UNION CARBIDE DISASTER

BHOPAL, DEC 2 (PTI): A large number of Bhopal Gas Tragedy survivors to-day marched, holding burning torches in hand, to a memorial of the world's worst industrial disaster on its 33rd anniversary this evening here.

They paid homage to those who

died in the trage-dy at the memorial statue in front of the now-de-funct Union Carbide factory.

Residents of Old City area, which is next to the factory, where the groundwater is said to be contaminated by

hazardous chemical waste lying on the factory premises, were also part of the

Leaders of five survivors' organisations. Rashida Bi. Nawab Khan. Balkrishna Namdeo, Satinath Sarange, Rachna Dhingra and Sarit Malviya, addressed the gathering, and demanded adequate compensation, clean-up of hazardous waste lying in the factory premises, rehabilitation of survivors and exemplary punishment for Union Carbide and Dow Chemical (which later took over Union Carbide).

The two-km march from Sindhi Col-

CII seeks upgrade for Bagdogra airport

BAGDOGRA (WB), DEC 2 (PTI): The Confederation of Indian Industry (CII) North Bengal has urged the Centre to upgrade Bagdogra airport with an overhauled infrastructure and night-landing facility for an improved air connectivity between North Bengal and the

rest of the country.
Placing the confederation's demands before the Union Minister for Civil Aviation Ashok Gajapa-thi Raju Pusapati here, the vice chairman of CII-North Bengal, Anand Mit-tal, also sought introduction of morning return flights from Bagdogra to Delhi and Kolkata, besides flights between Bagdogra and Kathmandu.

A five-member CII

team met the Union minister yesterday at Bag-dogra airport lounge on his way back to New Delhi from Gangtok.

The minister, accompanied by Joint Secre-tary of Ministry of Civil Aviation Usha Padhee had come to Gangtok to inspect infrastructure and facilities at the newly built Pakyong airport.

"Siliguri, close to Bagdogra airport, is not just the gateway to the North East, it also shares boundaries with Bangla-desh, Nepal and Bhutan. It is the second largest city in West Bengal and its importance as a major trading centre is growing every day," Mittal said.

The town also at-

tracts countless domestic as well as foreign tour-ists, said Mittal.

"It is high time that Bagdogra airport should grow in size to cater to the growing needs of Sili-guri and North Bengal as a whole. The upgraded Bagdogra airport will certainly serve as a fillip to businesses in the region which in turn will boost the local economy," the former chairman of CII-North Bengal, Ratan Kumar Bihani, said.

MUMBAI, DEC 2 (PTI): The Indian Under-17 girls team has returned home after ending up fourth in the Youth Olympic Games Rugby Sevens Qualifiers held at Dubai Sports City, Dubai. A total of 12 coun-

tries from across Asia, in-cluding Japan, Laos, Kazakhstan, Iran, Sri Lanka, Philippines, China, Thailand, Malaysia, India and hosts UAE, fought for top honours at the champi-onships that concluded

in end-November.

Japan were crowned the champions of the tournament after defeating China in a close-ly contested final, while Kazakhstan finished in third place, said a media release.

In the opening rounds, the Indian girls defeated Laos 27-0 in the first game, but in the second lost to eventual champions Japan 0-50.

Having qualified for the second phase, the Indian girls started off with a victory, defeating Hong Kong 24-7.

However, they lost their next two games against China and Kazakhstan 0-43 and 5-22. respectively.

ed under the aegis of the Indian Rugby Football Union (IRFU), the governing body for the sport in India, and was sup-ported by Societe Generale, the financial partner of Rugby India.

'Over 8K people disappeared during 1980 till 1995 in Punjab'

CHANDIGARH, DEC 2 (PTI): Punjab Documentation and Advocacy Project (PDAP), an NGO, today claimed that they have found over 8,000 people going "disappeared" during 1980 till 1995 in Punjab and demanded an inde-pendent judicial commission to probe the matter.

Satnam Singh Bains, representing PDAP, claimed that they have identified and documented hundreds of victims who were allegedly "cremated as unclaimed unidentified" and killed in "fake encounters".

