

(PTI): Nepal and India
should be sensitive towards each others' concerns and they should cooperate with each other to move forward on the path of mutual inter-est, senior Nepali leaders said on Friday.

Talking to reporters here on the eve of India's Republic Day, the leaders also called for the early adoption and implementation of the Eminent Persons' Group's re-port (EPG) on Nepal-India relations to further

strengthen the ties.
Senior leader of Ne pali Congress and former Finance Minister Ram-sharan Mahat said the bilateral relations should contribute towards at-taining economic pros-

perity for Nepal.

"Nepal has a huge trade deficit with India and to reduce the deficit Nepal should increase its export to India which requires favourable laws and agree-

ments," Mahat said.
"India's Republic Day is an important event for those countries that have gained freedom from colonialism," said Mahat.

The report prepared by the EPG of the two

countries is an important step taken towards making bilateral relations updated and timely, he pointed out, adding there is a need to implement the report at the earliest. The EPG was formed

in 2016 by the govern-ments of Nepal and India for reviewing the entire gamut of Nepal-India relations and update bilateral agreements and treaties, including the Nepal-India Friendship Treaty 1950.

"I congratulate the government and people of India on this occasion and also extend best wishes that India could move forward as a prosperous nation," he said.

Nepal and India enjoy close people-to-people relations since time immemorial that needs to be updated and consolidated from time to time and the EPG report was prepared towards fulfilling the objective, said former Nepal' am-bassador to India Baha-

dur Thapa.

#### An Article of Faith

**Understand the Constitution** better to appreciate Article 371F and its true potential

The Constitution of India is one or the Comprehensive documents every codified to cret that equality still evades the citizens and that disparities still mar the land. While this is true, it is not a failing of the Constitution; the blame rests in the limited ability of those responsible to uphold the Constitution. Those approaching the Constitution with 'limited ability' are not only the politicians as many would have naturally inferred, but also the lay citizens for whom the document was drafted and the intellectuals who are expected in any society to refine the people's understanding of rights, issues and situations.

As a people, we have failed in internalizing and understanding the document that makes us free. equal and empowered. Take Sikkim's example, it must have been the promise that the Constitution of India holds that convinced the Sikkimese to end a monarchy and become a part of India. Sure, there is this almost fashionable debate over what is the correct term to use - merger or annexation, and much as that is an interesting discussion to get into, we leave that for a later date It is the sensitivity of the Constitution of India which made Article 371F possible. Remember, there was no Article 371F when 1975 happened nor any demand or understanding of such an arrangement when the Merger was effected, and yet the Article was inserted into the Constitution to set the ground rules for India on how Sikkim's incorporation into the Union was to be handled. Article 371F did not flow from the magnanimity or farsightedness of the leaders of the time, but was conditioned by the principles espoused by the Constitution. Article 371F is a powerful tool providing Sikkim with its special status within the Indian Union. Unfortunately however, it has been reduced to convenient dodge to continue living in the past. The Act was inserted into the Constitution to guide Sikkim's future, not to keep it stuck in the past. It provides Sikkim with the unique privilege of cherry-picking what it likes and wants of the Indian democracy and allows it the space to adapt and grow at its own pace. Clearly, the idea was to cushion the shock of sudden change and it would be a disservice to the Constitution of India to allow its provisions to get reduced to a one-dimensional understanding perpetuating status quo forever.

Since Article 371F is so important for Sikkim and for the political rhetoric of lazy politics, one wonders why the public space here, in the more than four decades that the Article has been a part of the Constitution, never received an informed discussion or deliberation on this clause which makes Sikkim a part of India? There has been a lot of jingoism and many half-truths are routinely thrown around, but Article 371F has not received the honest discussion it deserves. For whatever many groups might say about it. 371F is a progressive Act and that is how it should be used; not as a political slogan to confuse people and keep them stuck with one leg in the distant past. The exemption from Income Tax being enjoyed by Sikkim Subjects becomes possible due to this Article and some better informed interpretations and tactful arguments can win the State even more special arrangements. That will require reasoned positions and appraisals which will benefit if they have an emotional core, but will prove harmful if approached only emotionally.

