Protests against CAA across Assam

GUWAHATI, DEC 24 (PTI): Tens of thousands of people hit the streets across Assam on Tuesday at the call of AASU, Congress and several other groups to peacefully protest against the contentious Citizenship (Amendment) Act.

The largest gathering was in Dibrugarh, the hometown of Chief Minister Sarbananda Sonowal. A large number of people assembled at Chowkidinghee playground at a programme by All Assam Students' Union (AASU), which is spearheading the protests.

The town observed a total and spontaneous bandh to express solidarity and shops, banks and business establishments remained closed. Though schools and offices were open, attendance was very thin as people from all walks of life joined the anti-CAA protest.

Noted educationist and Sahitya Akademi awardee Nagen Saikia, who participated in the agitation, said "The MPs and MLAs should clear their stand whether they are representing Assam or Delhi."AASU General Secretary Lurinjyoti Gogoi demanded immediate withdrawal of the Act and warned the government not to suppress peoples' movement.

"We also demand immediate release of KMSS leader Akhil Gogoi. The way he was arrested is totally condemnable," he added.

Akhil Gogoi, an RTI activist and peasant leader, was arrested on December 12 in Jorhat district as a preventive measure amid violent protests against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act across the state. He was taken into custody to avoid any

Youth organisations join hands against CAA, NRC

New Delhi, Dec 24 (PTI): Over 70 student and organisations vouth across the country joined hands on Tuesday under an umbrella body to intensify the ongoing pro test against the contentious citizenship law and the proposed nationwide NRC and updating of the National Population Register (NPR).

On New Year's Day, members of the National Young India Co-ordination and Campaign and those supporting the movement will take a pledge to save the Constitution and have also coined a slogan: "New Year's Resolution -- Defend Constitution".

Addressing a press conference here, they demanded withdrawal of the Citizenship (Amendment) Act before the upcoming 71st Republic Day.

"We had over 50 organisations supporting us when we did the press release for the launch of National Young India Co-ordination and Campaign. Now the number is 70 and counting," said N Sai Balaji, member of the Young India National Coordination Committee (YINCC).

"Our purpose is to develop the coordination between protesting students/organisations/ unions on a national scale and enhance its scope and impact," the former Jawaharlal Nehru University students' union president said.

Is Sikkim Sharing Sovereignty with India?

T n essence, mobilization of indigenous people **▲**in the Americas in the early 1990s created counter hegemonic spaces for marginalized section to envision autonomy exclusively from community perspectives. In doing so, indigenous communities advocated non-cooperation as techniques of proscribing top down agendas of modernizing settler nation states in the developed west. The communities' insistence of adopting this organic approach as a way forward for realizing autonomy meant reverting to community assembly of self government as the first line of indigenous governance. This posed obstructions for state from making incursions into community territorial spaces despite the state exercising significant monopoly over violence. Through these efforts communities were able to envision autonomous spaces as counter hegemonic spaces to offset top down governance of nation-state at local level through municipal laws. For the communities, this was a momentous opportunity for advocating self-governing rights through community customary institutions of relaying dialogue, dissent, and franchise entirely based on community subjectivities.

The CAA as it emerges from local indigenous contexts fracture India's commitment of recognizing indigenous peoples' constitutional rights of self-determination without conceding its territorial sovereignty. So far, this constitutional principle has mandated India's democratic credentials for yielding concessions for differentiated citizenship rights for its numerous cultural communities of the region. So far, this constitutional parameter has revitalized convergence of communities' interests within the framework of 'liberal' Indian Constitution. This constitutional characteristic has bridged innovative political, economic, socio-cultural gaps between state and its diverse cultural communities. Sikkim, initially tied to India through a

1950 bilateral treaty agreement stands out as a distinct state of the Union. In 1975 Sikkim Subjects (as nationals of Siikim), who went on to become Indian citizens retained its subject status (domicile as permanent resident) while becoming modern citizens of Indian democracy. The promise for autonomy was envisioned through the framework of shared sovereignty trajectories of India's inauguration as sovereign nation-state. The insertion of Article 371 F principally determined a sense of belonging, identity and private attachments for legal descendants of Sikkim Subjects. For Sikkim Subjects, the becoming and being Indian citizen actualized Sikkimese account and aspirations for human equality with individual as the basic unit of citizenship practice. While this Indian project made way for fresh thoughts on equality with the procedural progression of monarchical subject to individual citizen of Indian democracy. Equality has figured ass the basic tenet of fundamental rights under the Indian Constitution promised to its citizens. Additionally, the Indian Constitution while implementing a system of inclusion through citizenship regime also made exceptions under this project. As it appears from 1973 May Agreement, signed between the Chogyal, political parties and Government of India, Sikkim's linear nationhood in India remains mediated by historical circumstances first as an Associate state and full fledged state of the Union in 1975. Clause K under Article 371 F of the Indian

Constitution which allows for the persever-

ary laws (OLD LAW) is therefore analogous provisions as in 370 (I) (b) meant for erstwhile J&K which override application of parliamentary laws in the state. The 1973 May Agreement signed between India, ruler of Sikkim and the political parties actually drew road map for Sikkim's governance on the basis of popular government. As a result, the Government of Sikkim Act, 1974, the Representation of Sikkim Subject Act, 1974, Sikkim's central bank—State Bank of Sikkim and bilateral treaty between India and Sikkim in 1950 remains safely preserved under clause k of Article 371 F as Sikkim's Old Law. This analogous provision under clause k forms a blueprint of recognizing Sikkim's sovereign status in India. The Government of Sikkim Act, 1974 the Constitution of Sikkim and State Bank of Sikkim—central bank of Sikkim prevents application of parliamentary laws in Sikkim. State Bank of Sikkim is the only bank in India which functions independently of Reserve Bank of India's (RBI) functional operation. SBS mediates Sikkim's fiscal autonomy.

in his personal and individual capacity opined (widely circulated in social media sites) that CAA is a parliamentary law applicable in Sikkim cited absence of analogous provision for Sikkim as in Article 370 (1) (b) meant for erstwhile J&K. This takes us to rescind recent opinion of the retired honourable judge in favour of better clarity by evoking former Chief Justice of India, Justice Mohammad Hidayatullah's opinion on Sikkim's sovereign status. He maintained that India's action in Sikkim could have no effect of change to Sikkim's sovereign status as an international personality. The constitutional amendments legislated to ensure Sikkim's inclusion in India is a matter fact as an imperative of municipal (domestic) law with no modification on Sikkim's status in international law. From the perspectives of international law, Sikkim continues to be India's protectorate state since bilateral treaty had been contemplated between two or more sovereign entities. Hence, the 1950 treaty now preserved under clause K of Article 371 F (Old Law) maintains Sikkim's distinct international personality but sovereignty remains shared. Evidently, Sikkim Subject Regulation, 1961 continues to be a register of Indian citizens of Sikkimese origin. The nationwide exercise of National Register for Citizens (NRC) as proclaimed is farce as a far Sikkim is concerned. As for CAA is concerned, the legal status of Sikkim Subject maintained by enforcing COI as the basis of Sikkim Subject Certificate is used for dual purposes for indicating nationality (former Sikkimese nationals) and domicile (relationship of an individual as a permanent resident with a territory). The implementation of CAA in Sikkim means dilution of the legal status of Sikkim Subject and the notion of shared sovereignty.

