PAKYONG, 02 SEPT [IPR]:

Chief Secretary, AK Shrivas-tava, visited the upcoming Pakyong Greenfield Airport in East Sikkim to take detailed stock of the progress of work as well as the preparedness of the airport in view of the consequent inauguration schedule.

The CS inspected the distressed area of the wall and discussed about its resto-ration. He was apprised about the status in detail by Director, Operations, Manjunathan R, and General Manager, Engineering-cum-Project Head, Gautam Biswas, who explained that the distress is in the gabion box which has no bearing on the strength and stability of the wall since it acts as only the external look and does not contribute to the structural strength of the RE wall. immediate danger to the runway and the remedial work

was in progress. Matters reg Matters regarding water, power and other associated works were also discussed and PCE-cum-Secretary, Energy and Power Department, KB Kunwar, informed that dedicated line for airport supply has already been

Under the aegis of Integrated Mountain Initiative [IMI], IMI Sikkim Chapter facilitated by Ecotourism and Conservation Society of Sikkim [ECOSS] organised 'Apple-Orange Thinkshop' at the ECOSS office in Tadong on 01 Sept. The meeting was chaired by Lok Sabha MP, PD Rai, and co-chaired by Associate Professor & Head of Horticulture Department, Sikkim University, Dr Laxuman Sharma, a press release informs.

The programme was attended by representatives from Sikkim University, ICAR-NOFRI Sikkim, NABARD, Horticulture & Cash Crops Development Department, KVK, FS& AD, Zilla and Gram Panchavats, farmers, retired officials and apple & orange growers and farming enthusiasts.

The main objectives of the programme were to share and trace the history of apples and oranges which were previous-ly major cash crops in the State with a view to identify the causes of decline and change in their cultivation and iden-tify the challenges and strategies for their revival.



The meeting discussed the ground realities, issues surrounding their cultivation, current policies and practices and explored various solutions through the findings of

research and academia

The participants shared their experiences on field as growers and as depart-ment officials. The thinkshop brought forth anecdotes and insights with inputs of best practices from different perspectives of farmers, Horticulture Department, ac-ademia and included experiences from outside the State

such as the NABARD Wadi Project approach.
Retired Chief Secretary, KC

Pradhan, shared his knowledge with regard to apple and orange cultivation in Sikkim.

apple cultivation had declined from the 1980s with the introduction of weedicides and chemical fertilisers, possible infected new species and the onset of diseases such as apple scab and pests like the wooly aphid. Natural disasters had also contributed to loss of the apple trees in Lachung. With regard to oranges, the factors of decline included lack of moisture during winters, insufficient manuring, bad managerial practices, climate change, hailstorm damage, pests and diseases such as fruit drop, fruit fly, stem borer, citrus die back, citrus

psylla, citrus greening, etc.
In his concluding address,
Lok Sabha MP, Mr Rai, said, "Today, there is a need to re-alize that the new-age farmer has growing needs, different expectations and generally smaller landholdings. There is a need to focus the research on local problems while converging on a more natural and holistic growth of the or-chards in the State."

He also stressed on taking lessons from history, culture and traditions as these form a basis to build better local

Still Blind on Suicides

But time has come to wake up,

engage, and understand
When the suicide rate spikes in the Vidarbha
region of Maharastra or in southern Andhra
Pradesh, the reasons are known - crop failure and mounting debt. When teen suicides climb in June-July across the country every year, experts know the reason - the board exam results and academic pressure. Across the country and the world, the reasons prompting suicides are understood in reasonable detail and it naturally follows that efforts are mounted to suppress the triggers. The massive crores released to waive farmer loans, the grading system introduced for board exam results and the no failures in schools policies (now being unfortunately reconsidered) emerged as corrective measures undertaken to curb suicides in the country.

Suicides, meanwhile, remain a worry in Sikkim but informed corrective measures cannot even be speculated upon because no enquiry has been invested into understanding why so many in Sikkim take their own lives. It does not take an expert to inform us that suicides are born from depression; that much is obvious Everyone knows that untreated depression festers to manic levels triggering suicidal tendencies. We know that, and if we don't, a simple Google search will tell us so. What we do not know is what triggers are pushing people from teenagers to octogenarians to such levels of depression that they commit suicide when the family thinks they are away at tuition classes or out collecting fodder?

