SINGTAM, 04 DEC: A wom an hailing from Aadarsh Gaon in South Sikkim was killed on the spot this af-ternoon after being hit by a truck along National Highway 10 at Majhitar in East Sikkim. According to witnesses, the vehicle lost control, toppled over and crushed the woman under its oil tank.

Organs of brain dead woman give new lease of life to 9 persons

COIMBATORE, DEC 4 (PTI): Nine persons got a new lease of life after the organs of a 56-year old brain dead woman, a bank employee, were harvested on them.

The woman suddenly fell unconscious at her office here on November 30 and was rushed to K G Hospital, where she was diagnosed to be suffering from high blood pressure, cardio-vascular ac-cident and intra-cerebral hemorrhage.

A team of specialists tried to revive her and her brain became dys-functional yesterday and also suffered irreversible damage, Hospital chairman Dr G Bhakthavathsalam said.

After two mandatory apnoe tests, the doctors declared her brain dead

in the evening, he said.

After getting consent of her son and daughter, the heart, liver, lungs, kid-neys, eyes, skin and bones were harvested today.

Delhi's air quality dips further

New Delhi, Dec 4 (PTI): A day after Sri Lankan crick-eters took to the field here wearing anti-pollution masks, Delhi's air turned fouler today with a sharp

rise in the level of particulates since morning.

The concentration of the most dominant pollutants, PM2.5 and PM10, reached levels as high as 276 and 455 micrograms per cubic metre by 3 pm, according to the Central Control Room for Air Quality Management of the CPCB.

Pollution is considered severe plus or emergency when these readings are above 300 and 500 respectively. The corresponding prescribed standards are 60

and 100.

The Air Quality Index (AQI), as recorded by the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB), also reflected the rise in the levels of these ultrafine air-borne particulates. The AQI was 390, on a scale of 500, around 3.30 pm. It is classified as

Shashi Kapoor: Bollywood's ultimate charmer fades into the stars

NEW DELHI, DEC 4 (PTI): With those copybook good looks and that rakish smile, he was the stuff of teen crushes that evolved into wistful nostalgia as the years rolled by.


Shashi Kapoor, 79, when he passed away in Mumbai after a prolonged illness today, will be remembered for his many com-mercial films, his commitment to quality cinema when he turned filmmaker but also as the man who embodied ageless elegance.

"He was god's good man. He he was good s good man. He was such a beautiful human being beyond anything else," director Shyam Benegal, who worked with the late actor in "Kalyug" and "Junoon", told PTI.

Shashi Kapoor was also effort-lessly charming, whether at 25 when he was dancing around trees or at 65 when age and the famous Kapoor

weight had slowed him down.

The fame was destined, the legacy of quiet dignity the result of re-taining a certain humility despite a lifetime under the harsh arclights.



He was born an unpreposs ing Balbirrai on March 18, 1938 in what was then Calcutta to Rama Devi and Prithviraj Kapoor, the son of a legendary actor who went on to complete the famed Kapoor trinity with his older brothers Raj and Shammi.

The tryst with cinema started in 1961 with Yash Chopra's "Dharmputra". The next two-and-half decades saw a dizzying line-up of films, some good, like "Kabhi

Kabhie" and "New Delhi Times", others like "Fakira" and "Ghar Ek eminently forgettable, even embarrassing.

But Shashi Kapoor was not just a star, one more in an ensemble cast in the multi-starrers that were the vogue in the 1980s or another face in a brain dead Bollywood melodrama. He straddled two worlds with his partnership with James Ivory and Ismail Merchant resulting in films like "The Householder", "Shakespearewallah" and

"Heat and Dust" early in his career. The real turnaround came in 1980 when he started his own company Film Vala, diverting some of the money he had made in Bollywood into making films with the likes of Benegal and Aparna Sen. The partnership resulted in gems like "36 Chowringhee Lane", which James So Chlowringhee Lane, which saw his wife, veteran theatre actor Jennifer Kendal, as an aging teach-er in a changing world, "Junoon", "Vijeta", "Utsav" and "Kalyug". Shashi Kapoor himself acted in

several of these films - his roles as an obsessive suitor in "Junoon" set in 1857, as the brooding husband and father in "Vijeta" and as the suave, conflicted Karan in "Kaly-ug", a modern-day adaptation of the Mahabharata, see the actor deliver some of his career's finest performances.

