He added that the temple on the international bor-


der of Indo-Nepal would boost pilgrimage tourism.


Mr Bhutia has been working to promote Sopakha, Chewa Bhanjyang and Uttarey as tourism destinations.

Govt lied to SC on Rafale; committed contempt of court, perjury: Cong

Mumbai, Dec 15 (PTI): The Congress on Saturday alleged that the BJP-led government at the Cen-tre had misled the Supreme Court over the Rafale deal and commit-

ted contempt of court and perjury.
The Supreme Court on Friday dismissed petitions seeking a di-rection to the CBI to register an FIR for alleged irregularities in the multi-billion dollar deal between India and France for procurement of 36 Rafale jets.

It said there was no occasion to "really doubt the decision mak-ing process" warranting setting

aside of the contract.

Speaking to mediapersons
here, Congress spokesperson
Abhishek Manu Singhvi said the basis of the court ruling was a report by the Comptroller and Auditor General (CAG) which has not been seen by anyone, nor has it been shared with Parliament's Public Accounts Committee (PAC).

The apex court said it was ill-equipped to conduct judicial review of issues related to pricing, and this has been the Congress' stand. Hence, the party is demanding a probe by a Joint Parliamenta-

Committee (JPC), he said.
"The BJP has hoodwinked the nation and cheated the people. Now it has the guts to do the same to mislead the apex court. There is serious misrepresentation of vital, significant facts to the apex court. This amounts to contempt (of court), (breach of) privilege as well as perjury," he claimed.

'Modi' now stands for 'Mis-leading Of Democratic Institu-tions', he quipped. The government has now moved an application before the SC, seeking

correction of reference to CAG report, the Congress leader said.

"If this is true, it means a clear

admission by the government that what is reported in para 25 of the judgement is a misrepresentation of facts....the government is saving its skin. How can the SC imagine a CAG report and its vetting by Public Accounts Committee on its own?" Singhvi asked.

He also contested a mention in the SC judgement that relations between Dassault, the manufacturer of Rafale, and Reliance dated back to 2012.

Rajapaksa resigns as Sri Lanka's PM, Wickremesinghe to be reinstated

COLOMBO, DEC 15 (PTI): Ending the power tussle in Sri Lanka, Ma-Rajapaksa, was appointed as Prime Minister by President Maithripala Sirisena in a controversial move, resigned Saturday and Ranil Wickremesinghe is likely to take oath as

Rajapaksa resigned after two crucial Su-preme Court decisions made the embattled former strongman's efforts to cling to premiership untenable.

Pro-Rajapaksa lawmaker Shehan Semasinghe told reporters that the former President signed his resignation letter in a ceremony held in his house in Wijerama in Colombo.

"Rajapaksa informed the lawmakers of United People's Freedom Alliance (UPFA) that he has resigned from the post,"

MP Semasinghe said. Rajapaksa was ap-pointed as Prime Min-ister on October 26 by President Sirisena in a controversial move after sacking Wickremesinghe, which plunged the country into an unprecedented constitutional crisis.

The Supreme Court on Thursday unanimous-ly declared that the dis-solution of Parliament by

the island nation's Pre-mier on Sunday.

Sirisena was "illegal". The apex court on Friday refused to stay a court order restrain-ing Rajapaksa, 73, from holding the office of Prime Minister until

> next month. Wickremesinghe's United National Party (UNP) on Saturday said that Sirisena has agreed to reinstate him in the post after a discussion with him over the phone on Friday.

"We have heard from the presidential secre-tariat that our leader will be sworn in as the Prime Minister tomor-row morning," UNP gen-eral secretary Akila Viraj Kariyawasam said.

The unprecedented political and constitutional stand off which began on October 26 with the sacking of Wick-remesinghe appears to end tomorrow with his reinstatement.

Lakshman Yapa Abey-wardena on Friday said Rajapaksa, who had ruled Sri Lanka for nearly who had a decade, decided to step down "in the best interit fully heard the case est of the country' He claimed Rajapaksa

can hold office without resigning but that will only further drag the political turmoil in the country. So the former president decided to step down after the court rul-ing given on Friday and

on Thursday. The Supreme Court on Friday decided that a Court of Appeal order issued against the ap-pointment of Rajapaksa as Prime Minister and against his Cabinet from holding office will stand.

The appeal filed by Rajapaksa will be taken up for hearing on January 16, 17 and 18.

The apex court asked all parties to provide written submissions

within three weeks.

According to media reports, a new Cabinet will be sworn in on Monday. The Cabinet will consist of 30 members and include six Sri Lan ka Freedom Party (SLFP) parliamentarians.

After his appoint-ment as prime minister, Rajapaksa had sought to secure a majority in the 225-member Parliament but failed. Sirisena then dissolved Parliament and called snap

elections on January 5. However, the Su-preme Court overturned his decision and halted the preparations for snap polls

Indian-origin con woman jailed for faking cancer in UK

LONDON, DEC 15 (PTI): An Indian-origin woman who admitted to lying to her family and friends about suffering from terminal brain cancer terminal brain cancer
to con them out of over
250,000 pounds was
sentenced to four years
of imprisonment by a
UK court on Friday.
In 2013, Jasmin Mis-

try told her then husband, Vijay Katechia, that she had cancer, along with a supporting WhatsApp message what he thought was

Investigations later revealed that the message had been sent by her using a different SIM card.

