ration, he ran for 12 hours on hilly terrain on 14 July, covering a distance of around 80 KMs apart from his daily practice, he informed.

"The competition is really tough and a first for me, but I am confident that I will finish in the top-10," he said. He also thanked his supporters and well wishers who have backed his passion over the years. "This is over the years. "This is a good sign that many people have been coming forward to support sportspersons as this will encourage the younger generation to make a ca-reer in sports," he said.

#### Concern in Rajya Sabha over Rohingyas in Jammu, Ladakh

DELHI, JULY 24 (PTI): Veteran journalist and nominated member Swapan Dasgupta today expressed concern over the reported influx of Ro-hingya refugees in Jammu

and Ladakh saying it was a matter of national security. Raising the issue during the Zero Hour in the Rajya Sabha, he said there was a "vicious" ethnic conflict and civil war going on in Myanmar, but since it was an internal affair of a friendly neighbouring country, "we refrain from commenting on it".

"But it is curious and inexplicable as to why there should be so many Rohingyas who have migrated to Jammu and to Ladakh," he said. Rohingyas are tribals from

known as the 'boat people'.

Dasgupta said as per
the Jammu and Kashmir Government, there are approximately 5,700 Rohing-yas in Jammu and 7,664

Rohingyas in Ladakh. Whereas the UN High Commission for Refugees states there are 14,000 Rohingyas in the whole of India, the media reports say that the Home Ministry estimates there are 40,000, he added.

# If there is a will, there may be a way

What is clear by now is that the
Centre will not intervene in Centre will not intervene in the Darjeeling situation until the West Bengal government officially urges it to.

And, given the West Bengal gov-ernment's outlook, an official appeal may not come in the foreseeable future.

But, the state government has

been requisitioning Central security forces along with the Army when-ever hostilities escalated in the hills since June 8 and the Centre has been complying with a fair share of blame game thrown in between.

The pattern implies that both the Centre and the state are treating the hill situation as a law and order problem, not a political issue born out of identity crisis, as claim the movement protagonists. So where does it leave the people

of the hills and by extension of the region, which is also affected by the hill movement nudging two months now? In between a rock and a hard place is the answer.

Against this backdrop West Ben-gal chief minister Mamata Banerjee begins her Delhi sojourn starting Monday to attend the swearing in ceremony of the country's 14th President. Will the courtesy visit also graduate into meetings with the country's policy makers on the Dar-jeeling issue, even if on a personal basis? Here is keeping the fingers

rossed that it does.

With all sides maintaining rigid stands in keeping with their respective agenda, the hill movement has entered a blind alley. No relief is possible unless some side relents without pre-conditions.

That the Centre will not engage

on the hill issue till the West Bengal government asks it to became clear last week when replying to a ques-tion in Parliament from CPI-M MP Mohammed Salim vis a vis the hill movement, the Parliamentary Affairs minister, Ananth Kumar held Mamata Banerjee's "ham-handed" approach responsible for the hill

When the Parliamentary Affairs minister makes such a statement in Parliament, the message - 'it is your mess, you clean it,' goes out loud and

It is informed that SYA is just four months old and currently has around 500 members.

Addressing a press conference here today, SYA executive member, Bhanu Pratap Rasaily stated that few like-minded people of the State formed this organisation with the main aim of safe-guarding Sikkim and its people.

"We found that the people of Sikkim are presently living in an insecure environment, so we, the youth, decided to step forward and voice our issues to the State and Central governments," he said. He alleged that the State government has secretly diluted Article 371F which is considered as the safeguard of Sikkim and its people.

Speaking on the recent Rhenock incident, Mr Rasaily alleged that the negligence at Rhenock health centre is just an instance in which a child lost her life due to negligence but there are lots of other such incidents happening in the State. He alleged that the incident shows the deplorable condition of the health sector in the State.

Another SYA executive member, Manish Raj Shrestha stated that Sikkim University has not been able to set up its own campus in the last 10 years since its establishment and has been compelled to spread along the highway

The State government announced to make Sikkim an educational hub but SU does not even have its own campus in the State. However, numerous private pharma companies have been able create their own infrastructures easily. This is a total failure on the part of the State government," he alleged further adding that students have been suffering due to the same.

He also demanded that the State government make immediate arrangements for students of Sikkim studying in the schools of Darjeeling hills to continue their studies.