"In our seven-year long investigation, we have identified 8,257 persons from different sources who disappeared from 1980 to 1995 in Punjab," he claimed.

Bains said the records pertaining to "disappeared"

people were collected by visiting villages, meeting victims' family members and also from media reports. "The latest report is a further step in the long

struggle by people of Punjab for justice and account-ability for victims and for their kin," Bains said. Retired Bombay High Court judge Justice Suresh,

who was also present, said, "people disappeared. They (their families) have the right to know why they disappeared. They have the right to know why human right violations took place."

People's Union for Civil Liberties (PUCL) national convener Kavita Srivastava, while speaking on the occasion, sought formation of a judicial commission under retired sitting judge of the Supreme Court to probe the "disappearance" of the people.

Bains said they will soon move to the Supreme Court with the findings of their report and demand detailed investigation in the matter.

SLSA sensitization programme on registration of marriages

GANGTOK, 02 DEC [IPR]: Under the directions of Judge-High Court of Sikkim, Justice Meenakshi Madan Rai, who is also the Executive Chair-person of Sikkim State Legal Services Authority [SLSA], a sensitization programme for Registration of Marriages for different Religious Communi-ties in Sikkim was organized by Sikkim SLSA today at Chin-

tan Bhawan in Gangtok.
The programme chaired by Executive Chair-person-Sikkim SLSA as chief guest in the presence of Judge-High Court of Sikkim, Justice Bhaskar Raj Pradhan, as guest of honour.

Iustice Meenakshi Madan Rai informed the participants that the programme is aimed to sensitize different religious communities with regard to the registration and solemnization of marriages and the steps that will be required for registering such marriages.

She also informed about the functions of SLSA and the different tiers, National Legal Services Authority [NALSA] at the central level, the SLSA in every State of India, the District Legal Services Au-thority [DLSA] at the district



level and Taluk Legal Services Committee [TLSC] at the Taluka level, whose main function is to provide access to justice to all the marginalized sections of the society.

Justice Rai added that one of the functions of the SLSA/ DLSA/TLSC is to provide free legal aid to various sections of the society who are cate-gorized under Section 12 of the Legal Services Authorities Act 1987, regardless of their income, tribal status, caste system, women, child, person

with disability, person in custody and those whose income is below one lakh per annum.

Guest of honour, Justice all, informed the participants that since 09 August 2007, it has been made compulsory

to have all marriages registered. He also apprised all with regard to the provisions contained in 'Rules to provide for registration and solemnization of a form of marriage in Sikkim' published by the Maharaja of Sikkim vide Notification No.1520/H dated 03 January 1963.

During the working sessions, Senior Advocate-High Court of Sikkim/Senior Pan-el, Sikkim SLSA, N Rai, spoke el, sixkili sack, i kar, spoke elaborately on 'Registration of Marriages under the Hin-du Marriage Act, 1955 and other relevant legislations'. He delved elaborately on the Hindu Marriage Act, 1955 and explained as to who are governed under the Act, sole zation of marriages under the Act, void and voidable marriages, provisions of Divorce and Registration of marriages

under the said Act.
Panel Advocate-Sikkim
SLSA, Umesh Ranpal, stressed on Indian Christian Marriage Act, 1872. He highlighted the provisions of the Act in detail, how the marriages are to be sol-emnized as per the relevant provisions of the Act and the procedure to the followed, in detail.

cate-Sikkim SLSA, TR Barfungpa, spoke on 'Solemnization of all Forms of Marriages in Sikkim'. He brought to the notice of the participants that tribals are not governed by the Hindu Marriage Act, therefore, their marriages could be registered under 'Rules to provide for registration and solemnization of a form of marriage in Sikkim' and not the Hindu Marriage Act, 1955. He urged the Authorities present to guide the public by generating awareness amongst them. Each working session was followed by vibrant interactive session.

The participants of the programme included Sub-Divisional Magistrates, Block Development Officers and officers dealing with Registration of Marriages from the East Dis-trict, Kusholas of all the differ-ent monasteries of Sikkim, the Reverends, Pastors and Elders of all the Churches of Sikkim and the Purohits of all the temples of Sikkim.

