3 dead, 40 injured in SNT bus mishap near Mangan

MANGAN, 17 AUG:
Three people were killed and 40 injured in a tragic road mishap here at Mangan in North Sikkim today involving an SNT bus. The morn-ing service bus of Sikkim Nationalized Transport registration SK-01B-0241 bearing number plying from Gangtok to Mangan plunged near-ly 100 feet off the road and tumbled onto the road below here at Am-bithang, one kilometer

short of Mangan.

The deceased have been identified as Dhan Raj Limboo [60] of Mangshila, Prabin Nair [26] of Namok, and Dup Tshering Bhutia [49], the Panchayat Secretary of Phensong, all from North Sikkim

Forty pants including the driver and the con-ductor were on board the ill-fated bus, out of whom 39 sustained in-juries grievous enough for them to be referred to STNM Hospital and

dead bodies have been handed over to the family members after autopsy at District Hospital. On hearing about the incident, area MLAcum-Deputy Speaker. Sonam Gyatso Lepcha, Minister of Transport, DT Lepcha, MP-Raiva Sabha, Hishey Lachungpa, Zilla Adhyakshya-North, Anguli Lepcha, and Chairperson Transport, Pintso Namgyal Lepcha, visited the District Hospital to meet the injured occupants.

It may be mentioned here that Gangtok-Mangan SNT service had been resumed a few months ago after a very long hiatus to make commuting easier for office goers and the public in general.

The last time that an SNT bus was involved in a major mishap was eleven years ago on 25 October 2006 when a bus had fallen off NH10 near Singtam claiming 21 lives. Talking with SummitTimes. Secretary Transport depart-ment stated that the department is saddened by the accident and victims will be provided ex-gratia amounts as per government and department

norms as soon as possible.

The accident has brought to light the lack of ambulance and staff at the District Hospital since ambulance and the official vehicles of NHPC Teesta Stage IV had to be pressed into service for rescue operations today.

Hike in salaries of ad-hoc employees, DA also hiked

GANGTOK, 17 Aug:
The CMO has directed the De-The CMO has directed the perpartment of Personnel to issue necessary orders 'urgently' to increase the salaries of ad-hoc employees and has detailed the re-vised salaries to be notified, as per a communiqué from the Principal Secretary to the Chief Minister to the Commissioner cum Secretary, DoP on Wednesday.

Henceforth, the salary of Medi-cal Officers [Doctor] & Dentists are to be made uniform at Rs 30.000 per month with Lecturers' and Post Graduate Teachers' salary being increased to Rs 25.000 and Rs 20,000 per month, respectively.

Likewise, the salary of Inspec-

tors, Junior Engineers, Retainers and Graduate Teachers has been raised to Rs 15,000 per month. Primary Teachers, Lower Division Clerks and Peons will be now getting Rs 12,000, Rs 10,000 & Rs 8,000 per month, respectively.

The Department of Personnel also been directed to issue instructions that an official after posting now has to serve a mandatory minimum period of two years at the place of posting.

Another circular received from the Department of Finance, Revenue & Expenditure today informs that the Governor has enhanced the rate of Dearness Allowance to the State Government employees and Dearness Relief to the State Government Pensioners from the existing rate of 132% to 136% with effect from 01 Jan 2017.

The DA at 136% will also be ad-

missible to the employees appointed on contract basis and work-charged establishment drawing revised pay in the regular scales of pay of the State Government. Accordingly, the rate of DA admissible to the All India Service Officers who continue to draw their pay in the pre-revised pay band/ grade pay as per the 6th Central Pay Commission recommendation to 136% w.e.f. 01 Jan 2017.

However, the circular mentions that the DA of All India Service Officers drawing pay in the revised basic pay as per recommendation of the 7th CPC will be enhanced from existing 2% to 4% from 01 Jan 2017.

The payment on account of DA/DR involving fraction of 50 paisa and above will be rounded off to the next higher rupee and fraction of less than 50 paisa will be ignored, the circular adds.

It may be mentioned here, Chief Minister Pawan Chamling had listed out a series of acrossthe-board increments in various social sector grants and payments made out by the State Government. These announcements make part of his Independence Day message. These "key announcements," the CM details, are being "undertaken for accelerated development and progress of the State".

On the occasion of the 71st Independence Day, the Lachen Dzumsa adopted four new reso-lutions as a step towards making their village a "green destination".

A press release informs that the Dzumsa has issued an order to replace all synthetic Dhajas [prayer flags] which have been found to be non biodegradable and were blocking drains and waterways, with cotton ones.

These have been now made available for sale in the village by the Dzumsa and thus shall reduce the volume of nonbiode-gradable waste to a great extent.

To reduce the use of disposable plastic plates and cups, the Dzumsa has also invested in steel plates and cups, which shall be used in all community events, and also given out on hire to anyone in the village at a

minimal price.

landmark Lachen also has been the setting up of a resource recovery center [RRC] in the village to segregate and store all recyclable materials from household waste which shall be linked to scrap dealers.

