Two minors sexually assaulted by juveniles, molested by teacher and ignored by HM

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 06 DEC:

Two minor girls, aged 11 and 8 years, are reported to have been raped by six senior boys [all juvenile] and molested by a school teacher of a Junior High School.

Singtam Police have registered two cases of rape and the accused have been taken into custody, informs Senior Superin-tendent of Police, East.

It is informed that the 11-year-old girl narrat-ed her harrowing experience of being sexually assaulted by 6 boys way back in February earlier this year and being mo-lested by a school teacher last month, to her mother and her aunty on 28 November, last month.

After learning of the

incident, her mother and her aunty met the Headmaster the very next day who inexcusably delayed follow-up action and them only on 05 December. It is being alleged now that the Headmaster tried to hush up the case.

The aggrieved parents eventually filed an FIR with Singtam Police following which the six juvenile boys, the ac-cused teacher and also the Headmaster were arrested by the police on Wednesday evening.

Superintendent Police, Hem Raj Rai, confirmed that after the arrest of the school Headmaster, teacher and six boys, another eightvear-old girl also told her grandmother of having been sexually assault-ed by four boys in Octo-ber. These boys are also among the six accused in

the earlier case.
Following this, the grandmother of the second victim also lodged a complaint today and an-other case under POCSO

Act was registered today.
The SP informed that the case was still under investigation and that the juvenile boys have been sent to the correctional home while the two teachers are under police custody.

The chief minister hoped that help from Amul will help in solving unemployment to some extent besides fulfilling the state's demand for milk, it said.

Gujarat Cooperative Milk Marketing Federation Ltd (GCMMF) is the largest food company marketing milk and milk products under the brand name of Amul.

Deb also said his government wants to share experiences in running dairy industry with Amul which has a vast experience in the sector.

The CM sought help from Amul to implement his plan of distributing 10,000 cows to farmers

The state government had last month that it would launch a scheme for distributing 10,000 cows among 5,000 farmers to combat malnutrition and generate em-

ployment in the state.

Kamal Krishna Majumder, Director of Animal Resources Develop-ment Department, said that Tripura produced 1,74,260 metric tonnes of milk in 2017.

In April this year, a government notice said that steps would be taken for augmenting milk pro duction at Gomati Milk Cooperative Limited.

BJP leaders make fresh pitch for Ram temple; Left, Mamata call for upholding secularism

New Delhi, Dec 6 (PTI): On the 26th anniversary of the Babri mosque demolition in Ayodhya by Hindutva activists, several BJP leaders made a fresh pitch for the construction of Ram temple while Left parties and West Bengal chief minister Mamata Banerjee

called for upholding the country's secular fabric. The Congress, which has been highlighting its pro-Hindu credentials to blunt the BIP's attack on it over Hindutva issues, maintained a studied silence on the matter.

Union minister Uma Bharti, a leading figure of the Ram Janambhoomi movement, "appealed" to Congress president Rahul Gandhi to sup-port the construction of Ram temple to "honour his holy thread and Dattatreya Brahmin lineage.

She was referring to the claims of Congress leaders that Gandhi was "janeu-dhari" (sacred thread-wearing) Hindu. Recently at a religious ceremony, the Congress president was referred as a Dattatreya Brahmin.

Talking to reporters,

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for coordination among various groups so that a temple can be construct-ed at the disputed site in Ayodhya and accused the Congress of trying to viti-ate the atmosphere.

There was no comments from the Congress.

In Uttar Pradesh, Deputy Chief Minister Keshav Prasad Maurya said the BJP accorded the highest priority to an agreement between the warring parties for building the Ram temple in Ayodhya.
"The BJP is in favour

of the Ram temple's construction either by a judgement of the Supreme Court or through mutual agreement (among parties). And if both the options are exhausted, then the legislative route must be explored. The BJP accords highest priority to an agreement for paving the way for construction of the temple," Maurya said.

Amid the clamour for building the Ram temple, Left parties took out a protest march in the national capital with CPI(M) General Secre-Sitaram Yechury accusing the ruling BJP

and its Hindutva ideologue RSS of working to "destroy" the country's secular fabric.

Attacking the BJP, he said the saffron party has publicly proclaimed that it would abide by the Supreme Court order on the Ayodhya land issue but has been now talking about bringing ordinance on the matter.

In the last four years and seven months, the BJP was "silent" on the temple issue and has been raking it up as the next general election is

approaching, he alleged.
Banerjee, a bitter
critic of the BJP and head of Trinamool Congress, tweeted that the anniver-sary of the Babri mosque demolition is observed as "Samhati Dibas" (unity day) in the state.

"Iust like a human body is incomplete without all organs, India is incomplete without all communities, religions, castes, creed and gender. Let us pledge to uphold the secular fabric of In-dia," she tweeted.

In FIR Bajrang Dal convenor claimed saw cows being slaughtered, in video says he was 'informed'

NEW DELHI, DEC 6 (PTI): Contradictions appear in the two statements given by Bairang Dal's Bulandshahr unit convenor Yogesh Raj over the cow slaughter incident Monday which spiralled into a mob violence that claimed two lives, including that of a police

inspector. Two first information reports (FIRs) were registered by the police at Siyana police station in Bulandshahr -- one over cow slaughter and the other on the mob violence in which a village man was also killed.

The first one was cember 3, the day violence broke out. a complaint by Raj in which he claimed cow slaughter near Mahav village and accused seven persons from nearby

Naya Bans village.

The second FIR, in which police itself became a complainant, was lodged at 2.30 AM on December 4 for rioting and violence and names Raj along with 26 men including those from right-wing groups besides 50 to 60 unidentified people.

"Around 9 am on Monday we, Yogesh Raj, Shikhar Kumar, Saurabh etc, had come to the jungles of Mahav village while roaming. There we saw Sudaif Chuadhary, Ilyas, Sharafat, Sajid, Parvez, din (residents Sarfuddin (residents of Naya Bans village) etc slaughtering cows and ran away after we raised an alarm over it.

