Apart from having taken away a portion of the bound-ary wall, the erosion is now threatening one of the hostels in the school and has already led to the evacuation of the affected section.

The reservoir waters are barely three to four feet away

from the said section of the hostel which has now been evacuated. The school authorities are at pains in trying to accommodate the 24 boys in the remaining dorms. And while that may have been an inconvenience they could weather through, the continuing threat of unchecked erosion being caused by the reservoir has everyone worried.

Yesterday, the area MLA had visited the affected school and assured that emergency measures will be undertaken, and although the reservoir lev-el was reduced today, a longterm solution will have to be contemplated with proper rim treatment.

As for the immediate measures, DC-West, Kapil Meena, while speaking to Summit-Times about the JNV, Rohtak, situation, informed that the company in question, Dans Energy Pvt Ltd, has been given "strict instructions to complete temporary accommodation temporary construction within five days."

This temporary arrangement, the DC has ordered, should be "proper and adequate and per the requirements of the JNV school to be decided in consultation with

the Principal".

The project developer, he informs, has also been directed to install floodlights by the riv-erside from where all residential areas are to be vacated.

The school, the DC informs has been closed for 10 days starting today as a precaution-

ary measure.

"Also, we have asked the company to immediately lower the reservoir water level to a safe limit," the DC informed. The DC, it is informed, has

convened a meeting to address the situation at the school and issued formal orders.

"All precautionary measures to be taken by company and they have informed the water levels have been reduced today afternoon plus agreed to take up the works from tomorrow," the DC informs.

#### Uncertainty hangs over border trade as Doklam impasse continues

even years of smooth India and China via Nathula on the eastern front of Sikkim, has been disrupted by the escalating tension between the two countries on Doklam a short distance away.

Border trade had re-sumed in 2006, 44 years since it was stopped in the wake of the 1962 war between India and China.

The army guarding the border has asked traders to refrain from carrying out trade across the border, Customs sources informed SummitTimes, adding that it was the Chinese who first stopped their traders from crossing the border without informing their Indian counterparts.

The Indian army then also decided to stop traders from crossing the border into Tibetan Au-tonomous Region in view of the ongoing tension beween the two neighbours.

Trade across the border was last reported on 24 July, it is learnt.

Trade was affected during the month of July since the road between Gangtok and Nathula was

blocked at several places.
While the Border Roads Organisation [BRO] was undertaking upgradation work for more than two weeks during which time trade could not take place, road blockades due to landslides on the Chi-nese side extended this period for another 10 days, informed traders

in Gangtok. Indo-China border trade was seeing a steady growth during the last three years as per the statistics maintained by the Central Board of Excise and Customs Sherathang Station. Last year, exports and imports both had touched a record eight digit figures.

As the ongoing tension between the two Asian giants continues, uncertainty looms large over the resumption of Indo-China border trade.

## Syok Bhir landslide: A Year Later

The Syok Bhir landslide which oc-curred exactly 365 days ago on 13 Aug last year cut off several villages under the three Gram Panchayat Units of Upper Dzongu like Sakyong-Pentong, Tingvong and Lingthem-Lingdem. On the anniversary of the landslide

and creation of what is now known as the Mantam lake, let's take a look at what has been done so far.

RELIEF AND REHABILITATION

Immediately after the disaster, the government pressed into action relief and rehabilitation measures while Non Governmental Organizations flocked to the area to provide services to the affected people. Countless functions were organized to raise funds and help the cut off villages in every way possible. Essential commodities were being ferried on motor rafts across the lake.

An alternate route to connect Lingdem and Kayam was opened recently. The gov-ernment also sanctioned the bridge from the shutdown in the hills, sources said. Kayam to Tingvong since the bridge at Mantam was submerged in the lake.

#### THE MANTAM LAKE CONUNDRUM


The people of the cut off villages have demanded that the lake be retained for tourism purposes hoping to open up livelihood opportunities for the people of the area in the field of tourism. They also filed a petition seeking retention of the lake in the High Court of Sikkim. On the other hand, the task force committee set up by the government advised draining of the lake for the safety of the people living downstream.

