NSYS demands **Employment Guarantee** Act for Sikkim

newly-formed organ-Anewly-formed organ-isation, Naya Sikkim Yuva Sangh [NSYS], has demanded the State Gov-ernment prepare an 'Employment Guarantee Act' in the interest of unem-ployed youth of the State. The organisation has alleged that the schemes and programmes of the government for unemployed youth have not been reaching genuine beneficiaries.

Addressing a press conference here today, NSYS president, Hemant Basnet, claimed that no political party in the State has spoken genuinely for the unemployed youth of the State. He stated that political parties here have always been speaking only for government employees but never for the unemployed youth of the State.

He alleged favouritism in the distribution of schemes and programmes. In some instances, same person received government benefits multiple times while been deprived every single time, he said.

Basnet asserted that an 'Employment Guarantee Act' was the only solution to provide justice to unemployed youth of the State. He alleged that the trainers at capacity building programmes of the govern-ment were also not competent enough.

On the same, he stated that these training programmes should provide competent mul-tinational companies to ensure job reservation for youth within and outside the country after the

training.

He also stated that the enhanced taxes on garbage, health and oth-ers have been affecting small businesses being

run by local youth.

Mr Basnet informed that the organisation will hold a state-level meeting within this month and said that NSYS also has nlans to take out a rally ment to draft the 'Employment Guarantee Act'.



Reconciliation, Not Recrimination

See past the false narratives and open uncomfortable conversations

communal divide is the easiest to cleave and the Ahardest to bridge. We live in a country which has still not repaired the damage caused by the Partition Riots of 1947 and remain infiltrated by agent provocateurs at all levels who are resolute in their mission to paint monsters and fan paranoia, keeping people on edge and distrusting. These are people, leaders and groups perennially suspicious of the other and fearful of losing their privileges even as they imagine slights and denials. They live in a world of imagined persecution even as they project nefarious intentions on others and then marshal the scared and the fearful into pliant foot soldiers carrying forward their insular agendas. It is usually easy to see through their conspiracies and call them out, but the world is now becoming increasingly segregated, whispering fears in their respective echo chambers and consuming information filtered to suit their world view. Now, with elections circling around, expect these efforts to become more frenetic.

The diversity of opinions and analysis necessary to "understand" issues will now be increasingly sacrificed at the altar of selective information and pre-packaged explanations. Some years ago, this misdirection was seen in the political and communal uproar over botched Census figures which accorded the nation's Muslims an astronomically high rate of growth. Although it was almost immediately clarified that the Census officials had announced the figures based on wrong calculations, the data, even though wrong, suited the false narratives of the alt-Right in our country and remained in circulation. Unfortunately, technology, which was once expected to deliver as a tool to dispel falsehoods and "fake news", has ended up reinforcing these problems. It is now widely accepted that technology, like power and money, takes what is already inside you and amplifies it. As a result, the resentful and the easily scared become even more so when they play in the world wide web. Of course, the same is true for the liberal and the tolerant as well, but the problem is that each side ends up becoming more convinced of their respective positions because they end up preaching among the converted instead of bridging the divide.

We already live with stories of the horror created by divisions on religious and communal lines and still allow ourselves to be drawn in the same direction This cannot be healthy. And the collective health suffers even more when technology is boosted by power because then begins the mission to homogenise a remarkably diverse people and force independent thought to conform to a narrow ideology. Take for instance the beef ban which continues to obsess some leaders and although not making headlines, has not been exorcised yet and swims under the surface still As per data collected by the National Sample Survey Office, around 80 million people in our country eat beef. This number, believed to be under-reported, suggests that one in every 13 Indian is a beef eater. What needs to also be borne in mind that of the remaining 12, not everyone has a problem with others eating beef even if they don't do so themselves. Most of the beef eaters are Muslims, Scheduled Tribes, OBC and Scheduled Caste. Now, reflect this against the anti-reservation, "anti-appeasement" belligerence and false narratives that have been hammered by a certain group, and the real targets of the Gau-Raksha drama becomes obvious. It thus becomes important for us, as free citizens of a free country, to challenge claims more often and demand better explanations.