What is safeguarded by Article 371F will always be safe, the Constitution is strong enough to guarantee that, but the real aspirations which moved the people so strongly in 1975 will be achieved only when the true potential of the Constitution trickles down to every corner of the State. For that, a more confident understanding of what this document is all about has to be promoted. For that, Sikkim's engagement with Article 371F will have to move beyond the lazy chauvinism which blinkers a more complete understanding. Article 371F cannot be understood in isolation of what the rest of the Constitution holds. This Republic Day, maybe acquiring a deeper appreciation of this document is a promise the people can make themselves and keep.

## **SummitTIMES** Nepal's menstrual huts: what can be done about this practice of confining women to cow sheds?

The tragic recent deaths of a mother and her two sons in a chhaupadi hut in Nepal has again brought the issue of this exclusionary practice to The tragic recent deaths of a mother and her the forefront of international human rights and nedia attention.

Despite being illegal, chhaupadi, the practice of

exiling menstruating women and girls from their home – often to a cow shed – is still practised in some areas of Western Nepal. Chhaupadi is an extreme example of the stigmas and restrictions around menstruation that exist not only in Nepal, but also globally. The recent protests at the Sabarimala temple in India, which women of menstruating age are not allowed to enter, is another example of menstrual pollution beliefs.

The image of menstruating women and girls being forced to leave their homes and be confined to a cow shed dominates media coverage of the issue in Nepal. But this view oversimplifies what is a much more complex issue. Chhaupadi is not only limited to the physical practice of sleeping in a shed

it goes beyond this to include deeply rooted cultural beliefs about impurity, which see women and girls as inferior, and lead girls to internalise these feelings. Girls are told they are impure form a young age, which can have a damaging effect on their psyche and sense of self-worth.

Many NGOs and activists are destroying the sheds and the Nepalese government has introduced new penalties and sanctions, such as removing state food support and other services. While this might seem like a welcome move, in some areas there are reports that this can make it more dangerous for women and girls as instead they sleep outside in caves or the jun-gle without shelter or mosquito nets. These practices are deeply ingrained in culture and society, so many en may leave their homes despite sanctions for fear of bringing harm if they don't.

Tham Maya Thapa, Nepal's minister for wom-

en, children and senior citizens, believes it will take time to end chhaupadi. This is a custom that has been deeply entrenched in Nepalese society for

#### WHAT CAN BE DONE?

Nepal is an exceptionally diverse country of 125 ethnic groups. To tackle chhaupadi, a nuanced

understanding of how menstrual practices and beliefs differ among varied religious and ethnic back-grounds is required. Although chhaupadi hits the headlines, there is no one all-encompassing single narrative on menstruation in Nepal.

We have been researching gender, education and gender-based violence in Nepal over the past 25 years and are working on a project on the origins of menstrual beliefs and practices which ex-



plores the diverse range of beliefs, practices and his torical and cultural roots which underpin menstrual

health customs in all seven provinces of Nepal.

We are working with local organisations and activists such as Radha Paudel, to challenge menstrual stigma, as a deeper understanding of the diverse menstrual practices beyond chhaupadi is needed to do so. Our previous research has highlighted a range of stigmas and restrictions, such as not being able to visit the temple and participate in religious ceremonies, as well as being forbidden to look in mirrors, cook, or have any contact with men. Because while chhaupadi is a serious human rights issue, other issues of gender-based violence, such as sexual violence and domestic abuse do not get the same widespread media coverage.

A range of academics and activists are challenging the media representation with photography, film and art which empower women and girls to speak out about their experiences. These can be powerful tools, ensuring that the voices of women and girls are heard and highlighting that women and girls can be active agents of change, rather than simply passive victims of oppression

#### WORKING WITH LOCAL ORGANISATIONS

Collaboration with local communities and partners is key to changing attitudes, and this can be done using participatory and creative methods. For example, a team of experts from the University of

Pittsburgh in partnership with Nepal Fertility Care Centre used collaborative filmmaking to include girls in the conver-

sation around menstruation.

The girls who made the film have gone on to be advocates for change and are challenging menstrual stigmas and taboos in their community. Bringing them to Kathmandu increased the confidence of the girls, and engaged policy makers, government ministers and NGOs. The film received an international audience at the Kathmandu film festival as ell as media coverage. Meanwhile, the Menstru-

Action conference in Kathman du in December 2018 brought together local expertise working towards challenging stigmas and restrictions and enabling and empowering women to realise their sexual and reproduc-

tive rights and their basic right to be free from harm and discrimination. Government ministries need to engage in these events and work together with grassroots activists to promote change.