"When alerted, po-lice from Siyana police station and the additional district magistrate of Siyana reached the spot. The people mentioned above had brutal-ly slaughtered the cows

which has hurt our Hindu religious sentiments," states the first FIR, on a compliant by Rai.

Almost 50 hours af-ter the violence broke out and several accused including Raj went absconding a purported video with his statement urfaced on social media Wednesday.

In the purported video, Raj, who starts off with a "Jai Shri Ram" salutation and introduces himself as the Bajrang Dal's Bulandshahr unit convenor, says the police are portraying him as if he is a "history-sheeter".

"There were two incidents that happened on that day," he said referring to the Monday incident. "The first incident

was related to cow slaughter at Mahav village near Siyana. When got information about that, I reached there with my supporters. The police also reached there and we went to the Siyana police station for filing our complaint (about cow slaughter)," he said. Rai said that while he

and his supporters were still at the police station on December 3 they got to know that villagers were pelting stones. "There had been fir-

ing as well and a youth and a policeman have sustained gunshot inju-ries," he claimed.

However, relatives of Raj Kumar Chaudhary, on whose "fields" in Mahav village the caracasses were found strewn on December 3 morning, claimed the dead animals were discovered by a villager only who alerted Chaudhary about it around 7 AM

Chaudhary, a former head of Mahav village, had alerted the local police which had reacher

the spot and the matter had come to an "amica-ble compromise" around 8.30 AM, his wife Preeti

"Nobody knows who informed these people from the (Bajrang) Dal that they reached the spot. They only insisted n taking the carcasses to the police station when everything was already settled," she told PTI. Chaudhary has been

named in the second FIR on violence and rioting and he along with others from Mahav village were also absconding "fearing police action", she said.

Meanwhile, four of first FIR on cow slaughter have been disputed after it turned out that two of them were minors aged 11 and 12, one was non-existent in the village and one person, Sarfuddin, was claimed to be at the Ijtiba (Muslim congregation) in Bulandshahr city, 35 km away from the site, when the entire episode unfolded.

Police, Bulandshahr City, Pravin Ranjan Wednesday said that in the last nine months, action has been taken against nine people under the National Security Act and against 44 unde the UP Gangsters Act over cases related to cow

"Because of such actions there has been a strict control on cow slaughter in the district," he said.

"In Chingrawathi po lice post there has been no complaint of cow slaughter in the last one year," the SP said about the police post, under Siyana police station, which had come under the mob attack on December 3.

ister Satya Pal Singh said here on Thursday. Citing an example, Singh said when students of the CBSE and various state boards seek admission the under-graduate level of a university furnish their marksheets, it is found that their marks range from 98 per cent to 85 per cent.

The university then has to make a comparison between papers of different boards and strike a ratio to arrive at an admission formula, he said. "We have already sent an instruction to the CBSE to discuss with other state boards on the issue," the union minister of state for human development said. The CBSE is now in the process of discussing the issue, he said while interacting with the media on the sidelines of a Merchants' Chamber of



Commerce and Industry programme on education Singh, however, main-

tained awarding marks remained in the domain of school education department of the respective state boards. On the Centre's move to introduce "no homework policy" for class 1 and 2 students, Singh said "The parents also want the same.'

Nadar Malhotra is also the Vice Chairperson of the board of HCL Technologies and the Chairperson of its CSR Committee. She is a trustee of the Shiv Nadar Foundation, which is focused on education and has established some of

India's top colleges and schools.

Mazumdar-Shaw, Founder and
Chair, Biocon, is ranked 60. India's richest self-made woman had founded the country's largest biopharmaceutical firm in 1978.

The firm has successfully forayed into the lucrative US biosimilars market, catching the attention of investors and creating a surge in market cap, Forbes said.

Biocon became the first company to gain approval from the USFDA for two different biosimilars of drugs used in certain cancer treatments.

The 65-year old business woman has invested in research infrastructure and scientific talent with the aim of building a deep R&D-based biotech firm, not a copycat generics maker.

Bhartia, 61, Chairperson and Managing Director, HT Media, is ranked 88th. In 2013, Bhartia launched the business weekly MintAsia in Singapore and then bought Webitude, a social and digital media outfit. HT Media's tutoring arm, Studymate, has expanded into coaching students for the admissions exam required by India's elite engineering schools.

Chopra, who married American singer and actor Nick Jonas this week, mes in at the 94th spot.

Forbes said Chopra, 36, is "arguably

the most successful Bollywood actor to

cross over to Hollywood".

Chopra made her US big-screen debut in 2017's "Baywatch" and became the first Indian actor to lead a drama

series on American television as the former star of ABC's "Quantico."

She launched her own production

company, Mumbai-based Purple Pebble Pictures, to promote regional filmmakers and emerging Indian talent.

In 2018, she became a tech investor. putting money into dating app Bumble's investment fund and Holberton School for software engineering.

Around 15,000 deaths in road accidents due to potholes 'unacceptable', says SC

New Delhi, Dec 6 (PTI): The Supreme Court on Thursday termed as "unacceptable" the death of nearly 15,000 people in road accidents caused potholes in the last five years and said the number was probably more than those killed on the border or by terrorists.

This indicates that authorities concerned are not maintaining the roads properly, a bench headed by Justice Madan B Lokur said.

"It is unacceptable that such a large number of death takes place on roads due to pot-holes," said the bench, which also comprised Justices Deepak Gupta and Hemant Gupta.

The bench perused a report filed by the Supreme Court Com-mittee on Road Safety, headed by former apex court judge Justice K S Radhakrishnan, which said 14,926 persons had died in road accidents due to potholes from 2013 to 2017 across the country.
"It is almost 15,000

deaths in five years, probably more that those killed on border or by terrorists," the bench said, adding, "These are government figures".

The bench asked the Centre to file their

response on the com-mittee's report after consulting all state gov-ernments and posted the matter for hearing January. Advocate Gaurav Agarwal, assisting the court as an amic-us curiae in the matter, said the committee has filed a report on the is-sue following the apex court's direction and consulted all the states.

