India hits back at US, hikes import duty on 29 products

New Delhi, Jun 21 (PTI): toms duty on 29 products, including pulses and iron and steel products, imported from the US as a retaliatory action against the tariff hike by Washington.

The duty hike would come into effect immediately for 28 products, while for artemia, a kind of shrimp, the rate hike would be effective from August 4, the finance ministry said in a notification.

With the United States adopting protectionist pol-icies and hiking import duties, a trade war like situation has emerged. The European Union has decided to levy higher import duties on a variety of US products and a similar action is being contemplated by China.

As per the finance ministry notification the import duty on chickpeas, Bengal gram (chana) and masur dal has been increased to 70 per cent from 30 per cent earlier, while that on lentils has been hiked to 40 per cent from 30 per cent. Shelled almonds im-

ported from the US will ported from the US will now attract import duty at Rs 120/kg as against Rs 100/kg earlier. Almonds in shell will attract import duty at the rate of Rs 42/ kg as against Rs 35/kg.

Import duty on walnut in shell will attract customs duty at the rate of 120 per cent as against 30 per cent earlier. While apples will attract import duty of 75 per cent as against 50 per cent earlier.

The duty on boric acid has been hiked to 17.50 per cent, while the same on phosphoric acid has been raised to 20 per cent from 10 per cent each earlier.

Import duty on diagnostic reagents has been doubled to 20 per cent, while binders for foundry moulds has been hiked to

17.5 per cent.

Flat rolled products
on iron has been raised to 27.50 per cent from 15 per cent earlier, while cer-tain flat rolled products on stainless steel would now attract 22.50 per cent duty as against 15 per cent earlier.

Duty on artemia, a kind of shrimp, has been raised to 30 per cent with effect from August 4.

Last week, India had submitted to the WTO a list of 30 items on which it proposed to raise customs

duty by up to 50 per cent.

In the notification, there is no mention of duty hike on motor cycle with engine capacity of over 800cc.



Celebrating Merit to Save the Future

Inspiring the young towards greatness

S ome years ago, the State Government instituted an all-expenses paid scholarship for students securing admission on merit in the top-20 Universities of the world. A generous educational loan scheme has also been announced so that no student has to forego academic pursuits due to financial constraints and youth are being routinely sponsored to skill-upgradation courses and then assisted for job placements. For the still younger, there is the Chief Minister's Meritorious Scholarship Scheme which selects students on merit after class V from government school to place on full scholarship to public schools of repute outside and within Sikkim. And then there are the substantial cash awards now in place for the best-performing students [as also teachers].

These initiatives are welcome, because each one rewards merit instead of dispensing sops which would have been much easier to organize and still easier to rig. The sops are still there in the form of quotas and the continuing practice of favouring "connections", but these are now in competition with the recognition instituted for merit. The competitive spirit that the government has been seeking to promote in the younger generation will always be in conflict with the celebration of protectionism that obsesses the older generation, but with these new initiatives in place, especially the meritorious scholarship scheme and its recognition of the toppers, one can expect grander results. More and more students are aspiring for similar recognition and adulation as has been accorded to their seniors through this scheme, and as the feelings grows more infectious, it will trigger more competi-tion, and once instilled at such a young age, it will stay with even those students who do not make the cut for the scholarships.

What is more, because the rewards are tied to per-formance, students and parents will also perhaps become more demanding and ensure that government schools are managed better, teachers made more accountable and the selection and transfer process-es made more need-based instead of instigated by recommendation. All these are benefits that 'could' accrue from the move to reward merit, but what is a definite is that it is now proven that the young have become important, at least for the policy makers. And that alone is welcome news, because the young have been blindsided for far too long in Sikkim.

One can expect the focus on merit to get dulled in an election year, what with the pressure to promise across the board sops, but what is important to bear in mind is that a much stronger precedence has been instituted with the CM's Merit Scholarship scheme One hopes that the executive remembers what the CM had said while announcing the scholarship. He had underlined that Sikkim's children are already "good" and that with policy initiatives like the one discussed here, they will be encouraged to pursue "greatness". Of course, for the policy to deliver, parents will need to get involved in education, not by making their wards study more, but by ensuring that the government schools that the children go to impart education that gives them a fighting chance at reaching for glory.

