HC dismisses SKM petition challenging rules governing CBI's access to Sikkim

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 06 OCT:

The High Court of Sik-kim today dismissed the writ petition filed by Sikkim Krantikari Morcha members seeking quashing of a State Government notification of year 2010 by virtue of which the Central Bureau of Investigation was required to take prior permission of the State Govt to open investigations here.

The writ petition, filed by SKM MLA, Kunga Nima Lepcha, and nine others, including the par-ty president PS Tamang (Golay), had challenged the Gazette Notification

issued by the state government in July 2010, which, bringing Sikkim at par with other states of the country, required CBI to take prior consent of the state government before opening investi-gations against state government officers or public representatives here.

SKM primarily sought in bringing CBI into the state to investigate corruption charges against the Chief Minister and his council of ministers

and former legislators.
While dismissing the writ petition, Chief Justice Satish Kumar Agni-

preme Court in the case is not applicable to the facts of this case.

The court observed that the petition was "bereft of merit and deserves dismissal".

The Chief Justice upheld the power of the state government to withdraw the consent given to the CBI on earlier occa-sions to investigate cases and said that the court has no hesitation to hold that the state Government has power to give consent under the valid provision of law and also to withdraw the same.

Status Quo to continue at Gurudongmar Dharmastal

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 06 OCT:

The High Court of Sik-kim today turned down the request of the petitioners seeking that the furnitures and the Guru Granth Sahib, the Sikh Holy Book, removed from the Sarva Dharmas-tal on the shores of Guru Dongmar lake in North Sikkim be restored.

The petitioners, representing a section of the Sikh community, it may be recalled, have moved the High Court of Sikkim protesting the renovations planned by the Lachen Dzumsa and monastery at the Sarva Dharmastal, as a part of which, the religious items belonging to Bud-dhist and Sikh faiths placed there had been removed and relocated last

In the Court of Chief Justice Satish K Agnihotri today, the petitioners sought directions to the respondents "to refrain from taking any steps or further steps to disman-tle the structure of the Gurudwara at Gurudongmar Lake and to resto immediately the Holy Guru Granth Sahib Ji."

The Chief Justice, on consideration, observed that status quo as obtained on 30 August 2017 be maintained, and pointed out that directing restoration Guru Granth Sahib and fixing of internal furni-ture and other holy items turn to pg03

The petition has also sought NIA investigation into incidents of bomb

blasts in the Darjeeling

After hearing the petitioner's counsel Meenakshi Arora, the three-judge bench comprising of Chief Iustice Mishra, Justice AM Khan-wilkar and Justice Dr. DY Chandrachud issued notices to the Union Home Ministry, West Bengal Government through Home Department, Di-rector General of Police, West Bengal, Additional Director General of Po-lice, Crime, West Bengal, Superintendent of Police Darjeeling, Station House Officer Darjeeling, Director, CBI, Kolkata returnable within six weeks.

The Court has also allowed the petitioner to serve notice by Dasti, which was served to the counsels of the respon-dent, it is learnt.

No new developments at Dokalam face-off site: MEA

NEW DELHI, OCT 6 (PTI): The external affairs ministry said today there are no new developments at the India-China military face-off site in Doklam and its vicinity since the August 28 disengage-

"The status quo prevails in this area. Any suggestion to the con-trary is incorrect," the ministry said in a brief statement.
The ministry was re-

acting to recent press reports on Doklam.
The reports said that

China has maintained a sizeable presence of its troops near the site of the Doklam standoff with India and even started widening an existing road which is at a distance of around 12 km from the area of conflict.

Troops of India and China were locked in a 73-day-long standoff in Doklam since June 16 after the Indian side stopped the building of a road in the disputed area by the Chinese Army. Bhutan and China have a

dispute over Doklam.

Bhutan and India
were in touch with each other during the course of the face-off that ended on August 28.

and well-being.

Furthermore Ghatani highlighted that the state government has consistently ensured qualitative healthcare and strongly urged the public to reach out and utilize the perks of var-ious health campaigns available in the State.