He said the data on death in such accidents was based on the fig-ures of the Ministry of Road Transport and Highways.

The bench observed

that many authorities like the municipal cor-National porations, Highways Authority of India (NHAI), concessionaires working with them or the state road departments would be responsible for these deaths as they were not maintaining the roads.

Referring to the number of deaths, the bench said, "This is absolutely a very high number and indicates that concerned authorities whether they are municipal corporations, state governments, NHAI and others are not maintaining the roads".

The bench also ob-

served that no compensation was paid to the victim's family in such cases and legal representatives of the deceased have to "live with the unforeseen tragedy due to lack of concern shown by the authorities". It said no data was available before it about the number of persons injured in road accidents due to potholes and it was clear that "number of injured will be much much higher than the number of deaths". The apex court had in July termed as "frightening" the number of deaths in accident caused due to potholes on roads across the country and had observed that number of fatalities in such incidents was more than those in terror attacks.

While hearing a mat-ter related to road safety in India, the bench had also said that persons who have lost their lives as a result of accidents caused due to pot holes should be entitled

to compensation.

It had asked the Supreme Court Committee on Road Safety to look into this "very serious issue" and file a report before it.

The court is also

dealing with issue of compensation paid to the victims of hit-andrun and road accidents.

It had also raised the issue of deaths in accidents due to notholes on roads, particularly in Mumbai, and said that according to reports there were around 4,000 potholes in Mumbai.

Discuss Suicides More

Mental health and suicides rates need to be deliberated more often by the lay people

Suicide statistics for Sikkim no longer even shock with their frequency. It is not rare to learn of two suicides (sometimes more) on the same day at villages at different corners of the State and the victims separated by decades in age and unlikely to have anything in common. They do however have some things in common - a condition which made them suicidal and an environment which ignores their situation.

Suicides in Sikkim are not limited to any specific age-group, and every new incident needs to be received with anxious worry (despite the sheer frequency which can dull the shock), because in the absence of empathy, suicides could become even more routine, an even easier decision to make for those on the brink when they hear of so many following through on their suicidal tendencies. There is a lot that needs to be done to save lives from self-destructing, but the first step towards delivering anything effective will have to be active engagement.

Only after the people start talking about suicides beyond just airing shock over their increasing numbers can the society stand a chance of building the required defences. These conversations will have to be about more than just the incidents and move more towards asking what the experts and the concerned agencies are doing to address the situation. More people need to begin asking what is being done to counsel the surviving families of suicide victims, because surely, the guilt that burdens them must be staggering and they should not be required to weather through it alone without any professional help. More people need to wonder why no explanations have been forthcoming as to why the suicide rate is so high and which experts from where will make the time to "study" and explain the whys and the draw up an action plan on how to contain it.

The reasons behind suicides or attempted suicide are complex, but suicidal tendencies don't always require medical expertise to detect. Depression and other mental disorders, feelings of worthlessness, signs of abuse and other warning signs manifest rather clearly. What is missing is the correct response. Family and friends, the first to notice these signals, perhaps prefer to ignore them because it is a difficult situation to address and they find themselves at a loss on how to respond. Maybe they will seek out help and counselling if they were made to understand how serious the problem is. Although it is now widely accepted in Sikkim that too many suicides are taking place, individual realisation of how people around them could also take that route has not yet dawned. Suicides are still looked at from a sanitised distance of it could not happen to us. Any attempt at generating wider awareness and involvement on curtailing suicides has to begin by sharing case studies of how apparently "normal" people from "normal" families have also ended their own lives. The social support required to save lives will perhaps then reinforce itself better. It is also true that even people worried by warning signs they notice, don't know how they can help. That is where governmental and non-governmental organisations can take a leading role. It is important to bear in mind that awareness is required not only to highlight suicides as a problem, but also in equipping the first-responders to panic signs friends and family - on what they can do and whom they can approach for help.

And one is still discussing only the first step of addressing suicides and generating awareness for Sikkim here. The equally important phase of helping friends and family of suicide victims deal with the trauma and heal themselves is not even being considered in what little is being done here on the issue of suicides

WhatsApp skewed Brazilian election, proving social media's danger to democracy

isinformation via social media played a trou Misinformation via social media piagea a libiling role in boosting far-right Congressman Jair Bolsonaro to into the Brazilian presidency.

Bolsonaro did not win 55 percent of votes thanks to misinformation alone. A powerful desire for political change in Brazil after a yearslong corruption scandal and a court decision compelling the jailed front-runner Luis Inacio Lula da Silva to withdraw

from the race both opened the door wide for his win. But Bolsonaro's candidacy benefited from a pow-erful and coordinated disinformation campaign intended to discredit his rivals, according to the Brazil-

ian newspaper Folha.

Days before the Oct. 28 runoff between Bolsonaro and his leftist competitor, leftist Fernando Haddad, an investigation by Folha revealed that a conservative Brazilian business lobby had bankrolled the mul-timillion-dollar smear campaign – activities that may have constituted an illegal campaign contribution. ELECTION SCANDAL FALLOUT

Using WhatsApp, a Facebook-owned messaging ervice, Bolsonaro supporters delivered an onslaught of daily misinformation straight to mill

They included doctored photos portraying senior Workers Party members celebrating with Communist Fidel Castro after the Cuban Revolution, audio clips manipulated to misrepresent Haddad's policies and fake

"fact-checks" discrediting authentic news stories.

The misinformation strategy was effective because WhatsApp is an essential communication tool in Brazil, used by 120 million of its 210 million citizens. Since WhatsApp text messages are forwarded and reforwarded by friends and family, the information seems more credible.

The fallout from Folha's front-page report com-

pelled WhatsApp to issue an apologetic op-ed.
"Every day, millions of Brazilians trust WhatsApp with their most private conversations," wrote WhatsApp's vice president, Chris Daniels, in Folha. "Because both good and bad information can go viral on WhatsApp, we have a responsibility to amplify the good and mitigate the harm."

The company announced that it would purge thou sands of spam accounts in Brazil, clearly label m to show that they had been forwarded, tighten rules on group messaging and partner with Brazilian fact-checking organizations to identify false news.