A suicide always makes disturbing news and the psychological health of a State dregs low when a State as small as Sikkim sometimes reports up to 5 suicides on the same day. If official records can be taken seri ously, the suicide pattern is already changing in Sik-kim. The number of suicides by senior citizens has noticeably fallen even as suicides by the very young [teens and even pre-teens], as also victims in their thirties, are registering disturbingly high numbers. It is no longer enough to be told that psychiatric counselling needs to be reached to more people at more places. That should already have happened by now. Awareness camps will no longer suffice, the concerned agency should start investing more of its training in trying to understand and explain why depression is so pervasive in Sikkim and where Sikkim is failing, as a State and as a society, in trying to contain depression from turning morbid and fatal.

There have been some surveys and some data computation to understand suicides in Sikkim, but nothing comprehensive has been undertaken thus far. It is important for the State Government to commission a team of experts to carry out exhaustive research into suicides in Sikkim to pin down the reasons. Only after such a professional exercise is undertaken, can anything of consequence be explored to arrest the suicide rate in Sikkim and save lives. More agencies, from the social to the religious to sports associations, need to be involved in the remedial measures as and when they are undertaken, and these should be undertaken at a more earnest level than the tokenism which central missions and state events like Beti-Bachao, Beti Padhao initiatives receive. The government should play the role of the facilitator and extend logistical support to civil society organizations which should be invited in to address the issue, understand it and then engage in the task of saving lives.

Are we ready for the digital tsunami?

How do we prepare for and manage what's known as the Fourth Industrial Revolution?

A technological metamorphosis is upon us,

and we need to do more than look behind and use digital technologies to fix historical problems. We must start thinking more innovatively about how we re-engineer communities, moving from smart (where we use individual tools and technologies to fix problems) to intelligent (where we plan on

using disruption to our advantage).

The recent debate over the Google/Sidewalk
Labs proposals for the city of Toronto is an example of how quickly digitalization is moving forward and how unprepared we are to answer some important questions.

OPEN DATA

With more data from the Internet of Things (IoT), how will we make use of the information? Data is an asset that must be managed as a valued resource, not only by companies for use and resale, but for its public good and its opportunity to spur new social and economic innovations.

A recent Smart Cities World article outlined

some good examples on improvements we could make. The combination of several sources of data can make a significant difference in bringing about new solutions to a host of problems, from forecasting floods to minimizing medical wait times and

Open data needs management principles and procedures — ownership decisions and intellectual property (IP) rights, safe uses and protection, and compatible systems based on common standards to combine several data sets from different organizations in order to make inferences about that information.

This will force engagement and partnerships among the public sector, private sector, non-profits

and citizens to make principled decisions. Communities are at the centre of this planning, and have resources they can use to help — the European Commission, for example, has published a toolkit for data managers and data holders. And a Canadian public interest law clinic (CIPPIC) provides an FAO on smart citiesthat contains valuable

Ownership and protection of personal information, as well as privacy issues, are key points of contention. But let's remember that not all data are sensitive and require deep contemplation about usage. There are models for dealing with contentious issues, such as those proposed in a playbook provided by Harvard to cities wanting to share

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE AND ROBOTICS AI and robots will continue to replace humans.

We're already experiencing downsizing in some disciplines and demand for new types of skills, or more of the skills needed for the digital revolution. The ability to use AI to help us make decisions, to serve customers and perform repetitive tasks will continue to dramatically alter the workplace.

Post-secondary programs will need to change some currently popular programs may have

fewer job offerings, while other fields, or an amalgamation of disciplines, will need to be created or emphasized. Learning more than one discipline and honing up on soft skills (such as in communications, innovation and problem solving) will be key for many graduates.

The shifts in employment could hit some com-

munities harder than others. Therefore it's more important than ever to think ahead and determine how the new digital economy might have an impact on the future of each community, and understand that the lifespan of some companies is now shorter.

Autonomous vehicles are evolving, perhaps

slowly in some jurisdictions, but more actively in others. Legislation in the United States on self-driving vehicles is an example of how governments are appling with the issues raised by driverless cars.
It causes some rethinking on insurance, new

forms of ownership and entrepreneurship and a reassessment of planning for parking and land use. Vehicle manufacturers have been including more technologies in cars, inching our way to autono-

According to Deloitte, consumers may not be willing to pay for more technology in cars, but new ownership systems and ride-hailing services offer cost savings), cut down accidents by as much as 90 per cent and provide efficiencies that may accelerate consumer adoption.