SSACS project director, Dr Uttam Pradhan spoke in detail about the background of OST which comes under the aegis of 'National AIDS Control Programme' and provides a comprehensive package of interven-tions for needle syringe programmes, Opioid Therapy, Substitution

that the main focus of OST is on Injecting Drug Users (IDUs) as they are at risk to show high prevalence of HIV. He further added that these IDUs registered with the OST will be provided with counseling by trained staff along with a unique identification card so that a greater number of IDUs will benefit from the various OST intervention strategies. Furthermore, Dr Pradhan called upon for cooperation from the stakeholders alongside positively im-proving the participatory role of the civil society in addressing the drug prob-lem prevalent in the State.



From Delinguency to Antisocial Futures

Social engagement awaited to help reform juveniles in conflict with the law

N ews of juvenile crime is always disturbing. These are after all kids in age-groups when the most unruly of their excesses should be some experimentation that is the temptation of their age or some harmless


pranks played on peers or elders.

There has to be something inherently very wrong with the priorities of a society where innocence is lost so young that under-18 year olds are found in gangs of car accessory burglars, or prescription drugs pushers or moving in bands which loot public property by pilfering fibre-optic cables (this last form of theft in the wane now, though). All of these are frequently reported instances, and then there is the ever present nuisance of clothes and branded shoes being lifted from homes and rented accommodations, not to mention the string of unsolved daytime burglaries.

While there is no condoning a society that drives people to commit crimes so young, one could still accept these as the curses of modernity if instances of juvenile crime were aberrations and not the norm. In Sikkim, however, instances of juveniles figuring in criminal misconduct are becoming disconcertingly frequent. What must also be borne in mind is that what ends up getting reported in newspapers are instances that get recorded by the cops: there are many instances where "cases" are settled before they are officially entered into the crime data and several more which either never get reported at police stations or never get solved. The police have a job to do and there are adequate laws and regulations in place to ensure that juveniles, even when picked up for cognizable offence es, have a less traumatic run-in with the law. But the more important concern than how the police cracksdown on juvenile crime, is how the society at large responds to it. It is not enough to just get shocked if the shock does not lead to worry and worry does not initiate deliberations and then societal engagement to understand the reasons behind increasing juvenile crimes and then doing something about correcting the situation. What every person needs to bear in mind is that thefts and burglaries are the gateway crimes from which the delinquents could graduate to more serious felonies if not course-corrected in time. The sequence of crime and punishment does not resolve the situation and societal disinterest makes the situation worse a society which refuses to be moved into involvement by the shock of juvenile crime ends up creating misanthropes out of delinquents.

Even though Rakesh Rai, the notorious "Spider-

man" of Sikkim, is an extreme example, he illustrates this process to some extent – he started off as a smalltime burglar in his early teens; before he crossed 19, he had committed a double-murder and has been behind bars ever since. Too many of our youngsters are getting caught committing small misdemeanours or with substances of abuse. If the society does not get involved now, it will soon lose all moral authority to have a say in anything in the affairs of the young in the future. It will not be pleasant to realize later that the increasing hostile resentment in the young could have been avoided and assuaged.

What Archbishop Tutu's ubuntu credo teaches the world about justice and harmony

Archbishop Emeritus Bishop Desmond Mpilo Tutu's 86th birthday on October 7 is a good occasion to reflect on the man's contributions to South African society and global thought. I do so as a philosopher and in the light of ubuntu, the southern African (specifically, Nguni) word for humanness that is often used to encapsulate sub-Saharan moral ideals.

An ubuntu ethic is often expressed

with the maxim, "A person is a person through other persons." In plain English, this does not say

much. But one idea that indigenous Africans often associate with this maxim is that your basic aim in life should be to become a real or genuine person. You should strive to realise your higher, human nature, in a word to exhibit ubuntu.

How is one to do that?

"Through other persons", which is shorthand for prizing communal or harmonious relationships with them. For many southern African intellectuals, communion or harmony consists of identifying with and exhibiting solidarity towards others, in other words. enjoying a sense of togetherness, co-operating and helping people – out of sympathy and for their own sake.