Complex problems require complex solutions. Menstruation is often framed as a "health and hygiene" issue, but a range of actors are needed to bring about long-term change. The media have a role to play in raising awareness, too – but they must be careful not to sensationalise the issue, and to also listen to - and report - the voices of activists and change makers in the community.

Only when we put women and girls and their

voices at the centre of research, policies and interventions, can we truly understand the nuanced na-ture of the deeply embedded practice of chhaupadi.

### 5G: What will it offer and why does it matter?

or to drive growth.

N ever in the history of the mobile phone has there been so much hype about a new technology ahead of its launch than there is with 5G. It seems that the mobile phone op-erators, handset manufacturers and equipment vendors are locked into a massive global game of one-upman-ship, seeking to claim to be the first to achieve something groundbreaking with the technology. But the stakes are high – the mobile industry also desperately needs 5G, whether for new revenue sources, market share

Since mobile phones first appeared in the mid-1980s, the industry has launched several new "generations" of network and technology. Those early analogue "brick" phones of the 1980s were replaced by the 2G (1990s) GSM, digital and international roaming service. 3G (2000s) offered improved internet connectivity before 4G (2010s) delivered a truly broadband experience into our hands.

5G is now the fifth generation, but despite considerable media attention and focus on its massively enhanced data capability (downloading a HD movie in less than a minute), focusing on its speed alone is to miss the point of its significance.

#### THE NEXT GENERATION

Ultimately, it is simply not sustainable to keep launching a new technology every ten years or so. There are licence fees to pay for new radio frequency spectrum bands, new network infrastructure to build, and an increase in the management costs associated with integrating new technology with existing infrastruc-ture – while keeping all of the other previous generations of network op-erational. UK operators, for example continue to support 2G, 3G and 4G

while preparing to launch 5G.
So, what's so special about 5G?
Capacity and coverage won't be immediately there at launch but more of both is expected in due course. For the user, 5G speeds will be a big draw,

with quoted figures ranging from 100Mbps to 20Gbps (that's up to a thousand times faster than 4G).

Naturally, this is being delivered in direct response to our seemingly insatiable appetite for more and more online content and, especially, video. But 5G won't only revolutionise mobile handsets; it could also be an alternative way of providing broadband internet access to homes via the functioning of the Internet of Things whereby a massive number of sensors, embedded systems and devices will need to be wirelessly interconnected for data

Technology supported by 5G will also allow operators to offer different types of service to different groups over the same network but in a better and more managed way. This future-proofs the infrastructure by creating a service orientated tag for the industry. In April 2018, UK mobile operators spent £1.1 billion on licence fees for access to the newly released 3.4GHz radio frequencies and each is pledging several billions of investment to build the new 5G service. And all of this before any revenue starts to flow back into the industry.

So how can the service effectively

be monetised? Ultimately, the problem is that 4G is good enough for



Fixed Wireless Access (FWA) (which employs wireless mobile network technology rather than fixed lines).

Then there is the delay, or latency, which defines the responsiveness of the network. For 4G, this is currently around 40 milliseconds. 5G, however, could reduce the latency to 10 milliseconds for enhanced Mobile Broadband (eMBB) applications. This won't mean much to most people, but it could be critical for the useful development of specialist applications such as virtual reality and connected and self-driving vehicles, where even small delays can make a big difference.

#### WHAT ABOUT THE OPERATORS?

For the operators, the benefits are nu merous. Higher frequencies and new MIMO antenna technology will enable better coverage and more capacity. This will ensure a consistent user experience, even as demand grows in densely populated areas.

Improved coverage is also critical for

network which can evolve rather than having to be continually replaced with a new one, eliminating the need for a 6G and allowing previous network genera tions to be decommissioned.

Progress towards 5G has been rapid. Originally intended for commercial launch in 2020, 5G is already a year ahead of schedule. The first formal standards were approved in December 2017, handsets are set to emerge in the first quarter of 2019 (with pricing predicted to be around £600), and UK operators have announced commercial launch dates for mid-2019 onwards.

But the pace of roll-out will be driven primarily by demand, and given the huge investments in 4G and earlier generation networks, 5G has to be paid for with real revenue.


MAKING IT PAY This is a huge challenge. The benefits of 5G come with a hefty price

most mobile customers. And given that most of the benefits of 5G to the operators are either hidden or of little direct benefit to everyday users, what value can be placed on simply having even higher download speeds?