#### On Mantam Slide's First Anniv

#### Make a resolve to prepare better, notice auicker

 $\P$ oday, 13 August 2017, marks the first anniversary Today, 13 August 2017, Illands the illands of the calamitous Mantam landslide when the en tire cliff opposite 4th Mile Mantam in Dzongu, North Sikkim, suffered a slope failure and collapsed. The bhir thankfully crumbled at a safe distance from the nearest habitation and did not cause any casualties. It was however still close and dramatic enough to be captured on smartphones and the frightening visuals and videos were circulated widely on social media The material loss at Mantam, a habitation of around 24 homes, has been substantial. The settlement was battered by extremely violent headwinds of the landslide, suffered through the confusion of zero visibility caused by the fine-as-talc dust kicked up by the landslide and watched Rongnue Chu, a friendly stream, turn into 3km long lake dammed up behind a nearly 300 feet high dam of debris. Parts of 4th Mile, Mantam, now sit under the lake and road connectivity to villages on the far bank remains disrupted. The trauma of the displaced is not as worrisome as it could have been because most of the residents had another home at a higher location or have managed alternative since then. But they did lose a lot to the slide and even if the material loses can be compensated. unquantifiable damages of having lost surroundings they had grown used to or classrooms the children were familiar with must have left a void.

The incident has also remained in the headlines with the High Court having stepped in to keep track of relief and rehabilitation and experts brought in to decide the fate of the dammed up lake. These processes are underway and while one could argue that more local expertise should have been involved in the form of traditional knowledge holders and geological experts who know this terrain intuitively from the years spent working here, we leave that argument for a later time. Hopefully, the present set of experts will find a workable solution, but since that has not happened yet, maybe the concerned agencies will seek out better counsel once the rains have subsided.

In the meanwhile, what is important if for the lessons slammed home by the slope failure at Mantam are learnt well. The slope had started peeling away on 02 August 2016 itself, collapsing in massive heaps which sprayed sludge and spatter on the road on the opposite hill. Despite this dramatic display, the disaster management "experts" remained oblivious to the potential disaster in the making. This process continued for ten days, until, on the eleventh day since the slide had begun, on a clear cloudless day, the entire cliff face tore away and crashed a heap. Sikkim has traditionally been natural disaster prone, its geography and weather patterns collaborating to deliver as many fearsome slides and rattles as the bounties that one finds here. And yet, for a place which has a natural disaster for every season, Sikkim remains staggeringly casual about preventive measures. It is also very poor when it comes to mitigation, and it is thanks only to its small size of affected people and big hearts of conscientious officers that the fallouts of disasters are not worse than what they have potential for. When it comes to preparation, the first requirement should be area-specific list of potential threats, preventive measures to keep those threats at bay and a checklist of things to do in worst-case-scenarios and a sequence by which the level of alarm and preparedness goes up. These should be worked in detail down to the ward level, but have obviously not been done at any scale anywhere beyond documents which speak in vague generalities. These documents should be given to village elders to draft because they know the history of natural disasters in their respective areas, still remember the traditional safeguards the communities had worked into their lifestyles. and, well, will be motivated more by the greater common good than the civil-works priorities which might influence the less public-spirited consultants. That is really where Sikkim's preparation for disasters needs to begin. That has not happened yet.

Today, as Sikkim marks the first anniversary of the Mantam collapse, it could resolve to prepare itself better, notice things quicker and know what to do.

## Even a 'minor' nuclear war would be an ecological disaster felt throughout the world

S President Donald Trump's vow to hit North Korea with "fire and fury like the world has never seen" is an unveiled threat to unleash America's most potent weapons of mass destruction onto the Korean peninsula. According to many defence analysts, the risk of nuclear confrontation over and the Indian subcontinent has also increased in recent years.

In a more hopeful turn of events, 122 countries voted in June to adopt the United Nations Treaty on the prohibition of nuclear weapons in New York. The "ban treaty" will make nuclear weapons ille-

gal for ratifying countries, and many see it as an opportunity to kick start a renewed effort towards multilateral disarma ment. Supporters of the treaty argue that even a limited, re-gional nuclear war would produce a catastrophic and global humanitarian crisis.

Equally, other analysts suggest that the reality is not as severe as is often depicted. In March this year, Matthias Eken, a researcher of attitudes towards nuclear weapons, wrote in The Conversation that their destructive power "has been vastly exaggerated" and that one should avoid overusing 'doomsday scenarios and apocalyptic language". Eken argued that nuclear

weapons are not as powerful as often described, on the basis that a 9 megaton thermonuclear warhead dropped over the state of Arkansas would only destroy 0.2% of the state's surface area. He also ob-

served that more than 2,000 nuclear detonations have been made on the planet without having ended human civilisation, and argued that if we want to mitigate the risk posed by nuclear weapons, we must not exaggerate those risks.

Eken's sanguine approach towards nuclear weapons stands in contrast to the more dramatic rhetoric of global humanitarian catastrophe and existential threats to humanity. So what is the basis for the latter?

## NUCLEAR WAR IS ALSO A WAR ON THE ENVIRONMENT

of nuclear detonations on the environment and

climate. The most-studied scenario is a limited regional nuclear war between India and Pakistan, involving 100 Hiroshima-sized warheads (small by modern standards) detonated mostly over urbar areas. Many analysts suggest that this is a plausible scenario in the event of an all-out war between the two states, whose combined arsenals amount to more than 220 nuclear warheads.

