## CM Chamling receives PhD from SRM Univ, dedicates it to people of Sikkim

GANGTOK, 06 DEC [IPR]: A Doctorate of Literature [Honoris Causa] was awarded to Chief Minister Pawan Chamling at the 1st Convocation of Shri Ramasamy Memorial University [SRM], Sikkim at Chintan Bhawan in Gangtok today.

Governor Shriniwas Patil presided over the convocation programme along with the CM as chief guest.

Mr Chamling, in his address, congratulated the new graduates and said that the vision of higher education in India is to realize the country's human resource potential to its fullest with equity and in-clusion. He further said that this essentially means providing greater access to higher ed-ucation for all sections, particularly the vulnerable sections the society.

Higher education in India

is passing through a phase of unprecedented expansion, marked by an explosion in the



volume of students, a substantial expansion in the number of institutions and a quantum jump in the level of public funding, he added.

"Education is the single most important element in converting our young popu-

lation into national assets. If the younger generation of our constitute a very strong and

productive workforce for the coming years," expressed Mr Chamling.

He further informed that the Human Resource Development Department has come out with several schemes un-derscoring the importance of inclusive education and the budget outlay for higher education has been increased.

Mr Chamling also reiterated the fact that Sikkim is at the threshold of becoming fully literate by 2018 and the education related spending is also the highest in the country with expenditure of Rs 75,000 per

student in the State.

Congratulating the graduating students for completing their studies from such a reputed institution, he hoped that they leave as empowered citizens with the realization that each and every one of them are powerful enough to create change and empower

### PIL seeks extension of amended Maternity Benefit Act to govt and private sectors in Sikkim

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 04 DEC:

A Public Interest Liti-gation in the Sikkim High Court is seeking court directions for im-plementation of the Maternity Benefit (Amendment) Act, 2017 in the state of Sikkim and directions to amend the Sikkim Government Service (leave) Rules 1982 in light of the said Act.

Zangpo Sherpa, a practicing advocate, has approached the High Court seeking the extension of the new maternity benefit rules not only in government sector, but also in private sector units employing more than 50 people.

The State govern-ment, through Social Social Welfare, Women's Em-powerment & Family Welfare Department, has conveyed that necessary are being taken with regard to the imple-mentation of the Maternity Benefit (Amendment)

Act, 2017 to Sikkim.

However, in the writ petition, the petitioner has further contended that there are many private establishments in the State which have not implemented the Ma-ternity Benefit Act due to non-enforcement the said Act in the State.

As per the Mater-nity Benefit Act, where there are 50 or more employees engaged, there should be a provision of crèche facility.

The Maternity Benefit Act, first passed in 1961, protects the right to employment of women during the time of their maternity and entitles them maternity benefits.

To be eligible for maternity benefits. an must have been working in an establishment for at least 80 days in the past 12 months

The amendments to the Maternity Benefit Act, which were enforced from 01 April earlier this year, provide for 26 weeks of paid materni-ty leave and mandatory crèche facility, introduc-tions which were seen as path-breaking even as the feasibility remains to be established.

#### Delhi govt issues SOP to combat air pollution

NEW DELHI, DEC 6 (PTI):

The Delhi government has issued the standard operating procedure (SOP) to all the authorities concerned, including the DDA, PWD and civic bodies, for taking imme diate measures to com-bat air pollution in the national capital.

The measures include sprinkling of water by the PWD, MCDs, DDA, NDMC (New Delhi Municipal Council) on the city's roads and action against the polluting vehicles by the transport department.

Delhi's Air Quality In dex (AQI) was recorded as "poor" today. The en-vironment department has asked the Delhi Pollution Control Committee (DPCC), industry de partment, sub-divisional magistrates (SDMs) and assistant commissioners of police (ACPs) to ensure that the ban on die-sel generator sets (with the exceptions as defined by the DPCC for essential services) was enforced in their respective areas.

"All municipal commis-sioners, DDA vice-chair-man, NDMC chairman, divisional commissioners, member secretary (DPCC) will send all the staff to take stock of garbage burning throughout the city," the department said in a written communica-tion to all the authorities concerned.

Besides, the environment department has asked the special commissioner (traffic) and commissioner (transport) to intensify the drive against the pollutturn to pg02

Mr Ghatani responded to the queries put forth before Sikkim by the Union Minister on various components that



are being covered under IMI. He said that the mission has been successfully implemented in the State of Sikkim since 08 Oct 2017 along with the inauguration of the IMI by Prime Minister Narendra Modi at Vadnagar in Gujarat.

