GANGTOK, 05 JAN Youth wing of Hamro Sikkim Party [HSP] will be leaving for New Delhi on Syndow to Delhi on Sunday to conduct a dharna at Jantar Mantar on 07 Jan. In this regard, a function was held at the party office at Deorali today which was chaired by senior vice president, RB Subba along with senior func-tionaries of HSP.

The dharna is being held to raise the issue of corruption in the state along with placing demands for Limboo Tamang Assembly seat reservation, restoration of lost Nepali seats, tribal status for 11 left-out communities, etc, before the Centre. The team is being led by vice president, Bhaichung Bhutia. In days to come we

also plan to stage hunger strike if the demands are not met, said Mr Bhutia. The team also plans to visit the Prime Minister and Home Minister and submit a written memorandum on all the issues pertaining to Sikkim, he added.

A team of 15-20 youths from across the State will participate in

the dharna.

Mr Subba said that prior to scheduling of the dharna in Delhi, the par-ty had met the Governor of the State and submitted memorandum on behalf of the party.

"In the memorandum submitted we had high-lighted the corrupt practices prevailing in the state informing the Governor on the issues related to political and social rights of the Sikkimese, where-in no solution so far has been met," he said.

Even after 25 years of SDF rule in the state, long pending issues like political rights and other social issues pertaining to the state have not been solved, he added.

He also said that HSP

has been talking about these issues since the in-ception of the party but now the party also plans to attract the attention of the central government.

Vice president HSP, Tara Shrestha mentioned that the dharna has been timed according to the Parliament Session which is being held till 09 Ian.

Mallya becomes first tycoon to be declared Fugitive Economic Offender

Mumbai, Jan 5 (PTI): Weeks after a UK court ordered his extradition, former liquor baron Vijay Mallya, accused of defaulting on loans of over Rs 9,000 crore, received another blow as a Mum-bai court declared him a "Fugitive Economic Offender" (FEO).

Mallya on Saturday became the first businessman to be declared an FEO under the Fugitive Economic Offenders Act which came into existence in August 2018. The Enforcement Directorate had moved the special court for FEOA for this purpose. The agency had requested the court that Mallya, currently in the United Kingdom, be declared a fugitive and his properties be confiscated and brought under the control of the Union government as provided under the act. of ED's plea confiscation of properties will start from February 5. Incidentally, the same court is also hearing ED's plea to declare diamond merchants Nirav Modi and Mehul Choksi FEOs in the Punjab National Bank fraud case. Mallya's law-

yers requested the court to stay the order for four weeks so that they could obtain its full copy and move the high court. The judge declined, say ing a court under the FEO Act can not stay its own order.

The ED had argued that it made all possible efforts to bring Mallya back to India, but failed. The extradition process in the UK court was a proof enough that

he was not willing to return, ED counsel D N Singh had contended. Even after the London court

upheld Indian authorities' plea for his extradition, Mallya decided to appeal against the order before the higher court there and refused to return, so he should be declared an FEO, Singh had argued. Mallya's lawyers contended that as he had surrendered before a magis-

trate's court in London (during the hearing on his extradition case) and obtained bail, he could not be called a fugitive. They had also questioned ED's claim that he left India under suspicious circumstances, arguing that he had left to attend a meeting of World Motor Sports as the director of an F1 team (Force India).

Mallya left India on March 2, 2016. A court in London on December 10, 2018 ordered his extradition.

Facing cases registered by the ED as well as the Central Bureau of Investigation, he is wanted for alleged fraud and money laundering amounting to an estimated Rs 9,000 crore.

Under the FEO Act, a person can be declared a Fugitive Economic Offender if a warrant has been issued against him for an offence involving an amount of Rs 100 crore or more and he has left the country and refuses to return.

BJP accuses CM of having failed in duties of alliance partner

IndiGo plane returns after mid-air engine failure, govt to review incident

Mumbai, Jan 5 (PTI): An IndiGo Airbus A320neo plane flying to Kolkata from Chennai suffered a mid-air engine failure with a "loud bang" and was forced to return mid-way Thursday, prompting the civil aviation

ministry to order a review.

The January 3 incident, which came to light on Saturday, is the latest in a series of cases involving a Pratt & Whitney engine. The plane returned mid-way to Chennai and has been grounded there since then due to damaged engine blades, sources said. An IndiGo spokesperson said in a statement that its crew took note of a "technical caution" and decided to return the flight to Chennai, even as sources said the engine of the aircraft stalled mid-air with a "loud bang".