In this event, an estimated 20m people could die within a week from the direct effects of the explosions, fire, and local radiation. That alone is catastrophic – more deaths than in the entire of World War I.

But nuclear explosions are also extremely likely to ignite fires over a large area, which coalesce and inject large volumes of soot and debris into the

Although a nuclear conflict involving North Korea and the US would be smaller, given Pyong yang's limited arsenal, many people would still die and ecological damage would severely affect global public health for years. Additionally, any nuclear conflict between the US and North Korea is likely to increase the risk of nuclear confrontation involving other states and other regions of the world.

#### IT GETS WORSE

A large-scale nuclear war between the US and Russia would be far worse. Most Russian and US weapons are 10 to 50 times stronger than the bombs that destroyed Hiroshima. In a war involv-

ing the use of the two nations' strategic nuclear weapons (those intended to be used away from battlefield, aimed at infrastructure or cities), some 150m tonnes of soot could be lofted into the upper atmosphere. This would reduce global temperatures by 8°C the "nuclear winter" scenario. Under these conditions, food production would stop and the vast majority of the human race is likely to starve.

Eken suggests that both the

scenarios of a limited regional nuclear conflict and an all-out war between US and Russia are unlikely. He may be right. How-ever, both scenarios are pos-sible, even if we can't reliably quantify the risk. Continued adversarial rhetoric from both Donald Trump and Kim Jong-un about the use of nuclear weap ons is not making this possibility any smaller.

What we can say, is that the

doctrine of nuclear deterrence represents a high-risk gamble. Nuclear weapons do not keep us safe from acts of terrorism, nor can they be used to fight sea level rise, extreme weather, ocean acidification, biodiversity loss or antimicrobial resistance.

This is why so many medical and public health organisations have been campaigning to make nuclear weapons illegal. Regardless of how many need to be exploded to cause a catastrophe or produce an existential threat to humanity, and regardless of the risk of this happening, the adage that "prevention is the best cure" remains the case when it comes to these abhorrent and dangerous weapons.

## How eclipses were regarded as omens in the ancient world

On Monday, August 21, people living in the continental United States will be able to see a total solar eclipse.

Humans have been alternative-amused, puzzled, bewildered and sometimes even terrified at the sight of this celestial phenomenon. A range of social and cultural reactions accompanies the observation of an eclipse. In ancient Mesopotamia (roughly modern Iraq), eclipses were in fact regarded as omens, as signs of

#### Solar and lunar eclipses

For an eclipse to take place, three celestial bodies must find themselves in a straight line within their elliptic orbits. This is called a syzygy, from the Greek word "súzugos," meaning yoked or paired.

From our viewpoint on Earth. there are two kinds of eclipses: so-lar and lunar. In a solar eclipse, the moon passes in between the sun and Earth, which results in blocking our view of the sun. In a lunar eclipse, it is the moon that crosses through the shadow of the Earth. A solar eclipse can completely block our view of the sun but it is usually a brief event and can be observed only in certain areas of the Earth's surface; what can be viewed as a total eclipse in one's hometown may just be a partial eclipse a few hundred miles away.

By contrast, a lunar eclipse can be ewed throughout an entire hemisphere of the Earth: the half of the surface of the planet that happens to be on the night side at the time. ECLIPSES AS OMENS

More than two thousand years ago, the Babylonians were able to calculate that there were 38 possible eclipses or syzygys within a period of 223 months: that is, about 18 years. This period of 223 months is called a Saros

cycle by modern astronomers, and a sequence of eclipses separated by a Saros cycle constitutes a Saros series

Although scientists now know that the number of lunar and solar eclipses is not exactly the same in every Sa-ros series, one cannot underplay the achievement of Babylonian scholars in understanding this astronomical phenomenon. Their realization of this cycle eventually allowed them to predict

the occurrence of an eclipse.

The level of astronomical knowledge achieved in ancient Babylonia (southern Mesopotamia) cannot be separated from the astrological tradition that regarded eclipses as omens: Astronomy and astrology were then two sides of the same coin.

RITUALS TO PREEMPT ROYAL FATE According to Babylonian scholars, eclipses could foretell the death of the king. The conditions for an omen to be considered as such were not simple. For instance, according to a famous astronomical work known by its initial words, "Enūma Anu Enlil" – "When (the gods) Anu and Enlil" – if Jupiter was visible during the eclipse, the king was safe. Lunar eclipses seem to have been of particular concern for

the well-being and survival of the king.
In order to preempt the monarch's fate, a mechanism was devised: the "substitute king ritual," or "šar pūhi." There are over 30 mentions of this ritual in various letters from Assyria (northern Mesopotamia), dating to the first millennium B.C. Earlier references to a similar ritual have also been found in texts in Hittite, the Indo-European lan-guage for which we have the earliest written records, dating to second-millennium Anatolia – modern-day Turkey.

