#### Detention to be back in classes 5 and 8: Javadekar

KOLKATA, JUL 22 (PTI): HRD Ministe Prakash Javadekar today said the Centre will soon introduce detention of students in classes 5 and 8 with support from states.

"In the proposed bill

to be passed in Parliament, power has been giv-en to the states to have ex-aminations for students at fifth and eighth standards in March, failing which they (students) will be given one last chance to appear in an examination in May," he said. If a student fails in both attempts, he/she

would be detained, Javadekar said adding 25 states have already given consent to the move

"We decided jointly a meet attended by all (state) education ministers that we can't allow students to go to the class 9 without qualifying in the exams in classes 5 and 8. We will grant states the power to retain students," he said at an Indian Cham ber of Commerce discus sion titled 'Way forward For Education Sector In Eastern Region,' here.

#### Vacant police outpost set afire in Jaldhaka, ridicule of Dari MP continues

DARJEELING (WB), JUL 22 (PTI): A police outpost was set on fire by pro-gorkhaland agitators in Darjeeling hills and nosters were distributed saying local MP SS Ahluwalia "has not been seen in the hills in the last few months" on the 38th day of the indefinite shut-

down today.

The agitators threw petrol bombs at a vacant police outpost in Jaldhaka in the afternoon and also tried to set ablaze a forest bungalow in the hills but failed, the police said. The GJM youth wing

continued their fast-unto-death, which they launched yesterday at four places of the hills in support of a separate Gorkhaland state.

Meanwhile Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM) activists and other hill parties held a demon-stration outside the district magistrate's office here demanding restoration of internet services in the hills.

Internet have been suspended for the last 32 days.

The posters of BJP MP from Darjeeling S S Ahluwalia were distributed among people by the GJM, GNLF and other hill parties.

"We want to know where is the MP? He has not come to the hills since the unrest began. Will he only come to the hills at the time of election? If he tries to do that the BJP will get a befitting reply from the people of the hills," GJM MLA Amar Singh Rai said. Yesterday the GNLF

and other hill parties had lodged a missing person complaint for Ahluwalia, who, they alleged, "has not been seen in the hills in the last few months."

Some political party activists dressed in traditional Nepali attire, took out processions in the morning.

## Landslide near new Secretariat disrupts water supply in Gangtok

A landslide that occurred below the under construction Secretariat building in Gangtok at around 5.30 p.m. on 21 July has damaged the 600 ft long water pipeline that fills the zonal tank and consumer lines to Deorali, Namnang, Lal Bazaar, New Market, Kazi Road, Tadong, Lingding, Lumsey and Central Referral Hospital. Hence, it is informed that the water supply to the aforementioned areas will be disrupted till resto-ration work is completed.

Officials of Disaster Management department informed that a new pro-tective wall was being erected and road widening work was under prog-ress on the road towards RMDD prem-ises. The old [existing] wall below the new wall collapsed due to incessant rainfall as a result of which the entire under construction wall along with the

road was damaged. The landslide has also caused dam-

age to the Mines and Geology Department building located just below the site of the incident with mudslide en-tering the ground floor of the building that served as the laboratory of the de-partment and a tree landing on its roof.

Forest Department personnel along with Quick Response Team of Disaster Management Department and civil rescue personnel have been working on clearing the fallen tree and the debris.

The PHE officials stated that all

restoration works are being carried out on a war footing to restore the damaged pipeline. They have appealed to the public to cooperate with the department as there will be inconvenience caused for a few days.

Temporary measures are also being looked into so that the supply of water continues eve if in reduced quantity to all the areas that the tank connects to

It is informed that the PHE depart-ment has closed the water supply of the damaged pipeline in order to avoid further damage.

ject. "When against Dalits, oppressed and the poor take place, whoever is in power, he or she at the state or central level, should be held accountable for such in-cidents," he told PTI in an

interview here.

Modi still going up as reHe said that in 2015, flected in repeated elec-tion victories, he said it is for the people of India to choose their rulers.

"I think the real and biggest question is what do the people want. Peo-ple in the last election chose the Modi administration. Whether people of India will rechoose Modi in the next election,

I don't know. If they are against, they need to rise up in numbers to oppose his rule," he said.

"India still has a long way to go to solve the problems of poverty and incidents against the oppressed and poor people," he added.

#### Man accused of sexual assault of minor

GANGTOK, 22 JUL: A 36 year-old resident of nipool. East Sikkim has been accused of sexually assaulting a 16-year-old girl.

According to a police report filed at Ranipool police station on 21 Jul by the victim's mother, the accused had been working as a domestic helper in their house since last year. The case came into light when the victim's mother found out that her daughter shared an intimate relationship with

mate relationship with the accused.

