5 tourists killed in road mishap

 ${f F}$ ive tourists hailing from Hooghly, West Bengal, were killed when the Mahindra Maxx passenger vehicle they were travelling in went off the road at 7th Mile on JN Road while returning from Baba Mandir near Nathula on Sunday at 6:40 PM.

Police records reveal that while four passengers died on the spot, one succumbed to her injuries in hospital.

There were nine people on board the ill-fated

vehicle including the driver who has since been booked in connection with the accident.

The dead and the injured were evacuated from site with help from Home Guards (SDRF), local villagers, driver associations and tour operators.

Those killed in the accident are: Kakila Bose, 42, Shenasish Bose, 58, Soma Kar, 32, Sandeep Kaur, 44, and Subhajit Bose, 26.

Mahuya Patra, 21, and Surjyas Kaur, 05, are currently undergoing treatment for their injuries.

Report on PM's speech in Barmer sent to EC: Poll authorities

BARMER, APR 29 (PTI): The district polls authorities on Monday said a factual report has been submitted to the Election Commission following allegations by the Congress that Prime Minister Narendra Modi during his speech at a rally here had "brazenly" violated the poll code by repeatedly invoking the armed forces.

A factual report along with transcription of the prime minister's address he delivered in Barmer recently has been forwarded to the Election Commission, the district election office said.

The Congress had moved the Election Commission (EC) on April 22 alleging that the prime minister "brazenly" violated the poll code by repeatedly invoking the armed forces in his speeches Diwali?" he had said.

and demanded that a campaign ban be imposed on him for some time.

Following the Congress' complaint, the EC had sought a report on the address of the prime minister in Barmer from the district poll authorities.

"The report has been forwarded with the copy of PM's speech as per the direction of the Commission," district election officer Himanshu Gupta said.

During a poll rally in Barmer, Modi had said India is no more afraid of Pakistan's nuclear threats.

"India has stopped getting scared of Pakistan's threats, I have done right, no? Else every other day they (Pakistan) used to say 'we have nuclear button'....What do we have then? Have we kept it (nuclear button) for

208 FIRs, DD entries against political parties, others for poll code violations in Delhi

NEW DELHI, APR 29 (PTI): As many as 208 FIRs and daily dairy entries have been registered against various political parties and others in the national capital for violating the model code of conduct, officials said Monday.

Of these, 16 FIRs have been filed against the Bharatiya Janata Party, 13 against the Aam Aadmi Party, three against the Congress and one against the Bahujan Samaj Party, Delhi's Chief Electoral Officer (CEO) Ranbir Singh said.

He said authorities have removed over 3.4 lakh banners, posters and hoardings across the national capital.

The model code of conduct for the Lok Sabha election came into force on March 10.

The CEO said 1,155 FIRs have been registered and 1,157 people arrested under the Excise Act. Under the Arms Act, 424 FIRs have been filed and 496 people arrested.

Authorities have seized liquor worth Rs 3 crore and over 1,400 kg of drugs.

Police have confiscated 545 unlicensed arms. Forty-three cases have been registered for "misuse of vehicles, loudspeakers, illegal meetings and gratification of electors".

Home Minister James K Sangma said the state government had launched the Meghalaya Milk Mission and Rs 215 crore has been sanctioned.

"In view to really increase the milk production in the state, we have decided to approve the creation of a directorate of dairy development," he said.

The state Cabinet has also approved a proposal for enhancing the grant-in-aid to night and morning ad-hoc secondary schools in the state.

The Home Minister said the proposal to increase the grant-in-aid to 15 such schools has been approved.

The minister also said the government has decided to have uniform rate in the grantin-aid extended to such schools unlike earlier where different amount was given to different categories.

The fire broke out in the factories located behind PVR Cinema at the Naraina industrial area around 11.35 am. Forty fire tenders were rushed to the spot after a call about the blaze was received.

Officials said the factory where the fire started did not have a fire safety clearance and even the other two factories were functioning without a fire No Objection Certificate. They said there could have been casualties, had it

been a working day. "The chemical was adhesive in nature. It is suspected that it was spirit. The fire was brought under control at 2.10 pm. Just when it was thought that the fire had been doused, there was a blast in containers in which chemical was stored which led to injuries to fireman Naresh Kumar and special officer Aman," the Delhi Fire Service official said.

The impact of the blast was such that the duo slipped and sustained burn injuries.

"The fireman sustained burn injuries on the back and even when water was being poured

to ease the pain, he was feeling a burning sensation and was crying constantly," a witness said.

The injured were rushed to B L Kapoor Super Specialty Hospital and are out of danger, Chief Fire Officer of Delhi Fire Service Atul Garg

Garg said it seems the factories did not have fire clearance, but they are checking the facts.

One of the three factories was completely gutted in the blaze, one was partially burnt and the third one was affected a little bit, a senior fire officer said, adding that the cause of the fire is yet to be ascertained.