The success of 5G is therefore go-ing to be dependent on operators and their wholesale partners developing new markets that look beyond tradi-tional consumers of mobile services. It may start with higher capacity for today's services such as video, or improved functionality for tailored networks for campuses or business sites.

Ultimately, however, the investors will have to think big – and look to industries behind connected vehicles, the Internet of Things and the other major technologies of the future. [the writer is Professor, Computer

#### Monaco coach Thierry Henry suspended, faces axe

MONACO, JAN 25 (AFP): Thierry Henry was suspended from his role as coach of struggling Ligue 1 side Monaco with the former French international striker expected to be quickly axed.

Henry has been suspended until a definitive decision is made," Monaco said in a statement on Thursday, adding assistant coach Franck Passi would oversee training on Friday ahead of their trip to fellow strugglers Dijon. Henry, 41, was suspended by Monaco, who are second-from-bottom in the French top division with 15 points, after the former Arsenal and France striker earned the Principality club just two league wins since his arrival in October.

He took up the post with the 2017 French champions in October following the sacking of title-winner Leonardo Jardim but failed to im-Leonardo prove on the poor start to the campaign by his predecessor.
Ironically, Jardim was

already being tipped on Thursday as Henry's suc-cessor as Monaco battle to beat the drop.

The club's decision to dispose off Henry would have come as a shock if his comments at his scheduled weekly news conference earlier in the

day were any indiaction.

"My future is not a problem." Henry told reporters. However, his anticipated departure will not come cheap.

He was reported to be earning an estimated 3.2 million euros a year. With two and a half years still left on his contract, Monaco's owners face having million as compensation. Henry was also believed to have upset the club hi erarchy with some of his public comments.

#### Trump sets eyes on Indian duties on American whisky

LALIT K JHA WASHINGTON, JAN 25 (PTI): US President Donald Trump has set his eyes on the "high" 150 per cent Indian duties on American whisky after he struck what he called a "very fair" deal with India in about two minutes on the 100 per cent tariffs on the iconic motor-cycle Harley-Davidson.

India in February last year slashed the customs duty on imported high-end motorcycles like Harley-Davidson to 50 per cent after Trump called it "unfair" and threatened to increase the tariff on import of Indian bikes to the US.

At a White House event on the Reciprocal Trade Act on Thursday, Trump flashed out a green colour board with examples of non-reciprocal tariffs from various countries. Trump alleged

Trump said the Re-ciprocal Trade Act would help to solve the problem once and for all. "What-ever the tariff for a for-

eign country is, we place the same tariff on us.' "What's going to hap-pen, I think, from a prac-

tical standpoint, is they

won't be charging us tar-iffs anymore. We'll see. Or we'll charge them a lot. Tremendous amount of money," he said.

The Reciprocal Trade Act will be an incredi-ble tool to bring foreign countries to the

negotiating table and to get them to lower tariffs on US products and also to get rid of their trade barriers, the president asserted. America cannot lose

almost USD 800 billion on trade like has been done for many years, he said.

Congressman Sean Duffy, who introduced the Reciprocal Trade Act, has put granite from India in his global list of non-reciprocal tariffs.

# Backed by military, Venezuela's Maduro hits back at rival



CARACAS, JAN 25 (AP): Backed by Venezue-la's military, President Nicolas Maduro went on the offensive against an opposition leader who declared himself interim president and his US supporters, setting up a potentially explosive struggle for power in the crisis-plagued South American nation. A defiant Maduro

called home all Venezu-elan diplomats from the United States and closed its embassy on Thursday, a day after ordering all US diplomats out of Venezuela by the weekend because President Donald Trump had support-ed the presidential claim of Juan Guaido.

Washington has refused to comply, but or-dered its non-essential staff to leave the tumultuous country, citing security concerns.

The Trump admin-istration says Maduro's order isn't legal because the U.S. no longer recog-nises him as Venezuela's legitimate leader.

"They believe they have a colonial hold in Venezuela, where they decide what they want to do," Maduro said in an address broadcast live on

state TV. 'You must fulfill my order from the govern-ment of Venezuela." Meanwhile, all eyes were on Guaido whose whereabouts have been a mystery since the 35-yearold was symbolically sworn in Wednesday beold fore tens of thousands of cheering supporters, promising to uphold the constitution and rid Venezuela of Maduro's

dictatorship.

Speaking from an undisclosed location, Guaido told Univision he would consider grant-ing amnesty to Madu-ro and his allies if they helped return Venezuela to democracy.