At the end of December 2014, she told her ex-husband that her severe brain cancer meant she had just six months to live, with further messages from another fictitious doctor suggesting that it could be treated in America - at a cost of around 500,000 pounds.

Katechia, his family and members of the pub-lic went on to be conned out of money over a twoyear period between 2015-2017 in the form of donations they thought she needed for life-saving treatments.

Mistry's ex-husband became suspicious when a friend of his saw a picture of a brain scan she had said was taken at one

of her consultations.

The plot was final-unravelled after her ex-husband showed "scan" to a doctor friend, who told him it had been lifted from Google.

Katechia also discov-d SIM cards Mistry used to send messages pretending to be other people, and when con-fronting her she admitted that she had lied.

Police were contacted in November 2017, and Mistry was arrested.

During interviews, she confirmed to officers that was not terminally ill, and that she did not know why she had lied. according to Met Police reports.

It was found that 20 members of her extended family and eight others were found to have given her money. The total fraud amount was calculated as

253,122 pounds.
The 36-year-old had pleaded guilty to the crime after her arrest last year.

Mistry, a medical secretary from Loughbor-ough town in the Mid-lands region of England, was convicted of fraud by false representation and jailed for four years at Snaresbrook Crown Court this week.

Mistry, described in court as a "pathological liar", created a fake on-line account of a fictitious doctor to message her husband and also posted "Stand up to cancer" messages on social media.

Didn't say anything against secularism, says Meghalaya HC judge on controversial order

SHILLONG, DEC 15 his recent controversial order, Meghalaya High Court judge S R Sen on Friday issued a "clarification", saying neither was his judgment politically motivated nor did he say anything against secularism and that his order had been "misinterpreted".

In the 'clarification from the bench' posted

on the high court web-site, Justice Sen said he does not belong to any political party and does not dream of getting a political berth after retirement. He said he had written the judgement based on truth, history and ground reality "to save the citizens of India, irrespective of caste, creed, religion or language". The judge's observa-

tions in the December 10 judgement that India should have been a Hin-du country after independence just as Pakistan became an Islamic country and that no-body should try to make India into an Islamic country had stoked a controversy.

The CPI(M) had urged Chief Justice of India Ranjan Gogoi to remove him from his judicial duties and had alleged that his utterances were against the basic structure of the Constitution.

Justice Sen, in the

judgement passed on Monday while disposing judgement of a petition of a man who was denied domicile certificate by Meghalaya, had also observed that he was confident that only this government under Narendra Modi will un-

derstand the gravity.

However, Justice Sen said on Friday that when he mentioned the gov-ernment under Modi, ernment under it was inclusive of the ministers and members of both houses of Parlia ment and his request was to policymakers and law-makers of the country.

"Secondly, I would clarify here that in my judgement nowhere have I said anything against secularism and my judgement makes references to history and one cannot change the history," he said

He also asserted that "I am not a religious fa-natic rather I respect all the religions because to me God is one".

In his order, Justice Sen had urged the Centre to bring a law to allow Hindus, Sikhs, Jains, Buddhist, Parsis, Christians and Khasis, Jaintias and Garos tribals who are presently residing in Bangladesh, Pakistan and Afghanistan to live in this country peace-fully and with full dignity, without marking any cut-off year.
The judge in his clari-

fication said such people were coming to India due to religious persecution and they may get a right to live in in India but the process for this had to be determined by the authorities and by due process of law.
"We should remem-

ber that whatever we call influx or foreigner, that is due to unwanted partition and without proper referendum and wrong boundary demarcation and mainly on reli-gious persecution," Justice Sen said.

He added all states should embrace such people and no particular state or region should take the burden of influx. He added that it was only his suggestion and "totally depends upon the polity and law-

makers of the country.

At the same time he noted that the Constitution allows every citizen to settle in any part of the country.

"I do not belong to any political party nor have I got any dream to get any political berth after my retirement and neither is my judgment politically motivated or influenced by any party," said Justice Sen who is due to retire in March.

Although the Cen-e's Citizenship (Amendment) Bill, 2016 also seeks to make Hindus, Sikhs, Buddhists, Jains, Parsis and Christians from the three countries eligible for Indian citizenship after a stay of six years there was no mention of the bill in the court order.

Noting that secular-ism is one of the basic structures of the Constitution. Justice Sen said. "It (India) should not fur-ther be divided on the basis of religion, caste. community or

language."

He had in his judgement said the National Register of Citizens exercise in Assam is "defective" as many foreigners 'became Indians" due to the exercise and "original Indians are left out".

"Nobody should try

to make India another Islamic country otherwise it will be a doomsday...,' Justice Sen had said.

The judge was, how ever, quick to add in his order that he was not against "my Muslim brothers and sisters" who are residing in India for generations and abiding Indian laws.

