He further said that he or his government can never mislead and eye-

never mislead and eye-wash the Sikkimese. "It must be made clear that the Sherpa community enjoys res-ervation as part of BL community in the Sikkim Assembly. However, in other aspects like land. the Sherpas do not enjoy the same rule as Bhutias and Lepchas," he added.

The CM clearly maintained that land rules governing the BL community emanates from the Constitution of India and only the Parliament has the right to amend any rule.

Coming down heavily on the opposition, the CM stated that there is a constant effort to instill fear among the Bhutia Lepcha community.

He further stated that if the Sherpa community members are ready, his government is ready to bill to protect their lands

from sale and purchase

to other communities.

Defending the bill that was passed in the Assembly today, the CM hailed it as historic.
"This bill will protect

soil and address of all Sikkimese," he said.

On the newly intro-

duced 20% seat reservation to BL communi-ties in Panchayats, he countered opposition's allegation of not giving adequate representation to the two communities and stated that this is based solely on population in accordance with the Constitution.

The CM while criticiz-

ing opposition's view of his government dividing the Sikkimese popula-tion on communal lines, stated that it is the Con stitution of India which has made ST, SC and OBC communities and it is the good intention of the government to give equal rights and justice to all communities of Sikkim.

The concluding day of the summer session of the Sikkim Legislative Assembly had opposi-tion MLAs, Sonam Lama and RN Chamling raising questions on some crucial Bills.

Sangha MLA, Sonam Lama, who is also the chief coordinator of Sikkim Krantikari Morcha. while discussing the Sikkim Panchayat [Amend-ment] Bill, Bill No. 12 of 2018, alleged that parts of the Bill were "contra-

dicting" in nature.

He alleged that the Bill was not in line with the proportion of rep-resentation enjoyed by the Bhutia-Lepcha com-

munity in the Legislative Assembly where the community has 37.5% reservation while at the Panchayat level it has been proposed at 20%.
The Sangha MLA also

demanded reservation for Sangha in Panchayats. He further raised the

Limboo-Tamang and Nepali seats reservations issues and staged a walk out from the House.

While replying to his questions, Minister for Rural Management and Development Depart-ment, SB Subedi, criticized the opposition MLA for staging a walkout even before hearing a re-

ply from the government. He held that the Sikkim Panchayat [Amend-

ment] Bill is population based to ensure proportionate reservation and it was with the intention of the government to protect the interest of the Bhutia-Lepcha community that this Bill has been

As for the LT seat reservations, he added that the Centre is positive and the resolution for the same has been passed many a times.

Responding to the point raised by the Sang-ha MLA, Chief Minister Pawan Chamling also stated that reservation to Sangha in the Panchayats is practically not feasible as the Sangha community is sparsely populated

being used by hosts India as a preparatory ground for the AFC Asian Cup, to be held in January next year, and a win in the fi-nal will surely boost their confidence going ahead. India had blanked Kenya 3-0 in the league game at the Mumbai Football Arena, which

was skipper Chhetri's 100th appearance in national colours. And the India captain made the game memorable by scoring a brace. They will look to rep-licate the performance of

their league game against the African side again in the summit clash, which the organisers have claimed to be a 'sold out' match.

The hosts are the side

to beat this tournament as they have through-out played an aggressive brand of football.

But the Stephen Con-stantine coached team cannot take Kenya lightly as they have defeated New Zealand 2-1 and blanked Chinese Taipei 4-0 last night.

Constantine will ensure that his best playing XI will take the field tomorrow after his strategy of making seven changes initially in the game against New Zealand backfired as the team lost 2-1.


For India, all eyes will again be on Chhetri, who has 62 goals to his credit and will last in credit and will look to add to his tally.

Sikkim, Justice Meenakshi Madan Rai, who is also the Executive Chairperson of SSLSA, attended the inaugural function as chief guest in the presence of Judge, High Court of Sikkim, Justice Bhaskar Rai Pradhan. as guest of honor along with Lokayukta, State of Kerala and former Chief Justice, High Court of Sikkim. Road Rage

To make roads safer, prioritise policing against rash driving

colleague driving to Gangtok recently was nearly Arun off the road by a speeding taxi raging to over take. The road was broad and there was no incoming traffic, hence the reason why the taxi missed brush ing against the colleague's car by a whisker made no sense. And then there was another close shave, this time with a private SUV. Talk to others who drive on the highway, or even the capital roads at night, and many more of such anecdotes will tumble out. But pause with the episodes a while, and it all makes sense. It is born from the power of engines which have too many more horse-powers than the hands on the wheels can control. Add the knowledge of too many traffic jams on the roads and the race to rush gets explained, not justified though. Combine this is with the less than adequate training most people re ceive before they become drivers, and safe driving is no longer about just your driving skills and depends as much on the proficiency controlling vehicles all around you. This also still being tourist season, when it comes to passenger vehicles, the stress of traffic jams and the opportunity to squeeze in an extra trip further contribute to the rashness that is becoming too common on the roads here.