The RRC which is still to be formally inaugurated will set an example for the entire State.

On 15 Aug, the Dzum sa also announced a plan for household segrega-tion, making it mandatory for all households to segregate tins/ plastics/ tetrapaks/ glass/ carboard items separately in dry waste from their biodegradable waste. Mutual Respect Despite Everything

It is important for us to celebrate diversity, not fear it

It is unfortunate enough that people are communal by nature, but does one really require organizations, and now even governments, to keep trying to tease this inherent failing ever so often?

This latter development, made normal with the dominance of Right Wing ideology in governance, is worrying because it allows the ill-informed prejudices to be acted out by non-state actors – the kind one sees lining up for such outfits as Ram Sene, Hindu Yuva Vahini, Gau Rakshaks and the likes. Yes, all of these groups belong to the majority community, and before one counters with fingers pointing at the radical groups owing allegiance to minority groups, they should be reminded that intolerance is a major char acter flaw irrespective of which organization flaunts it. Meanwhile, in our country, most radical groups of the minority or fringe communities have already been either marked out as extremists or have been co-opted, however, elements claiming to represent the majority voice continue to be allowed to operate in the grey zone. They already have the numbers, and when they also get the State's backing, either through tacit support or through withdrawal of agencies which could keep things in check, their pent up frustrations over their own ignorance and failings find release against those who have not only been left largely unprotected, but also demonized. And majoritarianism is not always in the absolute numbers and can also manifest from elitist segments and the already privileged. We stand on a dangerous perch where shallow interpretations of majoritarianism are being foisted as the conscience of the nation and then being enforced by actors whose sense of nation is offensively parochial and inexcusably insular.

Indian nationalism, when the idea was born and reinforced to win Independence, was not about language, culture, religion, ethnicity or even history; it was more about the shared suffering of being subjects of an uncaring and exploitative Empire. It was inclusive in that sense, finding a common situation despite the diverse backgrounds. This common thread knit together a durable idea of India from the diversity that abounds in the subcontinent. But now, since we have a dispensation which has acquired power but has no legacy of being part of the anti-imperialist struggle, a new definition for nationalism is being stitched; one which seeks to impose ideas which are too narrow-minded for the grandness that is India. It is unlikely that this manufactured interpretation of Indian "values" will sustain, but till the time it lasts, it will cause much damage and the healing will take even longer. No iden tity should be framed around projected fears or at the cost of subsuming other identities, and yet, too much of that is being attempted.

It has become important for more voices to proclaim that India is more than the claims or fears of one mindset or region and that it is its diversity and abundance of contrasts that hold it together. Those who seek to impose uniformity pose a threat to the nation and should be called out as such.

Minority histories of the **Indian national flag**

This week, India celebrated 70 years of independence. The Tricolour, perhaps the most tangible and potent symbol of freedom from colonial servitude, is on particularly full display.

Few weeks ago, a rally was organised in Delhi under a 2,200-foot-long tricolour. At Attari, on the border of India and Pakistan, the tallest Indian flag in the country was recently mounted atop a 360-foot-high pole. Last year, Purnia, a town in northern State of Bihar, had a 7.1-kilometre-long tricolour Size it turns out does matter

Flag-waving also occupies a wide range of terrains, from banal street corners and sports matches to movie screens, in a display of both fervour and pride. The song "Maula Mere Le Le Meri Jaan" from the Hindi movie Chak De India (2007) is one

such moment:
"Teeja tera rang thaa main to teeja tere dhang se main to", it intones, reflecting on the flag's green shade: "I was your third colour, the one as fash-ioned by you".

Such spectacles generally come wrapped in the visual vocabulary of majoritarian politics, wherein the voices and concerns of the largest community dominate. Loyalty to the flag is never sui gener is; its citizens must be inculcated to display and demonstrate patriotism in this specific way.

The vivid shades of the Indian tricolour actually have a secret subaltern history, a genealogy that has been largely forgotten. As India celebrates its independence from Britain, it's a story worth re-

A SYMBOL WITH A FORGOTTEN HISTORY

We begin this brief history with an official doc-ent called Specification for the National Flag of India (Cotton Khadi), in which the Bureau of Indian Standards prescribes that the Indian national flag shall be a tricolour consisting of three rectangular (sub)panels of equal widths.

The specified colours are "India saffron" "white and "India green". At the centre is a design of the Ashoka Chakra, the "wheel of peaceful change" associated with a legendary ancient emperor Ashoka from the third century BCE. The wheel is in navy blue, the document says, before going into great

technical detail on other aspects of the national flag.

Two obvious questions arise here. Firstly, why do we call it a three-colour flag? Why has blue been erased from our cognitive frame when we think about the colour scheme of India's national flag?

And, second, this document does not tell us anything about meanings, social significance and popular perceptions pertaining to these four shades. We must go back in time to understand their origins.