More than 33 industries will be affected by the

advent of driverless cars, according to CB Insights. Communities need to envision how they plan for the resulting opportunities and disruptions.

ENVISIONING THE SMART CITY

Regarding smart cities, we need more active community engagement in debating the pros and cons, in thinking about the impediments to change and how to implement what we believe will benefit citi-zens. These kinds of disruptions cannot be managed

by governments alone; they require a wide variety of stakeholders at the table planning for change

There are several interesting ideas floating around on future cities. We have an opportunity to think about doing things differently, and correctly, rather than repeating the same patterns.

In Barcelona, for example, community activists

are working on a fabrication city concept. They de-

"A step away from importing most things into the city and exporting our waste, and instead introducing a circular model, where all resources flow in a closed-loop system within the city itself."

3D printing shops will be able to fabricate re-frigerators and and cars with designs uploaded from the cloud. The question that must be answered: What changes would we need to make lo-cally to allow this to happen?

Other examples are cities that focus on food production to improve their own food security; cities that are reducing CO2 and improving quality of life by becoming more walkable or more attractive for telecommuters.

This is only the start. There are many other ways that digitalization will impact sectors that affect where and how we live. Health care, for example, will undergo tremendous change as we self-manage, choose implantable technologies and cell and tissue regenerative technologies, and live

We must think about the impact of these changes before we start building infrastructure that may no longer be needed in a few years.

Technology is already changing how we live our lives and go about our days. Are we ready with col-laborative planning processes so we are not taken by surprise?

It's time to address the hidden agenda of school dress codes

Press code policies have always been prevalent in schools. Normally, what children can and cann wear in schools is explicitly noted in school policies or implicitly implied by broader cultural and societal norms.

The issue of the vast and sometimes exhaustive list of dress code policies of what cannot be worn has not had any resolution across localities and countries.

The problem with trying to devel-

op a set of guidelines for school dress code policies is that the implementation or restriction of dress is just not about the clothes that kids wear. Dress code policies are mired in larger contested debates that have to do with gender identity, race and sexuality, reflective of a broader public discourse.

How school educators and policymakers set parameters of dress in schools creates a highly emotional and volatile debate with little consensus or resolution.

Most obviously, the nature of

many dress code violations interconnects to issues of gender and sexual dentity. The vast majority of cases have targeted girls and LGBTQ youth on the basis that what one might wear reveals too much - that it's sexually suggestive, distracting for other stu-dents or offensive to the local and cul-tural norms of the community.

SHAMING

Those who are not part of the "norm," particularly those children whose self-identity goes beyond traditional gender types, are more susceptible to stricter dress code infractions than

those policies that privilege the status quo. Similarly, girls have taken the brunt of dress codes.

Tank tops, spaghetti straps, bare shoulders, cleavage or no cleavage, shorts that are too short, midriff, shirts/pants regulations are indicative of the multiple infractions that

shame girls. The list is exhaustive.

The infractions for noncompliance exacerbate the shaming of girls' self-perception of their worth. And yet it points to the basic assumption that girls' bodies are shameful something that is to be covered, eval-uated or objectified.

And when their bodies are not covered, it supposedly sends a clear message that girls are at fault should something wrongful be done to them; they somehow deserved such a fate.

This narrative, whether intended or not, plays to the broader social movements beyond simply that of dress codes. Dress code policies mask broader issues such as one's right to their own bodies.

Dress codes minimize the increasing public outcries over sexual harassment and assault that have been made so public with the explosion of the #MeToo movement. Conversations around issues of systemic racism or discrimination are also further cloaked.

Forms of dress may be curtailed in schools when they challenge dominant religious views. When schools or boards ban particular types of re-ligious dress, a clear and real danger of undermining religious minorities exists. They may feel a broader form of systemic discrimination lurking behind this ban.

CREATING INCLUSIVE, BODY-

POSITIVE DRESS CODES schools are going to remove this shackle of the perpetual dress code wars in schools, let educators and policymakers call it for what it is – a diversion behind the more significant public issues that remain intensely contested and vociferous.