DDA officials get 4 yrs RI for demanding bribe from eatery owner

New Delhi, Jun 20 (PTI): A city court has sentenced two DDA officials to four years of rigorous imprisonment each for demanding Rs 6,000 bribe every month for allowing a man to run his eatery illegally in northwest Delhi. Special Judge Ashutosh

Kumar handed down the jail term to Delhi Development Authority (DDA) officials Mukesh Chander and Satyabir Singh for demanding month-ly bribe from the man, whose 'Dhaba' (eatery) faced closure after he received a notice from authorities for illegally run-

ning it.

"It is proved beyond reasonable doubt that accused Mukesh being a 'khalassi' in DDA (government servant) made demand of bribe of Rs 6,000 per month from the complainant as a motive or reward for ensuring that no action on showcause notice is taken against the 'dhaba' being run by complainant and his father outside their residential premises (non con-

forming area).

"It is further proved beyond reasonable doubt that a conspiracy was hatched beSingh (also a government servant), where there was meet ing of minds between them as per which accused Satyabir Singh was to negotiate the bribe amount with the com-plainant while assuring him that the complaint would be deleted," the judge said.

In his complaint lodged on September 29, 2016, Ajay Kumar said he was running the Dhaba in Narela for 16 years. He informed that after receiving a notice from the DDA for closure of the eatery, he visited the DDA office where its officials demanded Rs 6,000 illegal gratification every mont to allow him to continue his

Turkey resists Erdoğan on social media as snap election approaches

urkey will soon go to the polls for the fifth time in less than four years. President Re-cep Tayyip Erdoğan announced them on the same day that parliament extended the national state of emergency for the seventh time since the botched coup attempt of July 2016.

Erdoğan brought these elections forward to June 24 for his own political ends: to pre-empt an expected economic downturn, to take his rivals by surprise, and to ride a surge of nationalism stirred up by the recent military offensive in Afrin, Syria. This will be the first national vote since the controversial constitutional referendum of April 2017, idential system without any checks and balances. Should Erdoğan win this latest election, he will consolidate his power futher: the office of the prime minister will be abolished

and taken over by a powerful executive presidency.

The election is taking place under the state of eme place under the state of emergency's restrictions, which have greatly distorted the campaign – but there are also signs that this time, Erdoğan and his Justice and Development Party (AKP) may find it more difficult to control events thanks to a highly motivated opposition and a lively social media environment.

Predicting the result is difficult, but the deteriorating economy, an unexpected alliance among four opposi-tion parties, and the energy brought by the candidacy of

Republican People's Party's Muharrem Ince undoubtedly will make life difficult

Could Erdogan ever be beaten? Perhaps - but if only there were a fair election campaign. Instead, the election is taking place under Turkey's state of emergency, which compromises democratic free-doms and the rule of law.

Before the state of emergency was imposed,

the High Electoral Board could penalise TV sta-tions that failed to give opposition parties fair airtime. That provision has now been revoked, and the consequences are already visible: according to a recent report, TRT Haber, the publicly-owned and financed national broadcaster, has covered the AKP-Nationalist Movement Party alliance for 37 hours and 40 minutes, and allotted all opposition parties and their presidential candidates a combined 3 hours and 13 minutes. And to make mat-ters worse, in March 2018, one of Turkey's leading media groups. Dogan Media, was sold to a pro-government Turkish conglomerate.

This is all forcing the opposition to take its cam-

paign elsewhere - and in particular, to social media. INTIMIDATION AND RESISTANCE

None of the parties has done so more effectively than the pro-Kurdish Peoples' Democratic Party (HDP) and its imprisoned former co-leader, Sela-hattin Demirtas. In the face of a de facto embargo by mainstream news sources, the HDP depends on social media to announce its parliamentary can-didates, to mobilise supporters for its rallies, and to share its policy positions. The internet and the social media in particular also provide a space for many well-known journalists who've lost their jobs for criticising the government. They are launching new online newspapers and TV channels to provide alternative sources of information.

Meanwhile, everyday Turks are making a noise on their own, and using Erdoğan's words against him. The president himself declared a few weeks before the vote that if the nation one day said "tamam" – meaning "done" or "enough" – he would all experts agree that the size of the Kurdish vote will be crucial in determining the fate of Erdoğan and his party.

