Fresh bridge collapse in West Bengal, one injured

SILIGURI (WB), SEP 7 (PTI): An old bridge collapsed near Siliguri in north Bengal on Friday, leaving a truck driver in-jured, a state minister said.

This is the second incident of bridge collapse in West Bengal in three days. The Majerhat bridge had collapsed in south Kolkata on September 4, killing three persons and injuring 24.

The middle part of the bridge collapsed on a canal below at around 9.30 am when a truck was crossing it and the vehicle was stuck in the broken portion, officials said.

The bridge connects

the Manganj and Phansidewa areas to Siliguri, a major city in north Bengal. Phansidewa is around 22 kms from Siliguri.

"Let the matter be inquired into," Governor

Keshari Nath Tripathi told reporters in Kolkata when asked about the back-toback collapse of the Majerhat bridge and the one North Bengal Devel-

ment Minister Rabindranath Ghosh said movement of loaded trucks was banned on the bridge but many such vehicles bound for the north-eastern states continued to take it.

Doc casts shadow of doubt over potency of medicines supplied to govt hospitals

Deptt assures follow-up if complaint is made

Health Care, Human Service & Fami-ly Welfare Department continues to face chal-lenges in delivering quality health services across the State as it confronts

lighting inadequate fa-cilities and lack of other basic amenities. The Department has yet again come under the scanner for poor quality medi-cines and drugs supplied in government hospitals.

This was informed by one of the doctors of Namchi District Hospital in South during the coor-dination meeting held at the hospital on 06 Sept which was also attended by Health Minister, AK Ghatani, along with Health Commissioner/ Secretary, Vishal Chauhan, and other officers.

During the meeting, the doctor in question informed that medicines supplied to the hospitals do not work as effectively as medicines bought in in the market.

"If it takes 4-10 days

to bring down a patient's fever with medicine like Paracetamol supplied for government hospitals, the same medicine when brought from pharmacies outside bring down the patient's fever in just one y," the doctor is reported to have told the meeting.

Health Secretary Mr Chauhan, in turn remarked that although it is taking more time, the patients are still recovering and urged the doctors and staff to present written complaints to the head office in such cases so that the medicines can

however, did not make any comments on the issue during the meeting.

Speaking to hospital authorities today, it was informed that incidents of slow-acting medicines or poor quality have not been reported to the head office till date.

The authorities also informed that the hospital is receiving both generic medicines as well as branded medicines. However, this matter has been taken up seriously now and information will mmediately be forwarded to higher authorities, it was informed

On the same, Health Secretary, Mr Chauhan, confirmed that a doctor of Namchi District Hospital had made such an observation during the coordination meeting.

He added that all medicines supplied for Health Department are received only after test reports of the medicine have been placed by the concerned company.

"Only after the test reports, the payment is made to the suppliers from the department. No such cases have been reported from any hospital or PHC in the State till date and if any such com-plaint is received by the department, the medicine will be sent for retests," said Mr Chauhan.

To Protect and to Promote

To secure the future, think beyond protection and quotas

Local protection is an important issue. It could also be argued that it is of more emotional significance than constructive intervention, but because people and their leaders feel so strongly about the issue, it becomes very important. Even the West, with its enviable unemployment rate despite the economic downturn, is passionately debating the pros and cons of outsourcing which, in its mind is taking jobs away to cheaper human resource destinations even though benefits of such cost cuts benefit cash-strapped consumers at home the most.

So yes, local protection evokes a passionate and emotional response from the people, and governments have to continuously appear to be prioritising it. There are, however, practical and logistical implications that should never be lost sight of and quality never allowed to be compromised. Opportunities that progressive and positive attitudes create should not be allowed to get drowned by the din of rhetoric. In a world growing increasingly 'flat' [to borrow the now dated term from Thomas L. Friedman], digging trenches only manages to keep opportunities out, shrinks the horizon and constricts development. The present times demand competitive edge, and prioritizing protectionism dulls this pre-requisite of making it in the world.

Protect, yes, but also trust the inherent skills and potential of the young. The young have proven that they have what it takes to succeed and survive. Take for example the many young entrepreneurs that Sikkim can boast of now. They happened when the easier option of landing employment with the government became scarce and also less appealing. They applied themselves to enterprises, something that the 'local' talent pool was not considered very adept at till even a decade back. But look around now, the youth, who while in school, were being groomed for cushy bureaucracy or technical professions, have grown up quite well as hoteliers, restaurateurs, travel operators, small scale industrialists, respected professionals with national media, sportspersons... achievers.

