Day 2 of bank strike, cashless transactions bring relief for tourists

The nationwide bank strike contin-The nationwide pairs of the less to affect locals and tourists in the Himalayan State of Sikkim.

The situation on the last day of the

strike witnessed closed ATMs across the capital with no transactions whatsoever.
"We knew about the strike before

our arrival hence we did carry cash. If the strike is not lifted tomorrow, we may just be in trouble," says a tourist

Another tourist from Durgapur, West Bengal, Mrinimoy Banerjee, stated that she has been mostly using her card in places where cards are accepted and has been avoiding using hard cash

Small eateries along the capital which are often frequented by many middle income tourists however have no such facilities

When enquired some stated poor network often made it difficult for them to use it for business. However, many cafes, restaurants, hotels and shops in the capital have swiping machines which has provided the people particularly the tourists some relief.

"There is absolutely no problem with online transactions and I am quite satisfied with the online money transfer in Gangtok," stated another tourist from Chandigarh, Ranjit Singh Sodhi.

Locals seem to be more affected by this ban with many complaining of not being able to pay school fees and other monthly loans particularly related to vehicles and flats.

"What can we do other than to wait for this strike to end? I absolutely am cashless right now, I need to pay for my flat," said a private corporate employee working with an insurance firm in the capital.

GANGTOK, 31 MAY: I imboo Tamang Vol-Luntary Committee [LTVC] has said that the Sikkim Democratic Front led State Government "is not sincere towards the Limboo-Tamang seat reservation issue".

In a press release is-sued today, LTVC has said that the recent meeting of SDF legislators on 29 May passed 13 proposals but left out the 16-yearold pending demand of the LT communities.

The committee mentions that although the issue has been pending for 16 years, the State Government has not only 'failed' to reserve the LT seats but also failed to

protect the tribal lands.

LTVC has asserted that all tribal lands in the

State should be protected.
The committee has further asked the Limboo and Tamang MLAs in the State Assembly to press the demand in the house.

The release further informs that LTVC has presented a memoran-dum to the Governor for the protection of Limboo and Tamang lands.

A similar memoran-dum will be submitted to the Chief Minister, reads the release.

BJP and its allies failed to retain Noorpur in UP and Shahkot in Puniab. while Congress, CPI (M), Jharkhand Mukti Morcha and Trinamool retained

their respective seats.

The BJP retained
Tharali in Uttarakhand, but lost Noorpur in UP to the SP. Naeemul Hasan of SP trounced BJP's Avni

Singh in Noorpur.
In Bihar, RJD won Jokihat by defeating BJP ally JD(U) by a huge margin. The result is being seen as a big jolt to Chief Min-ister Nitish Kumar who dumped the RJD and Congress last year to join hands with the BJP to form a new coalition gov-

ernment in the state.

A buoyed Tejashwi
Yadav of RJD said Kumar should immediate resign if he has some conscience left.

Commenting on the results, senior BJP leader and Union Home Minister Rajnath Singh said one has to take two steps backward before a big leap and the BJP is "going to take a massive leap."

BJP's Subramanian Swamy, however, had a word of caution for the party and said the "this huge setback in by polls is due to Hubris".

"But the trend is easily reversible if party stops rewarding sycophancy and has more participatory decision making ethos amongst those leaders whom the public find credible. BJP has infrastructure to bounce back but needs a

new ethos," he said.

AAP leader and Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal said the results reflect the anger against

the Modi government.

The UP results came as the biggest upset for the BIP with the joint onposition candidate, RLD's Tabassum Hasan, wining in Kairana. The seat had fallen vacant after death of the BJP candidate

Mriganka Singh's father, Hukum Singh. Former Chief Minis-ter Akhilesh Yadav called the results "a defeat of di-visive politics".

CPI (M) leader Sitaram Yechuri said BJP's loss at its "laboratory of communal and hate politics", Kairana, clearly showed that people did not accept the ruling party's governance that is "destroying" the unity and integrity of India. He, however, feared that the loss would push the RSS-BJP to spread communal tensions to consolidate the "Hindutva votebank" ahead of the 2019 general elections.

