Labour **Department** revises minimum wages of workers

SUMMIT REPORT ANGTOK, 06 IUL:

The Department of Labour has raised the minimum rate of wages through a notification issued on 01 July.

As per the notification, minimum wages of Un-skilled workers has been hiked from Rs 220 to Rs 300, Semi-skilled from Rs 242 to Rs 320, Skilled from Rs 275 to Rs 335 and Highly skilled from Rs 319 to Rs 36 5. The revised rates are inclusive of Dearness Allowance, but exclusive of other concessions, if any, enjoyed by the employees.

The notification mentions that the revision follows the policy decision adopted in 2014.



Safe delivery of currency notes to Sikkim raises concern

GANGTOK, 06 JUL:

Besides essential commodities and fuel, the transport of currency to the State has also been affected by the Darjeel-ing unrest. Banks in the State are currently meeting the demand for cash through internal collec-tion and there is no cause for panic as of now.

However, safe deliv-ery of currency through the National Highway has become a matter of con-cern. This is also the first week of the month, when people queue up outside ATMs to withdraw their salaries.

"We haven't been able to receive cash as the West Bengal Government is denying the provision of security for the safe delivery of notes through the Highway owing to the current unrest in Dar-jeeling," informed a bank official, who did not wish to be named.

The West Bengal Police has said that they are not in a position to provide escort or secu-rity for the transfer of currency notes from Siliguri to Gangtok as they are busy maintaining la

Sikkim considering legal action against WB government: CM

The State is considering the possibility of filing a case against the West Bengal Government in the Supreme Court demanding compensa-tion for the heavy losses incurred by Sikkim due to unrest in West Bengal, said Chief Minister. Pawan Chamling today while addressing the Janta Mela function at Singithang, South Sikkim.

Sikkim has incurred losses of around Rs 60,000 crore over the past 32 years due to unrest in the neighbouring hills, he stated. Standing firm by his

letter to the Union Home Minister last month supporting the demand for Gorkhaland, Mr Chamling said, "It is their constitutional demand but the government has always ignored and suppressed their demand.

He added that Sik-



kim's development had been hit for three decades because of the pro-tests and blockades in

West Bengal.
Condemning the recent attacks on Sikkimese vehicles including trucks carrying essential sup-

plies and passenger taxis, the CM said, "It has been 32 years of suffering. The agitation and blockades have caused damages to the Sikkimese people. Our people are beaten up and our vehicles de-stroyed by goons."

Regarding the standoff between China and India at the Nathu La bor-der, he said, "We are constantly in touch with the Central Government regarding the matter. There is no need to panic."

However, he added

that the Karmapa's visit to Sikkim could be delayed due to rising ten-sion between India and China.

The CM further appealed to the people to stay 'united and avoid con-flict amongst ourselves'.

J&K Governor records concurrence to draft Presidential Order

SRINAGAR, JUL 6 (PTI): Jammu and Kashmir Gov-ernor N N Vohra today recorded concurrence to the draft Presidential Order of the state government required for implementing Goods and Services Tax (GST) in the state.

The J&K Asembly had resterday passed a resolution on implementing GST in the state while ensuring protection of the special status of the state.

Jammu and Kashmir is the only state which is yet to implement the GST which was rolled out in rest of the country on July 1.

"The governor has recorded concurrence to the draft Presidential Order, approved by the state gov-ernment, which relates to the application of certain provisions of the Constitu-tion of India, in a modified form, through an order of President which is issued under Clause 1 of Article 370 of the Constitution of India, an official spokes-man said here. He said these provi-

sions would enable the extension of the GST framework to the state and would facilitate en-acting of the Jammu and Kashmir Goods and Services Tax Act 2017. "The draft Presiden-

tial order contains safeguards to maintain the special status of Jammu and Kashmir and the legislative powers under the Constitution of Jammu and Kashmir." the

spokesman said.
"The Presidential Order will come into force immediately after it receives the assent of the President of India, he added.

