Bagdogra Airport set to clear visibility hurdle

BAGDOGRA (WB), FEB 18 (PTI): The Bagdogra Airport in North Bengal is set to get a major boost with the commissioning of Category II Instrumen-tal Landing System (CAT II ILS) from March 29, a top Airports Authority of India official said.

Once the new system is in place, the airport will be able to operate flights even when the visibility is as low as 350 metres, the official said.

Flight landings at the airport get affected round the year, especially in the mornings. At present, a minimum visibility of 1.200 metres is required for an aircraft to land at the airport, he added.

The notification on the commissioning of CAT II ILS at Bagdogra Airport was issued by AAI headquarters in New Delhi on Thursday.

"The morning slot at our airport is not utilized at present as the airlines are reluctant to operate flights between 6 am and 11 am due to poor visibil-ity," Director of Bagdogra Airport Rakesh R Sahay told PTI.

The visibility at the airport generally drops below 500 metres in the morning.
"Be it fog, shallow fog

or heavy rain, the new system will now allow flights to land even when the visibility ranges between 500 metres and 350 metres," Sahay said.

At present, the air-port remains functional mostly between 11 am and 7 pm. "We have plans to

start operations as early as 5 am in the summers and from 6 am in the winters. With the air traffic control (ATC) available turn to pg03

The agreement was signed between Additional Chief Secretary, HRDD, GP Upadhaya, and UNESCO MGIEP Curricular Head, Yoko Mochizu-ki, here this evening.



As the world gears up to achieving SDGs, it was informed that the Embedding Project of UNESCO MGIEP will play a key role in supporting Member States' efforts to achieve SDG 4.7 on Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) and Global Citizenship Education (GCED).

The project aims to embed concepts of peace, global citizenship and sustainable develop

subjects especially Mathematics, Science, L guage and Geography.

Mr Upadhaya said, "Sikkim is the first state to enter into agreement with UNESCO. It is a happy and proud moment for Sikkim and HRDD to have Sustainable Development Goals incorporated in school curriculum from Classes I-V. We are grateful to state government and UNESCO for giving us

this opportunity.
A total of 45 resources

teachers are being trained for this project. BEIJING, FEB 18 (PTI): A major fire broke out at one of Tibet's holiest Buddhist temples, Jokhang Temple, a UNESCO World Heritage site in the capital Lhasa with a history of more than 1,300 years.

There were no re-

ports of any casualties, state-run Xinhua news agency reported, without specifying the damage caused by the fire to the temple.

The fire started at 6.40 pm yesterday but was soon brought under control, it said.

More than 40 languages may be heading for extinction: Officials

New Delhi, FeB 18 (PTI): More than 40 languages or dialects in India are considered to be endangered and is believed to be heading towards extinction as only a few thousand people speak them, offi-cials said.

According to a report of the census directorate, there are 22 scheduled languages and 100 non-scheduled languages es in the country which are spoken by a large number of people - one lakh or

However, there are around 42 languages which are spoken by less than 10,000 people. These are considered endangered and may be heading towards extinction, a home ministry official said. A list prepared by UNESCO has also

mentioned about the 42 languages or di-alects in India which are endangered and they may be heading towards extinction,

the official said.

The languages or dialects which ere considered endangered, include 11 from Andaman and Nicobar Islands (Great Andamanese, Jarawa, Lamongse, Luro, Muot, Onge, Pu, Sanenyo, Sentilese. Shompen and Takahanvilang). seven from Manipur (Aimol, Aka, Koiren, Lamgang, Langrong, Purum and Tarao) and four from Himachal Pradesh (Baghati, Handuri, Pangvali and Sirmaudi).

The other languages in the endan-

gered category are Manda, Parji and Pengo (Odisha), Koraga and Kuruba (Karnataka), Gadaba and Naiki (Andhra Pradesh), Kota and Toda (Tamil Nadu), Mra and Na (Arunachal Pradesh), Tai Nora and Tai Rong (Assam), Bangani (Uttarakhand), Birhor (Jharkhand), Nihali (Maharashtra), Ruga (Meghalaya) and Toto (West Bengal).

The Central Institute of Indian Languages, Mysore, has been working for the protection and preservation of endangered languages of the country, under a ntral scheme, another official said.

Under the programme, grammatical

descriptions, monolingual and bilingual dictionaries, language primers, anthologies of folklore, encyclopedias of all languages or dialects especially those spoken by less than 10,000 people are being prepared, the official said.