Tutu sums up his understanding of how to exhibit ubuntu as: "I partic-

APARTHEID AS INHUMAN

Tutu is well known for having invoked an ubuntu ethic to evaluate South African society, and he can take substantial credit for having made the term familiar to politicians, activ-

Tutu criticised the National Party. which formalised apartheid, and its supporters for having prized discord, the opposite of harmony.

Apartheid not only prevented 'races' from identifying with each other or exhibiting solidarity with one another. It went further by having one "race" subordinate and harm others. In Tutu's words, apartheid made people "less human" for their failure to participate on an evenhanded basis and to share power, wealth, land, opportunities and even themselves.

One of Tutu's more striking, contested claims is that apartheid damaged not only black people, but also white people. Although most white people became well off as a result of apartheid, they did not become as mor ally good, or human, as they could have

As is well known, Tutu maintained that, by ubuntu, democratic South Africa was right to deal with apartheid-era political crimes by seeking reconciliation or restorative justice. If 'social harmony is for us the summum bonum- the greatest good", then the primary aim when dealing with wrongdoing - as ones who hold African values should be to establish harmonious relationships between wrongdoers and victims. From this perspective, punishment merely for the purpose of paying back wrongdoers, in the manner of an eye for an eye, is unjustified.

CONTROVERSIES REGARDING TUTU'S UBUNTU

Tutu is often criticised these days for having advocated a kind of reconciliation that lets white beneficiaries of anartheid injustice off the book But for Tutu has not meant merely shaking hands after one party has exploited and denigrated another. Instead, it has meant that the wrongdoer, and those who benefited, should acknowledge the wrongdoing, and seek to repair the damage that he did at some real cost.

Tutu has remarked since the 1990s that "unless there is real material transformation in the lives of those who have been apartheid's victims, we might just as well kiss reconciliation goodbye. It just won't hap-pen without some reparation."

The Truth and Reconciliation Commission that he chaired was aimed at helping South Africans come to terms with their past and laid the foundation for reconciliation. In the fifth volume of its Report it was also adamant about the need for redistribution that would improve the lives of black South Africans. And Tutu has continued to lament the failure of white communities to undertake sacrifices on their own, and to demand compensation from them, for instance, by calling for a "wealth" or "white" tax that would be used to uplift black communities.

Another criticism of Tutu is that his interpretation of ubuntu has been distorted through the lens of Christianity, Although Tutu's Christian beliefs have influenced his understanding of ubuntu, it's also the case that his understanding of ubuntu has influenced his Christian beliefs. Tutu's background as an Archbishop of the Anglican Church does not necessarily render his construal of ubuntu utterly unAfrican or implausible.

In particular, Tutu has contro-

forgiveness is essential for reconcilin, and it is reasonable to suspect that his Christian beliefs have influenced his understanding of what ubuntu requires, here.

I agree with critics who contend

that reconciliation does not require forgiveness. But, might not Tutu have a point in thinking that forgiveness would be part of the best form of reconciliation, an ideal for which to strive?

A NEGLECTED VIEW OF

HUMAN DIGNITY

Tutu's ideas about humanness, harmo ny and reconciliation have been enormously influential, not merely in South Africa, but throughout the world. There is one more idea of his that I mention in closing that has not been as influential, but that also merits attention. It is Tutu's rejection of the notion that what is valuable about us as human beings is our autonomy, which is a characteristically Western idea.

Instead, according to Tutu: "We are different so that we can know our need of one another, for no one is ultimately self-sufficient. The com-pletely self-sufficient person would be sub-human."

In short, what gives us a dignity is not our independence, but rather our interdependence, our ability to participate and share with one another, indeed our vulnerability. This African and relational conception of human dignity has yet to influence many outside sub-Saharan Africa. I hope that this tribute might help in some way.

Passion and pain: why secessionist movements rarely succeed

Calls for "independence" have been increasingly heard on the streets of Barcelona in recent days. Those powerful emotions can drive people to extremes, which in some cases include killing and dying. Yet for the high price often paid, independence movements are rarely successful and their outcomes are usually less than hoped for.