But Shashi Kapoor was more than just an actor, an inheritor of the Kapoor family legacy of showbiz and style or a filmmaker with

He was the star with no starry

airs, the man who stayed steadfastly loyal to his wife through more than 25 years of marriage with scarcely a hint of scandal and the ultimate hero who always had a kind word for his fans.

Which other actor, in his hey day in the 1980s, would not just smile when a bunch of giggly, starry-eyed teens barge into his hotel room, but also welcome them in, take time to talk to them individually and leave them to handle things while he went into the next room for an interview.

That he maintained a relationship with the group -- among them this correspondent -- through his three days in Delhi, inviting them to watch a shoot and taking time off to talk to them is the stuff of

true greatness. He stood apart from his peers, part of the rat race and yet not part of it.

And then, with his wife's death in 1984 it was as if the very life had begun ebbing away from him too. The weight started piling and the roles started dwindling.

Shashi Kapoor began fading av from the headlines.

He appeared in few films, as the corpulent Urdu poet Noor in Ismail Merchant's "In Custody" in 1993 and as a narrator in "Jinnah" some years after that. He also revived his father's Prithvi Theatre, a job now taken over by his daughter Sanjana.

The sons, Kunal and Karan, tried dabbling in films and then stood respectfully away when they realised it was not for them.

Ill health felled Shashi Kapoor and when he was awarded the Dadasaheb Phalke award in 2015, he was too unwell to travel to New Delhi to get it. It was 17 years after he retired into the quiet shadows. Union minister Arun Jaitley went to Mumbai to honour him.

But the old charm still lingered, the silver hair that refused to be dyed adding to that grace and somewhere still that old charisma.

Bollywood's ultimate charmer has gone, leaving a legacy of decency and elegance that may find few followers in the film industry of today.

He also called on all Gram Panchayats to impart information regarding Chief Minister



Then your interest be-comes your passion it does not take long for the person to scale greater heights in their chosen field of work.

A classic example of such person is 31-year-old Roshan Prasad who hails from Singtam in East Sikkim.

Roshan has participated in competitive class and has won silver medal in the thematic category of philately [stamp collection] at Indian National Philatelic Exhibition [INPEX] 2017 in Mumbai.

National Philatelic Exhibition, "INPEX 2017", was organized by the Philatelic Society of India with the support of Department of Post, Govern-ment of India and the patronage of the Philatelic Congress of India to commemorate its 120th foundation year at the Prestigious World Trade Cen-Mumbai from 30 Nov to 04 Dec. The event aimed at promoting every aspect of



philately in the country. Over 900 frames were allowed comprising of almost 200 participants from all over the country in the exhibition.

The topic of Roshan's col-lection was "The Story of Cricket", a 5 frame exhibit [arranged in 80 A4 size paper], compris-ing of postal stamps, first days covers, special covers, book-

Support Rural Pragmatism, Not Urban Vainglory

The new panchayats should set themselves new aims

new set of Panchavats is in place now, this time Anew set of ranchayans is in place non, conunlike the absolute walkovers that were on the verge of becoming the norm. Reasonably well-empowered panchayats have been around for a few terms now and Sikkim has seen some exceptional panchayats rise through the ranks, so that is something to take heart from. Meanwhile, also slipped in without much explanation is the appointment of panchayat secretaries from the administration's side and not from among the elected panchayats as has been the practice all this while. This rearrangement of the panchayats is unfortunately not being discussed or dissed enough even though this is another example of the executive looking down on the capabilities of elected representatives and is symptomatic of the urban disregard for the capacities of rural pragmatism.

Soon, the new panchayats, after their welcomes

are over and the holiday season eased a bit, will be put through the motions of orientation programmes and workshops. They are usually taken through the processes on which amendments to which Acts made their election possible, given the drill on the usual stuff about working for the people etc etc. These are the basics that one hopes the elected Panchayats already knew when they filed their nomination papers. One still hopes that the Panchayats learn well the basic reason on why they are more empowered today and why plans are afoot to divest even more powers to them. The reason the nation has empowered the rural voters is because all other attempts at fixing accountability have failed. When Panchayats decide, and if they decide at the gram sabhas as they should, then the whole village knows; when the whole village knows, the whole village watches and because it is about them and about facilities they and their children will use, they are also expected to monitor implementation more closely. When things fail, the hierarchy ends with the village boundaries and the buck can actually stop at the right door. Empowered villages are not so much about politics as they are about accountability. The Panchayats have to be told that although they might be co-opted into taking shortcuts and sipping from the funds pool, the people above them are too vague and unrecognizable for the villagers they live among. When things go wrong and when development is compromised, their neighbours will not see it as the system having let them down, they will see it as a personal failing of the person who promised to work for them and is empowered to do so. These feeling can run deep at the village level and even stay alive for generations. That is the possible branding that Panchayats should be made aware of. Once realization sinks in, the Panchayats will refuse to sit through mundane repetitions of panchayat field books, they will demand details on how funds are released, which officers they can direct and which offices they need to approach if things don't progress the way they were planned. When that happens, panchayati raj institutions would have become institutions that they are ideally imagined to be. And when the interactions are held, the panchayats should also seek proper explanations on why the administra-tion wrested the post of panchayat secretaries away from the elected representatives.