Apart from the 22 scheduled language es, there are 31 other languages in the country which were given the status of official language by various state govern-

ments and Union territories.

According to the census data, there are 1.635 rationalised mother tong 234 identifiable mother tongues and 22 major languages in the country.

PNB fraud: 200 shell firms, benami assets under ED, I-T dept scanner

NEW DELHI, FEB18 (PTI): At least 200 shell firms and benami" as-sets have come under the scanner of the investigative agencies that are probing the Rs 11,400-crore alleged fraud at the Punjab Na-tional Bank (PNB), involving diamond czar Nirav Modi, his relative and business partner Mehul Choksi and others.

The Enforcement Directorate (ED), which continued its searches against Modi, Choksi and their companies for the fourth day today and seized diamonds and gold worth Rs 20 crore, is also moving to attach at least two dozen immovable properties under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA).

The ED today raided at least 45 premises, including jewellery show-rooms and workshops,

across the country.
As many as 29 properties -- of Modi, his fam-

panies -- that have been provisionally attached by the Income Tax department, are being assessed by the ED under the PMLA. A few more assets will be attached soon under the anti-money laun-dering law, a senior ED official said.

He added that the ED and the I-T department had zeroed in on about 200 dummy or shell com panies in the country and abroad that were being used to route or receive funds as part of the al-

leged fraud.

It is suspected that the shell firms were being used by the accused to launder money and create benami assets in the form of land, gold and precious stones, which is now being probed by the tax department.

Both the ED

the IT department had formed special teams to investigate the case, sources said.

Now, Rotomac Pen's Rs 800 cr defaulter flees country

NEW DELHI, FEB 18 (PTI): After billionaire diamantaire Nirav Modi, another defaulter Vikram Kothari, the promoter of Rotomac Pen, has also allegedly gone abroad after swindling Rs 800 crore from various public sector banks including Allahabad Bank, Bank of India and Union Bank of India, sources said.

The Kanpur-based company's owner had taken a loan of more than Rs 800 crore from over five state-owned banks.
Allahabad Bank, Bank

of India, Bank of Baroda, Indian Overseas Bank and Union Bank of India compromised their rules to sanction loans to Rotomac, sources said.

Kothari took a loan of Rs 485 crore from Mumbai-based Union Bank of India and a loan of Rs 352 crore from Kolkatabased Allahabad Bank.

Last year, Bank of Baroda (BoB), a consortium partner declared pen manufacturer Rotomac Global Pvt Ltd as 'wilful defaulter".

The company moved the Allahabad High Court seeking removal of its name from the list of wil-ful defaulter.

A division bench orising Chief Justice comprising Chief Justice
D B Bhosle and Justice Yashwant Verma had passed the order on a pe-tition filed by the company, contending that it has been wrongly declared a "wilful defaulter" by BoB despite having "offered assets worth more than Rs 300 crore to the bank

since the date of default". Rotomac was de-clared a wilful defaulter vide an order dated Feb-ruary 27, 2017 passed by an authorised committee, as per the procedure laid down by the Reserve Bank of India.

Confront Violence

It's worrying when letting off steam leaves behind grievous hurt

 $S^{\rm ome}$ months ago, a youth was brutally beaten up in the restroom of a Gangtok dive. A spent bullet was also reportedly recovered from the site, in all probability from a gun fired to intimidate. Some years ago, another youth in his early twenties was shot outside a local discotheque by a person old enough to be his father. This violent attack was triggered by a minor altercation inside the disco and it is unlikely that in the former incident either the provocation could have been severe enough to beat someone within a whisker of death. Thankfully, both victims of such senseless violence survived the respective assaults, but that was no thanks to the people who attacked them because they really could not care either way. And more recently, a youth threatened by a mob is reported to have pulled out a gun as well although he did not discharge it. All these episodes shocked Sikkim, as they rightly should have, because they brought the society face to face with a new kind violence– a violence which was alien to Sikkim in its bloodlust. Violence is not new to any society, and fights and fisticuffs are not rare in the State either.