BLUE. THE COLOUR OF RE-

VOLT AND DALIT POLITICS

In the popular memory of colonial period, blue is the colour of resistance. Commonly associated with indigo, the shade owes its political imagery from the "Indigo revolt" (Nil vidroha), a peasant uprising against the white Indigo planters in 1859-60 in Bengal.

Later, in 1917, the country witnessed another massive peasant mobilisation of indigo growers, this time in the northern state of Bihar. This event was transformative even for Mahatma Gandhi, who shifted his political attention from urban centres to rural landscapes of suffering and exploitation un-der the colonial regime.

It would be a fitting tribute to Gandhi and those rebellious peasants that the charka, or wheel, in the centre of the flag is in navy blue. But the wheel is bereft of Mahatma's spindle.

"India as a nation can live and die only for the spinning wheel", he often claimed, and this symbol occupied a central position in the model of Swaraj or self governance, laid out in his book Indian Home Rule.

In 1931, the Indian National Congress adopted it to don India's first pre-Independence flag as an emblem of the anti-colonial movement.

But in July 1947, just before independence, the charkha was replaced with the Ashokan wheel (chakra) in the design of India's first national flag. This irked Gandhi, who said he would "refuse to sa-

lute the flag" if it did not contain the charka.

There's also the eerie silence about navy blue, which compels us to confront the deep political prejudices of Indian politics. That's because its roots trace back to the dalit, to lower-caste politics. India's most famous dalit icon, a contemporary of Gandhi and Jawaharlal Nehru, Dr. Bhimrao Ramji Ambedkar, is always portrayed wearing a blue coat. Blue is still the colour of dalit politics in modern

Is it a mere coincidence that the colour of the Ashokan wheel in the Indian national flag, navy blue, remains uncounted when we talk about the "tricolour flag"? Or does this gesture perhaps reveal a deep grudge against dalit politics and subaltern voices?

WHITE FOR MINORITIES

Another colour that deserves more attention in any story of the flag is white. In the aforementioned official document, while saffron and green are affixed with the word "Indian", bestowing them a sense of rootedness and specific history, white has been denied similar cultural milieu.

Instead, it is perceived only in the universal vocabulary as representing peace and humanism. Why this erasure of particularities?

White is perhaps the most difficult shade

when it comes to telling a tale. From the bridal trousseau of Christian tradition to the Hima-layan snow capped Mount Kailasha, where, in poet Kalidasa's Sanskrit classic Meghadutam, it represents the laugh of Hindu god Shiva, to the ubiquitous caging in the monochromatic uniform of Hindu widowhood, the colour white is a canvas spread wide.

For Gandhi in 1921, while the flag's red and

green symbolised Hindu and Muslim communities respectively, white was to represent all the minority communities put together. In his scheme, they were to be protected by the other two.

RED AND SAFFRON

Soon, however, his own party, the Indian national Congress, officially distanced itself from this direct connection between colour and community. This was particularly important in the aftermath of violence between Muslims and Hindus communi-ties that had gripped the country in the 1920s.

Secular leaders (including the future prime minister Jawaharlal Nehru) championed saffron as a colour of valour, an ancient colour, and underplayed its popular association with right wing Hindu organisation, the Rashtriya Swayam Sevak Sangh and to the 17th-century Maratha warrior king Shivaji.

Yet to this day, the colour remains well associated with Hinduism and with Hindutva, an ideology that promotes an essentialist vision of Hinduism We have forgotten that saffron also came to India through minority religious traditions, including Buddhism, and via other ascetic religious move-

ments, like ancient Shramanic traditions.

It is rather ironic that in today's aggressive nationalism, India has completely forgotten the mi-nority histories of these colours. BYPASSING THE GREEN

The amnesia acquires a sinister property considering that the outgoing vice president, Hamid Ansari, recently voiced his anxiety pertaining to the vulnerability of minority communities in con

In the song from the film Chak De India, this anxiety is palpable. Premised upon the popular equation of green with Islam, the lyrics refer to green as the third colour, using the past tense – "I was your third colour" – lamenting the Muslim's community's growing marginalisation in contemporary India.

This erasure from the present, green's exile into the past, calls for deep introspection.

Health Check: do joint and muscle aches get worse in the cold?

he winter chill is often associated with an increase in aches and ains for many older people, particu-

larly in the joints, but also in the muscles. Some recent studies have shown an increase in general aches and pain in older men and women, and in particular a correlation between joint pain and weather conditions in patients with rheumatoid arthritis or steoarthritis.

For those without these condiions, any experience of pain with cold or wet weather may be related to changes in physical activity and diet. HOW DOES THE COLD AFFECT

OUR MUSCLES AND JOINTS? In investigating a link between

eather and joint pain, studies have examined temperature, barometric pressure, precipitation, humidity and sunshine for their links to pain. The results are somewhat inconclusive be-cause they vary greatly. This is largely ecause pain is subjective and it's dif-icult to isolate a particular cause. Other factors like exercise, mood

and diet also have an influence on pain perception. Some research fo-cused on the idea that atmospheric pressure may have the greatest effect. This is because there are gasses and fluids within joints, and if atmospheric pressure reduces, these gasses and fluids might expand, putting pressure on surrounding nerves causing pain.