In fact, a recently leaked video shows Erdoğan instructing AKP's local organisations to put "tight marking" on voters in every district in Istanbul to push the HDP below the national 10% threshold. The national threshold is the highest in the world, and has been criticised for many years for disenfranchising millions of voters, as happened most dramatically in 2002.

THE ONLINE BATTLE

Turning to social media is not without its risks. Since the 2016 coup attempt, Turkey has arrested thousands of people for allegedly supporting terrorism or insulting government officials on social media. According to the Turkish Interior Ministry, between January 20 and February 26 2018, authorities detained 648 people over social media posts criticising Turkey's military operations in Afrin.

But Erdoğan's distaste for social media dates back to the 2013 Gezi Park protests, when Twitter and other social media platforms were used extensively to bring people into the streets. Realising the potential of these platforms to disseminate information and enable collective action. he decried Twitter at the time as the "worst menace to society", and in March 2014, Twitter was temporarily blocked in Turkey altogether.

But technology has also come to Erdoğan's rescue be-fore. During the failed coup in 2016, he gave an interview via FaceTime to CNNTurk and called on the people of Turkey to take to the streets against

the apparent putsch. Through this last-ditch call and harnessing social media, messaging services, as well as the creative use of mosques calling people on to the streets, he survived the night and continued consolidating his power.

Should an opposition candidate somehow de-feat him, Erdoğan might well try to mobilise his supporters to delegitimise the election result. If he does, technology will certainly be one of his most important tools. But equally, all the major challenges to his rule in the last few years relied on social media to some extent. Each time, Erdoğan has managed to take control of the information environment and repel his rivals, tightening control on internet users, blocking social media platforms, harassing bloggers, and manipulating online discussions. But the internet still offers some hope and this election will be a crucial test of its power to challenge Erdoğan's authoritarian rule.

These volunteers could be critical on polling day: recent changes in electoral law have intro duced some controversial measures, such as allowing security forces to attend polling stations if they are invited by a voter. Clearly this provision can be abused to intimidate voters, especially in Turkey's predominantly Kurdish south-east – and

The World Cup is a chance to talk about African identities and unity

frica is the world's second most Africa is the world's second and populated continent; it's home to 54 countries. Yet, according to football umbrella body FIFA's rules, only five African countries can qualify for the World Cup tournament which is held every four years.

In the 2018 tournament Africa is

represented by Nigeria and Senegal from West Africa, and Egypt, Tunisia and Morocco from North Africa. Countries like the Democratic Republic of Congo, Ghana, Cameroon and Burkina Faso – which all feature in the top 60 of FIFA's ranking of its 206 member states – will be watching the 64 matches in Russia from home.

All of this raises questions about more than just football. It's a chance to reflect more broadly on identity. For instance, is there a shared African identity from the north to the south of the Sahara desert? Is the Sahara desert, in addition to being a natural separation between north and south, also a wall that separates two cultures: black Africa and Arab-Berber Africa?

The term "black" is not used here as a pejorative, although as someone who's originally from Algeria I must acknowledge that blackness with its rich culture and history is not celebrated enough in North Africa. The region suffers still from orientalist vision and a colonial legacy that constructed north Africa as nomadic or a place of "Arabic charm". There is also a false idea in north Africa about the

rest of Africa as a place of "black magic", poverty and military coups.

And some North Africans would

consider themselves closer to Europe (which they consider "the norm") than to sub-Saharan Africa.

The World Cup and the events sur-rounding it offer a useful chance to consider all of these biases and misunderstandings. After all, football and all sport offer powerful opportunities for divided people to unite - even if it's just over a sports tournament

AFRICAN DISUNITY

The 68th FIFA Congress in Moscow, held in the week before the tourna-ment's kick off, was another test for African unity. The question was: who to vote for as host of the 2026 FIFA World Cup? A North African country, Morocco was bidding for the fifth time. They were competing against the joined Canada, the US and Mexico bid. The socalled "United 2026" bid received 134 votes compared to Morocco's 65.

