# SKM Marches for Justice, submits sevenpoint memorandum to Governor

SAGAR CHETTRI GANGTOK, 24 MAR:

er interview session. SKM acting president and MLA, Kunga Nima Lepcha, in his address, thanked all workers and supporters from differfor their active participation in the rally. He stressed that people need to come together to provide justice to all sections of the society.

While mentioning that similar rallies will be conducted in other districts as well, Mr Lepcha stressed upon the need to further strengthen SKM's mission to provide justice to every section of the society.

BJP state president, Mr Chauhan, appreciated the initiative taken by SKM and expressed hope that the rally would spread positive message to the people in different corners of the State. He also assured to provide all possible support to SKM's mission.

The rally was attended by leaders, workers and party supporters from all over the State.

## Binay Tamang to call on Chamling next week



KALIMPONG, 24 MAR:

Chairman of the Board Of Administration of Gorkhaland Territorial Binay Administration, Tamang, in a press meet at Deolo, Kalimpong, today has said that he is scheduled to meet Sikkim Chief Minister, Pawan Chamling, on 27 Mar at Gangtok to discuss interests common to the Hills

of Darjeeling and Sikkim.

Mr Tamang told the media that he along with GTA vice chairman, Anit Thapa and other GTA members will meet the Sikkim CM to discuss mutual interests.

"The meeting will help bring peace and harmony between Darjeeling and Sikkim. It will also help us move for-ward," Mr Tamang added.

He also thanked Mr Chamling and the Sikkim Government for agreeing to meet him.

The ones who de-railed the Gorkhaland

movement by taking up arms are underground but are trying to come back into mainstream politics by joining Trina-

mool Congress, he added.

After months of violent agitation in Darjeeling last year, many West Bengal leaders had accused Sikkim and its Chief Minister of shelter-ing and financing Gorkha leaders like GJM supremo Bimal Gurung.
However, in a meeting

held on 16 Mar at Siliguri. West Bengal Chief Minister, Mamata Banerjee and Sikkim Chief Minister. Pawan Chamling, agreed 'work together for a better tomorrow'.

"Past is past," the CMs had said.

Even Mr Tamang, in his first political public meeting in January, had cautioned CM Pawan Chamling against interfering in the politics of Dar-jeeling hills. The hatchet, it appears, will now be buried by all sides.

#### FSSAI favours comprehensive legislation for organic foods

KOLKATA, MAR 24 (PTI): Food Safety and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI), the autonomous body looking after food safety and regulations in the country, today said a comprehensive legisla-tion should be in place for organic food products.

"Presently, the agriculture ministry and APEDA (Agricultural and Processed Food Products Export Development Authority) are having sepa-rate guidelines for organic foods.

We feel there should a single legislation in this regard," chairman of FS-SAI Ashish Bahuguna said.

Speaking to reporters on the sidelines of a Confederation of Indian Industry (CII) event here today, he said FSSAI has already prepared a draft regulation on organic food which has been put up in the public domain for seeking views from various stakeholders.

Bahuguna also sounded caution on boro rice cultivation due to high levels of arsenic contami-

nation in water.

Bangladesh had already reduced boro cultivation for this purpose. he said, adding that use of drought-resistant paddy variants and long stem crops were desirable.

# **Darjeeling Himalayan Railway** gets two new AC coaches

GANGTOK, 24 MAR:

Darjeeling Himalayan
Railway has successfully conceived, developed and tested two air-conditioned narrow gauge coaches for the UNESCO World Heritage railway, a press release informs.

"These air-condi-tioned coaches will make travelling in the hill railway more comfortable for travelers from the plains of New Jalpaiguri to the hill station of Dar-jeeling in all seasons," the release reads.

The commercial ser-vice of the AC coaches is expected to start from 01 Apr.

According to the re lease, the two air-conditioned coaches were de-



veloped by refurbishing two first-class coaches at a cost of about Rs 43 lakh. The air-conditioning unit in the coaches is roof-mounted and a small silent power-pack pro-vides power to the units.

Each coach has sitting capacity of 15 people and the interior of the coaches done by using teak panels, large toughened laminated safety-glass windows for passengers to enjoy

the scenic beauty and a system-cum-anmusic nouncement system for entertainment. Similarly furnished non-AC coach for use in the Joy Ride services between Dar-

also being developed.