The Presidential Or-der will be received under Article 370 of the Constitution that grants special status to the state

After the Presidential Order is received, the state government will take it to the Assem bly for enacting an SGST (state goods and services tax) bill, state's Finance Minister Haseeb Drabu

Iobs. admissions on fake caste certificates not valid: SC NEW DELHI, JUL 6 (PTI):

The Supreme Court to-day held that govern-ment jobs or admissions secured under reserved category by using forged caste certificates cannot be held valid or sustained

in the eyes of the law.

A bench of Chief Justice J S Khehar and Justice D Y Chandrachud did not concur with the findings of the Bombay High Court that if a person continues in service for a long period of time and the certificate is found to be fake at a later stage then, he or she may be allowed to continue in the service.

The verdict came on a batch of petitions in-cluding the one filed by the Maharashtra government against the Bombay High Court judgement.



Tension in Basirhat, WB govt says situation under control

KOLKATA, JUL 6 (PTI): Fresh tension was reported in West Bengal's Basirhat area today forcing the police to lob tear gas shells and resort to baton charge even as the state government decided to ban some organisations for allegedly instigating people.

"There may be some reports of small inci-dents, but the situation is under control," a senior official at the state secre-tariat asserted.

"Fresh tension brewed up at Basirhat town and station area after the communal clashes in Baduria in the district.

Police had to lob teargas shells and resort to baton charge to disperse an unruly crowd," a senior police officer said.

Police and BSF per-

immediately sonnel rushed to the area to bring the situation under control, he said.

The state cabinet de-cided to ban the organisations after they were allegedly found instigating people in communal riots, a state minister said.

It was also learnt that if these organisations try to hold any meeting or rally, they will have to inform the police and seek

prior permission.

"Police will run a check on their records and then only give per-mission for holding ral-lies and meetings," the minister said.

HAIFA, JUL 6 (PTI): Prime Minister Narendra Modi today saluted the Indian soldiers who laid down their lives during the World War I while protecting the Israeli city of Haifa from the Ottoman Empire forces and said the sacrifices made by them is a mark of enduring bond between the two nations.

Modi visited the Indian cemetery in Haifa along with his Israeli coun-terpart Benjamin Netanyahu on the last day of his visit to Israel and laid wreaths at the site.

Gopal Baglay tweeted.

He also unveiled a plaque commemorating Major Dalpat Singh, known as the 'Hero of Haifa' for his critical role in the liberation of the city.

The situation has prompted the state government to open 128 relief camps with Chief Minister Sarbananda Minister Sarbananda Sonowal taking stock of the situation, a govern-ment release said.

Get Involved, or Live With the 'Politics'

Politics is not inherently 'bad', but politics in everything is unhealthy

is ironic that people will continually foist leader-It is ironic that people will condition, ship roles in even social and cultural organizations on politicians, and then complain that the leaders are playing politics. When politicians get involved things are bound to be 'politicised.' While there is nothing wrong in career-politicians taking up social, cultural or environmental causes, it is also true that political presence in such initiatives compromises the core issue since the debates invariably digress to personal attacks and arguments eventually get adjusted to consolidate vote-banks. One sees such approaches in the current clash of ideas between pro and anti Stage-IV groups in North Sikkim, and this being Bhanu Jayanti season, ask around the organizing committees and they will attest that while a politician heading the group opens doors for funds and assistance, his/ her political position also shuts down some options for purely political reasons.

Does that mean that politicians be distanced from concerns of the society? They cannot, because it is the people that politicians represent and their involvement should ideally be automatic and spontaneous. But involvement should not immediately translate to influence. Maybe a conscious decision should be taken to not have them head apolitical organizations or efforts, especially so in a Sikkim where, unfortunately, political positions are too straitjacketed. Those who raise an issue might have no political affiliations, but the only response they receive is from political circles. As mentioned earlier, there is per se nothing wrong with political presence, what disturbs is that this invariably is the only involvement that stakeholders receive. This is not only about protests, even required social interventions await political patronage to reach deliverance. What people sacrifice when they invite a politician to head, say a Bhanu Jayanti organizing committee, is the opportunity to felicitate fiery writers who have captured not just the mood of the people but also their readership with their incisive literary skills sharpened in the whetstone of anti-establishment sentiments. You invite a politician to get involved in aid and relief and of course political affinities will influence beneficiary lists. Get them to head social movements and you cannot complain if the debate targets people instead of ideas and argu-