In Puniab. Congress Hardev Singh Ladi wrest-ed Shahkot from the Shiromani Akali Dal. Chief Minister Amarinder Singh hailed the victory as a "vindication" of the government's peo-ple-centric policies.

Trinamool's Dulal Das won Maheshtala bypoll in West Bengal, defeating BJP's Sujit Kumar Ghosh. The Left came third.

In Kerala, Left's Saii Cheriyan won Chengannur bypoll. The Congress came second and the BJP third.


JMM retained Silli and Gomia seats in Jharkhand. In Gomia, JMM's Babita Devi defeated AJSU nom-inee Lambodar Mahto, while BJP came third. In Silli, JMM's Seema Mahto defeated AJSU chief Sudesh Mahto.

Some years, in fact, more than some years ago, a workshop/ seminar ambitiously titled, "Job Profile, Life Management, Skills Orientation Program for Educated Youth of Sikkim" travelled across the State for a week. It was an ambitious initiative given the number of commas dividing the many tasks it aimed to address apart from being a workshop and a seminar bundled into one. The basic idea was obviously to support the skill and capacity development initiative underway at the time and being earnestly enough pursued to still make the news occasionally. The idea was well placed though in that it was help the youth still in school zero in on their future prospects well in time. That special focus, however, did deliver better than the tokenism which has traditionally plagued departmental, especially HRDD, undertakings and that was unfortunate because agriculture, despite what the Organic enforcement might want us to believe, is no longer the highest employer in the State.

As per the latest set of Census 2011, cultivators and agricultural labourers [as of 2011] make up 46.5% of the total workers in Sikkim. That is a substantial number, but a decade earlier, this segment made up a majority of the workers at 56.4% in 2001. Perhaps for the first time in Sikkim's history, "other workers" now make a majority of the workforce at 51.8%, having grown from their proportion of 42% in 2001. Agriculture is not receiving any new hands, so in the seven years that have passed since the last head-count, the number of other workers could have grown substantially more. The definition of "other workers" as per the Census operation is very loose, it is anyone who is not a cultivator or an agricultural labourer or a household industry worker. Simply put, the aspiration to become farmers has dulled substantially in Sikkim, and even as this trend needs to be addressed more seriously, one needs to also address the counseling needs of an increasing number of young who aspire to join the "other workers" club in Sikkim. In that sense, the skill development effort mounted through the Livelihood Schools was a move well ahead of its time and one which should be refined and made more effective to meet the aspirations of Sikkim's young; job profiling and skills orientation should hence deliver more

Even as this happens, Sikkim needs to also address the falling proportion of farmers. It needs to recognize that enterprise is not developed to a level high enough to become a majority employer and agriculture de-serves to be reinforced to provide the foundation for its economic plans. This is also important because projections for agriculture are ambitious in Sikkim with an intense Organic Mission underway here.

The setting is also perfect. Nature endows Sikkim as the land of bountiful, agriculture is a traditional occupation and organic farming is a well advised value addition for the farms here. What is however still a worrying reality is the lethargy that continues to define the Horticulture and Agriculture Departments and the inexcusable disinterest with which they engage with the farmers. And no, And no, enforcing the ban on non-organic produce does not count as engagement because engagement would require supporting organic farming (and there is a difference) which they have clearly not done a great job of.

Given the expansive presence of government in all

sectors then, it is hardly surprising that agriculture, like any other private sector activity here, is yet to shine. Granted there have been flashes of excellence but these are either individual achievements or targeted project interventions. The universal pursuit to grow more and grow relevant is not palpable yet. Not enough young are obviously taking to revamped traditional occupations and economies. The support mechanism has been instituted in most cases, but most are blowing bubbles because government officials continue to talk down to the stakeholders instead of deliberating with them to refine the State's policy.