The nature of violence in the past was mostly of the kind which lashed in the heat of the moment, and while the rare case ended in an accidental fatality, most fights closed with bruises, sprains and the occasional broken bone and bruised ego. Most of the times, these were settled with a "compromise". But when weapons like guns are added to the mix, a very worrying dimension injects itself into the discussions. One hopes that these were aberrations and not pointers to the things to come: but it would be unwise for the society at large to dismiss these as rare anomalies and ignore the responsibility towards exercising some soul-searching to understand situations which could be triggering such violent outbursts and such, apparently, easy access to weapons by those who clearly have a tendency towards violence. As mentioned earlier, violence is not a rare human condition, but what should be worrying for Sikkim is the possibility that the potential to deliver violence has multiplied from the power of fists and sticks to guns and bullets now.

There will be those who will blame the system and the political dispensation, and others who will look at the cops to keep the streets safe. Both approaches are flawed because neither addresses the societal response which sets up such outbursts of violence. Some have already blamed the relatively new "culture" of partying and discotheques for the incident. This is almost childish because the question which really needs to be asked instead is why do so many people leave for parties and arrive at discos with so much anger when the idea is to let the hair down and enjoy. Fights are now routine wherever there is a gathering of strangers with even the cultural celebrations closing with fights despite strong police and VIP presence. Weekend bashes have literally become so. What is important for the society here to confront is the reason why so many people carry so much anger and hate bottled up inside them that violence seeps out so often and so

This is not to suggest that people here are inherently prone to violence, but a query which leads to the next enquiry - why, despite so much public violence, are such few incidents booked and penalised. The answer is obvious- they are all compromised eventually. While one can argue that compromises are healthy because this means that grudges are not allowed to fester, but on the flip side, when violence is allowed to pass without reprimand, it emboldens perpetrators to unleash even more of it the next time. It is a complicated cycle, but one which needs to be addressed because the nature of violence is changing in Sikkim.

How I marvelled at Black Panther's reimagining of Africa

Watching Marvel's highly anticipated comic-book film adaptation, Black Panther, was ordinary tried and d cinematic experience. Much like the unapologetic showmanship, flamboyance and atmospheric idiosyncrasies of unday service black congregational worship, the cinema metamorphosised beyond its remnants of unswept popcorn kernels and sticky milkshake residue into an augmented space.

It became a "mega-church" sanctuary of spiritual catharsis –with all the impassioned and melodic trimmings of Afro-Pentecostalism.

But, make no mistake, this was not the time nor place for solemn contemplation or confessing past transgressions – but an opportunity for con-tinental Africans and diaspora to offload socially sanctioned climactic expressions of individual and collective excitement and expectations, as well as lip-bitten anxieties about a fictionalised Africa.

If this was an Afro-baptism in filmic spirit, I sought – and submitted to – full-bodied immersion.

Let's be clear, the fervour over Black Panther among the Ankra-wearing, close-cropped Af-ro-crowned cinemagoers is incredibly warranted for several reasons. Not least for its reimagining, its re-presentation of Africa and communities therein – with magical realism – that makes it an intriguing anomaly among the slew of other questionable Western cinematic attempts to deliver "Africa" on

Die-hard Marvel fans and those newly christened have waited with baited breath to secure a one-way ticket to Wakanda – the wondrous Afro-futuristic utopia and homeland of the titular character Black Panther (played by Chadwick Boseman). But this is by no means Hollywood's first foray into fictionalised African kingdoms. Before Wakanda, there was the similarly named and seemingly "African-sounding" Zumunda in Eddie Murphy's 1998 blockbuster Coming to America.

But Zumunda presented as nothing more than

a visual repository of African clichés and norma-tive assumptions, where wild animals, as domesti-cated pets, cohabit "as they do" nonchalantly with humans. So too, where royalty enrobe in lion's fur. As the Nigerian literary darling Chimamanda Ngozi

"If all I knew about Africa were from popular

images, I too would think that Africa was a place of beautiful landscapes, animals and incomprehensible people, fighting senseless wars, dying of poverty and Aids, unable to speak for themselves."

If only I could speculate on what may have in-

formed such a proclamation ... dare I venture towards films such as The African Queen, Out of Africa, Hotel Rwanda, The Last King of Scotland, Blood Diamond, Beasts of No Nation – to name a handful.

AFRICA'S BURDEN

Those cinematic offerings were the colonial-era mythmakers and extenders whose white lensed romanticisms have determined the space within which Africa is defined and knowable. It is also within this space that the complexities and pluralities of African representation have been lost in simplification and concealment.