It is obvious that the National Highway and the side

roads is in desperate need for an extra helping of tar, but our drivers, especially those of taxi vehicles, seem to be in even more urgent need of an extra class on driving etiquette and a reintroduction to road safety. The spate of accidents, most minor and the occasional fatal crashes, point to a total lack of concern for driving rules, traffic rules and most importantly, pedestri-an and passenger safety. Available technology ensures that engine failure, that favourite excuse of "steering lock," can no longer be blamed for mishaps, every single one of them occurs due to rash and reckless driving. And then there are the many close shaves that every commuter experiences on a regular basis. Every single one of them could have ended much worse, and many of the involved drivers will eventually become of part of a pile up eventually. The noticeably high number of head-on collisions bears out that most accidents occur due to reckless speeding. And this applies to the recklessness which rides on two wheels as well.

One cannot ignore the fact that all recent accidents have involved either taxis of two wheelers. It is thus advisable that we tighten our seat belts and snap on the helmets more snuggly and they tease out the reasons for such frequent road mishaps. Accidents are the culmination of "bad habits", and we are not speaking drugs here although that is also a factor in many cases That drivers do not observe basic traffic rules unless there is a cop around is common knowledge. Overtaking from the wrong side of the road, failing to signal when stopping or stopping abruptly, stopping at 'unauthorised' points... By themselves, these do not lead to major mishaps, but once the keenness to avoid traffic and safety rules becomes instinctive, larger risks are run once the city limits are crossed. The above mentioned reasons would suggest that our drivers tend to manifest a casual approach to their task and/ or are oblivious to the rules of the road - which are hard to digest. The motor vehicles department, after all, issues licenses to the drivers after some tests and checks which are now mandatory. How come drivers still emerge from their training wet behind the ears?

If we are to feel safe on the roads we must all make

a conscious effort at righting our wrongs. Drunken or rash driving should be heavily penalised and not just those vehicles parked on the wrong side of the road. The issuing of driving licenses should be made stricter and cracking down on rash driving prioritized because once this becomes a habit everyone around is put in harm's way.

Most people don't benefit from vaccination, but we still need it to prevent infections

A recent article in The Conversation questioned whether we should all get flu vaccinations, given 99 people would have to go through vaccination for one case of flu to be prevented.

But this position ignores the purpose of immunisation programs: whole populations of people need to take part for just a small number to benefit. So how do we decide what's worth it and what's not?

DECISION-MAKING IN PUBLIC HEALTH

When we consider a treatment for a patient, such as antibiotics for an infection, we first consider the evidence on the benefits and potential harms of treat-

ment. Ideally, this is based on clinical trials, where we as-sume the proportion of people in the trial who respond represents the chance an indi-vidual patient will respond to treatment.

This evidence is then weighed up with the individual patient. What are the treatment options? What do they prefer? Are there factors that might make this patient more likely to respond or have side effects? Is there a treatment alternative they would be more likely to take?

In public health, the frame work is the same but the "patient" is different – we are delivering an intervention for a whole population or group rather than a single individual.

We first consider the efficacy of the intervention as demonstrated in clinical trials or other types of stud-ies. We then look at which groups in the population might benefit the most (such as the zoster vaccine, given routinely to adults over 70 years as this group has a high rate of shingles), and for whom the harms will be the least (such as the rotavirus vaccine, which is given before the age of six months to reduce the risk of intussusception, a serious bowel complication).

Compared to many other public health programs, immunisation is a targeted intervention and clinical trials tell us they work. But programs still need to target broad groups, defined by age or other broad risk fac-tors, such as chronic medical conditions or pregnancy. RISKS AND BENEFITS OF INTERVENTIONS

When considering vaccination programs, safety is which considering vaccination programs, salety very important, as a vaccine is being given to a generally healthy population to prevent a disease that may be uncommon, even if serious.