If educators and policymakers are genuinely worried about the safety of their students or the decorum of dress codes, schools could simply fol-low the steps of one school administrator from Evanston Township High School in Illinois. The high school's fundamental "rule" mandated that certain body parts must be covered for all students at all times. Specifically, students must wear their clothes in a way that fully covers their genitals, buttocks, breasts and nipples with opaque fabric.

Such a simple yet inevitably provocative dress code policy re-moves the broader contested aspects of gender, sexual identity, faith or sys-

temic discrimination.

If society is concerned about cultivating students' attentiveness re-garding etiquette and decorum in light of our community values, let's make space in schools to discuss the root of these issues through meaningful political dialogue rather than using dress codes to obscure and cloak the more pressing and substan-

Plane skids off runway in Nepal; close shave for 21 on board

KATHMANDU, SEP 2 (PTI): All 21 people on board a Nepalese pas-senger plane had a miraculous escape when the aircraft skidded off the recently repaired runway of the Nepal's international airport here and got stuck in a grassy field nearby, officials said Sunday. The Tribhuvan Inter

national Airport (TIA) was closed for some 12-hours that left thousands of people stranded after a Yeti Airlines air-craft skidded off its runway on Saturday night.
All passengers and

were safe in the incident that brought the airport services to a halt, forcing inbound aircraft to be diverted to New Delhi, Dha-ka and Lucknow, the Himalayan Times reported.

The Jetstream 41 was carrying 21 passengers from Nepalgunj to Kath-

Normal operation of domestic and international flights has re-sumed at 8:25 am Sunday after almost 12 hours, according to a TIA duty officer. The Yeti airlines aircraft that slipped to the grassy field adjoining the runaway has been removed to the parking lot.

After skidding off the runway, the aircraft had reached the grassy field nearby.

The incident comes

amid mounting safety concerns over cracks on the runway's surface, which was repaired only recently.

The latest incident is

one of the many plane accidents that Nepal's airport has witnessed in recent years.

In March, a Dhaka to Kathmandu US-Bangla Airlines flight, with 67 passengers and four

caught fire after it ca-reened off the runway and ploughed into a football ground near the airport, killing 51 people. In April, all 139 peo-

ple on board a Malaysian passenger plane had a miraculous escape when the Kuala Lumpur-bound flight skidded off the runway and got stuck in mud while attempting to take off from the airport. Nepal's only inter-national airport lies in a

narrow bowl-shaped val-ley with the Himalayas to the north, making it a challenging place to land.

Fresh wave of flood hits Assam



GUWAHATI, SEP 2 (PTI) Another wave of flood has hit Assam inundating four districts affecting over 12,000 people while the Brahmaputra and its tributaries are flowing above the danger level, an official report said

here Sunday.
A total of 676 hectares of farm land in Dhemaji, Biswanath, Golaghat and Sivasagar districts has also been submerged in the third wave of flood this season, the Assam State Disaster Management Authority (ASDMA) report said.

No death was report-ed during the fresh wave of floods, though the previous two waves together had claimed 50 lives, the ASDMA said.

The deluge affected 12,428 people in 48 vil-

lages of these four dis-

In worst affected Dhemaji district, 11,355 are reeling under the impact of the floods, followed by 390 in Biswanath, 350 in Sivasagar and 333 in Golaghat, the report said.

Two relief camps have been set up in Biswanath and Golaghat districts, it

At least 525 big. 753

small and 977 poultry were affected by the floods, it said.

According to a Central Water Commission (CWC) report on Sunday, the Brahmaputra was flowing above the danger level at Nimatighat in Jorhat, Dhansiri at Numaligarh in Golaghat and Jia Bharali at N T Road Crossing Sonitpur district.

Asking parents to keep a close watch on the behaviour of children, the advisory said they should monitor the child's online and social media activity, and if need be, install a cyber or mobile parenting software.


Digital archive of Tagore poems launched

KOLKATA, SEP 2 (PTI): A digital archive of 3,500 poems of Rabindranath Tagore was launched here in a private initia-tive with 15 recitations by the poet himself and the rest by 245 elocutionists.