India's track record of shared sovereignty goes back to the era of nawabs and maharajas when sharing sovereignty was as a result of emergent rivalries between divergent sub-continental territories and kingdoms. Over a period of time, the East India Company not only mastered the political process of sharing sovereignty but also imposed its rule over petty rulers. The British consolidation followed by subsequent colonial acts such as Indian Council Act, 1861, Morley-Minto reforms, Montague-Chelmsford Reforms, GOI Act, 1935 remains a precursor of shared sovereignty in India.

Many provisions of the GOI Act, 1935 which guid-

ed India's transition to independence are retained by India's Constitution. The partition of British India further accentuated the need to draw boundaries of governance and citizenship regime informed by minority question and tribal aspirations. As a result, the consolidation of Indian sovereignty as a supreme authority remains through the notion of shared sovereignty in what has been the many ways of dispensing and exercising responsibilities between the centre and the states. The special citizenship rights and special provisions of the Indian Constitution mandate framework of autonomy for cultural communities as sovereign people. The aspirations of the people in the North East particularly in Sikkim correspond directly with land use and resource mobilization. The land forms the primer of community mobility and a sense of belonging with the territory. The implementation of CAA in Sikkim is a potential intrusion over Sikkim's land use and resource mobilization managed by its communities. This gives ample space for capitalist enterprises such as power developers, hoteliers, timber merchants and pharma companies to enter into Sikkim's untapped natural resource base in the future. As illustrated through GOI's talks with Naga groups for political settlement within the framework of sharing sovereignty transcends beyond political power plays to sharing of natural resources primarily residing with community control over land use. The special provisions of the Indian Constitution which allows application of customary law, community regulation over law and order speaks in multitude over the nature of sharing sovereignty with multiple stakeholders by acknowledging sovereign rights of Indigenous communities.

Sikkimese communities as historically specific cultural communities are governed by distinct customs. Their integration in India was guaranteed with a promise for autonomy as self governing communities. This aspect of integrationist focus in India within the framework of federal polity foists the discourse about sharing sovereignty through territorial autonomy. Sikkim Subjects regulated through Article 371-F relay the practice of shared sovereignty in India. The autonomous areas under Dzumsa jurisdiction and Dzongu reserve in North Sikkim gives an indication how communities in Sikkim are sharing sovereignty with Indian state. The Indian state armed with the might

of the legislation entered North Sikkim with tacit approval of the state government and politically elected Panchyati Raj Institutions (PRIs) have also made entry in natural resource management. In the community conserved Dzumsa, communities prevented power developers from making inroads in to community controlled resource areas. In Dzongu, the Affected Citizens of Teesta (ACT) mobilized the entire community to make people aware about the notion of shared sovereignty and the role of communities as stakeholders in sharing sovereignty with the state. The notion of shared sovereignty has made right to customary law, access to forest resources fundamental realm of concessions for communities without external interventions from dominant forces. Therefore, the category of Scheduled Tribes is synonymous with indigenous people of India where other Indian citizens are seen as an outsider within the territory governed under special provisions. In contrasts, implementation of CAA is most likely to reverse this imperative for immigrant communities to settle in territories governed by special provisions as rights bearing citizens.

The vibrant exercise of sovereign rights by self governing Sikkimese communities through plethora of self-governing institutions [Dzumsa and Chogdu-Lepcha customary] within a specified territory is self explanatory in Sikkim's context. The governance of village council as under self governing institutions based on customary laws and rituals include maintenance of community justice system as a mechanism for settling disputes etc. The special reference under clause K of Article 371 F regarding customary laws, customary rituals and inalienable rights of land is subtle mark of acknowledging and recognizing indigenous sovereignty in Sikkim. Therefore, in Sikkim's context it is not just Sikkim state but hosts of customary or formal institutions representing Sikkimese people such as self governing customary village councils, village elders, civil society, political parties of Sikkim, ecclesiastical organizations which share sovereignty with the Indian state. Therefore, debate over CAA in Sikkim should not be a monopoly of political parties in power but of the entire fabric of Sikkimese cultural communities.

Empowered Women

Since they vote more, shouldn't they be listened to more as well?

The 50/50 power-sharing arrangement between the sexes has been instituted in Sikkim at the panchayat and urban local body levels, with even the top posts being equally apportioned between the men and women. Just as the 50% seat reservation for women in Sikkim panchayats marked a new milestone for rural empowerment in Sikkim, so does their equal representation at the top panchayat level. While the verdict is still awaited on how effectively this mandated by law empowerment has been leveraged, what is significant is that women in Sikkim have consistently embraced their stake in Sikkim, an involvement they have proven with how enthusiastically they have turned out to vote.

By turning out to vote in larger proportions than men, Sikkim's ladies have displayed that they are keen to have a larger stake in governance and policy-making. Election 2014 was for the second consecutive election that women voters outperformed men in Sikkim. In 2009, against an 81.46% male voter turnout, Sikkim's women posted 82.77%. In 2014, 81.40% of the women voters exercised their franchise to help decide the government for the last term against 80.57% male voters.

This is one statistic that should make every Sikkimese sit up and take notice because make no mistake, stepping out, braving the heat and the rain later in the evening to vote, is a sign of empowerment. What is more, this is no flash in the pan episode, but appears to be a process which has sustained and grown over the past decade and a half. In Elections 1999, women voter turnout was five percentage points lower than men [79.10% versus 84.36%], and as women's empowerment efforts progressed in earnest [and the SDF government deserves credit for it], in Elections 2004, male and female voter turnout were almost level - 77.01% against 77.99%. As already mentioned, the women turned the tables on male voters in 2009, and have retained the bragging rights for the last election as well. Even as the women voters rank higher in percentage turn-out, they are not very far behind when it comes to absolute numbers either. Against a total of 1,53,425 men who voted in Sikkim in 2014, slightly over 1.46 lakh ladies pressed the EVM buttons.