But this has not been shown clearly.

A recent study found the combination of temperature, sunlight exposure and humidity correlates with joint pain in patients with rheumatoid arthritis. But the authors were quick to point out the variability in pain perception and other factors, like exercise and diet, means a clear



link still can't be drawn with confi-

ACHES IN WINTER

There are some things that can help reduce pain during the colder

Exercise: joint pain is often sociated with excess weight, so a weight-loss exercise program will help to take the pressure off the joints. Exercise also helps to improve metabolism and blood flow through muscles and joints, which can reduce inflammation, stiffness and pain.

Many people tend to be more active in the warmer months when the weather is pleasant and it's comfortable to be outside. It's important to continue exercise into winter as a reduction in physical activity in winter for more than two weeks results in loss of muscle strength and mass as well as reduced bone density. Being inactive for long periods can lead to a gain in fat mass and overall body weight which puts excess pressure on joints that can lead to injury.

Movements that include large

muscles of the legs, arms and torso such as squats, sit-ups and push-ups can be done in a fairly small space, and so are ideal inside during winter. Resistance exercise of this type is important for muscle and bone strength. Like muscles, bones adapt to the stimulus of repeated load bearing making them stronger and less prone to injury. This is particularly important for older individuals.

This doesn't mean you need to go to a gym and lift heavy weights, although you may consider joining a gym for individual or group exercise sessions. You can get enough stimulation for maintenance of muscle and bone strength through daily tasks and home workouts.

Vitamin D: exercising regularly can help to reduce symptoms in the long term, and getting outdoors for longer periods more often provides vitamin D for healthier bones and

When daylight hours are limited, vitamin D supplements are a good way to continue to get the benefits of this vitamin, which has an important role in bone mineralisation, muscle function and nerve growth. Studies have found daily supplementation with vitamin D reduces the risk of bone fracture and improves muscle

strength for older people.

It's recommended adults get at least 200 to 600 international units

(III) of Vitamin D daily if they're get ting some exposure to sunlight mos days. It's not easy to get vitamin D through diet, but in a country like Australia, where sunlight is available even in winter, this presents less o a problem than for people living in regions that have limited sunlight in

The best foods for vitamin D in clude fatty fish like sardines, mack erel and herring, milk, margarine and vitamin D-fortified soy drinks. But it's important to remember dietary sources alone are not sufficient to provide enough vitamin D. Sunlight is an important source and supplementation should be considered for those who have limited exposure to the su

Glucosamine and chondroitin glucosamine and chondroitin sul-phate help to provide nourishment to cartilage to improve joint function.
They make movement of the joint smoother by reducing the friction produced between the articulating surfaces of the bones. Crustaceans provide a good source of glucos-amine, while chondroitin sulphate can be obtained from cartilage of ani-mal bones. Supplementation of these is prescribed for patients with osteo arthritis to help restore cartilage.

Heat therapy: heat therapy car help greatly when you do have pain. Warm baths or showers, particularly in the morning can make a big differ ence to the level of pain and stiffness Warming the body increases elasticity of the tissue and improves blood flow making movement easier. It also activates neural pathways that reduce the brain's perception of pain.

Dredging of Brahmaputra to start soon to solve flood problem

NEW DELHI, AUG 17 (PTI): The dredging of the Brahmaputra river will start soon as a move to find a permanent solution to the perennial flood problem in Assam.

A decision in this regard was taken at a high-level meeting, chaired by Assam Chief Minister Sarbananda Sonowal and attended by top officials of central and state government here today.

"In course of the meeting, it has been decided to start the dredging of the Brahmaputra from Sadiya from Sep-tember onwards and as many as five dredgers will be pressed into service for the mega project," a state government statement said.

The floods in Assam



claimed 10 more lives. Around 31 lakh people across 24 districts are bearing the brunt of the flooding. The toll in the third wave of floods in the state has risen to 49. 133 people have died so far this year in flood- related incidents.

Today's meeting took up the construction of Brahmaputra Expressway threadbare and decided to rope in experts and man-power of Border Roads Organisation to build the expressway with the sand and silt dug-out through

dredging.
The Assam The Assam govern-ment will submit the detailed project report for Brahmaputra Express-way soon. Chief Minister Sonowal requested the Brahmaputra Board to set up a unit in Majuli and upscale its manpower to tackle flood in the island as well as in the state.

In the meeting, the Director General of Brahmaputra Board informed that the Board decided to start three major projects upstream to protect the river island Majuli from the fury of flood.

He also informed at a Rs 237-crore road-cum-embankment project would soon be started in the southern bank of Majuli which would help check flood-induced damages in the river island.