That said, the problem is also not only in the support that the State provides its farmers or entrepreneurs: it is also in the attitude of the farmers and the entrepreneurs themselves. They are, let's accept it, simply not driven enough to realize that the market is thirsting for some local enterprise, but entrepreneurs refuse to display the motivation or the hunger to succeed. The State, if anything, is guilty of making the people lethargic. Locals, anywhere in the world, are rarely well disposed towards hard work. In Sikkim, the spoon-feeding by the State machinery makes hard work an ever rarer commodity. The spoon however has rubbed thin and the sooner people realize this, the faster will Sikkim boom sustainably.

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How parenthood continues to cost women more than men

New Zealand's Prime Min-ister, Jacinda Ardern, is about to become a first-time parent next month, and her partner, Clarke Gayford, will set an example by becoming a stay-at-home dad.

But Jacinda and Clarke's plan is still the exception rather than the rule. Mothers tend to take more time than fathers away from their careers when they have children, and they pay a significant price.

Our research, published today, shows how parenthood contributes to the gender pay gap. It penalises all women, particularly those who are on high incomes, and sets them

on a trajectory of lower lifetime earnings relative to their male peers.

GENDERED RESPONSE TO PARENTHOOD

In New Zealand, the gender pay gap has fallen over the past 20 years and it is now below 10%. Earlier research shows that a high proportion of the gender pay gap can't be explained by differences in observable information, such as age, education, occu-pation and industry, and nor is it due to differences in productivity.

New Zealand is similar to the rest of the world in that the gender pay gap is larger among parents than people without children, although the reasons for this are not entirely clear. Our research uses newly combined data to describe what happens to men's and women's employment and wages after they become parents.

It shows a strongly gendered labour response to parenthood: women dramatically decrease their employment and work fewer hours if they are employed, whereas men's employment and hours worked barely change. Mothers, particularly those with high incomes before parenthood, experience lower monthly incomes and hourly wages than before they had children.

These reductions are larger the longer they

are away from paid work, and persist for at least ten years. Furthermore, high-income women who return to paid employment soon after becoming parents experience dramatically and persistently slower rates of income growth compared to before They are therefore likely to have much lower lifetime earnings than similarly high-income men who

Changes in employment and earnings for women after giving birth are likely to be related to social norms as well as the ability to breastfeed. We need to ask why so few men become the primary caregiver of their children?

EMPLOYMENT GAPS

Our work shows that few men stop paid employment after having a child, but only three out of five first-time mothers do any paid work before their Women with higher incomes and those with higher qualifications before parenthood return more quickly to work after childbearing and maintain higher employment rates. Only 45% of mothers with no qualifications are employed ten years after their first baby, compared with over 60% of those with a school or higher qualification and nearly 70% of those with a bachelor's degree.

Women who became mothers when aged 25 to 34 have higher employment rates after having children than older women. The employment rate of those who became mothers when aged under 25 is lowest (only 34% in their child's second year). Be-fore becoming mothers, Māori and Pacific women are far more likely not to be employed than Pākehā (New Zealander of European descent) women, but this gap narrows in percentage point terms after they become mothers. Päkehä mothers have a 59% employment rate in their child's tenth year compared with 41% for Pacific mothers and 45% for

MONTHLY WAGE EARNINGS

Monthly wage earnings are driven by a combina-tion of hourly wages and monthly hours worked. They are important for a parent's ability to support his or her family and for lifetime earnings. Across every pre-parenthood income quartile, employed women experience decreases in monthly earnings when they have children, while men do not. The de creases are larger for women who return to work

Time out of employment matters more for high-income women, but even those who return to work quickly experience much slower income growth after becoming parents. Prior to parenthood, these women were on a trajectory to be very high earners, and the dampening of their income growth helps explain why relatively few women appear in the highest income brackets. Their fast return to employment does, however, increase their earnings lead over their slower-returning

In contrast, low-income women who are employed experience small monthly income decreases with parenthood and similar income growth

rates before and after having children. However, this isn't necessarily a positive sign, as it could merely indicate that they were underemployed be-fore motherhood.