The welcome address was presented by Special Secre-tary-Sikkim SLSA, Matilda Isaacs, while the vote of thanks was delivered by Under Secretary, Praveen Pradhan.

Our Environment, Not Their Concern

So we better measure up to the challenge

The impact of global warming is becoming increasingly evident in the world's fragile polar caps and in the Himalayas. High mountain communities have noted that glaciers are retreating at unprecedented rates. Sikkim already has a glacier in advanced melt and posing a GLOF threat. This one, Sikkim is keeping a close watch over, but there have arguably been other GLOF episodes which have been written up as flash-floods, reducing substantially the danger they rang the bells on. Some results of retreating glaciers have become tourist spots and others have disrupted possible trekking routes. And yet, like the mainstream even the margins are negotiating global warming with

a blinkered and poorly-informed approach.

The planet's extremities are the canaries in the coal mine - alerting the rest of the world to the extent of the changes that are coming and we, because we hold that canary, should start getting more involved in the initiatives being undertaken to save the environment. Sikkim has launched several measures aimed at preserving its environment. These, however, have come only from the government thus far. We don't see any private participation in drawing attention to the larger picture. Most NGOs and social organisations are involved in highly localised issues like garbage disposal and plantation works. While these are also necessary, we need someone who communicates the need to start studying our glaciers, to start predicting how global warming will hit Sikkim in the next ten years, whether Teesta will remain the perennial river we know it as or shrivel down into a seasonal stream.

These studies are necessary because Sikkim's future developmental plans are indelibly linked to its natural resources. The development planners and the people in general need to know whether we will have these resources at hand by the time the developmental infrastructure is in place. We need these studies also to prepare our own action plans on how to save our ecology from further damage. Sadly, there does not seem to be enough research being devoted to Sikkim's environment. Sample this, by 2100, average world temperatures could go up by 5.8 degrees Celsius. Besides the increase in frequency of extreme weather events and expected rise of sea level up to a metre, forestry, biodiversity, agriculture, rainfall and human health and wellbeing will all be strongly affected.

Sikkim will not be left untouched by this change in global conditions and yet we have not had one local expert tell us what this change will translate into in ground terms. The main problem is that most people engaged for such tasks work on blueprints prepared in Delhi and refuse to think out of the box. The Centre's concerns do not necessarily place Sikkim's glaciers or springs or rainfall studies high on the priority list, they have the Gangotri closer at hand. Sikkim needs to work out its own environment assessment plan and start preparing for the future.

Penguins under threat from drowning in fishing nets

F ishing nets pose a serious risk to the survival of penguin species, according to a new global review of the toll taken by "bycatch" from commercial fishing. Fourteen of the world's 18 penguin species have been recorded as fishing

Among the species under threat are Tasmania's little penguins and New Zealand's yellow-eyed penguins, as detailed in a review, published in the journal Endangered Species Research

The review shows the level of by-catch is of greatest concern for three species: Humboldt and Magellanic

penguins, both found in South America, and the endangered New Zealand

yellow-eyed penguins. On New Zealand's South Island, yellow-eyed penguins are down to fewer than 250 nests. Previous population strong-holds have declined by more than 75%. Conservative population models predict local extinction of yellow-eyed penguins by 2060, if not earlier.

Penguins are among

the world's most iconic

and loved birds, despite the fact that many people never get to see one in the wild. Indeed, the opportunities to do so are diminishing, with ten of the 18 penguin species threatened with extinction. After albatrosses, penguins are the most threatened group of seabirds. And, like albatrosses, bycatch is thought to be a serious issue for some

On land, many penguins are now well protected, thanks to the efforts of conservation researchers, government agencies, community groups and tourism operators. Where many penguins were once vulnerable to attack from introduced predators, or to habitat loss from farming or development, today the biggest worry for many penguin chicks is how to get more food out of their parents.

