which took them four days to complete. SPYF is demanding improved facilities at the District Hospital at Gyalshing and not satis-fed with accurace and fied with assurances and developments since their started their movement, decided to march to Gangtok and register their pro-test in the capital.

The protestors are insistent that the hospital does not meet the minimum criteria required for a district hospital as per Indian Public Health



Standards norms outlined under the National Health Mission by the Union Ministry of Health Family Welfare which the State authorities are required to deliver.

Following their initial protests, Health Department had assured to meet

the required standards, officials had recently detailed improvements in infrastructure and manpower deploy-ment made since then.

India, China affecting world economy much more today, need to relook at global financial systems: Merkel

Avos, Jan 23 (PTI):
German Chancellor Angela Merkel on Wednesday said countries like India and China have begun affecting the world nomy much more today and that needs to be taken into account for having a relook at the global trade and financial systems.

In a veiled attack at policies being adopted by countries like the US, she said, "There is a new approach in the world that says shouldn't we look after our own, and ensure that our own are looked

"I have great doubts about this approach. We should always remember

that others have their own interests," Merkel said. "Let's call a spade a spade.

Speaking at the World Economic Forum Annual Meeting here, she said there are a number of disturbances around the world and the IMF has painted a rather gloomy picture of the global economy.

If we look at the inter-

national order today, the global architecture is still driven a lot by what was created by people who were in power after the Second World War and they had the insight and their decisions should not be cast aside, Merkel said.

She added that politi-cians have got a lot to face and banking industry has

also lost a lot of credibility after the financial crisis.

"The global financial

system has got damaged quite a bit and we need to do a lot to fix the things," she said, while noting that international bodies such as the World Trade Organization (WTO). IMF and the World Bank have very much contributed to making the world a better place. "Countries like China

and India are affecting the global economy much more today and the global organisations need to take that into account," she said, while highlighting the emergence of organisations like G20 and the Shanghai Cooperation Or ganization (SCO).

KOLKATA, JAN 23 (PTI): Ahead of the crucial Lok Sabha polls, political par-ties in West Bengal seem to be engaged in a battle over the legacy of Subhas Chandra Bose, leaving no

stone unturned to encash on Netaji's public image. Starting from the ruling Trinamool Congress (TMC) to opposition BJP, Congress and CPI(M)-led Left Front, all the political outfits organised day-long programs to celebrate Ne aji's 122nd birthday anni-

versary Wednesday Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee presided over the celebration at Darjeeling Chowrasta in the heart

of the hill town.

She rued that the Centre had not declared the birthday of Netaji Subhas

Chandra Bose as a national holiday befitting his

stature.
"It seems they (the Centre) do not consider him (Netaji) a national leader...Netaji had talked of togetherness and unity of all people of the country," Mamata said, adding a person who takes people from all sections along

was the only "true leader". The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), for the last few years since the Cen-tre's decision to declassify files on Netaji lying with the government in 2016, has claimed that it was the Narendra Modi government which had given due re-spect to the "unsung hero"

of India's freedom struggle.
"The Congress has always tried to highlight the

achievements of Gandhi family as if no one else has any contribution towards the country's freedom struggle or development post independence.

"The Congress has always neglected the legacy of icons like Netaji and Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel. But it is the Modi govern-ment which has given due respect to Netaji," BJP state president Dilip Ghosh said. Listing out various

steps taken by the Modi government to honour the freedom fighter's invaluable contribution towards the country's freedom struggle, Ghosh said neither Congress nor the CPI(M) or TMC had done anything to honour Netaji.

Cabinet decides to strengthen NE autonomous councils

NEW DELHI, JAN 23 al population in these (PTI): Aiming to woo the tribal population in the Northeast ahead of the Lok Sabha polls, the NDA government on Wednesday decided to grant more power and funds to 10 autonomous councils in the region.

The Union Cabinet approved a "landmark" constitutional amendment to increase the powers of the autonomous councils in the Sixth Schedule areas of the Northeast.

The Finance Commission will be mandated to recommend devolution of financial resources to them, an official statement said.

amendment also provides for transfer of additional 30 subjects including departments of Public Works, Forests, Public Health Engineering, Health and Family Welfare, Urban Development and Food and Civil Supply to Karbi Anglong Autonomous Territorial Council and Dima Hasao Autonomous Territorial Council in Assam.

"The cabinet ap-

proves landmark amendment to Article 280 and Sixth Schedule of the Constitution. The most important part of these amendments is that these will significantly improve the fi-nancial resources and powers of the autononous districts councils in Assam, Meghalaya, Mizoram and Tripura. fulfilling longstanding aspirations of the tribNortheastern states," the statement read.