#### SAVING THE KING

In this ritual, a person would be chosen to replace the king. He would be dressed like the king and placed on the throne. To avoid confusion with a

real coronation, all this would occur alongside the recitation of the negative omen triggered by the observa-tion of the eclipse.

The real king would keep a low profile and avoid being seen. If no additional negative portents were observed, the substitute king was put to death, therefore fulfilling the pro-phetic reading of the celestial omen while saving the life of the real king. This ritual would take place when an eclipse was observed or even predicted, something that became possible to do in later periods. The presence of this ritual among the corpus of Hittite texts in second-millennium Anatolia has led to the assumption that it must have existed already in Mesopotamia during the first half of the second millennium B.C.

#### A LEGEND

Although omens predicting the death of the king are already known for this earlier period, the truth is that the main basis for such an assumption is an interesting story preserved only in a much later, first-millennium composition known by modern scholars as the "Chronicle of Early Kings." According to this late chronicle,

a king of the city of Isin (modern Išān Bahrīyāt, about 125 miles to the southeast of Baghdad), Erra-imitti, was replaced by a gardener called En-lil-bani as part of a substitute king ritual. Luckily for this gardener, the real king died while eating hot soup, so the gardener remained on the throne

and became king for good.

The fact is that these two kings,
Erra-imitti and Enlil-bani, did exist and reigned successively in Isin during the 19th century B.C. The story, however, as told in the late "Chronicle of Early Kings," bears all the trademarks of a legend. The story was probably devised to explain a dynastic switch, in which the royal office

passed from one family or lineage to another, instead of following the usual father-son line of succession.

## LOOKING FOR MEAN-ING IN THE SKIES

Mesopotamia was not unique in this regard. For instance, a chronicle of early China known as the "Bamboo Annals" (Zhúshū Jìnián) refers to a total lunar eclipse that took place in 1059 B.C., during the reign of the last king of the Shang dynasty. This eclipse was regarded as a sign by a vassal king, Wen of the Zhou dynasty,

to challenge his Shang overlord.

In the later account contained in the "Bamboo Annals," an eclipse would have triggered the political and military events that marked the transition from the Shang to the Zhou dynasty in ancient China. As in the case of the Babylonian "Chronicle of Early Kings," the "Bamboo Annals" are a history of earlier periods compiled at a later time. The "Bamboo Annals" were allegedly found in a tomb about A.D. 280, but they purport to date to the reign of the King Xiang of Wei, who died in 296 B.C.

The complexity of human events is rarely constrained and determined by one single factor. Nevertheless, whether in ancient Mesopotamia or in early China, eclipses and other omens provided contemporary justifications, or after-the-fact explanations, for an en-tangled set of variables that decided a

specific course of history.

Four persons were killed in Sindhuli, four each in Jhapa and Sindhuli districts, three each in Banke, Morang and Panchthar districts and the rest others in different districts.

Hundreds of families have been displaced in the floods and landslides across the country.

## Flood situation worsens in Assam, 5 die; 4,500 families homeless in Tripura

New Delhi, Aug 12 (PTI): The flood situation in Assam wors-ened today, with five deaths re-ported while flash floods affected three districts in Tripura where at least 4,500 families were rendered

Mainly clear skies prevailed in the national capital with the maximum temperature settling at 34.9 degrees Celsius.

The minimum temperature was pegged at 27.7 degrees Celsius, a Met department official said.

The humidity level oscillated between 78 and 58 per cent.

According to a report by the Assam State Disaster Management Authority (ASDMA), two persons died in Dhemaji and one person each in Lakhimpur, Kokrajhar and Morigaon districts.

With these, the total number of persons losing their lives in this year's flood-related incidents

across Assam went up to 89.
ASDMA said 11 lakh people were affected in Dhemaji, Lakhimpur, Biswanath, Sonitpur, Baksa, Barpeta, Bongaigaon, Chirang, Kokrajhar, Dhubri, South Salmara, Morigaon, Golaghat, Jorhat, Majuli, Sivasagar, Charaideo, Dibrugarh and Tinsukia districts.

The ASDMA report said Dhubri was the worst-affected where 1.92 lakh people were hit, followed by Dhemaji where 1.51 lakh people have been affected by the calamity.

Currently 1,752 villages were under water and over one lakh hectare crop area have been damaged, ASDMA said.