Such successes probably happened because they

Such successes probably happened because they grew up before obsessive protectionism invaded the public domain and made the young lazy. This of course does not go to say that job opportunities should not be protected for the people of the land, they should; but the policy makers have to strike the right balance where it is done in a way that does not lull future generations into a false sense of security and stops them from developing skills which make them world beatres. It is not easy, but a good beginning can be made by devising ways which reward healthy business practices. Investors who set up shop in Sikkim should conduct themselves better, encourage and invite more local employment on their own instead of being made to do so by way of legislations. They enjoy tax breaks and many other sops when they opt for Sikkim, not because Sikkim needs more factories, but because it rewards job creation. They have to understand and appreciate this fact.

The young on the other hand should be groomed as competitors, not as beneficiaries-in-waiting. In times to come, it should be their skills that attract and retain investments and not lavish industrial policies alone. Various arms of the government will have to collaborate to make this possible. It is possible and the generation controlling the present owes it to the future.

How will Google's innovation continue beyond its 20th year?

As millions of people came online in the late 1990s they needed help figuring out what each webpage was about, and how to find what they were looking for. Web indexes and search engines sprang up. When Google was founded in September 1998, it had to compete with the information retrieval algorithms and techniques – nicknamed "secret sauce" – used by Lycos, Yahoo and other companies.

Technically speaking, Google added two innovations: highly efficient processes for crawling webpages to index their text, and a new way of ranking a page's relevance based on the number and quality of pages that linked to it. In addition, its interface was refreshingly clean: In an internet then pervaded by pages with lists of lists, Google offered a spare alternative, with just a box to type search terms and a "Search" button.

Even more startling was Google's confidence in its abilities. The company offered a second button, whimsically labeled "I'm feeling lucky," which would take users directly to the webpage that was the top result – skipping the step of listing possible search results for a user to choose from. It also sought to be a different kind of technology company, early on adopting a straightforward corporate motto: "Don't be evil." Two decades into Google's history, the power of search is still paramount: Entire businesses and professions are built around crafting internet content that will rise to the top of its search results.

But there are signs of trouble. The company's role in providing misleading information to U.S. voters is under scrutiny. More than 3,100 Google employees signed a public letter protesting the use of their work in warfare technologies – and about a dozen of them resigned in protest. Even more recently, 1,600 Googlers signed a petition to stop their employer from opening a government-restricted search service in China. Additionally, President Donald Trump has questioned whether its rankings for news stories are fair. What might the next 20 years of Google bring?

RAPID GROWTH

Google is used to being under scrutiny. In late July 2004 in Sheffield, England, I recall the buzz the company created at the 27th Annual Association of Computing Machinery Special Interest Group in Information Retrieval Research Conference. There were betting pools about when Google would offer its stock for public purchase, and at what price. The Google employees were easy to spot, only using their laptops while sitting with their backs to a wall, so nobody could see what they were reading or typing.

The company founded by two Stanford graduate students in 1998, which went public on Aug. 19, 2004, at US\$85 a share, still gets the vast majority

of its annual revenue from selling search-relate advertising.

Yet Google has grown too, in part thanks to a policy giving employees the freedom to work one day a week on side projects that catch their fancy. Now reorganized into an umbrella company called Alphabet, the company has expanded into industries as diverse as smartphone operating systems, mapping apps and self-driving vehicles.

DIVERSIFICATION

Many of the company's efforts to diversify build on strengths it has developed providing search, such as cloud computing systems that take advantage of Google engineers' experience managing massive data centers and huge amounts of traffic from – and to – sites all around the world.

The company's massive index of information in many languages is what enabled Google to build a machine-translation system between any of 100 languages. That will help Google remain globally valuable even as Baidu dominates Chinese-language searches.

Google's future depends on continuing to create and leverage indexes on features beyond the words on webpages. Combining the ability to identify a user performing the search with its knowledge of that person's search history and their current location, Google can already provide finely tuned personalized results. A new company effort is already planning to use health devices people wear, implant or carry on their bodies to provide useful nutrition and fitness tips.

nutrition and fitness tips.

