start from the end of this

"There was a series of meetings with the stake-holders on the matter. The introduction of online system would make the process much more hassle free and easy. Moreover, the online permit facility is only for tour operators registered with State Tourism De-partment," said a senior checkpost official.

Before this the tour operators had to line up outside the checkpost division office near MG

Marg every morning.
A portal with login id and password would be provided to tour operator by the checkpost

office.
"The process is very simple, once the user logs in to the portal he/she can fill up the required

relevant documents. An online permission would be granted which has to be shown to the police while checking in at 3rd Mile checkpost," said the official.

There are around 700 registered tour operators

in Sikkim. Rajni Gurung of Snoopy Tours and Travels said that the online system would also keep a check on tour agencies which are not registered.

"This system is good. Complete transparency would be maintained. Earlier, the process was long and time consuming," she added.

More than 1500 vehicles carrying tourists ply to Tsomgo Lake and Baba Mandir everyday during peak tourist season.

Suraj Rai of Hills Tours and Travels said that poor internet connectivity may create a problem for the tour operators. "We have to upgrade

with technology but in Sikkim internet connec-tivity is a problem. There should also be other pro-visions through which the permit could be obtained when the portal is not working," he suggested.

Situation in Doklam fine: Army Chief

NEW DELHI, FEB 21 (PTI): The situation in Doklam is "absolutely son to worry, Army chief Bipin Rawat said here today, amid reports of China developing defence infrastructure near the strategically key area.

Commenting on last year's Doklam standoff, Navy Chief Admiral Sunil Lanba said "frequent" instances of transgres-sion by the Chinese army across the Line of Actual Control (LAC) and the Doklam incident were an indication of increasing assertiveness by China.

Admiral Lanba, who

is also chairman of chiefs of staff committee, while addressing a confer-ence, said the face-off at Doklam has also under-scored the vulnerability of Siliguri Corridor, a 22 km-long narrow stretch linking the Northeast

with the rest of India.

"(It is) absolutely fine. There is nothing to worry," Gen. Rawat told reporters on the sidelines of the event when asked about the current situation in Doklam.

Troops of India and China were locked in a 73-day-long standoff in Doklam from June 16 last year after the Indian side stopped the building of a road in the disputed tri-junction by the Chi-nese Army. Bhutan and China have a dispute over Doklam. The face-off ended on August 28.

As a close friend and neighbour, Bhutan en-joys diplomatic and mil-



itary support from India

Addressing the conference on bridging gaps and securing borders in the north-eastern region, Admiral Lanba said despite the cartographic differences with China, peace and tranquility has been maintained along the LAC for several decades.

"However frequent instance of transgres-sion by the PLA (Peoples Liberation Army) across the LAC and the recent standoff at Doklam are indication of increasing assertiveness of China, as it makes rapid progress both economically and militarily. The recent developments have also underscored the vulner-ability of Siliguri corridor." he said.

The Navy Chief said the Northeast has a large portion of international borders and that the re-gion should be integrated into the national economy and national con-sciousness by improving its infrastructure econo my and connectivity.

Enforcement Directorate gets deep into this case and brings it to a logical conclusion and book all the culprits who have used the SBS as their personal bank and embezzled hundreds of crores of public money and have build empires in different corners of the country and abroad,"

SC allows Centre to withdraw force from Darjeeling hills

DELHI, FEB 21 (PTI): The Supreme Court today allowed the Centre to withdraw the remaining four compa-nies of Central Armed Police Forces (CAPF) from West Bengal's troubled Darjeeling area after March 8, amid the state government's demand that they be kept for four more weeks.

A bench headed by Chief Justice Dipak Misra settled the dispute between the Centre and the state over deployment of CAPF companies in Darjeeling area which was affected by the agitation of the Gorkha Janmukti Morcha

A bench, also comprising Justices A M Khanwilkar and D Y Chandrachud, considered Attorney General K K Venugopal's submission that the deployment of the central armed forces fell under the Cen-tre's administrative domain and allowed it to withdraw the remaining CAPF companies.

The apex court set aside the Calcutta High

Court order that had restrained the Centre from withdrawing CAPF from the state's hilly regions on the ground that normalcy had not returned and said the pending case at the High Court would now stand disposed of.