"There was panic in the area as locals saw smoke emanating from a factory around 11 am. Rumours are being spread about the fire tenders reaching late. Actually, fire engines reached there on time," General Secretary of Naraina Gurdwara C S

Bhatia said. The blaze intensified due to wind making the job of firemen difficult, an official said, adding that the factory was located in an open area due to which the firetenders could reach the spot in time and had easy access to the factories.

Smoke billowing from the factory could be seen from a distance as the firetenders made multiple trips to the fire station to fill water in the containers.

China, Pakistan sign agreement on space exploration

BEIJING, APR 29 (PTI): China and Pakistan have signed an agreement on space exploration, marking a new phase in space science cooperation between the all-weather allies.

The agreement was signed on April 27 during the visit of Pakistan Prime Minister Imran Khan to China for the 2nd Belt and Road Forum (BRF), the China National Space Administration (CNSA) said in a statement.

The space agreement will serve as a high-level foundation for cooperation in space science and exploration. Both nations will conduct scientific and technological experiments, astronaut training, along with manned space applications and achievement transformation, official media quoted the CNSA statement as saying on Monday. The space agreement

between China and Pakistan also comes close on the heels of India's successful Anti-Satellite (ASAT) Missile test last month.

The test made India the fourth country in the world after the US. Russia and China to acquire the strategic capability to shoot down enemy satellites. China had conducted such a test in January 2007 when its anti-sat-

ellite missile destroyed a

weather satellite. Under the agreement, the CNSA and the Pakistan Space and Upper Atmosphere Research Commission will establish a China-Pakistan space committee chaired by top officials from both sides to address future collaborative issues.

China has advanced space programme with successful manned missions besides exploration missions to Moon. China is also building its space station which was expected to be ready by 2022. It has also unveiled plans to send spacecraft to Mars and Jupiter.

"The newly-signed space exploration agreement between China

and Pakistan on manned space missions manifests their more profound cooperation on the peaceful use of outer space," state-run Global Times quoted experts as saying.

> Since Pakistan is China's all-weather friend, China is willing to provide know-how to foster Pakistan's technological development on the use of outer space, Lan Jianxue, an associate research fellow at the China Institute of International Studies, told the Global Times on Monday.

"China-Pakistan space cooperation will help Pakistan in terms of satellite monitoring of natural disasters and agricultural production, land and resources surveying, and waste handling in a microgravity environment," Lan said, adding that China will also benefit from the cooperation, including for commercial applications of space technology, investment security and counter-terrorism.

Where's the jobs? Rahul asks youths wearing 'main bhi chowkidar' T-shirts at rally

CHURU (R'THAN), APR 29 (PTI): Youths wearing T-shirts with the BJP's "main bhi chowkidar" slogan at a rally on Monday caught the attention of Congress president Rahul Gandhi, who asked them about the 2 crore jobs promised by Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

Addressing a public meeting in Sardarshahar town of Rajasthan's Churu district, Gandhi acknowledged the presence of some youths who were wearing the T-shirts having the "main bhi chowkidar" (I, too, am a watchman) slogan of the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP).

"You are wearing T-shirt of the 'chowkidar' (watchman). You all are welcome here," Gandhi

The Congress chief first said Modi had promised Rs 15 lakh in the bank accounts of all Indians and asked whether anyone present in the rally had received the

jobs. Anyone among you got the jobs?" Gandhi asked, pointing to the youths who were wearing the T-shirts.

Describing demonetisation and the goods and services tax as an attack on the country's economy and employment, the Congress leader claimed lakhs of youths were left unemployed by the twin decisions.

Gandhi accused Modi of giving public money to the top 15 rich people, adding that the Congress wants to give money to the poor through its proposed minimum income support scheme, Nyay. Under the scheme,

Rs 72,000 will be deposited annually in the bank accounts of the poorest 5 crore women of the country, Gandhi explained. "The money to run the scheme will not come from the bank accounts of the middle class and shopkeepers or from the pockets of honest businessmen."

He also talked about the Congress' manifesto promise of making loan

"I want to give a message to PM Modi, you want to send to jail those farmers who cannot repay a loan of Rs 20.000." Gandhi said. "But you can also send behind bars those who have taken away Rs 35,000 crore of public money. If they are not jailed, then the farmers will also not go (to

Gandhi pointed out to the farmers' budget promised by the Congress if it comes to pow-

"After the 2019 election, two budgets are going to be presented in India. The first budget will be the special budget for the farmers. Not after the general budget, it will be presented before the general budget."

In the budget, Gandhi said, the farmers would be told how much money the government was going to give them in a year. Issues of minimum support price (MSP) and compensation will be clear in the budget, he

BJP urges EC to deploy central forces in all polling booths in West Bengal

NEW DELHI, APR 29 **(PTI)**: The BJP Monday approached the Election Commission complaining that TMC workers have "hijacked democracy" in West Bengal and creating ruckus during voting, and again demanded deployment of central forces in all polling booths in the state.