The new AC coach-have been painted with shining metallic colours on the exterior and florescent stickers have been used for text. A hatch on the roof with a fan has also been provided for fresh air and ventilation when the air-conditioner is not put into operation. The hatch fan would be operated by battery which would be recharged by the power pack. The fuel consumption by the power pack would be around three

litres per hour.

If the new AC coaches evoke positive response, four more such coaches are proposed to be developed in 2018-19.

## Planning Should **Precede Training**

Imparted in a vacuum, skills will not translate to earnings

Training courses and awareness camps are necessary to Sikkim. This newspaper reports on one almost raining courses and awareness camps are not new every day. Given the number of such initiatives in the State, the youth here should have become multifaceted powerhouses enabled to take to any sector, at any time, at a moment's notice. And yet, one look around and the youth do not appear to be launching into any kind of enterprise with much success, save the still rare entrepreneurship ventures which impress and keep hope afloat. One reason why the empowering impact of trainings and awareness camps is unimpressive is because they are conducted without much planning.

Without getting into the course content, which itself might be in need of re-hauling, one can youch that too many of these camps are held in a vacuum. Synergv. that word that seems to drive all efforts in the globalised world seems to be lacking. Since most of these courses are either sponsored or conducted by government departments, the synergy one is speaking of has to be between the departments. Take for example the number of tailoring courses that are held all over the State throughout the year. How many local youth have formed tailoring cooperatives after getting trained? Not too many, if any at all. If a funding agency had been made a part of this training, the real possibility of grants/ loans to fund a new enterprise might have motivated at least some youth to put their skills to effective use. The expressed aim of these courses, after

all, is to make the youth job-creators not job seekers.

Another example is the adventure awareness camp which moved from one remote area to another in fits and starts and the tourist festivals which see an inauguration without much advance publicity or even a timely curtain-raiser. If it is self-employment avenues these efforts are hoping to open up, then the Tourism Department should be made a part of the camps. Sikkim Tourism can be brought in even on the last date to see for themselves the kind of skills local youth in remote areas have acquired so that in future it can promote the availability of locally trained guides in these areas. This will bring business to the local youth and also provide the Tourism department with more destinations to sell.

The examples can continue, but the lesson remains the same, planning has to accompany training so that the skills are put in perspective and real opportunities opened up.

# How women are collaborating to tell stories that break through the noise on Syria

Between the news coverage, reportage and statistics around the ongoing Syrian civil war and the battle against Islamic State the firsthand experiences of ordinary civilians on the frontlines are difficult to source and expose. Yet these are often the very stories that can often provide crucial war-time evidence, chronicle social and historic shifts, or unearth true narratives that can counter official ones. And these stories are increasingly found on our bookshelves rather than on the newsstands.

From testimonies to short stories, graphic novels to memoirs, female writers, journalists and sur-vivors are currently fronting the literatures of war, conflict and exile. The past two years have seen a surge of books and memoirs authored by women that capture the far-reaching human consequences of the Syrian civil war. Amid the fatigued reportage on its increasingly more complex escalations – and the cynical moves of other nations vested in opposing outcomes – these are compelling testaments to what befalls ordinary people as a consequence of fanaticism and powerful interests.

A remarkable example is Farida Khalaf's 2016 memoir The Girl Who Beat ISIS. Khalaf and her family are Yazidis, members of a Kurdish-speaking minority who follow an ancient, pre-Islamic faith. The book recounts how Islamic State crossed the border into their mountainside village in northern Iraq, killing the men, recruiting the boys, and taking women and girls to slave markets in Raqqa.


Through testimonies of those such as Khalaf, the genocide against the Yazidis was officially rec-ognised by the UN. Khalaf, in collaboration with German journalist Andrea C. Hoffmann, shaped their series of detailed interviews into a first-per-son narrative. Despite the indiscriminate violence visited on whole communities and towns, her memoir reminds that what women have suffered at the hands of IS, and what they continue to endure in refugee camps, is further devastating still.