Brazil's highest electoral court also created an advisory board on internet and elections to investigate disinformation in Brazil's 2018 election and propose regu-

lations to limit its impact in future political processes. IT'S A WHATSAPP-DEFINED WORLD

Brazil is only the latest country to learn that social edia can undermine the democratic process.

Numerous studies have confirmed that a toxic blend of data mismanagement, targeted advertisement and online misinformation also influenced the outcomes of the United Kingdom's Brexit vote and the 2016 U.S. presidential race.

Brazil's WhatsApp election scandal should be a wake-up call particularly for other developing world democracies, as revealed in research I recently presented at the United Nations' Internet Governance Forum.

In my analysis, Facebook and a handful of tech companies are now racing to collect and monetize the data gathered through sponsored apps, allowing them to profile millions of Africans. Lax government oversight means that people may never be informed that they pay for these "free" apps by exposing their personal information to data mining by private companies.



That's because the conditions that allowed fake to thrive in Brazil exist in many Latin American, an and Asian countries.

Internet access is very expensive in Brazil. A broadband connection can cost up to 15 percent of a household's income and mobile plans with unlimited data, common in rich countries, are rare. Instead, mobile carriers entice users by offering

"zero rating" plans with free access to specific applications, typically Facebook, WhatsApp and Twitter.
Nearly three-quarters of Brazilian internet users had these prepaid mobile-internet plans in 2016, according to the technology research center CETIC.br.

Most Brazilians therefore have unlimited social media access but very little access to the rest of the internet. This likely explains why 95 percent of all Brazilian internet users say they mostly go online for ssaging apps and social media.
Yet the "rest of the internet" is precisely where

Brazilians might have verified the political news sent to them on WhatsApp during the 2018 election. Essentially, CONCERN OVER AFRICA'S ELECTIONS

Democracies in Africa, where more than a dozen countries will hold elections in 2019, are vulnerable

to the same kind of lopsided access to information that influenced Brazil's presidential vote. As in Brazil, many Africans get stripped-down internet access through Facebook's Internet.org and Free Basics platforms. But, worryingly, most African countries have little or no data protection and no net neutrality requirements that internet providers treat all digital content equally, without favoring specific apps.

Such personal information is exceedingly prof advertisers in Africa, where Western-style olling and consumer surveys is still rare. It is easy to imagine how valuable targeted advertising would be for political candidates and lobbies in the lead-up to Africa's 2019 elections.

MOVE FAST AND BREAK DEMOCRACY

Democracy cannot thrive when the electorate is intentionally misinformed about candidates, parties

Political debate driven by likes, shares and angry com ments on social media increases polarization and distorts healthy public discourse. Yet evidence shows that insults, lies and polemics are what best drive the user engagement

that generates that precious personal data.

For over a decade, social networks have been associated with free communication, unfettered by gatekeepers like news editors or fact-checkers. Many in Silicon Valley and beyond saw this innovative dis-ruption as broadly beneficial for society.

That can be true when social networks are just one of many ways that people can engage in open and pluralistic debate. But when just a handful of apps are available to the majority of users, serving as the sole channel for democratic dialogue, social media can be

easily manipulated to poisonous ends.

Mark Zuckerberg's longstanding motto was,

Why we should stop labelling people climate change deniers

n the westernmost reaches of Nunavut, on the Northwest Passage, Inuit hunters have told me some pithy things about climate change.

The land is changing. It isn't climate change. This is part of cycles. Our elders saw this coming.

Some of the most visible and profound effects of global warming are occurring in the Arctic. Some Inuit are worried climate change will permanently alter the world. Others say it will pass, as other times of want and plenty have passed through the Inuit's long cycles of life in the Arctic.

In Inuit Nunangat, the Inuit homeland in Canada, perceptions about cli-mate change cannot be divided into two camps of "believers" and "deniers." The situation is far more complex.

To understand climate change communication and adaptation in mar-itime communities, my research team has travelled to the Canadian Arctic, Indonesia and the Philippines to find out what local communities have to say about climate change.

The answer so far? It varies.

Some fear climate change, some deny it's real and some don't know what, or whom, to believe. Many don't want to talk about climate change at all. Others say we must talk. The diverse interpretations of how climate change fits into their own stories are beautifully captured in the documentary Qapirangajuq: Inuit Knowledge and Climate Change.

It's simplistic to divide people into only two opposing camps of climate change: believers or deniers. The way we have been communicating the science of climate change has not been persuasive.

PLACE MATTERS

Scientists warn that human activity, industrialization and our dependence on fossil fuels have caused a warming of global temperatures that threatens life on Earth. By contrast, climate change deniers dismiss such dire premonitions as conspiracy. The weight of scientific facts is often presented to better inform or in-oculate a misinformed public. Yet between those two polarized po-sitions are local populations living with the immediate effects of climate change on the environments they depend upon

Few people can claim to share the iit's experience of climatic variation. Many process the concept of global warming with facts about climate change, but also by the geogra-phies they occupy. As University of Cambridge geography professor Mike Hulme suggests, we should conceive of climate change as the cultural evolution of the idea of climate.

Local experience, traditional knowless

edge and personal experience may blend in a swill of contradictory impressions about climate change. People are shaped in part by their place in the diverse physical and social spaces undergoing climate-related events, whether they are marine

untain, urban or desert regions.

The history and experience of in dividuals and communities may influence how they interpret and prioritize climate change. This diversity of lived experience and worldviews contra-dicts the divisions between climate ge belief and denial

FACTS AREN'T ENOUGH

Climate change science alone is not convincing. Recent research suggests the public is split into two conflicting groups: those whose views align with the scientific community (believers) and those who do not. These opinion-based groups have distinct social identities, beliefs and emotional reac-tions to environmental change; they are set apart by cultural differences and political leanings.

A recent study found that social networks influence people's stance on climate change. So, how you talk about climate change matters. An interna-tional survey of 24 countries found that personal experiences, beliefs, knowledge, values and worldviews are important factors that shape climate nge belief.
The viral response to last year's

National Geographic video of a starving polar bear shows how easily climate change narratives can be hijacked by deniers.