There are several issues kept alive in Sikkim as well

by those who want to tap into the inherent parochial nature of the people to whip up fear and suspicion in hopes of creating a situation where people start believing every conspiracy theory that is peddled to them. This provides these agent provocateurs with a weapon that can be deployed at will to earn them the political clout and mileage that they crave. The people, however should know better. History shows that many crises have been the results of lack of simple reconciliation between parties. The parties involved will never come to the discussion table because their very existence in the public mindset is threatened if touchy issues are resolved and there are no enemies left to protect against. We use the word "resolved" not solved. Issues which threaten the social fabric cannot be solved by a third party, they have to be resolved by the parties involved so that there are no lingering hard feelings which would bring us back to square one. The approach has to be one of reconciliation, not recrimination, and for that we need to have difficult and uncomfortable conversations with those who do not think like us or believe in what we do. Simply put, to move ahead, we need to step outside our segregated

FAILURES OF SUIL KYI'S GOVERNMENT

Suu Kyi has been the subject of much criticism since taking power 21/2 years ago, but the most recent and vociferous condemnation has centred on two events: the jailing of two Reuters journalists who exposed a massacre of Rohingya civilians by the military, and her government's failure to respond to international investigations into allegations of ethnic cleansing and genocide.

In September, the two Reuters journalists were convicted of possessing official secrets, despite testi-

mony by a policeman that they had been entrapped.
The journalists had reported on a 2017 massacre of Rohingya Muslims by security forces, which resulted in the eventual conviction of seven soldiers for murder

It is notable that it was Suu Kyi's civilian government that prosecuted the journalists, not the military. Suu Kyi could have ordered the charges dropped, as she did for student protesters during her early days in office. Instead, before the trial was over, she commented that the reporters were guilty of violating the Official Secrets Act, and once even

allegedly referred to them as "traitors".

The second great disappointment has been the government's response to the UN Human Rights Council's report into the violence that drove almost 700,000 Rohingya Muslims to flee to Bangladesh

The report, released in full in September, found

conclusive evidence that security forces had indeed engaged in mass killings and gang rapes of Rohingya, with genocidal intent. It went on to accuse Suu Kyi and her government of contributing to the atrocities through "acts and omissions".

The HRC recommended the UN Security Council refer the Myanmar commander-in-chief and five generals to the International Criminal Court (ICC).

erals to the International Criminal Court (ICC). The UN Human Rights Council also set up a body to prepare evidence for trials.

Rather than pledge to cooperate with the investigation, however, Suu Kyi has consistently defended the military action against the Rohingya and repeatedly pointed to a lack of understanding of the complexities of the situation.

Her only concession to the increasing interna tional condemnation of her government has been this muted statement:

There are, of course, ways in which, with hindsight, we might think that the situation could have been handled better."

LIMITATIONS ON SUU KYI'S POWER

The military remains a very powerful force in Myanmar. It has the power to appoint its own personnel to a quarter of the seats in parliament and oversees the three powerful ministries of Home Affairs, Defence and Border Affairs.

The government has no power to hold the military accountable for actions against the Rohingya. Suu Kyi is therefore in a very weak position.

She has nonetheless gone out of her way to not just defend the military, but praise it. In Singapore last month, she made headlines when she declared that the three generals in her cabinet were "rather sweet".

Suu Kyi has stressed that her government's aim of removing the military from politics would eventually be achieved through negotiation, keeping in mind the need for national reconciliation. However, her dream of constitutional reform depends entirely on military approval.

This would appear to inhibit any ability for her to censure the military. She also has no means to compel the military to cooperate with international investigators.

A PATH TO REDEMPTION

Suu Kyi still has considerable moral authority within Myan-mar, and the military is still widely unpopular. Thus, despite the severe limitations on her power, she does have other options to lead effectively on issues like human rights, the Rohingya and press freedom.

Suu Kyi and her government should start by recom-mitting themselves to a belief in universal human rights. She should also express empathy with the victims of the atrocities in Rakhine state, which

may begin to shift popular opinion against the actions of the military and en-

gender more public sympathy for the Rohingya. Further, Suu Kyi needs to pledge full coopera tion with the ICC investigation into the serious allegations of ethnic cleansing and genocide, and call for a genuinely independent domestic inquiry to pave the way towards true reconciliation.

Suu Kyi may not be able to compel military co-operation with the ICC investigation, or even unfettered access to the country for investigators. But drawing on her moral authority could go a long way to help. She could pave the way for visas and travel approval, for instance, both of which were

denied to investigators by her government.