A bill in this regard is expected to be introduced in the upcoming session of Parliament, a home ministry official said

"This will be a game changer, as it will substantially enhance the funds available to enhance these local government institutions for under-taking development taking development works in these tribal areas," the official said.

ine proposed amendments provide for elect amendments provide for elected village municipal councils, ensuring democracy at the grassroots level. The village councils

will be empowered to prepare plans for economic development and social justice including those related to agriculture, land improvement, implementation of land reforms, minor irrigation, water management, animal husbandry, rural elec-trification, small scale industries and social forestry.

At least one-third of the seats will be reserved for women in the village and mu-nicipal councils in the Sixth Schedule areas of Assam, Mizoram and Tripura and at least two of the nominated members in all autonomous councils in the North East Sixth Schedule areas result ing in empowerment of women.

There will be State Election Commissions for holding elections to the autonomous councils, village and municipal councils in the areas of Assam, Mizoram and Tripura.

There will be a provision for anti-defection too

Meghalaya has for the time being kept out of the purview of the provision for elected village and municipal councils and one-third reservations for women.

The amendments will fulfil the commitments made under tripartite Memoran-dum of Settlements signed by Government of India, governments of Assam and Meghalaya, United People's Democratic Solidarity (UPDS), Dima Halam Daogah (DHD) and Achik National Volun-teers' Council (ANVC).

The amendments propose to rename the existing autonomous councils as Karbi An-Autonomous glong Territorial Council (KAATC), Dima Hasao Autonomous Territorial Council (DHATC), Garo Hills Autonomous Territorial Council (GHATC), Khasi Hills Autonomous Territorial Council (KHATC), Jaintia Hills Autonomous Territorial Council (JHATC) and Tripura Tribal Area Autonomous Territorial Council (TTAATC) as the present jurisdiction of these councils extend to more than one districts.

There will also be increase in seats in KAATC (from 30 to 50 seats), DHATC (30 to 40 seats), GHATC (30 to 42), KHATC (30 to 40) and IHATC (30 to 34).

CBI books former Air India **CMD** on corruption charges

booked former Air In-dia chairman-cum-managing director Arvind Jadhav for allegedly vio-lating procedures while making various promotions and appointments, officials said Wednesday.

Along with Jadhav, the CBI has also named then executive director (personnel) L P Nakhwa now retired) and former additional general mangers (operations) Arvind Kathpalia, Amitabh Singh and Rohit Bhasin in its FIR registered under the Indian Penal Code section related to criminal conspiracy and provisions of the Prevention of Corruption Act.

The Central Bureau of Investigation alleged that Jadhav had constituted a panel in 2010 to promote officers to the rank of general manager (operations) in violation of laid

down procedure.

The three-member panel included then chief operating officer Gustav Baldauf, then executive director (operations) A S Soman and former ex-ecutive director (Personnel) L P Nakhwa, it said.

Nakhwa, who was general manager (medical service), was given the rank of executive director (medical ser-vices) after the post was upgraded as a temporary measure till August 31, 2009.

It is alleged that Nakhwa was to be reverted to the post of general manager (medical services) from September 1, 2009 but she continued

NEW DELHI, JAN 23 in her position as exec-(PTI): The CBI has utive director in clear utive director in clear violation of the Civil Aviation Ministry's directive dated March 6, 2009.

The CBI inquiry also und that Jadhav regularised Nakhwa in the post of executive director (medical services) with effect from April 1, 2010 without following the due procedure, the FIR

said The Civil Aviation Ministry had annulled and reversed the irregular appointment of Nakhwa as executive director (medical services), the CBI alleged.

A human resourc-

es sub-committee of the Board of Air India in an order dated September 8, 2010 reverted Nakhwa to the post of general manag-er (medical services) with immediate effect.
"Therefore, the pro-

motion panel so constituted by Arvind Jadhav... for selecting suitable candidates for promotions to the post of GM (operations) should have been re-constituted in the wake of reversion of Nakhwa from executive director (medical services) to the rank of general manager," it said.

This was necessary as according to the promo-tion policy of Air India, members of promotion panel should be preferably two levels above the post for which the selec-tion is to be made, which was not the case with Nakhwa who was of the same for which selection was to be made by the

BJP govt at the Centre saviour of illegal Bangladeshis: AASU

GUWAHATI, JAN 23 (PTI): Leading students union of Assam AASU Wednesday termed the BJP-led central government as the "saviour of illegal Bangladeshis" and appealed to opposition parties to vote against the contentious Citizenship

(Amendment) Bill

in Rajya Sabha.