They should also allowed to live peacefully".

AIMIM leader and
MP Asaduddin Owaisi

had reacted sharply to the court order. "This is a wrong judgment. We do not accept it. You cannot give such a judgement... India is and will remain a plural, secular country.
What kind of judgement is this will the government take note

Union Minister Giriraj Singh, howev-er, had welcomed the judge's order saving his observations are in line with public sentiments.

"What he has said is also the voice of crores of people of India," the BJP leader had said.

Seven civilians among 11 killed in encounter, protest in Kashmir

SRINAGAR, DEC 15 (PTI): Seven civilians died Saturday when se-curity forces opened fire at an unruly mob that thronged the site of an encounter in south Kashmir's Pulwama district in which three terrorists and an army man were killed, police said.

The militants killed included army deserter Zahoor Ahmad Thoker. who belonged to Simoo village where the gunfight took place.

The Army laid siege around an isolated house in the middle of an orchard following an intelligence input about the presence of the militants.

After the initial con-

tact with the militants. the security forces completed the operation in 90 minutes, killing all three.
The soldiers were

taken by surprise as people started marching to-wards the encounter site from all directions with some of them trying to seize their weapons, police said.

A police spokesman said while the operation was going on, security forces had to resort to firing at the crowd that came dangerously close from different parts to the encounter site".

Those injured in the firing were rushed to **FLAT AVAILABLE**

Unconfirmed reports put the number of civilians killed at eight.

Among those killed was a young Kashmiri man, who had recent-ly travelled back to his hometown with his In-donesian wife and a three-month baby. The youth was also a part of the stone-throwing mob, police said.

About five more people have bullet injuries. Others who were admitted in the hospital are stated to be stable," the spokesman said.

general advisory, asking people to stay away from the encounter site and said there was significant danger to life there.

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

Insularity is unfortunately a national malaise. Address it

dentity, as in the perceptions of the outside, is a touchy issue among the marginalized communities. The ill-informed clichés, the pedantic, and almost always offensive generalizations remain sore points for the offended communities, and we live in a region that has lived with such broad-brush impoliteness for ever since we started interacting with the plains. And the brush paints both ways, one may add here.

While it is easy to take affront and fine to draft fresh introductions to correct the offending perceptions, it is definitely not okay to allow the chip on the shoulder to burden any heavier than is healthy. The more this perceived slight is allowed to fester, the more it diverts energy from pursuits that take communities forward. One refers to a "perceived slight" here because the clichés that hurt are products of ignorance and one should not really allow ignorance of others to justify withdrawals into cocoons by the othered. And defensive shells are not the best habitations from which to plan ahead because they keep thoughts and ideas rooted in a past that has lost its relevance for everyone except those who swoon in its fermented confusion. Also, while so enclosed, one fails to recognize changes elsewhere.

That said, it is important that the ignorance which has degenerated into disdain, mutual suspi $cion\, and\, dist a steful\, stere o typing\, is\, lifted.\, One\, could$ argue that perceived slights are by nature pointless obsessions since they are born out of, well, perceptions which cannot really be tackled because, well again, they rest in perceptions and those are more difficult to address than actual instances of discrimination. They do, however, become worries when the perceptions start manifesting as actual attacks, like ones which triggered the exodus of NE people from the metros or the lynching which occurred in Nagaland a few years ago. And then there is the continuing parochialism everywhere else in the country and the reprehensible attempts at justifying such targeted attacks born out of Hate seeded in prejudices and stereotypes. These will repeat unless this country makes some earnest efforts at celebrating its much-vaunted diversity. 70 years as one nation and the citizens still don't behave as One People! This obviously needs to change, and the Supreme Court recently cracked the whip with its slew of directions, including the setting up of a three-member panel to "enhance the sense of security and inclusion of the people from the north-eastern states who faced violence and hate crimes". The SC directive is the first step, an acceptance of sorts of a problem that exists. For it to be of any real consequence, wider, more collaborative initiatives will need to be taken.

The students provide the best opportunity to build the bridges which can span the chasms of mutual ignorance which feeds insularity among us. A simple and easily achieved course would be for the community/ state representative organisations of the students to become mediums which link communities, not strive to make them self-ensconced unit of self conscious groups. Take the freshers' welcome parties for instance. Instead of each community, each state or region hosting a welcome party for its own kind, they should use the funds to introduce the freshers to 'others' in the student community. Host the parties for 'your own' but invite guests from all other groups. Make celebrations the medium to proffer more congenial introductions and strike new friendships. Use the organisations to speak more often about the concerns of other groups and engage more earnestly in issues and challenges which face other communities. This openness is possible only with the idealism of youth, but is currently being stifled because student groups remain obsessively insular.

Debate: The 'gilets jaunes' movement is not a Facebook revolution

In less than a month, France's gilets jaunes (yellow vests) have gone from being a celebrated example of Facebook's ability to power a spontaneous revolution to a cautionary tale of how social networks can be manipulated by outsiders to provoke outrage and sow dissent. But in both of these extreme scenarios, the central actors lie outside France, whether it's the platforms based in Silicon Valley or

the suspected propagandists in Russia.