For example, the lifetime risk of cervical cancer is one in 166 women, meaning one woman in 166 is diagnosed with this cancer. So even if the human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine was completely effective at preventing cancer, 165 of 166 women vaccinated would not benefit. Clearly, if we could work out who that one woman was who would get cancer, we could just vaccinate her, but unfortunately we can't.

It's only acceptable to vaccinate large groups if clinically important side effects are low. For the HPV vaccine, anaphylaxis (a serious allergic reaction) has been reported, but occurs at a rate of approximately one in 380,000 doses.

An even more extreme case is meningococcal vaccination. Before vaccination, the incidence of meningococcal serogroup C (a particular type of this bacterium) infection in children aged one to four years old was around 2.5 per 100,000 children, or 7.5 cases for 100,000 children over three years.

Vaccination has almost eliminated infection



with this strain (although other serotypes still cause meningocal disease). But this means 13,332 of 13,333 children didn't benefit from vaccination. Again, this is only acceptable if the rate of important side effects is low. Studies in the US have not found any significant side effects following routine use of meningococcal vaccines.

This is not to say there are no side effects from vaccines, but that the potential side effects of vaccines need to be weighed up against the benefit.

For example, Guillain Barre syndrome is a seri-

ous neurological complication of influenza vaccina-

tion as well as a number of different infections.

But studies have estimated the risk of this complication as being around one per million vaccina tion doses, which is much smaller than the risk of Guillain Barre syndrome following influenza infection (roughly one in 60,000 infections). And that's before taking into account the benefit of preventing

other complications of influenza. WHAT OTHER FACTORS NEED TO BE CONSIDERED?

We also need to consider access, uptake and how a health intervention will be delivered, whether through general practices, council programs, pharmacies or school-based programs. Equity issues must also be kept in mind: will this

close the gap in Indigenous health or other disadvantaged populations? Will immunisation benefit more than the individual? What is the likely future incidence (the "epidemic curve") of the infection in the absence of vaccination?

A current example is meningococcal W disease, which is a new strain of this bacteria in Australia. Although this currently affects individuals in all age groups, many state governments have implemented vaccination programs in adolescents.

This is because young adults in their late teens

and early 20s carry the bacteria more than any other group, so vaccinating them will reduce transmission of this strain more generally.

But it's difficult to get large cohorts of this age group

together to deliver the vaccine. It's much easier if the program targets slightly younger chil-dren who are still at school (who, of course, will soon enter the higher risk age group).

In rolling out this vaccine program, even factors such as the size of schools (it is easier to vaccinate children at high schools rather than primary schools, as they are larger), the timing of exams, holidays and religious considerations (such as Ramadan) are also taken into account

For government, cost effectiveness is an important

consideration when making decisions on the use of taxpayer dollars. This has been an issue when considering meningococcal B vaccine. As this is a relatively expensive vaccine, the Pharmaceutical Benefits Advi-

sory Committee has found this not to be cost effective. This is not to say that meningococcal B disease isn't serious, or that the vaccine isn't effective. It's simply that the cost of the vaccine is so high, it's felt there are better uses for the funding that could save

While this might seem to be a rather hard-headed decision, this approach frees up funding for other interventions such as expensive cancer treatments, primary care programs or other public health interventions.

care programs or other public health inter WHY IS THIS IMPORTANT?

When we treat a disease, we expect most people will benefit from the treatment. As an example, without antibiotics, the death rate of pneumonia was more than 80%; with antibiotics, less than 20%.

However, vaccination programs aim to prevent disease in whole populations. So even if it seems as though many people are having to take part to prevent disease in a small proportion, this small proportion may represent hundreds or thousands of cases of disease in the community.

Science in film: from the meaning of time to the marvels of fungi

One of the wonderful things about science is that it makes us think about what we value, or what is meaningful to us. It's not just an objective dispassionate inquiry into the material world, it's also a large part of the story about what it means to be human.

That dimension is often missing in science education, but it is brought home beautifully within the collection of films that represent the winners of the 2018 SCINEMA International Science Film Festival, to be screened at various capital cities across Australia this month.

I managed to catch up with the fes-tival in Brisbane this week, so I'll mention some films that do this exceptionally well.

THE MEANING OF TIME

In a playful way, Ninaad Kulkarni gorgeously animates a variety of interviews with people who are asked what time means to them.