The All Assam Students' Union (AASU)
and its 30 allied organisations also vowed to stop the free movement of Chief Minister Sarbananda Sonowal and BJP MLAs if they did not end the "con-spiracy" to destroy Assamese identity, culture and language, as protests against the Bill continued to rock

the north eastern state. Peasants organisa-tion Krishak Mukti Sangram Samiti (KMSS) and its 70 allied indigenous groups brought out a torch light prodemanding cession scrapping of the Bill, while the North East Congress Co-ordination Committee (NEC-CC) adopted a resolution demanding it.

"Except BIP, all other parties are opposing the Bill. We appeal to all of them to vote against it in Rajya Sabha. We are looking at them with great hope. This will prove who is with the North East and its people," AASU chief ad-viser Samujjal Kumar Bhattacharva said addressing a public rally here.

The rally called 'Khilonjiyar Bajra Ninad' (indigenous people's war cry) was attended by a large number of students, artistes, intellectuals, educationists, filmmakers and entrepreneurs. Bhattacharva said

the people of the North East will not accept Delhi imposing "any-thing and everything" on it to destroy its indigenous culture and identity and added that public and village meetings would be held in all corners of Assam from Thursday to intensify the protest against the Bill.

"This way we will intensify our agitation and unite the entire state against the sav-iours of illegal Bangladeshis who are sitting at Dispur now.
"This Bill has to be

scrapped. If it is imposed on us, if you (the Centre) try to finish our culture, language and identity, you cannot live in peace," he said.

Hitting out at Sonowal for saying that it was wrong for stu-dents to protest publicly. Bhattacharya said the chief minister was also a student leader during the Assam Agi-

tation.
"Was he wrong that time? If so, then he should first apologise to the people of As-

sam," he said.

The NECCC said even if the BJP passed the Bill in Rajya Sabha by resorting to undemocratic means, the Congress will scrap the law when it forms the gov-ernment at the Centre. AASU General Sec-

retary Lurinjyoti Gogoi said a "continuous political conspiracy" was on to destroy the Assamese identity and the BJP was trying to polarise the society on communal lines.

"Under the undemocratic prime minister and chief minister, a fascist government is trying to forcefully impose the Citizenship (Amendment) Bill on us. People of Assam are committed to block it at any cost. We will never accept the conspiracy to get it passed in Rajya Sabha," he said.
"If the CM and oth-

er BIP MLAs continue to engage in the plot to destroy the Assamese community, AASU and other 30 indigenous groups will stop their free movement in the state," he added.

All Bodo Students Union (ABSU) president Pramod Boro asked Prime Minister Narendra Modi wheth-er he had forgotten the North East and was it a mistake of its people

to vote for the saffron party.

"When the people of

NE do not want it (leg-islation of the Citizen-ship Bill), why are you doing it? You are not a king, but a representative of the people.

"You (PM) said NRC would be completed.
Then why did you not wait till its comple-tion? It would have identified the illegal infiltrators You cannot change everything as per your wish. This is not democracy. People will throw you out from power," he added.

Speaking on the occasion, popular Assamese singer Zubeen Garg, who had demanded that Sonowal return the votes the BIP had got in the 2016 Assembly polls using the election song sung by him, pledged his support to the struggle against the Bill and demanded that it be cancelled.

KMSS adviser Akhil

Gogoi met senior Congress leader Jairam Ramesh and appealed to oppose the Bill in every platform across the country. The opposition

Citizenship The (Amendment) Bill was passed by Lok Sabha on January 8 which seeks to provide Indian citi-zenship to Hindus, Jains, Christians, Sikhs, Bud-dhists and Parsis from Bangladesh, Pakistan and Afghanistan after six years of residence in India even if they do not

possess any document.

Massive protests
broke out across Assam and other parts of North East after Modi announced in Silchar on January 4 that the controversial document would be passed as soon as possible in Parliament.

Ms. Gurung and the officials inspected the female and the male wards, kitchen and the newly upgraded wards of the prison.


During the course of inspection, the Chairperson briefly interacted with under-trial prisoners.

Namchi taught the schol-ars during the workshop.


Apart from the work shop there were different sessions on life skills education, career counseling, etc. While addressing the programme, the chief guest congratulated the participants and thanked the organisers for con-



Back to School

Let's make this year genuinely about students, learning and schools

overnment schools across the State will soon be Government schools across the Students back opening their gates to welcome students back to a new academic session after a shortened winter break. Some schools begin a new year in upgraded avatars, or still catching up with it, and it will be interesting to see how the school in a Gangtok suburb which had reopened last year with a people-funded new facility after having remained shut for some years is faring. It is possible that some primary schools will not reopen this year because the low enrolment numbers just don't justify their continuation and the human resource can be much better deployed elsewhere.