Finally, the government must develop robust, urgent repatriation plans for the Rohingya – in cooperation with Bangladesh and the UN – that guarantee their security, human rights, a pathway to full citizenship and an end to segregation in Rakhine. They need a plan for inclusive development policies in the state, and to restore both media freedoms and humanitarian access to the region

The opportunity for such moral leadership is quickly evaporating.

Suu Kyi and her government were elected by a landslide in 2015, winning about 80% of seats up for election. Polling released last week showed that only about half those surveyed believe the rights of people have improved in the 2½ years that she has been in power and less than half the population feel there has

been any political or economic improvement.

There have also been increasing complaints about the performance of the government.

With her support eroding both home and abroad, Suu Kyi appears to have a limited window to adequately address the Rohingya crisis and regain her moral authority. Otherwise, Myanmar risks slipping back into isolation and again becoming a pariah state.

Responding Lombok and Donggala-Palu earthquakes: Lessons from public initiatives in Semarang

Situated in the Pacific Ring of Fire, Indonesia is prone to earthquakes, volcanic eruptions, tsuna-mis and floods. But despite being constantly at risk of various catastrophic natu-ral events, Indonesia's disaster management is still poor. This is mainly trig-gered by a lack of coordination between government agencies. In disaster-prone Indonesia, this kind of bureaucratic

mishap takes its toll on victims and prevents them from getting help.

Last month, a lack of coordination

from local governments disrupted the distribution of aids and logistics for the victims of earthquakes in North Lombok, West Nusa Tenggara.

The latest series of earthquakes that rattled Central Sulawesi and killed thousands are a reminder on the importance of effective disaster management.

Our recent research on disaster management in Semarang, Central Java, showed that effective disaster management is possible with the support of the public.

SEMARANG'S SITUATION

Having the longest coastline in the world, Indonesia is prone to tidal flooding, and cities in the northern coast of Java have been severely impacted. A 2007 study by Muhammad Arif Marfai of Gadjah Mada University

shows that tidal flooding in Semarang is more intensive and destructive compared to other cities in the northern coast of Java, such as Pekalongan,

The flood has disturbed various social and economic activities. One sub-district in Semarang has suffered loss of Rp 7 billion annually since 2016.

Following the 2004 tsunami in Aceh, Indonesia has established local agencies to handle natural disasters. In 2008, Central Java provincial administration established disaster management offices at provincial and municipal level.

However, our interviews and fo-

cus group discussions between April and July 2018 with the related agencies in Central Java showed a lack of coordination between these local government bodies.

For example, the local agencies

differ in interpreting tidal flooding as a disaster. This leads to a slow response in handling the aftermath of

tidal floodings

The disagreement also represents tension between the provincial government and the municipality. It seems that the provincial govern-ment, with its budgeting constraints, intends to pass the responsibility to the Semarang municipality. Meanwhile, the city administration demand more supports from the Central Java government.

THE POLITICS OF DISASTER

Our interviews with the Center for Coastal Rehabilitation and Disaster Mitigation Studies (CoREM) at Diponegoro University in Semarang, Indonesian Journalists Association and a local newspaper, Tribun Jateng, showed that local politicians did not really care about tidal flooding.

Most political candidates visited the flooded areas only to sell promises. Once elected, they suffer no political consequences even though they fail to keep their promises in tackling coastal flood. Issues on disaster are

not influential enough to

sway votes. CIVIL SOCIETY SAVES THE DAY

Until the government improves its disaster management, the solution may come from the public.

Our research in Semarang shows how public's initiatives responding to tidal flooding can provide solutions to problems aris-ing from the local governments' lack of coordination

in disaster management.

Local civil society or ganisations have carried

out projects to prevent the floods from getting worse. Non-profit institutions such as Kasemat and Ikamat have voluntarily planted man groves to reduce damage caused by floods and tides on coastal areas.

Meanwhile, young people have joined Lentera Pasir to voluntarily work in educating children living in Tambak Lorok, an area affected by the floods.

Young startup entrepreneurs called Barcode help CoREM in developing a mobile phone application called Rob Calendar (Rob is a Javanese word refers to tidal flooding). The application can warn people living in Semarang coastal area if the disaster is coming. This application can be downloaded for free at Google

Playstore.
These initiatives are possible due to support from local media institutions. Local media in Semarang such as Suara Merdeka and Tribun Jateng

Assam: Man gets death penalty for rape-murder of minor girl

HAILAKANDI (ASSAM), OCT 4 (PTI): A local court here on Thursday awarded death penalty to a man for the rape and murder of a 13-year-old tribal girl.