Why, really, should environmental concerns be the preserve of only the affected people receiving outside support from Opposition parties who will attach themselves to anything challenging the establishment? Why should ways and means to improve the quality of education [we talk of solutions here, not criticism] be deliberated only in seminars and workshops initiated by the State Government? Or, why should the proper functioning of cooperatives or promotion of organic farming be an obsession only of the establishment?

Those who rue the 'over politicization' of the affairs of the State need to also recognize that 'politics' is merely occupying the vacuum created by the absence of a coherent Civil Society. In an almost instinctive reaction, Sikkim looks towards the Government [and the very thinly separated ruling party] to deliver not only development, but also to engineer social reforms, and the Opposition to lend weight to dissenting voices. This is a common situation across the country, but most parts of the nation also have a reasonably mature civil society which moderates the voices and issues in the public domain. This civil society is sorely missed in Sikkim. In its absence come inferred fears and postured stands, both rather unhealthy trends. Surely, there must be many individual members of the Sikkimese society who notice the absence of a community feeling/ response at times. Is the State, or even the capital, anywhere near getting itself a Civil Society? A Civil Society is not an organised body that one can register and elect office bearers to; it is a level where individuals start thinking of more issues than just those that their immediate circles experience. It is a state where the society's reaction to issues and developments is spontaneous and free of prejudices. Simply put, it is a society that cares and is willing to get involved. Till Sikkim can do that, it will have to live with 'politicization' of all its affairs; not something that is inherently wrong or evil, but still something that leaves the public space incomplete and the people only partially represented.

Border walls are ineffective, costly and fatal-but we keep building them

t seems like every month brings news of another border wall going up.
Europe's Baltic States, worried about invasive

neighbours, are raising a fence along their eastern frontier. Meanwhile, in Asia, Chinese President Xi Jinping is calling for the building of an iron wall around the Xinjiang region

In Latin America, Ecuador appears to have be-gun erecting concrete panels along the Peruvian state line. In Africa, a barrier between Somalia and Kenya, made of barbed wire, concrete and posts, is nearing completion.

This is a far cry from the illusion generated by the fall of the Berlin Wall — and by the utopian dream of a world without borders that emerged in

THE WALL: A NEW STATUS QUO IN IN-TERNATIONAL RELATIONS

At the end of the Cold War there were just 15 walls delimiting national borders; today, with 70 of them in existence around the world, the wall has become the new standard for international relations

With the proliferation of border walls and their normalization in the rhetoric of U.S. President Donald Trump, democracies have adopted the tactic as though it were a classic policy tool in foreign rela-tions and defence.

And yet these rampant fortifications come at a hefty price, as much for the governments and international relations as for the local economies and populations affected. For those most vulnerable, for the middle class, for those pushed out by the walls (Saskia Sassen's "expelled" peoples), the cost

As symptoms of a rift in the world order, as manifestations of the failings of international cooperation, these barriers also come at a cost to those they shut out — the world's "untouchables".

The reality is that, despite being entrenched in international law, their freedom of movement is not as valuable as others', each passport carrying its own set of rights

THE FINANCIAL COST OF BORDER WALLS

First, we must consider the financial cost of border walls. Each one is a boon to the security and construction industries (many players from the fo having adapted to changes in the post-Cold War defence market).

The experience in United States provides many examples of the cost of a massive border infrastructure. This typically involves not just a physical wall with stone foundations, posts, and even concrete panels, but also razor wire, cameras, heat sensors, novement detectors, drones and patrol personnel, dogs or robots, among other things

That's because a wall, by itself, doesn't really work: it's easy to scale it, put up a ladder, place ramps over the barrier to get a car across, fly drugs over it with drones, or use hydraulic fracturing to dig out narrow tunnels to circumvent it.In fact, in 2009, the U.S. Government Accountability Office placed the cost for building just a fence along California's border at between \$1 million Cdn and \$6.4 million Cdn per kilometre. In harsher terrain jurisdictionally and geologically, such as the Texas state line, the building cost could be as much as \$21 million a kilometre.