Replying in the context of target set up by Government of India to achieve 90% of immunization coverage by 2018. Mr Family Health Survey [NFHS], Sikkim has achieved 83% coverage and according to the survey conducted by the State government, our State has al ready secured more than 90%

of immunization coverage."

Assuring to work tirelessly in achieving 100% coverage at the earliest, he informed that the State Steering Committee has been formed under the chairretary and meetings are being conducted on a regular basis.

"State task force and district task force have been formed which are also conducting meetings as per the guidelines. Activities related guidelines. #### Too Many Suicides And still too little concern

It was rather morbid Saturday last weekend; three deaths due to suicide were reported from across on that single day. Frequent visitors of Social Media pages frequented by "locals" would have noticed the persistent march of lost notices on such pages. Hopefully, most of these are cases of runaways, but many

undoubtedly also turn up as suicide victims.

A death affects everyone. The trauma travels through family members, friends, colleagues/ classmates, neighbours... The loss is permanent, and hence the grieving is long. When a death is by suicide, confusion and guilt, even among those who knew the victim only at a very casual level, are added to the already difficult emotion of grief. When the life lost is young, or leaves young dependents behind, the situation grows extremely complex and a nagging conscience begins gnawing minds already grappling with shock and sorrow and returning to thoughts of whether something could have been done differently, whether the suicide could have been prevented... Sikkim has a serious problem staring it in the face with the number of lives it is losing to suicides.

The social challenge posed by suicides has been flagged often for Sikkim, and although it is now universally accepted as a major problem, nothing is being done to address it. Organisations which one would turn to - the Government for a policy commitment to confront the problem, the healthcare sector for the professional intervention required and social and people's organisations to provide the necessary involvement and outreach- have remained unmoved. Unmoved might be too strong a word to describe the response, the ennui is perhaps because none of these organisations know what to do. This is a worrying situation and the time is now urgent for one of these groups to take a leadership role in talking about the problem more forcefully and with its proactive engagement, inspire others to join forces and help save lives.

Suicides in Sikkim are not limited to any specific

age-group, the Saturday casualties ranged from 40 to mid-sixties, but what is very specifically proven by now is the recklessness with which lives are being allowed to self-destruct.

Any attempt at curtailing suicides in Sikkim will have to begin by reinforcing the support system those at risk need. When it comes to the young, it will mean by treating them with more respect and addressing, with genuine concern, their requirements. The elders will need support groups, timely detection of their suicidal tendencies and effective interventions. Suicidal tendencies don't always require medical expertise to detect. Depression and other mental disorders, feelings of worthlessness, signs of abuse and other warning signs manifest rather clearly. What is missing is the correct response. Family and friends, the first to notice these signals, perhaps prefer to ignore them because it is a difficult situation to address and they find themselves at a loss on how to respond. Maybe they will seek help and counseling if they were made to understand how serious the problem is.

Although it is now widely accepted in Sikkim that too many suicides are taking place, individual realisation of how people around them could also take that route has not yet dawned. Suicides are still looked at from a sanitised distance of "it could not happen us". Any attempt at generating wider awareness and involvement on curtailing suicides has to begin by sharing case studies of how apparently "normal" children from "normal" families have also ended their lives. The social support required to save lives will perhaps then reinforce itself better.

It is also true that even people worried by warning signs they notice, don't know how they can help. That is where governmental and non-governmental organisations can take a leading role. It is important to bear in mind that awareness is required not only to highlight suicides as a problem, but also in equipping the first-responders - friends and family - to panic signs, on what they can do and whom they can approach for help. And one is still discussing the first step of addressing suicides and generating awareness for Sikkim here. The equally important phase of help-ing friends and family of suicide victims deal with the trauma and heal themselves is not even being considered in what little is being done here on the issue of suicides. Although the pain, grief and associated guilt may never go away, if left ignored, they could intensify and put more lives at risk. The chances of suicides, do after all, increase in cases which have a family history or instances of people [friends and acquaintances] having taken this drastic option. It is worrying that a State which has lost as many lives to suicide as Sikkim does not have an effective support group to counsel and help heal friends and family of suicide victims.

## Slave auctions in Libya are the latest evidence of a reality for migrants the EU prefers to ignore

Aman called out numbers against the murky darkness of the Libyan night: "400, 500, 600, 650." These man called out numbers against were bids in Libyan dinars during a slave auction. Video footage of these scenes, aired in mid-November by CNN, thrust concerns about the conditions facing migrants at Europe's borders back into the spotlight.

In response, the EU called for "swift action", and the French president, Emmanuel Macron, announced a plan to launch "concrete military action" against the perpetrators. The Nigerian government also said it had begun to bring home some of its citi-zens stranded in Libya.

