New cases calm down, but fatalities remain a worry

SUMMIT REPORT

GANGTOK, 31 MAY:

The number of daily cases in Sikkim **L** appear to be calming down with 146 new cases detected in the past 24 hours to take the State's tally of confirmed cases to 15,317 on Monday. This is a substantial lowering given that earlier this week Sikkim has broken the 400-mark and had many days of 300-plus daily

While Mondays usually see a low number because the VRD Labs where RT-PCR tests are conducted are closed on Sundays, today is different because extensive Rapid Antigen Tests more than made up for the usual drop in testings on Sundays.

Yesterday, a staggering 927 RAT tests were carried out across the State to pick up all the 146 of the new cases. In com-

parison, only 395 RAT tests had been carried out last Sunday, 23 May, and had still picked up 100 cases. Five samples screened through TruNat all returned negative for COVID-19

While the drop in daily cases is reassuring, fatalities continue to remain a worry and Sikkim's COVID death toll reached 253 with three more Covid patients succumbing to the virus in the last 24 hours. Two COVID deaths were reported from Central Referral Hospital and one COVID patient passed away in home isolation

Here, one needs to bear in mind that fatalities, experts have often pointed out, usually hit after a gap of 15-20 days. Given this timeline, fatalities remain high for a couple of weeks since after the infections have started going down. Hopefully,

In the year that has passed since Covid arrived on the scene, Sikkim has carried out nearly 1.20 lakh tests, or which, as mentioned, 15,317 have returned positive.

Of the latest count, 22 new cases were registered in East District, 68 in West District, 50 in South District and six in North District. It is not often that East Sikkim is beaten in the number of daily cases, but given the outbreaks in rural areas, West and South districts have beaten East today.

Petrol, Diesel Prices Hiked Again; Petrol Crosses Rs. 100/Litre Mark In Pune

NEW DELHI, 31 MAY [NDTV]: Prices of petrol and diesel have yet again reached new highs today, and Pune has become the newest city to cross the Rs.100 per litre mark.

Today, on May 31, the price of petrol in Pune stands at Rs 100.09 per litre, while diesel has reached Rs 90.66 per litre mark. In the nation's capital, Delhi, petrol price has reachedRs 94.23 per litre, while diesel price stands at Rs85.15 per litre.

At the same time, in Mumbai, petrol and diesel prices have touched - Rs 100.47 per litre and Rs 92.45 per litre, respectively. This is the 16th time fuel prices have been hiked in the month of may 2021.

Among other metros, petrol price in Chennai today stood at Rs 95.76 per litre, while the rate of diesel in the region went up to Rs 89.90 per litre.

At the same time, petrol price in Kolkata has reached Rs 94.25 per litre, while diesel is priced at Rs 88 per litre. In Bengaluru, the price of petrol has reached Rs 97.37 per litre, while diesel rate has touchedRs90.27 per litre. Overall, in the metro cities, petrol rates have gone up by up to 29 paise, while diesel has become expensive by up to 28 paise today, on May 31, 2021.

In Maharashtra, petrol prices in the Ahmednagar district too crossed the Rs 100 mark, currently standing at Rs 100.13 per litre, while diesel is priced at Rs 90.71 per litre in the region.

However, petrol prices are still the most expensive in Sri Ganganagar, Rajasthan, where it currently stands at Rs 105.24 per litre, while diesel is priced at Rs Rs 98.08 per litre, slowly creeping towards the Rs100 mark.

Other regions where petrol and diesel rates have already crossed the Rs 100 and Rs 90 per litre mark, respectively, include - Anuppur, Rewa, Jaisalmer, Banswara, Indore, Bhopal, Gwalior, Ratnagiri, Aurangabad, Kolhapur, Nashik, and Parbhani.

Right now, oil marketing companies like - Indian Oil Corporation, Bharat Petroleum, and Hindustan Petroleum are revising domestic fuel prices on a daily basis.

Changes in fuel prices are usually implemented at 6 am every day, however, since the last two weeks, we are seeing a revision is priced once every two days. Fuel rates differ from state to state depending on the incidence of local taxes such as value-added tax (VAT).

Mass testing in North Sikkim picks up 18 SARS-Cov2 cases from 769 samples

MANGAN, 31 MAY [IPR]: In the on-going Covid testing programme in North District by the District Hospital (Mangan), the villages of Tingchim, Tinjey and Jhushing were covered today with Rapid Antigen Testing. A total of 769 people were screened and 18 reported positive for Novel Coronavirus.