Because the gilets jaunes phenomenon couldn't be connected to one particular trade union, political party or any other national organization, many looked to the role of the Internet to explain the emergence and diffusion of the protest movement, sym-

bolized by the yellow safety vests that activists wear.
The French are accustomed to protests that are scheduled well in advance. There's even an app called "C'est la grève" that announces strikes, be they with the railways, schools or elsewhere.

There's an orderly fashion to so-called disruptive manifestations (as protests are referred to in French), but the gilets jaunes movement hasn't followed the rules. So who exactly broke the rules? An ver has been the Internet.

BREAKING THE RULES

In many ways, that's the point of the gilets jaunes: they're breaking the rules. Not only did they bypass traditional organizations, but they have accused the Parisian establishment, particularly President Emmanuel Macron, of being elitist and out of touch with the economic struggles of working-class people, particularly those in rural areas. They are not anti-tax in principle or even anti-government intervention, but they are against the type of decision-makers who supported an increase in the tax on diesel fuel without understanding how challenging it has been for people in the countryside to survive – they're struggling because they have to drive farther and farther to get to fewer and fewer jobs, with wages that have not kept up with the

costs of living.

And since existing institutions weren't responding to these everyday needs, the protests that erupted in November have expanded to broader economic and political demands. But how did this movement happen? If it wasn't existing organizations, many have said, it must be the Internet. A common example of this argument stems from the viral Facebook videos by Jacline Mouraud, a digitally savvy musician who lives in north-western France and early on encouraged people to protest. THE REVOLUTIONARY POWER OF SOCIAL ME-

DIA IS WISHFUL THINKING Both scholars and journalists have argued that

digital technology, rather than organizations, drive modern social movements. A decade ago, com-mentators dubbed the Iranian Green Movement in 2009 a "Twitter Revolution". Soon after, many suggested that a "Facebook Revolution" drove protests in Egypt. Scholars also claimed that the Internet was key to the 2011 anti-austerity movement in Spain and the American "Occupy Wall Street"

More recently, with the Women's March against Trump in 2017 or the gilets jaunes in 2018, the same argument is put forth. As a sociologist who researches social media, social movements and social class, I was not surprised at the overblown credit given to Face book with these latest movements. Still, le sigh. Again?

Yet over the past two years, this celebration over digital technology's role in political participa-tion took a dark turn. From Trump's toxic tweets to Brexit's online cesspool, the role of far-right outfits like Cambridge Analytica and Facebook itself came to light in fomenting far-right movements. And the French foreign minister recently announced an investigation into fake news and Russian manipulation of the gilets jaunes. What was once a horizontal digital army of white knights out to save the day was all of a sudden a horde of bots and hacks orchestrated by authoritarian institutions. Yet many still want to put

faith in the Internet over institutions.

But both of these views, whether digital utopianism or dystopianism, fail to acknowledge people on the ground and their existing networks, as well as the fact that populist movements that seem to arise out of nowhere are not new to the digital era.

IUST A TOOL

Without a doubt, the spread of information during a time of upheaval is certainly faster with the Internet. And the gilets jaunes are no exception. But do we call the French Revolution a "letter" movement? The American civil rights movement a "mimeograph" revolution? The Internet is a communications tool. An efficient one, but it's still a tool.

Every radical movement has had their communication tools, such as radio with the French Resistance, yet those coded messages in the 1940s needed a network on the ground to make sense of them and respond. Many of the gilets jaunes protests at traffic circles (ronds-points, as they're called in France) were organized by people who were already connected on Face-book through other ties or who work and live together in the same small towns.

Populist movements like the gilets jaunes often have spikes of initial protest without necessarily having formal organizations that link people to-gether, or what scholars like to call "weak ties".

Yet existing institutions and networks, from the connections made by France's Nuit debout move-ment to traditional unions of teachers and transport workers, were inspired to spread the news of the gilets jaunes during the emergence period of this movement. And the word "inspired" is the operating word here, as the gilets jaunes movement has motivated these organizations to not only participate in the protests but to take bolder stands on their own issues, such as the current teacher strikes and school occupations over the high school reforms.

And what is often forgotten is the still-critical role that traditional mainstream media play in disseminating information, such as the conservative French newspaper Le Figaro, which has run

sweeping coverage of the protests since their inception. And French nightly television news has run non-stop footage and analyses of the protests BEHIND THE HASHTAGS ARE COMMUNITY TIES AND STRUCTURAL INEQUALITIES

But how can the gilets jaunes move itself? From the analysis and research presented in my upcoming book, The Revolution That Wasn't: How Digital Activism Favors Conservatives (Harvard University Press), I found that over time, movements that have resources and infrastructure are more likely to harness the power of the Internet, and conservatives tend to have an advantage in this regard. Over the long run, it takes focused time and expertise to maintain online participation for social movements. Hierarchical, not horizontal, groups are more likely to be able to do this. Simply, more, not less, organization is required for

digital activism to endure in a movement.