Maintaining it for 20 years will cost an estimated \$8.5 billion; it is therefore a massive public in-frastructure, akin to a giant highway, that eats away at a country's public finances and, in turn, at overall disposable income (whether funding comes from public sources or in part from private sources).

So this financial burden is also an economic weight that drags down the country's aggregate income as well as the local economy. The latter, often significantly affected by the slowing down and re-

defining of cross-border activity, legal or otherwise, is sometimes put on life support in the form of an influx of military or patrol personnel, construction rews and staff for related services (restaurants,

WALLING OUR COUNTRIES IN: THE HUMAN COST

There is also a human component to the economic cost. There is, in fact, a proven correlation between the fortification of borders and the number of peo ple who die trying to cross them. In the United States, where local advocacy groups actively seek out and disclose this information, 6,000 deaths in the desert) along the border have been recorded in the last 16 years

Since the tightening of European policies, the Mediterranean has become a "dead sea," to paraphrase cartographer Nicolas Lambert, who maps tragedies befalling migrants in the region, where the number of deaths continues to climb despite a decline in the total number of crossing attempts.


In fact, to get across a fortified and tightly controlled border, the available routes are often far more treacherous, pose greater threats and require resorting to smugglers, who are sometimes linked to organized crime groups like the Mafia.

Violence is amplified when the border is militarized. First and foremost, because such militarization legitimizes the perception of the border zone as a theatre of operations, a war zone, where para-military groups feel justified to act, as in their deployments along the Hungarian border.

Secondly, by adding military personnel or army veterans to border patrol forces (they account for a third of such teams in the U.S.), the tactics come to match those used in war zones, bringing with them patent impunity and violence, as reported by authors Todd Miller. Reece Iones and others.

Lastly, by forcing clandestine border crossing to become even more hidden, by pushing migrants deeper underground, these measures reinforce the power of Mafia and organized crime groups, and increase the violent extortion or coercion of vulnerable migrants (through kidnappings and ran-som demands, for example). From the borders of Southeast Asia to the Sahel Region, and from the corridors leading from Central America to the U.S. or from Turkey to continental Greece, it is the most vulnerable migrants who suffer the repercussions of the world's border walls.

Thus, sexual assault has become a common event in women's migratory journey, with 80 per cent of them being assaulted along their route to the United States; the NGOs they encounter along



Constructing walls also comes at a political price. Since putting up a wall is a one-sided act — the farthest thing from the bilateral reasoning behind drawing state lines — it induces a separation from the neighbouring state, rather than fostering co-operation with it.

The rift created by the wall sends shock waves through other facets of the relationship between the nations. In the case of Trump's wall, the cost of the split with Mexico is high, given this trade partner's importance to the U.S. economy as well as to the other bordering states. Within the migratory channels that are increasingly popular with refu-gees, the neighbouring states often serve as filters. Erecting a wall at the border may influence not just

how these other countries play their role as advanced border checkpoints, but also how they set their own defence and security policy, which can sometimes lead to a form of extroversion, that is, a kind of appropriation of the discourse of the walled State at the expense of the national interests of the other.

Canada is not immune to any of this, either. In fact, in response to the presidential transition team's request for information on the borders in December 2016, U.S. Customs and Border Protection confirmed the need to fence off more than 640 kilometres of the country's southern border, but also some of its northern border between Canada and Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, New York, Montana, Idaho and Washington

FUNDAMENTALLY FLAWED

On June 3, The Economist published an article on the need to build a wall at the border with Canada,

mainly to prevent drug smuggling.