The apex court had earlier permitted the Centre to withdraw four of the eight CAPF companies from Darjeeling and Kalimpong. Before that, the Cen-

tre was allowed to with-draw seven of the 15 companies of CAPF from Darjeeling and Kalim-pong districts for deployment along the borders of Jammu and Kashmir and in the northeast-ern states besides the then poll-bound states of Gujarat and Himachal

Pradesh.
The Calcutta High
Court had stayed the
withdrawal of CAPF from Darjeeling hills, the scene of unrest over the statehood demand, till October 27 last year after the state government approached it, opposing the Centre's decision.

Earlier, he briefly in-teracted with Maraikkayar. Kalam's family presented a memento carrying an image of the for-mer president to Haasan. He also paid homage at the memorial of the 'missile man' at Peikarumbu.

However, Haasan's plans to visit a school where Kalam studied could not fructify as the local administration denied permission, saying it was "political" in nature

He had planned to address the students of the

school at 8 AM. However. the Mandapam Assistant Elementary Education Officer denied permission on the ground that if politicians were allowed to talk to the school children, it would create confusion among the kids, official sources said.

But the actor-director said there was "no pol-itics" in his visit to Kalam's house or the pro-

posed one to the school.

"Kalam who came from a simple house is an important person for me... a role model. I am happy to have gone there. It was a planned visit, there is no politics in the visit to his house," he later told re-

Haasan praised, among others, Kalam's patriotism and aspira-tions, saying he was attracted by such characteristics in him.

"A part of my learning is his life. That is why I went to the school. I wanted to go the school where he studied. There was no politics in the school visit also. They can prevent me from going to school but not from learning," he said.

Referring to the lyrics of a song from one of his films, Haasan said he was prepared to learn if he had to do so "by breaking



Rescuing Victims of Trafficking

We all have a responsibility help them heal

R arely does a week go by without news of missing girls or information arriving about the rescue of others from the web of trafficking. Of course, not every incident of the former kind is of someone being stolen away for trafficking and much as one is relieved by news of the latter kind, that feeling has to be tinged with worry over the fact that human trafficking continues on a disturbing scale. It is important that human trafficking is contained, and there are many agencies devoted to the task. They need to be supported more for their efforts to bear more long-lasting results. Meanwhile, the rehabilitation of victims of trafficking requires more engagement to ensure that they heal, recover and re-assimilate into the society they were stolen away from.

An episode from a few years ago will help establish the argument better. Some years ago, a raid on a Pune brothel led to the rescue of three girls from the region who had been enticed away from their homes while they were still minors and had lived around five years in the brothel in horrific abuse. One of the rescued victims was from Sikkim and while the families of the other two victims were contacted and the girls returned home, contact could not be established with the family of the girl from Sikkim for a long while. She was too traumatised from her experience and understandably, in the absence of family members, unwilling to return. She recuperated at a rehabilitation centre in Pune for the physical and psychological trauma suffered during her years as a victim of trafficking. She did not remember the exact address of her parents and was probably from a family of migrant labourers and since the rescue happened at least five years after she had gone "missing" from Sikkim, and since not all missing persons are reported to the police, her family could not be traced. At that time, she was taken in by an NGO and was later engaged as an outreach counselor. Hopefully, she leads a "normal" life now. Despite normalcy being a relative term, even in its most basic interpretations, it, many times, evades survivors of the flesh trade The mental and physical trauma, the social stigma and the psychological scarring is not something that few months at a half-way home and some months of vocational training can heal. And while conviction of pimps and traffickers is important, it is important to bear in mind that punishing the perpetrators does not heal the survivors. They are more effective in alleviating the society's guilt over having failed the victims and could also serve as deterrents for others planning to prey on the underprivileged.

Human trafficking also holds up the mirror to the

society for having failed to keep the vulnerable away from harm. And, if nothing else then as penance for this failure, it should be the collective responsibility of the society at large to help victims get over the trauma Unfortunately, this battle is invariably lost, Victims of trafficking are almost always from the already under privileged section of society. Whether they are enticed away by promises of 'good, well-paying jobs', blatantly 'purchased' to be sold into sexual slavery, of stolen way with promises of marriage, it is their destitution that sets them up as prey. The privation that makes victims out of them, need not always be economic poverty, it can also be a poverty of opportunities or the violence of denial; social conditions that make the vic tims take risks (by responding to obviously impossible offers), and even make their families ignore the obvious risks of sending them away. The warped sense of priorities of a disinterested society and the still prev alent gender discrimination puts the girl child and women in harm's way. A lot needs to be done to keep them safe.