District and Sessions Judge Debasish Bhattacharjee announced the quantum of punishment days after he convicted Jashimuddin Borbhuyian in the case.

Borbhuvian was held guilty on Monday under sections 376 (rape) and 302 (murder) of the IPC read with section 4 of POCSO Act.

The incident took place on March 14 this

On the fateful day, the victim was alone at her residence in Hailakandi district's Betcherra Pu-rabshree village along the Assam-Mizoram border.

A case was filed by the girl's parents at the Jamira police station, following which the accused was nabbed on March 16 and the murder weapon, a matchete, recovered, police said.

The incident led to public outrage and ral-lies and protest marches were held to demand stringent punishment for

Bangladesh seeks revival of silk industry

gladesh's silk industry is one of the oldest in the world, with farmers in the northwestern border district of Rajshahi producing some of the most sought-after silk yarns.

They specialise in high-quality mulberry silk-widely known as Bengal or Rajshahi silk -- produced by the larvae of moths fed on fresh mulberry leaves and used for luxurious items of clothing.

After around 40 days, the worms start to form cocoons -- by spitting out saliva around their bodies -- which are then placed in bamboo frames before being harvested.

The cocoons are then boiled in hot water, killing the worm inside and separating the ultra-thin threads, which are coiled on huge bobbins and

hung out to dry.

"Each cocoon contains around 500 metres (1,600



feet) of thin thread," said Akhi Akter, a supervisor at the Sopura silk factory, one of the country's key silk

The dried threads are sent to a mill where workers join several threads together and put them onto looms to make

cloth. This material boiled. washed and waxed before being sent to tailors to make mostly sarees, tunics and "dupattas", a kind of shawl-

cum-scarf.
Bangladesh's silk industry was hit hard in the 1990s and

2000s by what officials called government which flooded the market with

cheap Chinese silk imports.

But now the country has initiated a multi-million-dollar plan to revitalise the industry and create hundreds of thousands of new jobs.

prospect if we could nurture it properly," Abdul Hakim, the head of the country's Silk Development Board, told AFP.

He said the number of silk farmers has plummeted to around 2,000 from 10,000 only

a few years ago.
"Our plan is to bring in Chinese experts and train our farmers. It will increase our silk production," he said.

With the booming of the Bangladesh economy -- it grew over 7.5 percent last year -demand for Raishahi silk has increased several fold, Akter An average quality Rajsha-hi silk saree now sells for some

Groundwater of 24 Assam districts arsenic

contaminated

GUWAHATI, OCT 4 (PTI): been contaminated by arsenic, while that in 13 districts affected by fluoride, the state assembly was informed on Thursday. Assam has 33 districts.

Replying to a query by AGP MLA Ramendra Narayan Kalita during Question Hour, Public Health Engineering Min-ister Rihon Daimary said groundwater in 6,881 areas of 24 districts are

contaminated by arsenic. Fluoride has also been found across 930 areas in 13 districts, he added.

The government has established 227 and 40 schemes for arsenic and fluoride free water respectively at various locations, Daimary said.

"The Centre has also approved 122 schemes or arsenic free water in the state. But we have not been able to implement these as we have not got land for them. I request all the MLAs to help us in acquiring land for this purpose," he added.

Lapang appointed chief adviser to Meghalaya govt

SHILLONG, OCT 4 (PTI): DD Lapang, who quit Congress, was Thursday appointed chief adviser to the NPP-led govern-ment in Meghalaya with perks and facilities as enjoyed by top political appointees in the state, an official said.

Govt slaps fresh ban on two insurgent groups of Tripura

New Delhi, Oct 4 (PTI): The govon two insurgent groups in Tripura for their violent and subversive activities, which aim at establishment of an independent nation.

In a notification, the Home Ministry said the central government is of the opinion that the National Liberation Front of Tripura (NLFT) and the All Tripura Tiger Force (ATTF) have been engaging in subversive and violent activities, undermining the authority of the government and spreading terror and violence among people for achieving their objectives.

The ministry said the NLFT and

the ATTF have, as their professed aim, establishment of an independent nation by secession of Tripura from India through armed struggle in alliance with other armed secessionist organisations of Tripura and to incite indigenous people of Tripura for such secession.