For Tingchim, the testing centre was Tingchim school while the centre for Tinhey and Jhushing was Mangshila school.

With assistance from ADM (North), SDM Mangan, BDO Mangan and the administration team as well as the police along with logistic assistance from Village Covid Man-Committee agement

(VCMC) members, a total of 769 people were tested, out of which, 18 reported positive. Those who tested

positive were instructed to remain under home isolation. One patient from

Tingchim was sent to the district hospital for isolation whereas one patient from Mangshila was sent to the Zilla Covid Care Centre. The testing pro-

gramme will continue in the district and the next identified area where people will be tested is Mangan Bazar area, informed DMS (North) Dr. Rinzing. D. Bhutia.

Covid kit supplied by the Government of Sikkim was also distributed to the concerned patients assiduously.

Bengal Chief Secretary quits, named Chief Adviser to Mamata Banerjee

KOLKATA, 31 MAY [NDTV]: Hours after Mamata Banerjee wrote to Prime Minister Narendra Modi that she would not send top Bengal officer Alapan Bandyopadhyay to Delhi, she announced that he had retired as Chief Secretary and would now serve as Chief Adviser to her government for three years.

Mamata Banerjee had made it clear that she would not follow the Centre's order shifting Mr Bandyopadhyay to the Centre in the middle of her state's Covid fight. The Centre, she said, responded by insisting that he has to report to Delhi.

After Mr Bandyopadhyay's retirement, HK Dwivedi has taken over as Chief Secretary, she announced.

"They have given no reason. I am shocked. I have decided we need his service for the Covid pandemic. For Covid and



for Cyclone Yaas, he must continue his service to the poor, the state, the country, the affected people..." the Chief Minister

"If a bureaucrat is insulted after he has dedicated his life to his work. what message is the government and PM sending out? Are they bonded labourers? There are many

Bengali cadre officers at the Centre. Can I recall them without consultation, Mr Prime Minister? Mr Busy Prime Minister? Mr Mann-kibaat Prime Minister?"

The Chief Secretary was ordered to report to the Centre at 10 am today in a recall order issued hours after Mamata Banerjee skipped a Cyclone Yaas review meeting with PM Modi.

She met with the Prime Minister briefly after his helicopter landed at the Kalaikunda air base in Bengal and left for another meeting. Top central government sources called her "petulant" and said "never before in the history of

the Indian Republic has a Chief Minister of a state behaved in such an ugly, disrespectful and arrogant manner" with a Prime Minister.

In her letter, Ms Baneriee had written to PM Modi: "The government of Bengal cannot release, and is not releasing, its Chief Secretary at this critical hour, on the basis of our understanding that the earlier order of extension, issued after lawful consultation in accordance with applicable laws, remains operational and valid."

She added: "I am sure you will not inflict further suffering on the people of this state by taking away the services of an experienced officer, suddenly without any consultation and with no prior notice, whose continued presence in my state in these difficult times was accepted to be vital and necessary by your government four days back."

India reports lowest daily Covid cases in 50 days

New Delhi, May 31 recorded at 9.07 per **(PTI):** India reported the lowest daily new coronavirus infections in 50 days with 1,52,734 cases, taking India's total tally to 2,80,47,534, while the active caseload further declined to 20,26,092, according to the Union Health Ministry data updated on Monday.

The death to 3,29,100 with 3,128 daily deaths, the data updated at 8 am showed.

Recoveries continued to outnumber the daily new cases for the 18th consecutive day.

The number of people who have recuperated from the disease surged to 2,56,92,342, with 2,38,022 patients having recovered in a span of 24 hours, while the case fatality rate stands at 1.17 per cent, the data stated.

Also, 16,83,135 tests were conducted on Sunday, taking the total cumulative tests conducted so far in the country to 34,48,66,883, while the daily positivity was

cent . It has been less than 10 per cent for seven consecutive days, the ministry said.

Weekly positivity rate has declined to 9.04 per

The active cases have further reduced to 20,26,092, comprising 7.22 per cent of the total infections, while the national COVID-19 recovery rate has improved to 91.60 per cent.

India's COVID-19 tally had crossed the 20lakh mark on August 7, 30 lakh on August 23, 40 lakh on September 5 and 50 lakh on September 16.

It went past 60 lakh on September 28, 70 lakh on October 11, crossed 80 lakh on October 29, 90 lakh on November 20 and surpassed the one-crore mark on December 19.

India crossed the grim milestone of 2 crore on May 4.