In terms of ethnic differences, monthly income for Māori, Pacific Peoples and Asian mothers in paid em-ployment is slightly higher in the second year after their child's birth than in the second year before it. Over the same period, employed Pākehā mothers experience the largest decrease in monthly

WORK HOURS AND WAGES

Employed mothers work a median of 27 hours, down from a pre-parenthood median of 40 hours. The longer

a woman spends out of work the fewer hours she works on average upon her return. Women who re-turn to work in the first six months work a median of 30 hours, those who returned in months 7 to 12 work a median of 27 hours, and those who return after month 12 work a median of 22 hours. Men work a median of 41 hours both before and after

It isn't just a decrease in hours that contributes to the wage gap. Across our sample (which is not representative of the population and so differs from the official gender wage gap), women earn 6.8% lower hourly wages than men of the same age and education. The wage difference is 5.7% between men and women without children, but 12.5% between men and women who are parents.

When men become parents, their hourly wages aren't significantly affected. Women, on the other hand, pay a price. Their hourly wages decrease by 4.4% compared with the wages they could have expected without children. This wage penalty for motherhood varies substantially with how long the woman stays at home. The longer they stay at home, the bigger the drop in their hourly wages. Only some of this drop in pay can be explained by mothers moving to lower-paying industries and occupations.

Our research shows that parenthood exacerbates pre-parenthood gender wage gaps, with time out of work and reduced hours both playing major roles. We believe that we won't see equality in the labour market until it is just as common for a dad to stay home with the kids as it is for a mum. While many mothers may want to take time away from work to raise their children, this should be a personal (or family) choice and not the result of tradi-

But where did these viruses first come from?

Unlike bacteria, viruses aren't living organisms — they can't re-produce on their own. Instead, they hijack cells to multiply, spread and

But what if it wasn't always this

Scientists studying a so-called gi-ant virus called a Tupanvirus (named for the South American Guarani God of Thunder) found that it, unlike the viruses we encounter today, had an almost complete machinery to take care of itself.

This recent discovery has refuelled the debate over the origin of

FROZEN VIRUSES

There is no physical fossil record of viruses like there is for the dinosaurs. One way scientists detect viruses,

and study their origins, is to look for their genetic material — molecules of DNA or RNA — in animal tissues and

Even though the movies might have you believe otherwise, viral tected in fossilized plant leaves or in

insects trapped in amber.

However, some ancient viruses have been detected in permafrost in Siberia, and there are hopes of discovering more as global warming continues to thaw ground that has been frozen for thousands of years. Until then, we remain limited in our ability to precisely reconstruct the origin of viruses.
VIRUS EVOLUTION

Viruses are microscopic organisms that require a living cell, often called a host, to multiply. They largely consist of genetic material (either DNA or RNA) wrapped in a protein coat.

may change over time, accumulating modifications to the genetic code that favour the survival of the virus. Scientists can look at these genetic sequences to estimate how different viruses are related and how they may have evolved.

These studies have shown us that viruses do not have a single origin; that is, they did not all arise from one single virus that changed and evolved into all the viruses we know today. Viruses probably have a number of independent origins, almost certainly at different times.

One assumption scientists make when considering the origin of viits host. For example, the herpes virus that infects humans evolves over time, adapting so that it will continue to retain the ability to infect human

If we consider that all life forms on Earth began in the ocean, then it's reasonable to believe that viruses evolved with their hosts in the seas. As these creatures moved onto land and evolved, viruses also evolved and gained the ability to infect terrestrial

Earlier this year, scientists dis-covered evidence that some viruses may be millions of years old and have been in existence since the first ver-tebrates existed. But this doesn't explain the origin of viruses per se.

ORIGIN STORIES

One theory hypothesizes that viruses arose from circular DNA (also called a plasmid) that can replicate inde-pendently and move between cells, transferring genetic information from one organism to another. For example, some plasmids carry the genes responsible for antibiotic drug resistance. According to this theory, the plasmid escaped from cells and evolved in a way that allowed it to enter another cell to produce viruses.