Yet I am not arguing that the gilets jaunes was sparked by a conservative organizational bureaucracy. Quite the contrary. It is an organic popular movement that wants the government to be more, not less, involved in improving the lives of the working-class. Yet we can already see how institutions, such as Jean-Luc Melenchon's left-leaning La France Insoumise movement, have tried to fill the vacuum of this so-called leaderless movement. In the absence of a strong grassroots organization, others will take over, including orchestrated dis-information digital campaigns.

But nor is propaganda new to political movements.
The problem with the pendulum swing of "Hooray, the Internet connects!" to "Boo, the Internet deceives!" is that neither explanation for protest takes into account the community ties before the protests began but more importantly, the broader structural crisis that brought people together in the first place.

This is a movement that is linked to power and

economic differences – not just people feeling a financial squeeze at the end of the month but also eyeing the growing inequality between the elites and the working class all over France. And they're not spending valuable time at protests or risking arrest because they are dupes to fake news. They are embedded in a soci-

etal context that drives their participation. When I first moved to France in 2014 after studying populist movements in the United States - from Occupy Wall Street to the Tea Party - I was curious why there hadn't been a strong left-wing populist movement in France like in Spain, the US

or much of the western world in 2011.

I soon began to understand that despite the emergence of movements like Nuit debout and other protests against the "Loi travail" (a law that loosened worker protections), France's social system was able to weather the storm of the economic recession that had plagued other countries. So even though digital activism was alive and well in 2011, a strong movement against neo-liberal policies had not yet emerged. Simply put, a popular movement drives Internet use. Not the other way around.

Cheap oil is blocking progress on climate change

The relationship between supply and demand, a fundamental economic concept, holds that when the price of something rises, people use less of it. Simi-

larly, when prices fall, they use more. And it may seem logical that low oil prices benefit consumers, countries, even the world. When consumers save money on gas, they can spend it elsewhere. Yet, I argue that climate change makes this view obsolete. That's because cheap oil has two big downsides along with its short-term

gains. It erodes the advantages of vehicles that get more miles to the gallon, making consumers less apt to do their share to reduce emissions by buying vehicles that use less fuel – or none at all. It also makes the case for energy innovation seem less urgent to policymakers and the automotive industry. WHAT'S NOT TO LIKE?

Burning fossil fuels, the main source of manmade carbon dioxide, is the biggest cause of climate change. In the U.S. and other wealthy countries, oil is the single

largest source of these emissions.

But relatively low prices are boosting petroleum sales worldwide. Consumption is climbing particularly in Asia, where a sustained economic boom has lifted billions out of poverty and put millions more people behind steering wheels.

Those new middle-class and wealthy consumers and the industries spawned by

meteoric economic growth are burning millions of barrels of petroleum every day. This includes transport of goods by road, rail, water and air. But it is passenger vehicles that dominate global mobility, and they are consuming the greatest volume of fuel in the U.S., China and everywhere else.

To be sure, petroleum is the raw material for a great many products besides gas-oline, diesel and other fuels – from lipstick to asphalt. The economic benefits of cheap oil can be widely distributed, bolstering growth and keeping inflation down. President Donald Trump, expressed this view when he likened low oil prices

to "a big tax cut for America and the world" in a tweet.

GUZZLING MORE GAS

But cheap oil has other effects as well. After improvements in fuel economy during the 1970s and early 80s, two decades of low gasoline prices reversed this trend, causing average miles per gallon to actually decrease a little in some years. Only in 2004, when prices rose, did fuel economy again become an issue.

After years of hovering around and even topping US\$100 per barrel, aside from a brief peak during the Great Recession, oil prices collapsed. They fell to less than \$50 by the end of 2014 and sank even lower in early 2015.

Oil prices are still nowhere near \$100 a barrel.

Americans responded as economists would expect them to: by driving more. The lower prices fell, the less it cost to fill their tanks. Summertime gas

consumption hit an all-time high. Unsurprisingly, U.S. emissions from transportation rose by 10 percent between 2014 and 2017, even as they fell for electricity generation and other sectors

In addition, drivers bought bigger vehicles. Sales of SUVs, minivans and

small pickups soared, while passenger car sales plummeted.

By 2018, Americans were buying two SUVs or pickups for every sedan. The trend, also present in Europe, is a core reason why emissions have risen from

advanced nations for the first time in five years. Automakers are responding by phasing out passenger car production and manufacturing more SUVs and trucks in a trend that reaches beyond U.S. bor-

ders. SUV sales are surging around the world.

Partly due to the extra miles driven and the size of the vehicles involved, carbon dioxide emissions from wealthy nations rose by 0.5 percent in 2018,

following five years of decline. NO ONE CALLS THE SHOTS

But who controls oil prices? As an energy scholar and former petroleum geo-scientist, I believe that it's clear that no one does. Governments can establish climate policies, such as carbon pricing, stiff fuel taxes

and other measures, that raise gasoline prices. But, as the recent French protests and two defeats in a row in Washington state for a carbon fee or tax have shown, there are limits to how far or fast they can go, even in rich countries.