Google is no doubt planning to add to its special sauce indexes of social media posts, data from sensors in the environment – including cameras, microphones and all sorts of connected "internet of things" devices.

FUTURE CHALLENGES

Google is already applying its expertise to its line of smart speakers and personal assistants, offering its well-regarded search results through voice recognition and spoken responses. One day typing text onto a screen may seem as quaint as rotary phones.


A next category of features might be called an-

A next category of features might be called anticipatory search, providing information or suggesting action without a user even specifying a query. For instance, some cars already go beyond alerting the driver to low fuel levels, locating and providing directions to nearby gas stations. One day a personal fitness tracker might note that a user's resting heart rate is 15 percent higher this week than the average over the past six months. From there, it might offer up research or doctors' advice about cardiovascular health.

Google may even ramp up its efforts to distinguish people from machines – such as "captcha" challenges and multi-factor authentication processes. From there, it may work to eliminate the increasing efforts from both humans and computers – such as Russian government agents and Twitter bots – to secretly influence search results for malicious purposes.

These features may sound exciting and useful, but they also carry important ethical concerns, about who can access people's personal data, and for what purposes. It will be interesting to see whether the concerns Google employees are currently expressing about political uses of their work will extend to personal privacy, and whether – and how – any objections might influence searches in the future.

Globally, one-third of food produced for human consumption is wasted. Food waste costs Australia A\$20 billion each year and is damaging our planet's resources by contributing to climate change and inefficient land, fertiliser and freshwater use.

And it's estimated if no further action is taken to slow rising obesity rates, it will cost Australia A\$87.7 billion over the next ten years. Preventable chroner diseases are Australia's leading cause of ill health, and conditions such as coronary heart disease, stroke, high blood pressure, some forms of cancer and type 2 diabetes are linked to obesity and unhealthy diets.

But we can tackle these two major issues of obesity and food waste together.

AVOID OVER-CONSUMPTION

OF FOOD

Described as metabolic food waste, the consumption of food in excess of nutritional requirements uses valuable food system resources and manifectories.

The first of the Australian dietary guidelines is:

"To achieve and maintain a healthy weight, be physically active and choose amounts of nutritious food and drivles to mark to up a party and a "

drinks to meet your energy needs."

In 2013, researchers defined three principles for a healthy and sustainable diet. The first was:

"Any food that is consumed above

"Any food that is consumed above a person's energy requirement represents an avoidable environmental burden in the form of greenhouse gas

emissions, use of natural resources and pressure on biodiversity."

REDUCE CONSUMPTION OF

PROCESSED, PACKAGED FOODS
Ultra-processed foods are not only promoting obesity, they pose a great threat to our environment. The damage to our planet not only lies in the manufacture and distribution of these foods but also in their disposal. Food packaging (bottles, containers, wrappers) accounts for almost two-thirds of total packaging waste by volume.

Ultra-processed foods are high in calories, refined sugar, saturated fat and salt, and they're dominating Australia's food supply. These products are formulated and marketed to promote over-consumption, contributing to our obesity epidemic.

Healthy and sustainable dietary recommendations promote the consumption of fewer processed foods, which are energy-dense, highly processed and packaged. This ultimately reduces both the risk of dietary imbalances and the unnecessary use of environmental resources.

Author Michael Pollan put it best when he said, "Don't eat anything your great-grandmother wouldn't recognise as food."

SO WHAT DO WE NEED TO DO?

In response to the financial and environmental burden of food waste, the federal government's National Food Waste Strategy aims to halve food waste in Australia by 2030. A\$133 million has been allocated over the next decade to a research centre which can assist the environment, public health and economic sectors to work together to address both food waste and obesity.

Other countries, including Brazil and the United Kingdom acknowledge the link between health and environmental sustainability prominently in their dietary guidelines.

one of Brazil's five guidelines.

One of Brazil's five guiding principles states that dietary recommendations must take into account the impact of the means of production and distribution on social justice and the environment. The Qatar national dietary guidelines explicitly state "re-

duce leftovers and waste".