Another theory suggests that vi-ruses could have evolved from more complex free-living organisms, such

"IWF reports that the sample of Ms. Sanjita Chanu Khumukcham (IND) has returned an Adverse Analytical Finding for Testosterone (S1.1 Anabolic Agents). As a consequence, the Athlete is provisionally suspended in view of a potential

anti-doping rule viola-tion," IWF stated.

"In any case where it is determined that the Athlete did not commit an anti-doping rule violation, the relevant decision will also be published," the IWF added.

The IWF did not give details, such as the dates, of the dope test sample collection, saying "it will not make any further comments on the case until it is closed".

Sanjita had taken part in the 53kg class in the World Championship in Anaheim (US) in November last year, finishing 13th with a total lift of

177kg. She lifted a total of 192kg top win the gold in 53kg in Gold Coast. She had also won a gold in the 48kg category in the 2014 CWG in Glasgow.

I want to write a good detective novel: Ruskin Bond

New Delhi, May 31 (PTI): Ever since he came out with his first book at the age of 17, Ruskin Bond has uncountable works to his name, be it short stories, novels, poems and essays and the octogenarian author now wishes to try his hand at something he hasn't done till now - a de-

Bond says he read a lot of Agatha Christie and detective stories of other writers since the age of 10.

"Occasionally I have written about stories related to crime but I have never at-tempted a traditional detective story. So I want to write a true detective story," he

told PTI in an interview.

Bond has written a number of novellas, essays, poems and children's books. He has also written over 500 short stories and articles that have appeared in magazines and anthologies.

On his 84th birthday on May 19, he came out with his latest book "Ranji and



the Music Maker". Published by Penguin Random House imprint Puffin India, the book is about young Ranji who once in the middle of his languid holiday, stumbles upon assorted musical instruments in the storeroom - first a shrill flute, then a

blaring little trumpet and, finally, a too-big drum that may have once sounded a battle

Ranji stages impromptu concerts down the road, not sparing his neighbours, the cats around his porch, or the peace-loving inhabitants of the zoo.

"The book was set off, inspired you might say, by the photograph of a small boy playing his flute for a kitten sent to me by a reader in Sri Lanka. I imagined the lit-tle boy as Ranji," says Bond.

On his writing journey, Bond says, "When I ventured into writing at the age of 17, I wanted to be a good and successful writer. I just wanted to write good stuff -

poems, prose, stories, essays, everything."
Reading is also very important for
Bond. "My first book was a big one of
nursery rhymes." As a boy he wanted to
emulate his favourite authors and be one of them himself.

On children's books of today, he says he is happy that more and more publishers

are now coming out with books for kids.
"Now you have books for different ages. There are good illustrators too," he

On graphic novels, he says he doesn't get absorbed into them. "I liked the old

comic books, especially the funny ones

like Popeye and Beetle Bailey."

Bond also says he is a good typist but he stopped using the typewriter 10 years ago as he had some stiffness in his hand. "My publishers now have the task to

type my manuscripts and send me the printouts. I still prefer a pen, a decent and simple ball point pen," he says.

Bond was born in Kasauli, Himachal Pradesh, and grew up in Jamnagar, Dehradun, New Delhi and Shimla. As a young man, he spent four years in the Channel Islands and London. He returned to India in 1955. He now lives in Landour, Mussoorie, with his adopted family.

At the age of eight, Bond escaped his jail-like boarding school in the hills and vent on to live with his father in Delhi. His time in the capital is filled with books visits to the cinema, music, and walks and conversations with his father a dream life for a curious and wildly imaginative boy, which turns tragic all too soon.

Lankan President Maithripala Sirisena has accused Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe of shielding former strongman Mahinda Rajapaksa, his family and supporters in corruption cases, in a fresh jolt to their ruling coalition.

The unity government of Sirisena's Sri Lanka Freedom Party (SLFP) and Wickremes-inghe's United National Party (UNP) was plagued with crisis ever since former President Ra-japaksa's new party pulled off a stunning victory in February's local elections seen as a referendum on the ruling alliance.