Yet no wall has ever succeeded in permanently eliminating contraband. Ramps, catapults, drones, tunnels, submarines, mules or even corrupt border guards can always undermine its effectiveness; or the traffic merely shifts elsewhere. A wall simply pushes us farther from getting to the heart of the matter, from addressing the root problem, from

treating the illness and not just the symptoms.

As border walls erode the potential for international cooperation and community, the world's problems keep growing: food insecurity, ethnic conflicts, environmental crises, climate change, massive displacements of people. Many different problems bring nations to build walls, but we should recognize them as pointless facades that must, in the end, come tumbling down.

Trumps show how damaged personal brands can harm the business

econversation.com

The relationship between a high-profile figure and a business brand is fraught with difficulties, as the ascent of the controversial and contentious Donald Trump to the American presidency demonstrates every day. Despite

his political victory, Trump's business brand, as well as Ivanka Trump's, is suffering. The Trump Tower and properties in Toronto are ridding themselves of his name, and earlier this year, some retail giants pulled Ivanka Trump's fashion label from their shelves. More recently, her fashion line is facing increasing scrutiny.

How is a personal brand related to business brand? And what should be the optimal distance between the two?

My research findings suggest that we should all first understand the benefits and liabilities of a person who dominates a brand's presence such as Trump, Omnimedia's Martha Stewart, Virgin's Sir Richard Branson or Apple's Steve Jobs.

The person is dynamic, nuanced,

with his or her own set of values, com-



petence levels and vision. At the initial stage of the business brand-building, a person, particularly a charismatic founder with unique qualities, can represent an excellent shortcut to the construction of a business brand. Consequently, the business brand is not just a name or a logo. It is personified or exemplified by an intriguing, charismatic, successful and often idiosyncratic leader.

Nonetheless, the benefits of having a high-profile leader generally cease when the business grows and starts scaling. When a business brand has garnered substantial public attention and dominant market share, it gradually and necessarily evolves into an entity independent of its founder and leader.

PEOPLE MAKE MISTAKES THAT CAN HURT THE BRAND

The corporation's performance is mostly driven by teams and employees. Its major stakeholders are not just the brand's leader and founder, but investors and the public. And at that point, a personality closely associated with the brand can become a liability, because human beings are fallible. They are susceptible to scandal (Martha Stewart), they pass away (Jobs) or they become widely disliked or distrusted in the face of controversy (the Trumps).

The negative spillover resulting from a personal brand's scandal or crisis onto the business brand is not only costly and potentially disastrous

business to manage and control the fallout.

Based on my brand coaching experience over the past decade, I'd advise a business brand at the growth stage to cut the cord from the founder's brand and enter the phase of depersonalization. The trick is not to "kill" or deteriorate the personal brand but instead, to make that person immortal by propagating their legacy, values, achievements and caveats of their stories, and morphing that person into a symbolic meaning.

In this new world, the person in that case ceases to be a dominating force or a risky spectre hovering over the business. The person has become the rooting foundation of a business brand and its source of meaning. A person's visions, missions, thinking and responsibilities, when shared and enacted by the teams and employees, will become the soul of a business brand — and a source of inspiration, not embarrassment of the type that is plaguing the Trump brand. 2,513 pilgrims leave for Amarnath from Jammu

Vajpayee, not Congress, set the ball rolling on GST: Jaitley

NEW DELHI, JUL 6 (PTI): Finance Minister Arun Jaitley today said the first move towards the landmark GST was made by the Atal Bihari Vajpayee government 17 years back, and not the Congress.

The Vajpavee government constituted a task force which in 2003 submitted a report say-ing central and state levies should be merged or unified into a Goods and Services Tax (GST), said at a public rally on

the new tax regime.

Jaitley said the gov
ernment changed in 2004 and the incoming Congress saw merit the argument mooted in

the report.

The then Finance
Minister P Chidambaram in 2006 spoke of GST and set 2010 as deadline for rolling out the new indirect tax regime, he said, adding he could not implement the plan.