#### Young and Violent

#### Sikkim needs to wake up to a worrying trend and begin engaging

A youth was brutally assaulted on a very minor prov-docation in the heart of Gangtok over the weekend. A few days before that, another youth tried to get out of a scrap by pulling out a firearm and shooting in the air. Then there is the incident in which a person was shot from the back as he was returning home. There is no reason at hand to believe that this was a premeditated attack and could well have been over provoca-tion so petty that the victim is not even aware of it, or still more worryingly, a violent release sought out either on purpose or inducement by an idle mind with access to a dangerous weapon. These present a worrying scenario which add to the stress that the society here is already under due to rampant substance abuse, a disturbingly regular leveraging of privilege to escape accountability and debilitating ennui among the a wide cross-section of the young.

Such violence is not new to Sikkim and in the recent past, a youth was shot at pointblank range by a clearly demented mind (thankfully the youth survived, unfortunately, the cops could not build a halfway decent case) and another college youth succumbed to injuries received in a brutal beating by boys only slightly older than him. The Singtam thana is still talking about the insane rage the law keepers had to confront when they brought in a driver for questioning following a complaint. Agreed, these are but a few instances, but these are the ones which have come out in the public domain. There must be several episodes of such unhealthy outbreaks of violence occurring in schools, at homes and among friends which go unreported. Even if there are no other such incidents, these by themselves point to a disturbing trend which needs to be recognized and addressed before it strikes deeper roots. Sikkim, or course, is not alone in being visited by increasing instances of juvenile violence. Horror stories from USA and Europe of shootings in schools and other instances of macabre dystopian violence by the young have often made headlines. When these instances make headlines elsewhere, they also lead to much soul-searching and receive the attention of experts who then come up with possible solutions. It is unlikely that such focus will be invested into Sikkim's situation. So the people here will need to devise their

It will help to learn what is already widely understood about the young and violent crimes. The reason experts feel juvenile's commit crimes is because of risk factors when they were younger. Some risk factors associated with juvenile crime are poverty, repeated exposure to violence, drugs, easy access to potentially harmful weapons, unstable family life and family violence, delinquent peer groups, and media violence. These are generalizations, but look around, and one needs to accept that generalizations can sometimes be accurate. Of these risk factors, the demise of family life and the effect of the media and delinquent peer groups can be flagged as playing the more dominant role in turning so many juveniles to the delinquency path in Sikkim. The end of the joint family system and the increasing number of broken families expose children to spite and violence much younger than they should learn of these things and often also to neglect and even abuse, setting them up to be taken down by other influences. Psychologists have known for a long time that children who have suffered neglect and/or abuse in their earlier years display high levels of aggression and antisocial behavior. And then there is "media violence". A recent study in USA has shown that before the time a child has reached seventh grade, the average child has witnessed 8,000 murders and 100,000 acts of violence on the television! Most kids the world over are exposed to similar media nowadays, in fact, one could argue that children here and in our country might have seen more violence than their Western counterparts thanks to the absurd acceptance of violence on TV in these parts where crime shows are part of family viewing time. At least this we can change immediately because it is universally accepted now that heavy exposure to televised violence is one of the causes of aggressive behavior, crime and vio-lence in society. Television violence affects youngsters of all ages, of both genders, at all economic levels, and all levels of intelligence. Because the society at large still refuses to see violent crimes by the young with the worry and concern they demand, more young find themselves in the company of unreprimanded peers, an easy trap to fall into in an environment which offers very few alternatives to engage them.

Yes, these are generalizations and even superficial comments to flag a very real problem, but this is attempted here to start a conversation so that something more meaningful could shake out.

# **Can Tourism Alleviate Global Poverty?**

Wouldn't it be great if something as simple and pleasurable as international travel could help end something as grinding and enduring as global poverty? After all, the industry is booming, growing at least 4% a year since the 1960s (with a brief slowdown in 2009), according to the United Nations World Tourism Organisation (UNWTO).

In 2016, over 1.3 billion interna-

tional tourists spent an estimated US\$1.4 trillion. That's the equivalent of Australia's gross domestic product,

dispersed around the world.

The UN has even declared 2017
the International Year of Sustainable Tourism for Development, heralding the role of international travel in reducing poverty. But how much global tourism money really makes its way to poor countries?

#### THAT BIG TOURISM PIE

Researchers from Griffith University and University of Surrey provide a mechanism to get find out - Global Sustainable Tourism Dashboard. And, spoiler alert, it's not inspiring.

The dashboard was launched in January 2017 to measure tourism's impacts and contribution to the UN's 2015-2030 Sustainable Development Goals. Among other sustainability-re-lated indicators, it can determine whether tourism is really redistributing wealth by tracking how much travel money arrives in the world's least developed countries (LDCs) and small island developing states (SIDS).