Many would be surprised to learn
Australia's dietary guidelines include
tips to minimise food waste:

"store food appropriately, dis-

"store food appropriately, dispose of food waste appropriately (e.g. compost, worm farms), keep food safely and select foods with appropriate polyanization of the selection of

These recommendations are hidden in Appendix G of our guidelines, despite efforts from leading advocates to give them a more prominent position. To follow international precedence, these recommendations should be moved to a prominent location in our guidelines.

At a local government level, councils can encourage responsible practices to minimise food waste by subsidising worm farms and compost bins, arranging kerbside collection of food scraps and enabling better access to soft plastic


recycling programs such as Red Cycle.

Portion and serving sizes should be considered by commercial food settings. Every year Australians eat 2.5 billion meals out and waste 2.2 million tonnes of food via the commercial and industrial sectors. Evidence shows reducing portion sizes in food service settings leads to a reduction in both plate waste and over-consumption.

Given the cost of food waste and obesity to the economy, and the impact on the health of our people and our planet, reducing food waste can address two major problems facing humanity today.

GSI to use remote sensing tech to locate mineral deposits

KOLKATA, SEP 7 (PTI): The Geological Survey of India (GSI) is set to use advanced remote sensing technology developed by NASA to locate mineral deposits in the country, a senior official said Friday.

In a first-of-its-kind initiative, the organization will employ "Advanced will employ "Advanced Visible Infra-Red Imaging Spectrometer-Next Generation (AVIRIS-NG)" to explore mineral ores in 14 different locations Dinesh Gupta, the insti-tute's director general, told reporters here.

The sensor is an "engineering marvel" and has proved effective for mapping surface mineralogy in different parts of the world, he observed. "The AVIRIS-NG sen-

sor was recently mounted onboard ISRO aircraft for acquiring the hyper-spec tral images for mineral blocks in fourteen locations, including Jhagadia and Ambaji in Gujarat, Tundi in Jharkhand and Wajrakarur of Andhra Pradesh," Gupta said.

A Memorandum of Un-

derstanding (MoU) was signed Friday between the GSI and the Nation-al Remote Sensing Centre-Indian Space Research Organisation for the use of the hyper-spectral data to trace surface signatures of mineralization over the next three years, the director general said.

The technology is also used to map mineral de-posits on Moon and Mars. "The GSI has been

using advance technologies for mineral mapping over the years to ensure resource security for our country. The MoU is an ef-fort towards achieving that objective," Gupta added.

Kerala flood takes toll on natural rubber production, price

KOLKATA, SEP 7 (PTI): The Rs 45,000 crore nontyre rubber products market is facing the heat of flooding in Kerala as price of the commodity has shot up by 20 per cent and may soar further impacting the SMEs most,

officials said Friday.

"Kerala contributes about 80 per cent to the country's natural rubber production. The flood will affect the (natural rubber) production by about 15 per cent. Natural rubber production in India is around 6 lakh tonnes, while our consumption is around 10

lakh tonnes," All India Rubber Industries Association president Kamal Kishore Chowdhury said.

The shooting prices of natural rubber will impact profitability owing to rising input costs, said Vikram Makar, senior member of the associa-tion and chairman of India Rubber Expo 2019.

The expo will be held in January next year in Mumbai.

The yield for natural rubber has been stagnant while consumption has been growing by around 10 per cent annually, they said.

They also said do-mestic rubber products like tube and tyre for bicycles and rickshaws, conveyor belt and footwear could face threat of losing market to imported finished products.

"We urge the gov-ernment to rationalise import duty on raw materials in order to make domestic manufacturing competitive. Imported raw materials including natural rubber, attract 20-25 per cent duty while up to 10 per cent duty is imposed on imported finished products, the association said.

Eight arrested for Palamu lynching, sent to jail

(JHARKHAND), SEPT 7 (PTI): Eight people, including a woman were arrested Friday and sent to jail in connection with the lynching of a man in Palamu and injuring two others on the suspicion of being thieves and obstructing police from rescuing them, the police said.

They were produced before a local court which remanded to 14 days in judicial custody, Superintendent of Police, Indrajeet Mahatha said. Stating that more ar-

rests were likely in the incident, he said six per-sons including the woman were arrested in connection with the lynching and the rest two for ob-

structing the police.