"In exercise of powers conferred by sub-section (1) of section 3 of the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act, 1967 (37 of 1967), the central government hereby de-clares that the NLFT along with all its factions, wings and front organ-isations and the ATTF along with all its factions, wings and front organisations as unlawful associa-

tions," the notification said.

The rebel outfits in Tripura, formed in 1990 with the objective of "expulsion of all foreigners who entered the state after 1956", were first banned in 1997. The fresh ban will continue for five more years, an official said.

The home ministry also said both the groups have been maintaining close nexus with other unlawful associations of North East with the aim of mobilising their support, in pursuance of their aims and objectives in recent past, engaging in violent and unlawful activities which are prejudicial to the sovereignty and integrity of

The central government is also of the opinion that their violent and unlawful activities include, killing of civilians and personnel belonging to the police and security forces, extortion of funds from the public including businessmen and traders in Tripura, establishing and maintaining camps in neighbouring countries for the purpose of safe sanctuary, training, procurement of arms and ammu-

"The central government is also of the opinion that the aforesaid activities of the NLFT and the ATTF are detrimental to the sovereignty and integrity of India and that they are unlawful associations," the notification said.

The central government is also of the opinion that if there is no immediate curb and control of the NLFT and the ATTF they will take the opportunity to mobilise cadres for escalating secessionist, subversive, and violent activities, propagate anti-national activities in collusion with forces inimical to India's sovereignty and national integrity, indulge in killings of civilians and targeting of police and security force personnel, procure and induct illegal arms and ammunition from across the international border, extort and collect huge funds from the public for their unlawful activities

"The central government, hav ing regard to above circumstances, is of further opinion that it is nec-essary to declare the NLFT and the ATTF along with all their factions, wings and front organisations as unlawful associations with immediate effect; and accordingly, in exercise of powers conferred by the proviso to sub-section (3) of section 3 of the said Act, the central government hereby directs that this notification shall, subject to any order that may be made under section 4 of the said Act, have effect from the date of its publication in the Official Gazette," the notifi-

cation issued Wednesday said.

The NLFT and ATTF were first banned in 1997 following largescale ethnic riots involving tribals and non-tribals in Khowai subdivision in Tripura, in which both outfits intervened on behalf of the

Economist and philosopher Amartya Sen states in his book, Development as Freedom that a society with a more vibrant democracy is more likely to succeed a catastrophic crisis than one living under a dictatorship. He posits that well informed people can disseminate warnings or important notices.

In the case of disaster management, a well-informed society can launch numerous initiatives to support the government in handling natural disasters.

age sensation Prithvi Shaw announced his arrival in topflight cricket by becoming the youngest Indian to score a Test century on debut, headlining the home team's march to 364 for four against West Indies on day one of the series-opener here. Shaw (134 off 154) and

Cheteshwar Pujara (86 off 130) laid the foundation for a big score with a 206-run partnership after the early loss of K L Rahul (0).

Skipper Virat Kohli (72 not out off 137) and his deputy Ajinkya Rahane (41 off 92) then took the innings forward with a 105-run stand in the final session, putting India in the driver's seat before the latter was caught behind off spinner Roston Chase.
Kohli looked set for an-

other hundred and was batting alongside Rishabh Pant (17 not out off 21) at close of play. Eighty nine overs were bowled on day one with India scoring at 4.08 runs per over.

The West Indies, handed a big setback even before toss with the last-minute withdrawal of captain Jason Hold-



er, looked ordinary at best on the field. Barring pacer Shanon Gabriel (1/66), none of the bowlers troubled the Indian batsmen on a greenish surface which did not seem to do much.

opposition attack was far from threatening but due credit must be given to Shaw, who batted like a seasoned campaigner in his first match for India. His backfoot play off the pacers was a treat to the eyes and when spinners were deployed, he was not afraid to use the long

More than half of his runs came through boundaries, 19 in total. Unfortunately, Shaw fell at the stroke of tea, in what was a soft dismissal as he chipped one straight into the hands of leggie Devendra Bishoo.

He was not facing one of the best attacks but he gave ample evidence of his hrilhundred. Pujara too looked at ease at the other end until he was caught behind off debutant Sherman Lewis, missing out on a 16th Test ton.

In the morning, Shaw, no became the 293rd cricketer to represent India in Tests, showed supreme confidence from ball one, on which he offered a watchful

The Mumbaikar punched the second ball he faced towards the cover boundary for a three, his first runs in international cricket, easing whatever nerves left inside.