The meeting was held as a sequel to the announcement of Prime Minister's Rs 2,000 crore package for Assam and the Northeast for relief, rehabilitation, struction and flood mitigation measures

The package include Rs 400 crore for improv-ing water carrying capacity of the Brahmaputra through dredging in its entire stretch from Sadiya to Dhubri.

Sonowal said the pro-posed dredging besides enhancing the water holding capacity of the Brahmaputra would help in increasing navigation besides revamping the communication on the proposed Brahmaputra

Express Highway.
The chief minister also asked the central government to take up the repairing work of the National Highways in view of the deplorable road conditions.

KODAIKANAL (TN), AUG 17 (PTI): Manipur civil rights activist Irom Sharmila married long-time partner Desmond Coutinho a British national, under the Special Marriage Act at the Sub-Registrar's office here this morning.

The wedding was held in the presence of Sub-Registrar Rad-hakrishnan with Coutinho putting the ring on Sharmila's finger.

It was a simple function and the families of the bride and groom were absent.

Earlier, the couple married under the Hindu Marriage Act and were

asked by the Sub-Registrar to register it under the Special Marriage Act as their wedding was an inter-religious one.

Sharmila told reporters that Kodaikanal a peaceful place and her search for peace had end-

The rights activist said she would raise her voice for the welfare of tribals in Kodaikanal hills.

The wedding was objected to by a local activist V Mahendran, who contended that if the couple stayed in the hills, tribals in the area would face law and order prob-

However, the sub-reg-

istrar rejected the objection, clearing the decks for Sharmila's wedding with Coutinho.

The couple had submitted their application for marriage registration under the Special Marriage Act on July 12 and Sub-Registrar had called for objections, if any, within 30 days time.

A group of tribals in the area, including Palani Malai Pulaiyan and Paliyar had submitted a memorandum to the Sub- Registrar in support of the Sharmila-Coutinho wedding.

Sharmila had moved this hill town with Coutinho following her Assembly elections in March last in which her 'People's Resur and Justice Alliance' had been routed

The 44-year-old activist had shot to fame after launching an in-definite fast on November 4, 2000, demanding withdrawal of the Armed Forces (Special Powers) Act, 1958 from Manipur.

Sharmila, also known as the 'Iron Lady', broke her 16-year-long fast, the world's longest, on August 9, 2016 and declared that she wanted to become the chief min-ister so she could repeal the contentious AFSPA.

Nepal launches operation

Kathmandu, Aug 17 (PTI): Nepal has launched an operation to bring back four endangered one-horned rhinos that were swept away to various places in the country and to India during the recent floods. Chitwan National Park

(CNP) authorities have started rescuing four one-horned rhinos that were swept away by the Rapti river flood recently.

According to the park

officials, one of the five rhinos swept away by the flood was found dead in Gandak Canal while four others have been located in Nawalparasi and along

in Nawaiparasi and along the Indian border. "The flood carried away three rhinos to Nawaiparasi while the remaining two were spotted in India's Balmiki Nagar and Bagaha," said Narendra Aryal, assistant conservation officer of the CNP

"Authorities located a two-year-old baby rhino at Bagaha, 42-km southeast of Balmiki Nagar in India," Aryal said

Talks with the au thorities from Indian sides are being held to fetch the dislocated rhinos from Indian territo-

ries, he said. "We will first rescue the rhino spotted in a sugar-cane field in Bagaha. The rhino is trapped in floodwaters," Aryal said.

A CNP team led by Aryal reached Bagaha to rescue the rhino on Tuesen people, will be aided by three elephants. "A lot has to be con-

sidered before shooting a tranquilliser dart on a rhino trapped in floodwaters," he said. Six deer were also killed near CNP in the

floods. Police said that they found the carcasses of six deer on the banks of the Narayani River of Chitawan district in southwestern Nepal on Tuesday.


"They were killed by the flood and brought


here," police said. Basu Dhungana, wildlife conservationist, said animals that live close to water bodies and low laying areas are highly vulnerable at the times of flood.

"To mitigate risk of animals getting trapped and killed by floods, we should build high grounds close to their habitats," he added.

The floods triggered by incessant rains, in various places across the Chitwan district has wreaked havoc not only on human settlements but also the habitats of wild animals, resulting in the death of animals within and outside the

Park, the CNP said.
The death toll from widespread flooding and landslides in Nepal has reached 120 with nearly 35 people still unaccounted for and over six million affected by incessant rainfall across the country.

Sea glory: All-women Indian naval crew eyes record circumnavigation

of the Indian Navy is set to embark on an eight-month voyage in September to cir-cumnavigate the globe, the first such navigational attempt from Asia.

The naval officers led by Lt. Commander Vartika Joshi will set sail in the naval auxiliary vessel INSV Tarini from Goa and are expected to de-

part early next month.

"We will be passing through some of the roughest patches of sea during the voyage. It will be a tough journey but our spirits are high," Joshi told reporters today.

A native of Rishikesh in

Uttarakhand, she will skipper, the 55-feet INSV Tarini, built indigenously and inducted in the Indian Navy earlier in February this year.