The film KCLOC brings out an amaz-

ing thing about time - it's a physical quantity, sure, but it just doesn't seem as interesting to ask people what they think about mass or distance. It's a fascinating point that suggests something profound about the human experience with and in time.

More dramatically, in Timelapse writer and director Aleix Castro ex-plores the idea of an implanted chip that blocks mundane work tasks from

our consciousness, promising to free us from the daily grind.

Workers move around zombie-like until their work period (perhaps a month) ends. They then return to awareness and enjoy an extended lei-sure time. A month's work seemingly passing in a second, and then a week off - and they are well paid for it!

ployers and workers, but what about those periods during which we are working but our loved ones are not? And would we be happy losing large chunks of our lives from memory, even if those memories are boring? How would we learn perseverance, or recognise the exciting times if we have no

contrasting experiences?

Maybe we'd want to extend those down times to household chores as well. How much of our lives would we end up living?

One of the most powerful impressions on me was made by iRony, Radheyda Jegatheva's adaptation of his poem Seven Billion.

Hand-animated (which adds to the film's intensity) and extraordinarily creative, iRony explores our relation ship with the technology that is meant to connect us, but can rob us of joy and purpose. It's another call to focus on how we spend our time.

If you have a child or friend who seems to have lost themself in social media, iRony would be a superbly targeted intervention.

WHY FUNGI MATTERS

Among the shorter films, the signifi-cantly longer The Kingdom – How Fungi Made Our World sounds, to the uninitiated like me, a good opportunity to order another wine.

I just had no idea. Is there really fungus on everything we touch? Do we really breathe in fungi with every breath? (Yes, in case you were wonder-

ing.) And is the "g" hard or soft?
Fungi, it turns out, are the unifying evolutionary thread for all complex life on land. No fungi, no us.

Not only do they enable the proliferation of vascular plants over the world, creeping between and within their cells to provide essential nutrients, but they also connect them through giant networks of filaments Wood Wide Web.

Unlike plants and cold-blooded an-imals, mammals seem to be generally fungus-free zones, as fungi do not like the higher core temperatures of our bodies. That exclusion gave mammals the advantage over other animals immediately after the Cretaceous-Tertiary mass extinction about 66 million years ago, resulting ultimately in the appearance of humans millions of

But it's not that we don't get on with fungi at all. Not only did they gift us penicillin (and fungi might also be a solution to new resistant strains of bacteria - superbugs), but consider the yeast that gives us bread... and beer.

For the religiously inclined, it would not seem untoward to imagine that God at some stage said "Let there be fungi", and all was good.

Grassroots, written and produced by Tegan Nock and directed by Frank Oly, is an outstanding example of how citizens can put scientific findings to use. They don't always have to wait for a technology to be processed, packaged and delivered to their door by others.

Farmer Guy Webb became convinced of the ability of fungi (is there nothing they can't do?) to sequester carbon in very significant amounts when added to crops, potentially re-ducing the impact of global warming. Rather than wishing "they" would

of one person's belief - growing into a group's belief - that individual action based on existing science can have

huge consequences.

ue evident in the preview of Planet Earth II – Grasslands, produced and directed by Chadden Hunter. A beautifully filmed and written piece that is breathtaking in how it uses the newest camera technology to make the audience feel they are moving along with the organisms rather than seeing them from afar.

Also visually stunning was the

modelling shown in a Spanish produc-

tion called Virtual Humans.
A supercomputer creates a virtual copy of a body that could allow medical treatments and physical therapies to be tailored to an individual's exact requirements. All done in the safe confines of cyberspace.

It was also thought-provoking to realise how far away we are from being able to model a mind.

THE FUN OF IT ALL

The mindbogglingly mathematical Lily Serna takes us through a Catalyst episode, produced and directed by David Symonds and Nicholas Searle, about using mathematics in deci-

sion-making. Serna's lack of pretension around her abilities and her joy in sharing the benefits of it is admirable, and she explains some very sophisticated mathe-

matics with simplicity and clarity.

I wonder if we all have the confidence in mathematics to live by the decision-making algorithm she provides.

It's well worth a try, I reckon.

The festival is a great expression of why science matters, not just in the utility it provides but in the values and meaning it highlights. Facts and values don't just make good entertainment, together they make good science.