BFI President Ajay Singh to contest for position in world boxing body's EC

NEW DELHI, OCT 4 (PTI): Boxing Fedis in fray to be Asia's representative in the AIBA Executive Committee when the under-fire world body goes to polls where controversial interim President Gafur Rakhimov is set for re-election to the top post.

Singh's nomination was approved, along with 10 others from the Asian bloc, by the International Boxing Association's (AIBA) election committee chairman Jost Schmid on Wednesday in

The elections are scheduled to be held on November 3 during the AIBA's annual conference in Moscow starting November 2.

Currently, India does not have representation in the AIBA EC. Veteran technical official Kishan Narsi was the last Indian to find a place in the EC but his tenure ended after the BFI came into existence in 2015.

Singh will face competition from nominees of Korea, Indonesia, Japan, Mongolia, Nepal, Qatar, Singapore, Thailand and the UAE.

Singh, also co-founder of low-cost

"Therefore, the IOC reiterates its clear position that if the governance issues are not properly addressed to the satisfaction of the IOC at the forthcoming AIBA Congress, the existence of boxing on the Olympic programme and even the recognition of AIBA as an International Federation recognised by the IOC are under threat."

SC clears hurdles for first ever deportation of 7 Rohingyas to Myanmar

New Delhi, Oct 4 (PTI): The Supreme Court Thursday cleared last minute hurdles leading to the first ever deportation of seven illegally migrated Rohingyas, staying in Assam, to Myanmar by dismissing the plea which sought to thwart

Just after the court's order, the authorities concerned deported the seven illegal immigrants, who had migrated to India in 2012.

The top court said that these Rohingyas were convicted by the competent court under the Foreigners Act and were held to be as illegal immigrants.

A bench of Chief Justice Ranjan

Gogoi and Justices Sanjay Kishan Kaul and K M Joseph said that even the country of their origin Myanmar has identified them and accepted them as its citizens "Having considered the prayer,

we would not like to interfere with

the decision taken. The petition is dismissed," the bench said.

The bench rejected the plea de by one of the Rohingyas, who had filed an application seeking to restrain the Centre from deporting to Myanmar the seven Rohingyas lodged in a detention centre at Silchar in Assam.

char in Assam.

Those deported were Md Jamal, Mohbul Khan, Jamal Hussain, Md Yonus, Sabir Ahmed, Rahim Uddin and Md Salam -- all in the 26-32 year age bracket.

The top court took the case as first matter after advocate Prashant Bhushan, appearing for

petitioner Jaffarullah, informed the court that it is an urgent issue as the seven Rohingyas were taken to the Indo-Myanmar border from where they will be deported.

During the hearing, Additional Solicitor General Tushar Mehta, appearing for the Centre said that these Rohingyas illegally migrated to India in 2012 and were convicted under the Foreigners Act.

He said that after the conviction they were sent to a detention centre and the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) had contacted the Myanmar embassy for identification of these seven Rohingyas.

"Following the verification, Myanmar government issued a certificate of identity to the seven Rohingyas along with one month visa to facilitate their deportation," he said, adding that after getting the travel documents they were taken to the border.

The bench, asked Mehta that does his submissions made before the court were on an affidavit.

Mehta replied in an affirmative and read out the relevant paragraphs saying that these seven Rohingyas had illegally entered into the territory of India. He said that authorities con-

cerned caught them and put them in detention centre following their

conviction by a competent court.

Mehta said that after the MEA contacted embassy of Myanmar and they confirmed the Myanma-rese citizenship of the illegal immigrants following which one month visa and relevant documents were

The bench then told Bhushan, "First of all they have been held as illegal immigrants by the concerned court and secondly the country of their origin has accept-ed them as its citizens. Now what remains".

S Korea renews call for Japan to remove 'rising sun' flag

SEOUL, OCT 4 (AP): South Korea on Thursday reiterated a demand that retterated a demand that Japan should remove its "rising sun" naval flag from a warship partici-pating in an international fleet review at Jeju island

next week.

Many South Koreans associate the symbol with Japanese military aggression during World War II and have expressed anger over the potential display of the alleged "war-crime flag during the October 10-

South Korean Foreign Minister Kang Kyung-wha on Thursday said Japan should be more considerate about how South Koreans remember its brutal colonial rule of the Korean Pen-insula before the end of the war.