Surely these films must have affixed the "Afro" in the unmistaken and riotous Afro-futurism of Black Panther. But its the "futurism" aspect that makes Black Panther stand head and shoulders above the rest. Showcasing an iteration of Africa that is more imaginatively radical than merely culturally palatable for audiences who are used to being spoon-fed – better yet, force-fed – microwavable doses of an Africa that is melancholic, benighted and savage, to

satisfy their visually myopic cravings.
Unlike its predecessors, Black Panther's Afro-futuristic elements challenge stereotypes by readjusting the barometer of African imagination.
Where Africa and black-Africanness is equated with discourses of futurism, cybernetics, sci-fi fantasy and mysticism

NEW AFRICAN CENTURY

This is a far cry from previous film interpretations of Africa, and especially of Africa's future – or lack thereof. It has too often been represented as provisional and ephemeral - or arbitrated by the technocratic and philanthropic efforts of white do-good-ers. Instead, Black Panther provides a prophetic

reimagining of Africa with its postmodern gravity-defying vehicles and super-sonic technology that far exceed human comprehension

This has important implications for how we see Africa, through films which have long anchored it in a "forever-more" state that is seemingly unenlightened, backward-leaning and per ceived as a prolongation of the past.
So, too, the film speaks

volumes about how young and old black African

erworldly spheres. Its Afro-futurism allows black folk to apply self-iterations and augment alternate realities that transcend the limitations of the "here and now" towards the "what ifs" and "could bes", through their own melanin-infused, ethno-cultural

Equally, with its vestiges of the past and nods to the future, Black Panther presents a certain "contemporary ordinariness" within Africa that is discernible in all its parts. Where streets of African cities, for example, are littered with mother-tongue speaking, iPhone-clutching youth, dressed in dashiki-patterned bomber jackets, skinny jeans and with basket-woven braided hairstyles.

Moreover, the portrayal of Wakanda as re-

source-rich, unsoiled by European colonialism and the paraphernalia of international development, challenges cinematic presumptions of an Africa that is deficient, agentless and lacking internal diplomacies for sovereignty.

AFRICA UPGRADED

This is further reinforced by the central staging and representation of steely-eyed, intelligent African women – as Beyoncé avows in her feminist-imbued record Upgrade U, if the men are "the block" the women are "the lights that the keep streets on". We see this in the female Wakandans, the unyielding pillars of the film, who demystify allusions and illusions of Africa – through its female proxies – as infantilised, subordinate and devoid of individual articulation of unique intent.

As a Marvel trailblazer, Black Panther is stun-

ning in its redefining of Africa's aesthetic within the cultural zeitgeist of cinematic consciousness. It trades cinema's historical blueprint for Africa, for its own set of black paws. Suffice to say, representation (in all its shades) matters.

There are four types of drinker – which one are you?

t's easy to see alcohol consumption being a result of thousands of years of ritual and a lifetime of habit. But have you ever stopped to consider is you choose to drink? Know ing what motivates people to drink is important to better understanding their needs when it comes to encour-aging them to drink less, or in a less harmful way.

THE FOUR TYPES

Personally, everyone can come up with many reasons why he or she is drinking, which makes a scientific understanding of the reasons difficult. But there is something called the motivational model of alcohol use, that argues we drink because we expect a change in how we feel after we do. Originally developed to help treat alcohol dependence, the ideas described in the model led to a new understanding of what motivates people to drink

More precisely, the model assumes people drink to increase positive feelings or decrease negative ones They're also motivated by internal re-wards such as enhancement of

a desired personal emotional state, or by external rewards such as social approval.

This results in all drink ing motives falling into one of four categories: enhancement (because it's exciting), coping (to forget about my worries), social (to celebrate), and conformity (to fit in). Drinkers can be high or low in any number of drinking motives - people are not necessarily one type of drinker or the other.

All other factors - such as genetics, personality or envi-ronment – are just shaping our drinking motives, according to this model. So drinking motives are a final pathway to alcohol use. That is, they're the gateway through which all these other influences are channelled.

1. SOCIAL DRINKING

To date, nearly all the research on drinking motives has been done on teens and young adults. Across cultures and countries, social motives are the most common reason young people give for drinking alcohol. In this model, social drinking may be about increasing the amount of fun you are having with your friends. This fits in with the idea that drinking is mainly a social pastime. Drinking for social motives is associated with moderate alcohol use

2. DRINKING TO CONFORM

When people only drink on social occasions because they want to fit in not because it's a choice they would normally make – they drink less than those who drink mainly for other reasons. These are the people who will sip a glass of champagne for a toast, or keep a wine in their hand to avoid feeling different from the drinkers around them.