Following reports of a clash between the ruling Trinamool Congress and BJP workers outside a booth in Asansol's Barabani, and vandalism of the vehicle of Union Minister and sitting MP Babul Supriyo, a BJP delegation met top officials of the poll panel here.

The delegation included Union Ministers Mukhtar Abbas Naqvi and Vijay Goel, and the party's media in-charge Anil Baluni.

After meeting the poll panel officials, Naqvi told reporters, "The ruling Trinamool Congress workers have hijacked democracy in the state and are indulging in violence. They are being supported by the local machinery and we demand deployment of central forces in all polling booths in the state."

Later in a press conference, BJP's national spokesperson G V L Narasimha Rao said there were reports of "rampant violence" in West Bengal during polling on Monday.



Some BJP candidates, including ministers were attacked, he said.

"There is a clear indication that West Bengal is going with the BJP in this election. A state which was in the grip of the TMC is today experiencing winds of change. There is a massive buildup in support of BJP in the state.

"Mamata Banerjee is seeing the writing on the wall and the TMC cadre are indulging in violence only to scare away BJP voters. The people of the state are determined to bring change in the state," Rao said.

The BJP leaders, during their meeting with poll panel officials, also expressed concern over "no action" been taken against Congress president Rahul Gandhi for his "baseless allegations" against BJP chief Amit Shah and Prime Minister Narendra Modi, and said a memorandum in this regard has been submitted

to the Election Commission. "We wish to invite the commission's attention to the repeated and persistent violations of the Model Code of Conduct by Rahul Gandhi, President of Indian National Congress. The specific instances of brazen, baseless, malicious and defamatory allegations against Narendra Modi and Amit Shah," the BJP said in the memorandum.

Citing the various instances where Gandhi, in his public rallies, made "baseless allegations" against Modi and Shah, the BJP said these are just a few instances of the "brazen, blatant and utterly false and unverified and unsubstantiated allegations of Rahul Gandhi. There is a pattern and design and it continues unchecked and unabated."

This should be of concern for the poll panel as Gandhi, "unabashedly and shamelessly spreads lies and tears the model code of conduct", that the commission has put together as a set of basic rules of the game, Naqvi said.

The BJP also complained to the poll panel about the Madhya Pradesh chief secretary and the director general of police about their "partisan attitude".

The Centre's prayer was made before a bench headed by Chief Justice Ranjan Gogoi which did not say anything on the issue of adjournment of the scheduled hearing on Tuesday.

The bench, also comprising Justices Deepak Gupta and Sanjiv Khanna, allowed senior advocate R Balasubramanian, appearing for the Centre, to circulate a letter of adjournment among the parties which include petitioners who have filed the review pleas.

The Centre's letter said it needs time to file reply on merits on the review petitions.

The review petitions filed by former Union ministers Yashwant Sinha, Arun Shourie and activist lawyer Prashant Bhushan is listed for hearing before a bench headed by the Chief Justice on Tuesday in the post lunch session.

Two other review

petitions -- filed by Aam Aadmi Party leader Sanjay Singh and advocate Vineet Dhanda -- are also listed for hearing on Tuesday.

The Centre has said in the letter that it has raised certain preliminary objections on maintainability of certain documents relied upon in the review petitions and the court had decided the issue on April 10.

It said that since the government has not filed any reply on merit of the review pleas, it would need some time to file a detailed reply to the petitions seeking review of December 14, 2018 verdict in Rafale fighter jet deal case.

In a setback to the Centre, the apex court on April 10 allowed the pleas which relied on leaked documents for seeking review of its Rafale judgement and dismissed the government's preliminary objections claiming "privilege" over them.

The Centre had submitted that three privileged documents were unauthorisedly removed from the Defence Ministry and used by the petitioners to support their review petitions against the December 14, 2018 judgement of the apex court which had dismissed all pleas challenging the procurement of 36 Rafale fighter jets from France.

The top court had rejected the objections raised by the Centre that those documents were not admissible as evidence under Section 123 of the Indian Evidence Act, and no one can produce them in court without the permission of the department concerned as they are also protected under the Official Secrets

It had noted that all the three documents were in "public domain" and published by prominent daily The Hindu were "in consonance with the constitutional guarantee of freedom of

It had said the documents used in the pleas were published in The Hindu' in February and one of the papers was also published by The Wire'.

The apex court had also noted that no law enacted by Parliament specifically barring or prohibiting the publication of such documents on any of the grounds mentioned in Article 19(2) of the Constitution has been brought to its notice.

Help the Minor Recover

by helping them heal from the trauma of crimes visited on them

The safety of children around grown-ups I even in environments where they are expected to be safe is being discussed at the national level and on even media platform at present. Children, however, have always been in harm's way and Sikkim is not new to disturbing incidents of minors being targeted with sexual violence. It is important that these discussions continue and the society does not get inured to the horror of sexual offences being committed against children just because it gets reported so often.