But below the waves it's a different story. Over thousands of years, these keen-eyed seabirds have evolved to catch food in the depths, while avoiding natural predators such as seals and sharks. But they cannot see the super-fine nylon fishing nets invented in the 1950s which fishers now set in penguin

good little diver", typically forage in the upper 20 metres of the ocean, with each dive lasting about 90 seconds. The larger yellow-eyed penguin – Megadyptes antipodes, the "big diver of the south" – prefers to hunt on the seafloor some 80-90m down, holding their breath for 2-3 minutes before coming up for air. If they do not encounter a fishing net, that is.

Gillnets (also called set nets) in particular are very dangerous for penguins. These nets are set in a stationary position rather than being dragged through the water. They are designed to catch fish around their gills, but can just as easily snare a penguin around its neck.

Whereas threats on land are reasonably well managed, threats at sea need urgent attention. Marine habitat degradation by industries that damage the seafloor will take decades to recover. Similarly, pressures from climate change will not have a quick enough fix to save vellow-eved penguins from local

There is one thing, however, we can change immediately: the needless death of penguins in fishing nets. This will give already struggling penguin pop-ulations a bit of a breather and maybe even the resilience required to deal with the many threats they face in their daily fight for survival.



If it gets tangled in a net, a penguin will panic and drown in minutes In Tasmania, nets with more than 50 drowned little penguins have been found washed ashore. Other penguins are found on beaches with characteristic bruising from net entanglement around their necks.

When a penguin is killed at sea, this has knock-on effects back at the nest. The chicks will die of hunger or fledge underweight, with little chance of surviving their first year at sea.

The breeding partner left behind will probably skip a breeding season; some penguins never find another partner after losing their mate. I have seen them calling plaintively from their nest, or even going down to the shore in the evening to look out to sea, before returning to their nest all alone.

DECLINING NUMBERS

In New Zealand, the endangered yellow-eyed penguin is declining. Current population models predict their extinction on the New Zealand mainland by 2060, or potentially even earlier. Yellow-eyed penguins are facing many threats mostly because they are simply

Kurdistan earthquake: politics creates roadblocks to relief

theconversation.com Tran and Iraq are still struggling with the aftermath of a 7.3 on Nov. 12. The recovery effort has been slowed by politics, distrust and the legacy of war.

The quake – the deadliest in the world this year – killed

more than 500, injured some 7,000 and left 70,000 people in both countries in need of shelter.

The earthquake-affected region is dominated by the Kurds, the largest nation in the world without a state. Around 35 million Kurds inhabit a mountainous zone straddling Tur-

key, Iran, Iraq, Syria and Armenia.

The Kurdish population hit hardest by the recent quake is well-acquainted with tragedy. The epicenter was 20 miles southwest of Halabia, a city in Irag's semi-autonomous Kurdistan region, and about 18 miles from the city of Sarpol-e Za-hab, across the border in Iranian Kurdistan, my homeland.

Both places suffered severely during the Iran-Iraq war, which killed an estimated 1.25 million people between 1980 and 1988. Halabja is sometimes known as "Kurdistan's Hiroshima" because Saddam Hussein's government attacked it with poison gas in the closing days of the war, killing more than 5,000. Sarpol-e Zahab was completely destroyed in the early days

of the Iran-Iraq war, then rebuilt, and again destroyed in the Nov. 12 earthquake.

POLITICIZED DISASTER

The complex politics around the Kurdish people are my academic specialty as a professor at Indiana University.

The Kurdish minority in Iraq, Iran, Syria and Turkey has

long been repressed by those national governments, and tensions have been particularly high in Iraq following a Sept. 25 referendum for Kurdish independence in which 93 percent of voters favored separating from Iraq.

The political tension led earthquake victims to fears that

governmental relief might be slow or insufficient. In Iraq, Prime Minister Haider al-Abadi tweeted that he had sent health and aid agencies to Kurdistan – even though just before the earthquake he had sent troops to reassert control over the contested region, occupying the oil-rich city of Kirkuk. Kurdish areas of Turkey and Syria were unaffected by the quake.