In the last couple of years, programs like Hello Sunday Morning have been encouraging people to take a break from drinking. And by making this more socially acceptable, they may also be decreasing the negative feedback some people receive for not drinking, although this is a theory that needs testing.

3. DRINKING FOR ENHANCEMENT Beyond simply drinking to socialise, there are two types of adolescents and young adults with a particular risky combination of personality and drinking motive preference.

First are those who drink for en-

hancement motives. They are more likely to be extroverted, impulsive, and aggressive. These young people (often male) are more likely to actively seek to feel drunk – as well as other extreme sensations – and have a risk-taking personality.

4. DRINKING TO COPE

econd, those who drink mainly for coping motives have higher levels of neuroticism, low level of agreeableness and a negative view of the self. These drinkers may be using alcohol to cope with other problems in their life, particularly those related to anxiety and depression. Coping drinkers are more likely to be female, drink more heavily and experience more alcohol-related problems

than those who drink for other reasons.

While it may be effective in the short term, drinking to cope with problems leads to worse long-term con-sequences. This may be because the problems that led to the drinking in the first place are not being addressed.

WHY IT MATTERS

There is promising research that suggests knowing the motives of heavy drinkers can lead to interventions to reduce harmful drinking. For instance, one study found that tailoring counselling sessions to drinking motives decreased consumption in young women, although there was no significant decrease in men.

This research stream is limited by the fact we really only know about the drinking motives of those in their teens and early 20s. Our understanding of why adults are drinking is limited, something our research group is hoping to study in the future.

Next time you have a drink, have

a think about why you are choosing to do so. There are many people out there having a drink at night to relax. But if you're aiming to get drunk, you have a higher chance than most of ex-

periencing harm.

Alternatively. if you are trying to drink your problems away, it's worth remembering those problems will still be there in the morning.

PNB fraud: 200 shell firms, benami assets under ED, I-T dept scanner

NEW DELHI, FEB18 (PTI): At least 200 shell and benami" assets have come under the scanner of the investigative agencies that are probing the Rs 11,400-crore alleged fraud at the Punjab Naalleged tional Bank (PNB), involving diamond czar Nirav Modi, his relative and business partner Mehul Choksi and others.

The Enforcement Directorate (ED), which continued its searches continued its searches against Modi, Choksi and their companies for the fourth day today and seized diamonds and seized diamonds and gold worth Rs 20 crore, is also moving to attach at under properties the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA).

The ED today raided at least 45 premises, including jewellery show rooms and workshops,

As many as 29 properties -- of Modi, his family members and comprovisionally attached by the Income Tax depart-ment, are being assessed by the ED under the PMLA. A few more assets will be attached soon under the anti-money laundering law, a senior ED official said.

He added that the ED and the I-T department had zeroed in on about 200 dummy or shell companies in the country and abroad that were being used to route or receive funds as part of the alleged fraud.

It is suspected that the shell firms were be-ing used by the accused to launder money and the form of land, gold and precious stones, which is now being probed by the tax department. Both the ED and

the IT department had formed special teams to investigate the case, sources said.

The ED has seized diamonds, gold jewel-lery and other precious stones worth Rs 5,694

crore till now in the case.
The I-T department vesterday attached nine bank accounts of Gitanjali Gems, its promoter Mehul Choksi and others in connection with a tax evasion probe against

It had also attached 29 properties and 105 bank accounts of Modi, his family members and firms owned by them.

Modi. Choksi and others are being investigated by multiple probe agencies after it recently came to light, following a complaint by the PNB, that they allegedly cheat-ed the nationalised bank to the tune of Rs 11,400 crore, with the purported involvement of a few employees of the bank.

Forest guards in Assam given modern weapons to check Rhino poaching

KAZIRANGA, FEB 18 **(PTI):** In a major initiative for wildlife protection, forest guards in Assam were today given modern weapons like SLRs and 9 MM pistols, to check poaching of rhinos, tigers and other wild animals.

Chief Minister Sarbananda Sonowal said for the first time in the country, 10 wildlife fast-track courts were set up to exclusive-y deal with poaching and other related crimes against wild animals.