"Amnesty is on the table," said Guaido, who iust weeks earlier was named head of the opposition-controlled

congress.

"Those guarantees are for all those who are willing to side with the constitution to recover the constitutional order."

Besides the United States, much of the international community rallied behind Guaido, with Canada and numerous Latin American and European countries announcing that they recognized his claim to the presidency. Trump promised to use the "full weight" of US economic and diplomatic power to push for the restoration of Venezue-

Maduro has been increasingly accused of undemocratic behavior by his opponents, and has presided over skyrocketing inflation, collapsing economy and widespread shortages of

basic goods. Meanwhile, China, Iran, Syria, Cuba and Turkey have voiced their backing for Maduro's government.

China's Foreign Min-istry called on the United States to stay out of the crisis, while Russia's deputy foreign minister warned the US against any military interven-tion in Venezuela. Alexei Pushkov, chairman of the information committee at the Russian Federation Council, called Guaido's decla-"an attempted ration

ration an attempted coup" backed by the US. Russia has been propping up Maduro with arms deliveries and loans. Maduro visited Moscow in December, seeking Russia's political and financial support. Over the last decade, China has given Venezuela 65 billion in loans, cash and investment. Venezuela owes

more than 20 billion. Diplomats at the Organization of American States held an emergency meeting Thursday on the Venezuelan crisis, during nized Guaido as interim president.

Domestically, attention has been on Venezuela's military, a tradi-tional arbiter of political disputes in the country, as a critical indicator of whether the opposition will succeed in establish-

ing a new government.

Venezuela's top militarv brass pledged their unwavering sup-port to Maduro, deliv-ering vows of loyalty Thursday before rows of green-uniformed officers on state television.

A half-dozen generals belonging largely to district commands and with direct control over thousands of troops joined Maduro in accusing Washington of meddling in Venezuela's affairs and said they would uphold the socialist leader's rule.

Defence Minister Vladimir Padrino Lopez, a key Maduro ally, dismissed efforts to install a "de-facto parallel gov-ernment" as tantamount to a coup.

"It's not a war be tween Venezuelans that will solve our problems," he said. "It's dialogue."

Guaido has said he

needs the backing of three critical groups: The people, the international community and the military. While yes-

terday's protest drew streets and over a dozen nations in the region are pledging support, the military's backing is key. the

Though many rank-and-file troops suffer the same hardships as countless other Venezuelans when it comes to meeting basic needs like feeding their families, Maduro has worked to cement their support with bonuses and other special benefits.

In a video address-

ing the military earlier this week, Guiado said the constitution requires them to disayow Maduro after his May 2018 re-election, which was widely condemned by the international community because his main opponents were banned from running.

But there were no

signs that security forc-es were widely heeding Guaido's call to go easy on demonstrators

Gunfire during the protests and looting left 21 dead between Wednesday and early Thursday in the capital of Caracas and throughout the country, reported Marco Ponce, coordinator of the non-profit Ven-ezuelan Observatory of Social Conflict.

Many Venezuelans were looking for Guaido to re-emerge and provide guidance on the opposi-tion's next steps.

Guaido, a virtually unknown lawmaker at the start of the year, has reignited the hopes of Venezuela's often beleaguered opposition by taking a rebellious tack amid Venezuela's crushing economic crisis.

He escalated his cam-

paign Wednesday by declaring that the constitution gives him, as presi-dent of the congress, the authority to take over as interim president and form a transitional gov-ernment until he calls new elections.

#### No end to US shutdown as opposing bills to reopen govt fail in Senate



WASHINGTON, JAN 25 (PTI): Two bills to end the US government have been rejected by the Senate, leaving no end in sight to the record-breaking closure of federal agencies over President
Donald Trump's controversial plan to build
a border wall along the
US-Mexico border.

Trump is demanding USD 5.7 billion of congressional funding to build the wall, but the Democrats have refused. Some 800,000 federal employees have been going unpaid since December 22 due to the shutdown.

In back-to-back votes on Thursday, the Senate first blocked Trump's proposal to add USD 5.7 billion for his border wall to legislation to resume funding for the govern-ment, then turned back a Democratic measure that omitted the wall. Neither side was able to garner the 60 votes needed to advance its bill.

A Republican-backed measure to fund Trump's border wall failed in a 50-47 vote.