Words fail you when it comes to deploring the rape of a minor. While rape in itself is a reprehensible act, when the victim is a minor, the heinousness of the crime multiplies. The crime is no longer one in which the victim is violated physically, but becomes a transgression which scars an innocent mind permanently. Unfortunately most cases of child abuse and rape of minors are committed by people known to the child. Family friends and relatives, whom a child is normally conditioned to trust, are known to betray the faith and turn into animals as are neighbours and acquaintances that families leave children unattended around. While the Courts and the conscience of the predator will decide how the culprit lives with his guilt, it is the impact of such crimes on the fragile minds of children that is a matter of deeper and continued concern. Everything that a child has been led to believe and conditioned to accept [like trusting and respecting her/ his elders] are felled in one swoop of a warped mind. As much as the culprit needs to be punished, the child needs to be saved. The emotional trauma that is sure to haunt the mind which is still uncertain of what singled her/ him out to be targeted with such a crime needs to be addressed.

Minds of the minors understand and weigh everything as rewards and punishments. Already confused, the child cannot be left to find the reasons behind the crime by herself. She should not be allowed to go through the rest of her formative years trying to figure out what she had done wrong to deserve such 'punishment'. She has to be told that she was in no way responsible for what happened to her. It is important that victims understand that a deranged mind and ignorant elders allowed the crimes to happen. Everyone responsible for the child's care has to apologise to her for having ignored the warning signs [every culprit must have displayed some signs of his paedophilia] and allowed the crime to visit her. Victims also need professional help. It is now obvious that most parents don't have the wherewithal to handle such situations and ensure that their children heal properly. Hence, they along with the child need to be counselled by professionals so that the situation does not become worse for the child who has already suffered enough.

It is also important for all parents to look out for possible paedophiles in the family or the neighbourhood. Because this is such a repulsively deviant behaviour to discover in someone you know, most people tend to subconsciously ignore it even when it is obvious. We do so at our own peril.

Reporting on China in Africa is too binary. What needs to be done to fix it

China's involvement in many parts of Africa is expanding. Several milestones have been reached in recent years. These include China becoming the continent's largest trading partner in 2009 and the opening of the country's first overseas military base in Djibouti in 2017.

So it's not surprising that this has become an ever-expanding topic for both the media and researchers. But the accuracy of work being done, particularly in terms of reportage, leaves a great deal to be desired.

Over the past ten years media scholars have increasingly begun to turn their attention to the issue. It's one of the reasons for the 2009 launch of the Africa-China Reporting Project at the University of the Witwatersrand, where I'm associated. More recently scholarly work has been produced in a bid to identify what's missing.

In analysis I did for a recently co-authored chapter in New Directions in Africa-China Studies we argue that a number of factors have contributed to coverage of the relationship between China and African countries, at times becoming a fertile area for propaganda, misinformation and disinformation. The main factors are the pressure on journalists for fast-paced information gathering. And the second is the impact that platforms such as Google, Facebook and Twitter are having on the dissemination of news, including the growing trend of the misuse of information.

Search a topic in the widely reported area of China in Africa, and it's clear that many of the "facts" made available often appear contradictory. China is frequently framed and referred to in binary terms. It's either portrayed as predator, or as a friend.

But the truth is far more nuanced. Individual relationships between China and particular countries differ. It's also true that relationships between Beijing and certain regions have different hues. On top of this, these various relationships have been moulded over time.

There are ways to address the gaps in coverage and dearth of context. But it will require support as well as concerted effort on the part of journalists and media houses in African countries to report on behalf of Africans.

NO NUANCE

The "predator" coverage portrays African countries as "set to burn as debt soars". The "friend" image is portrayed through coverage of officials rejecting this view, as they did at last year's Forum on China-Africa Cooperation.

Other examples include China being portrayed as "grabbing land" in Africa, and offering "rogue aid". On the other hand reports tend to speak about "Chinese-funded" transport infrastructure projects without acknowledgement of the fact that a myriad international and local partners are also involved.

These over-simplified and overarching "China-Africa" narratives are deeply misleading. They make extracting facts about the China-Africa relationship extremely challenging: very often opinion trumps verification.

WHAT AFFECTS REPORTING?

I have established three reasons why certain narratives take hold in the popular psyche and become representative of this complex relationship.

The first relates to the issue of perceptions towards China. Perceptions about China are coloured by social and historical contexts. For example, business or government officials who have engaged with China for a longer period of time are more likely to view it in a more nuanced and even positive way.

The second factor is linked to interest. For example, those who have something to lose from China's role in Africa may harbour more negative views. And those who have something to gain are more likely to push a positive line.

The problem is that most of the time reporting doesn't make clear why particular individuals, or groups, hold certain views. For example, those who have a stake in the direction of links between China and a particular country, would want to push their view. Not explaining their particular interest can leave an incomplete and misguided impression. So a single perspective can multiply to become the defining narrative of story.

The third aspect is related to a lack of understanding. The focus on Asia studies in African higher education institutions remains limited. This in-

cludes deeper understanding of the rich history, culture and complexities of the East Asia region. In contrast the US, one of China's main global competitors, has a long tradition of Asia studies and exchanges.