When contacted, Civil Aviation Secretary R N Choubey told PTI, "Ministry has taken serious note (of the incident) and we will review it on Tuesday."

He was asked whether the ministry will direct the aircraft maker Airbus and US-based engine manufacturer Pratt & Whitney to stop deliveries unless all issues are fixed.

"One of the P&W engines of IndiGo neo aircraft operating on Chennai-Kolkata route on January 3 stalled mid-air followed by a loud bang and sparks from it and smoke, leading to heavy vibration," a source said

The incident forced the A320neo aircraft to return to Chennai under emergen cy conditions, he added The number of people on board the flight could not

be ascertained. "This was for the first time that that an A320neo faced multiple problems · smoke, heavy vibration oud bang and engine stalled -- in one single flight," the source added.

IndiGo, which is facing such issues in the A320neo planes powered by P&W engines since their induction in the fleet in 2016 and has received compensation from both Airbus and the engine maker for each grounding, said the aircraft returned to Chennai due to "technical caution" noted by the crew.

"An IndiGo flight 6E 923 (Neo) operating Chennai-Kolkata route on January 3 returned to Chennai after take-off due to a technical caution noted by the crew.

"The crew followed the normal operating procedures and asked for a priority landing. There was no engine shutdown and no emergency landing was de clared as per the report," IndiGo said in the statement.

Meanwhile, the government's apex aircraft in vestigation body AAIB has rushed a team to Chennai to assess the incident and take a call on the probe.

"As per settled practice we have sent a team. We are awaiting details," a senior official of the Aircraft Accident Investigation Bureau (AAIB) told PTI.



Watchdog group urges probe of Ivanka Trump tax break role WASHINGTON, JAN 5 (AP): An ethics watchdog group asked the Justice Department on Friday to investigate whether President Donald Trump's daughter Ivanka violated federal conflict-of-interest law by promoting an Oppor-tunity Zone tax break program from which she

could potentially benefit. The complaint from the Citizens for Responsibility and Ethics in Washington follows an Associated Press investigation last month

The AP found that Trump and her husband Jared Kushner, both White House advisers, could benefit from the Opportunity Zones program they pushed that offers tax breaks to developers who invest in downtrodden communities.

AP reported Kushner owns a USD 25 million to USD 50 million non-management stake in Cadre, real estate investment rm which has announced plans to invest in several cities under the Opportunity Zones program. Separately, the couple has interests in at least 13 properties held by Kushner's family firm that may qualify for the tax breaks because they are in Opportunity Zones in New Jersey, New York and Maryland.

The CREW complaint says that, under federal law, Kushner's financial interests are considered of value to Ivanka Trump as well. In a 12-page letter sent to Deputy Attor-ney General Rod Rosen-stein, CREW Executive Director Noah Bookbind-er said that as a result of the 2017 decision by Ivanka Trump and Kush ner to "retain a sprawl ing portfolio of investments after entering government," the couple assumed responsibility for exercising due diligence to avoid partici pating in any particular matter that directly and predictably affects the interests of the compa-nies they retained."

Ivanka Trump, Book binder wrote, "may have failed to live up to this re sponsibility."

Bookhinder told the AP that CREW's complaint focused on Ivanka Trump because "there is so much public information about her role in the Opportunity Zones program

The AP report noted that Ivanka Trump pub-licly promoted the proand coordinated with its main congres sional sponsor, Repub lican Sen Tim Scott of South Carolina. President

lauded his daughter last February for "pushing this very hard."

Hours after the AP story ran last month, Ivanka Trump tweeted her public support for Opportunity Zones and appeared at a White House event promoting

the program.

AP reported that
Kushner also backed the program, but had more limited involvement behind the scenes.

The Mountains Are Sweating

And more Sikkimese need to take a keener interest in issues like climate change

The current spate of biting columning the too well to talk of global warming, but that is also well to talk of global warming, but that is also well to talk of global warming. he current spate of biting cold might not lend itself the kind of only-on-occasion nature of interest that we need to get over when it comes to addressing issues of climate change and the health of Sikkim's ice-caps. It is bad enough that very few Sikkimese actually get to visit the glacial areas of the State, and to make awareness about warming limited to visuals of shrinking arctic ice creates a distancing which make genuine interest difficult to establish.

