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#### NASA blasts off Mars lander, InSight

VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE (US) MAY 5 (AFP): NASA today blasted off its latest Mars lander, In-Sight, designed to perch on the surface and listen for "Marsquakes" ahead of eventual human missions

to explore the Red Planet. "Three, two, one, lift-off!" said a NASA commentator as the space-craft launched on a dark, foggy morning atop an Atlas V rocket at 4:05 AM Pacific time (1635 IST) from Vandenberg Air Force Base in California, marking NASA's first interplanetary launch from the US west coast. The USD 993 million

project aims to expand human knowledge of in-terior conditions on Mars, inform efforts to send human explorers there, and reveal how rocky planets like the Earth formed billions of years ago.

If all goes as planned, the lander should settle on the Red Planet on November 26.

Its name. InSight, is short for Interior Explora-tion using Seismic Investigations, Geodesy and Heat

Transport.

NASA chief scientist
Jim Green said experts already know that Mars has quakes, avalanches and meteor strikes.

"But how quake-prone is Mars? That is funda-mental information that we need to know as hu-mans that explore Mars,"  $Green\ said.$

The crime branch has arrested eight persons, including a juvenile, for allegedly raping and murdering an 8-year-old girl from a nomadic commu-nity at Kathua recently.

Meanwhile, JK BJP incharge (IT and social me-dia) Jai Dev Rajwal came out in support of a 'factual' report submitted by five women to the Centre over the Kathua incident.

The group of five men had submitted the report to Union Home Minister Rajnath Singh and Minister of State for Personnel Jitendra Singh, and demanded a CBI

They said it was not a new practice to send the awards via post to those who missed the event due to any reason

In a departure from tradition, the function, held at Vigyan Bhavan, was divided into two phases. The first set of awards was conferred by Union Information and Broadcasting Minister Smriti Irani and Minister of State

Raiyavardhan Singh Rathore.

The key instrument on board is a seismometer, called the Seismic Exper-iment for Interior Structure, made by the French Space Agency.

After the lander set-

tles on the Martian surface, a robotic arm is supposed to emerge and place the seismometer directly on the ground.

The second main in-strument is a self-ham-mering probe that will monitor the flow of heat

in the planet's subsurface.
Called the Heat Flow
and Physical Properties Package, it was made by the German Space Agency with the participation of the Polish Space Agency.

The probe will bore down 10 to 16 feet (three to five meters) below the surface, NASA said, 15 times deeper than any previous Mars mission.

Understanding the temperature on Mars is crucial to NASA's efforts to send people there by the 2030's, and how much a human habitat might need to be heated under frigid conditions, said Green.

Daytime summer tem peratures near the Mar-tian equator may reach 70 degrees Fahrenheit (20 degrees C), but then plunge by night to -100 F (-73 C).

"It is an important

part of knowledge of how this planet is evolving," Green said. "We have to be able as humans living and working on Mars to sur-vive that."

The solar and bat-tery-powered lander is designed to operate for 26 Earth months, or one year on Mars, a period in which it is expected to pick up as many as 100 quakes. "Hopefully it will last a

lot longer than that," said Tom Hoffman, InSight project manager from NA-SA's Jet Propulsion Labo-

The spacecraft was initially supposed to launch in 2016 but had to be delayed after tem-perature tests showed a problem with part of the seismometer, which engi-

neers have since fixed.
InSight aims to be the first NASA spacecraft to land on Mars since the Cu-

riosity rover in 2012.
"There is nothing routine about going to Mars, especially landing or Mars," said Stu Spath, In Sight program manager at Lockheed Martin Space.

Various key issues on disaster mitigation like clearing of clogged drains and jhoras, maintenance of potholes, clearing private water lines and water leakages, maintaining inventory lists of equipment, quick clearance of internal roads within the district, restoration of electricity during the ensuing monsoon, traffic issues, health issues mainly relating to communicable diseases, wa-ter testing, assessment and insurance of crops, vaccination and assess-ment of animals and livestock death, maintenance of building and housing, tourism, dissemination of information, provision and deployment of Cen-tral agencies like defence and civil defence agencies were discussed at length.