A new turn of events in the continued political crisis came yesterday when Sirisena addressed a public gathering to commemorate a leading Buddhist monk who was instrumental in the then Opposition's victory over Rajapaksa in 2015.

Referring to a speech by the monk at the event where he



was faulted for accepting the leadership of the SLFP after becoming the president, Sirisena said it was due to him that Wickremesinghe became pre-mier and the current government was able to stay afloat.

"I made Ranil Wickremesinghe the prime minister with just 47 seats when Mahinda Rajapaksa had two thirds of the seats," Sirisena blasted.

"There are people who are trying to make out that it is I who obstructed the prosecuThe SLFP and the UNP had

formed a national unity gov-ernment after 2015 elections but both parties have differed

on several issues.

Sirisena said he had tele phoned the Air Force chief yesterday to ask who ordered the release of helicopters for former president Rajapaksa to travel to his southern province home soon after his defeat in January 2015.

"I was told that the then Air Force commander had been told that I wanted helicopters given, but they didn't even inform me about such a thing," he said, suggesting it was done by Wickremesinghe. Sirisena said he was also

unaware of the 100-day re-form programme unveiled by the UNP-led government soon after his election. During the programme, the government introduced the 19th amendment to the constitution which pruned presidential powers to dissolve parliament.

Sirisena said his SLFP support was the key factor in adopting the 19the amendment.
In response, UNP's Kabir

Hashim said his party was taking the ownership of the programme. "The 100-day programme was something all parties had signed up for. We were able to introduce far reaching democratic reforms by implementing the 100-day programme," Hashim said.

Sirisena in March had re-placed Wickremesinghe as the law and order minister amidst ity Sinhala Buddhists and minority Muslims in the Kandy district despite imposition of nationwide emergency.

Later in the month, Sirisena had further reduced the responsibilities Wickremesinghe, while suspending Par-liament for about a month in April in the backdrop of the ongoing political turmoil in the country.

China welcomes India, Pakistan agreement to observe 2003 ceasefire

BEIJING, MAY 31 (PTI): China today welcomed India and Pakistan's decision to observe the 2003 ceasefire agreement to stop cross-border firing along the Line of Con-trol (LoC) in Jammu and Kashmir and expressed hope that the two countries will properly resolve their differences

The Director Generals of Military Operations (DGMOs) of India and Pa-kistan on May 29, during a conversation over the hotline, agreed to fully implement the ceasefire pact of 2003 in "letter and spirit" forthwith to stop cross border firings in Jammu and Kashmir.

"We commend the positive actions taken by both sides." Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesper son Hua Chunying told

media briefing here. "We hope that both sides could properly resolve their disputes through dialogue and consultation and maintain regional peace and stability," she said. The LoC has been

witnessing increasing hostilities in the last few months.

According to Defence sources in New Delhi, a total of 908 incidents of ceasefire violations by Pakistan Army were re-ported till May 29 in the current year as against 860 incidents during 2017.

Indian DGMO Lt Gen Anil Chauhan and Pakistan's Maj Gen Sahir Shamshad Mirza had re viewed the prevailing situation along the LoC and the International Bor-der in J and K, following which both sides agreed to fully implement the 15-year-old ceasefire understanding.



Moscow invites N Korea's Kim to visit

Moscow, May 31 (AFP): Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov in Pyongyang today invited North Korean leader Kim Jong Un to visit Russia, Moscow said, during the first meeting between the head of the reclusive state and a Russian official.

"Come to Russia, we'll be very happy to see you," Lavrov told Kim in remarks released by the Russian foreign ministry.

Lavrov passed greet-ings from Russian President Vladimir Putin to Kim, saying he wished him success in the "major



undertakings that have been initiated on the Korean peninsula", the ministry said in a statement.

Lavrov was the first Russian official to be received by Kim, Rus-

sian news agencies said "It was the first official meeting with him face to face," TASS quoted a source in the minister's

delegation as saying.