For real accountability to set in, the defeatism

which accepts corruption as a necessary evil has to end. The pessimism with which people greet action against corruption is unfortunate and even misplaced. After all, when the people decide otherwise, they do succeed in challenging corruption at least at the village level and Sikkim has seen some such episodes even in the recent past. There is therefore no meat in the claim that the social and economic decay is simply too overwhelming for small efforts to make a difference. These are just excuses that the urban residents hide behind to avoid coming face to face with their own culpability in feeding the monster. Unfortunately, most efforts at public propriety has been mooted from urban settings [in Sikkim as much as in India] by people who might mean well, but are too ill-informed on what rural priorities are.

Thankfully, the rural folk have more say now. With panchayati raj there is more rural empowerment at work. The urban naiveté, which demanded Acts for transparency and accountability when they should have been part and parcel of democracy, is losing out to rural pragmatism. Now for that pragmatism to start expressing itself more forcefully.

When should you unfriend someone on Facebook?

The nature and ethics of "fake news" has become of us, the issue is much more personal: What are we to do when a cranky uncle or an otherwise pleasant old friend persists in populating our news feeds with a stream of posts that can run deeply contrary to our own values?

One option is to unfriend people who share material that conflicts with our values. But a siloed environment where people self-select into echo chambers could also be worrisome. As a

researcher working on the ethics of social technologies, I start with what might seem like an unlikely source: Aristotle

Classical Greece may bear little resemblance to today's world of smartphones and social media. But Aristotle was no stranger to the struggle to build and maintain social connections in a contentious political cli-

VALUE OF FRIENDSHIP

The first issue is what should real friendships look like. Aristotle argues that a "per-fect friendship is the friendship of men who are good, and alike in virtue."

On the face of it, it would appear then that friendships are essentially about similarities, arising where like-minded people group together. This could be a problem, if you thought that a good friendship involved respecting

difference. It would also be a reason for people to unfriend those who disagreed with us politically.

But Aristotle doesn't say friends should be "alike." What he says is that best friends can be different and yet share good lives together so long as each is virtuous in his or her own way. In oth-

er words, the only similarity necessary is that they

both be virtuous.

By "virtuous," he means the features of excellent people, those character traits like courage and kindness that help individuals be good to others, their own selves and live good lives. Such traits help people flourish as rational, social animals.

APPRECIATING DIFFERENCES

Again, if you thought that these characteristics looked the same for every individual, you might worry that this still means that friends should be very similar. But that is not what he says about the nature of virtue.
A virtuous character trait, he says, consists of

having the right amount of common human disposition – not too much and not too little. Courage, for example, is the middle ground between an excess and a deficit of fear. Too much fear would keep people from defending what they valued, while too little would make them vulnerable to unnecessary

But what counts as the middle ground is rela-

tive to the individual, not an absolute.

Consider how what counts as the right amount of food is different for an accomplished athlete than a novice. Likewise for courage and other virtues. What counts as the right amount of fear depends on what needs defending, and what resources are available for defense

So courage can look very different for different people, in different contexts. In other words, each individual could have his or her own moral style This seems to leave room for appreciating friends' differences on social media. It should also give individuals reason to be cautious in exercising the



LIVING TOGETHER

For Aristotle, shared lives are key to explaining both why friendship matters to us and why good character matters to friendship. Friends, he says, "...do and share in those things which give them the sense of living together. Thus the friendship of bad men turns out an evil thing (for because of their instability they unite in bad pursuits, and besides they become evil by becoming like each other), while the friendship of good men is good, being

augmented by their companionship..."