The numbers prove the heightened involvement with which women in Sikkim have taken to participatory democracy.

Generalisations, admittedly, are by nature inaccurate and unscientific tools to draw conclusions, but if one were to surmise on what factors led to more women voting in Sikkim, there would be a multitude of factors, but one of the most substantial motivators must have been the increased attention being paid to women in Sikkim which convinced them that they had a stake in governance and the need to sustain it. Factors such as improving literacy, increased representation [in panchayat and urban bodies] and a slew of other women-centric interventions contribute to this increased voter turn-out, and even as one frowns at sops and quotas, these must be working towards empowerment because that is what the data is posting. This is perhaps also a trend whose time has come, and one which would automatically require political planners to position there stands with improved consideration of women interests. Because women's participation in voting is on the rise, their mandate will require delivery more than rhetoric. There are however still many politicians, who, even if they have shed overt male chauvinism, remain insensitive towards women's issues and some have even displayed boorish poor taste in the recent past. For anyone with any serious political ambitions, gender sensitivity will be a good investment to make. While this used to be consciously included in the activities of most political outfits till a few years back, it has all but vanished from political deliberations in post-election Sikkim. The sooner the wannabe leaders recognise the due rights and aspirations of women, the better it will be for their political futures.

Sikkimese women have established that henceforth, their endorsement will be required by every aspirant and every candidate, in every constituency in Sikkim. This power cannot be ignored because while women voters are in majority in five assembly constituencies, in actual turnout [not just percentage points] they outnumbered male voters in as many as nine Assembly constituencies in 2014. Even the most basic political calculation will thus recommend that political parties in Sikkim allow more women into representative politics roles, in positions which are more than just token. The parties, for their own survival, need to appreciate the power that women now wield in Sikkim and this means that women's issues can no longer be sidestepped. Political power is no longer possible without catering to the women voters, and given the centuries of prejudice and offensively male-centric system that has been imposed on women, one hopes that this vote-bank stands separate from the caste and community divisions that short-sighted politicians tend to carve out.

The Neuroscience of Christmas Cheer 'Emotion'

It is, for many of us, the most wonderful time of the year. "Christmas cheer" is that thing which is often referred to by those who believe December really is the season to be jolly. It's that feeling of joy, warmth and nostalgia people feel when the jingle bells start jingling. But what is the science behind it?

Evidence of Christmas cheer inside the brain was found during a study run at the University of Denmark in 2015. Twenty people were shown images with either a Christmas or non-Christmas theme while having their brain monitored in a functional magnetic resonance imaging (fMRI) machine. The fMRI machine highlights parts of the brain when there is an increase or decrease in activity in that region. And when there was an increase of activity for this study, that region lit up like ... well, a Christmas tree.

When the participants saw photographs of Christmas themed images, such as mince pies, a network of brain regions lit up, leading the researchers to conclude that they had found the hub of Christmas cheer inside the human brain. What the activation in brain regions actually meant, the researchers couldn't say. One theory was that that network in the brain could be related to memories or spirituality. The scientific understanding of our internal experiences is changing and it now seems likely that Christmas cheer may be an emotion in itself.

WHAT IS AN EMOTION?

Many scientists used to think that emotions were pre-programmed reactions, hardwired into human brains. According to the traditional view, when you see Christmas TV adverts, some dedicated part of you (a kind of "happiness circuit") leaps into action to bring you Christmas cheer.

The happiness circuit was thought to be a single part of the brain responsible for making you feel that warmth in your chest, making your heart beat quickly with joy and forming an expression of happiness on your face – an expression thought to be universal across peoples and cultures.

According to the traditional view, humans have a small set of core emotions, like fear and happiness. Each of these emotions has its own dedicated brain region which creates changes in physiology and behaviour - changes which are similar (if not the same) across different instances of the same

emotion. For example, it was thought that the happiness you feel when you see a puppy would activate the same neural and physiological systems as the happiness you feel when you spend time with your friends. And so, when activated, the happiness circuit should light up in the fMRI machine. The traditional view feels intuitive. But, in the 100 years science has been studying emotion, scientists have never been able to find a specific happiness circuit or a circuit relating to any emotion.

When it comes to Christmas cheer, this is likely the reason why there was no specific neural path found in the fMRI data. Rather, the general network of neural activation associated with Christmas cheer points to a more nuanced understanding of emotions.

EMOTION ON DEMAND

The contemporary view says that emotions are the brain summing up three sources of information to create an on-demand experience. The brain combines information about your physiological state, environment and personal experiences to form a subjective feeling inside you. According to the contemporary view, when you see Christmas TV adverts, you feel positive because you associate good things with Christmas, your heart beats quicker because some part of you recognises the excitement the advert evoked in you as a child and you express the feeling physically, usually through facial expressions.

All of these things culminate as a feeling. A feeling which we label and categorise as an emotion. Throughout our lives we learn to label categories of emotions. This labelling is why we use the same word to describe the terror felt heading on to a rollercoaster and the terror associated with being in a car accident, despite the fact that these experiences feel completely different.

But because the brain constructs an emotion on-demand using a wide range of brain regions, there is no neural signature or physiological blueprint with which to record or measure the experience. Many different parts of the brain work together to create an emotion depending on what's going on around and inside you. This is why every experience of an emotion – even the same emotion - will look different in an fMRI scanner. When it comes to emotions, brain activation isn't predictable because each emotion is formed from different, unpredictable information and contexts.

At Christmas time, each person has associations with songs, foods and activities that help them use the label "Christmas cheer" to categorise the experience. These associations are totally unique to each person. This is why your festive family traditions don't always seem to translate when you introduce them to your friends or your significant other.

But Christmas cheer can be shared with others through rituals (such as decorating the tree) and language (through things like carol singing) to cement those emotion categories. Every time we encounter items or ideas that we relate to over Christmas because of our past, our brains create the emotion of Christmas cheer.


BAH HUMBUG SYNDROME

But, of course, some people are like Ebeneezer Scrooge and just want to get through the holidays. A lack of Christmas cheer has anecdotally been called "bah humbug" syndrome. In the same way as Christmas cheer, "bah humbug" can be seen as an emotion. Perhaps it's the dread of family politics or the tight, pounding chest people feel thinking about the cost of Christmas. But the brain combines these sources of information to create an emotion. So if you've had more negative experiences associated with Christmas, you are more likely to feel bah humbug than cheer.

Regardless of whether you tend to feel more of the Christmas cheer or the bah humbug emotion, there is a slither of magic in these festive emotions. In every waking moment, your brain is constructing your emotional reality. You have the power to increase your Christmas cheer or banish your feelings of bah humbug. This phenomenon is known as prediction, and it's really just a numbers game. Rather than reacting to the world, your brain is running an internal model built around patterns of your previous experiences. The more instances your brain has of a positive experience relating to Christmas, the easier it is for your brain to construct Christmas cheer on-demand in the future.