The cumulative number of COVID-19 vaccine doses administered in the country has exceeded 21.31 crore.



total 21,31,54,129 have been administered through 30,28,295 sessions, according to the provisional report till 7 am on Monday.

The 3,128 new fatalities include 814 from Maharashtra, 493 from Tamil Nadu, 381 from Karnataka, 186 from Kerala, 142 from West Bengal, 138 from Uttar Pradesh and 127 from Punjab.

A total of 3,29,100 deaths have been reported so far in the country, including 94,844 from Maharashtra, 28,679 from Karnataka, 24,151 from Delhi, 23,754 from Tamil Nadu, 20,346 from Uttar Pradesh, 15,410 from West Bengal, 14,432 from Punjab and 13,016 from Chhattisgarh.

The Health Ministry stressed that more than 70 per cent of the deaths occurred due to comorbidities.

"Our figures are being reconciled with the Indian Council of Medical Research," the ministry said on its website, adding that state-wise distribution of figures is subject to further verification and reconciliation.

Nearly 25 Cr vaccine doses likely by August: Central Covid Panel

NEW DELHI, 31 MAY [NDTV]: With ramping up of production capacities, nearly 25 crore 'Made in India' vaccines are expected to be available by August, a senior official has said and noted that it will go a long way in meeting the target of vaccinating one crore people daily against COVID-19.

There has been shortage of vaccines after it was decided to open up vaccination to all those above 18 years.

"Yesterday, SII in a letter mentioned that they will be manufacturing 10-12 crore of vaccine doses, which is almost 50 per cent ramping up (of their capacity) by Juneend. Similarly, Covaxin is also going to increase its production and by July-end they will also produce between 10-12 crore doses (per month)," said Dr NK Arora, Chairman of COVID-19 work-



al Technical Advisory Group on Immunization (NTAGI).

Pune-based SII (Serum Institute of India) manufactures Covishield vaccine against COVID-19 while Hyderabad-based Bharat Biotech manufactures Covaxin.

"By August we will have 20-25 crore vaccine doses per month, another 5-6 crore doses from

units or if we get international vaccine doses. The objective is to vaccinate one crore people every day," Dr Arora said.

He said India may start in few weeks testing the feasibility of a regimen "that mixes two different doses of COVID vaccines to see if it helps boost the immune response to virus". The researchers in such a study would see the effects of giving a different vaccine in the second dose.

At present, the country has availability of 7-7.5 crore doses of Covishield and Covaxin per month.

In March the court, while dismissing a petition against Jammu and Kashmir MP Faroog Abdullah, said expressing views that are different from government opinion cannot be termed "sedition".

That was in response to a petition claiming Mr Abdullah had sought the help of China and Pakistan against India on the Article 370 issue. The petitioners were also fined **2** 50,000.

On May 1 the court sought the centre's response to a PIL challenging the validity of the sedition law.

The PIL was filed by two journalists, Kishorechandra Wangkhemcha from Manipur and Kanhaiya Lal Shukla from Chhattisgarh, who said the provision violated the freedom of speech and

The journalists alleged frequent misuse, misapplication abuse (of the law) since

petition also The pointed out that sedition as a crime had been repealed in other post-colonial democracies, and condemned as undemocratic, undesirable and

unnecessary. Criticism of the sedition law - which activists say is used by the government to muzzle dissent and opposing views - is a long-standing point of concern in the country.

In December last year former Supreme Court judge Madan B Lokur said the sedition law was being misused to curb free press and speech. He said "a lethal cocktail of use and misuse of law" was being used to adversely impact the liberty of those who spoke up against the government.

"Time to set limits of sedition": Supreme Court relief to Telugu channels

New Delhi, 31 May [NDTV]: The Supreme Court today put on hold Andhra Pradesh's action against two TV channels and issued notice to the state government asserting, "It's time we define limits of sedition."

The Andhra Pradesh government should not take any coercive steps against Telugu news channels TV 5 and ABN Andhra Jyoti, the Supreme Court said.

"The Andhra Pradesh government's act of filing sedition cases against the channels is muffling channels. It is time the court defines sedition," said Justice DY Chandra-

At a separate hearing on Covid vaccination, the word "sedition" came up again in a caustic remark by Justice Chandrachud.

Justice L Nageswara Rao noted that pictures of "a dead body being picked up and thrown in a river" were seen on TV yesterday. NDTV had shown the shocking visuals of the body, apparently of a Covid patient, being flung into the river by relatives.