For Aristotle, virtues are by definition those traits that help you to flourish as a rational, social nimal. Being your best self helps you to live a good

The opposite, he says, is true of vices. What he means by a vice is the wrong amount of a char-acteristic: for example, too much fear or too little concern for others. Vices can make people's lives worse overall, even if more enjoyable in the short term. The coward cannot stand up for what she values and so harms herself and not just those she ought to protect. The selfish person makes himself incapable of close friendship and deprives himself of an important human good.

Difference isn't bad, and can even enrich our lives. But having vicious people as friends make us worse off, both because we care about them and want them to live well and because of their influ-

HOW CAN WE LISE FACEBOOK WISELY AND WELL?

What I take from this is that we ought not to think that friends' differences, political or otherwise, pose a problem for friendship. But at the same time, character matters. Repeated interactions, even on social media, can shape our character over

So, in considering the question, should you dis-connect from that Facebook "friend," the short but unsatisfying answer is, "It depends."

Facebook connects people, but it imposes both physical and psychological distance. One could argue that this makes it easier both to share our thoughts (even those that many wouldn't air in person) and to disconnect from others, even when social pressures might make it harder to do so when face to

Figuring out when to exercise these different abilities could require individuals to exercise the virtues. But as I have explained, they do not give anyone a uniform guide to action. What counts as a virtue depends on the details of the circumstance.

LANDMARKS FOR NAVIGATING

Several factors look relevant. Social media makes people happier when they use it to interact rather than passively observe. Di-

verse connections and conversations can enrich people's lives. On Facebook, we have an opportunity to experience "ideologically diverse news and

Sure, sometimes unfriending an obnoxious co-worker or relative helps keep the peace... but this can be cowardly. And sometimes arguing with someone online just reinforces our own belligerence, making us worse in the long run. What we want to do is have good conversations that strengthen good connections.

But here, too, we need to remain sensitive to details of context. Some conversations are better had at a distance and others face to face.

In the end, some reasons to connect or disconnect are rooted in concerns about our own char-acter, and some revolve around others' characters. We have reason to foster a courageous and compassionate willingness to consider others' worldviews and to be mindful of our own tendency to vilify posts (and people) because we disagree with them. But we also want our friends to be good people.

What we need to remember is that the devil is in the details. I think the reason we grapple with this issue is that it resists easy or uniform answers. But using the tools Aristotle provided to reflect on where we want to end up, we can find ways to connect that make us better off, both singly and together.

Blocks are still the best present you can buy for children

With Christmas looming (and in Sikkim's case, also Losoong), many people will be considering what present to buy for their children, nieces and nephews, grandchil-dren and friends. Soon, if not already, we will be reading lists of the top trending presents for 2017. These lists will no doubt include, and may even be totally dominated by, all the latest gadgets and devices.

The purpose of these lists is to at-

tempt to persuade parents of young children if they want to give their child the best start in life, and all the advantages for doing well later at school, they need to purchase the latest technology.

Missing from these Christmas lists, but what should actually be at the very top in terms of learning, are blocks. Blocks have been part of children's play for a long time. But there's still no other toy that compares in promoting all areas of children's development. Any early childhood teacher can easily identify all the areas block play develops including fine motor, social, language and cognitive skills

BLOCKS DEVELOP SPATIAL REASONING SKILLS

As children experiment by stacking, balancing, or building with blocks, they need to share, respect other children's constructions, ask for desired blocks and describe what they are creating. Perhaps more importantly, children develop problem solving skills, creativity and imagination in creating their masterpieces. Finally, let's not forget persistence where children try



again and again to build the tallest tower or most elaborate castle

Less well known is that blocks also foster spatial reasoning. Spatial reasoning is the ability to mentally manipulate objects or to think in a way that relates to space and the po-sition, area, and size of things within it. We use spatial reasoning skills in everyday life when we read maps, pack the car for holidays, assemble flat pack furniture or cut cake into equal slices

Spatial reasoning skills are linked to mathematics skills. Children who have good spatial skills tend to have better maths skills. Many people are unaware of the research, but early mathematics skills are a better pre-dictor of later school success than either early reading or social-emotional skills. Block play helps children under-stand many mathematical concepts in number, measurement and geometry. During block play children count, measure, estimate, pattern, transform, and learn about symmetry.