Like Iraq, Turkey views Kurdish rebels as a threat to na-

tional security. Just 12 hours before the earthquake hit, in the morning of Nov. 12, Turkish fighter jets had bombed the earthquake-affected region in Sulaymaniyah, Kurdistan, during an ongoing offensive against the Kurdistan Workers' Party. Still some 15 hours later, Turkish military cargo planes were the first to deliver relief supplies to quake-hit Iraqi Kurdistan.

Like Iraq and Turkey, Syria also views the Kurds as a threat to its national security. For decades, the Kurdish minority in Syria was deprived of basic human rights such as citizenship and teaching their children the Kurdish language. After the emergence of the Islamic State following the Arab Spring, Syrian Kurds were of the most effective forces in the war to defeat the insurgent terrorist group. Expressions of solidarity, as well as aid, have been sent from Syrian and Turkish Kurds to the earthquake-affected region in Iraq and Iran.

A STRUGGLING RELIEF EFFORT IN IRAN

Iran's response to the crisis along its Kurdish-dominated western border – where the earthquake was most severe and at least 500 people died - on the other hand, seems to be

Though Iran's Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei delivered a message of condolence, ordered first responders to hasten to help those trapped under the rubble and declared a national day of mourning, the relief effort has been plagued with problems, even two weeks after the quake.

Some issues are logistical. The affected Kurdish areas are

mostly remote and mountainous, making victims difficult to reach. But a lack of coordination between the Iranian Red Crescent and military forces has also slowed the rescue effort.

Even so, Foreign Minister Javad Zarif has rejected offers of

international assistance from the U.S., Israel and others. On Nov. 13, he tweeted, "We are grateful for global expressions of sympathy and offers of assistance. For now, we can manage with our own resources."

Iran's history of repressing its Kurdish population has sparked ointed criticism of the government's earthquake response

Many Kurds feel abandoned. "Why do they [the Iranian regime] send aid to Lebanon, Palestine, Syria but not us?" said one victim from Sarpol Zahab in a YouTube interview. "It must be because we are Kurds that the Iranian government is not helping us." A Facebook page called "Kirmashan" has become the voice of quake-affected people in Iran, as well as a campaign criticizing the government for its lack of response

Adding to the political complexity of the tragedy is the fact that many of the dead lived in the Mehr Housing, affordable units opened in 2007 by former Iranian President Mahmud Ahmadinejad. During a visit to earthquake-affected areas, President Hassan Rouhani acknowledged that government-built structures had collapsed while private constructions remained standing and vowed to "find the culprits."
On Nov. 14, Iran's national day of mourning for the earth

quake, four national newspapers and several local newspa-pers published front-page headlines in the Kurdish language. This rare move of solidarity with the Kurds broke unwritten law in Iran, where minority languages are technically allowed but forbidden in practice.

CROWDFUNDED HELP

In the absence of effective government aid, individuals and nonprofit organizations are stepping in to help Iranian earth-quake victims.

Several athletes – including the Kurdish Olympic weightlifter Kianoush Rostami – have put their gold, silver and bronze med-als on auction to raise money for earthquake victims in Iran.

One Tehran University professor, Sadegh Zibakalam, used crowdfunding to raise more than US\$300,000 less than 48 hours after the quake. Acknowledging a widespread lack of faith in government, he traveled to the area to supervise aid distribution himself.

Relief efforts in the United States have also run up against politics. Tohid Najafi, a Detroit-based medical professional, raise \$200,000 in donations, largely from the Iranian-American community. But in sending the money to Iran he ran afoul of U.S. sanctions.

He is not the only one who's struggled to get relief funds past the Kafkaesque processes of the U.S. Treasury Departnent and into Iran.

For long-suffering Kurds, as the age-old Kurdish adage goes: "The Kurds have no friends but the mountains." While this devastating quake may have made the Kurds some new friends, at least for the time being, neither the central governments of the region, the U.S. nor even the unstable mountains of Iraq and Iran are among them.