Meanwhile, it is wrong to believe that pulling victims out of brothels or other abusive conditions is rescuing them. Victims of trafficking go through acute physical and psychological trauma; a change of address is not enough. They have to undergo proper and extensive counseling before they can have a shot at leading normal lives. Many rescued victims have been known to return to prostitution and/or become alcoholics. This is not a reflection on their 'character', as many paint it to be, but a manifestation of the societal disinterest in their condition which fails to comfort and rehabilitate them adequately enough. When it comes to victims of trafficking, their rehabilitation demands that they receive, apart from psychological counselling, state support to acquire employable skills and then receive the financial assistance to become economically independent. Deny them these, and they remain defenceless, primed to become victims again.

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Joining the dots: why education is key to preserving the planet

econversation.com The evidence is clear: education The evidence is creat. The changes lives, in ways that are of-

ten not fully understood.

For instance, quality education can help you live a longer, healthier life. This is because education equips you to approach health on a rational, informed basis stripped of supersti-tion. Your own education can bene-fit others' health, too: research from Malawi has showed that having educated people as close neighbours en-

hances your health. Evidence from Indonesia, mean-while, points to education being a particularly strong predictor of who survived the aftermath of the 2004 tsunami. Cuba copes with hurricanes far better than Haiti in part because

its citizens are more educated.
Wolfgang Lutz and Reiner Klingholz recently completed a book, in German, on education's role in re-solving pressing current problems of inequality and sustainability, drawing extensively from history and recent scientific research. In 2017 it was translated into English with the title Education First! From Martin Luther to Sustainable Development.

Lutz is a world authority on pop ulation trends and climate change. Klingholz is a biologist and demographer. The pair worked on the book in South Africa, while based at the Stellenbosch Institute for Advanced Study in 2015

EDUCATION AS A DRIV-ER OF HISTORY

Lutz and Klingholz explore how mass literacy became a revolution that changed the course of Europe's and,

via colonialism, the world's history. Up to around 500 years ago, a defining feature of world inequality was that in those parts of the world where writing existed only around 1% had access to the schooling and texts that made literacy possible. Virtually all of this tiny minority were men. In Europe, the Muslim world and China, 99% of people were illiterate.

Martin Luther, in rebelling against

Europe's Catholic order, insisted that literacy should be universal. It was a view which would have appeared fanatical at a time when no one - prob-



ably including Luther - imagined just much economic benefit wou flow from literacy and education

more broadly.

The impact of the Reformation on literacy was not immediate, but the genie had been let out of the bottle. By 1800 around half of Protestant Europe was literate. By 1900 literacy was near universal. Japan, eager to modernise, replicated many aspects of the German education system, starting in the 1870s.

Britain's and, much later, Japan's empires proved efficient in their brutality largely thanks to an exception-ally educated population at home. The rise of the United States can be attributed to the fact that this champion of private enterprise also pioneered the mass public funding of secondary schooling.

It is argued that Germany became

susceptible to the lies of the tiny Nazi party because its secondary school-ing had fallen behind its counterparts across the world.

ENABLERS AND DISENABLERS

Modern technologies are undoubtedly education enablers. Their absence has also played a big role in how education has – or hasn't – evolved. One sobering case of technology suppression happened in 1485 when the Ottoman sultan imposed a ban on printing. It lasted for two centuries, throttling the technology that Luther's revolution relied on. This partly explains why the Islamic Golden Age, with its scientists and thinkers, was unable to evolve

into a mass education movement.

Communism, for all its failings on the economic policy front, was generally an excellent promoter of education. Inspired by Marx, himself originally a first-generation Lutheran, Mao laid the foundations for mass quality schooling in China, which made an astounding economic take-

off possible several decades later.
Julius Nyerere and Robert Mugabe were in some respects similar

education pioneers in Africa.

Education already serves bulwark against existential threats. It helps communities to understand each other, weakens rampant nationalism, assists in population control and widens the talent pool from which innovation must come. But parts of the world need much more

AFRICA'S STORY

Africa has made important strides: today around 80% of African children attend primary school and around 50% secondary schooling. But some countries are doing much better than others. Take Nigeria, for example The oil-rich country should be an education leader in Africa, but is in fact a laggard. African countries with far worse resource endowments have performed much better educationally.

At the other end of the spectrum is Mauritius, which took a decision to massify quality education in the 1960s. The impact is still being felt today. It stands out as the only African country (other than tiny Seychelles) to have virtually eradicated poverty.