Some 14% of the global popula-tion [lives in LDCs (which includes Cambodia and Some 14% of the global population lives in LDCs, (which include Cambodia and Senegal, among others) and SIDS, like Vanuatu and the Dominican Republic.

Yet in 2016 these countries saw ust 5.6% of global international tourism expenditure. If we take Singapore (a small island developing state in name only) out of the mix, it falls to 4.4% - just US\$62 billion out of the US\$1.4 trillion spent worldwide on travel in 2016.

Mainly, the dashboard shows, global tourism is an economic ex-change between rich countries. Citizens of ten nations, most of them in Europe and North America, make about half of all international travel. China, which in 1995 was not a mem ber of this frequent flyer club, broke



MONEY CAN'T BUY EVERYTHING If the share isn't great, the total amount of traveller money spent in hese countries is still substantial US\$79 billion in 2016 alone. This is as much as the foreign aid budget of the US, Germany, UK and France combined, based on figures from the World Economic Forum

But money alone doesn't reduce poverty. If it did, Thailand, the world's fourth most popular tourism destination, would be rich (it earned US\$54 billion from international

tourism in 2016).

Whether a cash injection turns into development depends on many well-studied factors. For example, less developed countries lack the critical goods and services that tourists require, including airports, accommodation, key attractions, tour guides and telecommunications, to me just a few.
This leads to what economists call

"leakage". When a country must import everything from generators and solar panels to certain kinds of food, it spends a considerable proportion of tourist dollars before they can multiply in the local economy.

In developing countries, leakage ranges from 40% in India to 80% in Mauritius, according to researcher Lea Lange who wrote a 2011 paper for the German development agency GIZ, depending also on the factors that are included in the analysis

Part of the broader leakage prob lem is that tourism investors are often foreign, so the profits are expatriated. Cruise lines are notorious for this. Ships may well visit a dozen small island developing states on any given marine jaunt, but most of the profit goes back to headquarters profit goes back to head which are typically located in West-

#### DON'T LET THAT DOLLAR GO

Governments can reduce leakage by thinking strategically about procure-ment, emphasising local business development, integrating supply chains and investing in education and training to prepare workers for tourism jobs.

Such changes helped Samoa, where tourism is one of the economy's main pillars, develop a more diversified and lucrative portfolio. Tourism income has grown from US\$73 million in 2005 to US\$141 million in 2015 (at current prices), when the industry contributed 20% of the country's GDP. It welcomes about 134,000 international visitors annually.

Among other innovations launched jointly by donors, government and community groups, Samoa increased locals' share of traveller resources by reinventing its fales - simple, sometimes open-air beach huts that often attract backpacker-types - to appeal to luxury travellers.

Out of the 2,000 hotel rooms in Samoa, about 340 are now fales, which are typically owned and operated by local families. The Samoa Tourism Authority assists them in business planning, marketing and service delivery. Samoan tourism was given a boost

by a lucrative 2009 contract with the Body Shop to produce and sell coco-nut-based beauty products. With the Samoan Women In Business Development Initiative securing continuity and scale, this deal is likely to create positive domestic tourism spin-offs like greater entrepreneurial capacity among Samoan women, business confidence, and brand enhancement of Samoa with luxury connotations. By 2014, Samoa was no longer clas-

sified as a least-developed country.

Making sure that visitor dollars benefit local people also depends on the commitment of foreign-owned companies, particularly hotel groups, to partner with and invest in local communities.

The Marriott in Port au Prince, for example, has been feted not just for setting up shop in earthquake-shat-tered Haiti (one of the world's least-developed countries) in 2015 but for hiring local, paying well and fo-cusing on professional development. This has proven to be a good business strategy, too. With happy workers, the hotel has very low turnover.

MAKING TOURISM WORK

Ecuador, Fiji and South Africa are among other countries illustrating that tourism can contribute to de velopment and alleviate poverty. The English travel agency Responsible Travel, which holds annual World Responsible Tourism Awards, showcas es more great examples.

International organisations such as the UN can help countries find this balance by financing transport connectivity, for example, and facilitating infrastructure investment that's mindful of potential tourism uses.

Capacity-building among domes-tic stakeholders is also critical. Only when a destination's tourism offices, luxury hotels and ecoparks are run and staffed by well-trained locals can the benefits of tourism be equitably distributed, its costs effectively managed and its growth sustainable.

Individuals have a role to play,

too, by making ethical travel choices Tourists visiting developing countries can maximise the community benefits of their trip by "going local" on everything from food and tour companies to craft purchases.