Efforts to enable people to escape from situations of slavery, violence and exploitation in Libya are certainly welcome. But they will need to go beyond the short-term perspective that so often accompanies responses to proclamations of crisis. And these new efforts will reek of hypocrisy if they do not also recognise the relationship between existing migration control policies and the vulnerability of migrants using routes into and through Libya.

The story of young men sold as slaves in Libya was the focus of debates at the UN Security Council and topped the agenda at a major sum-mit of European and African leaders. Slavery and other abuses are an "abomination" that "can no longer be ignored", stated Filippo Grandi, the UN's high commissioner for refugees.

But stories of forced labour, ploitation and the buying and selling of migrants are not particularly new. I heard them myself in 2015 when I was part of a research team which carried out interviews with nearly 200 people who had departed from Libya by boat, towards Italy and Malta.

"I was arrested and imprisoned in southern Libya ... I was sold to a slave trader, along with other Eritreans, Somalis and Nigerians. This person took us to a farm, where we could not leave except to go to work at a con struction site and return. We were always guarded by armed people."

These words, from a young Malian man, were mirrored by many others who spoke of being held captive, put

into forced work or bought and sold. Some were set free once they had gathered enough ransom money, wired over to them by family and friends. Others might be released when their labour was no longer required or if they managed, somehow, to escape. But it was also not unusual to hear people being beaten and even see others die at the hands of their "owners".

Our project has not been the only e to report such findings. In 2016 the International Organisation for Migration (IOM) found that 71% of migrants who crossed the central Mediterranean route from North Africa to Europe had experienced exploitation, particularly kidnapping, forced labour, carrying out work without being paid and being kept at locations against their will. In February 2017, a Sky documentary described Libya as "hell" for migrants and a study of trafficking and smuggling there referred to "the extortion economy and new slave trade".

#### EUROPEAN COMPLICITY

Public figures are right to condemn people being sold as slaves in Libya. But their concern has an air of insin-cerity when they have known about it for years. The EU's high representative for foreign affairs, Federica Mogherini, expressed her "total condemnation of these despicable acts" but also stated that "this is not something that began one month ago. Everybody has known about it for years".

For officials to say now that violence, exploitation and slavery can "no longer be ignored" belies the fact that these issues were downplayed and pushed aside as the EU pursued

collaboration with the Libyan authorities to control migration

The primary objective of Euro-pean approaches has instead been to stem the flow of people departing Libya by boat. Since the declaration of a migrant crisis back in 2015, the EU has given increasing amounts of funding and training to the Libyan coastguard and to detention centres

to keep migrants on Libyan soil.

In the summer of 2017, an emboldened Libyan coastguard then made threats of violence to international non-governmental organisa-tions (NGOs) engaged in search and rescue missions at sea. Soon after, an armed militia west of Tripoli with backing from the Libyan authorities - who are themselves supported by Italian and EU authorities - stepped in to intercept boats and prevent people leaving towards Italy.

These policies to stop boats ar

riving on European shores have had significant implications for the con-ditions of migrants in Libya. Many of the people we interviewed told us that they saw boats to Europe as the only way to flee. Now, once they are pushed back to Libya, they are held in detention centres, many of which have been criticised by international observers as overcrowded, unsanitary places where migrants are exploited.

Research reports point to "abun-

dant evidence" which shows that "detention facilities in Libya are the site of sustained criminal activity, as recruitment grounds for smuggling activity but also processing centres for ransom extraction and slavery." An-

other report by the NGO Refugees International noted how often "in Libya the policeman is a smuggler, and the smuggler is a policeman". Despite this, just a few months ago Macron claimed that Libya could be an appropriate place to process asylum requests.

The containment of migrants in

Libya is therefore likely to be reinforcing the very situation that Europe's leaders appear to be so angry about now. Médecins Sans Frontières described it as "feeding the business

#### MOVING BEYOND A CRISIS

European approaches to migration across the Mediterranean have repeatedly been shaped by urgent at-tempts to address sudden crises. But the situation in Libya cannot easily be addressed by such a short-term response. People smuggling has been a thriving economic sector for years. The profits from smuggling, exploita-tion and now slavery provide important funds for different groups around the country. One report describes mi-grants as "simply another commodity to be exploited" by the various armed groups vying to control parts of Libyan territory.

An important contribution to find-ing a longer term solution could come from a newly announced "transit and departure facility" in Tripoli provid-ing opportunities for people to escape from Libya. They would be resettled elsewhere, transferred to UNHCR facilities in other countries or returned to their country of origin. But so far there are only 10,500 places available – far below the number of places required – and this is little more than the nearly 9,000 returns already carried out by the IOM in 2017.