During the meeting, various feedback and positive recommendations with regard to pre-monsoon ter management disaswere placed and shared among the participants. Lessons learned from series of previous joint meetings on Disaster Management were shared among the participants.

Addressing the meet-

ing, the DC [East], Mr Meena, briefed the gathering on the importance of conducting such preparedness meeting on Disaster Management with regard to the ensuing monsoon. He urged the respective line departments and central agencies to be fully prepared for any natural and man-made disaster that may occur due to the ensuing monsoon.

All the line depart-ments and central agencies shared their invaluable inputs and placed forth remedial suggestions and feedback in regard to the preparedness for any disaster that may occur during the ensuing

Mr Meena directed the respective line departments and central agencies dealing with essential services to identify vulnerable points and spots and have a proper coordinated system tackle the problem faced during the time of emer-

He also asked respective SDMs to conduct similar pre-monsoon preparedness meeting on disaster management at the village and GPU level. Further, he specifically directed respective departments to appoint two nodal officers for each department.

Reiterating the impor-tance of having a disaster management plan for all the departments, Mr Meena touched upon the need to prepare a disaster management plan for those departments who have not prepared disas-ter management plans yet. He highlighted that disasters are unpredictable and hence urged the partici-pants to be seriously prepared for any disaster

He also directed all departments to more participation and presence in social media and WhatsApp groups to sensitize the public on disaster management. He urged all the line departments and central agencies to work collectively and in tandem for the ben-

efit of the society at large. The SP [East] also provided valuable inputs and placed positive feed-back and suggestions during the meeting.

### Real Concern for Safe Roads, Please

Tourist season is always a good time to check against the fast and the rash

he tourist season has begun. It is warming up rather well, assisted by the sweltering plains, and the numbers coming to Sikkim also benefitting from the rural polls in West Bengal which are likely to have tourists avoid Bengal for some time even though Dar-jeeling Hills will still not be electing panchayats, Sikkim can expect the season to shape up well. Given that memories of ruined holidays in Darjeeling are still fresh in traveler minds, tourists will likely play safe with their itineraries and Sikkim can look at a bumper 'season' as tourists add days to their Sikkim stay.

Traditionally, however, road safety has been in-

versely proportional to the robustness of a tourist season here. There are no indications that things will be any different this time around because nothing, repeat, nothing, is being done to make travel any safer in Sikkim. This is unfortunate, because this really is also the season of speeding and rash driving as taxis race to pack in more tourist drops and pick-ups as the highway travel will allow and as many sightseeing jaunts as Gangtok's permanent traffic jams will sustain. Given the state of the global warming, there is also no guarantee on what the weather will be like or how the roads will fare. More reason to pack as many sorties to and fro from Siliguri as possible for the cabbies. More reason also to wake up in time and get some effective policing on the roads – to check rash driving, not documents. Unfortunately, however, checking of documents continues to be the limit of imagination as far as highway patrolling goes. The status of vehicle documents is about the revenue the state exchequer earns, and has nothing in it to validate either driving skills or vehicular health or road etiquette which are the aspects that need checking if

road travel is to be made safer.
Although no updates have been made available on the "investigations" into various accidents that have happened in the past, thumb rule suggests that speeding claims more lives than mechanical failures. One look at the glazed eyes behind the wheels as taxis scream into Gangtok and rash driving also gets confirmed. It is time that the traffic police began patrolling the highways and conducting surprise checks, again, not to check documents or even pull out their breath analysers. The document issue has been mentioned earlier, and breath analysers can detect only alcohol, not the substances of abuse which are as debilitating when it comes to driving reflexes and are also more popped than the pegs that used to be downed earlier. Long back, the East District police had undertaken such a measure when they stopped passenger vehicles and advised passengers to warn drivers if they were over-speeding and stop at the nearest police checkpost to lodge a complaint if the driver continued to remain rash on the roads. Police personnel also checked the condition of the tyres and the reliability of brakes during such checks. The move had been very effective. This initiative was however short-lived. It has to be resumed.