So if you want to get into the Christmas spirit, spend time doing festive activities which you enjoy, share your experiences with the people you love, and do whatever rituals make sense to you. If science can give you anything this year, let it give you the gift of Christmas cheer.

Can You Die From a Common Cold?

Most people know that the flu can kill. Indeed, the so-called Spanish flu killed 50 million people in 1918 – more than were killed in the first world war. But what about the common cold? Can you really catch your death?

The cold is a collection of symptoms - coughing, sneezing, a runny nose, tiredness and perhaps a fever – rather than a defined disease. Although it shares a lot with the initial symptoms with the flu, it's a very different infection.

Rhinovirus causes about half of all colds, but other viruses can cause one or more of the symptoms of a cold, including adenovirus, influenza virus. respiratory syncytial virus and parainfluenza virus.

The common cold is normally a mild illness that resolves without treatment in a few days. And because of its mild nature, most cases are self-diagnosed. However, infection with rhinovirus or one of the other viruses responsible for common cold symptoms can be serious in some even death – particularly in people who have a weak immune system.

For example, studies have shown that patients who have undergone a bone marrow transplant can have a higher likelihood of developing a serious respiratory infection. While rhinovirus is not thought to be the main cause of this, other viruses that are associated with symptoms of the common cold, such as RSV, adenovirus and parainfluenza virus, are.

There is, of course, more than one way for someone to become very sick after infection with a respiratory virus. Some viruses, such as adenovirus, can also cause symptoms throughout the body, including the gastrointestinal tract, the urinary tract and the liver.

Other viruses, like the influenza virus, can themselves potentially cause severe inflammation in the lungs, but they can also lead to particularly serious conditions, such as bacterial pneumonia.

A virus-induced bacterial infection is one way a cold or flu virus can lead to death. While the exact mechpeople. Complications from a cold anisms of how bacterial infections

can cause serious illnesses and, yes, can be primed by viral infection are still being investigated, a possible way it can occur is through increased bacterial attachment to cells of the lung. For example, rhinovirus has been shown to increase the presence of a receptor called PAF-r in lung cells. This can allow bacteria, such as Streptococcus pneumoniae, to bind more effectively to the cells, increasing the likelihood of it leading to a severe condition like pneumonia.

HIGHER RISK IN SOME PEOPLE Unfortunately, a cold can also have more severe symptoms in the very young and the very old. Older people are more likely to develop a more serious infection compared with adults or older children. And people who smoke - or who are exposed to second-hand smoke - are also more likely to get a cold and have

more severe symptoms.

Another group of people who are more severely affected by infection with cold-causing viruses are people with an existing lung condition. They can include people with asthma, cystic fibrosis or chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD). Infection with a virus that causes inflammation of the airways can make breathing much harder. People with COPD who catch a mild cold virus are also at risk of developing a bacterial infection.

While the bacterial infection in these patients can be treated with antibiotics, there is no effective antiviral treatment against all types of rhinovirus. For other respiratory viruses, such as influenza, there is an effective vaccine that can help protect vulnerable people from the flu virus, including asthmatics, the very young and the very old.

There is not one single element that dictates how severe an infection with a cold virus will be, but there are many conditions or factors that can raise a red flag.

One of the best ways to avoid catching a cold is to wash your hands properly. This can prevent the spread of many different infections, not just the viruses that cause the common cold. And everyone, not just those classed as vulnerable, should get the flu jab. For viral infections, prevention is key.

Anti-CAA protesters block Guy's way, force him to return without attending JU convocation

KOLKATA, DEC 24 (PTI): Shouting slogans against the CAA and waving black flags, protesters blocked West Bengal Governor Jagdeep Dhankhar's entry into Jadaypur University where he had gone to attend the annual convocation, prompting him to denounce the incident as "total collapse of rule of law".

Amid his frequent run-ins with the Mamata Banerjee government, Dhankhar arrived at the university, a hotbed of anti-CAA and anti-NRC protests, only to find his way blocked by around 50 people, said to be members of Shiksha Bandhu Samiti, an affiliate of the ruling TMC's trade union wing.

"Go back", "No NRC, No CAA", the protesters chanted as Dhankhar stepped out of his car to reach the venue.

As the protesters were unrelenting, the governor dialled Vice Chancellor Suranjan Das, and later accused him of being a "silent spectator" to the unsavoury drama.

"We cannot allow such a system to be there....There can't be complete lawlessness. There's is total collapse of rule of law," a livid Dhankhar told journalists while seated in his car before leaving the campus in a huff.

He said he was surprised how a small group of people could play "havoc" with the future of students. Dhankhar also said none of the protesters was a student, while expressing "shock and surprise" at the turn of events.

"The university ad-



ministration is doing nothing at all. They must have control on their employees. They can visit employees with action. We cannot allow such a system to be there," an angry and exasperated Dhankhar told reporters.

The governor, who was heckled and shown black flags twice at the university on Monday, chose to ignore the warnings and visited the place again. Protests against Dhankhar had come a day after he declared as "illegal and invalid" the varsity's decision to defer the December 24 special convocation because of possible trouble.

However, the convocation did take place but without the presence of the governor, who is the chancellor of state universities.

In a series of tweets, Dhankhar deplored the occurences at the university. "Am surprised that inspite of my directive to VC to go by rule book and abide by my direction as regards Convocation, the same has been started. In utter helplessness as of now I am leaving the Jadavpur University campus. Those concerned must soul search," he wrote on the microblogging website.

He also claimed the vice chancellor was in a "passive mode and a silent spectator to the unseemly spectacle", and alleged the whole episode was "orchestrated by powers that be".

"Rule of law is nowhere in sight," he added. Dhankhar was on the

campus also on Monday to attend a meeting of the university Court, its highest decision-making body.

After he could not attend the Court meeting due to the agitation

students and the non-teaching staff, he had called up the vice chancellor and requested him to hold the meeting at Raj Bhavan. However, the members of the Court decided against it as the meeting had already begun on the JU campus.

The West Bengal government had recently trimmed the governor's power as the chancellor of universities, notifying a set of new rules governing his interaction with vice chancellors.

Under the new rules, the chancellor cannot intervene in the day-to-day affairs of universities, nor can he advise university officials directly. All communication between the chancellor and senior university officials will also have to be routed through the state's higher education department. Dhankhar's visit to Jadavpur University

in September to "rescue" Union Minister Babul Supriyo from a clutch of frenzied students had set off a verbal duel between the state government and Rai Bhavan, with recriminatory tweets being exchanged between the two almost on a daily basis.