Opting for certified "responsible" companies and simply by asking the right questions may also send an imortant signal over time that tourists care about their impacts.

Tourism will never end poverty. But if governments, industries and consumers start paying attention, they can make it a force for change.

#### How wildfires could radically change forests- and your life

Alonely bird call breaks my con-centration and I glance upward. glacier-topped mountains should be filling the horizon, instead my view is obscured by a strange orange haze. Even the bright sun has given up. It seems to float in the sky

I am a field ecologist working east of the Denali mountain range in Alas-ka, but the postcard-worthy view of my sites today is obscured by smoke drifting across the border from wild-fires burning throughout British Columbia. I have been studying boreal wildfires for years and have a strong understanding of the importance of fire to the boreal forest of Canada.

Boreal wildfires in Canada are spectacular displays of nature's force they burn across hundreds of thousands of kilometres and can last for months, sometimes smouldering right through the winter. These fires tend to occur in remote regions that simply cannot be managed. And their zone of impact is much wider than most people ever imagine as soot, ash and smoke drift in long-range atmospheric circulation patterns across geopolitical borders, affecting air quality around the world.

Over the past 5,000 years, re-peated cycles of burning followed by vegetation recovery have allowed conifer forests to flourish into the great forested biome that today covers much of Canada. But multiple lines of evidence are now telling us a convincing story that boreal fires are changing — they are getting bigger, larger, and more intense, particularly in northwestern Canada. And if this continues, there is a good chance that

the next years of wildfire will cause fundamental changes to our iconic northern forests.

Conifer trees need fire. Following light or moderate fire activity, trees like black spruce often regenerate im-mediately. But when northern forests burn too severely, deciduous trees like aspen and birch can outcompete conifers during post-fire succession. FIRES ALREADY CHANG-

#### ING NORTHERN FORESTS

some areas of boreal North Amer ica, we already are seeing large increases in the extent of deciduous forests as a result of increasing fire activity. There is no doubt that such an important shift in the makeup of Canadian forests will have winners and losers. Some animals may thrive with the better forage quality pro duced by deciduous species, while others will lose important habitat.

A loss of conifer forest area would mean big changes for how the boreal biome interacts with the Earth's climate system. The consequences of fire-induced shifts in the structure of boreal forests would be far ranging from small-scale changes in biodiver-sity to global-scale changes in albedo (the amount of the sun's energy reected back into space) and greenhouse gas emissions.

Northwest Canada has experienced steady increases in the annual amount of forest area burned over the second half of the 20th century. This is despite similar increases in money spent on fighting fires. Some of the variation in fire regimes in this area is attributed to anthropogenic — human-made — climate change and this influence is only likely to strengthen in the future.

There are some easy conclusions

to reach. Warmer, drier fuels will burn more - this seems obvious to anyone skilled in building a campfire. But there will be plenty of surprises when it comes to making predictions about the future of Canada's fire regime. People, for example.

Humans cause about half of the fires in Canada, although most of the area burned still results from fires started by lightning. With more people moving into and relying on the boreal forest, this dynamic between human versus lightning-initiated fires could shift in the next century.

Scientists in general expect cli-

mate change to increase the frequency of lightning ignitions in the north, but there is plenty we still need to learn about how climate change will influence storm events and cloud-to-ground lightning discharges.

It is impossible to make predictions about boreal fires without considering future vegetation. If deciduous forests do increase in extent, this will have major impacts on fuel-mois ture content, ignition probabilities and area burned.

Other disturbances that affect the amount of dead wood in forests also are likely to alter fire activity. There are number of examples of insect outbreaks triggered by climate change and this can lead to fuel accumulation and greater risk of severe fires.

IMPACT ON HUMANS

Climate change is not an esoteric concept for people living in the north. Northerners are intimately connected with their land and know that their homes are experiencing warming at a faster rate than anywhere else on the planet. Wildfire perhaps can be viewed as a climate change beacon, a harbinger of things to come.

While big fire years used to occur episodically, maybe once or twice a decade, now it seems that there is always a big fire year occurring some-where in Canada or Alaska. In 2014, the Northwest Territories experi-enced its largest fire year on record. In 2015, the military was called in to assist firefighters battling large fires in Saskatchewan. In 2016, images of the Fort McMurray fires were broadcast all over the world. And today, on this summer day in 2017, I am supposed to be working in one of the most pristine areas of Alaska, but am instead breathing in smoke from Canadian fires.