"We have put protection of wildlife in high priority. Accordingly, we have today launched a new programme - mod-ernisation of arms and equipment for protec-tion, rescue and rehabil-itation of rhinos, tigers and other wildlife," he told PTI.

According to the plan, forest guards were given 954 Self-Loading Rifles (SLRs), 272 INSAS rifles, 133 rifles of .12 bore. 20 of 9 MM pistols and 91 Ghatak rifles.

The chief minister said ever since the BJP came to power in Assam nearly two years ago, 197 poachers were arrested and eight were killed by security guards while as many as 59 poachers were convicted for their crimes against wildlife.

Sonowal said wildlife fast-track courts were set up in 10 districts and such courts were set up for the first time in the country.

"We hope that speedy trial and conviction of poachers will go a long way for protection of wildlife in the state," he said.

Assam has five national parks and 19 wildlife sanctuaries. The state is home to more than 91 per cent of Indian rhinos (2,431 rhinos as per 2015 census). It is also home to 167 tigers, 248 leopards, 1,169 Swamp deer besides a large number of wild buffaloes, different varieties of deer and other animals.

According to an estimate tabled in the state Assembly this month, altogether 74 rhinos were killed by poachers in Assam since 2015 and 316 poachers arrested during 2015-17.



74 pc polling in Tripura assembly elections: EC

New Delhi Feb 18 (PTI): The total voter turnout stood at 74 per cent in the single-phase Tripura Assembly polls today, 17 per cent less than the last Assembly election when the polling percentage was recorded at 91.82

Voting was today held in 59 of the total 60 seats as polling could not be held in the Charilam constituency due to the death of CPI(M) candidate Ramendra

Naravan Deb Barma last week. The constituency will go to polls on March 12.

According to the figures re-leased by the Election Commission today, the voter turnout

stood at 74 per cent.

The BJP, an also-ran until now in the north-eastern state, is making a determined bid to demolish the red bastion of 25 years, with stalwarts like Prime Minister Narendra Modi and party president Amit Shah leading the charge.

The saffron party, which had forged a pre-poll alliance with tribal outfit Indigenous People's Front of Tripura (IPFT), had fielded 51 candidates. The IPFT, an anti-Left party, contested

from the remaining nine seats.

The Congress went it all alone in Tripura this time and

contested from 59 seats. The party had not fielded a candidate from the Kakrabon constituency in Gomati district.

There are 25,73,413 registered voters -- 13,05,375 male and 12,68,027 female -- in the

State.

The number of voters under the third gender category in the state is 11 and that of the new voters 47,803.

The Portuguese boss added: "Now is the time to think about Paul, to know what happened why he didnt feel good enough to play, can he play or be available to help us on Wednesday?"

Pogba has reportedly been unhappy in recent weeks at the style Mourinho has adopted, generally playing him alongside Nemanja Matic in a two-man midfield.

But ahead of Satur-days match, Mourinho appeared prepared to meet the wishes of Pogba, who rejoined United from Juventus for 89.3 million (123.5 million, 100.5 million euros) in August 2016, by playing him on the left side of a three-man midfield setup.

United still won comfortably, thanks to Lu-kakus double, although victory could have been even more emphatic but for video assistant referee (VAR) Neil Swarbrick ruling out a Juan Mata goal late in the first half in an incredibly close off-

New Delhi, Feb 18 (PTI): For the first time, a group of Indian stu-dents who have worked on grassroot-level social projects for creating jobs will present their propos-als to international diplomats and policy-makers from around the

world at the UN headquarters.

The programme is part of the Future Leaders initiative of 1M1B, an Indian not-for-profit organisa-tion which seeks to train over the years one million young entrepreneurs for creating jobs for one billion people.

After a six-month-long curriculum and fellowship programme, India who will be present at the United Nations Headquarters in New York on March 19.

The top three students among them will make a presentation on their respective projects before a gathering of diplomats and repre-sentatives of the media, foundations and others.

"The 17 goals of the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) require people, especially young people, to drive action towards their fulfilment by the year 2030," said Manav Subodh, co-founder of 1M1B.

"So today, more than any other

time, the UN requires ambassadorship and action by young people towards the UN SDGs," Subodh said.

He said the Future Leaders programme of 1M1B, a job-creation and income enhancement initiative aligned to the UN SDG, seeks to give a global stage to future influencers.

Under the fellowship programme, promising students are identified, fe-licitated and given access to high im-

pact development projects.