HUMAN CONSEQUENCES

Kate Evans' graphic novel, Threads: From the Refugee Crisis, though different in perspective and style, tells the stories of equally vulnerable people. Volunteering in Calais in 2015-2016, Evans bore close witness to the situation of asylum seekers in the so-called "Jungle". Accustomed as we are to seeing quick news segments, these drawings are slow documentation at its best.

Its detailed visualisation of ordinary life under extraordinary circumstances enables Threads to vividly capture life in temporary shelters, the direct human consequences of European leaders' politi-cal manoeuvres and the remarkable hospitality of those who have lost everything. Unafraid of checking her privilege and keeping refugees' stories in the foreground, Evans depicts what reportage on Calais did not - indeed perhaps could not - capture.







#### VIVID TESTIMONIES

Interviews are often less depersonalising, but even they can sometimes ventriloquise already vulner-able voices. We Crossed A Bridge And It Trembled avoids this imbalance by presenting the direct testimonies of more than 300 Syrians living across the Middle East and Europe. American scholar Wendy Pearlman's book gathers four years of firsthand narratives chronicling the Syrian rebellion, civil war and displacement

The results unfold the extraordinary trajectory of the conflict in Syrians' own words. The men's accounts paint a vivid picture of life under Bashar al-Assad's authoritarian regime, the build up of revolutionary momentum, and the devastation that followed. The female voices here, however, often transport the reader directly into these experiences. One young woman describes her first anti-regime demonstration in electrifying words:

"I started to whisper, Freedom. And then I started shouting, Freedom! I thought to myself, this is the first time I have ever heard my own voice.

For some, finding the stories themselves comes with the highest of stakes. Having left Syria with her daughter in 2011 when the regime pursued her, writer and journalist Samar Yazbek secretly returned in 2012 hoping to set up a civic institution for women's empowerment. The devastated home land she found took shape into her latest book, The Crossing: My Journey to the Shattered Heart of Syria.

Yazbek's account is a hauntingly good piece of literature – less than a decade ago, under vastly different circumstances, she was among Hay Festival's top young Arab writers. Yazbek, although a longtime dissident, is an Alawite like the Assad family – so to travel in rebel-held regions and speak to jihadis, as she recounts doing, seems an almost suicidal undertaking. The Crossing is unforget-table when it thus entwines the personal and the political, as well as in its powerful lament; for girls pointian, as well as in its powerful failure. For girls snatched from childhood, and a homeland that has become unrecognisable.

All sides of the conflict in the region have en-

trenched the abuse of women. Dangerous journeys to Europe – and that often only to the limbo of refugee camps, rarely promise a way out. It recently came to light that humanitarian workers in Syria had been demanding sex from refugee women for UN food aid.

The sad fact is that this is a body of literature that can only grow as the true costs of this war for women continue to mount. But these books are a

# Does your DNA really change in space?

 $R_{\mathrm{iment}}^{\mathrm{esults}}$  from an important NASA experiment – in which astronaut Scott Kelly spent one year in space while his identical twin brother Mark stayed on Earth – have started to come in. Last week, a number of media outlets reported that Kelly's genome has changed by roughly 7% as a result of

being in space.

This seems remarkable. Research has shown that the rate of gene mutation during spaceflight could never produce a 7% change in the genome in a year. There is a 2.6% difference between the human and chimpanzee genomes, and this took 26m years to develop. Even with the eightfold increase in the rate of genetic mutations you may get in space – this has been reported for animals subjected to similar levels radiation - it would take more than eight million years to accumulate a 7% change in the genome. Importantly, this would be a whole new species.

So what actually happened to Kelly's DNA in space? Unsurprisingly, the reports claiming that 7% of it changed had mis-interpreted a press release from NASA, issued on January 31, 2018. It stated that "researchers now know that 93% of Scott's genes returned to normal after landing. However, the remaining 7% point to possible longer term changes."

NASA swiftly responded the day after

CNN ran the story (now corrected). They emphasised that the 7% difference referred to "gene expression" – how genes are turned on and off – rather than the entirety of the DNA. In other words, the astronaut's genome did not change, but which genes were actively being used did.