Dhankhar had recently berated Banerjee for her decision to launch street protests against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act and the proposed pan-India National Register of Citizens, insisting that a person occupying a constitutional position should desist from such action.

As violent protests raged in West Bengal over the new citizenship law, Dhankhar had advised the chief minister to focus on restoring law and order instead of engaging in "unconstitutional and inflammatory" actions.



Pakistan pace sensation Naseem grows from cub to lion

KARACHI, DEC 23 (AFP): Pakistan's Naseem Shah may be just a teenager but his fiery bowling has given him a top position on the bowling charts.

On Monday, Naseem grabbed 5-31 in Pakistan's series-clinching win over Sri Lanka in Karachi to become the youngest fast bowler at 16 years 307 days to achieve the feat.

He broke the record of another Pakistan Mohammad Amir who also made his mark with his first five wicket haul at 17 years 257 days against Australia in Melbourne 10 years ago.

Naseem's feat has prompted the cricket world to take notice of the precocious ability.

Belief in his talent, Naseem says, has been the key.

"I had belief in my hard work and talent so when I got the chance I tried my best," said Naseem. "I am elated that my feat on a home ground and before my own people has contributed in the win.

"I know this is just the beginning and if I keep up the hard work more rewards will come my way." Naseem's landmark moment capped a three-month fast track progress from a precocious talent to one of the leaders of Pakistan's bowling attack.

He has been in the limelight for sometime but it was in October this year that national selectors decided to throw him in the deep when he took nine wickets in a domestic match.

Four days later he was on the plane to Australia for the two-match Test series -- a move described as 'throwing a cub before the wolves.' Pakistan's bowling coach Waqar Younis -- himself a lethal fast bowler -- likened Naseem to former Australian great paceman Dennis Lillee.

"He's got a very strong action. He reminds me of Dennis Lillee actually. He's got a very similar action," Waqar said before the first Test in Brisbane.

"He's not as big as Dennis - Dennis was a big guy - but when he gets it right, he's a handful. He's very talented with his pace the key."

Naseem made people take notice with his short burst of eight overs against Australia A, claiming Marcus Harris's wicket with a sharp bouncer.

That was after he received the news of his mother's death back home.

But he showed steely resolve as a week later he was played in the first Test in Brisbane.

He claimed dashing Australian opener David Warner twice, first off a no-ball on 56 and then on 154. Warner appreciated Naseem's talent.

"He charged in, and there's a superstar there," said Warner.

"If Waqar can get a hold of them (Naseem and other young bowlers) and get their lines and lengths and their engines going, they're going to be a force to be reckoned with in the future."

How one man used royalty, rednecks and football to help Syrian refugees

Samuel J Fox, a lawyer from Los Angeles, saw the Syrian refugee crisis and felt compelled to act. "It was heartbreaking," he tells the Guardian of the brutal, harrowing pictures of displaced children that spurred him into action. "Something, anything, needed to be done."

For Fox, that something was football. He began what he called a "movement" to provide football jerseys – and hope – to the thousands of displaced, poverty-stricken youngsters living in camps with nothing but the tattered shirts on their backs. And so JerseyEX was born.

It's a remarkable tale of rednecks, refugees, royalty, show business, and sports stars, incredible serendipitous meetings and the genuine goodness of Fox (with help from his friend and associate, New York producer Eric Angelson), who has, out of his own pocket, gone to incredible lengths to help those less fortunate than himself.

The story, naturally, begins in 1990 with legendary redneck comedian Jeff Foxworthy. Fox was at Foxworthy's side providing legal help throughout his career. The now 61 year-old Foxworthy enjoyed a stellar stand-up career and authored a series of books about redneck lifestyle with titles such as No Shirt. No Shoes ... No Problem! – and his fame opened unexpected doors for Fox.

One of those doors, involved a surprising phone call. "I'm calling on behalf of the King of Jordan," the voice said. Fox hung up. It was surely a crank caller. The phone rang again. It was Major General Gary L Harrell, a decorated US Army veteran, based in Jordan, where he was helping the King of Jordan, Abdullah II, establish an anti-terrorism training center.

It turned out the king was a fan of a reality show presented by two clients Fox had met through Foxworthy – Abdullah wanted to meet them. Once the disbelief lifted, he went to the Middle East with his clients, and met a friend of the king's on the return flight to New York, during which an opportunity to advise on a digital strategy for Jordan presented itself. "The goal was to bridge the



digital communities of Amman and Los Angeles," he says.

A consulting contract was agreed and Angelson, whose background also included digital technology, was enlisted. When the king visited California, the pair attended a reception with him and Andrew Harper, the Jordan-based head of the United Nations High Commission on Refugees (UNHCR). Abdullah and Harper gave presentations showing the plight of Syrians crossing the desert into Jordan to escape violence and persecution in their own country.

"The photos were haunting," says Fox. But one image in particular caught his eye. "There were three kids running barefoot on rocks, smiling and kicking a ball. It made me want to go to a refugee camp and bring some happiness," he says. "So that became the plan."

He found a shop in Los Angeles that collected old jerseys, and 180 shirts were loaded into bags. Fox and Angelson then headed off to Jordan and the newly opened Azraq refugee camp. Conditions were bleak - there was no electricity and little water for the estimated 10,000 inhabitants. The mood, however, was quickly lifted. One by one, children of all ages queued up to receive the jerseys and greeted Fox and Angelson with

warm hugs and handshakes. "Eric and I were so moved," says Fox.

This, however, was just the start. The contract to build a digital bridge between the US and Jordan was canceled, as Isis's brutal stranglehold on the region grew. But the football connection was forged and the pair wanted to do more to help the refugees they had met.

That opportunity quickly repeated itself, thanks to a chance meeting at a conference in Los Angeles run by Jusoor, an organization that helps Syrian youth with education. "Our strategy was simple; talk to everyone," says Fox. "We explained to some of the attendees we had just been to Azraq to distribute jerseys and were now trying to figure out a way to send some more. This man looked at us and said, 'I'll ship them for you - for free.' I was blown away."

The man was Fadi Ghandour, who founded Aramex, one of the biggest shipping companies in the Middle East and North Africa. To date, 15,000 shirts have been sent.

Fox and Angelson's knack for connecting with the right people continued. When they were in Jordan, via the Royal Film Commission, Fox and Angelson were introduced to the king's brother - Prince Ali bin al Hussein, who headed the Jor-

dan Soccer Federation and also ran for Fifa presidency in 2015. Prince Ali's offer to waive customs charges for any shipments was a massive moment for Fox, who was funding JerseyEX out of his own pocket. "I couldn't have done this without him and Fadi," he says.