One of the selected projects,
'The Project Fresh Start (TPFS), by Nikita Nambiar (14) of The International School Bangalore, seeks

socially and financially, help them stay out of prison, and become productive community members.

Nambiar plans to auction off these paintings through a charity event later and forward the pro-ceeds to the women.

She created an app that not only provides access to autism-related research to create awareness within support groups, but also showcases the varied talents of people who suffer from autism.

The programme started in August 2017 in partnership with The Interna-

The initiative builds conscious enterprises and undertakes income enhancement initiatives for underprivileged communities by engaging urban leaders and startups.

Start-up integrates AI with health app to help patients

New Delhi. Feb 18 (PTI): Seeking to provide "smart help" to patients in accessing consultation from doctors, a city-based start-up has introduced a 'digital assistant' in its healthcare app which allows users to chat with an artificial intelligence-based

The founders of 'Visit', an on-demand healthcare service online platform that provides to its users a pool of medical specialists and general physicians to choose from for consultation, said they developed this "AI-driven assistant" also to ease the

burden of doctors.

"Our country is already facing a shortage of doctors. And, many a time, patients go to a general physician's clinic, where there is a long queue, and the doctor eventually asks them to consult a specialist.

'What this AI bot ('chatbot') does is, it performs the initial screening of patients, based on the responses fed by the user of the app. It then directs the user to the general physician or a specialist, accordingly," said Vaibhav Singh, head of growth at the firm, founded in 2016.

Visit Internet Services was started by four students of BITS-Pilani, including Vaibhav, while they were in the final year of their course. The venture has already received funding from MapMyIndia, and based out of Okhla in south Delhi.

"When a user downloads the app, he or she gets a text greeting from the bot, like 'Hi... How can I help you'. It then asks questions, like the symptoms, and responds according to the run-time response of the

user. And, then say, the user says, 'it has skin itching or something', then it may direct him/her to a dermatologist on our pool," 24-year-old Vaibhav told PTI.

The chatbot or the 'Healthcare Assistant Bot' is a react-based chat client, and users can also ask a bot to order

"The bot is available on Android, IOS web. We have already crossed the 50,000-mark on downloads on Google PlayStore for Android-based apps only," he said and claimed this was the country's

first AI-integrated health app. Shashvat Tripathi, 25, head of tech-nology at Visit, said he and his team spent 'sleepless nights" and there were "moments of failure" but, we believed in it.

"The bot uses a mathematical probabi-

listic model to determine possible conditions, based on the answers given by the user, to questions that the bot asks," he

"The bot learns about conditions and their associated symptoms by parsing millions of live chats on the Visit app and uses its NLP (Natural Language Processing) engine to extract information about symptoms and possible diagnoses by the doctor." Shashvat said.

The bot learns using this data and uses the information to "reinforce its decision network". "It does not throw up stored responses to questions, but learns from the answers given by the user, which makes it unique, he said.

'Visit' offers paid online consultation, through video and voice channels, and seven days of free follow-up check-up over text chat, Besides, it maintains a pool of MBBS doctors, who through its 'Q' service, offer free health advice by text.

"Currently close to 700 users chat on our 'Q' per day. We seek to position ourself as a replacement for online searches and self-medication habits," Vaibhav said.

The online platform, currently has a pool of 2,200 doctors which include psychologists, dieticians, dermatologists, sexologists, gynaecologists, preventive cardi-ology and paediatrician, besides general physicians.

"For a general physician (having an MD), the consultation fee is Rs 400, for a psychologist (Rs 800), sexologist (Rs 500), aecologist (Rs 400), among other verticals," he said.

Trump turns on FBI over school shooting after criticism from survivors

(AFP): US President Donald Trump today said the FBI was so caught up in the Russia probe that it failed to heed signs which could have prevented the Parkland school shooting.

His comments came as he faces criticism from survivors of the attack over his ties to the powerful National Rifle Association, and after several thousand rallied in Florida to demand urgent action on gun control.

"Very sad that the FBI missed all of the many signals sent out by the Florida school shooter. This is not acceptable," he wrote on Twitter.

"They are spending too much time trying to prove Rus-sian collusion with the Trump campaign - there is no collusion. Get back to the basics and make us all proud!

US authorities have come under mounting scrutiny for failing to act on a series of warning signs ahead of the massacre at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in which 17 people were killed.