#### THE SCIENCE

e is like a set of instructions written in DNA. By expressing different genes, our bodies follow these instructions to make mole-cules like RNA or proteins – each of which carries out a different biological task. The change

tirely expected given that we know that human physiology alters in space. Which genes are actively being used (or expressed) control and are responsive to such physiologic alterations.

The preliminary data suggested that significant changes include alterations in genes associated with the response to oxygen and carbon dioxide levels. Changes linked with a ambient oxygen levels on the International Space Station are different than on the surface of the Earth. Changes in gene expression allow astronauts to adapt to this new environment.

Similarly, just as new students bring a va-riety of bacteria and viruses to school with them, so do new astronauts and equipment arriving at the International Space Station. do not entirely understand the molecular reasons for this, or how to combat it. Once the specific genes that are displaying altered expression are published, it may be possible to work out the causes of these gene expression changes and test the ability of current drugs to prevent them.

The increased expression of DNA repair enes, enabling us to maintain our DNA, could be a result of increased levels of radiation in space - causing DNA damage and ge-

When the study is peer reviewed and published, we can also compare it to oth-er results. The Japanese Space Exploration Agency published results demonstrating whole genome gene expression chang-es observed in a group of ten astronauts in 2016 (though not twin pairs). We can also compare them with gene expression changes in animals and gene expression changes on Earth-based analogues for

spaceflight, like bed rest.

Should these gene changes appear similar to those previously reported, then it raises the likelihood that ongoing animal studies will manage to identify drugs that counteract harmful effects of gene expression. Hopefully, these will work not just in animals, but also in astronauts.

Until the data are published, it remains unclear exactly how many changes in the genome occurred in Kelly during his year in space. But it was certainly more than in his Earth-bound twin.

The potential impact of this research clearly is huge, as NASA and other space agencies plan to venture further into space than the International Space Station soon. If astronauts are to go all the way to Mars, they will suffer even higher doses of radiation and go through an even higher numbers of changes

### **UN** report: Loss of plants, animals making a lonelier planet

New United Nations scientific reports diagnose that Earth is getting sicker, losing plants, animals and clean water at a dramatic rate.

Scientists meeting in Colombia looked at shrinking biodiversity in the Americas, Europe, Asia and Africa. They report today that nowhere is doing well. Study team chairman

Robert Watson says shrinking biodiversity means less food and clean water for people.

The reports project that by the year 2050, if current trends continue, the Americas will have 15 per cent fewer plants and animals than now.

They forecast that in Asia there will be no fish stocks for commercial fishing by 2048. Scientists say that 28 per cent of the species that live only in Europe are threatened now

The reports say Africa could lose half of some bird and mammal species by





reduced ability to make energy (our cells turn nutrients into chemical energy) and bone were also reported, as were alterations linked to an increased ability to fight infection and maintain DNA.

The suggestions appear to fit with what we would predict. It also correlates with what we have seen in the past in spaceflown animals (NASA maintains a repository of this animal gene expression data called NASA GeneLab).

It is highly likely that gene alterations asso-ciated with oxygen use and the ability to fight infection are due entirely to astronauts being Therefore we expect there to be an increased expression of genes that enable fighting infec-tion. These are known and longstanding issues with spacecraft - we can deal with them partly by keeping objects and surfaces clean to high standards.

#### DRUG DISCOVERY

The reported changes in ability to make energy and bone and maintaining our genome are more interesting and potentially concerning. Decreased ability to produce energy and bone, making us weaker, are seen both with age and spaceflight. However, we currently

# Lalu sentenced to 14 yrs in fourth fodder scam case

RANCHI, MAR 24 (PTI): RJD supremo Lalu Prasad was today sentenced to 14 years in jail and fined Rs 60 lakh by a special CBI court in connection with the fourth fodder scam case pertaining to fraudulent with-drawal of Rs 3.13 crore from Dumka treasury in the early 1990s, a CBI counsel said here.

CBI judge Shiv Pal Singh awarded two separate sentences of seven years each to Prasad under the Indian Penal Code (IPC) and the Prevention of Corruption Acts, counsel Rakesh Prasad said.