WHERE TO FROM HERE?

Part of the reason stories may be misreported is that data and information about particular relationships, particularly related to high-level agreements and deals, are missing.

This was highlighted when the Democratic Alliance, South Africa's main opposition party, threatened to take legal action against power utility Eskom, if it did not make its 2018 loan agreement with China public. Hence links with China is also at times, a backdrop to deeper domestic interactions.

The advent of technology and the information age has brought societies closer together. But they have also reinforced persistent differences based on perception, interests and limited understanding.

The divisive views and reporting such as the Africa-China example won't dissipate unless journalists continually ask "why" when they are presented information about China and Africa's relations.

They also have a duty to stand back and not perpetuate the preferred flavour of the news cycle.

For their part, media houses should make sure that their journalists are better equipped to cover these complex relationships. Given that one of the trends that stands out is that reporting on the relationship between China and African countries takes place from outside the continent, it's imperative that more on-theground reporting, verification and support for local journalists is encouraged.

Sudan: The symbolic significance of the space protesters made their own

Where there is revolution, there's a central gathering point - just think of Egypt's Tahrir Square, Taksim Square in Istanbul and Habib Bourguiba Avenue in Tunisia. They all captured the world's imagination as places where the power of the masses couldn't be ignored.

As an architect who studies urban public spaces, and as a Sudanese, I have wondered since December 2018 - when protesters rose up against Omar al-Bashir's regime - which space would become Khartoum's equivalent of Tahrir Square. Which of the Sudanese capital city's public spaces would hold similar symbolism?

Some open areas in Khartoum, such as Al Saha Al Ghadraa, have historical links to the al-Bashir regime and would not have been acceptable to the protesters. Others would hold immense symbolic value, but would raise questions about links to specific political parties. Buildings of significance, such as the parliament in Omdurman, don't offer a public square in the true sense of the word, and so would not be an appropriate gathering space.

The answer emerged on 6 April 2019. Hundreds of thousands of people marched to the Sudanese Army's headquarters in the Ministry of Defence's complex. That march evolved into a multi-day sit-in. Weeks later, and with al-Bashir ousted, the sit-in

It's a powerful, significant choice of venue. First, the army headquarters are usually off-limits. Photography is not permitted and access is restricted. Yet the army permitted a massive gathering on its doorstep. Second, the army actually went on to actively defend the protesters against attacks by the National Intelligence



and Security forces. The venue offered protection and security.

Finally, it was a symbolic choice: the protesters knew that army collaboration would be crucial to achieve a transitional government.

All of this echoes what research and history have repeatedly shown. Urban public spaces may be built to represent governments, but they are often appropriated by citizens and become sites of protest. The space in Sudan has not been a gathering place before, and the roads that surround the complex actually hold no special characteristics spatially or architecturally. Yet they have been appropriated - and they have come to serve the protesters' purpose

AN ALTERED SPACE

The Sudanese military complex in Khartoum is comprised of three sections. The Land Forces occupy a section that's built to resemble army tanks. The Air Force's section is shaped like an airplane, and the Navy's resembles a ship. This approach to architecture - buildings that project their meaning in a literal way - has a name: "ducks" The spaces adjacent to the buildings are in-

habited by protesters who literally live on the site.

The complex sits just north of the airport and is flanked on the east and west by the Hay al Matar (Airport District) and the neighbourhood of Burri, which has been one of the most active neighbourhoods during the revolution. A couple of kilometres to the north is a bridge that crosses the

Blue Nile to Khartoum North. This has transformed the streets. Some have said that this space is now a microcosm of the future Sudan that the protesters envision. It's a space where freedom of expression is permitted. Murals and street art are everywhere.

Temporary classrooms have been set up to commemorate a teacher who was killed by the security forces. Makeshift clinics staffed by volunteers offer free medicines. We are being told by people on the ground about the free food, water and medicines that are being provided through donations. Street children and the homeless have been accommodated. Engineering and architecture students are working to build drinking fountains. Temporary toilets have been set up.

Street traders are selling their goods. Cultural activities abound, too: musicians and political leaders from different parties visit the area each day to entertain and educate.

It's important to point out that the situation is in flux. The routes were pedestrianised. Protesters would not let vehicles in, apart from those making important deliveries. But Sudan's military council has now called for the reopening of the routes.

WHAT NEXT?

The fate of other iconic places of protest hasn't always been celebratory or positive. Sometimes, authorities move to eradicate history and memory in these spaces.

There are hopes that Khartoum's story might be different. Already architectural groups on social media are discussing the possibility of retaining this space as a "freedom square" in future plans for the city. Others have argued that this is not possible because of the site's military nature.

But whatever happens, there's no doubt that Khartoum's military complex - and its role as a space for public protests and uprising - will go down in history and would have to be acknowledged in any future visions for the city.