Besides the recitals. 110 Rabindra Sangeets (Tagore songs) and 103 English recitations have also been included in 'Rabindra Kobita Archive', said its maker Purnendu Bikash Sarkar, a physician by profes-

Sixty most popular poems of Tagore have also been put separately in a gallery - 'most pop-ular poems', Sarkar, who collected and digital-ly compiled the poems during a research spanning over five years, told PTI.

Details like at what age the poem was writ-ten by Tagore and the place where it was penned - are also avail-able in the archive.



"I found during re-earch that apart from 150 popular poems by Tagore, others are not very much known. And the number of such poems is much higher than the known ones," he said hoping the digital initiative will now help the younger generation to know the lesser known works of the Nobel lau-

Visva Bharati university Vice-chancellor Sabujkali Sen, present at the launch of the archive

this week, said "Purnendu Bikash Sarkar accomplished a task which ideally should have been done by the Visva Bharati university. It is undoubt-edly a complete archive of Tagore poems and will guide future generations and initiate them with Tagore's works."

Bangladesh Depu-High Commissioner Toufique Hasan said the archive would enable 25 crore Bengalis, living across the world, hear

Tagore. Poet Sankha Ghosh

said the archive was an important and unique initiative.

ndonesia bids spectacular farewell to Asian Games

IAKARTA. SEP 1 (PTI): Indonesia bid an emotional farewell to the 18th Asian Games, displaying the same gritty spirit with which it organised the 15-day sporting ex-travaganza as thousands braved heavy rain to turn up for a spectacular closing ceremony here on

Sunday.

The 76,000 capacity Gelora
Bung Karno stadium did not attract many people when the track and field events were on but they made a beeline to watch the two hour long closing ceremony that was high on entertainment.

Indonesia's love for Bollywood was also on full display as singer Siddharth Slathia and Denada sang popular numbers 'Koi Mil Gaya', 'Kuch Kuch Hota Hain' and 'Jai Ho'.

As expected, the closing cere-mony was not as spectacular as the opening when Indonesian President Joko Widodo made headlines with his bike stunt to enter the venue. But it was fun nonetheless with a heady mix of song, dance and fireworks.

Widodo's video message to his countrymen and the entire Asian continent also added to the excite-

For the organisers, it was the end of an intense and successful campaign, having got four years to prepare for the second biggest multi-sporting event in the world following Vietnam's withdrawal. Having two cities -- Jakarta and Palembang -- as co-hosts was a first in Games' history, making the herculean task all the more chal-



lenging.
Hosting more than 11,000 athletes from 45 countries across two contrasting cities was no mean feat but a determined Indonesia pulled it off, overcoming the triple threat posed by terrorism, crime and its notorious traffic.

"Everyone supported, that's the key. The whole of Indonesia became one and supported the

Games. We had a plan since March. 2016. As an organisation we made sure we implemented that plan. We also got the best Indonesian talent to support the Games. Did everything work? Not 100 percent. But we tried to solve the issues and did not run away from them," said Erick Thohir, chief of organizing committee INASGOC.

The successful staging of the

Games, happening for the first time in Indonesia since 1962, has also given the country the confidence to bid for the 2032 Olympics.

International Olympic Commit-tee President Thomas Bach, who was at the VIP area alongside OCA chief Ahmad Al Fahad Al Sabah and Indonesian Vice-President, has also given a thumbs up to the

While the grand opening ceremony showcased Indonesia's rich cultural heritage, the closing of the Games was a modest affair but still scored high on liveliness. The spectators revelled in the united spirit of Asia as artists from India, China and Korea performed.

India's Slathia, one among the six singers who sang the Games anthem in their local language, en-

the reputed Ikon and Super Junior from Korea besides Indonesia's very own like Isyana Saraswati, Dira Sugandi, RAN and Bunga Citra Lestari.

For the physically, mentally and emotionally exhausted athletes, the ceremony gave them an opportunity to let their hair down. Forgetting the intense competition for the moment, the sporting champions mingled to celebrate the occasion rather than parading

China and Japan, who finished an expected first and second in the medals tally, were welcomed vo-ciferously but the roar got louder when the Indonesian contingent marched in. Indonesia finished fourth in the medals tally, a drastic improvement from a top-20 finish in Incheon four years ago.

The Indian contingent was led by women hockey team's captain and flag-bearer Rani Rampal. It was also a memorable Games for India as it produced the best ever performance with 69 medals including 15 gold, 24 silver and 30

The loudest cheer, however, was reserved for the 13,000 volunteers who worked tirelessly to contribute to the Games' success.