Justice Chandrachud said, "Yes. There was picture of body being lifted and thrown into river. I do not know whether complaint of sedition filed against the news channel for showing it."

The Andhra TV channels were charged in an FIR with sedition allegedly for airing the comments of a rebel MP of Andhra Pradesh's ruling YSR Congress, Kanumuri Raghurama Krishnam Raju. Mr Raju had been very critical of his own government's handling of Covid.

challenged the FIR before the Supreme Court, arguing that the Andhra government had violated a recent court order that restrained governments from punishing citizens for flagging Covid-related

grievances. TV5 also said Mr Raju's speeches were broadcast by several media outlets.

The MP, Mr Raju, was arrested on May 14, weeks after he asked a CBI special court to cancel the bail granted to his party founder, Chief Minister Jagan Mohan Reddy, in a disproportionate assets case.

The Supreme Court granted bail to him on May 21, saying there was a possibility he was "ill-treated in custody".

In March, the Supreme Court had said that expressing views that were dissenting and different from government opinion cannot be termed "sedition".

The case involved a

NEW DELHI, 31 MAY [NDTV]: The National Students' Union of India (NSUI) in a letter to Minister Jitendra Singh has demanded age relaxation and extra attempts for students appearing for competitive exams including engineering entrance test (JEE) and medical entrance tests (NEET UG, PG).

NSUI has emphasized on the fact that due to the ongoing Covid pandemic many aspirants of various exams like NEET and JEE are losing out the opportunity to sit in the exams hence government must immediately form a policy to protect the attempts of all such candidates.

NSUI President Neeraj Kundan in the letter emphasised that, "..apart from the demands of age relaxation and extra attempts for the aspirants, it is extremely important to form a vaccination policy for all such candidates before making any decision about any of the examinations."

"The candidates going to appear in exams like UPSC, CA, NEET (UG & PG), JEE, SSC-CHSL, UGC NET, INCET, should be vaccinated on priority basis as soon as possible," the letter added.

NSUI gave the slogan of 'Pehle Suraksha, Phir Pariksha' and has been demanding immediate action from the Centre to make sure that none of the students' future, who will be appearing in the competitive examination, is compromised.

NSUI last week had opposed the Central Government's decision to conduct the Class 12th board exams amid the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and termed it as a "wrong call". Following the propos-

als of the Union Government to conduct exams, Questioning the government decision to conduct this exam, the NSUI further asks, "If the government is ready to come up with an evaluation formula for many other subjects why can't they do the same for these 19 subjects as well?'

Conducting exams for these 19 subjects, NSUI said, could be equally dangerous as it would have been for all the subjects and considering the present conditions in the country this is not the risk which Modi Government should take

In May last year, Jio discontinued the Rs. 98 prepaid plan from its portfolio and made the Rs. 129 plan as the lowest for its cus-



When Mountains **Sweat, Pay Heed**

Let's take better care of the water towers

Not just experts, even lay people and mass media are now noticing the change in weather patterns all over the world. The mountains are getting warmer, the plains getting colder and weather hitting extremes at unexpected times.

All these are symptomatic of Climate Change, a fact that cannot be denied or wished away anymore. Even as the debate continues over the developed world's attempts at browbeating the third world nations to sacrifice more to manage the world environment, regions close to ice need to get more concerned and start undertaking studies and working solutions on their own. Ice caps - the polar regions and the glacier fields - feel the impact of climate change first. North and west Sikkim are crisscrossed by many glaciers which are the frozen fountains of life for the State. Most times people do not realise the importance of glaciers to Sikkim since life does not directly depend on glacier-fed rivers in Sikkim and most times people tap into mountain springs for water. But such disconnect is only superficial and at the end of the day, the water cycle goes back to glaciers. Hence, the cultivation, the rivers and their hydel potential are all sourced from these glaciers and now that hydro-power has so much invested in it as the economic deliverer for the State, it becomes imperative that the source of this potential is better studied and understood.