Fox then met Richard Walden, founder of Operation USA, which collects items to be offered in disaster zones. Hollywood legend Julie Andrews is a spokesperson for them – and they, by sheer chance, had thousands of extra jerseys in a warehouse. Fox took them all. The next development came through another unlikely source.

"I got a call from [humanitarian organization] World Vision asking to donate 400 jerseys to reward children for a hygiene-education program in partnership with Sesame Street," says Fox. "I said yes, but then we never heard back, so I said 'I'll do it myself.' Then, I had an epiphany – if jerseys can give children a moment of joy, then football can be used to motivate these kids to change their lives and take control of their future."

Fox was inspired but desperate for celebrity endorsement to fasttrack his efforts through a video campaign. Luckily, Borussia Dortmund and Manchester United were in LA during the summer of 2018.

"Dortmund were training [at the University of California, Los Angeles], but the session was closed," recalls Fox. "Then, I saw [former NBA star] Steve Nash whom I had represented for his first Nike contract 20 or so years ago. He was with Christian Pulisic, and when I shouted my name to him, he couldn't believe it. He got me over the barrier and I managed to shoot a video with Christian."

The theme of the seven-second video - and subsequent clips created with Manchester United duo Scott McTominay and Axel Tuanzebe - was simple: players pointed out the importance of washing hands before eating. More videos were filmed in Jordan by Widad Shafakoj, a brilliant director found in Amman, featuring their women's World Cup team. That led to a partnership with USA for UNHCR and that, says Fox, "gave me some serious credibility."

The next logical step was to get soap to the refugees. A deal was struck to buy soap from the Zarqa Life Center, a community safe haven for women and children affected by war, who make and sell the product to support themselves. A second contract was agreed with soap makers at Za'atari refugee camp. A further donation came from Trinitae, a high-end Jordanian soap company. During their last trip in August, Fox and Angelson distributed over 2,000 bars in Za'atari and Azraq. Fox even created a catchy football chant that the refugee children in Azraq sang on the pitch.

So what does the future hold? The dream is to work with clubs and players to create football-centric media with life-affirming messages. Fox also wants to partner with a soap company to generate revenue to continue to support UNHCR and help his program. For every bar sold, another bar is donated to a refugee family.

"The true potential of the sport is found not on the pitch, but in the lives of millions of children who watch it and play it every day," concludes Fox. "The beautiful game can produce some beautiful messaging, even if it's only seven seconds long."

Kohli, Dhoni named captains of Test and ODI team of the decade by Aussie website



MELBOURNE, DEC 24 (PTI): Virat Kohli has been named captain of the Test XI of the decade by Cricket Australia's official news website, while Mahendra Singh Dhoni was chosen as the leader of its ODI team of the decade.

It is not a surprise that Kohli finds himself in both the Test and ODI teams. The 31-year-old has arguably been the best batsman over the last decade. He has already amassed 70 international hundreds and is only behind Ricky Ponting (71) and Sachin Tendulkar (100).

Kohli, who averages more than 50 in all formats, is also third in the list of leading run-scorers of all time with 21,444 runs, behind Ponting (27,483) and Tendulkar (34,357).

The India skipper has scored runs all around the world but Australia has been a special place for him, having scored nine hundreds (six in Tests, three in ODIs) Down Under.

Kohli is primed to shatter more records, having ended 2019 as the leading run-getter.

The others in the Test XI of the decade include Alastair Cook, David Warner, Kane Williamson, Steve Smith, AB de Villiers, Ben Stokes, Dale Steyn, Stuart Broad, Nathan Lyon and James Anderson, 'cricket.com.au' posted.

The website's ODI team of the decade is led by Dhoni, who captained India to two World titles, in 2007 and 2011, respectively.

Rohit Sharma, who had a memorable 2019, which included five hundreds in the World Cup, is one of the openers in the team alongside Hashim Amla.

Kohli is the undisputed number three, followed by de Villiers, Shakib Al Hasan, Jos Buttler, Dhoni, Rashid Khan Mitchell Starc, Trent Boult and Lasith Malinga.

Ice-cool Mason Greenwood can ignite Manchester United's tepid season

Watching a teenager make their name is a moving, affirming experience, equal parts empathy and envy: if you're young you want to be young and good, and if you're old ... you still want to be to be young and good. In a wild world, there's no feeling like watching talent explode, all wideeyed, grateful and disbelieving.

Mason Greenwood is none of these things, a child who scores goals like a man. Often young players snatch at chances, lost in the supermarket trying six different finishes at once. But Greenwood handles things differently, blessed with a clear mind and the resting heart rate of a table. These may seem ridiculous words to write about someone who has accomplished so little. But they are considerably less ridiculous than Greenwood's ability. When we encounter new things we naturally assess them relative to old things, and Greenwood's points of comparison are obvious. Aesthetically he is most similar to Robin van Persie: smooth, lean, precise and controlled – but with a right foot as definitive as his left.

Strategically, though, he more closely resembles Ole Gunnar Solskjær: able to get a shot away – and on target – in almost any circumstance. Against AZ Alkmaar and Everton, Greenwood's excellent goals bore a hallmark of his boss: shaping for the far post before dragging a finish back towards the near – through



the legs of a defender used as a screen. Neither strike was particularly powerful and both passed close to the keeper, but timing and disguise ensured that neither effort was remotely saveable.

And elementally Greenwood is most reminiscent of Paul Scholes: though he does a very different job, his style is underpinned by the principle of only ever attempting what is feasible. If a situation demands something simple, something simple is performed; if a situation demands something flash, something flash performed. This illustrates equanimity as well as ability. "He doesn't change his demeanour if he scores or if he misses," said Solskjær after Greenwood's superb winner against Astana in September. "He's a delightful young boy to work with."

When Real Madrid won the Champions League final in 2000, Roy Keane noticed that Raúl reacted with none of the

traditional tears and histrionics. "I deserve this," was how Keane summarised his attitude, and Greenwood is similarly entitled. Unlike for instance Marcus Rashford, he seems not surprised by his emergence but that he has been expecting it, wondering what's taken so long.

Though it made sense that Greenwood began the season as a substitute, it was odd that, with Anthony Martial injured and United struggling to score, he was picked to start only two cup games. But he still managed beautifully taken goals against Astana and Rochdale, and in 893 minutes now has seven – plus two assists.

The xG model calculates that there was only an 11.41% chance of him taking as many opportunities as he has done, and no number can describe the expertise of those finishes. Nor does xG account for which foot the ball dropped to or the state of the game. He is two-footed

enough to vary his dead balls and all of his goals have come with United under pressure, either level or trailing.