The closure of anything is a difficult moment, especially when it is a place of learning and holds so many memories and significance for so many lives. But some closures are a practical necessity, and it makes sense for the HRDD to focus on the schools which still retain students and staff them with the best of faculty and facilities. In this regard, Sikkim's falling fertility rate and growing awareness among the youth could prove a boon for the coming generations. If Sikkim can manage its resources well, then the young can now be lavished with infrastructure, resources and access much in excess of what their numbers require or the previous generation received. It is simple. There might be fewer students coming into schools, and maybe some schools will even shut down, but the number of books, libraries, laboratories, and most importantly, teachers, will not go down and if anything, will only increase. What this means is that if Sikkim's planners can, well, plan, then this abundance of learning resources can be assigned in ways that every child in a government school gets focused and dedicated attention. This is an opportunity which is pregnant with immense possibilities if it is taken as an opportunity and not rued as a downturn.

Meanwhile, the winter break is over, and thank-

fully the new holiday schedule has kicked in to ensure that academic breaks are not so long that too much time is wasted every new session just repairing the academic connections for students. There is also a new transfer policy in place for the teachers and the promising EQUIP initiative is looking to ex-pand its footprint. All of these make the start of a new academic year exciting and one hopes that the mood sustains and pushes learning to a level here, the politicking of an election cycle notwithstanding. And the excitement is palpable in more obvious terms as well, as for instance, in the preparatory rush expected at stores dealing in uniforms and books and in the number of laundry-fresh uniforms all over the state as students and teachers return to class.
In the coming weeks, Sikkim will also learn wheth-

er the Department responsible for education in the State has done any learning while the students and teachers were away. The good news is that education has received heartening attention over the winter holidays with a slew of teacher training workshops, hopefully some effective teacher transfers and most recently with the Chief Minister announcing that primary education will now receive primary attention.

And what is it that schools, whether primary, secondary or senior secondary, should deliver? If nothing else, then at least a generation that is better lettered, less parochial and more inquisitive. Look at it this way, Sikkim always had among the best per capita distribution of schools and the most enviable teacher-student ratios. It also now arguably has the highest per capita density of universities and children now have more options to explore by way of higher education. Without getting into the "quality" or reliability of the institutions of higher education, imagine a scenario where the schools here fostered a real thirst for knowledge that universities could help quench and expand. For far too long, schools have been about regimented teaching, and that has clearly not worked too well. How about the State started getting more liberal with the learning process? Open more minds, and they will not only take care of themselves, but also carry the state along. Now that there are fewer students in the classrooms and more options in the staff room, wider explorations are possible if the teachers were freed from clerical chores and inspired to work more with the students. With fewer schools to look after, the finances could also be invested more keenly on improving the learning environments at schools and making classrooms more student and learning friendly. One hopes that fewer teachers are borrowed out of classrooms to stand-in for tasks they are neither trained nor appointed for One hopes that education-related problems will receive immediate attention and are not kept pending for the next winter holidays. One hopes that the process begins to make school interesting so that fewer students dropout. One hopes that there are fewer schools this year which are short-staffed and more teachers who motivate learning. Wishful thinking? We wish the same every February and still continue hoping...

It's cold! A physiologist explains how to keep your body feeling warm

Whether waiting for a bus, playing outside or walking the dog – during the colder winter season, everyone is looking for ways to stay warm. Luckily, the process your body uses to break down oods serves as an internal heater.

But when the weather is cold some defensive trategies are also necessary to prevent your body from losing its heat to the surrounding environment. As the temperature difference between your warm body and its frigid surroundings increases, heat is lost more quickly. It becomes more of a challenge to maintain a normal body temperature.

And two people with the same exact body tem

perature in the same exact environment may have very different perceptions. One may feel frozen while the other is completely comfortable.

But beyond the subjective experience of coldness, researchers do know that natural physio-logical responses to cold as well as behavioral adaptations - like bundling up! - can help keep our body around 98.6 degrees Fahrenheit and nake sure you feel warm.

WHAT YOUR BODY DOES

Your blood courses through your body carrying nutrients, oxygen and other biological important substances. And this delivery system also brings heat pro-duced in the muscles to the skin, where it's released. When you enter a cold environment, your body

redistributes blood to the torso, protecting and maintaining the warmth of the vital organs there. At the same time, your body constricts blood flow to the skin. Narrowing the roads to the skin means less heat can make the journey, and so less is lost to the environment. And minimizing how much blood goes to the skin – which is in closest proximity to the cold – means you can hold onto more of your internal heat longer.