There was also very little sign of

African unity behind Morocco. Many sub-Saharan African countries gave their vote to the American bid, including Guinea, Benin, Burundi, Li-beria, Mozambique, Namibia, Sierra

Leone, South Africa and Zimbabwe. The all-Arab solidarity did n help either as many Arab nations did not vote for Morocco. Economic and political interests overtook considerations of belonging to the same conti-

nent, race and ethnicity.

Having said this, there is mutual fascination about football culture and history, uniting Africa across its four

Morocco's progress to the second round of the 1978 World Cup tourna-ment held in Argentina was a milestone for African football, Algeria's performance in Spain in 1982 made an impact that changed the World Cup tournament forever. The North Africans were on the receiving end of one of the worst cases of match fixing, involving West Germany and Austria. FIFA's limp response to calls for punishing the Europeans or staging a replay was to rule that from then on the last pair of games in every group must be played simultaneously

Algerian striker Lakhdar Belloumi said afterwards:

"Our performances forced FIFA to make that change, and that was even better than a victory. It meant that Algeria left an indelible mark on football history."

Eight years later all of Africa celebrated and danced with the then 38-year-old Roger Milla in 1990. The brilliant Cameroonian forward scored four goals in the tournament, hosted by Italy. Four years later in the US, he became the oldest player to score a

goal at a World Cup tournament.

Nigeria's Super Eagles, with five World Cup appearances and per-formances, led by Jay Jay Okocha, Rashidi Yekini and Daniel Amokachi, have inspired generations of young Africans from the north to the south.

Many young Africans wanted to be goalkeepers following role models like Joseph-Antoine Bell (Cameroon) and Badou Zaki (Morocco).

MORE CHANCES FOR UNITY

At this year's tournament in Russia fans from across the continent, and of course beyond, will be cheering on the new emerging star of African football, Egypt's Mohamed Salah. As a proud African, I know that most ns on our continent will be like me during this tournament: supporting Africa's five teams, whether they lie north or south of the Sahara.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Social Impact Assessment (SIA) refers to assessing broad range of impacts and analysing the processes of both intended and unintended social consequences primarily aiming at understanding the socio-cultural and economic ramifications of land acquisition for any kind of development project. In India, SIA has become mandatory by Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and resettlement (RFCTLARR) Act, 2013, which was further amended in 2015. In the state of Sikkim, SIA has been made mandatory for land

acquisition of any kind by publicly or privately funded development projects in compliance to Sikkim Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement (Sikkim) Rules, 2015.

The present Social Impact Assessment study has been undertaken regarding Land Acquisition by the Police Department, Government of Sikkim for construction of 2nd and 3nd Indian Reserve Battalion (IRBn) Headquarters at Manglay in the Ben Block of Tarku Revenue Circle under Namchi Sub-Division of South District of Sikkim. The at Manglay in the Ben Block of Tarku Revenue Circle under Namchi Sub-Division of South District of Sixkim. The proposed land for acquisition measures 2.35 hectares, which are distributed in seven plots of land bearing No(s). 1277(P), 1278, 1279, 1280(P), 1281(P), 1272 1301/1441. The seven plots of land belong to two land owners, namely, Late Chogyal Palden Thondup Namgyal (1277(P), 1278, 1279, 1280(P), 1281(P)) and the remaining two plots (1271, and 1301/1441) belongs to Mrs. Wang Gyamtso Bhutia.

The impact assessment study was carried out with the objectives of assessing the potential social, cultural,

economic ramification of the land acquisition and the project in the locality, to assess whether there will be any displacement of families. The study also attempts to profile the social – economic background of the affected families, their livelihood pattern and strategies and impact of the project in their socio-economic life. The study also to understand stakeholder's perception on the project and incorporating their viewpoints in Social Impact Management Plan.

The assessment is based on the information gathered from both primary and secondary sources. The secondary information provided by Land Revenue & Disaster Management Department (LR&DMD), Government of Sikkim, and Office of Village Level Officer (VLO), Tarku Revenue Circle guided the framework for collection of the primary information, which were drawn profoundly from the several field visits and interviews with the affected families, both the land owners as well as the tenants. Interview with the affected families were undertaken using both the structured as well informal interviews depending on the situation of the interview. Telephonic interviews were also undertaken for those who were not accessible directly for face to face interview. Further information was collected through Focus Group Discussion (FGD) and Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA) with the local population. For the secondary sources, various literatures related to SIA were consulted and reviewed. Official secondary information was collected from the DESM&E, Land Revenue & Disaster Management Department, 2nd and 3rd IRBn Offices of Police Department, and from the officials working at the gram Panchayat level and

2nd and 3nd IRBn Offices of Police Department, and from the officials working at the gram Panchayat level and office of VLO and other stakeholders.