Not just experts, even lay people and mass media are now noticing the change in weather patterns all over the world. The mountains are getting warmer, the plains colder and weather hitting extremes at other times, think the inundation of Kerala recently which Met scientists have ascribed to climate change. All these are symptomatic of global warming, a fact that cannot be denied anymore. Even as the debate continues over the developed world's attempts at browbeating the third world nations to sacrifice more to manage the planet's environment, regions close to ice need to get more concerned and start undertaking studies and working solutions on their own. Ice caps - the polar regions and the glacier fields - feel the impact of global warming first. North and west Sikkim are crisscrossed by many glaciers which are the frozen fountains of life for the State. The cultivation, the rivers and their hydel potential are all sourced from these glaciers, and now that hydro-power is still being pursued as the economic deliverer for the State, it becomes imperative that the source of this potential is better studied and understood. Himalayan glaciers are reported to be receeding at the rate of 10 to 15 metres on an average every year. The largest glacier in the Eastern Himalaya – the 10 mile long Zemu Glacier in north Sikkim is believed by many to be receeding the fastest. It also sits in the vicinity of many minor glaciers, several of which have visibly retreated from the valleys and now hang higher on the mountains, leaving behind a litter of dangerous moraines. Zemu also feeds the Teesta on which many hydel projects have been planned. When glaciers recede, and some in Sikkim are also reportedly expanding, there is more water in the rivers, that is simple enough to understand, but someone has to study the glaciers better to be able to calculate how long the source will keep feeding the rivers. Some recent studies have been undertaken, and a closer watch is now being kept on some glacial lakes, but very little of these findings have made way into the public domain with any coherent analysis.

Given the fact that 70 percent of the world's fresh water is frozen in glaciers, it is surprising that not more is being done to save them and contain their recession. This is probably because the scientists and decision makers prefer the plains and share their data only among their clique and have seldom made their findings simple enough for the stakeholders to understand. But the problem is already too clear and present to waste time pointing fingers. Sikkim might be too small to make a difference to the handling of Himalayan glaciers, but it can at least take care of its own "water towers." Maybe with its initiative, it could also trigger a more genuine concern elsewhere.

India: Government continues to suppress citizens' right to information ahead of election

Back in 2014, when the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) ascended to power in India, it did so on the promise of running an open government accountable to its citizens that would eliminate corruption. But nearly five years later, and with an election due between March and May, the track record of Narendra Modi's government on upholding citizens' right to information has raised doubts about its commitment to accountability.

The BJP's predecessors, the United Progressive Alliance (UPA) government, led by the Indi-an National Congress party,

were instrumental in passing the Right to Information (RTI) law in 2005. Its aim was to undo the culture of bureaucratic secrecy en-couraged by the colonial Official Secrets Act of 1923.

For the first time, the law compelled government departments to provide official information in the form of records or documents to citizens when specific requests were made. This helped to expose corruption in government as state authorities could no longer hide information on the way they made decisions, or spent taxpayer's money. The exposés contributed to the UPA government's political downfall at the 2014 elections.

Yet, ever since the RTI law was passed, successive governments have sought to suppress it one way or another. In recent years, public authorities affiliated to the central governnent have denied information to citizens under the aw on matters of vital public interest.

REOUESTS BLOCKED

Take, for instance, the case of demonetisation, in which the government pulled high-value currency notes out of circulation in 2016. It said the move was aimed at eradicating fake currency notes cir-culating in the economy, but demonetisation led to a severe cash crunch that had spiralling effects on jobs and economic growth.

When citizens filed RTI appeals with the Re-

serve Bank of India (RBI) about demonetisation, they were refused information on a range of queries from who had been consulted, to the reasons behind the move and the cost incurred by scrap ping the banned notes. The central bank took refuge under the law's exemption clause, which states that exemptions can be sought for information if disclosure would: "prejudicially affect the sover-eignty and integrity of India, the security, strategic, scientific or economic interests of the state, relation with foreign state or lead to incitement of an offence". While it's up to the public information ofthese decisions can be appealed to the Central Information Commission (CIC), which settles information disputes.

But such denial of information amounts to a failure to come clean on a controversial decision that affected the lives of ordinary citizens in a big way. It's not even clear whether demonetisation's stated motive of removing fake notes was actually achieved.

Another important ongoing case of denial of

information regards a list of wilful loan defaulters held by the RBI. This came at a time when the Indian government has been struggling to extradite businessmen who fled the country after defaulting

tails accessible under the RTI. The legal case drags on, with the next hearing due in early 2019. Requests for the release of details of the prime minister's MA degree from Gujarat University were also denied under the RTI law

In November 2016, the Supreme Court up-held citizens' right to know about the educational background of people contesting polls and held that the election of those lying in their affidavits could be set aside.