The victim revealed that the accused had promised to marry her and the two had estab-lished physical relations. The mother then accordingly narrated the incident to the police after which the accused was brought

under police custody.

A case under Protection of Children from Sexual Offenses Act, 2012 was registered against the accused. However, when the accused was directed to undergo a medical examination at Manipal Hospital in Tadong the Medical Officer on duty said that the accused was medically 'unfit' due to which his arrest has been put on hold for now.

He will be arrested as soon as he is discharged from the hospital, reports Ranipool police station.





#### LT Seats Need Consensus, Not Confusion

#### Let's revisit what the CRESP report had recommended many years back

t is nearly a month past since the deadline for feed-It is nearly a month past since the determination op-back and suggestions to the seat reservation option proposed by the Ministry of Home Affairs for the Limboos and Tamangs of Sikkim by virtue of their having becomes Scheduled Tribes ran out on 26 June last month. It is not clear who all made the effort to respond to the MHA circular. This is unfortunate because it would have helped the situation if the positions had been more widely shared so that they could also have been more publicly discussed. Of course, one is speaking specifics here because responses to the MHA circular, for them to be taken seriously, would require to be more reasoned and more detailed than is normally expected of routine press releases and state ments that the issue has so far received. The general positions of most political and community organizations which have joined cause with the seat issue are relatively well known, and these are dictated as much by their political alignments as by their interpretation of facts or understanding of possibilities. As far as the State Government is concerned, its position has been relatively consistent and the MHA circular is largely based on it. There are some inconsistencies between what the MHA has circulated and what the State Gov ernment has sought, and while that was touched upon in this section a while back, let's still revisit it via what the CRESP report had recommended and why.

The terms of reference of the Commission for Review of Social and Environmental Sector Policies, Plans and Programmes [CRESP] were enhanced by the State Government on 27 December 2005. One of the "terms" added for reference was the reservation of seats for Limboo and Tamang communities in the Sikkim Legislative Assembly consequent to their inclusion in the Scheduled Tribes list. CRESP was not asked how many seats should be reserved for the two communities because that is already prescribed under Article 332 (1) of the Constitution of India which stipulates that seats reserved for Scheduled Tribes in the Assembly should be in proportion to their population. The issue forwarded for deliberation was whether seats could be exclusively reserved for representa-tives from the Limboo and Tamang communities to the exclusion of Bhutia and Lepcha since the BLs were already enjoying reserved seats in the same Legislative Assembly. To this, the CRESP Report pointed out that BLs get their reserved seats not as Scheduled Tribes, but as a "sequel to a political agreement" made in 1973. Although the argument that the Limboos and Tamangs, as also some other communities of Sikkim, should have been accorded Scheduled Tribe status along with the BLs in 1978, is a very strong one, fact remains that ST status for LTs came about only in the vear 2003. Seats reserved for them will thus have to be as Scheduled Tribes, expanding its interpretation will further complicate the matter not so much because of the existing scheduled tribes of Sikkim – BLs and LTs – but because of future additions to the list which might come about sooner rather than later. The CRESP Report had explained as much. The Report explains that segmented reservation of seats for a section of STs is not provided for in the Constitution of India."

But the MHA circular suggests that the proposed reserved seats be community-specific to LTs. While this may sound a simpler solution for now, it does very little to settle the issue of the still-awaited tribal seats for Sikkim in the long run. Of course, neither the CRESP Report nor the MHA circular is binding. These are but recommendations and opinions and open to further deliberations and drafts before a final amendment to the Representation of People Act is tabled in the Parliament. The stakeholders need to understand that need for reserved seats for Limboos and Tamangs need no more recommendations, they are already guaranteed that by the Constitution. The delay is not because the requirement of seats does not have a strong enough basis, but because of the mathematical conundrum [for fresh reservations] posed by the existing seat reservation format in Sikkim. This is a challenge that only a consensus can surmount, confusing interpretations and conspiracy theories will not help. It is also an opportunity to set-

# We regulate doctors to protect the public from harm - why not journalists?

In the post-truth haze that has enveloped public discourse, a free press is more crucial than ever in educating the public and holding leaders to account. Reliable, accurate news is an essential public good. while false or misleading news can foment confusion

In this regard, the practice of journalism has much in common with the practice of medicine. The best medical practice can enhance the public's health, while careless treatment can lead to real harms. One of these professions is tightly regulated. The other is

practised without any formal systems of oversight.

Doctors are granted a licence to practise medicine by a medical board, or a college of physicians. Licensure typically requires proof of completion of medical school, as well as passing a series of examinations, and payment of an annual fee. Many physicians are additionally registered with other professional bodies that require evidence of continu-ing medical education, to better ensure that practi-tioners stay current in their fields.