The policy decision to have drivers [with driving licences from outside the State] undergo a driving test on Sikkim roads before being allowed to ferry passengers here was a welcome one too, but even that appears to have fallen out of practice. Too many lives are being risked to reckless driving and it is time that stricter action was taken against delinquent drivers instead of time and energy wasted on checking only documents

etflix has commissioned Julian Fellowes the creator of the award-winning historithe creator of the award-winning historical period drama Downton Abbey, to write a new TV series exploring the early development of modern football and how its creation "reached across the class divide" as Etonians and factory vorkers came together to create the world's most popular sport.

The origins and early history of association football is certainly full of prestigious names and colourful characters. People like Charles William Alcock, the Sunderland ship merchant who invented the FA Cup, and William McGregor, who ran a draper's shop and established the Football League in 1888 with his club Aston Villa. So Fellowes will have no shortage of potential content. But will he look to explore the stories of less rened figures such as Arthur Wharton, Walter Full and Frank Soo?

All three were early non-Caucasian pioneers in British football that had to face and overcome racial barriers, both on and off the pitch as "men of colour". Yet most people will never have heard of them. There is a danger that their stories, along with other less prominent players, will disappear from the collective memory of society, and their accomplishments, achievements and struggles will be forgotten if we don't give them the credit they

deserve by remembering them.

THE FIRST PROFESSIONAL

Arthur Wharton is widely accepted as the first professional non-Caucasian football player in the world after he appeared for Rotherham United in 1000 Rem in Inspection 1889. Born in Jamestown, Gold Coast (now Ghana), he was a talented all round athlete who was renowned for his "prodigious punch" when play-ing as a goalkeeper and for equalling the ama-teur world record of ten seconds for the 100-yard sprint. Wharton played for numerous clubs as both an amateur and professional, including Preston North End, Sheffield United and Darlington, prior to retiring in 1902.

#### THE WAR HERO

The second non-Caucasian to play in the Football League was Walter Tull. The inside forward signed for Tottenham Hotspur in 1909 and participated in the club's tour of South America prior to joining Northampton Town in 1911. But the outbreak of the First World War saw Tull enlist in the British army where he rose to the rank of second lieutenant in 1917, becoming the first officer of colour despite contemporary military regulations forbidding it, before being killed in northern France in 1918.

### THE EGYPTIAN ENGINEER

Hassan Hegazi became the first Egyptian to appear in the Football League when he made his debut for Fulham in 1911. He had arrived in London to study engineering but had gained a reputation for being a talented striker while playing for amateur side Dulwich Hamlet, attracting the interest of local profes sional clubs. However, despite scoring on his debut for Fulham (a 3-1 win against Stockport County) and being asked to play the following week, Hegazi opted to return to amateur football with Dulwich so that he could focus on his studies.

#### THE BAREFOOT WINGER

Mohammed Abdul Salim Bachi Khan, also known as Mohammed Salim, was an Indian winger who arrived in Britain in 1936 after winning five successive Calcutta Football League titles with Mohammedan SC in his homeland. Despite making only two official appearances for the Glasgow

Celtic reserve team, his presence attracted a great amount of interest from the public as he would play in bare feet that were swathed in bandages rather than boots. He was given the nickname "The Indian Juggler" and impressed in his duo of performances but returned to India after he became homesick.

THE ENGLISH PIONEER
Contrary to popular belief, the first non-Caucasian player to represent the English national team was Stoke City half-back Frank Soo in 1942 – as opposed to Viv Anderson who made his debut three decades later in 1978.