DILUTING THE LAW

Besides denying information, the BJP government has also proposed amendments to the RTI law, in which the central government seeks to

control the salaries and tenures of the information commissioners. The effect would be to erode the independence of the information sions at the national level and in India's states. It is the information commis-sions – which are vested with court-like powers to adjudicate information appeals denied by government departments that actually give the law its teeth.

Since coming to office in 2014, the BJP govern-ment has delayed making crucial appointments to the CIC as vacancies have arisen and, as the end of 2018 approached. eight of the 11 posts for information

sioner were vacant. After activists went to the Supreme Court to demand speedy appointments to the commission, in late December the government announced the appointment of a new chief information commissioner and four new information commissioners. While RTI activists hailed this as a small victory following months of protests, the gov-ernment has refused to divulge information on the process adopted for vetting applicants for the job.

At present more than 26,000 information appeals lie pending before the commission, delaying availability of information to thousands of citizens using the RTI. The government has also dragged in-formation commissioners to court. This is a clear case of intimidation of commissioners aimed at discouraging them from ordering disclosures of in-formation that the government finds inconvenient.

Back in 2005, when India passed the RTI law, it was heralded as a revolutionary move to empower the people to hold those in power to account. But that task has been easier said than done. As India awaits yet another electoral battle later in 2019, the incumbent government has clearly failed to deliver on its promise of accountability.

on billions of dollars of bank loans. After the CIC ordered the RBI to release information on the loan defaulters, the central bank went to court in mid December to get a stay order, denying the release.
India's Supreme Court had already pulled up the

RBI back in 2015 over its in-house "disclosure policy", which violated provisions under the RTI law. The court ruled in favour of making disclosures, but the central bank has continued to deny information requests on matters of vital public interest. In 2017, the Indian Air Force also denied an RTI

request and refused to release crucial information related to the pricing of a deal for 36 Rafale aircrafts fi-nalised between India and France, that has currently snowballed into a major corruption scandal.

Another controversy pertains to the prime minister's educational qualifications. In 2015, when Neeraj Sharma, an IT professional from Delhi, sought to verify Modi's 1968 BA degree results from Delhi University – mentioned in his election affidavit - the information was expressly denied. When the CIC directed the university to disclose the information, the university went to the high

court demanding a stay on the disclosure order.

The university publicly confirmed Modi's degree was authentic, but still refuses to make the de-

Will China's moon landing launch a new space race?

hina became the third country to land a probe on the Moon on Jan. 2. But, more importantly, it became the first to do so on the far side of the moon, often called the dark side. The ability to land on the far side of the moon is a technical achievement in its own right, one that neither Russia

nor the United States has pursued.

The probe, Chang'e 4, is symbolic of the growth of the Chinese space program and the capabilities it has amassed, significant for China and for relations among the great power across the world. The consequences extend to the United States as the Trump administration considers global competition in space as well as the future of space exploration.

One of the major drivers of U.S.

space policy historically has been competition with Russia particularly in the context of the Cold War. If China's successes continue to accumu late, could the United States find itself CHINA'S ACHIEVEMENTS IN SPACE

Like the U.S. and Russia, the People's Republic of China first engaged in space activities during the development of ballistic missiles in the 1950s. While they did benefit from some assistance from the Soviet Union, China developed its space program largely on its own. Far from

smooth sailing, Mao Zedong's Great Leap Forward and the Cultural Revo-


lution disrupted this early programs.

The Chinese launched their first satellite in 1970. Following this, an early human spaceflight program was put on hold to focus on commercial satellite applications. In 1978, Deng Xiaoping articulated China's space policy noting that, as a developing country, China would not take part in a space race. Instead, China's space efforts have focused on both launch vehicles and satellites - including communications, remote sensing and meteorology.

This does not mean the Chinese were not concerned about the glob-

station, a lunar base and possible sample return missions from Mars. A NEW SPACE RACE?

The most notable feature of the Chinese space program, especially compared to the early American and Russian programs, is its slow and steady pace. Because of the secrecy that sur-



power space efforts can generate. 1992, they concluded that having a space station would be a major sign and source of prestige in the 21st century. As such, a human spaceflight program was re-established leading to the development of the Shenzhou spacecraft. The first Chinese astronaut, or taikonaut, Yang Liwei, was launched in 2003. In total, six Shenzhou missions have carried 12 taikonauts into low earth orbit, including two to China's first space station, Tiangong-1.