The ceremony culminated with Ahmad Al Fahad Al Sabah calling on the athletes to meet in four years in Hangzhou, the host for the 2022 Asian Games, before the symbolic handing over of the OCA flag to the Mayor of the Chinese

Kohli survives dubious DRS call as India reach 46/3 at lunch

SOUTHAMPTON, SEP 2 (PTI): Skipper Virat Kohli got a lucky reprieve after another howler from third umpire Joel Wilson as India reached 46 for 3 against England at lunch on the fourth day, chasing a tricky victory target of 245.

TV umpire Ioel Wilson ruled not out when replays showed that Kohli did not edge the ball off Moeen Ali (0-8) in the 17th over and it was crashing onto the leg

Kohli (10 batting) and Ajinkya Rahane (13 batting) duo added 24 runs for the un-broken fourth wicket after another top order collapse reduced India to 22 for 3.

The Indian top order flopped once again as Shikhar Dhawan (17), KL Rahul (0) and Cheteshwar Pujara (5) were dismissed cheaply.

James Anderson (2-15) had Dhawan caught at slip and trapped Pujara lbw, as the Indian top-order struggled against lateral



ovement generated by the new ball. KL Rahul's (0) struggles against the in-

coming delivery continues as well, bowled off Stuart Broad (1-14) in the fourth over, albeit he was unlucky to get a low toe-edge that deflected onto his stumps.

Hockey team captain Sreejesh Parattu Raveendran and member Rupinder Pal Singh would get Rs 20 lakh each for winning bronze medal.

Palaniswami recalled that the late Chief Minister Jayalalithaa had enhanced the high cash incentive to sportspersons bagging medals in international events.

Summer of 69: India's top show in Asiad promises bright future

JAKARTA, SEP 2 (PTI): Achievements over the past two weeks, in the world's second biggest multisport event, matched India's aspirations and set the country on a road that appears far more promising than the path it has been on

The best-ever medal haul at the 2018 Asian Games is a leap forward for Indian sport after the Commonwealth Games medal

spurt.

In pursuit of excellence in the sporting arena and creating a niche for itself, India never had it so good in the continental show piece that is considered next only to the Olympic Games.

Even as the medallists come

back with a feeling of accomplish-ment from Jakarta and Palembang, the surge in podium finishes could trigger new passion for Olympic sports in a country so obsessed with cricket.

From teenager Saurabh Chaud-hary to 60-year-old Pranab Bardhan, an assortment of athletes combined to produce a top show even as the country endured shocking results in kabaddi and

hockey.
With 15 gold, 24 silver and 30 bronze, India's medal tally stood at 69, a step up from Incheon four years ago when they won 65.

India equalled the 15-gold tal-



of the 1951 inaugural Games but the country had never won 24 silvers before. Overall, India maintained its top-10 rank by finishing eighth yet again.

Every multi-sporting event has witnessed controversies and it was no different this time too.

However, once the action be-gan, it was only the athletes and their performances that took centre stage.

The track and field remained

the most productive area for India as seven of the 15 gold came from the Gelora Bung Karno Stadium.

It was the burly Teiinder Pal Singh Toor, who delivered the first athletics gold with a record-breaking throw of 20.75m and later 12toed Swapna Barman entered the history books by becoming the country's first heptathlete to grab a yellow metal at the Games.

Dutee Chand returned to the track with a bang. Running as if there was no tomorrow, she ended up blazing the track for two silver medals, the one in 100m being India's first in 20 years.

If it was not for superior Africa-origin athletes, representing countries such as Oatar and Bahrain on track, India's gold count would have been bigger.

It was purely for this reason that Hima Das had to be content with a silver in the 200m as she

ran alongside Nigerian-born Salwa Eid Naser.

expectedly Neeraj Chopra achieved a super result by becoming the first Indian to win a gold in javelin throw and sprinters Man-jit Singh and Jinson Johnson too changed a few statistics with their courageous show.
India's badminton

Saina Nehwal and P V Sindhu continued to deliver the goods and ensured that the country's 36-yearold wait for an individual medal

Sindhu's silver and Saina's bronze were among the highlights of India's campaign along with the table tennis players' two historic

Manika Batra was without doubt the biggest star of India's CWG show at the Gold Coast but in Jakarta, winning two bronze in team events by competing against powerhouses like China and Japan is no mean feat. Batra, Sharath Kamal, G Sathian and Harmeet Desai

deserve an applause for their effort.