Clashes disrupt polling in Bengal, minister's car vandalized

KOLKATA, APR 29 (PTI): side a booth, following rigging the polls in al-Violence marred the first few hours of polling in West Bengal, where the fourth phase of elections is underway in eight Lok Sabha constituencies.

According to a senior election official, clashes broke out between the supporters of rival parties in Nanoor, Rampurhat, Nalhati and Siuri areas of Birbhum seat, injuring several people on the two sides.

In Dubrajpur area of the constituency, voters allegedly engaged in a scuffle with the central forces when they were barred from entering the booths with mobile phones.

Security personnel reportedly opened fire in the air to control the mob, following which polling was stalled in these booths, the official

The state election office has also received reports of violence from Jemua and Barabani areas of Burdwan East (SC) constituency, he maintained.

"In Barabani, BJP candidate and central minister minister Babul Supriyo's vehicle was vandalised allegedly by the workers of the TMC outside a polling station, while in Jemua, voters fled a polling station after being threatened by miscreants," he told PTI.

According to reports, Supriyo had a tiff with the polling officials inwhich TMC supporters attacked his vehicle.

Supriyo, on his part, said, "I visited Barabani to witness the poll process, but found that voters were not being allowed to exercise their franchise. Our fight is to establish democracy... It is shameful that I have to say this in a democratic country."

The senior election official gave assurances that measures were being taken to rein in poll-related violence.

"Polling was peaceful in the first two hours. However, news of clashes started surfacing from several areas thereafter. We have sought reports from each of these plac-

Our officials are monitoring the situation and taking measures to conduct the election in a free and fair manner," he said.

In Birbhum constituency, the Election Commission has showcaused BIP candidate Dudh Kumar Mondal after he was seen talking over a mobile phone inside a polling booth, just before casting his ballot, the official said, adding that the presiding officer of the station has been removed.

Notably, the EC has put TMC's Birbhum president Anubrata Mondal under scanner after poll workers complained that they feel

"threatened" by his presence. Accusing the TMC of most every booth, BJP's Krishnanagar candidate Kalyan Chaubey said voters in several areas were not allowed to cast their ballots.

"The TMC goons have jammed the booths in Chapra, Dompukur and Hatisala areas of Krishconstituency. The central forces are guarding the booths and 100-metre radius around those centres, but people beyond that were being warned against casting their votes. I was also threatened by some of them," Chaubey said.

Rebuffing charges, TMC Krishnagar candidate Mahua Maitra said the accusations were baseless and bereft of truth.

"As they (BJP) do not have a support base in the constituency, they could not appoint enough observers for the polling stations. Now, they are giving excuses They are baseless allegations," she added.

A total of 1,34,56,491 electorate will seal the fate of 68 candidates on Monday in eight parliamentary seats -- Baharampur, Krishnanagar, Ranaghat (SC), Burdwan East (SC), Burdwan-Durgapur, Asansol, Bolpur (SC) and Birbhum.

The EC has deployed 580 companies of central forces to man over 98 per cent of the polling booths in these constituencies to ensure free and fair polling.

Muhammed told PTI there are heritage sites dating back 1,000 years in two villages, Mitawali and Padhawali, within a range of 5 km in inaccessible parts of the Chambal Valley.

Foreign invaders attacked and ruined these heritage sites. The structures could not be restored as the ruins then became a haven for dreaded dacoits of Chambal. And now, crevices have developed in the walls due to illegal mining blasts.

Muhammed around 700 years ago in 1323, when the temple was constructed under the regime of King Devpal, no one would have imagined that British architect Edwin Lutyens would precisely depict the architectural beauty of this temple on a replica of the structure, the "temple of the Indian

> The temple constructed at a height of 200 metres on a hill reminds tourists, reaching Mitawali after taking uneven roads, of the Parliament House.

> Veteran archaeologist Muhammed said there are two opinions among historians regarding the Parliament House being a replica of the temple.

> While one section believes that Parliament House, Rashtrapati Bhavan, and other such structures on the Raisina Hills were Roman-inspired architecture, the other is of the view that architects Lutyens and Herbert Baker clearly presented a mix of the Indian and the western architect in these constructions.

> Muhammed claimed that the design of the Parliament House is inspired from the circular Chausath Yogini temple.

> He said the vedic mantras engraved on the walls of the Parliament House is a vindication that the Birtish architects did take into account the Indian building construction art. The Chausath Yogini

MADRID, APR 29 (AFP): Real Madrid's response to Barcelona winning the title was to lose to 19th-placed Rayo Vallecano and fall 18 points behind La Liga's newly-crowned champions.

A deserved 1-0 defeat at Vallecas Sunday means Zinedine Zidane's second term now shows four wins from eight games and a worrying lack of improvement since he returned as Madrid's coach.

Adri Embarba's penalty, given after consultation with VAR, was enough for Rayo, who move to within six points of survival, with three games left to play.

For Madrid, the gap widens between them and Barcelona, whose players had been dancing on the pitch at Camp Nou the night before and posing for photos with their children after wrapping up a fourth La Liga title in five years.