Soo was of mixed Chinese and English heritage

his father, Our Quong Soo, had migrated to Britain
and married a local girl, Beatrice Whittam, in 1908.
Soo became the first player of Chinese heritage to
appear in the Football League when he made his debut for Stoke in 1933 and he quickly became a regular fixture in the first team, culminating in him being proclaimed one of the "finest half-backs in the country". Soo made nine appearances for the national team between 1942 and 1945 but this ac-complishment is often overlooked as the Football Association do not class wartime internationals as "official" fixtures.

These players should play a prominent role in our understanding of the history of the game and wider society. Their achievements and accomplishments – in addition to the racial barriers and chal-lenges that they faced – deserve to be recognised. The stories of the early non-Caucasian pioneers of British football should never be lost and, in my opinion, might even make a good Netflix series.

n the U.S., if you want a face lift or a In the U.S., if you want a tace IIIT or a tummy tuck, it's generally assumed that you'll be paying out of pocket. Insurance will tend to cover plastic surgery only

when the surgery is deemed "medically necessary" and not merely aesthetic. In Brazil, however, patients are thought of as having the "right to beauty." In public hospitals, plastic surgeries are free or lowcost, and the government subsidizes nearly half a million surgeries every year.

As a medical anthropologist, I've spent

years studying Brazilian plastic surgery. While many patients are incredibly thankful for the opportunity to become beautiful, the "right to beauty" has a darker side to it.

the "right to beauty" has a darker side to it.

Everyone I interviewed in Brazil admitted that plastic surgeries were risky affairs. In the public hospitals where these plastic surgeries are free or much cheaper than in private clinics, I heard many patients declare that they were "cobaias" (guinea pigs) for the medical residents who would operate on them.

Yet these patients, most of whom were women, also told me that living without beauty in Brazil was to take an even bigger risk. Beauty is perceived as being so central for the job market, so crucial for finding a spouse and so essential for any chances at upward mobility that many

can't say no to these surgeries.

The very long queues for plastic surgery in public hospitals – with wait times of several months or even years - seem to confirm this immense longing for beauty. It's made Brazil the second-largest consumer of plastic surgery in the world, with 1.2 million surgeries carried out every year. BRAZIL'S 'POPE OF PLASTIC SURGERY'

Today, Brazil considers health to be a basic human right and provides free health care to all its citizens - a hard-won victory of social activists after Brazil's dictatorship fell and a new democratic constitution was written into law in 1988. However, public hospitals remain severely under-funded, and most middle-class and upper-class Brazilians prefer to use private medical services.

In effect, Brazil has a two-tiered system.

There is a private health care system that is cutting-edge and luxurious and a public one that is strapped for cash but provides essential services to the working class.

Plastic surgery is considered an es-sential service largely due to the efforts



of a surgeon named Ivo Pitanguy. In the late 1950s, Pitanguy – now known as the "pope of plastic surgery" – convinced President Juscelino Kubitschek that the "right to beauty" was as basic as any other health need. Pitanguy made the case that ugliness caused so much psychological suffering in Brazil that the medical class could not turn its back on this humanitar-

ian issue.

In 1960, he opened the first institute

that offered plastic surgery to the poor, one that doubled as a medical school to train new surgeons. It was so successful that it became the educational model fol-lowed by most other plastic surgery residencies around the country. In return for free or low-cost surgeries, working-class patients would help surgeons learn and practice their trade

Brazil was the perfect testing ground for this idea. In the early 1920s, Brazilian eu-

genic scientists suggested that beauty was a measure of the nation's racial progress. Beauty started to assume more cultural clout, and plastic surgeons inherited these ideals, seeing their trade as "fixing" the er-rors of too much racial mixture in Brazil, particularly among the lower classes. BEAUTY'S HIDDEN COSTS