The United youth coach Jimmy Murphy used to describe the players he nurtured as apples in his orchard, presenting them to Matt Busby only when they were ready. But because there were no substitutes in those days, eventually the manager had to take a risk. Even players such as Scholes, Ryan Giggs and David Beckham were picked to start on account of their talent rather than the compelling case they made off the bench. Greenwood, on the other hand, has earned a spot by the quality of his performances, and the more there are, the faster he will improve.

Of United's attackers, Daniel James is the easiest for Solskjær to drop. But though Greenwood can contribute from the right wing, he's better between the width of the goalposts: already United's best finisher, his holdup play was lively when picked at centre-forward against Spurs. It is true that Martial, who usually features there, has a high top level but what distinguishes the best players is a high bottom level, which the Frenchman lacks. Against United, teams tend to sit back - Newcastle seem sure to on Boxing Day - and Greenwood is far more likely than Martial to press, conjure room for shots and attack crosses at the near post; to mitigate the abominable midfield behind him.

Bethlehem welcomes pilgrims for Christmas celebrations

 $P^{\text{ilgrims from around}}_{\text{the world gathered}}$ Tuesday in the biblical city of Bethlehem, revered by Christians as the birthplace of Jesus, to celebrate Christmas in the Holy Land.

Palestinians and foreigners began converging on the "little town" in the Israeli-occupied West Bank from early morning, with Christmas Eve festivities taking place in and around the Church of the Nativity.

Tourists queued to visit the grotto inside the church, believed to be the exact site where Jesus was born, with Ola, a Nigerian visitor, saying it was a "special day."

Outside in the winter sun, hundreds watched as Palestinian scouts paraded to the sound of drums.

"I feel really emotional to be here today, it's wonderful," said Germana, an Italian travelling with her husband and two children.

Archbishop Pierbattista Pizzaballa, apostolic administrator of the Latin Patriarch of Jerusalem and the most senior Roman Catholic official in the Middle East, was due to travel from Jerusalem to Bethlehem on Tuesday morning.

He will lead midnight mass in the Church of the Nativity, with Palestinian president Mahmud Ab-

Bethlehem is close to Jerusalem, but cut off from the holy city by Israel's separation barrier.

The first church was built on the site in the fourth century, though it was replaced after a fire in the sixth century.

This year celebrations were bolstered by the return of a wooden fragment believed to be from the manger of Jesus.

Sent as a gift to Pope Theodore I in 640, the piece had been in Europe for more than 1,300 years before being returned last month, Francesco Patton, chief custodian for the Holy Land, said.

"We venerate the relic because (it) reminds us of the mystery of in-

carnation, to the fact that the son of God was born of Mary in Bethlehem more than 2,000 years ago," Patton told AFP at the time.

- 'Tough Christmas in Gaza' -In the square by

the church, Palestinian tourism minister Rula Maaya told AFP it had been a good year, with 3.5 million tourists visiting the city.

But fewer Christians from the Gaza Strip were in attendance than in previous years, as Israel granted permits to just around 200 of the some 900 people who applied, said Wadie Abunassar, an adviser to church leaders in the Holy Land.

The Palestinian territories of the West Bank and Gaza are separated by Israeli territory and crossing between them hard-to-get requires permits. Abunassar said Christmas remained a time for hope.

"The Holy Land is not only the site of the birth and crucifixion (of Jesus), it is also the place of resurrection," he told AFP.

"Despite all challenges, difficulties, pain and problems we are facing, we keep the hope in God and people."

In her traditional Christmas Day message, Britain's Queen Elizabeth II was to describe 2019 as "quite bumpy" after a year of crises in the royal

The walkout has ruined Christmas travel plans for tens of thousands of French ticket holders unable to reach loved ones in time for Christmas Day.

And in the central Philippines, where Christmas is widely celebrated among the country's Catholics, thousands of people were warned to leave their homes as a severe tropical storm approached.

Queen admits 'bumpy' year in Christmas message

Queen Elizabeth II called 2019 "quite bumpy" in a Christmas message at the end of a chaotic year which saw Britain bitterly divided over its split from the European Union and her scandal-plagued son Prince Andrew withdraw from public life.

But in some good news on Tuesday, the 93-year-old monarch's husband Prince Philip checked out of a London hospital after four nights of treatment for an undisclosed "pre-existing condition" in time to join the royal family for Christmas.

The year was filled with disappointments for the queen -- a seminal figure in British public life who assumed the throne in 1952 and is beloved by much of the nation.

None may have been more bitter than a calamitous BBC interview in which her second son Andrew tried to distance himself from American paedophile Jeffrey Epstein. Andrew promised to "step back from public duties" after his denial of having sex with one of Epstein's alleged victims was ridiculed in the UK media and reportedly criticised in Buckingham Palace.

The queen will point to the life of Jesus as an example of how reconciliation can be achieved and "how small steps taken in faith and in hope can overcome longheld differences and deep-seated divisions" in her speech, which will be broadcast on Christmas Day. The remarks were

widely interpreted as a reference to the Brexit debate that has torn Britain apart since it voted to leave the EU in a 2016 referendum.

"The path, of course, is not always smooth, and may at times this year have felt quite bumpy, but small steps can make a world of difference," the queen will say.

Royal commentators said the queen's use of the word "bumpy" marked her most explicit admission of turmoil since her headline-grabbing description of 1992 as an "annus horribilis".

The marriages of three of her children fell apart and her beloved Windsor Castle nearly went up in flames that "horrible year".

Missing picture -The queen found herself dragged into the tortuous political drama of Brexit when she approved Prime Minister Boris Johnson's request to suspend parliament in August. Critics claimed it was an attempt to silence opponents to his Brexit plans.

"By being willing to put past differences behind us and move forward together, we honour the freedom and democracy once won for us at so great a cost."

"As the region's major power, China hopes to show its diplomatic presence to the world by bringing the Japanese and South Korean leaders to the same table," Haruko Satoh, professor and expert on Chinese politics at Osaka University, told AFP. At separate lead-up meetings in Beijing on Monday with Chinese President Xi Jinping, Moon and Abe both spoke of China's hefty diplomatic influence in the region.

Long-running efforts to contain North Korea's nuclear programme have been largely deadlocked since the collapse of a second summit between US President Donald Trump and Kim in Hanoi at the start of this year.

In an effort to pressure the United States,

the North has conducted a series of short-range missile tests and threatened to go further with its "Christmas gift". If the North fired an intercontinental ballistic missile in defiance of UN sanctions, it would destroy Trump's argument that he had succeeded in reducing risks from North Korea. Former US nation-

al security adviser John Bolton, who was dismissed in September, on Monday criticised Trump's strategy and warned the North posed an "imminent" threat.