While I study wildfires from a nat-ural science perspective, I am acute-ly aware of the sociological impacts. Fires cause human health problems and anxiety. Wildfires cause more evacuations in Canada than any other natural disaster. The Fort McMurray fire alone forced more than 80,000 Canadians to flee their homes.

Not too long ago, I spoke with an emergency room doctor based in a northern Canadian city who told me about increases in post-traumatic stress disorder diagnoses following big fires. "Is it the sight of billowing smoke and flames?" I asked. The anxiety of having to leave your home and not knowing whether it would still be standing when you returned? No, she said. She believed it was

the realization of a new reality — that climate change was no longer something to just talk about. It's here, and it will affect how people will live and survive in the north. Fire is just part of the stress of this new reality.

According to the list of untraceable monu-ments prepared by the ministry, Uttar Pradesh tops with 11 such monuments, followed by two each in Haryana, Delhi, Maharashtra and Rajasthan, and one each in Assam, Arunachal Pradesh, Uttarkhand, Madhya Pradesh and West Bengal.

Conservationists say that urbanisation has made it very difficult to trace such monuments and often buildings come up around them and

eventually parts of the historical site are "swal-

lowed up."

Another reason for the monuments disappearing is the routine encroachment, say senior culture ministry officials.

The minister listed such encroachments in centrally protected monuments during the last five years which his ministry has

partially removed.

They include Asafi Imambara in Lucknow, a mosque at Sakhakheda in Maharashtra, Mahadev

Fort, Dantenshwari Devi Temple at Chattisgarh, D'Eremao Cemetery in Delhi, Mosque of Sarai Alavardi Khan in Hary-ana and Virupaksha Temple in Hampi, Karnataka.





BEIJING, JUL 24 (PTI): China said today that it will safeguard its security interests at "any cost" as its sovereignty was "in-domitable", amid a standoff with India in the Sikkim sector.

Chinese Defence Ministry spokesman Wu Qian made this ssertion ahead of this week's National Security Advisors' (NSA) talks to resolve the standoff.

Maintaining China's hardline stance on the issue, Wu told a media briefing that the willingness and resolve of China to defend its sovereignty was "indomitable".

"China will safeguard its security interests at any cost. India should not leave things to luck and not harbour any unrealistic illusions," he said ahead of the 90th anniversary of the People's Liberation Army (PLA).

Commenting on the over a month-long military standoff between the troops of the two countries at Doklam area in the Sikkim section, Wu urged India "correct its mistake".

Stating that the PLA has tak-



en emergency measures in the region and continues to increase focused deployments and drills, he said, "We strongly urge India to take practical steps to correct its mistake, cease provocations, and meet China halfway in jointly safeguarding the border re-gion's peace and tranquillity."

His comments came as NSA Aiit Doval is set to travel to Beijing this week to attend the BRICS NSAs meeting school uled to be held from July 27-28 during which he is expected to hold talks with his Chinese counterpart Yang Jiechi. Both Doval and Yang are Special Representatives of the two coun-

tries in the boundary talks.
Chinese officials say while there may not be a formal meeting between the two officials, keeping with Beijing's public position that no talks will be held without India withdrawing troops, they could hold discussions on the sidelines to end the deadlock.

Last week, External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj told

Rajya Sabha that China intends to unilaterally change the status of the tri-junction with Bhutan. which poses a challenge to India's security.

She had said there was a written agreement between In-dia, China and Bhutan in 2012 that the three nations will together decide on the boundaries at the tri-junction point.

She also accused China of building roads using bulldozers and excavators, which has been protested by Bhutan in writing

Swaraj also said that India was not "unreasonable" on the issue and all nations were with it.

The standoff between China and India in the Doklam area near the Bhutan tri-junction has dragged on for the past four weeks. It started after a Chinese Army's construction party attempted to build a road.

Doka La is the Indian name for the region which Bhutan recognises as Dokalam while China claims it as part of its Donglang region.

#### FM introduces bill to replace Banking Regulation Ordinance

NEW DELHI, JUL 24 (PTI): A bill to authorise the RBI to direct banking companies to resolve the problem of stressed assets was on Monday introduced in the Lok Sabha by Finance Minister Arun Jaitley.

The Banking Regulation (Amendment) Bill, 2017, seeks to amend the Banking Regulation Act, 1949 and replace the Banking Regulation (Amendment) Ordinance, 2017, which was promul-gated in May this year.

The measure allows the RBI to initiate insolvency resolution process on specific stressed assets. The RBI would also be

empowered to issue other directions for resolu-tion, appoint or approve for appointment, authorities or committees to advise the banking companies for stressed asset resolution. Jaitley