Perhaps most surprising to readers will be the research that shows spatial reasoning skills are the best

predictor of whether children will end up in a Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) related career. Spatial skills are espe cially important in STEM related jobs where people are required, for example, to create or read X-ray and ultra-sound imaging, engineering and architectural designs, or cross sections of heating and plumbing system BLOCKS ALSO HELP DEVELOP

SPATIAL LANGUAGE

Block play also fosters spatial lan-guage. When children play with blocks they hear and produce more words related to spatial reasoning including things such as beneath, above, next to, behind, and so on

One study showed block play elic-ited more spatial language than any other type of play. The other types of play included playing with puppets, playing house, shops, school, zoos, chefs and throwing a ball.

Other research that looked at spa-tial language showed the more spatial words children heard, the more spatial words they produced and the better they performed on spatial tasks. In this study, researchers looked at language relating to the spatial features and properties of objects such as the dimensions of objects (such as how big small, wide, tall), the forms of shapes (for example rectangle, circle, square) and other spatial properties (like bent, pointy, curved).

DIFFERENT BLOCKS FOR

DIFFERENT AGES AND STAGES

There are a wide variety of choices for blocks for children including Mega-

Bloks for really young children, Du-plo, wooden blocks or waffle blocks for preschoolers, and Eco bricks and Lego for older children.

These age guidelines are suggestions only. My ten and fourteen year

old daughters will still play with the wooden blocks. Much of the reason blocks are such enduring toys is due to the fact they're "loose parts". That is, they can be moved, arranged, combined, taken apart, and put together in any number of ways. Frobel, the fa-ther of kindergarten, created ten gifts for children of which six were blocks.

The best way to engage children in block play is to play alongside them and show your interest and enthusi-asm in block building. My friend has a ritual of playing half an hour every afternoon with Duplo with her three young boys aged five, three and one. She says it's her favourite time of day.

So, when those lists appear in your inbox or on social media, just re-member the best toy of all is likely to

Lower courts short of 5k judges as no suitable candidates available

NEW DELHI, DEC 4 (PTI): Lower courts in the country face a shortage of nearly 5,000 judges, mainly because of the inability to find suitable candidates and pending cases challenging previous recruitments, a law ministry document says.

sanctioned strength of the subordinate judiciary, considered the backbone of Indian justice delivery system, was increased from 16,949 at the end of 2010 to 22 288 in December, 2016. But as on June 30, 2016, there was a shortfall of 4,937 judg-es in lower courts across

the country.
"Some of the reasons for delays in filling up of vacancies, as indicated by the high courts, is the inability to find suitable candidates, pending court cases challenging previ ous recruitments and difficulties in coordination between high courts and state public service commissions," the note says.

The note was circulated to members of the

parliamentary consulta-tive committee attached with the law ministry. There are only 17,576 court rooms/court halls and only 14,363 residential units available for district and subordinate courts in the country.

It says that this is against the sanctioned strength of 22,288 for judicial officers/judges of district and subordinate courts in the country.

"The focus is, there-fore, to match the number of court halls/court rooms with the number of sanctioned strength of judicial officers/judges in the district and subordi-nate courts. This will help in improving the func-tioning and performance of the judiciary in the

country," the note states.
On November 16 the government had decided to continue with a scheme sponsored by it to develop the infrastructure of the lower courts, which would help complete the construction of 3,000 courtrooms and 1,800 residential units for the judicial officers of

In 94.6 per cent cases of rape, accused known to victim: NCRB

INDORE, DEC 4 (PTI): Girls and women are more vulnerable to their own relatives and acquaintances than unknown persons on the is-sue of sex-related crimes, data from the National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB) "Crime in India 2016" report has indicated.

Highlighting rape figures, the report has stated that "in 2016, the accused of rapes in 94.6 cases are none other than the victim's relatives in-

cluding brother, father, grand-father, sons or acquaintances."

The report showed that in the year 2016, a total of 38,947 cases of rape were registered in the country under Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act (POCSO) as well as Section 376 and other related sections of the Indian Penal Code. Among these 38,947 cases,

36,859 matters, accused are related

Similarly, it said that in 630 cases, victims were allegedly raped by grand-father, father, brother and son while in 1,087 cases the accused were acquaintances.

Besides in 2,174 cases, the ac cused are relatives and in 10,520 matters, it was neighbours who were facing charges of rape, it said.

In 600 cases, employers and coworkers are accused of rape, the re-

The NCRB report also stated that in 2016, in 557 cases, the accused are live-in parthers, husband and ex-husbands

Similarly, in 10,068 cases, women were raped on the promise of mar-riage. It also states that in the remaining 11,223 cases, the victims in some

manner or the other knew the accused.