The island's post-independence leadership in the 1960s was neither communist nor Lutheran. It simply

understood the value of education.
Ethiopia, the only non-Muslim sub-Saharan African country with a long history of literacy – albeit limited to a tiny minority – benefited from good leaders in the 1980s. They refused to follow instructions from the International Monetary Fund to cut education funding. This stubbornness, also seen in Ghana and Mozambique, bore fruits in the form of Ethiopia's recent economic growth, and reduced fertility rates. In Addis Ababa they are as low as in Switzerland. Nigeria, which essentially gave in to the IMF, has paid a high price for this.

Elite capture in places such as Malawi have held education back. 68% of public spending on education goes to the richest 10% of the population, partially because spending is heavily skewed towards one university

THE ROLE OF FOREIGN DONORS

International development funding debates display a short-sighted lack of appreciation for education's long-term benefits. The evidence suggests that a significant portion of the fund-ing being made available for climate change adaptation is best spent on education.

UNESCO's estimate of the annual cost of plugging the financing gap to bring schooling, up to the lower sec-ondary level, to all the world's chil-dren equals less than 1% of what the United States spent on its war in Iraq. or a tenth of what Qatar has committed to the 2022 World Cup.

The world moves fast. In the three years since the book was first published in German, much has changed. Then, US participation in global climate agreements still seemed assured. Now its English title can clearly be read as a sideswipe at the Trump administration and its insistence on "America First". One wonders how the authors would have dealt with a newly emerging risk: a tragic mix of a high level of education, as in the US,

with an anti-science populism.

Five ways India must help its farmers face the threat of climate change

limate change could hurt farmers' income by up to 20-25% in the medium term, according to the Indian government's latest annual economic survey. Extreme weather events, temperature rise and lower rainfall all threaten to derail the Indian government's agenda of doubling farmers' income across the country.

There are ways to counter this, however. New technology and better farm management can be deployed to improve irrigration systems. And, to ensure long-term impact, it is also important that the Indian government invests in agricultural research.

Agriculture is central to the Indian economy. It accounts for 50% of the country's employment and 18% of its GDP. And in India, about 80% of farmers are smallholders - which is generally considered to mean they have two hectares or less of land. The main crops are wheat, maize, rice, millets, pulses, sugarcane and oil-seeds.

Indian farmers must contend with a number of risks, including adverse weather, competition from larger landowners or food corporations and price surges. Small farmers are a vulnerable population where social, market and economic pressures are huge, often leading to considerable distress. India is home to nearly 25% of the world's hungry population and has an alarming rate of farmer suicide

(around 60,000 cases in the past three decades). So the effects of fluctuations in weather, temperature and rainfall on agricultural productivity will have a significant impact on the wider population.

CLIMATE CHANGE

Extensive meteorological data in the recent government report shows that average temperatures are rising across the country and annual rainfall is declining. It also shows a rise in the number of days with extremely high temperatures and a cor-responding decline in the number of days with low temperatures.

Extreme temperature shocks, when a district is significantly hotter than usual, results in a 4.7% decline in agricultural yields. Similarly, when it rains significantly less than usual there is a 12.8%

Areas lacking in irrigation are worst affected by these extreme weather conditions. A temperature shock in an area that is not irrigated reduces yields by 7.6%. Similarly, the effects of extreme rainfall

shocks are 14.7% higher in areas without irrigahave in irrigated districts.

Lower yields mean lower incomes for farmers. The report estimated that extreme temperature shocks will reduce farmers' incomes by 4.3% and extreme rainfall shocks will reduce incomes by 13.7%. In a year where temperatures are 12 higher, farmers' incomes would fall by 6.2% in unirrigated districts. Similarly, in a year when rainfall levels were 100mm less than average, farmers' incomes would fall by 15%.

Temperatures in India are likely to rise by 3 to 4☑ by the end of the 21st century. It follows that in the absence of any adaptation by farmers, farm incomes will be lower by 20 to 25% on average in the coming years, especially in the unirrigated areas.

There are five important ways to mitigate gainst this that the Indian government could start

1. Smart irrigation

There is a significant need for an appropriate irrigation system considering rising water scarcity and depleting groundwater resources. Less than 50% of agriculture in India is irrigated. States such as Karnataka, Maharashtra, Madhya

Pradesh, Rajasthan, Chhattisgarh and Iharkhand are still extremely vulnerable to climate change due to poor irrigation. Smart irrigation systems such as drip, sprinklers and efficient water man-agement should be made a priority and allocated across the country where needed.