After a decade of repeatedly declaring migrant crises and emergen-cies at their borders, it is time the EU took a broader, longer-term approach. This has to recognise the structural relationship between policies of border control, dynamics of migration and patterns of migrant vulnerability and exploitation. Intensifying border controls without addressing the reasons why people move or providing alternatives is likely to reinforce the dangers that they face

## Who are the Baha'is and why are they so persecuted?

The Baha'is are among the most persecuted religious minorities in the world.
In Iran, where the religion was founded, universities refuse to admit Baha'i students. Baha'i cemeteries have been destroyed and the country's Su-preme Leader Ayatollah Khamenei has confiscated roperties from Baha'i families. Baha'is have also een discriminated against in Yemen and in Egypt.

At the same time, the Baha'i faith has spread around the globe. There are more than 100,000 ocal Baha'i communities in places as diverse as Chile, Cambodia and the United States.

On the 200th anniversary of the birth of Ba-ha'u'llah, the founder of the Baha'i faith, the question ains: What is the reason for their persecution?

#### BAHA'U'LLAH AND THE BABI MOVEMENT

Baha'u'llah, whose name means "Glory of God" in Arabic, was born in Tehran in 1817. Baha'u'llah's father was a minister in Iran's government, which supported Shi'i Islam as the state religion. As a member of Iran's nobility, Baha'u'llah was offered government position. Instead, he joined a new religious movement, started by a young Iranian, known as the Bab.

The Babi movement called for revolutionary social changes and championed women's rights. Quite controversially, the Bab claimed that his teachings were a revelation from God and predicted that a new prophetic figure, or manifestation of God, would soon appear.

In 1850, the Bab was charged by Shi'i religious

officials with heresy and was put to death by firing squad. Subsequent public protests and mob vio-lence claimed the lives of thousands of his followers.

As part of its crackdown on the followers of the Bab, the Iranian government incarcerated Ba-ha'u'llah. He was kept in an underground prison in Tehran, which Baha'u'llah describes in his writings as filthy, dark and "foul beyond comparison."

The government released Baha'u'llah in 1853,

and exiled him to Baghdad, then part of the Ottoman Empire. It was during this exile that he public-ly announced the establishment of the Baha'i faith. Indeed Baha'u'llah claimed to be the manifestation

f God that the Bab had foretold and gained a large following.

Ottoman officials later moved Baha'u'llah to the prison city of Akka in Palestine. He remained there until his passing in 1892. Today, Baha'u'llah's shrine, now in Israel, is an important pilgrimage site. BAHA'U'LLAH'S TEACHINGS

Baha'u'llah's writings form the foundation of the Baha'i faith. Throughout his life, Bah'u'llah penned over 100 volumes in Arabic and Persian. About a dozen of these have been translated into English

and other languages.

His most well-known book is "The Hidden Words," which is composed of short poetic statements that get to the heart of his spiritual and ethical teachings.

A primary theme of Baha'u'llah's teachings is achieving world peace through the establishment of unity, justice and equality. Therefore, Baha'u'llah's teachings specifically advocate for racial unity, gender equality, universal education, and harmony of science

and religion.

Baha'is, for example, embrace interracial mar riage and education for girls. In fact, the first school for girls in Iran was established by the Baha'is.

Baha'is were nonetheless subjected to persecution, as some Muslim clerics perceived their faith to be a heresy. For most Muslims, the prophet Muhammad was the last and final prophet.

#### ESTABLISHMENT OF THE BAHA'I FAITH

Despite the persecution, the Baha'i faith has attracted millions of adherents around the globe for its ability to transcend nationalism, racism and the

Baha'u'llah's followers disseminated his teachings in the Middle East and beyond. His son and successor, Abdu'l-Baha, traveled to Europe and the United States to spread the faith.

Baha'u'llah encouraged Baha'is to cooperate with their governments and engage with the followers of all religions in a spirit of fellowship. Yet Baha'is in Iran, who are the largest non-Muslim religious community, continue to face persecution. The majority of Baha'is, however, live in the global

For many, the Baha'i faith is one of the most universal religions. Summed up in Baha'u'llah's words:

"The Earth is but one country, and mankind its

The PCI team arrived here last night on a three-day trip and would also meet Chief Secretary Sanjib Ranjan and DGP A K Shukla.

Shantanu Bhowmick was hacked to death on September 20 at Mandai in West Tripura district while covering a political event of a party, Sudip Datta Bhowmick was killed inside the battalion headquarters of Tripura State Rifles near here on November 21.