And low-income wnations view such measures as damaging and intrusive Raising fuel prices has inspired massive resistance, even riots, in nations as diverse as India, Iran, Mexico and Haiti.

The Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries has teamed up with Russia to create an oil-exporting alliance known as OPEC+. Those countries can usual supplies to increase prices, as they agreed to do in December 2018. They can also

increase output, should they wish to lower prices.

Yet that doesn't mean that exporters have the power to call all the shots. For example, if China – the world's largest oil importer – were to have a big recession, Saudi Arabia and Russia would probably have trouble finding buyers for all of the oil they want to export. Overproduction in that scenario would make oil prices sink.

There is another reason the group can't dominate. They must compete against the world's largest oil producer and most rapidly growing crude exporter: the U.S. ELECTRIFYING SOLUTIONS

Advances in drilling technology have made it easier than ever to produce pe-

troleum at a time when humanity should use less of it for the planet's sake.

Until and unless electric vehicles become dominant, it will prove extreme

ly hard to wean the world off of oil.

I believe that governments and automakers should for this reason be working together for the long term. By providing strong incentives for consumers and industries to make the jump, they can stop letting cheap oil stymie climate action.

Otherwise, as hundreds of millions more people become drivers in coming

decades, the laws governing supply and demand could steer all of us down a road to devastating degrees of global warming.

1984 anti-Sikh riots: HC to pronounce verdict on Monday

NEW DELHI, DEC 15 (PTI): The Delhi High Court is likely to pro-nounce on Monday its verdict on the appeals challenging a trial court's judgement in the 1984 anti-Sikh riots case in which Con-gress leader Sajjan Kumar was acquitted.

A bench of Justices S Muralidhar and Vinod Goel had on October 29 concluded hearing arguments on the appeals filed by the CBI, riots victims and the convicts, and reserved the judgement.

Former Congress councillor Balwan Khokhar, retired naval officer Captain Bhagmal, Girdhari Lal and two others were held guilty in the case relating to the murder of five members of a family in Raj Nagar area of Delhi Cantonment on November 1, 1984 after the assassination of then prime minister Indira Gandhi.

The trial court had acquitted Sajjan Kumar the case, but awarded life term to Khokhar, Bhagmal and Lal, and a three-year jail term to two others - former MLA Mahender Yadav and Kishan Khokhar.

The convicts had challenged their conviction and sentencing by the trial court in May 2013.

The Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) had also filed an appeal, alleging they were engaged in "a planned commu-nal riot" and "religious cleansing". The agency and the victims have also appealed against the acquittal of Kumar.
The high court had

on March 29 last year issued show cause no-tices to 11 accused, including Khokhar and Yadav, in five 1984 anti-Sikh riots cas-es which were earlier closed. The matter is being heard by another division bench.

The accused, who were acquitted of the were asked why should the court not order reinvestigation and retrial against them as they faced allegations of "horrifying crimes against humanity".

second Test here. Ishant was guilty of bowling a few no balls in the first Test which escaped the on-field umpires' attention. While his propensity to overstep denied India wickets on two occasions, the poor policing of front-foot slipattracted the ire of the host nation.

"Maybe Australian media should answer I have been playing cricket for so long. And these things happen. Because you are a human, you are bound to make a mistake. I was not worried about it at all," Ishant said during a press conference.

He said that the counter attack from Vi-rat Kohli and Ajinkya Rahane was vital as India ended the day at 172 for three in reply to Australia's 326 all out.

"Whenever Virat is batting we feel confi-dent. We finished the day in a strong posi-tion. Hopefully they will both continue. The game is in the balance right now. Hopefully we will dominate the first session tomor-row," Ishant said.

Kohli's unbeaten

82 coupled with Ajink ya Rahane's counterattacking 51 helped India overcome the cheap dismissals of Murali Vijay (0) and K L Rahul (2).

"Rahane added quickfire 20-30 runs and they were really needed at that time. If they had played de-fence then Australia would have stayed on their plans and it was important for him to counter attack to force them to change plans," he added.

Earlier, Kohli added 74 runs for the third wicket with Chetesh-war Pujara after the Indian openers had been dismissed cheaply.

India coach Harendra irks FIH for raising questions on umpiring

BHUBANESWAR. DEC (PTI): Harendra Singh's outburst against umpiring after India's quarterfinal loss to Netherlands in the ongoing World Cup didn't go down well with the world body (FIH) and its President Narinder Batra Saturday hinted at a strict action against the coach for his indecent behaviour.

Eyeing to rewrite history after a hiatus of 43 years, India lost 1-2 to Netherlands in the fourth and last quarterfinal to crash out of the tournament in front of a packed Kalinga

Stadium here on Thursday. Soon after the defeat, Harendra blamed poor umpiring for his side's unexpected early ouster, saying FIH seriously need to address the is-sue as his side has been on the receiving end of poor on-field decisions twice this year.

But the India coach's vitriolic outburst came back to haunt him as the FIH chief said a team should be graceful in defeat and questioning umpires is against the spirit of the game. "Being the FIH Presi-

dent I have to follow certain protocols and I have my strong reservations against this kind of behaviour. A sport has to be played in the right spirit," Batra said in a press conference also attended by FIH CEO Thierry Wiel here on Saturday.