The flood has damaged embank-ments, roads, bridges and other infrastructures in Dhemaji, Darrang, asagar, Majuli, Sonitpur, Lakhimpur, Barpeta, Baksa, Dima Hasao, Golaghat and Morigaon districts.

Three districts of Tripura were affected by flash floods due to inressant rains and at least 4,500 amilies were rendered homeless, official sources said.

More than 2.000 families were forced to take refuge in different government buildings as large part of the state capital and its low lying outskirts were inundat-ed, state Revenue Minister Badal Chowdhury, who along with Dis-trict Magistrate of West Tripura district, Milind Ramteke visited

the affected areas said. Chowdhury said the water was flowing above the danger level in Howrah river.

District Magistrate of Sipahija-

la Pradip Chakraborty said that at least 2,500 families were affected due to flood in the district and were sheltered in 60 relief camps opened in the government buildings.

Chowdhury said many parts

of Khowai district were also inundated and many people were ren-dered homeless.

Director of Meteorological department Dilip Saha said the regional weather station here recorded 116.55 mm of rains.

Very heavy rains continued to lash the sub-Himalayan districts of West Bengal with many places receiving extremely heavy precipitation leading to a deluge, the Met department said.

The highest rainfall in the state was recorded at Hasimara in Alipurduar district at 480 mm, it said. The West Bengal government

said it was tackling on war footing the flood in north Bengal, where it

has impacted five districts and inundated about 100 tea gardens.

"We have already opened con-

trol rooms and I am personally involved in monitoring and man agement. The state is working on a war-footing to tackle the flood situation in the region which is facing heavy rainfall," state irrigation minister Rajib Baneriee told PTI.

"Chief Minister Mamata Banes jee is monitoring the situation. All steps are being taken, including sending of relief materials," he said.

Coochbehar, North Dinajpur, Alipurduar, Jalpaiguri and Dar-jeeling are the five districts which have been affected by the flood.

About 100 tea gardens were re-ported to be affected across north Bengal in the flood and it was apprehended that tea production in the region would be less. Light to moderate and heavy

to heavy rainfall occurred in most places of north east, north central and north west parts of Bihar, Met office said. As per Met bulletin, Purnea reg-

istered 108.8 mm rainfall among four major cities during the day.
In Himachal Pradesh, moderate

rains occurred in some parts as mon-soon remained subdued and there was no significant change in maximum and minimum temperatures

Aghar was wettest in the state with 42 mm rains.

The maximum temperatures hovered around normal at most places in Punjab and Haryana.

Union Territory Chandigarh recorded a maximum temperature of 33 degrees Celsius.

In Haryana, Ambala recorded a maximum of 34.3 degrees Celsius.

In Punjab, Amritsar recorded a high of 36 degrees Celsius.

# Heartbroken Neeraj vows to come back stronger

PHILEM DIPAK SINGH LONDON, AUG 12 (PTI):

He can't really figure out what went wrong but rising Indian javelin thrower Neeraj Chopra has vowed to come back stronger by correcting the "flaws" that led to his unexpected early ouster from the World Championships here.
The 19-year-old Neeraj, the cur-

rent world junior record holder, had carried the hopes of the entire coun try but failed to make it to the final

He could not cleared the auto matic qualification mark of 83m. It was compatriot Davinder Singh Kang, who managed to make the cut, becoming the first Indian to qualify for the javelin throw final round in a World Championships.

"There is something lacking in my throwing, that is for sure. I don't know now whether it's a technical issue or some other factor. I have to find out and rectify it and come back stronger," Neeraj told PTI.

"I need some time to do that, to improve my technique. I have been taking part in competitions continuously for the last four-five months. Now I want some time for training to prepare myself for future events. I am waiting for the new coach to come," he added.

In the qualification round on



in his opening throw, 74 centimeters short of the automatic qualification mark.

Nerves got the better of the youngster in his maiden World Championships as he fouled his second attempt and then could only send the iron spear to 80.54m in his final effort to bow out of the

"I was confident that I would be able to touch 83m and get the auto matic qualification. I made a big effort in the first throw but it was short of 83m mark by a few centimeters.

Then in the second throw, I was going for the attack but I was off-bal-ance in the run up and fouled it. The third and final throw also came

"I got quite a good number of competitions and training before the World Championships and I should have qualified for the final round. I tried my best and I am disappointed that I could not do well," said the Haryana athlete who has a season's best of 85.63m and personal best of

Neeraj came without a coach as

holder Uwe Hohn of Germany is vet to join the national team. Hohn is still with the Australian team and he is expected to join as India javelin coach later this year.

"After (former coach) Gary

Calvert left, I have been mostly do ing training all alone. I am waiting for the new coach to come. A person who knows the techniques lets you do a lot of work. So I am waiting (for the new coach).