South Korea's navy has asked all 14 countries participating in the fleet review to display only their national flags and the South Korean flag on their vessels, a re quest apparently aimed at preventing the invited Japanese destroyer from flying the "kyokujitsuki."

The Foreign Ministry also conveyed Seoul's po-sition to Tokyo through diplomatic channels.

But Japan has balked at the demand, with De-fence Minister Itsuno-ri Onodera saying last week that the ship's dis-play of the red-and-white flag would be mandatory under Japan's laws.

The flag, portraying a red disc with 16 rays extending outward, has been used as the en-sign of Japan's Maritime Self-Defense Force since

its launching in 1954.
When asked whether
South Korea could raise the issue of Japan's usage of the flag with the Unit ed Nations, Kang said her ministry will review the "possible and appropriate options" before deciding whether to take stronger

Trump shrugs off report revealing fortune in tax dodges, parental gifts

NEW YORK, OCT 4 (AFP): US Pres ident Donald Trump has shrugged off an investigation by a prominent newspaper that concluded he made his fortune with the help of more than USD 400 million from his parents, partly through tax schemes, as a boring, rehashed "hit piece."

Trump has often boasted that he built a multi-billion dollar real estate empire from a USD 1 million loan from his father, Fred, himself a prominent New York builder.

But the New York Times reviewed more than 100,000 documents in-cluding confidential tax returns and financial records that it said showed he actually received at least USD 413 million in today's money, in part through schemes to avoid taxes.

"They used the concept of 'time

value of money' in doing a very old, boring and often told hit piece on me," he tweeted.
"Added up, this means that 97%

of their stories on me are bad. Never recovered from bad election call!".

Forbes magazine, meanwhile, es timated Trump's fortune at USD 3.1 billion -- the same as last year, but a third smaller than it was in 2015.

Forbes ranked Trump's fortune at 259 in the world, down from 248



the year he was elected president.

The Times story said that from the time Trump was a toddler, his father funneled millions of dollars to his four children through a sham

corporation to avoid gift taxes.

The Times said the records also indicate that Trump helped his fa-ther take millions more in improper tax deductions.

And he helped devise a scheme that undervalued his parents' real estate holdings by hundreds of millions of dollars, sharply reducing taxes on those properties when they were transferred to their children, according to the paper.

A lawyer for Trump. Harder, called the account "100 per cent false, and highly defamatory." There was no fraud or tax evasion by anyone. The facts upon which The Times bases its false allegations are extremely inaccurate," he added.

"President Trump had virtually no involvement whatsoever with these matters."

Addressing a press conference White House spokeswoman Sarah Sanders rubbished the article's main claims, but said it was right in one important aspect: Trump's business

"I will say one thing the article

did get right was that it showed that the president's father had a great deal of confidence in him.

"The president brought his father into a lot of deals and they made a lot of money together. His father went on to say that everything he touched turned to gold."

The paper's contention that Trump was earning as much as USD 200,000 a year in today's money by the time he was three years old, and was the equivalent of a millionaire by the age of eight, drew considerable attention

several late night talk show hosts, including comedian Stephen Colbert, the host of "The Late Show" on CBS.

"So, let me get this straight: At one point, Donald Trump was an ex-traordinarily wealthy toddler. And today? He is still that," he said.

Not everything, however, was laughing matter: The Times said Trump's tax-hating father used various methods to funnel his wealth to his children and shield it from the Internal Revenue Service, some of which tax experts said was improper or possibly illegal.

Following the article's publication, the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance announced it was "reviewing the allegations in the NYT article and is vigorously pursuing all appropriate avenues of investigation.'

Speculation about the source of Trump's wealth has mounted since 2015, when he declared his candidacy for the nation's highest office but oke with long-standing tradition by refusing to release his tax returns.

He has been repeatedly rebuked over ethics violations for refusing to divest his assets in the Trump Organization, instead turning over control of the entity to his sons, Donald Ir and Eric.

The president also continues to stay or make use of hotels and golf clubs he owns, leading to conflict of interest allegations and multiple lawsuits.

In July, a federal judge allowed to

proceed a suit accusing Trump of violating the constitution by maintain-ing his interest in a hotel that does business with foreign governments.

It marked the first time a court interpreted anti-corruption clauses in the constitution, known as emoluments clauses, and applied them to a sitting president.