"One should be graceful whether you win or lose. Finding a fault is very easy. You should rather appreciate and respect. They (umpires) have only two eyes. They are doing a job, a thank-less job. They will get criticised by anybody criticised by anyb who loses," he added.

Harendra's job has been under the scanned ever since India failed to defend its Asian Games title in Jakarta and the World Cup was his last opportunity to save his skin.

It seems the India coach is set to lose his iob with Hockey India mulling to take a drastic decision on the matter after the conclusion of the World Cup.

A former chief of

Hockey India, Batra, who has considerable influence on the national federation, further indicated that some radical changes are on the offing in Indian hockey.
"I am here till the

17th December and then I will return to Delhi. Af-ter 17th I will give my statement on the issue as NOC (National Olympic Committee) President," said Batra, who also

heads the Indian Olympic Association (IOA). "You are being un-fair to people on the grounds, sometimes umpires themselves ask for referrals. Other games have also adopted (vid-

eo referrals)."

FIH CEO Weil, who came on board in March this year, too felt it was not wise to blame umpires after a defeat.

"I think the beauty of sports in principle is that you have a winner and a loser. The day you win, you are happy. The day you lose, you are sad, which I understand. Even Argentina team cried on the bench," he said.

"Respect in fair play is such a nice thing. When you lose, what you have to do? You have to look forward to play better and win next time. To blame umpires is not the hockey style

"I would just recom mend (that) and defi-nitely say umpires have a tough job, decision to be made within seconds. It (questioning umpires) is

not acceptable."

The FIH CEO said the world body is no mood to review any umpiring decisions.

'We will not review anything. We will re-view the teams who have made such complaints made against the um-pires. That is not acceptable. If you lose, you have to accept it and look for-ward," Weil said.

Pak court acquits 2 prime suspects in Sarabjit's murder case M Zulgernain

LAHORE, DEC 15 (PTI): A Pakistani court on Saturday acquitted two prime suspects in the murder case of Indian national Sarabjit Singh in 2013 in the Kot Lakhpat jail here, citing "lack of evidence" against them.

The Lahore Sessions Court announced its verdict in the case which was pending for more than five

According to a court official, Lahore's additional district and sessions judge Muhammad Moin Khokhar acquitted the main suspects - Amir Tam-ba and Mudassar after all witnesses turned hostile.

"Not a single wit-ness testified in the court against both the suspects. The court acquitted them for lack of evidence against them," the official

He said both suspects made their presence in the court through a video link from the Kot Lakhpat Jail because of security con-cerns. Amir and Mudassar, two Pakistani death row prisoners, attacked Singh, 49, in Lahore's Kot Lakhpat jail in 2013 resulting in his death. In previous hearings, the judge had expressed his anger as the prosecution failed to bring forth prose cuting witnesses to record their statement.

One witness in the previous hearing told the court that Singh was brought to the Services Hospital in a critical condition.

"I wanted to record the doctors stopped him, terming his condition very serious," the official quoted the witnesses.

Singh died before re-cording his statement before the doctors. A oneman judicial commission of Justice Mazhar Ali Akbar Naqvi of Lahore high court had initially investigated Singh's murder case before the trial kicked off

in the Sessions court.

Naqvi recorded the statements of some 40 witnesses in the case and submitted its report to the government which is vet to make its findings public

The one-man com-mission had also issued notices to Singh's relatives through the foreign ministry to record their statements and produce any evidence they had regarding his death.

France's 'yellow vest' protesters gather on decisive weekend

Paris, Dec 15 (AFP): "Yellow vest" demonstrators began gathering on the Champs-Elysees in Paris on Saturday morning for a fifth weekend of pro-tests in defiance of calls by the French govern-

ment to stay home.

President Emmanuel Macron, facing the biggest crisis of his presidency, announced a series of concessions on Monday to defuse the explosive "yellow vest" movement which sprang up in rural and small-town France last month.

He is hoping the package of tax and minimum wage measures, coupled with a terror attack on Tuesday night in Stras-bourg and bitter winter weather, will help end a month of violent clashes and disruption.

The last three Saturdays have been marked by violent demonstrations, with burning barricades, pillaging and clashes with police in cities across France.

"Last time, we were here for taxes," a 28-yearold called Jeremy told AFP as he joined others gathering in freezing cold on the Champs-Elysees shortly after 8:00 am (0700 GMT)

"This is for the insti-tutions: we want more direct democracy," he said, adding that people needed to "shout to make themselves heard."

The "yellow vests" have made dozens of

demands of the government but have no agreed programme or nominat-ed leaders, making the task of negotiating with them difficult

Until now, a clear majority of French people had backed the protests, which sprung up initially over tax hikes on transport fuel before snowballing into wide opposition to Macron's pro-business agenda and style of governing.

But two polls published on Tuesday -- in the wake of Macron's concessions -- found the country was now split broadly 50-50 on

whether the protests should continue. "We expect slight-ly less people (in the streets) but individuals who are slightly more determined ," junior in-terior minister Laurent Nunez said late Friday.