Medical colleges establish clear rules and guide lines about how, in general terms, a physician's prac-tice should be carried out. Clear policies govern the professional standards that must be met, as well as how investigations and disciplinary actions are to be

now investigations and unstaining a more strength of a suspected violation.

Certain types of misconduct — be it a failure to maintain the standards of the profession, disgraceful behaviour, abuse of a position of authority, or other misdeeds — can land a physician before a disciplinary committee with the power to revoke their licence if they are indeed found guilty of malfeasance BOARD SERVES PUBLIC AND PROFESSION ALIKE Medical boards serve the public, providing mecha nisms through which patients can lodge complaints about physicians. They also serve physicians, who use credentialing to demonstrate good standing. Importantly, medical boards and colleges do not represent an additional layer of government bureaucracy. Rather, they are formed by groups of doctors,

patients and members of the public.

The potential parallels with journalism are easy to spot. The media fulfils an essential role in public life. Anyone writing and publishing news stories is given a potentially powerful voice. While our hope is that journalists will use their voice to reliably inform the public, we melead people astray.

Not long ago, accurate, fact-based and ground-breaking reporting was valued – think Knowlton Nash, Woodward and Bernstein or the Boston Globe's Spotlight team. Highly respected journalists collected information first-hand, bringing stories to press or to air only after the most stringent of vetting and corroboration.

The upside of the hard work that goes into producing and filing a story included nothing more than a good reputation and a modest pay cheque. Though by no means perfect, reporting was for the most part done with the best of intentions, by those most qual-

#### ANYONE CAN NOW REPORT ON A STORY

Our current media ecosystem presents a far different picture. The internet has given voice to anyone wishing to report on a story, enabling shoddy research based on secondary sources (or even pure fantasy). It has become possible to publish at the push of a button, at any time of day.

The upside now includes an influx of cash from

clicks and page views; being provocative may be more profitable than being correct. As a conse-quence, the lines between news and entertainment are now blurred. Consumers of news are adrift in a sea of stories, left to disambiguate the fake news from the real thing.

This state of affairs constitutes a threat to the

public good.

One needs look no further than recent votes in

the United States and the United Kingdom to see that elections have serious and far-reaching consequences. While failing to vote may be a dereliction of one's civic duty, voting while uninformed can be down-

This state of affairs — in which a profession duty to protect the public but the means to do harm ed for a journalism licensing body.

#### JOURNALISTIC BONA FIDES

A self-regulating college of journalists could determine what sort of education is needed in order to become licensed. Standards of journalistic practice and norms of professional conduct could be established based on a consensus of expert opinions. Formal pro-

cesses to investigate malpractice and strip wrongdo-ers of their credentials could be put in place. A licence in good standing would be a visible sign of a journalist's bona fides, akin to the post-nominal

"MD" that medical school graduates use.

A college of journalists would in no way infringe upon free speech or freedom of the press, much as a medical board does not preclude patients from seeking treatment from complementary and alter-native sources.

In fact, seeking health treatments or news stories outside the mainstream may in many cases be a safe and reasonable thing to do. The difference is that the consumer becomes better informed about their choices, and practitioners can't as easily claim to pro-

vide a service they aren't qualified to deliver.

Physicians inhabit a unique place of trust in society, conferred at least in part by the recognition that their practice is regulated, and that those operating

outside of accepted bounds face consequences.

Trust in journalists is no less important, but increasingly scarce these days. While the licensing of journalists may do little to stem the tide of fake news it might at least make it easier to call it out for what it is.

# Why licensing journalists won't end the scourge of 'fake news'

 ${f A}$  good place to start when considering a proposed solution is to ask what problem that solution is ming to fix.

That's a good way to approach suggestions that journalists should be licensed as a means to address concerns about "fake news" in an era in which journalists are often no longer trusted by the public.

But are those real problems?

"Fake news" — to the extent that the concept means anything — has been with us forever, on display at supermarket checkout counters every day. What's new is not "fake news," but the ability to distribute it quickly, asily and widely online through social media.

Licensing journalists can't prevent that.

In fact, "fake news" as a concept now seems to mean factual information that those in positions of authority would rather not see published or broadcast — all the more reason to ensure it is distributed as widely as possible

#### MANY DON'T TRUST NEWS ON SOCIAL MEDIA

Interestingly, public opinion surveys over the past year conducted by the Public Policy Forum in con-junction with the Canadian Journalism Foundation as part of the PPF's Shattered Mirror report, and by the Reuters Institute at Oxford, both suggest the mainstream media in Canada enjoy a considerable degree of trust. That's quite different from the situation in the United States.

What isn't trusted, those same surveys show, is accuracy of anything distributed via social media. On one level, that leads to an intriguing question.