Based on the field visit, the study found that the cultivable plot belonging to Mr. Wang Gyamtso Bhutia has remained unutilised for many years and was not under physical possession of anyone during the site inspection, although Mr. Gobind Prashad Chettri has been officially recorded as kuttiadar in the Khasra, Ben Block. Therefore, the acquisition of the proposed land does not affect the question of livelihood to the land owner or to any other tenant. Moreover, the land owner owns considerable portion of land in other locations which provides him and his family ample source of sustainable livelihood. Secondly, regarding Late Chogyal's land, the present acquisition of land will not have any advance impact to the Royal family as they are not using the land directly and all concerned members of the family are socially and economically well placed. However, both land owners and all concerned members of the family are socially and economically well placed. However, both land owners will be losing valuable land having potential future prospect hence, the landowners except fair and rightful com-

pensation.

In relation to the tenants, out of the total five plots of land, only two plots, i.e. 1277 and 1281 have legal tenants, which were occupied by Late Pancharam Kami and Late Buddhiman Kami respectively, as per the land Survey record, 1978-79. The mentioned two plots are currently occupied by four households who are the descendants of the two tenants. Since, only portion of these two plots of the land will be acquired, therefore, of the four household only one near to the approach road is likely to be dispossessed, as per the concerned Revenue Surveyor. Hence, the question of mass displacement and rehabilitation is not anticipated in the present context. In the case of the displaced single household, the family is already in the process of shifting to the new model house allotted under CMRHM. In relation to the remaining three households, although they are not likely to be disposed from their households nonetheless their livelihood strategies which is based on the agricultural land. disposed from their households, nonetheless, their livelihood strategies which is based on the agricultural land

disposed from their nouseholds, nonemeless, their invelindod strategies which is based on the agricultural land is going to be hampered and affected by the acquisition of the portion of the land.

In relation to social opportunities and benefits of the project, the Panchayat and the local community perceives more in term of economic advantage like expansion of the local market and boosting their local economy through marketing of the locally produced goods, for instance, vegetable, poultry, dairy products, etc. There is also the possibility of expansion and development of housing facilities to accommodate the increasing population in the area including the family members of the stationed police personnel. Other advantages include the scope for development in transport and communication facilities in the area in order to facilitate coordination with the police department of other districts headquarter which can have a positive socio-economic implication to the local populace.

The anticipated social and environmental cost in relation to the present project, as per the Panchayat and local population includes the area of concern like increase threat to the security of local girls an chances of increasing immoral activates in the area. Environmental concerns where also raised by them related to sewage and solid waste management due to the additional population pressure in the area, also managing and tapping water resources to cater the increasing population might create manmade water scarcity in the area.

After evaluating the pros and cons of the impact of the proposed land acquisition and the ongoing project, SIA concludes that since there is no mass displacement and resettlement issues to present land acquisition of 2.3500 hectares by the Police Department, and the social opportunities and benefits compensates the social and environmental cost therefore, the project becomes feasible. Nonetheless, issues and concerns related to the assessment need to be addressed thoroughly through the relevant SIMP and rightful compensatory measures.

As per the report, plot of lands belonging to Mr. Wang Gyamtso Bhutia seems to have remained unutilized for many years and was not under physical possession of anyone and thus acquisition of the proposed land does not affect the question of livelihood to the land owner and as per the report, the land owner has a considerable amount of operational landholdings in Ravangla sub-division.

Regarding late Chogyal's land, as per the report the present acquisition of land will not have any adverse

impact to the Royal family as they are not using the land directly and all concerned members of the family are

As per the report SIA team, both landowners will be losing valuable land having potential future prospects.

Out of the five plots of land belonging to late Chogyal, two plots i.e 1277 and 1281 have legal tenants as per the land Survey record, 1978-79. At present the above stated land are currently occupied by four households as per the report only one house

hold near the approach road is likely to be dispossessed. However the family is already in the process of shifting to the new model house allotted under CMRHM.