Zidane took over knowing Madrid's challenge was all-but extinguished but the difference on Barca then was 12 points while catching Atletico Madrid still seemed achievable.

Atletico are now nine points ahead and the way Madrid are closing out this season will surely be a cause for concern.

Not since March 31 has anyone except Karim Benzema, out with a hamstring injury, scored for them in La Liga and they created precious few chances against a Ravo side that had conceded 62 goals this term. No side in the division has shipped more.

Zidane said last week that the league would be the club's first priority from August but, even with new signings and fresh motivation, it could prove difficult to flick the switch. Madrid's winning habit has long-been lost.

Mumbai Indians will have a return-leg clash against KKR on May 5 which will be their last clash in the league round. Needing a win to seal a playoff berth, Mumbai Indians next face Sunrisers Hyderabad at home on May 2.

Opening or floating, talented Gill 'happy' to bat anywhere

KOLKATA, APR 29 (PTI): His two half-centuries this IPL season may have come in his favoured opening slot but Shubman Gill has defended Kolkata Knight Riders' debatable decision to use him as a floater.

Opening the batting for only the third time this season, the talented 19-year-old smashed a career-best 76 to power KKR to 157 for one in 15 overs against Mumbai Indians Sunday. In the end, KKR notched 232 for two in 20 overs.

SYDNEY, APR 29 (AFP): A fresh opinion poll Australia's showed bare-knuckle election campaign tightening significantly but the centre-left opposition Labor party maintaining a narrow lead ahead of a first televised leaders' debate Monday.

The Newspoll survey showed Labor's edge over the conservative governing coalition narrowed to two percentage points, well within the margin of error.

For months the polls had shown the opposition headed for a landslide victory at the May 18 vote.

The latest result heaps pressure on the 51-year-old Labor leader Bill Shorten ahead of Monday's prime time debate.

"The flooding in Bengkulu was made worse by the severe damage... caused by coal mining," Ali Akbar from local environmental group Kanopi Bengkulu said in a statement.

Illegal mining was blamed for killing dozens on the island of Sulawesi in March when a makeshift mine collapsed.

Mineral-rich Indonesia has scores of unlicensed mines -- many with complete disregard for even the most basic safety procedures.

Also in Sulawesi this year, some 70 people were killed by floods and landslides that wiped entire villages off the map. Nearly 10,000 people were displaced.

Last month, some 112 people died and more than 90 remain missing after torrential rains pounded Indonesia's Papua region, triggering landslides and flash floods.

Indonesia, a nation of some 17,000 islands, is one of the most disaster-prone nations on Earth. Earthquakes and volcanic eruptions are a common occurrence.



OUAGADOUGOU, APR 29 (AFP): Gunmen killed four worshippers and a pastor in the first jihadist attack on a church in Burkina Faso, security and local sources said Monday.

Sunday's attack took place in the small northern town of Silgadji near Djibo, the capital of Soum province, and two others were reported missing.

"Unidentified armed individuals have attacked the Protestant church in Silgadji, killing four members of the congregation and the main pastor," a security source told AFP.

"At least two other people are missing," the source added.

It was the first attack on a church since jihadist violence erupted in the West African nation. Muslim clerics and imams have been targeted as well.

"The attack happened around 1:00 pm, just as the faithful were leaving the church at the end of the service," a member of the church who did not want to be identified told AFP.

"The attackers were on motorbikes. They fired in the air before aiming at the members of the congregation," the witness added. Burkina Faso has

suffered from increasingly frequent and deadly attacks attributed to a number of jihadist groups, including the Ansarul Islam group, the Group to Support Islam and Muslims (GSIM) and Islamic State in the Greater Sahara.

The attacks started in the north of the country before targetting the capital Ouagadougou and other regions, notably the east of the country.

In February, a Spanish priest, Father Cesar Fernandez, was killed in a raid attributed to jihadists in Nohao in the centre of the country.

Prez suspends defiant Lankan police chief over blasts, names successor; appoints new defence secy (Eds: Adds defence secy's appointment)

COLOMBO, APR 29 (PTI):

Sri Lankan President Maithripala Sirisena on Monday suspended defiant police chief Pujith Jayasundara and named his successor as well as a new defence secretary as part of the revamping of the security establishment following the country's worst terror attack.

Sirisena on Friday said that Jayasundara had resigned but he never sent the letter and remained in his official residence, according to officials.

tor General C D Wickremaratne has been appointed as the acting police chief while former Inspector General N K Illangakoon named as an advisor to the Defence Ministry, according to the President's office.

Police chief Jayasundara was asked to quit along with defence ministry secretary Hemasiri Fernando, taking responsibility for the intelligence failure that led to the bombings.

Jayasundara, however, refused to heed Sirisena's call to resign following April 21 coordinated blasts on three churches and three luxury hotels.

The police chief in Sri Lanka can only be removed through a parliamentary procedure and Sirisena's action suspending him is the first step towards that, the officials said.