In my recently published book, "The Bio-politics of Beauty," I question the idea that humanitarianism is the driving force of plastic surgery in Brazilian public hospitals. Burn victims and individuals with con-

genital deformities were once the main beneficiaries of plastic surgery in these hospitals. But at many of the clinics where I carried out my research, nearly 95 per-cent of all those surgeries have become purely aesthetic. I documented hundreds of instances where surgeons and resi-dents purposely blurred the boundaries between reconstructive and aesthetic procedures to get them approved by the gov-

Since most of the surgeries in public hospitals are carried out by medical residents who are still training to be plastic surgeons, they have a vested interest in learning aesthetic procedures – skills that they'll be able to later market as they open private practices. But they have very little interest in learning the reconstructive procedures that actually improve a bodily

#### deficit in 17 years in Q1 biggest quarterly deficit KIM VARMA

BEIJING, MAY 5 (PTI): China has recorded its first quarterly current account deficit in nearly 17 years, ending its dream run of accumulating trade surplus as a top exporter for a peri-od during which it amassed the world's largest foreign exchange reserves of over

China saw a current count deficit of USD 28.2 billion in the first quarter of this year, the country's first quarterly deficit since the second quarter of 2001, data released yeterday by the State Administration of Foreign Exchange showed.

The goods trade still ran a surplus of USD 53.4 billion, but registered a 35 per cent slump yearon-year, while the service trade posted a deficit of USD 76.2 billion, the

since 1998, China's Caixir magazine reported.

SAFE tried to play it down saying that the rare red figure in the current account was a result of seasonal factors , but economists said it could signal a fundamental shift in China's international payment position, which in turn is a result of global economic rebalance in the last decade.

function or reduce physical pain.

Additionally, most of Brazil's surgical innovations are first tested by plastic surgeons in public hospitals, exposing those pa-tients to more risks than wealthier patients. Working-class patients are understood as subjects for inquiry, and I spoke to the small but significant number who were very un-happy with the results of their surgery.

Take one woman I interviewed named Renata. The medical resident who operated on her left her with deformed breasts and uneven nipples. She also developed severe infections that took months to heal and left significant scars. She considered suing the doctor, but discovered she would need a costly expert medical evaluation. She also knew that the Brazilian legal system would likely grant her very little in terms of damages. In the end, she settled for another free surgery, one that she hoped would provide

a better result and leave her less unhappy.

This was a typical story among low-income patients that were harmed by plastic ons. Their lack of financial re made it nearly impossible for them to find anv iustice if anything went wrong, so they ned all of the risk. Plastic surgeons, on the other hand, are

eager to try new techniques if they seem promising, no matter how risky they might be. A technique known as "bioplastia," for example, consists of injecting a liquid com-pound called PMMA into the body in order to permanently reshape a patient's features. The compound, which is similar to acrylic glass, doesn't cause problems in most patients. But in a small minority it causes very severe complications, including necrosis of facial tissue. Yet many doctors I interviewed strongly defended the technique, claiming it was a phenomenal tool that allowed them to transform the human body. Risk, they argued, was inherent in any surgical procedure.

Around the world, Brazilian plastic sureons are known as the best in their field, and they gain global recognition for their daring new techniques. During an interna-tional plastic surgery conference in Brazil, an American surgeon I interviewed told me, "Brazilian surgeons are pioneers... You know why? Because [in Brazil] they don't have the institutional or legal barriers to generate new techniques. They can be creative as they want to be." In other words, there are few regulations

place that could protect low-income patients from malpractice.

In a country where appearance is seen as central to one's very citizenship, patients agree to becoming experimental subjects in exchange for beauty. But it's often a choice made under duress, and the consequences can be dire.

### Gold touches Rs 32,000mark, up Rs 100 on jewellers' buying

DELHI, MAY 5 (PTI): Gold prices reclaimed the Rs 32,000-level by rising Rs 100 to Rs 32,080 per 10 grams today, taking strength from scattered buying by local jewel-lers amid a firm trend overseas.

Silver also strengthened by Rs 200 to Rs 40,500 per kg due to increased offtake by in-dustrial units and coin makers.