Sikkim has had its glaciers studied and while the commissioning of the study was welcome, it has to be a continuing effort and a glacier watch needs to be set up. Some of Sikkim's glaciers have increased, some reports suggest and even that is not necessarily good news. Elsewhere, Himalayan glaciers are reported to be receding at the rate of 10 to 15 metres on an average every year. The longest glacier in the Eastern Himalaya – the 10 mile long Zemu Glacier in north Sikkim is believed by many to not be in the best of health. This glacier feeds the Teesta on which many hydel projects have been planned. The glaciers of West Sikkim have also been in fast recession for nearly a century now and most of them are hanging glaciers now, their course in the valley now just a litter

Given the fact that 70 percent of the world's fresh water is frozen in glaciers, it is surprising that not enough is being done to save them and contain their recession. This is probably because the scientists and decision makers prefer the plains and share their data only among their clique and have seldom made their findings coherent enough for the stakeholders to understand. But the problem is already too clear and present to waste time pointing fingers. The finds of the study of glaciers commissioned by the State Government should be considered for inclusion in school curriculums so that the young can grow up learning how things are and then hopefully develop a connection with the canaries of climate change and learn to take better care of the water towers.

Superforecasters: What Pandemic Planners Can Learn From the World's Best Predictors

Cummings has argued that the UK government's official scientific advice in March 2020 hugely misunderstood

how the pandemic would play out,

that cost thousands of lives. According to Cummings, it was certain specialists with less knowledge of pandemics or medicine such as data scientist Ben Warner, artificial intelligence researcher Demis Hassabis of DeepMind, and mathematician Tim Gowers - who gave more accurate forecasts at this

Cummings is also known to be a fan of Superforecasting by Philip Tetlock, a book about people who predict future events more reliably than most. Some superforecasters have been praised for their predictions about the pandemic, while others have also been critical of the experts' record.

So should governments make greater use of superforecasters instead of relying on scientific experts? The evidence isn't quite that clear cut. But there certainly seem to be things governments could learn from superforecasting.

In a famous American study on superforecasters published in 2014, they were an elite crew. Only the top 2% of contenders performed well enough in a geopolitical forecasting tournament to win the title. Their task was to assign probabilities to possible answers to dozens of ques-

The researchers provide a few illustrative examples. Who would be the president of Russia in 2012? Will North Korea detonate another nuclear weapon in the next three months? How many refugees will flee Syria next year?

Of course, just because someone does well one year doesn't prove that they're more skilled than anyone else. Maybe they just got lucky. We have to look at how well they did in the following years to evaluate how "super" they really are.

Impressively, these superforecasters maintained their edge as the tournament wore on for three more



years. In fact, after being combined into "superforecasting teams" containing only other top performers, their performance increased by a substantial margin. The researchers also found that working in teams and taking relevant training improved performance for other forecasters, compared to forecasters in a control condition.

TEAMS AND TRAINING

Whether or not we take Cummings at his word that the UK's pandemic planning suffered from a "classic group-think bubble", we know that teams don't always make wise decisions. What was it that made the teams more successful in the US study?

It's hard to say for sure, but the researchers specifically encouraged the teams to ask precise questions to encourage clearer thinking about the evidence supporting a particular forecast, to "look for evidence that contradicts your current prediction", and to constructively introduce alternative points of view.

Such debate may well improve collective judgment and guard against groupthink. Nor were team members required to come to a consensus. Although they shared information and opinions, they still made individual predictions which were combined by algorithm. Superforecaster teams in particular were highly engaged, frequently sharing information with and asking questions of other team members.

Another study took a closer look at which specific training techniques seemed to help most. Three techniques were particularly associated with higher accuracy. The first was the use of so-called comparison

For example, if I am trying to predict the probability that Benedict Cumberbatch and Sophie Hunter will still be together in five years. it can be helpful to think about other "classes" that are relevant — say, the class of celebrity marriages, or even marriages in general. This allows me to look to history to inform my predictions: What percentage of celebrity marriages end in any given five-year period?

The second was to make use of mathematical and statistical models, when available, to help inform one's views. The third was to "select the right questions" - a recommendation to spend more time predicting answers to questions where you know more than others about the topic, or on which additional research is likely to pay off. However, the researchers stressed that all components of the training may have contributed holistically to better performance.

Research has also shown that accuracy improves when we keep track of our past performance - but the kind of feedback matters. Did outcomes you thought would happen 20% of the time actually happen 20% of the time? What about outcomes you thought would happen 90% of the time? Performance improves for those who receive this kind of information.

CAN GOVERNMENTS DO BET-

Could the UK government have done better on COVID-19 by soliciting input from teams of superforecasters? It's possible. Su-

perforecasters at Good Judgment Open and practised forecasters at Metaculus (in which I've participated) each seem to have done well on COVID-19, with Metaculus claiming to have outperformed experts in June 2020. That said, in a recent series of COVID-19-related predictions, trained forecasters were not always more accurate than experts. The researchers behind the survey are experimenting with ways of combining predictions from domain experts and trained forecasters into a "consensus forecast".