Russia's top diplomat arrived in Pyongyang ear-lier today, ahead of a landmark summit between Kim and US President Donald Trump. His visit comes amid a flurry of diplomatic activity to organise next month's summit, with US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo also meeting Kim's right-hand man Kim Yong Chol in New York late yesterday.

around 90 minutes. The high-ranking North Korean official,

who will meet Pompeo again on Thursday, arrived at New York from Beijing.

"Pompeo has arrived in New York for meetings with North Korea Vice Chairman Kim Yong Chol as we continue to actively

prepare for Trump's potential summit with North Korean Chairman Kim in Singapore and emphasise our commitment to the denuclearisation of the Korean Peninsula." State Department Spokesperson Heather

White House press secretary Sarah Sanders said the administration is preparing and expects the summit to take place on June 12

"And we'll be ready, if it does, on June 12. And if it's not, then we'll be ready if it takes place on July 12," she told reporters at her daily news conference. The United States, she said, is continu-

ing to prepare for the meeting between the President and the North Korean leader.

Trump last week called off the summit after North Korea expressed anger at comments by American officials. The President, however, later said that he was reconsidering his decision.

The advance team, led by Deputy Chief of Staff Joe Hagin, met with the North Kore-

an team in Singapore, and again expect to do so tomorrow. We want to thank our strategic partner in Singapore, who's been incredibly generous in agreeing to host the summit. And the President is very appreciative of Prime Minister Lee (Hsien Loong) for all of their efforts." Sanders said.

"Their talks will continue. So far, the readout from these meetings has been positive, and we'll continue to move forward in them," the White House press secretary said.

The conversation, she said, is going to be focused on denuclearisation of the Korean Peninsula.

"That's what these ongoing conversa-ons taking place now will be centred on, as well as the summit that would take place in Singapore. As long as that is part of the discussion, we're going to continue to shoot for June 12 and expect to do that," Sanders said.

BTS GOES TO NO. 1 ON BILLBOARD'S ALBUM CHART, A FIRST FOR K-POP

K-Pop is having a moment — a big one. Billboard has announced that Korean pop music boy band BTS will have the No. 1 album in the U.S. this week, a first for any K-pop artist or group.

For the as-of-yet uninitiated, BTS ("bangtan sonyeo-ndan") now stands for a number of names. Take your pick: Bangtan Boys, Bullet-proof Boy Scouts or the more English-friendly Beyond The

And to give you a sense of their worldwide audience, BTS was named the most Tweeted-about celebrities of 2017; the group's tweets were liked or retweeted half a billion times — reportedly more than those of either President Trump or Justin Bieber, or even Trump and Bieber combined.

The pump has been primed for BTS' mainstream success. Earlier this month. the band performed at the Billboard Music Awards another first for a K-pop act



performing its new sin-"Fake Love," seven young men in a tightly choreographed swirl - each taking turns to pose and preen for the crowd. People wrote of the Billboard performance, "BTS Brings Screaming Fans to Tears!" BTS also had a spot on Dick Clark's New Year's Rockin' Eve a few months ago and appeared on the American Music Awards last No-

Now, you might be thinking: "Wasn't there another big Korean pop song a few years ago?" You're thinking of Psy's once-inescapable novelty hit, "Gangnam Style." But Psy didn't have an album chart in the U.S.

What Psy arguably did do, though, was to offer a proof of concept: It was evidence to the American music industry that U.S. listeners would be open to songs sung in Korean, with a very Korean musical aesthetic and point of view. It helped to open the doors for BTS, and K-pop more generally, in the U.S. With those

wide open, could other K-pop bands be far behind? It's been a while since the Brit-ish Invasion — maybe it's time for a Korean Invasion. Almost undoubtedly, other boy bands like the veteran Korean-Chinese group EXO, and all-female counterparts like Blackpink and the Korean-Japanese-Taiwanese group Twice, could be considered front-runners for following in BTS' footsteps.