Three senators Dem-ocrat Joe Manchin of West Virginia and Republicans Tom Cotton of Arkansas and Mike Lee of Utah broke with their parties.

A plan supported by Democrats fared better. but still fell short in a 52-44 vote. Six Republican senators supported it.

Senate leaders from both parties later briefly discussed a new proposal to reopen federal agen-cies for three weeks.

Trump was noncommittal, telling report-ers at the White House that he would only sign a bill if it included a "down payment" on a border barrier.

"One of the ideas suggested is they open it, they pay sort of a pro-rated down payment for the wall, which I think people would agree that you need the wall," Trump told reporters at the

White House.
White House Press
Secretary Sarah Sanders told reporters that any resolution would work if there is a "large down payment" on the wall.

Speaker Nancy Pelosi

said Trump's request was

not reasonable.

Later Trump said that he has a lot of alternatives.

"We have a lot of al-

ternatives. Honestly, everybody, for the most part, people agree. When I say everybody, I would say almost everybody agree, we have to have border security We have to have a wall in order to have border security. You cannot have border security without a wall," he said. You cannot order security

The failure to advance the bills left Washington with no obvious path out

of the longest shutdown in US history. Neither the president nor Democratic leaders have shown any willingness to back dow even in the 34th day of the partial shutdown.

Thousands of gov-ernment employees have scrambled to pay for meals and cover their bills. The shutdown has affected various services from airports to FBI investigations and food safety inspections.

CNN, meanwhile said the White House was preparing a draft proc-lamation for Trump to declare a national emergency along the southern border and has identified more than USD 7 billion in potential funds for his signature border wall should he go that route.

Trump has not ruled out using his authority to declare a national emergency and direct the De-fense Department to construct a border wall as Congress and the White House fight over a deal to end the government shutdown. But while Trump's advisers remain divided on the issue, the White House has been moving forward with alternative plans that would bypass Congress.

Trump's State of the

Union address, scheduled for Tuesday, has also been postponed until the end of the shutdown following an acrimonious tit-for-tat with Pelosi.

#### S Korea in airborne fight against 'Chinese'

pollution
SEOUL, JAN 25 (AFP):
Seoul on Friday sent aircraft over the Yellow Sea to carry out cloud-seed-ing experiments in an effort to tackle air pollution many South Koreans blame on China.

Air quality in South Korea is generally better than in its giant neighbour, the world's biggest pollut-er, which is periodically af-fected by choking bouts of filthy air and according to the International Energy Agency uses coal to generate around three quarters of its energy.

Beijing has been seek-

ing to tackle the scourge which causes widespread public anger, and a recent study found urban lev-els of PM2.5 -- the tiny airborne particles considered most harmful to health -- had been cut by almost a third on average over four years. But they remain far above World Health Organization norms, and pollution levels in Korea sometimes spike as the prevailing winds blow PM2.5 particulates -- referred to as "fine dust" in the South -- across the sea between the two countries.

#### Kamala Harris seeks ends to shutdown, reopening of federal government



Jan 25 (PTI): First Indian-origin Senator Kamala Harris. who recently announced her presidential bid for 2020, has sought an end to the unprecedented government shutdown and asked for earliest reopening of the federal government. The Democratic Party leader from California said that the senate will vote on a clean bill to fund the government.

"It's been 34 days since the government shutdown. The Senate will vote on a clean bill today (Thursday) to fund the government that we unanimously approved

one month ago. Let's get this done. 800,000 federal workers are counting on us," Harris said in a tweet. Trump wants to build a US-Mexico border wall and is seeking a whopping USD 5.7 billion in funding for the physical barrier which according to him is a must to prevent flow of illegal immigrants into the US. The Democrats as-

sert that such a move is a "waste" of taxpayers money.

she asserted.

Harris officially launched her campaign for the US presidential election in 2020 to take President Donald Trump on Monday, saying she was "honoured" to announce her bid on a day when Americans celebrated Martin Luther King Jr who sought inspiration from Mahatma Gandhi.

The first of the straw poll that that came after she announced her candidature, Harris has emerged on top of the list of nearly 10 current or prospective Democratic presidential candidates.

According to a report in the Washington Post published Thursday, she was the most searched candidate on the inter-net after she went public with her bid.


KOLKATA, JAN 25 (PTI): Talking everyone onboard on a jourand won multiple Oscars.

Later, a reader pointed out to him that 22 divided by 7 is close approximation of Pi.