PITTSBURGH, APR 29 (AFP): Former US vice president Joe Biden, the newest Democratic presidential candidate, will hit the campaign trail in earnest on Monday with a rally before union members who have been a mainstay of his and the party's support.

For his first public event since announcing his candidacy last Thursday, Biden chose Pennsylvania, the state where he was born 76 years ago -- and more specifically Pittsburgh, a blue-collar city now remaking itself as a tech hub.

Perhaps best-known as former president Barack Obama's twoterm deputy, Biden has set himself apart from most of the sprawling Democratic field by opting for a strategy of fullon confrontation with President Donald Trump.

He accuses the current Republican president of undermining long-time American values.

Whether that approach appeals to voters -- or if they prefer other Democrats' focus on issues like healthcare, the environment and infrastructure -- will become clear in coming months. But Biden, with name

recognition earned not just with Obama but in his 36 years representing the state of Delaware in the Senate, starts out with a leg up over other Democrats.

A Washington Post/ ABC poll on Sunday put him in the lead among Democrats, with 17 percent support, to 11 percent for Senator Bernie Sanders and five percent for South Bend, Indiana Mayor Pete Buttigieg.

Pennsylvania voted for Trump in 2016 -- after favoring Obama in the two previous elections -making it one of the key industrial states where a

"Wall Street bankers and CEOs did not build the United States," he said in a recent appearance in Massachusetts in front of striking supermarket workers. "You built the United States... ordinary people of the middle class built this country." In Pittsburgh, Biden will be addressing a union group about his ideas for rebuilding the American middle class.

The announcement of his candidacy drew rapid fire from Trump, who immediately conferred on him the dismissive title of "Sleepy Joe." It also may have sparked the insistence last week by the 72-year-old president that he is a "young, vibrant man" -- presumably contrasting himself with Biden, who has visibly aged since leaving the White House and will need reserves of energy during the long campaign ahead.

With several young Democrats seeking the nomination -- the youngest is 37-year-old Buttigieg -- Biden's age seems certain to become an issue. However, one top rival, Bernie Sanders, is also no spring chicken at 77 years old.

And with many of his Democratic rivals taking left-leaning positions on issues from the environment to reparations for the descendants of slaves, Biden's decidedly centrist and moderate approach could make him an outlier.

"Here's the problem for Joe," Republican Senator Lindsey Graham said Sunday on CBS: "Does he fit into the Democratic Party of 2020? I don't know." For now, Biden can take comfort not only in the polls, which made him a frontrunner even before he declared his candidacy, but also in his fund-raising success.

He raised USD 6.3 million in the 24 hours after his announcement, highest figure for any Democrat so far.

Biden has another problem, however -- the accusations, dating back years, that he has been a little too "touchy-feely" around women on the campaign trail and at public events.

He has insisted that he never "intended" to make anyone uncomfortable and has promised to do better in future.

Lanka to introduce tough laws to eliminate jihadism: PM Wickremesinghe



COLOMBO, APR 29 (PTI): Introducing a tough new legislation to eliminate jihadism and extremism from Sri Lanka is the government's top priority, Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe has said in the aftermath of country's worst terror attacks on Easter Sunday. The deadly attacks

could have been prevented if the new Counter Terrorism Bill, which provides for territorial jurisdiction, was passed in Parliament without delay, he said on Sunday after joining the Sunday Mass in Colombo and the mass at the Saint Anthony's church in Kochchikade, a week after the deadly suicide bombing killed over 250 people. "No anti-terrorism

law in Sri Lanka provides for territorial jurisdiction under which a cadre belonging to an international terrorist organisation could be arrested in Sri Lanka if they are found. Not even the penal code provides that provision," the Prime Minister was quoted as saying by the Daily Mirror.

Introducing legislation against extremism is a priority for the government and new laws will be introduced to eliminate jihadism from the country, Wickremesinghe was quoted as saying by the Colombo Page.

"We have included this provision in the new Counter Terrorism Bill. However, it is stuck in Parliament for months. The Easter Sunday attacks could have been prevented if this legislation was passed," he said.

Nine suicide bombers carried out a series of devastating blasts that tore through three churches and three luxury hotels on the Easter Sunday, killing 253 people.

The Islamic State claimed the attacks, but the government has blamed local Islamist extremist group National Thowheeth Jamaath (NTJ) for the attacks.

Sri Lanka on Saturday banned the NTJ and a splinter group linked to the ISIS.

A total of 106 suspects, including a Tamil medium teacher and a school principal, have been arrested in connection with the Easter Sunday blasts.

Wickremesinghe reiterated that defence authorities should have acted upon the warnings given by intelligence units.

"There has been no breakdown in the intelligence services but the issue has been that the defence authorities had not acted upon the warnings," he added.

Last week, State Minister of Defence Ruwan Wijewardene accepted that there had been "major" lapses in the security arrangements.

Sri Lankan and international media reported that India and the US provided specific warnings about terror attacks to Sri Lanka, ahead of the Easter Sunday bombings.