Catalonia's recent vote for independence provoked a heavy-handed response from the government in Madrid. This has, in almost textbook style, conversely in-

The Spanish government's response was wrong if the intention was to secure Catalonia's loyalty, but perhaps the right response if the intention was to shore up

falling nationalist support elsewhere. Independence movements commonly start with a small number of idealists, yet quickly grow when central governments respond with repression. In such circum-stances, the desire for "freedom" takes root and flourishes. So the first responses of central governments to secessionist movements are critical to their outcome.

There are currently well over 100 secessionist movements, including four in the Philippines, dozens in India, around eight in Myanmar, and several dozen in Af-rica. Many of these have produced bloodshed and trauma well in excess of possible practical gains. Yet, despite their numbers, very few secessionist movements are ultimately successful, while the costs for gov-



ernments imposing a nominal unity can be high for all involved.

With high risks and limited chances of success, secessionist movements are rarely about pragmatism and more about fervour. Even with popular support, these movements rarely have the political or military capacity to impose their will on the state from which they intend to secede

Such limited examples of secessionist success that there are have relied on either external intervention - such as Bangladesh and Kosovo - or agreement by a weakened parent state, such as Eritrea and South Sudan, Timor-Leste achieved independence on the back of both factors

Having overcome daunting odds of

achieving independence, the success of post-secessionist states has, on balance, been poor. Bangladesh has struggled between periods of incapable civilian government, military coups and a state emergency. Since independence in 1991, Eritrea has been an authoritarian one-party state with no political activity allowed.

Kosovo has been marked by divisive ethnic politics, while South Sudan has been wracked by ethno-political fighting since independence in 2011. Timor-Leste is a successful democracy, yet survived in tact only due to international intervention ending civil conflict in 2006.

my and a very capable military.
Yet even an independent Kurdistan would require access to trade routes to export oil. This is currently blocked by its parent state, Iraq, and suspicion or hostil-ity from neighbouring Turkey, Syria and Iran. Kurdistan may continue to pursue independence, but it would likely have a more viable economic future as an autonomous state in a federated Iraq.

Even when successful, the cost of in-dependence can be high. It can bring destructive wars, lack of economic activity and independence leaders failing to translate as wise politicians and capable administrators. The skills needed to win independence are not those required to rebuild and run a successful state.

So the record of successful secessionist ovements is, overall, poor. The rhetoric of freedom and reward is more usually reflected in little of either.

Catalonia is luckier than most, having an experienced set of politicians and administrators. It also has, for now at least, an intact infrastructure and a vibrant economy. Its chances of success, should Madrid let it go, would be better than

Yet what is now more practically needed in Catalonia, and for most other secessionist movements, is a relatively high level of regional autonomy. Loosening the ties that bind can ease tensions and make states more stable, if in federated or similar form, rather than being tightly con-

trolled and therefore resented. Spanish President Mariano Rajoy's threat to revoke Catalonia's autonomy is, therefore, precisely the wrong response for a leader wishing to quell secessionist demands. It was, after all, Spain's Constitutional Court's decision to restrict Catalonia's existing autonomy that sparked the present calls for independence.

Spain's governing People's Party may strengthen its faltering support base by appealing to a wider nationalist sentiment in favour of state unity and imposing con-trol over Catalonia. But imposed control will likely prompt further and more deeply entrenched separatist sentiment.

Given their vast differences, the fate

of the handful of successful separatist movements cannot be used as indicators of an independent Catalonia's future. But the drivers of separatism, and impediments to achieving independence, are shared.

Catalonia has been at the forefront of Spain's domestic battles, and it could be that the current push for independence will spark another. Should it come to this, the cost of such conflict would exceed any possible benefits, for both Catalonia and for Spain.

The question, then, is how Spain's national government and the Catalan independence movement can step back from a showdown. Failure to do so may mean the consequences become irretrievable.