Another defensive strategy the body uses to stay warm is cranking up muscle activity. This in turn increases your metabolism and creates more heat. Think of a brisk winter walk when the mer-cury has really plunged – your teeth may chatter and your arms and legs may shake uncontrollably in shivers. This seemingly nonproductive use of the

muscles is actually an effort to increase body temperature by breaking down more nutrients to stoke vour internal furnace

Differences in body size, body fatness and met-abolic activity influence how different individuals experience cold. Smaller people with lower levels of body fat lose more heat to the environment than larger people with more body fat. A bigger individual may have increased muscle mass, which is a producer of heat, or elevated body fatness, which functions as an insulator to reduce heat loss. These ents, which generates additional heat. This additional heat production can help maintain body temperature and the feeling of warmth. Maybe you've noticed this in your own life if you've run in place for a bit or done a quick set of jumping jacks when you're out in the cold.

Unfortunately, physical activity or layers of clothing can tip the balance past what you need to offset heat losses. In that case, you'll experience an increase in body temperature – and your body will start sweating in an effort to cool

down. This is a bad outcome, because the evaporation of sweat will lead to greater rates of heat loss.

Finally, eating increases the body's production of heat. The process of breaking down food is going to slightly increase body temperature. Some times campers will have a snack before bed in an effort to stay

warmer through the night. While the metabolic impact of a small snack may not be huge, the tipping point between heat balance and heat loss is

You may also notice the urge to urinate – physicians call cold diuresis. It's a side effect of constricting blood vessels and the resulting increase in blood pressure as the same amount of blood has a

smaller space available to travel through your body. And if you're the type who tends to feel cold and leave your coat on even inside, you might want to rethink the habit. Your skin will be flush with blood as your body tries to dissipate excess heat inside.

Worst of all, you may start to sweat. Once you head back out the door, you might feel even colder initially than you would have as the cold air saps the heat from your skin and your sweat evaporates. To stay comfortable, your best bet is dressing appro-priately, whether inside or outdoors this winter.

The most common thing people do to stay warm

is wear a coat, hat and gloves. Obviously increasing clothing thickness or piling on the layers helps.
Winter clothes serve not to warm you up, but more

dispersing to the surrounding environment.

Contrary to popular belief, the head is not a greater source of heat loss than any other adequately covered body part. If you were to wear a warm hat and no coat, your torso would contribute the most to heat loss, thanks to how your body re-distributes its blood in cold conditions. If you can keep your torso warm, you'll maintain blood flow to your limbs and can often keep the arms, legs, hands and feet warm.

Secondly, being physically active causes your muscles to contract, breaking down more nutri-

Lessons from 'Spider-Man': How video games could change college science education

ike many people over the holidays, Its many people over the normaly.

Its pent some time – maybe too much – playing one of the most popular and best reviewed video games of 2018: "Spider-Man."

While I thought I'd be taking a break from chemistry research, I found myself web-swinging through virtual research missions all over New York City. I collect-ed samples of polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons in Hell's Kitchen, studied vehicle emissions in Chinatown and determined the chemical composition of atmospheric particulate

"Spider-Man" has many of these eco-friendly re-search missions. But what I found most encouraging is that the game also includes tools that can potentially

matter in Midtown.

teach advanced concepts in chemistry and physics. These tools include adjusting the wavelength and amplitude of radio waves, rewiring circuits to meet target voltages, and what will be examined here, using absorption spectroscopy to identify unknown chemicals.

Beleive it or not, the millions of people playing "Spider-Man" have been unwittingly introduced to principles of quantum mechanics. There is a lot of veiled science to this aspect of the video game. Perhaps more importantly – as a chemistry researcher and university lecturer – I believe the game represents an interesting opportunity to teach science in a fun and engaging way in higher education.

SPECTROSCOPY AND 'SPIDER-MAN'

To better understand the scientific technique that players simulate in "Spider-Man," it helps to have a short primr on what absorption spectroscopy is.

The interaction of light with mat-

ter is the most powerful means scientists have to understand what matter is made of. When matter does not interact with light, we are quite literally left in the dark. This problem is made obvious in the still unknown composition of dark matter that constitutes the vast majority of matter in the universe.

Using light to study ordinary

matter like atoms and molecules is a broad field of science known as spectroscopy. It is an important part of university courses in chemistry and physics. There are currently many different types of spectroscopy. How-ever, the underlying concepts are alels. The catch is that the energy - or wavelength – of light must exactly match the energy difference between two electron arrangements in an atom or molecule for absorption to occur. This set of energies is unique for each chemical and leads to a distinct absorption spectrum much like a finger

World." In this game, the player learns polymer chemistry by crafting materials in the game. Preliminary results showed that students learned real chemistry through the game even though they weren't doing it for grades or getting regular classroom instruction.

In the popular game "Kerbal Space Program," the player builds their own space program by successfully launching rockets into orbit. The game was not originally intended for educational purposes but implements rigorous orbital mechanics in its physics calculations. is so accurate that NASA joined the game's de-velopers to create new missions, and it now has a teaching-ready standalone game that could be used directly in universi-ty physics courses.