The video was initially swiftly embraced by climate change champions. For instance, Canada's Environment Minister Catherine McKenna tweeted: "THIS is what climate change looks like. Climate change is real. As are its impacts. Time to stand up for our polar bears and our planet." But the photographers were later criticized for assuming the polar bear was starving because of climate change, laying the "believe" camp open to ridicule.

The domi nant climate change narrative is one of permanent, near-irre-versible human-induced changes to the climate accompanied by a rise in global

temperatures. This is what I thought I heard as an Inuit hunter eloquently described how the land has stayed greener for longer during each of the last 40 seasons he

has travelled since his honeymoon.

Then I pondered his words again, and I asked him, "Do you think climate change is permanent or cyclical?" He paused and replied, "It's cyclical." LISTEN TO LOCAL PEOPLE

In its new report "Global Warming of 1.5°C," the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) says the prognosis is dire if we do not contain

a rise in global temperatures to 1.5°C.

The debate over "1.5 to stay alive" is not new. It was central to the 21st Conference of the Parties (COP) to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) held in Paris in December 2015. Will the IPCC's latest message finally

convince the climate change confused or their leaders, who failed to make 1.5°C binding in the Paris text three years ago? The debate will rage on at the 24th COP in Katowice, Poland in December.

Meanwhile, far from the pomp and formality of COP meetings, do local populations feel engaged in climate change action? I doubt it.

Inuit hunters must increasingly navigate unpredictable sea ice. One explained their seeming indifference to climate change this way: "What are we going to do about it? We Inuit take care of the land."

Elsewhere, a community leader

hinted at his weariness of a prob-lem that has been known to Inuit but ignored by the world for too long: "What's there to say? We've long: "What's the said it all before

BE BETTER COMMUNICATORS

After attending three COP meetings since Paris, I question the reach of the existing narrative and governance of climate change. I suggest we move be-yond a simplistic division between believers and deniers, and talk to people in local communities to examine h climate change complexity and confu-sion are hindering effective action on climate change.

We need to communicate at the local scale where resource-dependent or climate-susceptible populations live with the actual or foreseen threats of

climate change.

We should heed the words of Thai marine scientist Suchana Chavanich, who told delegates at a workshop at COP 23, hosted by Fiji but held in Bonn, last year that to make a difference we need more than scientific knowledge; we need to connect with local people on the ground, in the places they live and work, to learn about the relevance of climate change in their lives.

That is more effective than theorizing about what might happen in a 1.5°C or 2°C world.

For many, climate facts are not convincing nor do they speak for them-selves. And because people are not necessarily swayed by climate change facts but rather the communicator of facts, the nature of communication, their personal affiliations and networks, and their personal experience, labelling someone who is confused about climate change as a denier does not advance us to a world of collective

effort to confront climate change.


We are not doing a good job of communicating climate change. Maybe we can do a better job if we recognize that people are not just passive receivers of climate change facts, but actors with their own history and knowledge in place and interpretations of how cli-mate change fits into their own stories. Cal HC says can't give permission for BJP rally at this stage

Thursday said it cannot give permission at this stage for the BJP rally in Coochbehar, scheduled to be flagged off by party president Amit Shah on Friday, after the West Bengal government refused to allow the event on the grounds that it might cause communal tension. The court directed that superinndents of police of all districts in West Bengal will file a report by December 21 to it on the holding of 'rath yatra' rallies by the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), after hearing all the district presidents of the party.

Directing that the ral-

ly stands deferred till the next date of hearing on January 9, Ju stice Tapabrata Chakraborty observed that the prayer of BJP for permission to hold the 'rath yarta' cannot be granted at this stage. The BJP was scheduled to hold three 'rath vatras' that will start from different



Lok Sabha constituencies.

It had moved the court seeking a direction to the state government for giving permission for its rallies after its applications allegedly went unanswered,

The BJP campaign was scheduled to begin from Cooch Behar district in the north on December 7, from Kakdwip in

on December 9, and from the Tarapith temple in Birbhum district on December 14. State advocate general Kishore Dutta told the court that the Kishore

of police refused permission for the BJP president's rath yatra from Friday. The state government submitted that it might cause communal

said the district has a history of communal issues and that there was information that "communal provocators" and rowdy elements had become active there.

The SP's refusal letter

also noted that several top BJP leaders would come to Coochbehar, as also people from other states, stating that these may affect the communally sensitive district.

The refusal of permission was an administrative decision in view of the ground situation, the AG said, adding that "details of apprehension" cannot be spelt out in open court due to their sensi-tive nature and he can submit these to the court in a sealed cover. if directed.

WB govt denies permission to Amit Shah's rath yatra

Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) president Amit Shah is scheduled to kickstart the party's 'Save Democracy Rally', comprising three 'rath yatras', in the state.

The state government submitted that it might cause communal tension in the district.

Dutta said the district has a history of com-munal issues and that there was information that some communal provocators and rowdy elements had become active there.

The SP's refusal letter

also noted that several top BJP leaders would come to Cooch behar, as also people from other states, stating that these may affect the communally sensitive district.

Stating that refusal of permission was an administrative decision in view of the ground situation, the AG said that details of appre-hension cannot be spelt out in open court due to its sensitive nature and he can submit these to the court in a sealed cover, if directed

Ramesh said very frequently, the proponents of big-ticket projects are the governments, centre or state, and not the private sector.

"It is a tough call that those in power have to take and they must eval-uate that what the exact issues are. What can be the short term implica-tions, what can be the long term implications whether it is a national highway or a railway project," he said.

Asserting that the substance and style of India's climate diplomacy needs a change, Ramesh said that he had suggested several measures "Tried to implement



According to her, the collector base in India is "very small" compared to countries like China, resulting in inadequate visibility of and dialogue around modern and contemporary Indian art.
"Art and art related

activities are still not a regular part of people lives. There is still a gap in the dissemination of knowledge to people," she said.