Expressing concern over these figures, National Commission of Women (NCW) chairperson, Rekha

Sharma told PTI, "In our society there is lot of restrictions imposed on girls.

But now it is enough. Time has come when boys should be taught from childhood how to behave with women as per our social values."

BHUBANESWAR, DEC 4 (PTI): Cutting through barriers and years of neglect in a country that is obsessed with football and its global icons, the Argentine men's hock-ey team is finally coming out of the shadows and charting its own path.

While the likes of Lionel Messi and Di-ego Maradona are household names, 'Los Leones', as the Argentina men's hockey team is called, lived in relative obscurity till a bronze medal at the 2014 Word Cup opened the doors for more success

Until the breakthrough in the Nether-lands, the men's hockey team was living not only under the shadow of soccer, rugby and basketball, but was also weighed down by the achievements of its more fa-

mous women counterparts.

Hockey in the South American nation, till then, was mainly liked to 'Las Leonas',

the women's hockey team. Featuring the great Luciana Aymar, the Argentine women have won medals at the last four Olympics, won two World Cups and seven Champions Trophy titles, all coming in a century that is not even two decades old.

And then, out of nowhere, the men's team won the gold medal in the 2016



Rio Olympics, its best-ever international

"The Olympic gold was important for

the survival of men's hockey in Argentina. It was a historic moment for us. We know how important it was for us," said Gonzalo Peillat, who was the top-scorer in Rio with

10 goals

'After the Olympics mentality (of Argen tines back home) has changed a little bit. Hockey has slowly started to become bigger only famous but now a days the support is equal for us. Every television channels in Argentina are now following us."

Soccer is a culture in Argentina and football players are worshipped as Gods. Expectedly, the infrastructure and popularity of hockey is not upto the mark, forcing the likes of Peillat to ply their trade in the European leagues of Netherlands and Germany

"Argentines are crazy about soccer. Competition in hockey is not good and that's why more than half of our team players have moved to Europe," said Peillat.

Australian Parl resumes gay marriage reform debate

CANBERRA, 04 DEC [AP]: Australia's Parliament today started debating a bill that could soon legalise gay marriage across the country, with one lawmaker taking the opportunity to propose to his gay partner.

The House of Repre-

sentatives resumed for its final two- week ses-sion of the year, which is giving priority to achieving same-sex marriage reform. The major parties want the legislation passed this week after a majority of Australian's endorsed reform in a postal ballot last month.

The Senate last week approved the bill and rejected all proposed amendments that would have increased legal protections for those who would discriminate against gay couples on religious grounds.

But several lawmakers including Prime Min-ister Malcolm Turnbull intend to persist with amendments rejected by



Turnbull, a gay marge supporter, say wants wedding cele riage says brants, not just those affiliated with churches, to to officiate at same-sex marriages.

If the House of Representatives supported such an amendment, then the altered bill would have to return to the Senate for ratification, delaying the reform.

Tim Wilson, a lawmaker in the conserva-tive coalition, was among the first lawmakers to join the debate and used his speech to propose to his partner Ryan Bolger, who was watching from

"In my first speech I defined our bond by the ring that sits on both of our left hands," Wilson said. "There's only one thing left to do: Ryan Patrick Bolger, will you mar-

the public gallery.

The 33-year-old primary school teacher responded: "yes", which was recorded in the official parliamentary record.

Warren Entsch, a long-term advocate of marriage equality within the conservative govern-ment, helped draft the bill and was the first to speak for it in the House on Monday.
"The bill which the

Senate passed is a robust bill, a whole range of religious protections are already in place," Entsch said in introducing the bill. "We have made sure that we have removed any element of discrim-

ination in this bill while ensuring that religious freedoms are protected."

Entsch said related

amendments to bolster freedoms of speech and education rights could be debated in a separate bill next year and should not be sued to delay the reform.

"Australians are sick of excuses and they're sick of delays," Entsch said

A nonbinding postal survey found that 62 per cent of Australian respondents want-ed reform. Almost 80 per cent of Australia's registered voters took part in the two-month survey. Most gay marriage opponents accept that the Parliament has an overwhelming mandate to make the reform.

While equality could become law this week, state marriage registries say they would not have the paperwork to proceed with weddings until January.