Tripura government had earlier formed two separate special investigation teams to probe the killings.

The newly formed Forum for Protection of Journalists, an umbrella organisations of ten media bodies, has demanded CBI inquiry into the killing and met Union Home Minister Rajnath Singh, President Ramnath Kovind and Union Minister of State in the Prime Minister s Office, Jitendra Singh in Delhi to press for their demand.

## Youngsters guide Sri Lanka to draw, India claim series

New Delhi, Dec 6 (PTI): Sri Lanka's unheralded youngsters, led by Dhananiava De Silva. cashed in on the ineffectiveness of Indian spinners, holding on for a draw in the third Test even as the home team collected its ninth successive series victory here today.

While the win in Nagpur ensured a 1-0 series win for India, it will certainly be a moral victory for a beleaguered Sri Lankan team, which also had to endure physical discomfort due to pollution in the national capital.

Sri Lanka were never go ing to chase 410, but did well enough to bat as many as 102 overs in the second innings, finishing at 299 for five. The captains decided to shake hands after the end of seven mandatory

En route his third Test hundred, De Silva battled severe muscle stiffness before retiring hurt on 119, but he instilled the self belief in debutant Roshen Silva (74 not out) and the maverick Niroshan Dickwella (44 not out), who displayed enormous determination while playing out the final session of the

The Roshen-Dickwella pair added invaluable 94 runs for the unbroken sixth-wicket stand as India did not get a single wicket in the final session.

Wriddhiman Saha bungled an easy stumping chance of Dickwella off Ravindra Jadeja (3/81 in 38 overs) in the final session and that, effectively, was the end of India's hopes to win the Test match.

The Test match once again



proved that Indian spinners especially Ravichandran Ashwin (1/126 in 35 overs), is not same bowler when there isn't much help in the wicket. The Kotla track didn't show any wear and tear throughout the five days, rendering Ashwin ineffective in the second innings.

He tried a lot of doosras, car-

om balls and altered the speed of his deliveries, but they were of no use. The trio of De Silva, Roshen and Dickwella used Ashwin's pace picked up runs easily. His stock delivery, which is the conventional off-break, never came into use save once when he had bowled rival captain Dinesh Chandimal

If not getting turn was Ashwin's bane, Jadeja was at his restrictive best but again the 'x-factor' in his bowling, when there is some turn and grip on the surface, was missing. He was quicker through the air, hardly flighted the ball, depending on deliveries that straightened as batsmen played for turn.

De Silva, who had a problem using his feet during the later

stages due to a muscle pull, was easily able to play him inside the crease. During the final hour of the day, a frustrated Jadeja at times was seen kicking the dust as breakthroughs were hard to come by. This is the first time in six

Tests this year that the islanders managed to stretch Virat Kohli's men to the last session of a match, deservingly earning a favourable result after all the

mauling in the past few months.

De Silva's innings was the highlight of the first two sessions as he was hardly troubled by the Indian bowlers en route his third Test hundred. Towards the end, he started hobbling due to the cramps, having played 219 balls.

His innings was studded with 15 boundaries and a six off Ashwin.

The range of his strokes was impressive as he cut and pulled with ease whenever the spin-

ners dropped anything short.
Anything pitched up was driven with disdain.

With the pitch offering lit-

tle help, Ashwin didn't look as effective although he dismissed Chandimal (36). Iadeia, who completed most

of his overs within 90 seconds, bowled quick and flat with the occasional delivery turning sharply.

Among the Indian quartet,

he looked the most effective. keeping the batsmen pegged on the backfoot.

During the first session. Jadeja endured mixed luck with a couple of no-balls. The first one accounted for Angelo Mathews (1), with the umpires missing it altogether, while the second was a brilliant delivery to clean up Chandimal but the umpires were more cautious and promptly called him for overstepping.

First-innings centurion Mathews was dismissed when he edged one off Jadeja to the slips. But the left-arm spinner was lucky as he was not called for a no-ball even as replays showed that no part of his foot was behind the popping crease. However, Jadeja was not so

lucky when he bowled a classic left-armer's delivery that had Chandimal beaten all ends up. This time umpire Ioel Wilson

checked for the no-ball and the Sri Lanka captain got a reprieve. It was a day when the Feroz

Shah Kotla was bathed in bright sunshine, cutting through the haze that had forced the visiting players to don anti-pollution masks till yesterday.

The pitch was as flat as it could have been, which made strokeplay easier, as De Silva and Chandimal added 105 runs in 33 overs for the fifth wicket.