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India's decision to decriminalise gay sex sparks debate in

Singapore GURDIP SINGH SINGAPORE, SEP 7 (PTI): The Supreme Court's de cision to decriminalise gay sex in India has sparked a debate in Singapore with the Minister for Law and Home Affairs K Shanmugam saying the society has to decide which direc-tion it wants to go on an is-

sue related to social values. The Supreme Court on Thursday decriminalised part of the Section 377 of the Indian Penal Code that criminalises consensual gay sex, saying it was irrational, indefensible and manifestly arbitrary.

The apex court unanimously held that the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer (LGBTQ) community possess the same constitutional rights as other citizens of the country.

When asked about the ruling by the Indian Supreme Court, Shanmugam said: "(In Singapore) if you look at this issue, it is a deeply split society. The majority are opposed to any change to section 377A, they are opposed to removing it," Shan-mugam, an Indian-origin senior minister was quot-ed as saying by The Straits Times newspaper.

However, he said that a "growing minority" wants to have it repealed. "The Government is in the middle".

The minister said that the subject is related to social values.

"Can you impose view-points on a majority when (the issue is) so closely related to social value sys tems?" asked Shanmugam adding that in his personal opinion care has to be taken against criminalising lifestyles and sexual atti-tudes, and treating people involved as criminals.

"(But) it would be wrong for me to impose my personal views on society or as a policymaker," he said.

"So really, I think society has got to decide which direction it wants to go. And the laws will have to keep pace with changes in society and how society sees these issues," said Shanmugam.

Meanwhile, veter-an Singapore diplomat Tommy Koh called for challenging section 377A following India scrapping the same British colonial-era legislation.

"I would encourage our gay community to bring a class action to challenge the constitutionality of Section 377A," the paper quoted Koh, also Singapore's Ambas-

sasor-at-large, as saying. Koh's comments were in response to a Facebook post by Professor Simon Chesteran, dean of the Faculty of sity of Singapore.

When a Facebook user reminded him that pre-vious legal challenges in 2014 on the constitutionality of the law failed, Koh

replied: "Try again."

In 2014, Singapore's highest court dismissed a constitutional challenge to the law and stated that it was up to parliament to repeal it.

Despite the challeng-es, support for gay rights has been growing in recent years in the city-state

The rights of lesbian gay, bisexual and transgenders have been discussed in recent years in Singapore which many still consider a fundamentally conservative

Japan quake toll rises to 18 as hopes fade for survivors

Japanese rescue workers with bulldozers and sniffer dogs scrabbled through the mud Friday to find survivors from a landslide that buried houses after a powerful quake, as the death toll rose to 18.

Around 22 people are ll unaccounted for in the small northern countryside town of Atsuma, where a cluster of dwellings were wrecked when a hillside collapsed with the force of the 6.6-magnitude quake, causing deep brown scars in the landscape.

"We've heard there are people still stuck under the mud, so we've been working around the clock but it's been difficult to rescue them," a Self-Defense Forces serviceman in Atsuma told public broadcaster NHK.

"We will take mea-sures to find them quick-



ly." An elderly woman in Atsuma told NHK: "My relative is still buried under the mud and has not been found yet, so I couldn't sleep at all last night. There were also several aftershocks so it was a restless night."

Around 1.6 million

households in the sparsely populated northern island of Hokkaido were still without power af-

ter the quake damaged a thermal plant supplying electricity to the region

Industry minister Hiroshige Seko said that number should be re-duced to 550,000 households on Friday.

Pakistan focussed to undermine India's territorial integrity through terrorism: India at UN

UNITED NATIONS, SEP 6 (PTI): Pakistan's focus for decades has been to undermine India's territorial integrity through the "explicit use of terrorism" as a state policy, New Delhi said in a stern response after Islamabad raked up the Kashmir issue at the UN.

Pakistan's Ambassa-dor to the UN Maleeha Lodhi vet again raised the issue of Kashmir while addressing the High Level Forum on the Culture of Peace in the UN General

Assembly Wednesday.
She said "foreign occupation and the denial fundamental rights including the right to self-determination exacerbate the sense of injustice among the occupied and the oppressed".

"Nowhere is this more apparent than in the pain and suffering" of the people in Kashmir and Palestine, she said, citing the recent report on Kashmir issued by former UN High Commissioner for Human Rights Zeid Ra'ad Al Hussein

Minister in India's Per manent Mission to the UN Srinivas Prasad said that a culture of peace is not just an abstract value or principle to be discussed and extolled in conferences, but needs to be actively built into global relationships between and among

nation states.