Around 8,000 police will be on duty in Paris on Saturday, the same number as last weekend, backed up by 14 armoured vehicles, water cannons and hors-es which are used for crowd control.

Around 90,000 secu-y forces were mobilised last Saturday across France and 2,000 people detained, around half of them in Paris.

"That people demon-strate, no problem, but the vandalism is appalling," Maria, who manages the Le Vin Coeur restau-

Dissident Pakistanis gather in US to chalk future course of action



LALIT K JHA WASHINGTON, DEC 15 (PTI): Several prominent Pakistani dissidents currently living in various countries have gathered here at a conference to discuss ways of ensuring greater support for pluralist ideas, human rights, and democracy in Pakistan, organisers of the event said Saturday.

The two-day delib-erative conference titled 'Pakistan After The Elections' was opened by for-mer Pakistan ambassa-dor to the United States Husain Haqqani and will end on Sunday with an event to be addressed by US Congressman Brad Sherman, Chairman Emeritus of the Asia subcommittee of the House Committee on Foreign Affairs, a statement said.

"Terrorism and in-national isolation, ternational not dissent, are the real threats to Pakistan but unfortunately Pakistan's establishment refuses to recognise that reali-ty," said Haqqani.

Не said heavy-handed suppres-sion of diverse views in Pakistan would not end the country's economic crisis nor would it help the government's stated purpose of projecting a posi-tive image for the country.

"The best way to have a positive image is to build a positive reality, one that is free of the taint of terrorism, exter nal dependence, and lack of democracy" he said

Attended by scholars, journalists, bloggers and social media activists many of whom now live in exile, the conference is the third to be organised by South Asians Against Terrorism and for Human Rights (SAATH), a group of prodemocracy Pakistanis and is co-hosted by Haqqani and US-based columnist

Mohammad Taqi. Earlier, the SAATH conferences were held

London in 2016 and 2017. This year, organisers scaled down the conference's size as some of the forum's Pakistani participants were legally barred or intimidated by authorities from participating.

Movement (PTM) member of the National Assembly Mohsin Dawar was detained at Peshawar airport as he was leaving Pakistan a few days ago. He informed the

conference organisers that the government had unlawfully stopped him from attending the meeting, according to a SAATH statement.

"Pro-democracy Pakistanis, including liberals and Baloch, Sindhi, Pash-tun, Seraiki, and Muhajir nationalists see the ap-pointment of Imran Khan as Prime Minister as a virtual military takeover, with a very poor civilian fa ade," SAATH

said in a statement.
"In our discussions, we hope to address questions such as where Pakistan stands in the aftermath of the 2018 elections, what are the con-sequences to Pakistan of mainstreaming terrorists and terror groups, and how might the weakening voices for reform and a liberal vision be strengthened," it said.

Tagi said the freedom-loving Pakistanis needed to join hands "to create space for in-tellectual and political discourse".

"The Pakistani press remains in chains, electronic media is being coerced into submission, journalists are being hounded by the deep state, and the political parties have been tamed into submission," he observed, adding that "resistance would continue to the Pakistani establishment's totalitarian project".

Myanmar's president praises Rakhine state for 'auspicious' year

YANGON, DEC 15 (AFP): Myanmar's president said Saturday it had been an "auspicious" year for Rakhine state, the vio-lence-scarred territory and epicentre of the Rohingya crisis.

More than 720,000 Rohingya have fled the western state since August 2017 after the military conducted "clear-ance operations," sending a stream of refugees to neighbouring Ban-gladesh with accounts of rape, arson and mass killings -- acts that UN investigators say amounts to "genocide" by the military generals.
Another 120,000 of

the stateless minority. who are largely reviled by ethnic Rakhine and have garnered little sym-

pathy among the Myanmar public, have been forced to live in displacement camps in the region with bleak conditions and a dire lack of food. But Myanmar Pres-

ident Win Myint paint-ed a different reality in a statement Saturday when he congratulated the "ethnic brothers and sisters" on the 44th anniversary of the Ra-khine State Day. With no natural di-

sasters, "we can say that 2018 has been an auspicious year", he wrote in Myanmar's state-run newspaper.


Rakhine, one of the poorest states in the country, is also the site of planned economic zones. he said, and the govern-ment is working to pro-vide "24 hour electricity"

to certain townships.

He also praised a pact signed between Myan-mar and Bangladesh to repatriate the Rohingya refugees and the arrangements made to receive "those displaced people have gone over to the Bangladesh side".

The process which was repeatedly delayed was supposed to finally commence last month but it fell flat when not a single Rohingya took up the offer of repa-triation, with many on the returnee list going into hiding.

The refugees fear returning home without guarantees of protection, citizenship or rights from the government and the powerful military. Rights groups have criticised re-



As for those within the camps in Rakh-ine state, many have attempted to leave by boats to Malaysia and In-donesia since the monsoon season ended last month, enduring a per-ilous journey to escape what rights groups call "open-air prisons".