GST relief for SMEs, exporters; tax rates on 27 items cut

NEW DELHI, OCT 6 (PTI): Three months after the rollout of the new indirect tax regime, the GST Council today made sweeping changes to give relief to small and medium businesses on filing and payment of taxes, eased rules for exporters and cut tax rates on more than two dozen items.

Businesses with annual turnover of up to Rs 1.5 crore, which constitute 90 per cent of the taxpayer base but pay only 5-6 per cent of total tax, have been allowed to file quarterly income re turns and pay tax instead of the current provision of monthly filings.

Also, the turnover threshold for businesses to avail of the composition scheme that allows them to pay 1-5 per cent tax without going through tedious formalities, was raised to Rs 1 crore from current Rs 75 lakh.

"Compliance burden of medium and small tax-payers in GST is being reduced," Finance Minister Arun Jaitley told report-ers after the 22nd meeting of the Council.

Small and medium en-terprises had complained tedious compliance burden under the Goods and Services Tax (GST) that was supposed to be a simple indirect tax regime which replaced over a dozen Central and state taxes. Jaitley said the Council also decided to cut GST rate on 27 com-

GST on unbranded namkeen. unbranded ayurvedic medicine, sliced dried mango and khakra has been cut to 5 per cent from 12 per cent, while the same on man-made varn used in textile sector has been reduced to 12 per cent from 18 per cent.

Rallies were taken out in various parts of the state by BJP workers, demanding the arrest of the culprits.

The Darjeeling police arrested two men in the early hours today for their alleged involvement in the assault on BJP workers during a 'Vijaya Sammelani' meeting called by Ghosh

For the last two days, agitators in Darjeeling have been demanding that Ghosh and his BJP team leave the hills immediately and refrain from disturbing the "peace and stability" in the region. The BJP leaders have also been shown black flags by various hill parties.

The ruling Trinamool Congress (TMC) leadership in the state mean-while accused the BJP of trying to disturb the peace in the hills and said it would take out rallies across the state tomorrow to counter the saffron party and burn effigies of Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

"Tomorrow, from 1 pm to 2 pm, we will hold protest rallies and burn effigies of Prime Minister Narendra Modi. The central government is helping the divisive forces in the hills," TMC secretary general Partha Chatterjee told reporters.

"When peace has returned to the hills, the BJP is trying to disturb it. It is helping a person (Bi-mal Gurung), who has cases under the UAPA (Unlawful Activities Prevention Act) lodged against him. If it tries to disturb the peace, the people of Bengal will never forgive it," he said.

Ghosh, who left for Sikkim along with the BJP team today, earlier told reporters in Darjeeling that he would convey all the demands related to the hills to the Centre.

To questions on whether would meet Gurung, who is on the run Ghosh said the Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM) supremo had rung him up and criticised the attack on

.. "I told him (Gurung) that democracy in the hills was very crucial. But I have no intention of meeting Gurung. I am not aware of his whereabouts and he is under the police scanner," he added.

Gurung, in an audio message from his hideout, condemned the attack on the BJP workers.

"Those behind the attack should

Those against a separate state of Gorkhaland have attacked the BJP delegation. We condemn it," he said.

China's assertiveness in Doklam to dominate Army commanders' conclave

On the other hand, he urged the students in the audience to adapt to the changing times where knowledge and skill is more important than mere certificate-based education. He called for a shift in the limited mindset of job-oriented education and to realize the immense potential in sectors like agriculture and tourism. Giantkillers Niger up against North Korea

Косні. Ост 6 (РТІ): Debutants Niger would look to continue their giant-killing run from the continental qualifying event when they take on a defensive North Korea in their opening Group D match of the FIFA U-17 World Cup here

U-17 vvc. tomorrow. Niger have never previously appeared at a FIFA competition at any level. When they walk out tomorrow at the Jawaharlal Nehru International Stadium here, they will join India and New Caledonia as the three debutants of the FIFA U- 17 World Cup.

The first-timers from Africa are no pushovers and they would be looking to cause a looking to cause a few upsets as former champions Nigeria have found out in the continental qualifiers.