Shouldn't we be spending less time worrying about the spread of "fake news" and more time (assuming ou can define "fake news") trying to figure out just ow many people believe any of it.

With that as a preamble, there are more ques-

tions to ask about licensing journalists. Start with how to determine who's a journalist at a time when anyone can distribute text, audio or video widely online. Traditional media are no longer information gatekeepers. A smart phone is all you need to become a "journalist" and record, edit and distrib-

ute any chosen mixture of video, audio, photos, data and/or text. Look at the daily online flood of material about traffic accidents, fires, demonstrations, bad behaviour in parking lots or on public transit, encounters with police and almost anything else.

WHAT ABOUT BLOGGERS?

Senate Bill S-231, now under consideration by the House of Commons to give journalists the ability to protect the confidentiality of their sources, defines a journalist as "a person whose main occupation is to contribute directly, either regularly or occasionally for consideration, to the collection, writing or production of information for dissemination by the media, or anyone who assists such a person.

That's as good a definition as any but excludes any-one who starts a blog, tweets or distributes information other than through "the media" as it was once defined. Such individuals can produce and distribute whatever comes into their minds in whatever format they want, while facing the legal consequences if it's libellous or violates Criminal Code provisions regarding hate speech. others can pick it up and circulate it through social media. Licensing journalists won't stop that.

It's also difficult to compare journalism to

self-regulating professions such as doctors, lawyers, engineers and architects. Those professions require lengthy training, specific detailed knowledge and a demonstration that you can apply all that successfully to be given a license

#### A SMART PHONE IS ALL THAT'S NEEDED

Who would determine what knowledge and skills someone should learn and be able to demonstrate to get a journalism licence?

You don't need any technical skills — comparable in detail to the other professions - to write, shoot video, record audio, put it all together online and distribute it. You can do it, although perhaps badly, with almost no instruction. It's no more complex than figuring out how to use your smartphone and laptop.

Nonetheless, there's no question that journalism schools teach would-be reporters much more than that — everything from defining a story to pitching it to editors, interviewing people, digging out information that authorities would prefer remain hidden, structuring and presenting stories to audiences in

different formats, not to mention the hands-on experience with the technical elements (shooting, editing, data visualization, content management systems, etc.) of online journalism. That gives journalism graduates the significant advantage of skills training when seeking employment — something someone

with just a smartphone doesn't have.

Licences also mean there are certain rules you must obey or risk sanction. What are those rules for journalism? As one example, journalism schools tell students they should have at least two sources for every story. If that was applied in practice, every news organization in Canada would likely be sanc-

#### WHO WOULD BE THE ENFORCER?

Who would establish the rules? Provincial press councils tried to do that informally but they dealt only with print, were underfunded, membership was voluntary and their only sanction was publicizing that the council had rapped a newspaper's knuckles. They have since disappeared, replaced by a National NewsMedia Council that is trying to develop a con-sensus around defining good journalism while also mediating public complaints about media coverage.

Finally and more important, who enforces the rules and imposes penalties if a licensed journalist breaks them? Certainly not a government agency subject to political direction against news stories that those in power might not appreciate. Remember Justin Trudeau's ill-considered and short-lived refus-al to answer questions from Sun Media while leader of the opposition or Stephen Harper's decade-long

battle with the media while prime minister?

"Fake news," yellow journalism, tabloid exposés, bad reporting and sensationalism won't end with the licensing of journalists. Much better to focus on educating audiences about the elements of good jour-nalism and the cost of producing it, what to look for when they see, listen to or read a news story and how to question and hold to account news organizations and journalists about their reporting. That's something both the educational system at all levels and the media itself can do.

# One more person dies, but flood situation in Assam improves

GUWAHATI, JUL 22 (PTI): The flood situation in Assam improved today although one person died in the deluge and nearly 90,000 people are still as fected in 11 districts of the state.

According to a report by Assam State Disaster Management Authority (ASD-MA), one person lost his life at Mayong revenue circle in Morigaon district.

revenue circle in Morigaon usu acc.
With this, the total number of people losing their lives in this year's flood related cases has gone up to 76, including eight in Guwahati.

The ASDMA said around 90,000 people are suffering at present in Lakhimpur, Biswanath, Barpeta, Morigaon, Nagaon, Karbi Anglong, Golaghat, Jorhat, Sivasagar, Karimganj and Cachar districts.

Till yesterday, 1.65 lakh people

were affected in the latest wave of flood across 14 districts in the state.

The ASDMA said 294 villages are under water at present and over 20,000 hectares of cron areas are inundated.

hectares of crop areas are inundated.

The worst affected is Golaghat, where over 31,000 people have been affected by the deluge, followed by Barpeta with more than 17,000 people.