Why Silicon Valley wants you to text and drive

As self-driving cars come closer to being common on American roads, much of the rhetoric promoting them has rhetoric promoting them has to do with safety. About 40,000 people die on U.S. roads ev-ery year, and driver errors are linked to more than 90 percent of crashes. But many of the big-gest advocates of autonomous vehicles aren't car companies looking to improve the safety of their existing products. Huge backing for self-driving technol-ogies is coming from Silicon Valley giants like Google and Apple.

Those of us who have studied the relationship between tech-nology and society tend to look more carefully at the motivations behind any technological push. In this case, it's clear that in addition to addressing safety concerns, Silicon Valley firms have a strong incentive to create a new venue for increasing the use of their digital devices. Every minute people spend on their mobile phones provides data – and often money to tech companies.

At present, digital devices and driving are in conflict: There are serious, often fatal, consequences when drivers use smartphones to talk or to text. Regulators and safety advocates look to resolve that conflict by banning phone use while driv ing – as has happened in vir-tually every state. But the tech companies are taking a different approach. The obvious answer for Silicon Valley is creating an automobile in which continuous cellphone use no longer poses a threat to anyone

NOT A NEW IDEA

The idea of a car so capable a driver is not needed isn't new. As far back as the 1950s, the Saturday Evening Post ran an illustration imagining a family playing a board game (in a convertible!) as the car conducts itself down the road. When self-driving cars actually take to the streets in large numbers, today's families likely won't be playing Scrabble – though Words With Friends and other mobile games are a near certainty. Every passenger is likely to be using a mobile device.

In recent years, the amount of time adults spend on their mobile devices (beyond actual phone calls) has grown rapidly. At the moment, it's around four hours a day for the average adult in the U.S. However, that rapid growth is likely to slow down as people run out of time that's available for them to use their devices.

Unless, of course, there's a new block of time that sud-denly opens up. The average American now spends about 48 minutes in a car every day, a sizable opportunity for increased cellphone use.

Chris Urmson, former director of Google's self-driving car project, made this interest clear in a 2016 talk, saying that autonomous vehicles offer the "exciting" possibility of creating "another room for you" where, among other activities, vou can watch videos. The investment analysts at Morgan Stanley have talked about autonomous cars becoming a "fourth screen" in Americans' lives (in addition to the home TV, personal computer and mobile phones or tablets). Perhaps the most explicit declara-tion of this interest came from Jia Yueting, co-founder of the budding Chinese automaker LeEco, when he said, "We see the car in the future as an extension of the internet, another entry point for us to sell webbased content and services."

So as the public conversa-

tion around autonomous cars highlights the safety advantages, don't forget the tech industry's powerful desire for more profits which goes well beyond simply saving us from ourselves. [the writer is Visiting Scholar, Van-


Party spokesman Hina Camder Tok said Congress President Sonia Gandhi approved the candidature

Union minister.

The ED registered the criminal case against based on the CBI FIR.

The CBI has already recorded the statements of Tejashwi and Lalu asad in this case.
The ED is investigate

ing the alleged "proceeds of crime" generated by the accused, purportedly through shell companies. according to the officials.

Others named in the CBI FIR include Vijay Kochhar, Vinay Kochhar

(both directors of Sujata Hotels), Delight Marketing company, now known as Lara Projects, and then IRCTC managing director PK Goel.

The CBI FIR was registered on July 5 in connection with favours allegedly extended to Su-jata Hotels in awarding a contract for the upkeep of the hotels in Ranchi and Puri and receiving premium land as "quid pro quo".

Too early to say low growth trend reversed: Manmohan Singh

SURAT, DEC 2 (PTI): Former Prime Minister Man-mohan Singh on Saturday welcomed the uptick in the Q2 GDP growth at 6.3 percent but cautioned that it is too early to say there is a reversal in decline seen in the past five quarters.

Singh also said at this singh also said at this rate it is not possible for the Narendra Modi government to equal UPA government's 10-year average growth rate.

"July-September quarter has registered a growth rate of 6.3 per cent. This is to be welcomed, but is too early to conclude that this represents a reversal of the declining trend seen in the previous five quarters," Singh, also a former finance minister, told a gathering of businessmen here.