Her team members on-

board the sister vessel of INSV Mhadei would be -- Lt. Commander Pratibha Jamwal from Kullu, Himachal



Pradesh; Lt. Commander Swathi P from Visakhapatnam, Andhra Pradesh; Lt. Aishwarya Boddapati from Hyderabad; Lt. Shourgrakpam Vijaya Devi from Mani-pur and Lt. Payal Gupta from

Dehradun.
"This all-women circumnavigation attempt would be the first of its kind, not only from India but also Asia. They well-trained and with

their maritime odyssey, they will also set sail into the re cord books," Naval Chief of Personnel Vice Admiral A K Chawla said.

"They are going to set benchmarks not just for India but for the entire world," he said.

The crew had met Prime

Norendra Modi yes-

terday.

Jamwal, who had joined

the Naval Academy in 2011, said the voyage is daunting but they are all trained and set for it.

The expedition -- 'Navika Sagar Parikrama' will be covered in five legs, with stopovers at four ports -- Freman tle (Australia), Lyttleton (New Zealand), Port Stanley (Falklands), and Cape Town (South Africa), the Navy said. Capt. (retd) Dilip Donde,

"I think what these six officers are attempting is very courageous. In an mountain expedition, you can stop and climb back, but once you are in the sea, you are in the sea. Only your faith and courage can help sail you through," he

INSV Tarini, having a wood core and fibre glass sandwich structure, was built by a shipyard in Goa and the vessel has sailed approximately 8,000 nautical miles till date, the Navy said.

Anand finishes joint eighth in St **Louis Rapid**

ST Louis (USA), Aug 17 (PTI): Former world champion Viswanathan Anand suffered a disappointing final round loss against Sergey Karjakin of Russia to finish joint eighth in the St Louis Rapid Chess tournament

After raising visions of a good finish, luck did not favour Grandmaster Anand much on the final day as he was first held to a draw by Le Quang Leim of Vietnam in the seventh round and then shared points with Fabiano Caruana of United States in the penultimate round.

The Indian ace ended on seven

points, coming through one win, five draws and two losses in the event that gave two points for a win and one for a draw

Levon Aronian of Armenia topped the rapid section with 12

points in all. On the final day, Aronian scored two good wins and a soli-

The American duo of Hikaru Nakamura and Caruana were right behind Aronian on 11 points each and Russian Ian Nepomniachtchi was fourth on 10 points. Lenier Dominguez of Cuba was right behind on nine points.

Le Quang Leim and Sergey Kar-jakin shared the sixth spot on eight points each while Anand, Garry Kasparov and Navara David of Czech Republic shares the eighth position.

The event is still only half way

through as the players will change gears again and play the blitz that will have eighteen games in all and the winner in the USD 150000 prize money tournament will be decided by the cumulative score.

For Anand, the road ahead looks

difficult but things can still turn around if he can start off with a few wins in the blitz. A five-point margin is huge and the turnaround can only happen with some massive scoring by Anand.

Garry Kasparov was again the big news of the day simply with his presence. However, Kasparov,

once the best player on the planet, could not keep pace with clock or pressure and lost two games be-sides getting lucky and winning one against Leim.

It was a heartbreak for the yes-teryear champion as he simply lost from a won endgame through a super-trick from David Navara in the first game of the day. Le Quang Leim dropped a rook in the next game from a playable position to give Kasparov his only victory in the event thus far while Caruana proved stronger in what was a tricky end-game in the final round.

Blue Whale game: NCPCR asks parents, teacher to be vigilant

NEW DELHI, AUG 17 (PTI): The NCPCR, apex body for child rights, has urged parents and teachers to "keep a watch" on children showing abnormal and erratic behaviour due to exposure to 'Blue Whale Challenge', the lethal online game which is suspected to have led to suicides in Kerala and elsewhere in the country.

'Blue Whale' is a controver-

sial Internet game in which a series of tasks, mostly brutal, are given to players for a period of 50 days by the administrators with a final challenge requiring them to commit suicide. The player is asked to share pho-tos after finishing the different levels of the game. The game is spread via links on social media platforms.



More than six children across India in the age group of 12-19 years are suspected to have taken their lives playing this game within a span of two weeks.

"We appeal to parents, teach

ers, students and all concerned individuals to keep a close watch on all those who may be

showing abnormal and erration behaviour because they may be playing online games such as the Blue Whale Challenge," the National Commission for Pro-

said in a press statement. The move comes after the government asked Internet

majors like Google, Facebook WhatsApp, Instagram, Microsoft and Yahoo to "immediately remove" links of the deadly game from their platforms. Law and Information and

Technology minister Ravi Shan-kar Prasad has earlier warned that violation of government direction by social media plat-forms would be viewed "very seriously".

Minister for Women and ild Development Maneka Gandhi had also written to Home Minister Rajnath Singh and Prasad requesting that the challenge be "removed" from

The NCPCR said it has also written to the IT ministry thrice since May asking it to identify violators.