The FBI admitted Friday received a chilling warn-



ing in January from a tipster who said the gunman Nikolas Cruz could be planning a mass shooting, but that agents failed to follow up.

But the attack, the 18th school shooting this year alone, has also renewed calls for greater gun control with several survivors leading the charge.

One of them, 18-year-old Emma Gonzalez delivered a fiery address to a crowd of students, parents and residents in Ft. Lauderdale.

"To every politician tak-ing donations from the NRA, shame on you!" she thundered,

AFP following her speech

In Washington, the political response has made clear that the powerful NRA pro-gun lobby re-mains formidable, while Trump himself suggested the root cause of mass shootings was a crisis of mental health -- making no mention of gun control.

"If the president wants to come up to me and tell me to my face that it was a terrible tragedy and... how nothing is going to be done about it, Im going to happily ask him how much money he received from the National Rifle Association," Gonzalez said in her impassioned address.

"It doesnt matter because I already know. Thirty million," she said, citing the sum spent by the NRA to support Trumps election bid and defeat Hillary Clinton.

She then ran through a list of the pro-gun lobbys talking points -- for example, that "a good guy with a gun stops a bad guy with a gun," that no law could ever stop a madman intent on killing -- answering each argument with "We call BS."

The young woman's pow

erful address immediately went viral, with her name a top

trending topic on Twitter.
In addition to the FBIs missteps, Cruz was also known to local police after his mother repeatedly reported him for violent outbursts, while records obtained by the South Florida Sun Sentinel show authorities investigated Cruz in 2016 after he cut his arms on messaging app Snapchat and threatened to buy a gun.

The newspaper, citing De-partment of Children and Family Services documents, said the investigation came four days after Cruz turned 18 -- legally an adult, and thus able to buy a firearm.

Investigators said there were "some implications" for the teens safety, but conclud-ed that his "final level of risk is low as (he) resides with his mother, attends school and re-ceives counseling" as an outpatient at a mental health center. the Sun Sentinel said.
Cruz later passed a back-

ground check, allowing him in February 2017 to buy the AR-15 rifle used in the massacre.

Sharifs assets worth Rs 58 million 18 yrs back: NAB tells court

ISLAMABAD, FEB (PTI): Pakistan's ti-graft watchdog has informed an accountability court here that ousted prime minister Nawaz Sharif and his family's declared assets were nearly Rs 58 million 18 years ago, a media report said today.

Three corruption cases were filed against 68-yearold Sharif and some of his family members on September 8 following a Supreme Court verdict that disqualified him as prime minister and ordered the National Accountability Bureau (NAB) for institu tion of cases against the PML-N leader.

The cases include Av enfield properties, Azizia & Hill Metal Establishment, and Flagship Investments.

In two suplementary references one pertaining to Flagship Investments Limited and 15 other companies, and the oth-er to Al-Azizia Steel Mills and Hill Metal Establishment against Sharif and his sons, NAB said the total declared financial worth of assets of the accused persons as per their tax record in 2000-01 was Rs 50,940,870 and USD 64,984 (Rs 7.18 million), the Express Tri-

bune reported today.

"The NAB chairman said in the reference that Sharif had acquired Al-Azizia Steel Mills as well as Hill Metal Establishment, but the pro-ceeds were found disproportionate to his known sources of income," the paper said.

In the supplementary references, the NAB said that Hussain Nawaz and Hassan Nawaz, in con-nivance with each other, assisted, abetted and aided Sharif in accumulating and managing assets, the paper reported.

UK police probing online abuse of Indian-origin principal in hijab row

LONDON, FEB 18 (PTI): UK police are investigating the alleged online abuse of an Indian-origin school principal who was characterised as German dictator Adolf Hitler over her attempt to ban the hijab for very young pupils.

Neena Lall, the head-teacher of St Stephen's School in east London, has been in the eye of the storm over a decision to ban the hijab for girls under eight years, a decision she was forced to reverse last month amid backlash from the community.

A complaint has now been filed with local police in Newham, east London, about emails. Facebook posts and other social media messages received by both Lall and Arif Qawi, the former chairman of governors. The Sunday Times reported.

Local police confirmed that they were assessing a report of malicious communications following abusive e-mails having been received in connection with the case.

Oawi claimed that a campaign of essages, some abusive, over several days had forced the school to reverse its hijab ban. "I resigned because I did not agree with reversing the hijab ban and to protect the head-teacher. She was told that if I left, the campaign would