"Some economists believe that the Central Statistics Office (CSO) has not adequately captured the impact of demonetisation and GST on the informal sector that accounts for about 30 per cent of the economy," he said. Further quoting econ-

omists M Govinda Rao and former chairman of National Statistical Commission Pranab Sen, the former prime minister said, "There is still considerable uncertainty about the growth of GDP. The RBI forecasts that growth in 2017-18 will pick up to 6.7 per cent. However, even if growth reaches 6.7 per cent in 2017-18, Modiji's four-year aver-age growth rate will still be only 7.1 per cent."

He claimed that the Modi government will not be able to equal the UPA government's year average growth rate.

"To equal the UPA's 10-year average, the economy will have to grow at 10.6 per cent in the fifth year. I would be happy if this were to happen, but frankly, I don't think this will happen,"

Singh quipped.

Reversing the five quarters of slowing GDP growth. Indian economy expanded by 6.3 per cent in July-September on the back of a pick-up in man-

ufacturing.

The senior Congress leader also said the GDP growth rate falling to 5.7 per cent in the first quarter of 2017-18 due to demonunderestimate" as the GDP did not capture the pain of the informal sector.

"Every one per cent loss of GDP annually costs our nation Rs 1.5 lakh crore. 72,500 crore this fiscal.

Severe weather kills 13 in Sri Lanka; cyclone Ockhi moving away

COLOMBO, DEC 2 (PTI): Powerful storms with heavy rains have killed at least 13 people in Sri Lanka, as a strong cyclone, which has wreaked havoc in southern India and posed threat to it, moved away from the island na-

tion today.

The severe weather conditions started on Wednesday night as gusty winds and rains battered parts of the country, and have so far affected more than 77,000 people, officials said.

Power supply, essential services and air traffic was disrupted in the stormy weather that left several buildings damaged and trees uprooted in its wake.

Five people have been reported "missing" and at least 13 people killed since Wednesday night due to rains and storm, the police said.

The Ambalangoda re-

gion in southern Sri Lanka has recorded the max-imum number of these deaths at four, they said.

According to the police, around 4,000 people were being housed in temporary relief camps in Ambalangoda.

The high winds and persistent rains which

hit the island nation on Wednesday later devel-oped into cyclone 'Ockhi', which has affected parts in southern Indian states of Tamil Nadu and Kerala and caused loss to life and property.

Sri Lanka's depart-

ment of meteorology to-day announced that 'Ock-hi' is now located some 850-km to the west of the island and is moving further away.

"Hence its effect for the country is expected to be lessen gradually," it said in a statement.

The department said "fairly heavy rains" or thundershowers were exern, Sabaragamuwa and Central provinces, while "strong gusty winds" in Ratnapura, Kaluthara and Galle districts.

In Flynn, Mueller unearths more lies - and a key witness

WASHINGTON, DEC 2 (AP): More

ident's son-in-law, Jared Kushner.
But Flynn's admission, and
all of the criminal cases thus far, ve not resolved the fundamental question special counsel Rob-ert Mueller is seeking to answer: Did Trump's campaign collude

with Russia to win the election?
Still, Mueller has left no doubt that his investigators amassed a wealth of knowledge about the contacts between Trump associates and the Russians, and they're looking to gather more facts from

nn, a new key cooperator.
By forcing Flynn's assistance, Mueller gains someone who can put him in the room with Trump and his closest advisers during the campaign, transition and the early days of the administration, times where Trump associates have ac-knowledged communicating with people connected to Russia.

In the hours after Flynn admitted lying about his contacts with a Russian government offi cial, two names surfaced as integral players in his actions.

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Kushner was identified as a "very senior" transition official, who directed Flynn to contact foreign governments, including Russia, about a UN Security Council resolution last December. And KT McFarland, who served as Flynn's deputy national security adviser, was a "senior" transition official involved in discussions with Flynn about what to relay to Sergey Kislyak, then Russia's ambassador to the US, about the response to US sanctions levied by the Obama administration. Kushner and McFarland

weren't named in court papers. But McFarland's involvement was confirmed by two former transition officials who spoke on condition of anonymity because they weren't authorised to publicly discuss the matter. One of the officials confirmed Kushner's involvement.