Authorities are running 58 relief

camps and distribution centres in eight districts, where 11,611 people are currently taking shelter.

Due to the impact of the flood waters, many roads, embankments and bridges have been damaged in many districts.

Currently Dhansiri river at Golaghat town and at Numaligarh in Golaghat is flowing above the danger mark.

#### No tarmac access for Lalu, wife at Patna airport

NEW DELHI, JUL 22 (PTI): RJD supremo Lalu Prasad Yadav and his wife Rabri Devi will no more be able to drive straight to their aircraft at Patna airport as the central government has withdrawn tarmac access for their vehicle, according to officials.

"Previous order (allowing access) was for Patna airport only, which has been withdrawn," an official at the Bureau of Civil Aviation Security (BCAS) told PTI on the condition of anonymity.

The move comes af-

The move comes after the Ministry of Civil Aviation wrote a letter to the BCAS informing that it had decided to revoke permission granted in 2009 allowing Lalu Yadav and his wife's vehicle to drive up to the tarmac.

decided that the permission accorded to Shri Lalu Prasad Yadav and Smt Rabri Devi vide the AVSEC order No 13/2009 dated

drawn forthwith," says the letter dated July 21.

The letter asks BCAS to take "immediate action to issue necessary instructions" to ensure implementation of the

ministry's decision.

Under the earlier order, the two former chief ministers were "permitted access in their own vehicle up to the tarmac of Patna airport during their departure/arrival by air at Patna airport".

Lalu was the chief minister of Bihar from 1990 to 1997 when he was forced to step down following corruption charges.

His wife Rabri took over as the chief minister and served three terms until 2005.

Lalu's RJD is an alliance partner in the Bihar government and his son Tejashwi Yadav holds the post of the deputy chief minister. Lalu was convicted in a fodder scam case in 2013 and is facing fresh allegations along

# US admits inconsistency in describing JK, but no policy change

US officials have acknowledged that there have been inconsistencies in the American description of Jammu and Kashmir, but insisted there was no change in its policy saying the "pace, scope and character" of any discussion on Kashmir is for India and Pakistan to determine

"Our policy on Kashmir has not changed," a State Department spokesperson told PTI.

The clarification came after questions were raised about the different ways the US has described Jammu and Kashmir.

Recently in one of its statements, the US described it as "Indian administered Jammu and Kashmir" and this week it said the "Indian State of Jammu and Kashmir".

In June while designating Pakistan-based Hizbul Mujahideen chief Syed Salahuddin as a "specially-designated global terrorist", the State Department had said the militant group has

claimed responsibility for several attacks, including the April 2014 attack in "Indian-administered Jammu and Kashmir".

India, however, had played down the nomenclature by the US, saying similar terms had been used previously too. In the past, the US

had also used "India-held Kashmir". In the latest "Country Report on Terrorism 2016", released on Wednesday, the US used "Azad Jammu and Kashmir" to describe Pakistan-occupied Kashmir.

The use of the word "Azad Jammu and Kashmir" by the State Department was strongly opposed by the Indian Government.

US officials acknowledged that there have been inconsistency in the American way of describing Jammu and Kashmi, but insisted there has been no change in its policy

no change in its policy.

"Our policy on Kashmir has not changed. The pace, scope, and character of any discussions on Kashmir is for the two sides to determine," the spokesperson said.

### Crisis of Confidence

Nearly six months after TR Zeliang was forced to step down and hand over the top chair to Dr Shurhozelie Liezietsu in a compromise to bring normalcy in the State, Shurhozelie has been dethroned and TR Zeliang has made a comeback to the Chief Minister's chair.

The political games and the tussle for the top chair since former Chief Minister Neiphiu Rio sud-denly decided to leave state politics and try his fortunes in national politics more than three years back has painted our people and state politicians in a very bad light. In fact, political events in the last three years have shown where the priorities of our elected legislators lie - themselves and not to their constit-uencies. So it is no wonder that our people's confidence in the political class is at an all time low to-day. The members of our legislative assembly, which not only represents people but also makes laws and sets the moral parameters of the socio-political discourse, is today finding itself credibility-challenged. People who are elected with whatever little or more electoral participation, evoke little confidence in their integrity. This is a malaise that afflicts the en-tire political class in India but in Nagaland, the situation is more complicated. Here the issue is not only about corruption. It is not only about the institutional decay. It is about the decay of people, perhaps the most pernicious of all rots. In fact over the years, this crisis of confidence in our leaders or their lesser versions in the form of elected representatives has not remained limited to them. There is now no aspect of life that is not riddled with this malaise - the breakdown of trust among people in one another And the damage to collective psyche seems so deep and endemic that even if a spotless leader exists or were to emerge, he will barely survive the whispers. murmurs and asides - the frenzied collective rush to judge and take him down. The absence of an overarching figure we can look up to, lack of an everyday role model and the sense of being betrayed by those we venerated has in turn undermined our faith in ourselves as a people. The sense of being let down by our own kind runs deep. But as a community we have chosen to