A unique approach has been taken with the biochemis-try-based game "FoldIt." This game serves as both an educational as well as a citizen science platform. In the game, players manipulate the structures of real proteins to search for the "best" or lowest en-ergy structures. Results published in the journal Nature showed that the player's search methods can be successfully combined with computer-based algorithms to solve actual scientific problems. The use of video games in high-

er education is a real possibility and could even have a promising future in higher education given the advantages of delivering educational content through a video game format. These advantages include things such as remote access, personalized student progress and immediate feedback. However, creating an engaging video game from scratch is challenging, costly and time-consuming. As indicated by the creators of "PolyCraft World," finding existing games to modify for educational purposes – like the research missions in "Spider-Man" –

could be the best way forward.

most entirely the same as the original version that began in the 17th century when Isaac Newton first dispersed sunlight with a prism.

As famously illustrated on Pink

Floyd's "Dark Side of the Moon" album cover, dispersing the white light of the sun with a prism reveals its continuous color spectrum extending from violet (higher energy, shorter wavelength) to red (lower energy, longer wavelength). However, if this is done carefully, you would find that this continuous spectrum is patterned with intermittent dark bands.

While the origin of these dark bands was not fully understood until the 20th century, scientists now know that they are due to absorption of specific wavelengths of light by atoms and molecules present in the sun. In fact, this kind of spectroscopy led to the discovery of helium in the solar spectrum before it was identified on Earth. This is why it derives its name from the Greek "helios" meaning sun.

So what causes this phenome-non? Atoms and molecules have a set of energy levels that depend on how their electrons are arranged. The absorption of light – which remember is energy - can cause the electrons print from which it can be identified. In "Spider-Man," the player iden-

tifies unknown substances using simplified versions of these spectra.

The goal is to match the pattern in

the spectrum using the fragment inventory provided to give the absorption spectrum of the unknown substance. Unfortunately for chemists everywhere, determining the chemi-cal structure of an unknown molecule is much more complicated. Still, there is a significant amount

of science conveyed in the video game version of what a spectrosco-pist would call assigning this spectrum. Only slight modifications and additional explanation could make these parts of the game an excel-lent way to teach these concepts to undergraduate science students. But are video games ever used in higher education?

VIDEO GAMES IN HIGHER EDUCATION

Video games for teaching more ele-mentary skills like arithmetic or spelling are common. Similarly, colleges and universities are increasingly infusing video games into their coursework.

CWG gold medallist weightlifter Sanjita's provisional suspension revoked

PHILEM DIPAK SINGH New Delhi, Jan 23 (PTI): The International Weightlifting Feder-ation has revoked the provisional suspension on weightlifter K San-jita Chanu for a failed dope test, a major re-prieve for the two-time Commonwealth Games gold-medallist who has claimed innocence.

In a case that has

dragged on for almost a year and has been marred by an "administrative" goof-up in San-jita's sample number, the IWF informed that a final decision on the matter is expected in the coming days.

"On the basis of the information at its disposal, the IWF has decided that the provisional sus-pension of the athlete (Khumukcham Sanjita) shall be lifted as of to day (22 January 2019)," IWF's legal counsel Eva Nyirfa said in an e-mail sent to the national fed-

eration and Sanjita. "The IWF Hearing Panel will render its decision on the athlete's case in due course," it added. The 25-year-old Sanjita,

who had won a gold in the en's 53kg category at the 2018 Commonwealth Games in Gold Coast, had steroid testosterone. Her urine sample was taken prior to the World Championships in United States in November 2017, and she was put under provisional suspension from May 15 last year. A final decision of the IWF panel is yet to come but Saniita said her assertion of innocence has been vindicated.

"I have got a mail from the international federation and our national federation has also called me up this morn-ing informing about the lifting of the (provisional) suspension. I am relieved and happy. I am innocent and I have never taken any banned substance in my career. I am vindicated now." she place in Manipur. "At the same time, I experienced mental trauma during these past 8-9 months (since May 15 last year) due to the mistake of the international federation. I hope nothing like this happen to any athlete in future. An athlete's reputation is very precious," she added. Sanjita said the Indian Weightlifting Federation had asked her to join the national camp immediately if she wants

"The federation of-ficial told me today to write if I want to join national camp. I am doing that. I missed the Asian Games and World Championships in 2018. I want to compete in the World Championships this year and qualify for 2020 Olympics. For any athlete, Olympics is the ultimate," she said. The international body

Pressure on Brazil, Argentina as Copa America draw looms

SAO PAULO, JAN 23 (AFP): They may boast seven World Cup victories between them and two of the game's biggest stars in Lionel Messi and Neymar, but Argentina and hosts Brazil will be under immense pressure when the America begins in June. the Copa

First they have a nerve-wracking wait ahead of Thursday's draw in Rio de Iaeiro to see who they will face in the group stages.