In addition to human spaceflight, the Chinese have also undertaken scientific missions like Chang'e 4. Its first lunar mission, Chang'e 1, orbited the moon in October 2007 and a rover landed on the moon in 2013. China's future plans include a new space rounds many aspects of the Chinese space program, its exact capabilities are unknown. However, the program is

likely on par with its counterparts.

In terms of military applications, China has also demonstrated significant skills. In 2007, it undertook an anti-satellite test, launching a groundbased missile to destroy a failed weather satellite. While successful, the test created a cloud of orbital debris that continues to threaten other satellites. The movie "Gravity" illustrated the dangers space debris poses to both satellites and humans. In its 2018 report on the Chinese military, the Department of Defense reported that China's military space program "continues to mature rapidly."

Despite its capabilities, the U.S.,

unlike other countries, has not engaged in any substantial cooperation with China because of national security concerns. In fact, a 2011 law bans official contact with Chinese space officials. Does this signal a new space race between the U.S. and China?
As a space policy researcher, I can

say the answer is yes and no. Some U.S. officials, including Scott Pace, the executive secretary for the National Space Council, are cautiously optimistic about the potential for cooperation and do not see the beginning of a new space race. NASA Administrator Jim Brindenstine recently met with the head of the Chinese space program at the International Astronautical Conference in Germany and dis-cussed areas where China and the U.S. can work together. However, increased military presence in space might spark increased competition. The Trump administration has used the threat posed by China and Russia to support its arnent for a new independent military branch, a Space Force.

Regardless, China's abilities in

space are growing to the extent that is reflected in popular culture. In Andy Weir's 2011 novel "The Martian" and its later film version, NASA turns to China to help rescue its stranded astronaut. While competition can lead to advances in technology, as the first space race demonstrat-ed, a greater global capacity for space exploration can also be beneficial not only for saving stranded astronauts but increasing knowledge about the universe where we all live. Even if China's rise heralds a new space race, not all consequences will be negative.

With help from diaspora, Palestinians hope for Asian Cup surprise

RAMALLAH, JAN 5 (AFP): The Palestinian football team are taking part in their second-ever Asian Cup in the coming days, and team members born in various parts of the world are hoping to spring a few sur-prises. The team qualified four years ago for the first time but crashed out in ignominious fashion, losing all three games to an aggregate score of 11-1.

This year, with the help of several players from the Palestinian diaspora, they hope to

do better.

Around five million Palestinians live in the blockaded Gaza Strip and occupied West Bank, but around another six million are estimated to live elsewhere.
Chilean defender Alexis

Norambuena said the players speak in a mix of languages to understand each other.

"Football is a way to give some joy to the people and for us to represent them in this cup that is quite important for the country," he said.

'We aim to represent them and give them enough joy so the people can be entertained a bit." The tournament begins in the United Arab Emirates on Saturday. Back home in the West Bank, football lovers are also willing their players on to new heights.

At a recent second division league game, player Sameh Sheikha told AFP that the team's participation "rep-



resents a country at a time when we are still living under occupation." "We hope the team achieves good results this time, because the team has become stronger than before," he said.

There are perhaps cautious reasons for optimism.

Despite being made up of mostly amateurs, the team beat Bhutan 10-0 on aggregate to qualify for the tournament.

This and other good results w them rise to a record high 75th in the FIFA world rankings, though they have since slipped back to 99th.

Palestinians say that Israeli restrictions on players' move-ments limit potential, whether that means checkpoints in the West Bank or the blockade on Gaza, where Israel and Hamas have fought three wars since 2008. Sport is also an area where Palestinians seek to advance their cause.

Their football federation has been a member of FIFA since 1998 and plays in the Asian Football Confederation.

The Palestinians were also granted the status of UN non-member observer state in 2012. This year's Asian Cup side has a little more of an international feel.

They are led by an Algerian coach and among those donning the red jersey in the Emirates is Yashir Pinto, a Chilean who qualifies for the team due to his Palestinian ancestors

Another Chilean with Palestinian roots on the team, Ionathan Zorrilla Cantillana. said "I think we are preparing in a very good way and we will try to create a surprise, to surprise them with the training we got here, and I think will arrive well prepared at the cup.