deal with this problem in the most negative sense possible. Today everybody suspects everybody. We have become a land of agents: Indian agents, agents of this or that factions/party/group, double agents, etc. It is not only about politician versus politician, it is political party versus political party, bureaucrat versus bureaucrat, men versus women, everyman versus everyman, etc. At its most vicious end, this tendency has created a breed of people who have developed a cannibalistic urge to devour reputa-tions, to shred and tear them apart. How does one manage one's subjectivity or neutrality, how to engage or disengage from the system? Where to draw the line? When system is like water in which we all swim? Those who are outside can have the luxury to speak "purely" about it, invoke the idealism of the pristine variety at their command. But those working on the ground here through the blood and guts of the better part of past two decades, being brushed and nicked by the system, sometimes bruised by it while trying to do just their jobs, have no such luxury. But so thick with suspicions is the environment in which we operate that it is not only the strangers that suspect one another but even friends do it with least compunction, even while they may have known each other for years. But those who pick on others are not free from the blame too. They are also talked about in hush-hush asides, whispers and murmurs. People for all their outward appearances, their dispositions, their work, may count for little. There can be no such thing as personal integrity. People evoke the sense of a flesh and blood conspiracy, are seen as inherently perfidious, compromised entities with contradictory outer inner selves. Who did this to us? Conflict is the obvious reply.

Who did this to us? Conflict is the obvious reply. This is part of the psychological fallout of the conflict, but one we could self-address. But the mean thrill of smudging reputations and its vicarious buyout by others can be too much of an addiction to give up. The world of suspicions and conspiracy can be too darkly alluring to forgo. The only remedy for this state of decay is for politicians to show character and evolve into leaders. And why only them, all of us, including the ones accusing others have to measure up.

It also noted that one school in the East District of Sikkim retained 114 students out of 2105 in the same class during 2010-100 to 2014-15.

# Katchatheevu's restoration to India only solution to stand-off with Lankan navy: TN CM

CHENNAI, JUL 22 (PTI): Restoration of Katchatheevu islet to India is the only permanent solution to a long-standing issue of Indian fishermen being apprehended by the Sri Lankan navy, Tamil Nadu Chief Minister K Palaniswami said today. In two separate incidents in last few

In two separate incidents in last few days, 12 fishermen from the state were apprehended by the island nation.

"The heightened intolerance of the Sri Lankan navy can be seen from the fact that fishermen were apprehended even when they were engaged in traditional fishing using gill nets in Palk Bay waters," the chief minister said in his letter to Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

Palaniswami said the only solution to the long-standing issue "on a permanent basis" was restoration of Katchatheevu back to India and redrawing the International Maritime Boundary Line.

He also said that the Sri Lankan government keeps on "irritating the fishermen with continuing apprehension of their boats and arrests".

The chief minister requested the prime minister to use all diplomatic channels available with the Centre to find a permanent solution to the issue.

He also sought Modi's intervention to secure the release of 72 fishermen along with 148 fishing boats apprehended by the Sri Lankan navy.

### Governor's role

Former Chief Minister Dr Shurhozelie Liezietsu and the Naga People's Front has made serious allegations against Governor of Nagaland PB Acharya for "the partisan role" played by him in installing a Government through the backdoor without following the due process of parliamentary norms. "The haste with which he has acted favouring the RSS-friendly dispensation should be a wake-up call to the Naga people that there are elements fiercely and furiously doing the utmost to pierce the Trishul into the heart-land of Christ," the NPF has alleged. The Governor had on July 19 dismissed Dr Shurhozelie's Government and appointed his favourite TR Zeliang as Chief Minister. Shurhozelie is also the president of the NPF party.