China evades comment on Chabahar port launch

BEIJING, 04 DEC [PTI]: China today declined to directly comment on the launch of the strategic Chabahar port in Iran but hoped that the project, which enables India to directly trade with Afghanbesides rivalling Pakistan's Gwadar port, is conducive to regional peace and stability.

The first phase of the Chabahar port on the Gulf of Oman coast was inaugurated yesterday by Iranian President Hassan Rouhani, opening a new strategic route connecting Iran, India and Afghanistan while bypassing Pakistan, and reflecting growing convergence of interests among the three countries.

The port in Iran's Sistan-Balochistan provin Iran's ince on the energy-rich nation's southern coast is easily accessible from India's western coast and is increasingly seen as a counter to Pakistan's Gwadar port, which is being developed with Chinese investment and is located around 80 kms from Chabahar.

Asked how China views the launch of the project, considering that China is investing heavily in Gwadar as part of the USD 50 billion China Pakistan Economic Corridor, foreign ministry spokesman Geng Shuang declined to comment on it directly.

"As for the [Chabahar]

port, I want to give you a principled answer. We welcome the develop-ment of friendly relations between the regional countries and conduct mutually beneficial cooperation," he said.

"We hope the rele-

vant cooperation can be conducive to maintaining regional peace and promoting regional sta-bility and prosperity," he

The Chabahar port is being considered a gateway to golden opportunities for trade by India, Iran and Afghanistan with central Asian countries besides ramping up trade among the three countries in the wake of Pakistan denying transit access to New Delhi.

Vijay Mallya arrives at UK court for extradition trial

LONDON, 04 DEC [PTI]: Liquor baron Vijay Mallya, out on a 650,000-pound bail bond following his arrest by Scotland Yard over fraud and money laun-dering charges, today arrived at Westminster Magistrates' Court for the opening day of his extradition trial.

61-year-old tycoon looked relaxed as he was greet-ed by a swarm of cameras and reporters when he entered the court to stand trial on charges of fraud and money laundering related to his erstwhile Kingfisher Airlines owing several Indian banks around Rs 9,000 crores.

"Please hear the proceedings," Mallya told reporters outside the courtroom.

However, the trial opening was delayed as the courtroom had to be evacuated due to a fire

alarm going off.
Mallya, who has been out on bail since Scotland Yard executed an extradition warrant in April this year, will be in the dock for the duration of the trial scheduled to end on 14 Dec.

A judgement in the case,

being presided over by Judge Emma Louise Arbuthnot, is un-likely until early next year.

His defence team is led by barrister Clare Montgomery, known as an expert in criminal and fraud law with the UK's Matrix Chambers.

The Crown Prosecution Service [CPS] will be arguing on behalf of the Indian government,



led by barrister Mark Summers. The CPS will need to demon-

strate a prima facie case by pro ducing evidence to show that the criminal charges against Mallya are justified and that he should be extradited to face the Indian courts.

Prison conditions in India are expected to be at the forefront during the hearing, with the Indian government providing assurances of protection of

Mallya's human rights.

The tycoon has been on self-imposed exile in the UK since he left India on 02 March,

While on strict bail conditions, which include providing a bail bond worth 650,000 pounds, surrender of his passport and a ban on possessing any travel documents, the former Rajya Sabha member has been based at his Hertfordshire estate Ladywalk in the village of Tewin, around 30 miles from London.

The CPS, acting on behalf of the Indian authorities, had presented "supplemental" charges of money laundering to previous charges of fraud against the businessman at an earlier hearing in October.

The judge had agreed to ef-

fectively re-open a fresh case so that all charges can be heard concurrently in court.

If the judge rules in favour of stradition at the end of the trial, the UK home secretary must order Mallya s extradition with-in two months. However, the case can go through a series of appeals in higher UK courts before arriving at a conclusion

Judge Arbuthnot and her colleague, Rebecca Crane, at Westminster Magistrates Court have recently rejected two other long-pending extradition requests from India, that of UKbased alleged bookie Sanjeev Kumar Chawla on 16 Oct and a British Indian couple, Jatinder and Asha Rani Angurala, on 12 Oct, relating to bank fraud.

Chawla, the key accused in the cricket match-fixing scandal involving former South African captain Hanse Cronje in 2000, was discharged on human rights grounds over severe conditions in Delhi's Tihar Jail where he was

to be held on being extradited.

The Anguralas were discharged on grounds of over 25 years having passed.