Argentina haven't lifted a major tournament trophy in 26 years and while it has only been a dozen years for hosts Brazil, the trauma of their 2014 World Cup humiliation on home soil is still fresh in their collective memory.
The 7-1 thrashing inflicted

by Germany in the semi-finals left a wound that only trophies could heal.

The two South American giants can ill afford a false step in such a competitive tournament

Brazil failed to even make it out of the group stages last time around, their only victory coming against Haiti, while a 1-0 defeat to Peru sent them



packing. They haven't gone beyond the quarter-finals since last lifting the trophy in 2007.

As for Argentina, they have lost four of the last five finals, three of those in penalty shoot-outs, meaning Bar-celona great Messi has never major international honor with his country.

Messi's participation is far from certain, though, as he

hasn't played for his country since Argentina were dumped out of the World Cup at the last 16 stage in Russia by eventual winners France.

They have played six friendlies since then, but Messi has stayed in Barcelona each time, allegedly to rest.

"I'm convinced that if he's selected, he'll play. It depends on the coach," Argentinian

federation president Claudio Tapia told TyCSports TV channel. Messi has retired from international duties before, following Argentina's penalty shoot-out loss to Chile in the Centenary final in the United States in 2016, only to reverse his decision a few months later to help guide a struggling Argentina to Russia.Their Argentina to Russia.Their World Cup campaign was a

When she reached there, she found the house locked, the sources said. Her husband and other relatives had shifted to a rented building, the police said, adding Kanakadurga then took refugee at the One Stop Centre here.

Kanakdurga, an em-

ployee of the Civil Sup-plies Department, had scripted history along with Bindu, a college with Bindu, a college lecturer and CPI(M) ML activist, on January 2 by offering prayers at the Ayyappa shrine, where traditionally women in the 10-50 age group were barred from entering.

The Supreme Court had in a historic verdict last year lifted the centuries old ban and allowed women of all age groups to offer prayers at the temple. The two were the first women of menstrual age to offer prayers at the Lord Ayyappa shrine after the SC verdict. Perinthalamanna Circle Inspector T S Binu said she was being provided round-the-clock security as directed by the apex court.

Sharif's condition very serious, says his doctor



M ZULQERNAIN LAHORE, JAN 23 (PTI): Pakistan's jailed former prime minister Nawaz Sharif's condition is "verv serious" after heart complications and he should be shifted to hospital without any delay, his doctor said on

Wednesday. Sharif, 69, who is serving a seven-year imprisonment in a Lahore jail, was rushed to a hos-pital from Kot Lakhpat jail on Tuesday after he complained of heart re-

lated complications.

He was later discharged from hospital and taken back to jail following medical tests. Doctors of the Punjab Institute of Cardiology Lahore, where his medical tests were con-ducted, said Sharif's condition was "not very serious", but suggested "aggressive medication" and regular medical follow-ups to avoid cardiac complications.

However. Sharif's cardiologist Adnan Khan termed his condition as 'very serious and said he should be shifted to hospital without any delay.

"Nawaz Sharif's treatment at jail is not possi-ble because of his heart complications. He should be shifted to hospital forthwith so that he is properly taken care of," Khan said.

"Even a special medical board that earlier examined Mr Sharif had suggested shifting him to hospital for treatment but the government did not heed to the suggestion," he said.

Sharif's stress thalium test -- a nuclear imaging test that shows how well blood flows into one's heart -- suggests "post stress LV pump/ contraction 56 per cent which is almost nor-mal", according to his medical reports.

The report says that the left ventricle, the main pumping cham-ber of the heart, is damaged on the lower left wall, it said.

Expressing concern about Sharif's health, his daughter Maryam tweet-ed: "My only source of information on what is happening to my father

is the media only."
Sharif's brother
Shahbaz Sharif asked the government to pro-vide best healthcare facilities to the three-time

prime minister.

A special medical board that examined Sharif in jail last week observed "he is not completely well" as more investigations (tests) are required before suggesting treatment for him.

According to the report of the special medical board, "Patient Mu-hammad Nawaz Sharif, 69, examined by the special medical board is known case of diabetes Mellitus and hypertension for the last 10 years He is also known case of Ischemic heart disease since 2001."

underwent Sharif Coronary Angioplasty (PCI) twice in 2001 and 2017. He also had open heart surgery twice in 2011 and 2016 (no medical record/documents are available for these above said procedures at the time of examination), it says.