With outreach initiatives such as the flash nob, Nadar wants to bridge this gap so that art is no longer seen as just for the elite but a layman could also strive to stay connected with it.

The flash mob leveraged the entertainment value of the performance, surprising the visitors at the mall with a choreographed jig that combined tra-ditional classical forms, break-dancing and modern dance set to South Indian fusion music.

The performers were wearing saris along with temple jewellery, gajras, dhotis and turbans draped in styles from

centuries ago.

Pujara's maiden hundred in Australia bails India out of trouble

ADELAIDE, DEC 6 (PTI): Cheteshwar Pujara rose to the occasion with a maiden century in Aus-tralia, pulling India out of a deep hole to a respectable 250 for nine on day one of the first Test here

on Thursday.
Pujara showed the same grit and gumption that is typical of him en route a 246-ball 123 that kept India in the game after being reduced to 127 for six in the 50th over.

It took a brilliant di-

rect from Pat Cummins to remove him on what happened to be the final ball of an absorbing day one of the four-Test series. Skipper Virat Kohli

opted to bat in ideal con-ditions but the top-order once again failed to apply themselves against the potent pace trio of Mitch-ell Starc, Josh Hazlewood and Cummins.

Anything close to 250 looked a mountain to climb with India reeling at 56 for four at lunch. But Pujara stood tall amid the ruins to save In-dia from embarrassment on way to his 16th Test ton. His fighting effort comprised seven fours and two sixes.

The 30-year-old put on two crucial partnerships with the lower-or-der batsmen to ensure der batsmen to ensure India give their bowlers something to bowl at.

Post tea, Pujara add-ed 62 runs with R Ashwin (25) for the seventh wicket. The latter played watchfully, unlike the Indian top-order, and played a great role in this minor recovery.

Cummins (2-49) finally got the break-through in the 74th over when Ashwin edged to second slip. Ishant Sharma (4) then put on 21 runs with Pujara, pushing the score past 200 in the 79th over.



isnant survived a loud lbw shout via DRS, but Mitchell Starc (2-63) bowled him with a fuller delivery thereafter. As he started to run out of partners, Pujara hit a few lusty blows to gather

ne quick runs. Earlier, Pujara's effort was the sole silver lining after India were reduced to 143-6 at tea. This was after a horrendous shot selection by Rohit Shar-ma (37) left India in the lurch at 86 for five in the

38th over.
Post lunch, Rohit and Pujara started off well as they added 45 runs for the fifth wicket.

While Pujara was sedate at one end, the for-mer took the lead in scoring as he hit sixes at will. Two came off Cummins; the first a pull shot that sailed for six and the other a proper cover drive that cleared the ropes as

It seemed that Rohit was intent on digging India out of this hole as he hit Nathan Lyon (2-83) for a six on the second ball of the 38th over. Marcus Harris almost caught it, with the ball barely

crossing over the ropes and the umpire took

some time to call it a six.

That should have should been a note of caution for the batsman, but he didn't heed it and skied the very next ball for Harris to take an easy catch in the deep.

Rishabh Pant (25) too arrived at the crease with intent of attacking the bowling. He scored two fours and a six in the space of a few deliveries, before Pujara asked him to calm down.

The duo then added 41 runs for the

sixth wicket as India crossed 100 in the 41st over, including five sixes surprisingly.

But this didn't work against the pacers, who pushed Indian batsmen back with their perfect length and induced drives thereafter. In the 21st over then, Rahane fell to Hazelwood, the fourth batsman out driving in this morning session, and was caught at

Yemen govt, rebels lash out as peace talks set to open



RIMBO (SWEDEN), DEC 6 (AFP): Yemen's gov-ernment and rebels doubled down on their rival demands Thursday, just moments before hard-won peace talks were due to open in Sweden under the auspices of the United Nations.

A top Huthi rebel offi-cial threatened Thursday to bar UN planes from using the Yemeni capi-tal's airport unless peace talks in Sweden lead to

its full reopening.

"If the Yemeni capital's airport is not opened to the Yemeni people in the peace talks in Sweden, I call on the (rebel) political council and government to close the airport for all planes," Mohammed Ali al-Huthi tweeted.

The Yemeni government hit back, demand-ing the rebels withdraw from the flashpoint port city of Hodeida.

ministry demanded the "coupist militias with-draw fully from the western coast and hand the area over to the le-gitimate government" gitimate government" via Twitter -- a reference to rebel-held Hodeida, home to Yemen's most valuable port.

The Sweden talks mark the first attempt in two years to broker an end to the Yemen con-flict, which has killed at least 10,000 people since 2015 and triggered what the UN calls the world's worst humanitarian crisis. Some 14 million peo-ple are at imminent risk of starvation in Yemen. according to UN esti-mates, as a Saudi-led military coalition continues to battle the country's Iran-backed Huthi rebels.

800k to 2 million religious minorities detained in Chinese internment camps: US

WASHINGTON, DEC 6
(PTI): An estimated
800,000 to 2 million religious minorities are
currently being detained
in internment camps in
China, the Trump administration has told
lawmakers, who have expressed serious concerns
over the massive human
rights violations in the
Communist nation's Xinjiang province.

The situation in resource-rich Xinjiang has been restive as the native Muslim Uighurs have been resisting increasing settlements of majority Han Chinese from other provinces.

China appears to have set up a series of secret internment camps used to lock up hundreds of thousands of ethnic Chinese Muslims, whose existence has long been denied by authorities.

At a Congressional hearing, Scott Busby, Deputy Assistant Secretary of State at the Bureau of the Human Right Democracy and Labour, alleged that Beijing was supporting similar repressive moves by other authoritarian regimes across the globe.

"The US government

"The US government assesses that since April 2017, Chinese authorities have indefinitely detained at least 800,000, and possibly more than 2 million, Uighurs, ethnic Kazakhs and members of other Muslim minorities in the internment camps," he said.

Testifying before a Senate Foreign Relations Subcommittee, Busby said reports suggested that most of those detained were not being



charged, and their families had little or no information about their whereabouts

At first, China denied the existence of such camps, but as public reports have emerged, Chinese authorities now assert that they are "vocational education centres", which glosses over the fact that many renowned Uighur intellectuals and retired professionals are also detained in these camps, he said.