S-400 deal with Russia focus area for sanctions: warns US ahead of Putin's visit to India

WASHINGTON, OCT 4 (PTI): The US has urged its allies to forgo transwith actions warning that the S-400 missile defence system that India intends to buy would be a "focus area for it to implement punitive sanctions against a nation undertaking "sig-nificant" business deals with the Russians.

The US administration is required under a domestic law, Countering America's Adversaries through Sanctions Act or CAATSA to impose sanctions on any country that has significant transactions with Iran, North Korea or Russia.

The Act primarily

deals with sanctions on Russian interests such as its oil and gas industry, defence and security sector, and financial institu-tions, in the backdrop of its military intervention



in Ukraine and its alleged meddling in the 2016 US Presidential elections.

"We urge all of our

allies and partners to forgo transactions with Russia that would trigger sanctions under CAAT-SAI," a State Department Spokesperson said on Wednesday when asked about India's plan to pur-chase multi-billion S-400 missile defense system om Russia. "The A

Administration has indicated that a focus area for the implementa-tion of CAATSA Section 231 is new or qualitative upgrades in capability - including the S-400 air and missile defense system," the spokesperson said.

According to a media report, India and Rus-sia will sign a deal for multi-billion-dollar S-400 surface-to-air missile system this week.

Moscow has been negotiating to sell the S-400 long-range surface-to-air missiles to India for

The signing of the deal for Moscow's most advanced air defence system will be overseen by Russian president Vladimir Putin, who is visiting New Delhi on October 4-5 for the an-nual India-Russia summit, the report said quoting a top Kremlin official said.

"The President is trying to develop a relation

ship and change that, but we've not been success ful, at least to date," US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo told NBC news in an interview.

In September, a senior

administration told reporters that purchase of major military system like multi-billion S-400 missile defense system would be considered as a "significant transaction and thus has a potential" for CAATSA sanctions.The emphasized that the ul-timate target of these sanctions was Russia. The CAATSA sanctions

in this context are not intended to undermine the defence capabilities of any

particular country.
"They are instead aimed at imposing costs upon Russia in response to its malign activities," the official had said.

'Firstexomoon may have been found'

NEW YORK, OCT 4 (PTI): Astrono mers may have discovered the first known moon outside our solar system, orbiting a gas-giant planet 8,000 light-years away. According to the finding pub-

lished in the journal Science Advances, the candidate exomoon -- moons orbiting planets in other star systems -- is unusual because of its large size, comparable to the diameter of Neptune

Such gargantuan moons do not exist in our own solar system, where nearly 200 natural satel-lites have been catalouged, said researchers from the Columbia University in the US.
"This would be the first case of

detecting a moon outside our solar system," said David Kipping, an as-sistant professor of astronomy at

Columbia University.
"If confirmed by follow-up
Hubble observations, the finding could provide vital clues about the development of planetary sys-tems and may cause experts to revisit theories of how moons form around planets," Kipping said.
In looking for exomoons, the

researchers analysed data from 284 Kepler-discovered planets that were in comparatively wide orbits, with periods greater than

30 days, around their host star.

The observations measured the momentary dimming of star-



light as a planet passed in front of its star, called a transit.

The researchers found one intance, in Kepler 1625b, that had intriguing anomalies.

'We saw little deviations and wobbles in the light curve that caught our attention," Kipping

The Kepler results were enough for the team to get 40 hours of time with Hubble Telescope to intensively study the planet, obtaining data four times more precise than that of Kepler.

The researchers monitored the planet before and during its 19-hour-long transit across the face of the star.


After it ended, Hubble detected a second and much smaller decrease in the star's brightness 3.5 hours later, consistent with "a moon trailing the planet like a dog following its owner on a leash," Kipping said.
"Unfortunately, the scheduled

Hubble observations ended before the complete transit of the moon could be measured," Kipping said.

In addition to this dip in light, Hubble provided supporting evidence for the moon hypothesis by measuring that the planet began its transit 1.25 hours earlier than predicted.

This is consistent with the planet and moon orbiting a com-mon centre of gravity (barycentre) that would cause the planet to obble from its predicted location.
"An extraterrestrial civilisa-

tion watching the Earth and Moon transit the Sun would note similar anomalies in the timing of Earth's transit," Kipping said.




TOM CRUISE "HASN'T SEEN DAUGHTER SURI IN YEARS", REPORTS USWEEKLY