The bookkeepers still see Palestine as very much outside shots. While regional giants Japan, South Korea and Iran are again among the favourites, Palestine have odds as high as 2,000 to one.

Their group is also a little daunting, with a game against Jordan followed by matches

against group favourites Australia and Syria.

Yet while few expect them to have any chance of com-ing home with the cup, in the Palestinian territories there is optimism. "The national team is a source of pride, and it is competing at the Asian level. This confirms the progress of the level of our sport," said Mohamed Sulaiman, a football coach in the West Bank city of

"Our team is strong and we hope we can achieve some-thing." In Qatar, Norambuena said "it's very nice to have these days to get to know each other more and we hope this will help us do good in this cup.

India inch closer to maiden series win before bad weather stops play

CHETAN NARULA SYDNEY, JAN 5 (PTI): India closed in on their maiden Test series triumph in Australia before bad light and rain com-bined to delay the inevitable, adding more hours to a wait of 71 years.

Bad light stopped play in the final session of day three of the fourth Test as the hosts, responding to India's mammoth first-innings total of 622 for seven declared, were reduced to 236 for six in 83.3 overs on Saturday.

With two full days play left in the game and Australia still 386 runs adrift of India's score, the visitors will fancy their chances of winning the four-match rubber 3-1.

India first went Down Under back in 1947-48 under Lala Amarnath's captaincy, and are yet to achieve series triumph there despite eleven attempts. At the Sydeleven ney Cricket Ground, the players went off with an hour's play pending in the day as bad light hampered proceedings, before rain intervened and brought out an early stumps.

This was after Kuldeep Yadav (3-71) and Ravindra Jadeja (2-62) shared five wickets to put India in a commanding position. At stumps then, Australia were trailing by 386 runs, with Peter Hand-scomb (28 not out) and Pat Cummins (25 not

out) at the crease.
Post tea, Yadav struck on the sixth ball as Tim Paine (5) was completely foxed by the turn he was getting. The spinner pitched the ball up and the batsman, going for a drive, failed to counter it and was bowled.

Cummins and Handscomb then put on 38 runs for the seventh wicket. India requested for the second new ball after 81 overs but were denied owing to bad light.

They kept the bats-men in the middle for only a couple more overs before the umpires stopped play altogether owing to a thunderstorm in the vicinity.

Earlier, India struck four times in the middle session as Australia were at tea. Post lunch, Australia made the worst start possible with Marcus Harris (79) getting out before he could set-tle in again. In the third over after the restart, he

played on off Jadeja.

In the 49th over, the left-arm spinner made it a double blow six overs later as Shaun Marsh (8) was caught at slip.

Djokovic crashes out of Qatar Open



DOHA, JAN 5 (AFP): Novak Djokovic lost surprisingly in Doha on Friday, beaten in the Qatar Open semi-final by world number 24, Roberto Bautista Agut, 6-3, 6-7 (8/6), 6-4.

The Serb fell to his first defeat of the season in a high-quality contest lasting more than two-and-a-half hours, which saw the Spaniard lose his first set of the week but come back to beat

the world number one.
"What happened? I lost the match. That's it," a clearly frustrated Djokovic said in his postmatch press conference

Agut took Djokovic's serve in the second game of the final set for the de-cisive break and secured victory on his first match point. "I will remember this match for [the rest] of my life," said the

30-year-old Spaniard.

He will play the
Czech Republic's Tomas Berdych in Saturday's fi-nal. "I can't be more happy than I am now."

It is the second time he has beaten Djokovic in his career and both victories occurred in a semi-final.

The first came in October 2016 in Shanghai. Djokovic was also world number one at that stage.
Bautista Agut said

Friday's victory was the

better of the two.

"I think today the match was better, the level of the tennis today was very high," he said. "We

both played very good tennis and it was also more tight on the score and more emotions and today was a really good match."

A fired-up Djokovic smashed his racquet after dropping his serve in the eighth game of the second set.

"I thought I was pretty much in control of the match, set and a break, serving 4-3," Djokovic said. "He played a good game. I missed some easy balls and that's what you get as a result of losing the focus in the most important moments and it happens, it happens."

Questions may be asked about how tired the Serb was, as he played two matches each day for three days in sin-gles and doubles, prior to Friday's defeat.

Including the meet-ing with Bautista Agut, Djokovic spent almost 10 hours on court in three days and played 11 sets in singles' matches.