The shock 1-0 win by Niger in a group match in Gabon in the African qualifiers sent the five-time FIFA U-17 World Cup champions Nigeria crashing out of the India

They went onto reach the semifinals to book a berth in this FIFA U-17 World Cup edition. Niger were beaten 5-6 on penalties by Ghana after a goalless semi-final and then went down 1-3 to Guinea in the match for third place, though they had already achieved their lofty objective by

Niger coach Soumaila Tiemogo is hoping that his side makes the same kind of impact and tomorrow's match could be the ideal start in a group which has title contenders Brazil and Spain.

"I can't guarantee that we'll go on and win the competition but I can guarantee that we'll make people talk about us, just like we did in Africa. Maybe we can't work miracles, but we can do our best," Tiemogo said before the tournament.

North Korea, on the other hand, are not one of the most attractive sides in world football. They believe more in having a strong and compact defense and do not normally play attacking football.

Of the four Asian qualifiers for the 2017 FIFA U-17 World Cup, North Korea were arguably the least impressive. They won just two of their five matches in the Asian qualifying tournament.

Aside from a 4-1 win Thailand North Korea displayed trade mark pragmatism with goal-scoring at a premi-um. They defeated Ye men 2-0 but rounded out the group campaign with a 1-3 defeat at the hands of Uzbekistan.

Qualification for In-dia 2017 came via a penalty shoot-out win over Oman, before a defeat on penalties against Iran in the semi-final.

For both the opponents, a win tomorrow will be crucial.

Whoever loses the match tomorrow, it will be difficult for them to proceed the knock-out stage as formidable Brazil and Spain are the clear favourites to finish in top two from this group.

Young 'Sambas' clash with 'tiki-taka' starlets in marquee game

KOCHI, OCT 6 (PTI): Three-time champions Brazil and European powerhouse Spain will take on each other in a highly-anticipated mar-quee clash between title contend-ers of the FIFA Under-17 World Cup

here tomorrow.

The football-mad Kochi could not have asked for anything better than this showdown between the South American champions Brazil and European qualifying tournament winners Spain at the Jawaharlal Nehru International Stadium.

Brazil are the overwhelming favourites of the fans here and Spain will virtually feel like playing in Rio de Janiero or Sau Paulo

But to their good fortune the crowd may not be as loud as usual because FIFA has forced the local organisers to reduce the capacity of the stadium to just 29,200 to comply with the world body's strict evacua

But the lucky ones who will be at the stadium tomorrow are sure to witness a fascinating contest be-tween Brazilian attacking flare and Spanish 'tiki-taka' possession football in what could be a final before a final of this tournament.

Both Brazil and Spain are expected to finish as top two teams in Group D, which also has North Korea and Niger. But whoever wins tomorrow will have the advantage and will have one foot at the knock-out stage.

Brazil are a formidable force even in the age group, having appeared 15 times in 16 editions India before and winning the U-17 World Cup trophy thrice (1997, 1999 &

They finished runners-up in 1995 and 2005, third in 1985 and fourth in 2011. Their solitary absence came at Japan 1993.

In the last edition in 2015 in Chile, they were knocked out by eventual champions Nigeria in the quarterfinals.

Brazil went unbeaten in lifting this year's South American U-17

title, winning seven matches and

drawing two.

They boasted both the leading goalscorer (Vinicius Junior with seven) and the player providing most assists (Alan with five).

The Brazilians clinched the continental title with a 5-0 defeat of hosts Chile. The squad in India is practically unchanged from the one which won the South

American qualifying tournament except the absence of Vinicius Junior. The top scorer and player of the tourna-ment at the

South American U-17 Championship has not been released for the World Cup by his club side Flamengo.

The core of this team has played five tournaments recently and the level of understanding among players is high.

In the absence of Vinicius Iunior. another Flamengo youth team play-er Lincoln Correa dos Santos will be the man leading the Brazilians from the front

The 16-year-old can play on both wings of the pitch.