Both the sentences will have to e served consecutively, he added. Advocate Vishnu Sharma, while

explaining the court's decision, said, "Lalu Prasad has been sentenced to seven years in prison under IPC sections 420 (cheating), 409 (criminal breach of trust by public servant), 467 (forgery of valuable security), 468 (forgery for purpose of cheating), 471 (using as genuine a forged), 477 (fraudulent cancella-



tion, destruction of will or valuable security) and 120B (punishment of criminal conspiracy), and penalised Rs 30 lakh

"He was awarded another sev en-year jail term and slapped with a of Rs 30 lakh under the Prevention of Corruption Act...Both the sentences will run consecutively."

For default or non-payment of fine, the convict would have to spend

ne more year in prison for each of the two sets of sections, Sharma said

The court also pronounced the quantum of sentence for 18 other convicts in the case.

Former regional director of Animal Husbandry department O P Diwarkar received the same punishment as Prasad.

Nine other Animal Husbandry department officials and former IAS

officer Phoolchand Singh were sentenced to seven years in prison and fined Rs 30 lakh each for their involvement in the case.

Sharma said failure to pay the fine would entail an additional 18-month prison term for each of them.

Seven fodder suppliers were giv-en three-and-a-half years of prison terms and Rs 15 lakh penalty each.

Prabhat Kumar, Lalu Prasad's counsel, told reporters he would appeal in a higher court against the

The court had on March 19 held the 69-year-old RJD chief guilty along with 18 others in connection with the Dumka treasury case.

# Punishments are Marijne's way to improve discipline ahead of CWG

SAUMOJYOTI S CHOUDHURY NEW DELHI, MAR 24 (PTI): Sjoerd Marijne is handing out punishments to erring players training for the Com-monwealth Games, the Indian men's hockey team chief coach trying out the unique experi-ment to inculcate in his wards discipline, which he says is key to achieving success.

The Dutchman, who re-

placed the legendary Roelant Oltmans at the helm, is taking his players to task whenever they are found to be lacking in discipline.

The punishments range

from doing push-ups to crawling from one side of the goal to the other and, according to the coach, the players have readily accepted his method.
"I am really happy with our

preparation. 2018 is a big year for us and the Commonwealth Games is the first big major tournament and we want to do well in it," Marijne told PTI in an exclusive interview.

"But to do well in big tourents and against top sides like Australia, we need to be

disciplined. We have been working hard on discipline area and the boys have also realised discipline can make the difference.

"The players who are found to be less disciplined and less energetic on the pitch are given punishments like push-ups and crawling from one side to the other. Of course,the punishments are not from a negative point of view," he said.

Marijne said such tasks would make a player realise that hockey is a team game and one individual mistake can ruin its chances.

"If a player is not doing his task properly and with dedication, it can effect the whole team. So, here comes discipline," he said.

With the Asian Games, Champions Trophy and the

year-ending World Cup at home, India have a busy calendar year lined-up and the coach said the Commonwealth Games would set the tone for the important tournaments ahead.

"It is a challenging and exciting year for us. The Asian Games is very important for us as we can qualify for the Olympics from there. Then you have the Champions Tro-

phy and later in the year you have the World Cup at home,"

"But it doesn't mean we will give our 80 per cent in the Commonwealth Games. We try to give our 100 per cent in every tournament and the Gold Coast event is very important for us. It's about taking small steps which will eventually lead to bigger goals."

World champions Australia have been a thorn in the flesh for India in the last two Commonwealth Games having outplayed them in the finals in 2010 and 2014 editions, but Marijne said there is no reason why his side can't get the better of the Kookaburras in Gold Coast.

"Goals are always difficult to set but being the second highest ranked team we will definitely go for the highest position," he said.

"I can't say anything about past but we have closer and closer to Australia so why can't we win (against Austra-lia). It's all about belief.

But for me the most im-

portant match right now is our

first game against Pakistan." Consistency is something which has been hurting Indian hockey for long, and Mar-ijne said: "Consistency is also about discipline. If you are disciplined on the pitch, consistency will come automatically."

India left out their most experienced player and former captain Sardar Singh from the CWG squad and the coach said he has selected the best possible team for the Games.

Mariine further said that irrespective of their perfor-mances, the CWG-bound players will continue to be part of the 24 crore probables group, which will be revised after the Games, in a way hinting that it would be tough for Sardar to make a comeback.