In 2011, the then Fi-nance Minister Pranab Mukheriee, who is now President, duced a Constitutional Amendment to bring

GST.
But the UPA could not get all states onboard be-cause they could not resolve how to compensate losses to manufacturing states arising because of GST being a destination-based tax, he said.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi, he said, was clear from day one that India has to be unified economically and devised not just a compensation formula, which was put in the Constitution Amendment Bill, but also got all the 29 states and six union territories on board to agree to the new tax.

India has 29 states and seaven union terri-tories but the Finance Minister apparently did not include Chandigarh as that Union Territory has not be consulted separately because it is part of Punjab and Haryana in

such negotiations.

Jaitley said Prime
Minister Modi not just got the bill approved in the Parliament but also got states and UTs to pass their laws, with Jammu and Kashmir assembly being the last to pass a resolution yesterday adopting GST.

Taking a dig at the Congress, he said the GST was in the party's election manifestos but at the last moment it did flip-flops as it was not sure if the new tax regime would pay off.

India rise to 96 in FIFA rankings, best in two decades

The Indian football team on Thursday rose to the 96th spot in the latest FIFA rankings, its best-ever in the last two decades and the second best overall. As far as Asia is concerned. India are the 12th highest ranked team in the continent, while Iran lead the

chart at the 23rd spot.
India's best-ever FIFA ranking till date stays 94, which was attained in February 1996, while 99 was India's second- best, achieved in November 1993 The national team has been on an upsurge with a string of impressive results leading to a climb of 77 places over the last two years.

The team has now won 13 of its last 15 matches and is unbeaten in the last eight games (including the unoffi-

cial match against Bhutan).

India were ranked 171
when Stephen Constantine took over as national coach for the second time in February 2015 and slipped further 173rd in March 2015 in to 173rd in March 2015 in the FIFA ladder even before



the gaffer could have his first game in charge against Nepal, which India eventually won 2-0 on aggregate.

Congratulating the team, All India Football Federation president Praful Patel said:

"It's a giant leap of faith for Indian football. Two years back, we were 173 and now we have reached our second best FIFA ranking ever. The leap signifies the potential of Indian football. Congratu-

lations to the national team boys, the coach, the staff and all in AIFF."

AIFF general secretary Kushal Das stated: comes as a huge boost ahead of our next AFC Asian Cup qualifying match against Macau on September 5, 2017. Hats off to the team for giving it their all in achieving this milestone. Qualifying for the AFC Asian Cup 2019 stays our top priority." Conand reigning world champions Germany have overtaken Brazil to be the top team in the world and are followed by Argentina at third spot, Portugal and Switzerland.

Constantine said: "When I took over, I had mentioned that my target was to bring India below 100. I am happy to have played a small part in this process. Kudos to the boys, the staff and a big thank you to my colleagues in AIFF for supporting us all throughout. 175 newly-appointed IAS officers to study BHIM, GST & Aadhaar

NEW DELHI, IUL 6 (PTI): As many as 175 newly-recruited IAS officers will be given exposure to the Centre's flagship programmes, including the Goods and Services Tax (GST), the BHIM app for cashless transactions and Aadhaar.

These officers have been posted as assistant secretaries in different central government departments, except the Prime Minister's Office (PMO), from July 3 to September 29.

Their posting is part of an initiative started by the govern-ment to groom bureaucrats at the Centre before they move to their respective cadre states. All officers of the Indian Administrative Service (IAS) are allotted cadres which could either be a state or group of states. The officers are supposed to start their career in their respective cadre The assistant secretaries have

been allocated work relating to flagship programmes or initia-tives of the ministry concerned. They will also be given exposure to the government's important initiatives such as the GST with particular reference to Saksham (a technological system by the Central Board of Excise and Customs),

Constitutional amendments, rules and regulations, working of the GST council and GST Network, the information technology backbone of the GST, an order issued by the Department of Personnel and Training (DoPT) said.

These officers will also be given exposure on the move towards "less cash econowith emphasis on digital transactions such as unified

payments interface, Aadhaar enabled payment systems and Bharat Interface for Money (BHIM), it said. "Each ministry/department is

already taking action for smooth implementation of the GST in their area of work as well as to promote digital transactions. The assistant secretaries must be fully involved in these activities of the ministry/department," the DoPT said.