It also seems plausible that even the training that helped the non-supers make better forecasts would have been useful. For example, Cummings claimed that although there was much attention to epidemiological models, evidence that contradicted the models' assumptions — such as data being reported by intensive care units — was ignored. It certainly seems plausible that someone trained to "look for evidence that contradicts your current prediction" might have spotted this earlier.

Of course, not all recommendations from the literature are practical in government settings. In theory, governments could test such recommendations for themselves, adopting any that seemed beneficial. Unfortunately, you can't improve what you don't measure.

In Superforecasting, Tetlock emphasises that any organisation serious about improving its forecasts must attach concrete numbers to them, at least internally. A phrase like "serious possibility" may mean a 20% chance to one person and an 80% chance to another.

This is almost certainly what Cummings was referring to when he said: "A guy called Phil Tetlock wrote a book and in that book he said that you should not use words like reasonable and probable and likely, because it confuses everybody." Perhaps it shouldn't surprise us if organisations that do not make forecasts in a way that they can be evaluated are not equipped to learn how to make them better. To improve, you first have to try.

Local Newspapers Can Help Reduce Polarization With Opinion Pages That Focus on Local Issues

If you're confused about opinion journalism and ■ what it is, you're not alone. Many Americans are. But even so, the editorials, opinion columns and letters to the editor that fill the op-ed pages could help bridge political divides in the U.S. and offer some help to struggling local news outlets.

Two-thirds of Americans polled by Gallup in 2017 said that the news media do not distinguish between fact and opinion, an increase from 42% in 1984. Only 43% of people in another poll said that they can easily tell the difference between news and opinion online. Half of Americans are unfamiliar with the stock opinion journalism term, "op-ed," which is shorthand for an opinion column.

As the lines between opinion and news blur in many Americans' minds, trust in media is falling. Local news sources - daily newspapers and local television news programs - are seen as more trusted, caring and unbiased than national news sources, but even that trust is fraying.

Like nearly everything else in American politics trust in the media is polarized along party lines: Democrats trust the media far more than Republicans do, and the most ideological members of each party have the most different ideas about media's trustworthi-

Given this confusion and disagreement, it might seem unlikely that opinion journalism could be a positive influence. But our research shows that it can.

We are scholars who study politics and the media. We have found that local newspapers – and local opinion journalism in particular - can bridge political divisions and attract more readers.

VIBRANT COMMUNITY FORUM

Opinion journalism is not news reporting; it is distinguished by its stated point of view. It has three basic formats: editorials; opinion columns, or "op-eds"; and letters to the editor.

Editorials are written in the newspaper's voice by the editorial board, often composed of editors, owners and community members. Op-eds are typically written by professional columnists or community leaders. Letters are written by regular readers.

Op-eds ensure that perspectives from nonjournalists appear in the newspaper, help the general public interpret major events and can change readers' minds on the issues. The best op-ed pages operate almost like a town square, allowing readers to discuss and debate issues important both to their communities and beyond.

But the economic crisis in local news is making it harder for the opinion page to realize its potential as a vibrant community forum. Falling revenues and diminished numbers of staff have forced local newspapers to use more syndicated columnists from outside of the paper's community and whose work usually has a national focus. Some papers have cut the position of opinion editor completely.

Without a dedicated staffer to seek out community writers and edit their work, newspapers' reliance on syndicated columns means more opinion columns focused on "right versus left" ideological conflicts between the two national political extremes, not local

NO MORE NATIONAL POLITICS?

Our book shows how doing the opposite – getting rid of national politics on the opinion page and reinvesting in local opinion content - can help newspapers attract readers and cool tensions in their com-

The Desert Sun of Palm Springs, California, tried this for the month of July 2019: no syndicated columns, no cartoons about national politics, no letters about then-President Donald Trump.

We measured the ways this experiment changed the material that was published and the attitudes of the people in the community.

It was a major shift. In June, the month prior to this change, half of The Desert Sun's op-ed page was nationally syndicated columns, and one-third of all columns referenced Trump. In July, national syndication disappeared, as did all stories mentioning the president. California topics were the focus of less than half of all columns in June, but 96% focused on California in July. Mentions of the Democratic and Republican parties dropped by more than half, from 25% of all columns to 10%.

Local issues filled the page: Issues like artistic and cultural preservation, traffic and downtown development, and education and the environment got much more attention. The unique character of Palm Springs shone through, once given a chance.