Pak court temporarily halts Mumbai attack case hearing

ISLAMABAD, JAN 23 (PTI): A Pakistani has temporarily halted the hearing of the 2008 Mumbai attack case to let the prosecutor produce more witnesses. Ten Lashkar-e-Tai-

ba (LeT) terrorists had sailed into Mumbai from Karachi and carried out coordinated attacks, killing 166 people and injuring over 300 in November 2008.

The trial, underway in an anti-terrorism court in Pakistan against seven activists, has made little headway in more than 10 years as the Pakistani establishment has been claiming lack of enough evidence against them.

Putin and Erdogan to hold Syria talks

Moscow, Jan 23 (AFP): Russian President Vladimir Putin and his Turkish counterpart Recep Tayyip Erdogan will hold Syria talks in Moscow on Wednesday, with Turkey saying they will focus on Ankara's so-called "security zone" in northern Syria.

The two leaders are on opposite sides of the conflict: Russia provides critical support to the Syrian government, while Turkey has backed rebel groups fighting President Bashar al-Assad's forces.

Despite this, they have worked closely to find a political solution to

the seven-year conflict. Russia and Turkey have agreed to coordinate ground opera-tions in Syria following US President Donald Trump's shock announcement on pulling 2,000 American troops out of Syria last month.

speech on Mon-Erdogan said he would discuss with Putin the creation of a Turk-ish-controlled "security zone" in northern Syria, suggested by Trump.

The US-allied Kurds, who control much of northern Syria, have re-

supporter of Assad, is likely to oppose the plan, with Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov last week saying Damascus must take control of the country's north.

Nearly eight years into Syria's deadly con-

flict, the US pullout has led to another key step in Assad's Russian-backed drive to reassert control over the country.

Kurdish forces who were left exposed by Trump's pledge to with-draw US troops have asked the Syrian regime for help to face a threat-

The Kremlin hailed the entry by Syrian forc-es into the key northern city of Manbij for the first time in six years after Kurds opened the gates.

Moscow plans to organise a three-way summit with Turkey and Iran at the beginning of this year

as part of the Astana peace process, launched by the three countries in 2017.

"So far, no date has been set but af-


ter negotiations with Erdogan, we will begin preparations for the trilateral summit," Putin's foreign policy aide Yuri Ushakov told reporters last week.

The last meeting beand Iran's Hassan Rouhani took place in Iran in September last year with the fate of the rebel-held Idlib province dominating the agenda. Ties between Russia

and Turkey plunged to their lowest level in years in November 2015 when Turkish forces shot down a Russian warplane over Syria.

But after a reconciliation deal in 2016, relations have recovered with remarkable speed with Putin and Erdogan cooperating closely over Syria, Turkey buying Russian-made air de-fence systems and Russia building Turkey's first nuclear power plant.

Karan Johar apologises for Pandya-Rahul 'Koffee with Karan' episode

MUMBAI, JAN 23 (PTI): Breaking his silence on the controversy following comments by cricketers Hardik Pandya and K L Rahul on his chat show, filmmaker Karan Johar says he apologises for what happened and admits the conversation "may have crossed boundaries".

The filmmaker also said he feels very responsible for the remarks made on "Koffee with Karan" and has spent sleepless nights wondering how to "undo this damage".

Pandya and Rahul were widely slammed for their remarks labelled misogynistic and sexist and have been provisionally suspended by the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI), pending an inquiry.

'I'm not justifying the conversation that happened on the episode. I'm saying that per-haps things were said that may have crossed boundaries and I apologise because it was my platform where it happened," Johar told ET Now in an interview.

The filmmaker, who is in Davos for the World Economic Forum, said the boys have "paid the price" for what happened on the episode.

"I haven't spoken about it really... I feel very responsible because it was my show and

my platform. I invited them as guests and so the ramifications and repercussions of the

show are my responsibility.

"I have had so many sleepless nights, just wondering about how I can undo this damage. Who is going to listen to me? It has now gone into a zone that is beyond my control,' Iohar told the channel in the interview posted

on Twitter on Wednesday.

Calling himself a feminist who has been brought up by strong women, Johar said he asks the same questions to everyone.

"I don't defend myself when I say this, the questions I asked the two boys are the ques-tions I ask everyone, including women. When Deepika (Padukone) and Alia (Bhatt) were on

the show, I asked them those questions.

"I have no control over the answers that come my way. And post the show, I have a control room of about 16-17 girls. The show 'Koffee with Karan' is run entirely by women. I'm the only man there. None of them came up (with issues)." According to Johar, some of them thought Pandya was wild, "crazy or cracked" and some said he was funny too

"No one came and told me that 'Karan, this is was inappropriate," he added.