Asked if he had done too much through the week, he replied: "I wasn't the freshest, you know. "This is what I was looking forward to, to get from this tournaas many matches as possible, to get ready for the Australian Open, so I'm

India face Thailand in AFC Asian Cup campaign opener ABU DHABI, JAN 5 (PTI): Underdogs India will look at their

impressive results in recent months for inspiration when they open their AFC Asian Cup football campaign against Thai-land here Sunday.

With the continental show-

piece event being expanded to 24 teams for the first time from the earlier 16, the Indian side have a real chance to make it to the knock-out rounds, which will be a first after their runners-up finish in 1964.

Both in 1984 and 2011, India were knocked out of the tourna-

ment at the group stage.

The two top sides from each of the six groups made up of four countries as well as four third-place teams will advance to the Round of 16.

India, playing in their fourth Asian Cup, are entering the tournament on the back of a goalless stalemates against World Cup-winning Italian coach Marcello Lippi's China and Oman in



the lead-up to the tournament. They lost narrowly (1-2) to Jordan in their third big match ahead of the Asian Cup.

These results were preceded by a 13-match unbeaten run in international friendly matches and the Intercontinental Cup at home last summer.

Constantine's players will

also be keen to improve upon the disastrous performance of the country in 2011 edition, when it badly lost all its group matches.
Sunday's Group A match

against Thailand at the Al Nahyan Stadium will be crucial for India as a positive result will boost the Stephen Constantine-coached team's chances of making it to the Round of 16.

If India beat Thailand on Sunday, then a draw in the remaining two matches -- against hosts UAE (January 10) and Bahrain (January 14) -- could be enough for them to qualify for the knock-out round.

Defensive discipline will be one of the key factors for India against a Thailand team that scored a lot of goals at the ASEAN Football Federation Championship.
India are placed 97th in the

FIFA charts compared to Thailand's 118, but rankings will hardly matter in the continental showpiece. In fact, India are the second highest-ranked team in the group after the UAE.

Historically, India and Thailand have played against each other 24 times with the South East Asian nation winning on 12 occasions. India have won five times while the remaining seven were drawn.

India needs more women in science to improve research quality: Narayana Murthy

BANGALURU, JAN 5 (PTI): India needs to create an environment conducive for qualified, bright women researchers to continue their pursuit in the field of science to improve the quality of research in the country, Infosys co-founder N R Narayana Murthy said here.

A recent report released by the firm Clarivate Analytics shows that only 10 Indians figure among the world's top 4,000 highly-cited researchers (HCR), with only one woman from India featuring in the list topped by the US.

Asked if more women researchers can help improve the quality of research in India, the renowned IT industrialist said, "absolutely, no doubt about it..."

"Whenever I have gone for a convocation address in any university or IITs or lots of institutions in the country, I find the percentage of gold medals that are won by women is generally much higher than by men," Murthy told PTI.

"Therefore, we have to create an environment where it is easy for our women research-



ers to continue their pursuit even after they get married, even after they have chil-.," he said.

However, Murthy noted that it was a social issue and not so much the problem of the research institutes.

"In our society, we have to create mechanisms whereby qualified, bright women re-searchers have no hindrance at all to continue their research focus," Murthy said.

"And it does help (in im-

proving the quality of research) as 50 per cent popula-tion (in the country) is women

and their performance is no less than men at the undergraduate and perhaps at the Masters level," he said ahead of the Infosys Prize ceremony here on Saturday. The Infosys Prize is an an-

nual award given to scientists, researchers, engineers and social scientists by the Infosys Science Foundation (ISF) and ranks among the highest monetary awards in India to recognise research

This year, six eminent professors have been awarded the prize across different categories of science and research.

pure gold medal, a citation and a prize purse worth USD 100,000 (or its equivalent in Indian rupees).

Murthy believes that India

The annual award includes a

has realised the importance of creating an environment where the researchers can indeed contribute to the global betterment and produce world-class work.

"We are still obviously in the early stages, and I'm pos-itive that as we move forward the number of Indians in the top 4000 scientists will indeed increase rapidly. And I have no doubt that Infosys Science Prize will provide an impetus to this effort," he said.

He said many Infosys Prize winners had gone on to win inter national awards in research considered at par with the Nobel Prize.

Asked about the challenges faced by Research and Science in the country, he noted that the research institutes should adopt a more multidisciplinary approach and provide for more interactions of researchers with those outside the country.