"We saw 50 players in five months and played them in two tournaments each and this group has convinced us the most. The 24 players core group will be reworked after the CWG but these 18 players

# French hero officer who swapped himself for hostage, dies

TREBES, MAR 24 (AP): A French police officer who offered himself up to an extremist gunman in exchange for a hostage has died of his injuries, the interior minister said today.

Col Arnaud Beltrame was among the first officers to respond to the attack on the supermarket in the south of France in the south of France yesterday. His death, announced by French Interior Minister Gerard Collomb, raises the toll to four. The gunman was also killed, and 15 people were injured in the attack

The gunman first hi jacked a car and opened fire on police, then took hostages inside a supermarket. Baltrame volunteered to take the place of a female hostage and surreptitiously left on his cellphone so police outside could hear what was happening inside the store.
Officials said the deci-

sion was made to storm the building when they heard shots fired.



President French Emmanuel Macron said investigators will focus on establishing how the gunman, identified by prosecutors as Moroccan-born Redouane Lakdim, got his weapon and how he became radicalized.

Yesterday night, authorities searched a vehi-cle and a building in central Carcassonne.

Lakdim was known to police for petty crime and drug dealing. But he was also under sur-veillance and since 2014 was on the so-called "Fiche S" list, a government register of individuals suspected of being radicalised but who have yet to perform acts of terrorism.

Despite this, Paris prosecutor Francois Mo-

lins said there was "no warning sign" that Lakdim would carry out an

Lakdim was taken into custody over alleged links with a terrorist enterprise. Molins said. He did not identify her.

The four-hour drama began at 10:13 a.m (local time) when Lakdim hijacked a car near

Carcassonne, killing one person in the car and wounding the other, the prosecutor said.

Lakdim then fired six shots at police offi-cers who were on their way back from jogging near Carcassonne, said Yves Lefebvre, secretary general of SGP Police-FO police union. The police were wearing athletic clothes with police insig-nia. One officer was hit in the shoulder, but the injury was not serious, Lefebvre said.

Lakdim then went to a Super U supermarket in nearby Trebes, 100 kilometres southeast of Toulouse, shooting and killing two people in the market and taking an unknown number of hostages. Special police units converged on the scene while authorities blocked roads and urged residents to stay away

He shouted "Allahu akbar! (God is great)" and said he was a "soldier of the Islamic State' as he entered the Super

U, where about 50 people were inside, Molins said.
"We heard an explo-

sion well, several explosions," shopper Christian Guibbert told reporters. "I went to see what was happening and I saw a man lying on the floor and another person, very agitated, who had a gun in one hand and a knife in the other."

## Hardline Buddhist aroup accused in anti-Muslim riots in Lanka to float political party

COLOMBO, MAR 24 (PTI): A hardline Sinhala-Buddhist group in Sri Lanka, which was allegedly involved in attacks on Muslims during the recent communal riots in the country, has decided to float a political party. Mahason

Balakaya or the Devil Mahasona's Force, which had allegedly published videos of hate speech against Muslims, said it has forwarded papers to the authorities for the party's registration.

"Sinhalese have got no political party while every race has one. We have decided to form a new political party with Mahason Balakaya and several other Sinhala organisations," a spokes-man for the group said in the north central town of

Anuradhapura.

Mahason Balakaya was accused in arson attacks on Muslims, their religious sites and properties during the communal violence between ma-jority Sinhala Buddhists and minority Muslims in the island's central hills Kandy and Ampara districts.

The communal violence was triggered by the death of a Sinhales man at the hands of a mob.

The government had imposed a state of emergency and blocked Facebook, WhatsApp and oth-er social media sites following the riots in which three people were killed and hundreds of Muslim-owned properties, including mosques, were damaged.

Nearly 300 people, including a senior leader of Mahason Balakaya, were arrested during the riots.

Violence has risen in Buddhist-majority country since 2012, with some hardline Buddhist groups accusing Muslims of forcing people to convert to Islam and vandalising Buddhist archaeological sites.

## Tough talk on global trade escalates as Trump claims results

BEIJING, MAR 24 (AFP): The US and China's top economic officials agreed

by phone today to "continue to communicate" on trade issues, Chinese state media said, as President Donald Trump pledged his escalating trade showdown would get results despite pushback from Europe and Beijing.