"It rests on good

spect for the territory and the governing systems and principles of other states," he said. In a stern response,

Prasad said it is ironic that Pakistan, "whose focus over the decades has been the undermining of India's territorial integrity through the explicit use of terrorism as a state policy has chosen to use this platform to yet again claim Indian territ under the guise of a sup-posed concern for 'justice and self-determination' by quoting a report that not a single member state had asked for or has supported".

He asserted that Jammu and Kashmir is and will remain an integral part of India.

formation that has been stolen is name, address, email address, credit card information; that would be credit card number expiration date and the three-letter code in the back of the credit card,"

he told the BBC.

He added that no passport data had been obtained in what he called a "very sophisticated, mali-cious criminal attack," but that British Airways is "100 per cent committed" to npensating custome Consumer ad

website MoneySavingExpert says customers who were swept up in the data breach should first seek advice from their bank then monitor bank and credit card statements closely for signs of possible fraudulent activity

It also warns of pos-sible "phishing scams" in which hackers would try to trick affected consum ers into revealing personal information like pin codes

or banking passwords.
Some angry travelers
complained to Britain's Press Association that they had already noted bogus activity on credit cards that had been used to make British Airways bookings breach was undetected.

British Airways experienced an IT-related crisis in May last year when roughly 75,000 passen-gers were stranded after the airline cancelled more than 700 flights over three days because of system problems.

Pak govt succumbs to hardliners, withdraws minority

ISLAMABAD, SEPT 7 (PTI): Succumbing to pressure from the hardliners, the Pakistan government on Friday withdrew the nomination of noted economist Atif Mian, a member of the minority Ahmadi community, from a newly-constituted economic panel, according to media reports.

The move came three days after the Pakistan Tehreek-i-Insaf (PTI) gov-ernment defended the academic's nomination to the Economic Advisory Council (EAC) led by Prime Minister Imran Khan, saying in categorical terms that it will "not bow to extremists".

Ahmadis are desig-

nated non-Muslims Pakistan's Constitution and their beliefs are considered blasphemous in most mainstream Islamic extremists and their plac-

es of worship vandalised.

Mian, an Massachusetts Institute of Technology-educated Pakistani-American eco-nomics professor at the prestigious University, was recently named member of the 18-member EAC to advise the government on economic policy. He is the only Pakistani to be considered among International Monetary Fund's list of 'Top 25 brightest

groups, hardline Tehreek-i-Labbaik stan (TLP), who objected to his Ahmadi faith.

US to probe Big Tech on 'stifling' free speech

WASHINGTON, SEP 6 (AFP): President Donald Trump's administration warned Wednesday of a possible legal crackdown on big technology companies over competition or political bias, in a bomb-shell announcement that came as social media executives were defending their policies before lawmakers.

The Justice Department statement appeared to escalate a war between the administration and Silicon Valley after a series of attacks by Trump claiming tech firms were biased against conservatives.

According to the state-

Jeff Sessions will convene a meeting of state attorneys general later this month "to discuss a growing concern that these companies may be hurting competition and intentionally stifling the free exchange of ideas on their platforms

The suggestions of legal or regulatory action caught many tech industry observers surprise and came lawmakers were holding hearings on foreign influ-ence campaigns on social media and "transparenmedia and "transparen-cy." Daniel Castro, of the

and Innovation Foundation, said the intent of the statement was not clear, but that it was worrisome. "Social media plat-

forms have the right to determine what types of legal speech they will permit on their platforms," Castro told AFP "The federal govern-ment should not use the

threat of law enforcement to limit companies from exercising this right. In particular, law enforcement should not threaten social media companies with un-founded investigations." Legal analysts have

have little recourse against any political bias even if proven because of constitutional free speech guarantees. While antitrust con-

cerns against Google and Facebook are to be expected, Eric Goldman of the High Tech Law Institute at Santa Clara University said it would be troublesome to use antitrust law as a guise for regulating speech.

"This (statement)
makes me think antitrust

is not the real goal, that the real goal is censor-ship," Goldman said. "This could be broad

to try to subvert the First Amendment."