"In an ideal situation it would have been better to have a coach but that is not in my hands. It makes a difference if a coach who knows techniques tells you what to do," he

Athletes are allowed to bring their javelin in the World Champio ships, which is checked by the IAAF, but Neeraj did not have one as he came straight to London after competing in the Monaco leg of the Diaond League meetings on July 21.

"I came here straight from Mona-

co after the Diamond League there, so I could not bring my javelin. It is good if you come with your javelin with which you do practice.

"I took my javelin when I compet-ed in the Asian Grand Prix in Chinese Taipei and then I used my own javelin during the Asian Championships in Bhubaneswar also. Sometimes it makes a difference," said Neeraj.

# Bolt wins relay heats in his penultimate race

to his final race by anchoring Jamaica to the 4x100m relay finals with an easy win in the heats here on Saturday.

Running in his penulti-mate race of his illustrious career, Bolt eased past the finishing line as he helped the defending champions Jamaica win the second heat in 37.95 seconds, their season's best, to enter the final round with third best time.

The Jamaican quartet of Tyquendo Tracey, Julian Forte, Micheal Campbell and Bolt led the eight-team second heat from beginning to the end.

Experienced Yohan Blake, who finished fourth in the men's 100m final and failed to qualify for the final round in 200m, did not start in the heats but Bolt later said that he will return in the final race.

In his trademark style, Bolt grabbed the baton from rivals and slowed down while approaching the finish line to conserve energy for the finals.

The top three from each of the two heats and next two fastest finishers from the remaining qualify for the final round.

The United States team of Mike Rodgers, Justin Gat-lin, Bee Jay Lee and Christian Coleman won the first heat in 37.70 seconds, the world leading time this season, to clock the overall best time going into the final round.

Great Britain clocked the second best time of 37.76, while France were fourth with their season's best of 38.03.

China (38.20), had finished second in the 2015 edition at home, Japan (37.21), who took a surprise silver in the Rio Olympics, Turkey (38.44) and Canada (38.48) -- third in both 2015 Rio Olympics -- completed the eight-team final round which will run later tonight.

Bolt, who has anchored the gold-winning Jamaican team in both 2015 World Championships and Rio Games, will be seeking his 20th global title and would want to hang up his boots with a yellow metal in his final race of his glittering career.

He lost the 100m dash last Saturday in his final individual race, settling for a bronze.

His long-time American rival Gatlin, who has twice served bans for doping, won the gold while Coleman took the silver as the London Olympic stadium and the global television audience were stunned at the turn of events.

Widely considered as the greatest sprinter of all time, Bolt has won eight Olympic and 11 World Championships gold medals beginning with a 100m and 200m double at the 2008 Beijing Olympics.

Since then he has dominated the shorter two sprint events like none in athletics history. His Jamaican team had also won the 4x100m relay gold in Beijing but it had to return the medal after one member of the quartet -- Nesta Carter -- tested positive for a prohibited substance

On the last day of his international career, fans jostled for space to have a glimpse of Bolt at the warm-up arena, adjacent to the stadium and television cameras were fixed at him to have a shot of the towering Jamaican.
Whenever the giant screen

inside the stadium showed him doing the baton exchange practice with his Jamaican team-mates in preparation for the 4x100m relay race at the warm-up arena, the capacity crowd cheered loudly.

The showman, as usual, entertained the crowd as he acknowledged the cheers as he entered the stadium for the relay heats. He did his routine marking of his starting position and did a few run-downs imitating baton exchange.

After easing past the fin-

ish line. Bolt ran down the

track as he usually does and clapped towards the crowd. There are no words to describe how I am feeling. I get so much support from the

crowd. I appreciate that a lot. All the energy I am getting from the crowd. It is brilliant," Bolt said after the race. "The young runners in our team -- it is just about execut-

ing and coming through the race for them. We have been training that relay, there were some camps. Still there were some mistakes. Yohan Blake is coming in for the final is defi-

nitely good."

In the women's 4x100m relay, all the medal contend--- United States, Great Britain, Germany and defending champions Jamaica -- progressed to the final round

without much trouble, while the Bahamas quartet failed to finish in the second heat due to a poor second baton change. Olympic champions Unit-

ed States won the first heat in a world leading time of 41.84 seconds, even in the absence of individual 100m champion Torie Bowie.

Great Britain finished second in that heat -- and also second overall -- with 41.93, the third fastest time ever produced by a British quartet.

Defending champions Ja-

maica (42.50) finished sec ond behind Germany (42.34) in the second heat.

Switzerland (42.50) qualified with the fourth fastest time overall while Netherlands (42.64), Brazil (42.77) and Trinidad and Tobago (42.91) completed the final round line-up.