As per SIA report [page no. 62] the three households are not displaced from their houses but there is high probability that are likely to dispossess portion of their cultivable land, which might have adverse effect to their livelihood.

EXPERT GROUP'S COMMENTS/ RECOMMENDATIONS:

The Multi-disciplinary Expert Group constituted by notification No. 08/LR&DMD/GoS dated 20/02/1 under ction 7 of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013 for evaluation of the Social Impact Assessment report held its meeting on 7th April 2018 and 13th April 2018. The issues of examination and discussions are as follows:

The Social Impact Assessment team has done a meticulous work with immense clarity by identifying the ants and the affected families.


Both the landowners and the tenants may be given fair and rightful compensation.

The extent of land proposed to be acquired is the absolute bare-minimum extend needed for the project and

there is no other less displacing option available.

Therefore, the Expert Group is of the opinion that the project will serve various public purposes, and the potential benefits outweigh the social costs and adverse social impacts, hence the SIA study report pertaining to acquisition of land at Manglay, Simchuthang by Police Department is recommended to go ahead with the provisions of RFCTLARR Act, 2013.

Costa denies 'provocation' but admits to 'lucky' goal

KAZAN ARENA, JUN 21 (AFP): Diego Costa rejected claims he intentionally stamped on Iran goalkeep er Ali Beiranvand during a tense 1-0 win over Iran but admitted his crucial match-winner for Spain came down to "luck".

Frustrated throughout by a dogged defensive display from the Lions of Persia, Costa court-ed first-half controversy n he walked towards the Persepolis shot-stopper as he prepared to kick out the ball.

Asked about his gesture afterwards, Costa lashed out by claiming Iran had been the main culprits.

"What game were you watching?" said Costa when probed by a Spanish journalist.

"They were provoking us, we were on the grass all the time, you can't just say that because it's your national team." Costa nov has three goals from two games, only one less than Portugal star Cristiano Ronaldo's tally of four.

Ronaldo scored a hat-trick in a 3-3 draw with Spain in Sochi, where Costa scored a brace.

Costa added: "I'm not

comepeting against him, (Ronaldo)." But the big Spain striker admitted his goal against Iran was fortuitous. I had a bit of luck with the goal, but I'm happy because it was a very tight game. The important thing today was to win" he added

Spain, looking to em ulate their 2010 triumph when Andres Injesta hit an extra-time winner to deny the Netherlands in the final, now sit top of Group B before a final match against Morocco, who re-stricted Portugal to a 1-0 win earlier on Wednesday.

Iran, still on three points ng their oper over Morocco, won't give up on their "dream" of a place in the last 16, said their Portuguese coach Carlos

Indeed, they twice threatened to level in the second half, seeing one goal ruled offside and a late header from Mehdi vid De Gea's crossbar after Vahid Amiri had nutmegged Barcelona star Gerard Pique. "We will keep on

Ronaldo aging like 'port wine' at fourth World Cup

Portugal coach Fernando Santos compared Cristia no Ronaldo to a bottle of port, the fortified wine that famously gets better with age, after his latest match-winning goal for his country.

Five days after his hattrick rescued Portugal in an opening 3-3 draw against Spain, Ronaldo's fourth-minute header clinched a 1-0 victory over Group B opponents Morocco in Moscow.

Three previous tournaments vielded a return of just three goals for the five-time world player of the year, but Ronaldo is taking Russia by storm after netting four times in two matches.



Ronaldo 'Cristiano is like a port wine, he changes as he ages," said Santos. "He's constantly evolving, unlike regu-

lar players he's always evolving

"He won't be doing the same thing in two or three years and he's not doing

what he did four or five vears ago. He knows himself well and knows what he needs to do." Ronaldo bagged a staggering 15 goals in European World Cup qualifying as Portugal reeled off nine consecutive wins to seal a fifth consecutive appearance.

It is likely to be a

fourth and final World Cup for the 33-year-old, although he is showing little sign of decline after a fourth Champions League title in five seasons with Real Madrid.

Portugal reached the semi-finals in 2006, losing to a Zinedine Zidane penalty against France, but exited in the last 16 four years later before crashing out at the group stage in Brazil.