Violence-hit Shillong limps back to normalcy

SHILLONG, JUN 9 (PTI): A week after clashes broke out between local Khasi people and Sikh community members, Shillong is gradually returning to normalcy with no fresh violence reported from anywhere in the city prompting authorities to relax the daytime curfew. The capital of Me-

ghalaya was gripped by violence since May 29 following an altercation between Sikh residents in the city's Punjabi Lane area, and Khasi drivers of state-run buses. More than 10 people, including policemen and CRPF personnel, were injured in the clashes.

As in past two days, curfew was relaxed for nine hours in the 14 "vulnerable areas" from 7 am to 4 pm today. Au-thorities will decide on further relaxation of curfew, Deputy Commis-sioner, East Khasi Hills, P S Dkhar said.

In other parts of the city, prohibitory orders have been lifted from



stored at 8 pm, he said. Mobile phone messag-

ing service has been rein-stated but access to mobile internet remains suspended, the official said.

The inflow of tour-ists to Shillong popularly known as "Scotland of the East" has been increasing and vacationers in droves can be seen at tourist hot spots like cathedrals and museums.

JNU student leader Umar Khalid files police complaint over death threats

New Delhi, Jun 9 (PTI): INII student leader IIma Khalid has filed a complaint with the Police that he and Guiarat's Independent MLA Jignesh Mevani had received death threats from a man who identified himself as fugitive gangster Ravi Pujari, a senior official said today.

Khalid tweeted that he has asked for police

"Filed a complaint with @DelhiPolice re-garding Ravi Pujari's death threat to Jignesh and me. He said that I am on his HIT LIST! I have asked for police protection, given the fact that this is the same person who had previously also issued similar threats of killing me in Feb 2016 (sic)," he said.

Yesterday, Khalid approached the police with a complaint over the threats and a case was registered, the police official said, adding that they are investigating the matter.

The student lead-er said that he was informed by Mevani about the threats, and he has not received any call himself till now.

"Mevani has been re-ceiving death threats for the last two-three days. In one of the calls he received, the caller had mentioned my name too. He had mentioned that if we don't stop giving speeches we would be killed.

"Mevani informed me and I approached the police. A case has been registered and they said that they will do a threat assessment and take a call on providing police protection," Khalid told PTI.

Mevani too had alleged yesterday that he has received death threats from Pujari.
When asked wheth-

er the calls were being received in relation to the arrests made by the Pune Police on June 6 in connection with the Bhima-Koregaon violence, he said, "I am not aware about the context. Pujari has not mentioned that he was calling in that context. I don't feel it is a coincidence that the calls (to Mevani) started coming from that day (the arrests were made).

Elgar Parishad, oranised to commemorate 200 years of the Koregaon Bhima battle, was held on December 31 at Shaniwarwada. It was attended by Mevani, Khalid along with Rohit Vemula's mother Radhika Vemula and Bharip Bahu-jan Mahasangh President Prakash Ambedkar.

In 2016, Khalid's fa-ther Syed Qasim Illyas Rasool had filed a police complaint, claiming that he has received a phone call "threatening to kill" his son if he doesn't leave the country.

APML general sec-retary Muhammad Amjad said Musharraf will come back before the election but did not give a final date. He said that the party will field candidates for several seats.

The Supreme Court its ruling asked Musharraf to appear in person on June 13 and promised that he will not be arrested despite

The apex court has been criticised by leading politicians, including ousted premier Nawaz Sharif, for allowing Musharraf to contest de spite his disqualification.

Musharraf came to power in a bloodless coup in 1999 and ruled until 2008 when forced to resign. He has been living in Dubai since March 2016 after he was allowed to leave the country for medical

Secret Facebook deals gave some firms special user data access: report

WASHINGTON. IIIN (PTI): Social media giant Facebook had customised data-sharing deal with certain companies giving them special access to user's records, a media report said today.

Street Journal report.

Facebook said it al-lowed a "small number" of partners to access data about a user's friends after the data was shut off to developers in 2015. Many of the extensions lasted weeks and months, Facebook said.

It "isn't clear when all of the deals ultimately expired or how many companies got extensions," the daily said.

Cambridge Analytica, a data-mining firm, is embroiled in a scandal purportedly over its work for US President Donald Trump's 2016 campaign and is alleged to have improperly obtained information from tens of mil-lions of Facebook users to develop political ads.