Here let us try to understand the role of governors in India. The very process of the centre appointing governors warps the country's federal structure. They can be transferred from one state to another or sacked without cause. Initially, the draft constitution envisaged a governor elected by the state. In 1948, it was amended to suggest two alternatives; appointment by the president from a panel of four candidates elected by the legislature, or direct election by the people of the province. The constituent assembly opted for presidential appointment, with the proviso that the governor should act on the advice of the state

cabinet. The impartiality and independence of the governor was strongly emphasised by the architects of the constitution. All the leaders who intervened in the debate recognised that the chief minister's consent is an essential prerequisite to the appointment of the governor by the president. Nehru said, "He must be acceptable to the government of the province." Every safeguard was removed in actual practice. Chief Ministers were not always consulted. Governors behave, not as constitutional heads of state in a parliamentary system bound by the advice of the chief minister, but as agents of the centre. The Supreme Court's rulings are in stark contrast to the reality. In 1979, the court ruled, "It is no doubt true that the governor is appointed by the president which means in effect and substance the government of India, but that is only a mode of appointment and it does not make the governor an employee or servant of the government of India. Every person appointed by the president is not necessarily an employee of the government of India. So also it is not material that the governor holds office during the pleasure of the president. It is constitutional provision for determination of the term of office of the governor and it does not make the government of India an employer of the governor in dia. He is not amenable to the directions of the government of India, nor is he "accountable to them for the manner in which he carries out his functions and duties. He is an independent constitutional office which is not subject to the control of the government of India. He is not subject to the control of the government of India. He is not subject to the control of the government of India. He is constitutionally the head of the state in whom is vested the

executive power of the state and without whose assent there can be no legislation in exercise of the legislative power of the state"

Even in 1979 this ruling seemed unreal. In the nearly four decades that have elapsed since it has acquired irrelevance. In 1983, Indira Gandhi's government appointed a commission on centre-state relations headed by Supreme Court justice R.S. Sarkaria. On security of tenure, the report made feeble suggestions on safeguards against arbitrary dismissal. Among others, the report recommended that as "It is desirable that a politician from the ruling party at the union is not appointed as governor of a state which is being run by some other party or a combination" of parties. A fortnight after the publication of the report, governors were appointed in five states in direct violation of the commission's recommendation.

The practice continues today, making a mockery of federalism and democracy. Every party in India that comes to power at the centre packs the offices of states' governors with party men, or retired civil servants, heads of armed and police forces. But the Modi government went one better. It appointed party hacks as governors in states ruled by opposition parties, who behave as if instructed to pick fights with their respective chief ministers. In fact the recent cases of governors' alleged misbehaviour will not be the last.

The Instagram picture, even accompanied by a matching emoji, shows the 25-year-old Brazilian superstar stretched out on the pitch

with his chin resting on his left hand.

It garnered more than 1.5 million 'likes' within 12 hours of it being posted in the United States

where Barcelona are on a pre-season tour.

Three of the 'likes' came from PSG players -- winger Angel Di Maria, goalkeeper Kevin Trapp and midfielder Marco Verratti. On Tuesday, PSG skipper -- and fellow Brazilian -- Thiago Silva gave a digital thumbs up

zinan -- Tinago Silva gave a digital diumbs up to a mocked-up photo montage published by media company Esporte Interativo showing Neymar in a PSG shirt along with compatriots and prospective teammates in France. Esporte Interativo used the montage to illus-

trate what they insist is an agreement reached for Neymar to move to the French capital from Barcelona where he has played since 2013.

Like Barcelona, PSG are also touring the United States where Neymar's future has de inated conversation.

Barcelona coach Ernesto Valverde described

the ongoing saga as a "time of rumours".

"We understand it's how it is. He is with us right now, one of us," said Valverde in East Rutherford where his team plays Juventus in a

pre-season friendly on Saturday.

"He's a player we love and we want. Not only football wise, but also for the things he brings to the locker room.

However, it's believed the Brazilian is being seduced by the immense wealth on offer to him from the Qatari owners of PSG and by the opportunity to have a team built around him.

The daily Sport newspaper also claimed that Luis Suarez has also attempted to per-suade Neymar not to split up the MSN frontline at Barcelona made up of Lionel Messi, Suarez

and the Brazilian star.

Catalunya Radio said that the deal is "95 percent complete".

Jeje with them this season also.

Jhingan and his national teamforward Vineeth will continue to play for 2016 runners-up side Kerala Blasters.

The clubs were allowed to retain a maximum of two senior



players from their 2016 squad. in addition to upto three U-21 players to fill up the development player quota. Eight teams have already signed up 22 do-mestic players, while Delhi Dynamos have opted to begin on a

Both Lyngdoh and Anas, who were released by FC Pune City and Delhi Daynamos respective-ly, have been kept at the base price of Rs 1.10 crores each, according to sources.

Other players in the top price bracket include goalkeeper Sub-rata Paul (Rs 87 lakhs), Pritam Kotal (Rs 75 lakhs), Robin Singh (Rs 65 lakhs) and Arindam Bhattacharya (Rs 64 lakhs).

Goalkeepers like Paul, who was recently let off with a warn-ing after a doping infringement,



and Arindam could be in demand as the new ISL regulations have reduced the number of foreign players a team can have in the playing eleven from six to five.

Most of the teams would want to have foreigners as out-field players instead of losing out one slot to a goalie.