### IPL GC clears path for Dhoni's return to CSK

New Delhi, Dec 6 (PTI): Premier Governing Indian

League Council today cleared the decks for M S Dhoni's return to Chennai Super Kings, which will make a comeback to the league in the 2018 edition after serving a two-year suspension

The IPL Governing Council, after a meet ing here, allowed CSK and Rajasthan Royals, which was also banned alleged spot-fixing and betting, to retain the players which were on their 2015 roster. Dhoni had played for the Rising Pune Supergiants (RPS) in the last two editions.

"An IPL Franchise is eligible to secure up to 5 players by virtue of a combination of Player Retention (Pre Player Auction) and Right to Match (RTM) (During Player Auction),"

I Acting Secretary BCCI Amitabh Choudhary said in a statement after the

meeting. "The

player pool for CSK and available RR for retention/RTM will be the players' who played for them respectively in IPL 2015 and who were part of RPS and Gujarat Lions squads in IPL 2017," he added.

RTM refers to a franchise's right to match the highest bidder for a player. CSK and Rajasthan

Rovals were ed owing to the 2013 spot-fixing which shook the league to its core and allegedly involved not just players but also some top officials of the two franchises.

The IPL Governing Council also hiked the salary budget of the franchises from Rs 66 crore to Rs 80 crore for the next year's auction, tentatively set for February

"The minimum spend will be 75 per cent of the salary cap for each season," the BCCI stated.

## RBI rationalises charges on debit card transactions

MUMBAI, DEC 6 (PTI): In order to promote digital payments, the Reserve Bank today came out with differentiated merchant discount rates (MDR) for debit card transactions, prescribing separate caps for small

and large traders.

MDR is the rate charged to a merchant by a bank for providing debit and credit card services. As per the latest noti-

fication, MDR charges for small merchants with an annual turnover of up to Rs 20 lakh has been fixed at 0.40 per cent with a cap of Rs 200 per transaction by debit cards through Point of Sale (PoS) machines or online transactions.

For accepting payments via QR (quick response) code based transactions, the charge will be 0.30 per cent subject to a cap of Rs 200 per

transaction.

In case the annual turnover of a merchant is over Rs 20 lakh, the MDR charges would be 0.90 per cent with a cap of Rs 1.000 per transaction. If transaction is through QR code, the charges will be 0.80 per cent with a nilar cap.

These directions will

come into effect from January 1, RBI said, adding it would be the duty of the banks to ensure the MDR levied on the merchant does not ex-

ceed the prescribed cap.

RBI said rationalisation of the charges is being undertaken with a view to achieve the twin objectives of promoting debit card acceptance by a wider set of merchants, especially small traders, and ensuring sustainability of the business for the entities involved.

Following demonetisation, the RBI had in De-cember last year capped the MDR charges at 0.25 per cent for transactions up to Rs 1,000.

For transactions above Rs 1,000 and up to Rs 2,000, it was capped at 0.5 per cent of the transaction value.

Before that, the MDR

was capped 0.75 per cent for transaction up to Rs 2,000 and not exceeding 1 per cent for payments above Rs 2,000. Commenting on RBI's

move. Ashwani Kumar. Chairman and Manag-ing Director of Dena Bank, said introduction of differentiated MDR differentiated and a cap on the absolute amount is expected to increase acceptance of debit card usage and "will also bring down the cost of transactions for small merchants"

#### Wang to visit New Delhi, hold talks with top Indian officials

BEIJING, DEC 6 (PTI): Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi will travel to New Delhi to attend the meeting of RIC Foreign Ministers on December 11 and hold talks with top Indian officials, his office announced here today

Wang's visit would the first high-level trip by a Chinese official to India after the Dokalam standoff.

73-day-long The Dokalam standoff end-ed on August 28 after Chinese troops stopped building a key road close to India's Chicken Neck corridor. India had ob-jected to the construction highlighting its security concerns. The road was being built by the Chi-nese troops in the area also claimed by Bhutan.

On sidelines of Russia. India and China (RIC) Foreign Ministers meet-ing, he will hold talks with top Indian officials, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Geng Shuang told the media here.

The 15th RIC meeting will be held in New Delhi India on December 11.

"According to our ormation, Wang will information, Wang will meet with the top of-ficials of India and detailed information will be released in due course, Geng said.

During the RIC meeting, the three foreign ministers will exchange views on major international and regional is-sues of common concern and deepen trilateral pragmatic cooperation, he said.

"We believe under the joint efforts of the three parties, this meeting will achieve expected

outcomes," he said.