Gold prices firmed up after falling for three straight days, mainly because of fresh buying by local jewellers at the domestic spot market, coupled with a better trend globally.

Globally, gold rose 0.26 per cent to USD 1,315 an ounce and silver by 0.64 per cent to USD 16.50 an ounce in New York yesterday as the dollar backed off its day's highs, raising demand for the precious metals.

In the national capital, gold of 99.9 per cent and 99.5 per cent purity rebounded by Rs 100 each to Rs 32,080 and Rs 31,930 per ten grams, respectively. It had lost Rs 220 in the previous

three days.
Sovereign, however held steady at Rs 24.700

per piece of eight grams.
In step with gold, silver ready advanced by Rs 200 to Rs 40,500 per kg, while weekly-based delivery by Rs 30 to Rs 39,095 per kg. Silver coins too spurt-

ed by Rs 1,000 to Rs 75,000 for buying and Rs 76,000 for selling of 100 pieces.

In addition to the state charges, Purinton faces prosecution in federal court. The US Attorney's Office in Kansas filed hate crime charges against Purinton last June.



venture capitals to help countries produce goods and services using tech-nologies in digital age. "It should invest in

fintech, healthtech and other ways in which pub-lic services can be delivered to people of Asia to improve their quality of life," Garg said.

In his opening address at the 51st annual meeting of the ADB, Nakao said the multilateral lender is developing a new long-term 'Strategy 2030' which will renew its commitment to eradicate poverty in the region and expand vision to achieve a prosperous, inclusive, resilient and sustainable Asia and the Pacific (APAC).

"Today, the economic centre of gravity is shifting to Asia and the Pacific, and almost all our developing member countries have advanced to middle-income status. Yet, large challenges re-main, and new ones are emerging," Nakao said.

"There is still per-sistent poverty. We must address rising inequality, growing environmen-tal pressures, and rapid urbanisation. Aging in

some countries and an increasing youth population in others present opportunities as well as challenges," he added.

Stating that ADB plans to complete the process of formulating the 'Strategy 2030' by mid-2018, he said the multilateral lend-er will pursue differentiated approach for lend-ing to various developing member countries.

"Our task ahead is to reinvent ADB and meet the challenges of a transforming Asia and the Pa-

cific," Nakao said.
Highlighting 10 priorities in 'Strategy 2030',

Nakao said ADB will foster regional cooperation and integration, building on its experience in sub-regional sub-regional coopera-tion initiatives since the 1990s in Central Asia, South Asia, Southeast Asia, and the Pacific.

"We will promote re-gional public goods such as transportation and logistical networks, and protection against communicable diseases. We will support a regional approach to energy security, education, tourism, and financial stability. ADB will cooperate with existing and emerging international and regional initiatives," he said.

Earlier in the week, addressing a press con-ference, Nakao had said the Manila-based bank is looking at ways on how to fund the 'One Belt One Road' initiative, which would connect China with the rest of Eurasia and is also open to collaborate with China-led Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB).

The ADB was founded in 1966 and was mandated to lift people out of poverty and fund projects which will benefit society at large. Since

its inception, ADB has been led conventionally by a Japanese governor, with larger quantum of funding coming from Japan and United States. The ADB has 67 member countries, including 48 from the Asian region.

Nakao, in his opening address at the ADB board of governors meet, said implementing the 'Strat-egy 2030' will require a stronger, better, and fast-

"We will continue to use our financial resources efficiently and creatively... We will expand our presence on

ground. We will modernise business processes to speed up our services to clients. A 'One ADB' approach will break down silos and bring together expertise across ADB. We will continue to

work with a wide range of partners," he said. India is a founding member of the ADB and is currently the fourth-largest shareholder and the largest borrower of ADB sovereign lending since 2010. The multilateral lender has so far committed sover-eign loans totalling USD 35.9 hillion to India



Karan was recently seen in "Wel-come to New York" and the film, featuring Sonakshi Sinha and Diljit Dosanjh, also bombed.