2. Reduce post-harvest loss
Post-harvest loss of major agricultural produce is estimated at US\$13 billion . About 16% of fruits and vegetables, valued at US\$6 billion were lost in the year 2015. Only 2.2% of fruits and vegetables, the most perishable of agricultural produces, are sorted and packed for consumption in India, increasing the chances of wastage as it gets sent abroad. In contrast, the US (65%) and China (23%) are far ahead of India in processing their

Small landholders lose out the most from this. It is not economically viable for most of them to transport their produce for centralised large-scale processing - and they lack local processing and preservation technologies. This results in a lot of wastage. This is then compounded by inadequate transport infrastructure - produce gets damaged

on the journey because of bad roads, gets contaminated from repeated loading and unloaded, as well as lack of refrigeration.

Small farms also suffer from their reliance on middlemen to sell their product. As a result, they are sometimes compelled to sell it at less than the cost of producing it.

So there is an overwhelming need to develop technologies for local processing, smart packaging and transport facilities which do not disadvantage small farmers.

3. Data driven supply-chain management

India must start using data to continuously improve the efficiency of its agricultural supply chains. New technologies such as sensors, GPS and satellite imaging can help collect meaningful data to make India's agriculture system more resilient.

This enables different sections of the supply chain to monitor environmental and other condi-tions. It can be used to adapt how crops are produced, stored and distributed to reduce waste

4. Farmer-centric crop insurance
To compensate for the uncertainty caused
by climate change, an effective crop insurance by climate change, an enective crop insurance programme is required to protect farmers from bad yields. Many already pay into insurance programmes but they provide little protection. The system needs overhauling so that small farmers are protected by low premium and long-term insurance cover, instead of being designed, as it seems to be at the moment, purely for the profit of insurance

5. Evidence based research

Agricultural research will be vital in increasing yields but also in increasing resilience to all the problems that could come with climate change including extreme heat and precipitation, pests and crop disease. Research will be especially important for crops such as pulses and soybean, which are crucial crops and highly vulnerable to weather and climate change.

These measures will improve crop and water nanagement practices. They are tailored to small farmers and to the fragmented, small-scale agricultural landscape – to directly improve efficiency, boost productivity and minimise the environmental impact on farming.

Syria, Russia pound rebel enclave, put clinic out of service

ARBIN (SYRIA), FEB 21 (AFP): Syriair strikes on the reb el-held Eastern Ghouta enclave have killed more than 100 civilians for the second straight day and put another hospital out of service.

In a major development in Syria's complex seven-year war, Damascus also sent pro-regime fighters to the northern Afrin region, where they came under fire by Turkish forces attacking the Kurdish-controlled enclave.

On the outskirts of Damascus, air strikes, rockets and artillery fire have been battering the Eastern Ghouta enclave in apparent preparation for a government ground assault.

At least 250 civilians have been

killed since the escalation began on Sunday, among them dozens of chil-dren, the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said.

Bombardment on Tuesday killed 106 civilians, including 19 children, the Britain-based war monitor said.

It was the second straight day that he civilian death toll topped 100, after 127 were killed Monday in Eastern Ghouta's bloodiest day in four years.

The strikes left an important hos-

pital out of action, further limiting the little medical aid that besieged civilians can access.

"The Arbin hospital was hit twice

Mousa Naffa, country director in Jordan for the Syrian American Medical Society (SAMS), which supported the clinic.

The Observatory blamed Russian warplanes, saying Moscow carried out its first strikes in three months on Eastern Ghouta.

The rebel-held region is nominally included in a "de-escalation" deal meant to tamp down violence, but President Bashar al-Assad appears to be preparing troops for a ground assault to retake it.

UN Secretary-General Antonio Gu-

terres was "deeply alarmed by the escalating situation in Eastern Ghouta and its devastating impact on civilians," said spokesman Stephane Dujarric.

Eastern Ghouta is home to more than 400,000 people living under crippling government siege, with little access to food or medical resources

The United Nations said six hospi tals had been hit in the region in the past 48 hours, in addition to the one in Arbin, At least three were out of service and two were only partially functioning, said the UN's regional humanitarian co-

The army already waged a ferocious five-day air assault on Eastern Ghouta earlier this month that left around 250 civilians dead and hundreds wounded.