We surveyed readers before and after The Desert Sun's experiment, in Palm Springs and a different city, Ventura, whose local newspaper, the Ventura County Sun, didn't change its opinion page. We wanted to see if the change in opinion journalism shifted how people think and feel about their political opponents.

Political polarization, which is when people feel far apart from the opposing party, slowed significantly in Palm Springs compared to Ventura among certain groups:

- Those who read the newspaper;
- Those who know a lot about politics; and
- People who participate most in politics.

These groups are the people most likely to share their views and inform others, potentially spreading the newspaper's influence into the broader community. Even if only a fraction of the community reads the newspaper regularly - The Desert Sun's total circulation is just over 26,000 - a change like this could have larger spillover effects.

The Desert Sun's readers enjoyed the change: Online readership of opinion pieces nearly doubled in July, and in reader surveys we fielded after the experiment, almost five times as many readers said they approved as said they disapproved of the experiment. The experiment helped the newspaper recruit more opinion writers, who then continued to write in the months that followed.

REINVESTING IN OPINION

Supporters of local news could follow the lessons of this research by raising money to pay for opinion editor positions and funding creative thinking like The Desert Sun's experiment.

The alternative is that opinion pages will wither and cease to reflect their communities. A local-only opinion page won't restore the economic model that supported newspapers in decades past, but our research shows it can bring back some readers and bridge some of the political divides that can drive American communities apart.

By keeping the focus local, the opinion page could play a small part in restoring trust and helping local newspapers survive these trying times.

Bihar extends lockdown till June 8, curbs eased: Nitish Kumar

PATNA, 31 MAY [PTI]: The Bihar government on Monday extended the lockdown by another week, till June 8, but eased some of the restrictions in order to facilitate business activities.

Chief Minister Nitish Kumar made the announcement on social media after chairing a meeting of the crisis management group that comprises his cabinet colleagues and top officials.

"In view of the corona outbreak, a decision has been taken to extend the lockdown by a week, till June 8. However, some extra concessions will be made for business activities. People are requested to wear masks and maintain social distancing," Mr Kumar tweeted in Hindi.

Detailed guidelines regarding the extended period of the lockdown will be released later in the day, officials said.

20 new cases push COVID-19 tally of Andamans to 6,984

PORT BLAIR, MAY 31 (PTI): The COVID-19 caseload in Andaman and Nicobar Islands rose to 6,984 as 20 more people tested positive for the disease in the Union Territory, a health department official said on Monday.

Two new patients have travel history and others were detected during contact tracing, he said.

The death toll rose to 114 as one more fatality due to the infection was reported in the last 24 hours, the official said.

At least 23 people were cured of the disease during the period, taking the total number of recoveries in the archipelago to 6,683.

The Union Territory now has 187 active cases.

The local administration has been strict to contain the spread of the disease and has adopted an approach of tracking, testing and treating, he said, adding that people arriving here from the mainland are mandatorily required to undergo rapid antigen test.

Information, publicity and tourism secretary Sunil Kumar Singh urged people to cooperate with the administration to combat the spread of the virus. He appealed to them to maintain discipline by strictly adhering to COVID appropriate behaviour.

Altogether, 1,25,285 people have been inoculated and 17,363 of them having received both doses of the vaccine.

Of the total number of people inoculated so far, 6,695 citizens in the age group of 18 to 44 years have received vaccine shots, the official said.

The Andaman and Nicobar administration has conducted 3,85,988 sample tests for COVID-19 so far, and the positivity rate stands at 1.81 per cent.

Panic over oxygen subsides in Kathmandu but hoarding of cylinders adds to problem

SHUVAM DHUNGANA KATHMANDU, 31 MAY [KATHMANDUPOST]: Hamro Team Nepal, a non-governmental ganisation that has been providing free oxygen for underprivileged Covid-19 patients, gets hundreds of phone calls every day.

"We receive hundreds of calls every day from people who are in need of oxygen cylinders," said Nilam Kumar Bogati, vice chairman of Hamro Team Nepal. "Many people who are in home isolation also contact us pleading for oxygen saying they didn't get a hospital bed but need oxygen urgently."

But the people who took cylinders from the group are not returning them even after patients have recovered from Covid-19.

"Many people after using the cylinders want to keep them saying they might need them in future," said Bogati. "This has affected our service to make oxygen cylinders available to those in need of them."

After the number of cases soared in India in early April and reading reports of scarcity of oxygen cylinders there, the group had collected 50 containers from various sources like oxygen plants and industries before the

As the number of cases soared in Nepal, the group helped individuals and hospitals by providing full cylinders, according to the group's president Bimal Panta.