Pualinho is another key player.
One moment, he is bursting past his marker on the right wing to set up a goal; the next, he is providing a deli-cate finish from the centre- forward position.

Spain, on the other hand, are seeking their maiden FIFA U-17 World Cup title in their ninth appearance. A line of illustrious players of the calibre of Xavi Hernandez, Andreas Injesta or Iker Casillas have not been able to lift the trophy at different editions.

Despite their record haul of three European U-17 Champio ships, Spain have never managed to win the FIFA U-17 World Cup. Run ners-up in 1991, 2003 and 2007, La Rojita have curiously failed to qualify

since finishing third in 2009. Spain qualified for U-17 by claim ing another European U- 17 crown in Croatia in May. It was touch and go on in that gane with Nacho Diaz equalising in injury time in the final to deny England, who had led since the 58th minute. Spain then emerged victorious from the ensuing penalty shoot-out (4-1).

The La Rojita play a brand of otball that is synonymous with the Iberian nation -- possession football. With six players from FC Barcelona's famous academy La Masia and five from Real's academy, the team is brimming with players who have the potential to be future stars.

They have wonderkids like Barcelona's youth team player and cap-tain Abel Ruiz and Valencia starlet Ferran Torres.

Ruiz is an attacking player and was one of the La Masia talents courted by top premier league clubs like Manchester City, Arsenal and Chelsea. He is more than just a goalscorer.

It was under his leadership that in won their ninth UEFA European U-17 Championships earlier this year.

17-year-old Torres is another bright prospect in Spanish football at the moment and two La Liga giants -- Barcelona and Real Madrid have shown interest in the young

Argentina in peril as World Cup race goes to wire

MONTEVIDEO, OCT 6 (AFP): Lionel Messi and Argentina's hopes of reaching the 2018 World Cup were left hanging in the balance after another stalemate on a nail-biting day

The result left Argentina

in sixth place in the standings The first four teams qualify automatically, with the fifthplaced team advancing to a playoff against New Zealand in November.

But with only two points separating third-placed Chile seventh-placed Paraguay the final standings could change dramatically depending on results on Tuesday.

The margin for error for Argentina, however, has narrowed after their latest setback, their third consecutive



draw of a faltering qualification campaign.

Argentina's final qualifier is a challenging away trip to Ecuador in the thin air of Quito. Argentina have a poor record in the Ecuadoran capital, losing two out of three of their last World Cup qualifiers there and drawing the other. The Argentines' last World Cup qualifying win in Quito came in 2001

However a victory on Tuesday would guarantee Argentina at least fifth place in the standings, with Peru and Colombia guaranteed to drop points against each other in their final game.

Current UN structures were designed for bygone era: India

UNITED NATIONS, OCT 6 (PTI): Continuing to push for reform and ex-. nansion of the IIN Security Council, India has said that the current struc-tures of the United Nations were designed for a bygone era by a handful of nation states. Yedla Umasankar,

First Secretary at the Permanent Mission of In-dia to the United Nations, told a UN General Assembly committee that effec-tive multilateralism and international rule of law require that the global governance structures should reflect contemporary realities. "For retaining legiti-

macy and effectiveness, fundamental reform of these structures, especially the Security Council is needed," he said yesterday while participating in a debate on "rule of law at the national and international levels"

India along with Brazil, Germany and Japan have been pushing for the expansion of the UN Security Council.

Observing that laws not remain static, Umasankar said they continue to evolve ac-cording to changing circumstances. often brought forth by changes in society and prevailing technologies.

"Changes also leave many old laws and regulations redundant. The Indian constitution, ad-opted seven decades ago, has seen over 100 amendments," he said.

Nobel Peace Prize awarded to anti-nuclear campaign group

Peace Prize was awarded today to the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons, an organisation seeking to eliminate atomic weapons through an international treaty-based

prohibition.