Volkswagen submits roadmap on recall of 3.23L cars before NGT

New Delhi, Aug 17 (PTI): German auto major Volkswagen, which is embroiled in a global emission scandal, today submitted a roadmap before the National Green Tribunal to recall over 3.23 lakh vehicles in the country fitted with a 'defeat device' meant to fudge emission tests.

The roadmap was submitted by it in pursuance to the NGT's direction passed yesterday. The automobile giant is in the process of recalling several million cars across the globe.

A 'cheat' or 'defeat device' is a software in diesel

engines to manipulate emission tests by changing the

performance of the cars.

Volkswagen India had in December 2015 announced the recall of 3,23,700 lakh vehicles in India to fix the emission software after Automotive Re-search Association of India (ARAI) conducted tests on some models and found that their on-road emissions were 1.1 times to 2.6 times higher than the applicable BS-IV norms.

Partition through the eyes of an ex-British commander

eran British commander looks at the Partition from a military per-spective, analysing the thinking of and pressures on the politicians, administrators and soldiers of 70 years ago and how the violence

could have been prevented.

Barney White-Spunner describes the partition as a "tragedy that was, because the British had stayed on too long, probably unavoidable by 1947 but the violence and loss of life could have been reduced enormously had proper use been made of the armed forces".

In 2008, White-Spunner was the military commander of British and Coalition troops in Basrah and the three other provinces designated by the Coalition authority in Baghdad as constituting the south-

eastern sector of Iraq.

He says he has written "Partition:
The Story of Indian Independence and the Creation of Pakistan in 1947" from a soldier's perspective.

"It does not purport to be a full history of Indian independence and the birth of Pakistan. Such a study would be a lifetime's work, fill many volumes and is correctly best left to professional histori-



to do, as someone who has played a small part in British interventions around the world, is to explore the thinking of and pressures on the politicians, administrators and soldiers of 70 years ago, and the effect their subsequent actions had on the people of the Indian subcontinent," he adds. According to White-Spunner,

given his background, he has a better understanding of the Brit-ish players in this tragedy than he es of their Indian and Pakistani

"I don't hold with the view

that only Indian, Pakistani and Bangladeshi authors should write about 1947. What happened is as much part of British history - and if British authors don't write about it then the UK will not face up to what happened. In particular, the military aspects needed researching and writing about in detail -they were so fundamental to what happened - and I am pretty well qualified to do that," White-Spun-It took him about 28 months of

researching and 8 months of writing to finish the book, published by Simon & Schuster.

"While commanding British and Allied troops in Iraq, I found myself at that interface of politi-cal and military affairs whereby we were trying to make sense of political direction that was not al-ways clear. I have had a life-long fascination for India and Pakistan and particularly for the events of 1947 so I found myself wondering how our forbears had reacted when faced with similar issues,"

White-Spunner says he, in particular, was never able to under-stand why both the British and British Indian armies were not used more extensively in the Punjab.

"An effective military deployment, which was urged on the au-thorities in Delhi from as early as March 1947, would have prevented much of the violence. Why had this not happened? I also feel that although lots is written about Partition in India there is surprisingly little in the UK - just as there is surprisingly little about the events of World War Two in India and the Bengal famine," he says about the reasons he chose to write the book.

According to him, one of the advantages of writing having had military experience, and especially

cal-military interface, is that he is in a better position to understand what was going on between Claude Auchinleck and Lord Mountbatten

and the Army and Congress.

"It is the almost total lack of military initiative that was the cause of so much of the blood-shed; that is what needs exploring and my background means I can approach that with some idea of how armies and governments are

meant to work together," he says.
White-Spunner regards H
V Hodsons' "The Great Divide",
Ayesha Jalal's "The Sole Spokesman" and V P Menon's "The Transfer of Power in India" as the top three books on Partition.

"Hodsons' 'The Great Divide' is to understand the British perspective. It is factual rather than exciting to read but very well researched as Hodson was Reforms Commissioner before Menon. 'The Sole Spokesman' is to understand the Muslim League. Jalal has got nearest to what Jinnah really wanted, and Menon is one of the unsung heroes of 1947. Trusted by everyone he seems to me to be the architect of so much of modern India," the author says.

book between personal recollections and official government and military papers.

"I was also helped greatly by access to family papers from descendants of Brits who were there. The most valuable personal reminiscences were those recorded (or written - but many were recorded) fairly soon after 1947 as events were fresh in peoples minds - and hearts," he says.

He also dug out the full military records from the Army Headquar-ters in Delhi and from the Punjab

Boundary Force which are in the UK.

"They revealed a lot, such as that in 1946 the Army conducted a complete rehearsal of a breakdown of law and order in the Punjab, right down to the detail of how

they would protect trains."

Educated at Eton College and the University of St Andrews, White-Spunner was commissioned in 1979. He was made Commander of the British Field Army in 2009, a post he held until December 2011 when he retired. He was appointed Commander of the Order of the British Empire in 2002 and Knight Commander of the Order of the Bath in 2011.