The salary cap for each team (both Indian and foreign players) has been set at Rs 18 crores and only a maximum of Rs 12.5 crores can be utilised to sign overseas players. So, each team gets a minimum of Rs 5.5 crore to buy Indian players.

ISL 2017-18 Player Draft will witness a total 15 rounds.

The sequence for selection of Player Draft rounds for each club will be determined by a

As the new team in ISL, Jamshedpur will get the first pick in both the first and second rounds, while Dynamos will be the second to exercise their right

in the opening round.

The Instant Trading Card, first introduced in ISL 2015 Player Draft, allows teams a second chance to trade an already picked player. From the third round onwards, any club may, within 15 seconds of another club announcing its Draft pick, press the buzzer to activate the "Instant Trade" process.

Representatives of the clubs will then head to Instant Trading Table to propose, negotiate and close the deal within a stipulat-

ISL regulations allow clubs to have a minimum of 15 and maximum of 18 Indian players in the squad, including two mandatory Under-21 development players. The maximum squad size will be of 25 players and must contain a minimum of seven foreign players and 15 Indian players. must also include at least two U-21 players (players born after January 1997).



#### Doval's visit key to ease Sikkim sector standoff: Chinese analyst

BEIJING, JUL 22 (PTI):
Indian National Security
Adviser Ajit Doval's visit to Beijing for a meeting of NSAs from BRICS countries may be key to ease tensions between India and China over the military standoff in Dokalam, a Chinese analyst said.

Doval is scheduled to visit China for the meeting on July 27-28.

The meeting is hosted by his Chinese counter-part and State Councillor Yang Jiechi. It is part of a series of meetings of of-ficials from BRICS countries - Brazil, Russia, India, China, and South Africa - ahead of this year's summit of the five-member bloc of emerging countries in Xiamen city in September.

Prime Minister Nar-endra Modi is expected

to attend the summit.

Ma Jiali, a research
fellow at the China Reform Forum thinktank, said Doval's visit may be key and would serve as an opportunity to ease India-China tensions.

His comments came in a piece in The Global Times, the mouthpiece of the Communist Party media group, which gen-erally reflects the views of the ruling party, to-day. The tabloid has unleashed a barrage of anti-India rhetoric in recent weeks amid tensions between the two countries.

Chinese and Indian soldiers have been locked in a face- off in Dokalam area in the southernmost part of Tibet in an area also claimed by Indian ally Bhutan for over a month after Indian troops stopped the Chinese arm from building a road in

the disputed area. Both Doval and Yang are also the Special Representatives for India-China boundary talks. The two sides have held 19 rounds of boundary talks to resolve their differences.

Chinese officials say Doval and Yang may have informal talks to resolve the standoff in Dokalam in the Sikkim sector.
"China would lodge

solemn representation with the Indian side during Doval's visit, hoping it could take measures to ease the tension. India may make some requests as a bargaining chip for its pulling out troops," Ma, who specialises in India-China studies, said.

He, however, cau-tioned that if the two sides failed to reach an agree ment on the issue, the China-India ties would be severely damaged.

#### 16 Afghan police killed in US strike

KANDAHAR, JUL 22 (AFP): A US airstrike killed 16 Afghan police and wounded two others in Helmand province, officials said today.

The incident took place yesterday around 5 pm as Afghan security forces were clearing a village of Taliban elements, Salam Afghan, Helmand police spokesman, told AFP. "In the strike, 16 Afghan policemen were killed including two commanders. Two other policemen were wounded," he said.

Omar Zwak, Helmand provincial governor spokes-

man, confirmed the strike and gave the same account.

It occurred in Gereshk district in Helmand, large parts of which are under Taliban control.

NATO's mission in Afghanistan issued a statement. "During a US-supported (Afghan security) opera-tion, aerial fires resulted in the deaths of the friendly Af-ghan forces who were gathered in a compound," it said.

"We would like to express our deepest condolences to the families affected by this unfortunate incident," the statement said, adding there would be a probe into what happened.

The US is the only foreign force in the coalition conducting airstrikes in Afghanistan.

Acting interior ministry spokesman Najeeb Danish

gave a lower death toll than the provincial officials.

"The toll we have received is that unfortunately as a result of the strike, we have 12 police forces martyred and no one wounded," Danish told AFP.

He said a ministry delegation had been sent to the

area to investigate the incident and help families of the victims. There have been a series of incidents involving US airstrikes and Afghans.

In February, a US airstrike in Sangin killed at least

18 civilians, mostly women and children

suggests that the result-ing increase in popula-tion density is likely to place significant extra demands on resources, including electricity and water, while simultaneously increasing the out-put of waste in the form of drainage, solid waste and greenhouse gasses.