Despite Trump, transgender veterans honor their own

ARLINGTON (US), JUN 9 (AFP): President Donald Trump has made clear his opposition to transgender Americans serv-ing in the military, but that didn't deter transgender veterans from laying a wreath on hallowed ground: the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

Trump's July 2017 tweet that people who have undergone gender transition should not serve "in any capacity" in the US armed forces raised alarm throughout a move ment that had been counting gains in recent years.
"We, as transgender

people, bled like anyone else," Yvonne Cook-Riley, a US Air Force veteran and a spearhead of the transgender rights move-ment, told AFP after the Friday ceremony, as she walked a tree-lined path through rows of white headstones in Arlington

National Cemetery. The Vietnam war vet-

eran was among a dozen members or friends of the Transgender American Vet-Association (TAVA) who witnessed the somber ceremony at the marble sarcophagus on a hill over-looking Washington.

For years Cook-Riley, who began her transition after returning from Vietnam, advanced the cause of transgender rights.

She shared in the jubilation of the June 2016 announcement, under Barack then-president Obama, that ended the ban on transgender people serving openly in the US military.

The gay rights move ment was ascendant too, and the marginalized transgender community was suddenly seen with

a sympathetic eye. Just one year earlier, in April 2015, Caitlyn Jenner --the former Bruce Jenner of 1970s Olympic decathlon fame -- had come out as a transgender woman.

Then Trump's tweet changed the momentum.

In March, the presi-

dent rolled back his blanket transgender ban, but his shift of responsibility to Defense Secretary

Jim Mattis left open the prospect that people who have undergone gender transition treatment are still barred from serving.

Aside from Trump's announcements, Republican-controlled legislatures in 10 states intro-duced measures in 2017 restricting transgender individuals' access to gender segregated bath-rooms consistent with their gender identity.

"It scares the hell out

of me, because somebody is going to get killed," Cook-Riley said, com-menting on the current atmosphere.

Another icon of the movement, Phyllis Frye
-- a former Army lieutenant and the country's first openly transgender judge -- said nothing less than a "Democratic takeover" of Congress in this year's mid-term elections will ease the communi-

ty's difficulties.

"In November, people need to get off their butts and vote," she said.

Before the wreath-laying, Frye and Cook-Riley participated in a TAVA conference to help trans-gendered service-memgendered service-mem-bers gain greater access to appropriate health care.

Ironically the gather-

ing took place in the same hotel as a conference of evangelical Christians pressing for more conservatism from politicians in Washington. Some in the

transgender gathering decided to wander over. "How can it hurt?" mused Nella Ludlow, a clinical professor at Washington State University who once flew fighter

jets for the US Air Force.
Ludlow, 56, playfully snapped selfies with a cardboard Trump cutout. But she also met some of the conservative attend-

ees, and hoped their interactions "caused people to rethink" their impressions of transgender veterans.

But her concerns for fellow trans ser-vice-members only amplified the seriousness of the wreath-laying.

"They're serving their country, and they don't know, will they be fired six months from now?" Ludlow asked. "I think they deserve better."

The number of transgender troops among the approximately 1.3 million active duty US service members is fair-ly small, with estimates topping out at 15,000.

With uncertainty about transgender troops sim-mering, several members of Congress this week wrote Mattis to "reject" his policy recommendations to bar transgender service except under limited circumstances.

Celebrity chef Anthony Bourdain, the opinionated host of Parts Unknown on CNN, was found dead Friday in a French hotel room.

The brash and often controver

sial chef and writer took his own life at age 61, CNN reported.

Bourdain's suicide is the sec-

ond by a celebrity this week. Fashion designer Kate Spade hanged herself in her apartment Tuesday.

"It is with extraordinary sadness we can confirm the death of our friend and colleague, Antho-ny Bourdain," CNN said in a writstatement Friday morning. ten statement Friday morning. "His love of great adventure, new

friends, fine food and drink and the remarkable stories of the world made him a unique storyteller. His talents never ceased to amaze us and we will miss him very much. Our thoughts and prayers are with his daughter and family at this incredibly difficult time."

Bourdain was filming an episode of Parts Unknown in Stras-bourg, France, at the time of his death, the BBC reported. He had joined CNN in 2012 after spending several years hosting No Reservations on the Travel Channel.

His friends and colleagues reacted with shock.

Chef Gordon Ramsay tweet-ed that he was stunned and saddened. Ramsay wrote that Bourdain "brought the world into our homes and inspired so many people to explore cultures."

Bizarre Foods host Andrew Zimmern wrote that a piece of his heart "is truly broken." Zimmern said "the sad cruel irony is that in the last year, Bourdain had never