## **International Left-Handers Day: going left** in a world made for right-handers

New Delhi, Aug 12 (PTI): Known for my recent do da Vinci was a thoroughly curi-ous man, but more curious was his writing style that flowed from right to left, forcing people to use a mirror

While most theories believe he wanted to make it difficult for people to steal his ideas, a simpler explanation is that he was probably trying to keep himself from smudging the pa per while writing with his left hand.

But that was da Vinci, the Renaissance polymath celebrated as artist, inventor, scientist and architect.

As left-handers the world over celebrate International Left-Handers Day tomorrow, they know only too well the many obstacles they face, societal and otherwise, and the continuing feeling of being a minority in a world made for right-handers.

From not-so-friendly teasing to structural details like desks with writing slabs placed wrong and mouse clicks that need to be reconfigured, nothing really goes right for

left-handers.

In India, where an estimated 10 per cent of the population is



left-handed, the belief that being left-handed connotes evil and is inauspicious continues.

Indian left-handers have grown

up getting a quick slap here and hearing a harsh word there for using their left hand.

The word itself originates from the Latin word sinistra, or sinister, that meant left. Deepak Bhati, 29, a software gineer in Bangalore, remembers

being scolded for extending his left

hand to receive prasad and for giving money with the "wrong hand".

Aastha Chugh, 26, a Delhi-based

PR executive, recalls getting hit with a stick for writing with her left hand. The slap on the knuckles - literal-

ly - for using their left hand left Bhati and Chugh with a few bad memories. But for Anand Jayaram, 25, a media professional, the impact was far more profound.

Jayaram still finds it difficult to speak without a stammer

"I remember my stammering started because my teacher in Montessori would force me to write with my right hand. The memories are nothing short of painful.

"Right from the postman to the driver and the courier guy, every-body insisted that I give money with my right hand.

was considered a freak, made fun of," Jayaram said. As for the other 'structural' diffi-

culties, they just learn to live with it. But Bhati finds it impossible to deal with "chairs with writing pads on the right" and Jayaram, a gamer at heart, continues to be frustrated by a

right-hand oriented computer mouse.

Doorknobs, writing pads, scissors, coffee mugs, guitars are some of the tools in a long list of such objects that are meant for right-handed

Iconic American guitarist Jimi Hendrix decided to turn his right-handed six-string guitar upside down and played it backwards when refused a left-hand guitar by

The list of famous left-handed people is long and varied, includ-ing names such as Aristotle, Barack Obama and Bill Gates, Famous lefties closer home include Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Amitabh Bachchan

and Sourav Ganguly.

And there's Sachin Tendulkar of course who became the "god of cricket" playing right-handed his entire career.

Has Indian society evolved? Is

being left-handed less of a stigma than it was?

Not really, says Mumbai-based psychologist Harish Shetty.

The stigma still persists, at tim creating life-long trauma for chil-

"Constant nagging and even pun ishment by parents and teachers to force kids to use their right hand can cause life-long trauma. Although mostly they manage to learn and

adapt, they lack self-confidence and try to keep to themselves," Shetty

Echoing him, Sandip Vishnoi, founder of the Indian Left Hander Club based in Aurangabad, says perception of society needs to change.

"The word left connotes some-thing bad or wrong In Indian culture, the use of left hand for routine activities such as eating, writing and even for religious work is not allowed.

"There are families which don't allow their left-handed daughterin-law to cook food or do religious tasks. The perception of society needs to change," he said.

## Xi asks Trump to avoid heightening tension with North Korea

hinese President Xi Jinping today asked his US coun terpart Donald Trump to avoid remarks and actions that could escalate the already-tense situation in the Korean Peninsula as the two leaders reaffirmed their commitment to denuclearise the region.

The two leaders spoke over phone to discuss the escalating tension after North Korean leader Kim Jong-Un threatened the US this week to fire missiles at Guam, a US island territory, after the US sponsored a resolution imposing new economic sanctions on Pyongyang over its missile and



Xi told Trump that China is ready to work with the US to "appropriately resolve" the issue, state-run Xinhua news agency reported.

"The concerned parties should avoid remarks and actions that could escalate tensions on the peninsula," Xi was quoted by the report.

"The relevant side must at present exercise restraint, and avoid words and actions that exacerbate tensions on the Korean peninsula," the report paraphrased Xi as saying

President Trump and Pres ident Xi agreed North Korea must stop its provocative and escalatory behaviour," the White leaders also reiterated their mutual commitment to denuclearise the Korean Peninsula.