Former detainees, who have reached safety, have spoken of relentless indoctrination and harsh conditions for example, praying and other religious practices are forbidden.

"The apparent goal is to force detainees to renounce Islam and embrace the Chinese Communist Party," Busby said.

Life outside the in-

ternment camps is not much better, he noted. Neighbourhoods have entry and exit checkpoints manned by armed police. Families have been forced to accept Chinese officials into their homes for extended home-stays. Thousands of mosques have been shuttered or destroved.

while some turned into

communist propaganda

centres, Busby alleged.
"Unfortunately, fleeing China is not enough to escape the long arms of the government. China has routinely pressured other countries to return Uighurs, ethnic Kazakhs and members of other Muslim minority groups, which has often proven successful," he told the lawmakers.

Even when such individuals reach safely, China continues to harass and intimidate them. China's repression of mi-

nority groups does not end in Xinjiang, he said.

Its policies have spread hundreds of miles away, for instance to the Hui Muslim communities. Tibetans also face continued repression and pervasive surveillance. The Tibetan Autonomous Region was the testing ground for many of the techniques now used in Xinjiang, Busby claimed.

Senator Cory Gardner

Senator Cory Gardner said the so-called authoritarian closing under President Xi Jinping has resulted in an unprecedented and intensifying crackdown on civil society, ethnic minorities and religious freedom in China.

"The news of mass concentration camps for Uighur Muslims and the Xinjiang Autonomous Province has shocked the conscience. And this necessitates a serious re-

sponse from the United States and the international community," he said. Senator Ed Markey said it was pretty clear that there was a systematic effort by the Chinese government, not just within China, but also around the world, to back those policies which are most repressive and which allow for a compromise of human rights.

Senator Tim Kaine

Senator Tim Kaine said reports indicated that a million Han Chinese have been recruited to forcibly occupy homes of Uighurs so that those not in detention camps, are having Han Chinese placed in their homes to ensure there isn't a Quran visible and they don't pray during the day.

Senator Marco Rubio rued the silence of the Muslim world in the face of the forced internment of hundreds of thousands of Muslims Uighurs in China.

Top Huawei executive detained in Canada, angering China

OTTAWA, DEC 6 (AFP):
A top executive and daughter of the founder of Chinese telecom giant Huawei has been arrested in Canada and faces extradition to the United States, officials said Thursday, angering Beijing days into a trade war truce with the US. The detention of Meng Wanzhou, Huawei's chief financial officer, comes after American authorities reportedly launched an investigation into suspected Iran sanctions by Huawei, which was already under scrutiny by US intelligence officials who deemed the company a national security threat.

The arrest stirred tensions just as the United States and China agreed to a ceasefire in their trade spat while negotiators seek a deal within three months.

News of her detention

News of her detention rippled through stock markets in Asia, particularly Shanghai and Hong Kong, with tech firms among the worst hit. By lunch Shanghai was 1.3 per cent lower while Hong Kong was 2.6 per cent off. "China is working creatively to undermine our national security interests, and the United States and our allies can't sit on the sidelines," US Senator Ben Sasse in a statement linking the arrest to US sanctions against Iran.

"Sometimes Chinese aggression is explicitly state-sponsored and sometimes it's laundered through many of Beijing's so-called 'private' sector entities that are in bed with (President) Xi (Jinping)'s communist party," he added. Meng was arrested in the western city of Vancouver on December 1, Canada's ministry of justice said in a statement.

The ministry said the US is seeking her extradition and she faces a bail hearing on Friday, adding it could not provide further details due to a publication ban that was sought by Meng, whose father, Huawei founder Ren Zhengfei, is a former Chinese People's Libera-

tion Army engineer. The arrest occurred on the same day that US President Donald Trump and Xi struck the trade war truce at a summit in Argentina. China's embassy in Ottawa demanded Meng's release.

"The Chinese side firmly opposes and strongly protests over such kind of actions which seriously harmed the human rights of the victim," the embassy said in a statement.

"The Chinese side

has lodged stern representations with the US and Canadian side, and urged them to immediately correct the wrongdoing and restore the personal freedom of Ms Meng Wanzhou." Huawes said it was unaware of any wrongdoing by Meng and was provided "very little information" about the charges. "Huawei complies with all applicable laws and regulations where it operates, including applicable export control and sanction laws and regulations of the UN, US and EU," the company said in

a statement.

The Wall Street Journal reported in April that US Department of Justice had opened an investigation into suspected violations of Iran sanctions by Huawei. The New York Times said the company had been subpoenaed by the Commerce and Treasury Departments over alleged violations of Iran and North Korea sanctions. Huawei is not the first Chinese telecoms equipment firm to face

the ire of US authorities.
Earlier this year, the
US imposed a seven-year
ban on the sale of crucial
US components to Chinese smartphone maker ZTE after finding it
had failed to take action
against staff who were
responsible for violating
trade sanctions against
Iran and North Korea.

The ban nearly killed the Chinese tech company, which said it was forced to cease major operations in May.

A month later, Washington and Beijing reached a deal that would

strike ZTE from the sanctions list -- just days after China reportedly offered to ramp up purchases of American goods to help cut the yawning trade imbalance with the US.

American officials denied any connection between the two. In exchange, ZTE agreed to pay a hefty USD 1 billion fine and put an additional USD 400 million in escrow in case of future violations. It was also ordered to replace its board of directors and retain outside monitors.

The case showed that China is highly dependent on imports of USmade semiconductors or computer chips and reinforced Beijing's need to become self-reliant on this key technology.

Huawei is one of the world's largest telecommunications equipment and services providers. But despite global

success, its US business has been tightly constrained by worries it could undermine American competitors and that its cellphones and networking equipment, used widely in other countries, could provide Beijing with avenues for espionage. In May, the Pentagon said that devices from Huawei and ZTE posed an "unacceptable" security risk.