Media reports previously said the RIC meeting was planned for April this year but Wang did not confirm dates in the backdrop of China's protests over the Dalai Lama visiting Arunachal Pradesh in the same month. China claims Arunachal Pradesh as part of South Tibet

## Russia voices regret at Olympic ban, awaits Putin verdict

Moscow, Dec 6 (AFP) Russia today reacted with disappointment but no great surprise after the country was banned from the Winter Olympic Games, while President Vladimir Putin was yet to comment on a possible boycott.

Russia was banned Tuesday from the 2018 Winter Games by the International Olympic Committee over its stateorchestrated doping programme, but clean Russian athletes will be allowed to compete un-der an Olympic flag.

Putin was set to make a speech in Moscow later Wednesday in which he was expected to give his view on the International Olympic Committee's decision. So far the Kremlin has not commented.

The head of Russia's Olympic Committee, Al-



exander Zhukov, told the IOC on Tuesday that punishing clean athletes was "unjust and immoral".

Russian media exressed regret at the decision while welcoming the possibility of some athletes participating, albeit under tight restrictions.

"It's very hard to take accusations and punishments. But the fate of our athletes and preserving our place in the Olympic family is more important," wrote the Sport Express daily.

"Can't get by without Russia," the pro-Kremlin Izvestia daily headlined its front page, stressing that "Russian Olympic athletes will defend the honour of the Motherland under any banner."

'Will Russia be at the Olympics but without a flag?" Sport Express newspaper headlined its front page, calling the decision "unprecedented".

It slammed the IOC decision as "very harsh humiliating for Russia," citing the life bans on attending the games for ex-sports minister Vitaly Mutko, now first deputy prime minister.

Nevertheless the IOC President Thomas Bach "left the door open for Russia" by allowing athletes to participate in some form, even with the word "Russia" on their uniforms, the newspaper

Some top sports figures agreed, with ice hockey forward Ilya Kov-alchuk telling TASS state news agency: "We must go to the Olympics. Refusing is surrender.'

Pole vault star Yelena Isinbayeva told TASS: "Addressing our athletes, I want to say that they should absolutely not despair and should continue training for the games."

Pro-Kremlin discrediting Grigory Rodchenkov. the whistleblower who gave evidence of a state- controlled doping programme in which he played a central role.

Rodchenkov has been living in hiding in the United States since lifting the lid on the intricate workings of the state-supported scheme to cheat athletes at the 2014 Winter Olympics in Sochi. "Grigory Rodchenkov

is the perfect traitor," wrote tabloid daily Komsomolskaya Pravda. It said the IOC's ac-

tions proved that "you can destroy a whole Olympic country on the basis of indirect evidence and a single witness who was under a criminal investigation and has been treated in a psychiatric hospital."



### South Korea's Moon to visit China next week

SEOUL, DEC 6 (AFP): South Korean President Moon Jae-In will visit China next week for talks on North Korea and issues, his office said today, amid tentative signs of diplomatic movement after months of high tensions over Pyongyang's nuclear and missile threats.

The announcement came as a high-level United Nations representative held talks with a senior North Korean official during a rare trip to

Pyongyang.
Jeffrey Feltman, UN
undersecretary general
for political affairs, arrived Tuesday to discuss
"issues of mutual interest and concern".

It was not imme-diately clear what was discussed between Feltman and the North's vice foreign minister Pak Myong-Kuk.

Feltman's trip -- the first by a UN diplomat of his rank since 2010 -comes less than a week after North Korea test- fired a new hallistic missile said to be capable of reaching the United States.

Discussing ways to peacefully resolve North Korea's nuclear issue' will be on Moon's agenda when he meets President Xi Jinping next week. on's office said.

China has proposed that the North suspend missile and nuclear tests in exchange for a suspension of US-South Korean military exercises, a sug-gestion Washington has repeatedly rejected.

flew over the Korean peninsula on Wednes-day, Seoul's defence ministry said, as part of a major joint air exercise slammed by the North as an "all-out provocation" that could trigger a nu-

clear war. The five-day Vigilant Ace drill -- involving some 230 aircraft including F-22 Raptor stealth jet fighters -- began Monday, five days after the North's ICBM test.

Moon will arrive in Beijing next Wednesday for a four-day state visit, his first trip to China since taking office in May. The two countries are trying to improve ties strained by Seoul's deployment of a US missile defence system.

Seoul and Washington say the Terminal High Altitude Area De-fense (THAAD) system is intended solely to count-er missile threats from North Korea but Beijing sees it as a threat to its own military capabilities.

It has imposed a series of sanctions on South Korean firms and banned Chinese tour groups from going to the country in moves seen as economic retaliation. The tour group ban has since been partially lifted.