"The risk to US forces & our allies is imminent & more effective policy is required before NK has the technology to threaten the American homeland," tweeted Bolton. If the North does

carry through with a threatened provocation, the United States should admit its policy of engaging the North had failed, Bolton said in an interview with news site Axios. The US should then work with allies to show that "when we say it's unacceptable, we're going to demonstrate we will not accept it," he added. Before leaving for

China, Abe told reporters that links with Seoul remained "severe", though the Chengdu meeting was important given the regional issues at stake.

"Considering the security environment in East Asia, I recognise that relations between Japan and South Korea as well as relations among Japan, the US and South Korea are important," he said.

The relationship between Japan and South Korea is overshadowed by the 35 years of brutal colonisation by the Japanese -- including the use of sex slaves and forced labour -- that is still bitterly resented today. Ties began a downward spiral in recent months after a series of South Korean court rulings ordering Japanese firms to compensate wartime forced labour victims.

These infuriated Tokyo, who insisted the matter had been settled by a 1965 treaty between the two countries. Seoul then threatened to withdraw from a key military intelligence-sharing pact, although it reversed course in November and agreed to extend it "conditionally".

(AFP): Former US national security adviser Iohn Bolton on Monday sharply criticized President Donald Trump's North Korea policy. warning that the Asian country posed an "imminent" threat. 

Baba Ram Dass, spiritual guru and LSD proponent, dies at 88

1960s counterculture spiritual leader who experimented with LSD and traveled to India to find enlightenment, returning to share it with Americans, has died. He was 88.

Dass' foundation, Love Serve Remember, announced late Sunday that the author and spiritual leader died

peacefully at his home earlier in the day. No cause of death was given. He had suffered a severe stroke in 1997 that left him paralyzed on the right side and, for a time, unable to speak. More recently, he underwent hip surgery after he was injured in a fall in November 2008, according to his website.

"I had really thought about checking out, but your love and your prayers convinced me not to do it. ... It's just beautiful," he told followers in a videotaped message at the time from his hospital bed in Hawaii.

Over the years, Ram Dass born Richard Alpert — associated with the likes of Timothy Leary and Allen Ginsberg. He wrote about his experiences with drugs, set up projects to help prisoners and those facing terminal illness and sought to enlighten others about the universal struggle with aging.

But he was best known for the 1971 book "Be Here Now," writ-

ten after his trip to India. The spiritual primer found its way into thousands of backpacks around the world. "I want to share with you the parts of the internal journey that never get written up in the mass media," he wrote. "I'm not interested in what you read in the Saturday Evening Post about LSD. This is the story of what goes on inside a human being who is undergoing all these experiences."

Among his other books were "How Can I Help?" and "Compassion in Action" and "Still Here: Embracing Aging, Changing, and Dying." "In the '60s, I was an uncle for a movement," he told The Associated Press in 1998. "I was always showing people where they could go. I went east, and then there was a big movement east."


Now, he said, "the baby boomers are getting old — and I'm learning how to get old for them. That's my role."

The Boston-born son of a prominent attorney, Ram Dass entered the public sphere in the early 1960s as a young Harvard psychology professor. Alpert, as he was then known, earned a doctorate at Stanford University.

He and Leary, a Harvard colleague,

HONOLULU (AP) — Baba Ram Dass, the lucinogenic mushrooms and LSD, giving to break the law, since that leads to fear the drugs to prisoners, philosophers and students to study their effects. Ram Dass later wrote that he tried psilocybin, the compound found in hallucinogenic mushrooms, in Leary's living room.

"I peered into the semidarkness and recognized none other than myself in cap and gown and hood," he wrote. "It



was as if that part of me, which was a Harvard professor, had separated or dissociated itself from me."

The experiments got him and Leary kicked out of Harvard in 1963. "It was a little too sensational," Ram Dass said in 1998. "We were the starters of it."

He and Leary retreated to an upstate New York mansion that drew Beat Generation figures Ginsberg, William Burroughs and Jack Kerouac.

By the late 1960s, LSD and other hallucinogens had become part of pop culture and a rite of passage for many young Americans. But Alpert eventually sought a way to reach a state of enlightenment without drugs. Following Ginsberg's advice, he headed to India in 1967, where he met the man who became his guru, Neem Karoli Baba.

There, his guru introduced him to yoga, meditation, Buddhism and Sufism, and gave him the name Ram Dass, Hindi for "servant of God." (He is often called Baba Ram Dass; "baba" is an honorary title.) Ram Dass wrote "Be Here Now" when he returned to the United States. Around the same time, he told The New York Times that he had turned and paranoia." In 1974, Ram Dass founded the Hanuman Foundation, which set up programs such as the Prison Ashram Project to introduce inmates to spirituality. He also helped create the Seva Foundation, which works to prevent blindness and helps community groups in developing countries. His Love Serve

Remember Foundation is dedication to preserving his teachings and those of Neem Karoli Baba.

Ram Dass lived for many years in the quiet town of San Anselmo, California, about 20 miles (32 kilometers) north of San Francisco, surrounded by the markers of his life straddling East and West: Japanese prints and statues of Buddha, seashells from the South Pacific and a well-used player piano.

In later years, he moved to Woodside, California. More recently, he was based in Maui.

He said his 1997 stroke brought physical and spiritual suffering, but that he came to see the suffering as a source of insight that he could share with others facing their own battles with illness and aging.

"It's brought out new aspects of myself and aspects of my relationship to the world," he said in 1998. The stroke has gotten me into a stage of life — this is a stage close to death, a stage which is inward."

After regaining his speech, Ram Dass returned to the lecture circuit, starting by touring Northern California sharing tales of what he called his state of "heavy grace."

"All illnesses are part of the passing show," he told the San Francisco Chronicle in 2004. "You are not just your body. You are the witness of your body." He had a falling out with Leary in the 1970s after rumors surfaced that the latter, jailed on drug and prison-break charges, offered to provide authorities with information on others involved in the drug culture in exchange for a lighter sentence.

But the pair had reconciled in the years before Leary's death in 1996, joking back and forth and praising one another as they made joint appearances at lectures. When Leary was on his deathbed, Ram Dass came to visit after Leary asked for advice on how best to let go of life. "The mythic level that Timothy and I lived at was that we were adventurers," he said in the 2014 documentary, "Dving to Know: Ram Dass & Timothy Leary."

Although speaking of Leary, Ram Dass added an epithet that also could be his own: "If you have identified with your soul when you are alive, death is