Personnel on US military bases are banned from buying equipment manufactured by the Chinese tech firms. Over the summer, Australia barred Huawei from providing 5G technology for wireless networks in the country over espionage fears. New Zealand followed suit in November, but said the issue was a technological one. Britain's largest mobile provider too has joined the global ban on Huawei.

On Wednesday, BT announced it was removing Huawei's telecommunications equipment from its 4G cellular network, following a warning from the head of MI6 foreign intelligence service that singled out the Chinese company as a potential security risk.

China to 'immediately' implement US trade truce measures



BEIJING, DEC 6 (AFP): China said Thursday it would "immediately" implement measures agreed under a trade war truce with the United States.

The commerce ministry's remarks came days after US President Donald Trump and Chinese leader Xi Jinping agreed to give negotiators 90 days to resolve their trade spat.

Few details have been made public about what the two sides will negotiate, a lack of clarity that has unsettled stock markets. "China will immediately implement the consensus both sides already reached on agricultural products, energy, autos and other specific items," commerce ministry spokesman Gao Feng said at a regular press briefing.

The two sides will

The two sides will also discuss intellectual property protection, technology cooperation, market access and "fair trade", and "work hard to reach a consensus", Gao said.

But the spokesman did not provide more specific details about what actions China will take.

The White House has said China agreed to purchase a "very substantial" amount of agricultural, energy, industrial and other products to reduce the yawning trade gap. It also would begin buying products from US farmers "immediately".

buying products from US farmers "immediately".

The two sides will also negotiate "structural changes" to forced technology transfer, intellectual property protection, cyber intrusions and cyber theft, services and agriculture, according to the White House.

For its part, China has said it will import more US products to reduce its trade surplus, but no dollar amount has been publicly discussed.

Trump added China would roll back tariffs of 40 per cent on cars. It was unclear if Gao was referring to the tariffs in his remarks to reporters.

Gao's briefing came hours after the trade detente risked being rattled by the arrest in Canada of a top executive from Chinese telecom giant Huawei at the request of the United States

Pakistan slashes nonsalary budget by 10%

(PTI): The Pakistan government has decided to cut by 10 per cent the non-salary current budget of the civilian setup as part of an austerity drive to solve the cash-strapped nation's economic woes, according to a media report.

The Express Tribune

The Express Tribune reported that the move will help save nearly Rs 10 billion in the remainder period of fiscal year (2018-19) but would not address core fiscal problems.

The Pakistan Teh-

The Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) government has also decided to continue with a ban imposed on the creation of new posts excepts where the posts are required to be created under development projects, the report said.

The Ministry of Finance has issued an office memorandum to give effect to the austerity measures for fiscal year 2018-19. Effectively, the cut in the current non-salary expenditure will be on the budget allocations for the period of December 2018 to June 2019, the report said.

"In consideration of fiscal constraints and keeping in view the austerity drive of present government and to save public money, it has been decided to effect a saving



of 10 per cent in current expenditures," said the ministry of finance office memorandum.

The 10 per cent cut will not be applicable on employees' related expenses, their retirement benefits, subsidies, transfers, and civil works. The military budget has also not been slashed.

The PTI government is implementing tight fiscal and monetary policies. The State Bank of Pakistan has already downward revised the economic growth rate projections to 4 per cent for this fiscal year as against 5.8 per cent growth rate in the last fiscal year.

The total downward

revised annual budget for running the civil government is Rs 460 billion for fiscal year 2018-19. Nearly 70 per cent expenditures have been exempted from the budget cut, which would reduce the net benefit to not more than Rs 10 billion, according to an official of the Ministry of Finance.

the Ministry of Finance.

The total non-salary expenditures are Rs 180 billion and some components like transfers and civil works are exempted from the cut. The total budget for this fiscal year is Rs 5.3 trillion. Out of this, an amount of Rs 1.1 trillion has been allocated for defence and Rs 1.842 trillion for servicing of the public debt.

Prime Minister Imran Khan, after his swearing on August 18, moved into a modest three-bed room house of his military secretary along with two servants. He had announced

that he would not be staying in the sprawling PM House which has a staff of 524 and fleet of 80 vehicles, keeping his pledge to cut down the expenditure of the cash-strapped government.

Desperate to get back to normal life now: Vinta Nanda

MUMBAI, DEC 6 (PTI): Writer-director Vinta Nanda, who has accused actor Alok Nath of rape and sexual harassment, says she now "desperately" wants to get back to normal life.

Nanda gave an account of the alleged sexual assault in a Facebook post on October 8, soon after actor Ta-nushree Dutta's complaint of harassment against Nana Patekar fuelled India's #MeToo movement.

The director said she got the courage to call out Nath after she realised it was for the first time that men in Bollywood were standing up for women.

"My trigger obviously was the atmo-sphere, there was an enabling environment. I was very certain I will be heard and supported because the movement had gathered momentum, started by Tanushree. I give her all the credit in the Bollywood space, as she took on very big people.

"When I saw that the industry was supporting her, CINTAA was coming out openly and speaking for her... It was the first time in Bollywood where I saw men stand up and speak for women," Nanda said on Wednesday.

She was speaking at a panel discussion on #MeToo at the Mumbai Curtain Raiser of the Zee Jaipur Literature Festival, which



will run from January 24 to January 28.

Nanda said she "went to sleep" after writing about the alleged sexual harass-ment on social media and woke up to realise that things will never be the same.

"For me, it was over. I had held back for so many years. I was relieved but I had given sleepless nights to everyone, including my family. By the time I woke up, from my building to the office building, there were media vans parked all over the place.
"I woke up to the fact that 'ok now

I've done it'. Now I have to live up to it.

Γhat's what I am doing until today. I am trying desperately to get back to normal life now. This is the last panel I'm saying 'yes' to because I just have to get back to normal life now," she added.

Last month, Mumbai Police reg-istered a rape case against Nath following Nanda's complaint. He has been booked under Indian Penal Code's Section 376 (rape).

Nath has refuted the allegations and filed a civil suit against Nanda and is seeking Re 1 as damages for alleged defamation.