In Palembang, 16-year-old
Chaudhary and 15-year old Shardul Vihan showed that India has no dearth of talent even as the other voungsters Manu Bhaker and Anish Bhanwala must be disappointed for not winning a medal.

Saurabh was one of the two gold medallists along with Rani Sarnobat while Shardul won a silver.

Bajrang Punia and Vinesh Phogat performed as if they owned the mat, winning gold medals with sheer domination. But veteran Sushil Kumar and Salshi Malik suffered disappointments.

While there were many moments to rejoice, India's performance in kabaddi and hockey dis-

appointed the fans.

Bridge buddies Bardhan and
Shibnath Dey Sarkar won gold in men's pairs and urged fans to not equate their sport with gambling, saying it's a game of intellect.

A gritty Amit Panghal ensured that a medal -- gold -- came from the boxing arena too, the Army

mate day of the competition.

The recurve archers disappointed with their lacklustre show but their compound teammates made sure that the contingent does nor return empty-handed.

In kabaddi, Iran jolted India twice by taking both and men's and women's top prize. It came as a rude shock as India went into the Games as the continent's powerhouse, having all nine gold medals

The men's and women's hockey teams being the top-ranked in Asia were also expected to stand on top of the podium but a silver and bronze was all they could manage. By scoring more than 70 goals in

the pool games, India's men's hockey team looked unstoppable before they were halted by Malaysia. The defence choked in the crucial last two minutes and they eventually lost it in sudden death. The team took a bronze by beating Pakistan.

The women's team lost in the final to Japan, who claimed both

the gold medals.

The positives far outweigh the disappointments in few events, and the many firsts and many national records that were broken during the Games provide hope for a bright future.

He said the US military would aim to spend the money on other "urgent priorities" before the funds expire on September 30, 2018.

With the latest move, the Department of Defence (DoD) has repro-grammed USD 800 million CSF destined for Pakistan as US Defence Secretary Jim Mattis did not give the necessary certification to Congress that the country has taken strong steps against terrorist groups like the Haqqani network and Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT).

"This is not a new decision or a new announce-ment," Faulkner told PTI

in response to a question. "We continue to press

Pakistan to indiscriminately target all terrornately target all terror-ist groups, including the Haqqani Network and LeT in the region," Faulk-ner said, adding that the USD 300 million aid which had earlier been suspended - should be used elsewhere.

30 Nigerian soldiers killed in Boko Haram raid: military sources

KANO, SEP 1 (AFP): At least 30 Nigerian soldiers died in combat with Boko Haram jihadists who overran a military base in the northeast near the border with Niger, two military sources told

AFP on Saturday.

Scores of jihadists in trucks stormed the base at Zari village in northern Borno state late Thursday and briefly seized it after a fierce battle, they said.

"They came in large numbers in trucks and carrying heavy weapons and engaged soldiers in a battle that lasted

for an hour," a military officer said.
"We lost at least 30 men," the officer said, adding that the attack took place

at around 4:00 pm.

"They overwhelmed the troops who were forced to temporarily with-

draw before reinforcements arrived," said the officer who asked not to be named because he was not authorised

Boko Haram has intensified attacks on military targets in recent months.

The attacks appear to undermine repeated claims by the military that Boko Haram had been defeated.

The militants took weapons and

military equipment before they were pushed out of the base by troops with aerial support, said a second military source who gave a similar death toll.

The militants were pursued and bombarded by a fighter jet, said the military sources.

"The terrorists also suffered heavy

casualty from the bombardment", one

of the military officers said.

Zari is located 30 kilometres from the town of Damasak on the border with Niger.

The jihadists are thought to have attacked the base from the nearby Garunda village, where 17 troops were killed and 14 injured in an attack on another military base last month, the sources

In a statement late Friday the Nige rian military confirmed troops fought Boko Haram "insurgents...on rampage to loot the community and extort money from villagers".

"Troops...have successfully routed

Boko Haram insurgents in an encounter that ensued yesterday evening at Zari village," the military said in the