The Geneva-based ICAN won the USD 1.1 million prize because it "has been a driving force in prevailing upon the world's nations to pledge to cooperate ... in efforts to stigmatise, prohibit and eliminate nuclear weapons," Norwegian Nobel Committee chairwoman Berit Reiss-Andersen said in the announcement

The prize "sends a message to all nuclear-armed states and all states that continue to rely on nuclear weapons for security that it is unacceptable behaviour. We will not support it, we will not

make excuses for it, we can't threaten to indiscriminately slaughter hundreds of thousands of civilians in the name of security. That's not how you build security," ICAN executive director Beatrice Fihn

told reporters in Geneva.

She said that she "worried that it was a prank" after getting a phone call just minutes before the official Peace Prize announcement was made. Fihn said she didn't believe it until she heard the name of the group proclaimed on television

"We are trying to send very strong signals to all states with nuclear arms, nu-clear-armed states, North Korea, US, Russia, China, France, UK, Israel, all of them, India, Pakistan, it is unacceptable to threaten to kill civilians," she

The prize comes amid heightened tensions over both North Korea's aggres-sive development of nuclear weapons and President Donald Trump's persistent criticism of the deal to curb Iran's nuclear programme.

"The panel wants to send signal to North Korea and the US that they need to go into negotiations. The prize is also coded support to the Iran nuclear deal. I think this was wise because recognising the Iran deal itself could have been seen as giving support to the Iranian state," Oeivind Stenersen, a historian of the peace prize, told The Associ-

been reached on chemical and biological weapons, land mines and cluster munitions.

"Nuclear weapons are even more destructive, but have not yet been made the object of a similar international legal prohibition," she

Reiss-Andersen "through its inspiring and innovative support for the UN negotiations on a treaty banning nuclear weapons, ICAN has played a major part in bringing about what in our day and age is equivalent to an international peace congress.

Asked by journalists whether the prize was essentially symbolic, given that no international measures against nuclear weapons have been reached. Reiss-Andersen said "What will not have an impact is being passive.

In January, a similar protest was held by the opposition against the move to handover the Hambantota sea port to China on a long lease. Scores of people were arrested then.

The government, which charged that Rajapaksa had built costly infrastructure projects in Hambantota with com-mercial loans from China, has been forced to enter the long lease with a Chinese company to set off debt on an equity part-

nership. The Opposition claim that by giving India the Mattala airport, the government is making Hambantota a playground of international super powers - China and India

Pak warns India against surgical strikes on its soil

WASHINGTON, OCT 6 (PTI): Pakistan's top dip-lomat has warned India against launching surgiagainst radinting surgering cal strikes or targeting the country's nuclear installations, saying no-body should expect re-straint from Islamabad if that happens.

Responding to a statement of India's Air Chief Marshal B S Dhanoa that his forces are ready for a full spectrum operation, Foreign Minister Khawaja Asif said Pakistan wants to live in peace and harmony with

its neighbours.
But if India carries out any surgical strike in Pakistan or strikes at its nuclear installations "nobody should expect restraint from us", he warned yesterday.

Speaking at the US Institute of Peace, Washington-based think-tank. Asif said the



"relationship with India is at a lowest ebb at the moment".

Responding to a question on India, he said, "sadly India did not respond" to Pakistani efforts to improve relationship.

"What is going on in Kashmir is the biggest roadblock to normalisa-

tion to talks," Asif said.
Asif, who is here as part of efforts to rebuild bilateral ties fraved after President Donald Trump accused Pakistan of sheltering terror groups, said his meetings with Secre-tary of State Rex Tillerand National Security Advisor H R McMaster

were good. "The meeting went ell with Tillerson and McMaster (meeting) was good. (It) was not bad," Asif said, noting that the two countries need

to pursue contacts with each other.

He favoured adopting an approach of talks and exchange of views more vigorously.
Asif in a way acknowl-

edged that the madrasas were training ground for

madrasas "These were nurseries American jihad Afghanistan. Pe People who took those decisions will burn to hell. We are actually living in hell because of that decision," he said, adding that Pakistan is paying the price of such a decision.

The US, he said, is focusing solely on safe haven allegations or blaming Pakistan for what they have not achieved in Afghanistan.

"There are more dimension of what is going on in Afghanistan," he added.