There were reports that Modi and Xi may meet on the sidelines of the G20 Summit to resolve the standoff.

Chinese Foreign Ministry Spokesman Geng Shuang expressed hope that "India can immediately withdraw the border troops to the Indian side of the boundary to uphold the peace tranquillity of the China and India border areas".

"I think this is the pre-condition for any meaningful peace talks between the two sides," he told a media briefing here when asked about the meeting between Modi and Xi on the sidelines of the G20 summit.



and open trade. Other top leaders expected to be present top leaders include Russia's Vladimir Putin, Turkey's Recep Tayyip Erdogan, France's Emmanuel Macron and Theresa May of the UK.

Trump -- including on issues like climate change

The 'Group of Twenty' is made up of 19 countries and the European Union. The countries are Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Canada, China, France, Germany, India, Indonesia, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Russia, Saudi Arabia, South Africa, South Korea, Turkey, the UK and the US.

While Hamburg hap-pens to be city of birth for the Summit host and German Chancellor Angela Merkel, it is also known as an 'anti-establishment bastion' of Left-wing radicals.

At least 30 protests are expected to be held here ahead of the Summit that may attract thousands of people, includ-ing from anti-capitalist groups. Local authorities expect these protests to remain peaceful and around 15,000 police personnel will be deployed to protect the venue. Besides, nearly 4,000 personnel will keep a tab on the airport and train

security. While counter-terrorism and economic re-forms will dominate the discussions, the 12th G20 Summit will also discuss issues like free and open trade, climate change, migration, sustainable development and global stability

Modi, who is reaching Hamburg after a visit to Israel, said in a Facebook post before his depar-ture from India that he is looking forward to "engaging leaders from other G20 countries on the vital issues affecting our world today that have a bearing on economic growth, sustainable development, and peace

ity".

The ister said the world leaders will review

progress on decisions since the Hangzhou Sumprogress mit last year and delib-erate on issues of terrorism. climate. sustainable development, growth and trade, digitisation, employment, health, migration, women's em-powerment, and partner-

ship with Africa.

He further said he is looking forward to the opportunity to meet leaders on the sidelines of the Summit to exchange views on bilateral matters of mutual interest. The Summit will begin tomorrow with Merkel welcoming the world leaders, followed by 'G20 Leaders' Retreat' where the topic of dis-cussion will be 'fighting terrorism'.

The first working session will be on 'global growth and trade', followed by the second session on 'sustainable development, climate and energy'. The world leaders will also attend a musical concert tomor-row evening, followed by a dinner for them and their spouses.

The second day of

the Summit will begin with the third working session on 'partnership with Africa, migration and health' while the fourth working session will be on 'digitisation, women's empowerment and employment'. These two will be followed by a closing session on Saturday evening, after which a joint statement by the G20 leaders will be issued.

US warns using military force against

UNITED NATIONS, JUL 6 (PTI): The US today warned of using military force in response to North Korea's "reckless" launch of a ballistic missile and blasted China and Russia for "holding the hands" of the reclusive nation's "vicious dictator" Kim Jong Un.

North Korea

"It is a dark day because yesterday's actions by North Korea made the world a more dangerous place. Their illegal mis-sile launch was not only dangerous, but reckless and irresponsible. It showed that North Korea does not want to be part of a peaceful world," US Ambassador to the UN Nikki Haley said at an emergency Security Council meeting here yesterday following the launch of the interconti-nental ballistic missile by North Korea.

The device, launched yesterday, was capable of reaching Alaska, and the Korean Central News Agency quoted leader Kim Jong-Un as saying the confrontation with the US had entered the "final stage".

Indian-American Haley warned that the US "is prepared to use the full range of our capabilities" to defend itself and its allies.

"One of our capabilities lies with our considerable military forces. We will use them if we must, but we prefer not to have to go in that direction. We have other methods of addressing those who threaten us and of ad-dressing those who supply the threats. We have great capabilities in the area of trade," she said.