He noted that funding may not really be the hurdle in im-

proving the quality of research and that he was very hopeful and excited about the things to come in the field of research

and science in the near future.
This point in time, the UPA government and the current NDA govt, both have taken a lot of interest in improving the quality of higher education. UPA tripled the allocation of funds for higher education, the current government has continued it, so I don't know if funding is the issue, Murthy said.

He said youngsters needed to spend more time with inter-national researchers and they should participate in confer-

ences outside India.
I think our aim for world-class work, aim for the best research work has to be improved first by being more open-minded to compare our work to what is happening outside India, second by providing greater chances for our youngsters to interact with world-class researchers and third by adopting a multidisciplinary

research approach, he said.

If we do some of these things I am sure we can improve the quality of research, Murthy added.

have 2000 miles of border between the United States and Mexico and if vou take a look and vou see like we do through certain technology including cameras in airplanes, not just drones, you will see vast numbers of vehicles driving through the desert and entering where you don't have a very powerful fence or a wall, he said.

Trump said he only wants to stop the flow of illegal immigrants, human trafficking and smuggling of drugs, by having a solid steel structure or concrete structure. Now the steel is actually more expensive than the concrete but I think we are probably talking about steel because I really feel the other side feels better about it and I can understand what they are saying. It is

more expensive, he said.

We mentioned the price that we want USD 5.6 billion This is national security we're talking about. We're not talking games. talking about national security. This should have done by all of the presidents who preceded me and they all know it. Some of them have told me that we should have

done it, Trump said.

We're not playing games. We have to do it. And just remember hu-man traffickers, remember drugs, the drugs are pouring into this country. They don't go through the ports of entry. When they do, they sometimes get caught," said Trump.

He said even Democrats want to check the inflow of drugs and illegal immigrants in the country.

"When we finish, and the Democrats do want this, they want ports of entry strengthe I want to do that too. In fact, we have it done. It's about USD 400 million and we can have the best equipment in the world, he said. Vice President Mike Pence said the nation is in the southern border.

Floods, blackouts after Thai storm, but tourist islands spared



media reported Saturday. People's Liber ation Army (PLA), the world's largest with two million troops, last year doubled the training period for new recruits from three to six months in a bid to improve their combat capabilities.

I am relieved," Krikkrai Songthanee, district chief of neighbouring Koh Phangan, an island famed for its fullmoon parties, told AFP, adding only minor damage had been caused by high winds.

But holidaymakers keen to leave the islands face long delays as transport links are slowly reopened on Saturday.

The storm was downgraded early Saturday to a depression with wind speeds slackening as it moved into the Andaman Sea, the Meteorological Department said.

Pabuk made landfall on Friday afternoon in Nakhon Si Thammarat province, south of the tourist hubs on the Gulf of Thailand, hammering the coastal province with rain.

Authorities warned of flash floods as some parts remained inundated by a combination of rainfall and storm surges.

Around 200,000 people were

left without power as dozens of electricity poles were toppled by high winds or falling trees.

Some 30,000 customers remained without power early Sat-urday, according to an update by the Disaster Prevention and Mitigation Department.

A similar number of people

remained in evacuation shelters, waiting for floods to recede and power to be restored, it added.

Pabuk struck in peak tourist season, a blow to the cash-cow sector that is integral to Thailand's economy. The kingdom is expected to welcome a record 40 million visitors this year.

UN to send new envoy to Somalia after flap led to expulsion

UNITED NATIONS, JAN 5 (AP): The United Nations plans to replace an envoy who was expelled from Somalia after questioning the arrest of a political candidate with an extrem-

ist history, unc said Friday.

The announcement

announcement The announcement came after three days of diplomatic back-and-forth over Somalia's expulsion of Nicholas Haysom, a longtime UN official who has also served as envoy to Afghanistan, Sudan and South Sudan. UN spokesman Farhan Hag said Secretary-General Antonio Guterres has full confidence in Haysom, deeply regrets So malia's decision and spoke twice about it with Somali President Mohamed Abdullahi Mohamed.

The world body also argues that its personnel can't be kicked out under the diplomatic doctrine that Somalia invoked.

Nevertheless, secretary-general plans to appoint a new representative for Somalia. Haq said. "It's crucial that the UN mission on the ground is able to go

about its work," he explained. That work includes electoral support and other functions.


Somalia's UN mis-sion didn't immediately respond to an inquiry about the developments.


The last season will air in two parts, with the first half slated to premiere later this year and the final ten episodes to air sometime in 2020, reported Deadline.