China is South Korea's biggest trading partner the measures have had a big impact on some of the South's big-gest companies, including retail conglomerate Lotte -- which provided a golf course used for the THAAD deployment

### US House passes resolution on "ethnic cleansing" of Rohingyas

I srael braced for violence as President Trump was due to announce Wednesday a controversial decision to recognize Jerusalem as Israel's capital and move the U.S. Embassy there. The expected declaration has fueled international concern. Trump will address the issue, a campaign promise that he has vowed to keep, from the White House later. Palestinian leader Mahmoud Abbas warned that changing the status of Jerusalem would mark the end of years of peace efforts and have "dangerous consequences" for the "security and stability of the region

WASHINGTON, DEC 6 (PTI): The US House of Representatives has condemned the "ethnic cleans ing" of Rohingya Muslims and called on Myanmar's leadership to end attacks on minorities in the Rakhine state, in the stiffest congressional criticism of the government in the Buddhist-majority country.

The House passed a resolu-tion yesterday, urging immediate restoration of humanitarian access to the Rakhine state where unrest has forced over 600,000 Rohingya Muslims to flee to Bangladesh.

"This slaughter must end, and our resolution ought to send a strong message to Burmese leaders that their commitment to re storing democracy will be judged by their respect for the individual rights and freedoms of all people

living within Burma's borders, no matter their faith or ethnicity, House Democratic Whip Steny H Hoyer said in a statement.

Introduced by Congressmen Joe Crowley and Eliot Engel, the resolution condemns the "horrific actions" of the military and security forces and calls for an immediate cessation of violence.

The resolution also urges the restoration of humanitarian access to the restive Rakhine state where unrest has forced hundreds of thousands of Rohingya Muslims to flee to Bangladesh

"It also calls for Aung San Suu Kyi (Myanmar's de facto leader) to exercise moral leadership, something that's needed now more than Engel said in his remarks on the House floor yesterday.

"We reject the Army's claims that what's taking place in Bur-

ma is a so-called counterterrorism measure that's nonsense. It's a textbook ethnic cleansing, that's what it is," Engel said.

"We should also encourage other governments to stay en-gaged and continue to address the pressing needs of these refes' needs that will only grow as long as this situation remains unresolved," he said.

Clashes erupted after the August 25 deadly attacks by militants on security forces in the Rakhine State, sparking a major army crackdown on the community. According to the UN estimates, more than 600,000 members of the minority Muslim group have fled across the border into Bangladesh since then, triggered a grave humanitarian crisis in the country.
"Bangladesh deserves

deep gratitude for opening its doors to the Rohingya at a time when our government slams the door shut," Engel said.

"The governments of Burma and Bangladesh have struck a deal to begin repatriating Rohingva next month, but it's not clear that anyone is interested in returning right now," he

Congresswoman Betty Mc-Collum, who visited the refugee camps in Bangladesh last month, said that as Congressional fact-finding mission has noted their visits to refugee camps and conversations with survivors made it clear that the persecution of the Rohingya people in Myanmar is a vere humanitarian crisis that demands robust" American leadership

## BTS IS MOST TWEETED ABOUT ARTIST IN 2017

Twitter has released its year-end data for 2017's most tweeted about artists, and while regulars like Nicki Minaj and Harry Styles made the Top 10 (#2 and #3, respectively), the number one most tweeted about music act may come as a bit of a surprise.

K-pop — and especially BTS — sunk its hooks into the American market in a major way, making BTS the number one most tweeted about artist this year in the U.S. The group, which has 10.8 million follows, broke the record for the highest-charting entry into the Billboard Hot 100 for a K-pop group; "MIC Drop" debuted at number 28.

Also receiving major tweet action this year were Chance The Rapper, Niall Horan and Fifth Harmony. Although pop stars including Justin



Rieher Rihanna and Ariana Grande charted in the Twitter Top 10, they received less love than fans might have thought.

However Grande's tweet in reaction to the suicide bombing that took place outside her concert in May was the second most "liked" tweet of the

year, inspiring reactions from 2.6 million viewers. The emotional tweet read, "broken from the bottom of my heart, i am so so sorry. i don't have

BTS was recognized not only as the most tweeted-about celebrity globally, but also the most tweeted music act in the U.S overall. Their top social artist win at the 2017 Billboard Music Awards in May also resonated, with the award ceremony recognized as the second most tweeted-about televised event globally throughout the year.

Along with BTS, Seventeen and Monsta X were also two of the most tweeted-about celebrities in 2017, with the former taking the second spot on the list and the latter coming