Trump disbands business councils after CEOs quit in protest

WASHINGTON, AUG 17 (PTI): Donald Trump was today forced to disband two key business advisory councils after some members of the panels rebuked the US President for his incen-diary remarks on the Virginia violence in which he apparently defended white nationalists.

The abrupt decision came after the Strategic and Policy Forum, comprised of JPMorgan CEO Jamie Dimon, PepsiCo's Indian-origin CEO Indra Noovi, General Motors CEO Mary Barra and Walmart CEO Doug Mc-Millon, decided to aban-

The Strategic and Policy Forum and the White Manufacturing Jobs Initiative were both dissolved amid a string of resignations from the chief executives of top American firms over his
"ambiguous" response to
the violence in Virginia.
Trump had established the Manufacturing

Advisory Council in January after his swearing-in while the 16-member Strategic and Policy Forum was set up in De-cember when he was the president-elect.

"Rather than putting pressure on the business people of the Manufac-turing Council & Strat-egy & Policy Forum, I am ending both. Thank you all!" Trump said in a

As many as 11 CEOs in the advisory councils have quit so far.

A majority of them resigned after criticism mounted over Trump's less-than-encouraging response to the weekend violence in Charlottesville (Virginia), where a



car rammed into a crowd peacefully protesting against the rally by white supremacists, killing a peacefully

32-year-old woman.

Trump in his remarks had blamed both sides

for the violence.

Earlier in the day,
members of the Strategic Policy Forum in a joint statement said that intolerance, racism and violence have absolutely no place in the country and are an affront to core American values.

President's Strategic and Policy Forum was conceived as a bi-partisan group of business leaders called to serve our country by providing independent feedback and perspectives directly to the President on accelerating ident on accelerating economic growth and job creation in the United States, the members said.

"We believe the debate over Forum par-ticipation has become a distraction from our well-intentioned and sincere desire to aid vital policy discussions on how to improve the lives of everyday Americans,"

Sarahah has become the talk of the town and viral on social media. Everyone, be it on Facebook, Twitter, In-stagram or Snapchat, is talking about Sarahah, an app that allow users to send anonymous messages to oth-ers registered with the app. The key highlight of Sarahah is that it doesn't reveal the identity of the sender of the message at any given cost. This is where Sarahah stands out from other similar applications available on the Play Store.

So you downloaded the Sarahah app and you are loving all the attention, both good and bad. It makes you feel important, gives you the idea that you are being noticed, but there's al-ways this itch that makes you want to know who is sending these messages.

With that said, there are plenty of websites that have come to the rescue of those desperate to know their secret admirers [or haters]. Well not exactly, as these are some hardcore scamming websites that are simply out to make money off the poor souls who are desperate to know who that anonymous sender really is [it's not Justin Bieber for sure!]. If you have ever fallen prey to

those game cheats, cheat codes or game hack websites, the first steps to knowing your anonymous sender

itself will be a clear cut hint to close that tab and may be go meet a shrink about your growing self-obsession.

These websites that claim to ex

pose users of the Sarahah service, are clearly fake. Take 'www.sarahahexposed.com' for example. The website has a number of tickers to make you believe that there are hundreds of users

currentwebsite, along with another active ticker that is actually pushing out some make be

lieve messages to give desperate visitors the impression that it's actually scanning through Sarahah's message ar-

As we all know by now, Sarahah is all about one-way traffic. You find a user, you type in your personal text message and he or she will never know it was you. Sarahah's privacy policy clear states that it does not "sell, trade, rent or disclose any information to any third party out of this website or sites out of our network". Which should be good enough for the teenager of 2017.

So what happens when you type in your username on such scamming

You will first be led to a couple of options to help support the hard

working servers and their philanthropic owners who work tirelessly to let you know who your anonymous

s e n d e r . Clearly, it is anything but that!

You will first be greeted by a message TRENDING telling you how the service is free and how you will need to click on a couple of links to keep the site's servers running [so that others looking for answers fall prey].

Post this you will in all probability get a 'Decrypt my messages' button. If you thought this was the end you will finally get to know your anonymous You will then be guided to another

page that will ask users to complete a couple of tasks after which the page with your decrypted messages will itomagically" unlock.

Now comes the fun part. You will

then be forced to either download games, download apps or play contests to 'Win an iPhone 7'. So you downloaded a couple of apps, liked a couple of random Facebook pages, and even played a couple of contests. That's when you head back to the page and discover that nothing has really changed and that it's all a scam. Some genius actually made easy money off you by getting you to click on some links and play some contests [may be even giving up your personal

And it's not just the websites. Users of the Sarahah app have even reported getting messages to head to these scamming websites to know their secret admirers. How these services get contact details is a clear mystery for now.

So it is wise to avoid such websites and keep your secret admirers [or haters] a secret because there's really nobody else, apart from your-self, who will know "what you did last