The two countries should strive to resolve the issue through dialogue and negotiation to reach a political solu-

Trump warned North Korea it faced "fire and fury like the world has never seen" if it continued to threaten the United States with its missile and nuclear programs Xi told Trump that China

is willing to keep close contacts with the US, on the basis of mutual respect, to seek a sound settlement on the issue,

Xi said he had a productive meeting Trump on the sidelines of the Group of 20 Summit last month in Hamburg, Germany

Maintaining close contacts between the two leaders on issues of common concern is "very important for the develnent of the China-US rela-

He urged the two sides to enhance dialogue and com-munication in accordance with the consensus previously reached, promote exchanges and cooperation in various fields, and appropriately deal with each other's concerns, so as to ensure healthy and stable advancement of bilateral ties.

Furthermore, the Chinese president said that Beijing places high value on Trump's state visit to China later this

year, urging both sides to make good preparations for the visit.

## Sharif terms ouster as 'joke', says will become PM again

SAJJAD HUSSAIN ISLAMABAD, AUG 11 (PTI): waz Sharif today

Nawaz Shan Carly termed his disqualification from premiership as a "joke" and exuded confidence that he will be elected as Prime Minister of Pakistan for the fourth time. A five-member Supreme Court bench last month disqualified Sharif for dishonesty and ruled that corruption cases be filed against him and his children over the Panama Papers scandal, forcing e prime minister to quit for the record third time.

Addressing a huge gathering in Gujarat on the third day of his journey from Islamabad to Lahore via the Grand Trunk (GT) Road to display his political might, Sharif said even the judges who disqualified him failed to point out a single example of corruption against him.

"Should this even be called a disqualification? I will be made prime minister by the masses again tomorrow," he told a cheering crowd.

"They have only renoved me on paper but they have not removed from your hearts. Is this removing me at all? Sharif asked.

He asked people to stand by him to make sure that their vote is respected.

"I cannot accept this joke. Can you accept this joke that you elect someone, then he is disgraced

and ousted," he said. "May I ask why I was ousted? Did I commit any kind of corruption?

I am innocent and did not commit any financial wrong. That has been said by the judges who disqualified me.

Then why I have been ousted," the 67-year-old veteran politician said.

Sharif said the peo-ple's vote had been trampled upon as millions of people elected a leader and a couple of people or five judges disgraced and sent him home. He said it was for the people of Guiranwala to "think that removal was just".

Sharif, who could not complete his term for a third time, also asked the gathering, "Should I sit back and accept the ver-dict or fight the injustice?"

The people responded in unison with a big 'No', prompting Sharif to ask them to stand by him.

"If you do not want me to sit back then you would have to stand by me. Then stand by me to change the fate of this nation. Promise me that you would do what I tell you," he said.

He also announced that he would share his future plan of action and asked his supporters to

wait for it.
Sharif stepped down after being disqualified by the Supreme Court on July 28 and after staying in Murree and Islam-abad, embarked on road journey to his home.

## **UDGE THROWS OUT DJ'S CASE AGAINST TAYLOR SWIFT**

Ajudge dismisses a Colorado DJ's law-suit against the singer, saying he couldn't prove she ruined his career over groping claims.

A US judge has dismissed allegations that Taylor Swift got a radio DJ fired, but court proceedings will continue to consider the singer's allegations that he sexually assaulted her. David Mueller has accused Swift of slandering him to his radio staalleging her complaint led to his unfair dismissal.

Swift is counter-suing Mueller in the civil case, alleging he groped her during a 2013 backstage photo op with fans and guests before a concert in 2013, US District Judge William Martinez ruled that Swift could not be held liable because Mueller failed to prove that she personally set out to have him fired.

He agreed with Swift's attorney, who had filed a motion asking for the pop star to be dropped from Mueller's lawsuit, saving his case should have been against his Colorado radio station. Swift was happy to hear the judge's ruling in court, hugging members of her legal team. Mr Martinez said the eight-person jury will make a decision on Swift's claim that she was groned.

e panel will also consider allegations from Mueller that Swift's mother, Andrea Swift, and her radio manager, Frank Bell, contributed to him losing his job. Swift's attorney Doug Baldridge had argued there was no evidence the singer herself took any action that harmed Mueller. "A man grabbed her rear end. She

told her mother, and that's it," Mr

Earlier Friday, Swift's former bodyguard Greg Dent testified that he wit-nessed the singer's skirt being flipped up as she posed for a photo with Mueller and his girlfriend.Mr Dent, a former po-lice officer, said in his testimony: "I saw his hand under her skirt... Her skirt went up... She jumped."

Swift spent an hour on the witness stand on Thursday, defiantly recounting what she called a "despicable and horrify ing and shocking" encounter.

"He stayed attached to my bare ass-cheek as I lurched away from him," she said.

"It was a definite grab. A very long