Flynn became the fourth person known to have been charged in Mueller's probe and the sec-

ond, after former campaign policy adviser George Papadopoulos to cooperate with investigators.

For both Flynn and Papadopoulos, prosecutors employed a similar, and textbook, strate-gy by accepting a limited guilty plea and turning the defendants

rinto government cooperators.

Papadopoulos and Flynn
both pleaded guilty to lying to
the FBI about their foreign contacts but not for their underly-

Still, Flynn's plea to a single felony count of false stateme made him the first official of the Trump White House to admit guilt so far in Mueller's criminal investigation as court papers made clear that senior Trump officials were aware of his outreach to Russian officials in the

weeks before the inauguration.

That revelation moved the Russia investigation, which has overshadowed Trump's agenda throughout the year, deeper

into the White House and raised questions about the accuracy of administration assertions that Flynn had misled Vice President Mike Pence and other officials about his calls with Kislyak.

Though prosecutors also had investigated Flynn lobbying work on behalf of the Turkish government, the fact he pleaded guilty to just one count, and faces a guideline range of zero to six months in prison, suggest prosecutors see him as a valuable tool and are granting a degree of leniency in exchange for his sharing what he knows. Flynn, a 58-year-old retired

Flynn, a 58-year-old retired US Army lieutenant general, accepted responsibility for his actions in a written statement: "My guilty plea and agreement to cooperate with the Special Counsel's Office reflect a decision I made in the best interests of my family and of our country."

Immediately after Flynn's plea, White House lawyer Ty Cobb sought to put distance be tween Trump and the ex-aide, saying, "Nothing about the guilty plea or the charge implicates anyone other than Mr Flynn."

For his part, the president ignored reporters' shouted questions as he welcomed the Libyan prime minister to the White House, and aides cancelled media access to a later neeting between the two.

He did appear briefly at an

afternoon White House holiday reception for the media, where he offered season's greetings and departed without addressing the Mueller investigation

Trump grew close to Flynn uring the campaign. The general was a vocal and reliable Trump surrogate, known for leading crowds in "Lock her up" chants regarding Democrat Hillary Clinton's use of a private email server. After his election victory, Trump elevated Flynn as his top national security adviser. But Flynn's White House

tenure was short-lived. He was forced to resign last February following news reports revealing that the Obama administration officials had informed the Trump White House that Flynn had discussed sanctions with Kislvak, a fact at odds with the public assertions of Pence.
The officials warned that the

discrepancy made the administration potentially vulnerable to Russian blackmail.

That FBI investigation was the basis of the court case against Flynn, centring on a se ries of conversations that Fly-nn had with Kislyak during the transition period.

Ed Sheeran is taking what many are calling his Grammy Award snubs in stride and is focusing on what matters to him more: His fans.

The British pop star was nominated for two 2018 Grammys for Best Pop Vocal Album for his 2017 album ÷ and Best Pop Solo Performance for "Shape of You." Many of his fans expected him to garner far more nods, as his album and its new singles have been very successful. In an in-terview on Ellen DeGeneres' YouTube series Ellen's Show Me More Show, posted online Friday, the host told Sheeran she is "outraged" that he was not nominated for Album of the Year or Song of the Year.

"My outlook on it is like, some years you have your year and some years you



don't have your year, maybe this year wasn't my year," the singer said.

Sheeran has won two Grammys before, including Song of the Year for "Thinking Out Loud" at the 2016 ceremony.

DeGeneres said the song


"Shape of You," which hit No. 1 on 10 charts worldwide, including in the U.S., did not leave her head.

"But that's the point, that's where you win," Sheer-an said. "That's where the validation comes from, where

Shall I ask Beyoncé? And in my head, I was like, 'She's gonna say no.' And then I was like, 'Well, you might as well ask.' And she said, 'Yeah,' so here we are."