Ronaldo is intent on leaving his mark on this tournament, two years after helping Portugal to

a first major title at Euro

2016.
"He's a fantastic player. There are no words to describe him," said Portugal team-mate Bernardo Silva.

"If he isn't the best player in history, he's at least one of them. He's a fantastic player who tries to show it every time." Morocco boss Herve Renard had warned of the challenge in shutting down Ronaldo, but despite for-tifying his defence the Portugal captain made the decisive breakthrough.

"Even if you want to draw up plans for Ronaldo, he always finds a way out," Renard had said on the eve of the contest. Trudeau: Canada to legalize marijuana on Oct. 17

TORONTO, JUN 21 (AP): Marijuana will be legal nationwide in Canada starting October 17 in a market share away from organised crime and pro-tect the country's youth, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau has said.

The Senate gave fi-nal passage to the bill to legalise cannabis on Tuesday, legislation that will make Canada only the second country in the world to make pot legal across the country.

Trudeau said provin-cial and territorial governments need the time to prepare for retail sales

"It is our hope as of October 17 there will be smooth operation of retail cannabis outlets operated by the provincwith an online mail delivery system operated by the provinces that will ensure that this happens in an orderly fashion,"

Trudeau said yesterday.

The prime minister said at a news conference that the goal is to take a significant part of the market share away from

organized crime.
"Over the following months and indeed years we will completely replace or almost completely replace the organized crime market on that," he said.

Canada is following the lead of Uruguay in allowing a nationwide, legal marijuana market. although each Canadian province is working up its own rules for pot sales. The federal government and the provinces also still need to publish reg-ulations that will govern the cannabis trade.

"The legislation is transformative," said Justice Minister Jody Wilson-Raybould, adding it "marks a wholesale shift in how our country approaches cannabis, leav-ing behind a failed model of prohibition." She urged Canadians to follow the existing law until the Cannabis Act comes into force.

"The law still remains the law," Wilson-Ray-

Many questions main unanswered, cluding how police will test motorists suspected of driving under the influence, what to do about those with prior marijuana convictions and just how the rules governing home vation will work.

The Canadian provinces of Quebec and Manitoba have already decided to ban home-grown pot, even though the federal bill specifies that individuals can grow up to four plants per dwelling.

Provinces can set their own laws. If individuals are challenging that law, they can chal-lenge it," Wilson-Raybould said.

Trudeau said the government won't discuss pardons of past convictions until legalization is in effect.

"There's looking at pardons while the old law is in the books," Trudeau said.

Trudeau said they are going to treat it like wine and tobacco, noting that few people will cultivate it at home but it's necessary to fight organized crime.

Trudeau promised to legalize it during the 2015 election and had set a goal of July 1 for it. The provinces pleaded for more time.

Canadian marijuana stocks have rallied in anticipation of legalization and jumped again on Wednesday.

In the neighbouring U.S., nine states and the District of Columbia have legalized marijuana. California, home to one in eight Americans, launched the United States' biggest legal marijuana marketplace on January 1.

The news was greeted with enthusiasm by ma juana advocates in the US Morgan Fox, a spokesman for the National Cannabis Industry Alliance in the US. said Canada's legalization should also serve as a wake-up call south of the border

Neymar returns to training, Brazil guarantees he's ready

SOCHI (RUSSIA), JUN 21 (AP): Brazil is making sure everyone knows Neymar is perfectly fit at the World Cup.

A day after he limped out of training and raised further doubts about his physical condition in Rus-, the Brazilian soccer federation was quick to tell the world the team's biggest star was just fine.
Brazil had a closed

nractice session Wednes day, two days before its game against Costa Rica in St. Petersburg, but the federation posted photos and a video of Nevmar in action in training with the rest of the squad.

"Brazil practicing and Neymar participating normally in the team's activity," the federation said in a Twitter post.

One of the photos showed the playmaker touching the ball with his injured right and the injured right ankle.

"Take a look at Ney-mar practicing in Sochi!" read the post linking to the video which showed

nation which served as the backdrop for

Marvel's award-winning Black Panther, which took more than \$1.3bn at the box office after its release in February. In the film, Wakanda combines lush

People need to hear the things you have to say. You're doing yourself and others a disservice by keeping it all bottled up inside.