In his latest jolt to the prevailing global or-der, Trump on Thursday authorised tariffs on as much as USD 60 billion of Chinese imports, targeting sectors in which Washing ton says China has stolen American technology.

Liu He, the Chinese vice premier in charge of the economy, told US Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin today that Beijing was "ready to defend its national interests" but hoped that "both sides will remain rational and work together," ac-cording to China's official

Xinhua news agency. He also accused a US probe into Chinese intellectual property practices of violating international trade rules.

China had warned the United States yesterday that it was "not afraid of a trade war" as it threatened tariffs on USD 3 bil-lion worth of US goods in retaliation. And French President Emmanuel Ma cron said Europe would respond "without weak-ness" to Washington's threats of tariffs on steel and aluminium.

"Nothing should be addressed when it is with a gun to your head," he said at the end of an EU summit in Brussels.

Global stocks have plummeted as fears rise that the confrontation could provoke a damaging trade war. Meanwhile, World Trade Organization Director-Gen-eral Roberto Azevedo called for cooler heads to prevail, saying in a state-ment that new trade barriers would "jeopardise the global economy". But speaking to re-

porters yesterday as he signed new budget leg-islation, Trump said his efforts were beginning to

bear fruit.

Washington this week said it would temporarily exempt Europe as well as countries including Brazil, Argentina, South Korea and Australia from the steep new steel and aluminium tariffs that Trump unveiled this

## N Korea agrees to inter-Korean talks next week: Seoul

SEOUL, MAR 24 (AFP): North Korea today agreed to hold high-level talks with Seoul next week to discuss logistics for a rare inter-Korean summit, the South's Unification Ministry said, as a diplomatic thaw on the peninsula gathers pace.

The two sides will each send

a three-member delegation to the border truce village of Panmunjom on Thursday for talks aimed at paving the way for a summit due in late April, it said.

South Korea on Wednesday had proposed holding high-level talks with the North to discuss details including the summit's dates and agenda.

The talks will take place at

the Unification Pavilion building on the northern side of Panmunjom, which sits on the border, with Seoul's delegation led by Unification Minister Cho Myoung-gyon and his coun-terpart Ri Son Gwon heading

Moon Jae-in and North Korean leader Kim Jong Un to meet came amid a rapid rapproche-ment kicked off with the recent Winter Olympics in the South.
The United States and South

Korea announced Tuesday that their annual joint military drills would go ahead next month, but the main exercise will be shortened by a month. The exercises have caused tensions for years, with Pyongyang condemning them as preparations for an invasion of the North.

The inter-Korean summit is due to be followed by a face-to-face meeting between US President Donald Trump and Kim by the end of May.

Following a period of heightened tensions stoked by the North's nuclear and missile tests last year, a rapid rapprochement has been underway on the Kore-

an peninsula.

The North on Wednesday broke its silence on the diplomatic thaw with Washington and Seoul, with its official KCNA news agency saying Pyongyang was driving the peace initiative and rejecting suggestions that sanctions forced it to dialogue table.

As diplomats scurry to arrange the North-South talks as well as th proposed Trump-Kim meeting, the North's silence has raised concerns

North Korean state media have not yet directly mentioned

Analysts say the North is carefully watching to see how events
-- including the US-South Korea military drills -- play out before making them public to its people.
State media in the North have

not reported any public activities by Kim since March 6, when they said he held talks with South Korean envoys and made a "satisfac

tory agreement" on the proposed

inter-Korean summit.
Yesterday, Rodong Sinmun, the official daily of the North's ruling Workers Party, attacked the US for continued sanctions and pressure on Pyongyang despite diplomatic progress

'The good atmosphere appearing on the Korean peninsula has been created by our aggressive efforts and initiatives. has not been brought about by sanctions by the US and its syco-phants," the newspaper said

"The United States has miscalculated. The stronger the US pressure, the stronger the DPRK (North Korea)... If the US fails to draw a lesson and continues acting recklessly, it would surely be in for a greater humiliation and defeat."

The commentary came President Trump named John Bolton, a foreign policy hawk, as his new national security adviser.