"For the underprivileged who need oxygen, we provide cylinders for free and after it finishes, we bring it back to refill them," said Panta.

While the shortage of oxygen in Kathmandu has eased somewhat compared to two weeks or so ago when there were people queuing at oxygen plants for the sake of their loved ones at home and in hospitals, the demand for oxygen is still high, according to manufacturers.

Nepal on Friday recorded 8,407 new infections, with 2,447 in Kathmandu Valley. This figure for the Valley is well below the 4.198 on May 9 when 8,777 new cases were recorded in the country.

The nationwide infection tally now is 497.052. of which 116,192 cases are active.

On Friday the Ministry of Health and Population reported 177 more deaths, taking the total toll to 6,024. The gradual decline in

the number of cases in the Valley is reflected in the number of people crowding at oxygen plants.

"There is no panic



buying of oxygen now but demand continues to be high," said Gaurav Sarda, director of Kantipur Oxy-

With hospitals under strain, thousands of infected people are in home isolation.

According to manufacturers and the Health Ministry, people need a doctor's prescription to get oxygen from manufacturers who provide them after taking a deposit for cylinders.

"But we don't give out large cylinders of 60 litres capacity to individuals," Sarda, who is also the president of Oxygen Manufacturers Association, told the Post. "We have only given out small 10 litre-cylinders to individuals after taking a deposit but even those are not being returned."

If there is a shortage of oxygen cylinders there must be a leakage somewhere, according to him.

Shanker Lal Agrawal of Shanker Oxygen Gas said that he does not give oxygen cylinders to individuals as far as possible because they may be hoarding cylinders.

"But in case hospitals ask for them, we provide them after taking a deposit," Agrawal told the Post. "Otherwise we just give smaller cylinders to individuals against cash deposits."

When Hamro Team Nepal contacts a patient's family to get back oxygen cylinders, many make excuses saying

they gave the cylinders to their relatives as they were in need of oxygen

"While some people do not return cylinders thinking they might need them in future, others do if we convince them saying that they can call us anytime in future," Bogati told the Post.

The lack of empathy and hoarding of oxygen cylinders have roused ire on social media.

"Someone at Teaching needed an oxygen cylinder last week.

@Ravimemoirs came to the rescue. The covid patient was discharged from hospital & is recovering well. Ravi Singh, flooded with oxygen requests, sent her a text message requesting the cylinder back, yesterday. No response. He called her today. They didn't take the call. Apparently, she hasn't used the oxygen BUT the family - an upper middle class working for INGOs in Kathmandu - refuses to return the cylinder saying they might need it. Look at humanity." wrote a Twitter user.

"People may be hoarding cylinders as until some days ago it was difficult to get oxygen due to the government decision," said Dr Sher Bahadur Pun, chief of the Clinical Research Unit at Sukraraj Tropical and Infectious Disease Hospital

He was referring to an earlier government decision as per which the Covid-19 Crisis Management Centre was allocating cylinders to hospitals and hospitals were turning away patients since the allocation was not enough.

ygen cylinder which costs between Rs15,000 and Rs20,000. Nepal Police has also collected over 9,000 oxygen cylinders so far in different parts of the country

"Oxygen cylinders kept at homes or in stock at different factories, gas welding workshops, stores, godowns and other sites for purposes other than health are being collected," said Senior Superintendent Basanta Bahadur Kunwar, spokesperson for the Nepal Police.

But no matter how many cylinders are available, there may be shortages if people hoard them.

According to Pun, only critical patients need oxygen and if they don't get it on time, it could cost their people lives too.

"Hoarding cylinders can create artificial shortages, which could cost many people's lives," Pun told the Post. "The demand for oxygen and cylinders is high even now and if people started hoarding cylinders, it could prove

Politics still pack a punch(line) for Iranian-American comic

EMIRATES (AP): For Iranian-American MazJobrani, a stand-up show in Dubai marked the first time he's been in front of a major live audience overseas since the start of the coronavirus pandemic — and he feels it.

"Doing stand-up comedy is kind of like going to the gym — you have to get up on stage five, 10 times a week," said Jobrani, sitting in a Dubai hotel overlooking BurjKhalifa, the world's tallest building. "You have to keep going or the muscles are going to be rusty."

Jobrani had a calm demeanor during a recent interview with The Associated Press. It was a far cry from the exaggerated expressions and dancing he's known for

DUBAI, UNITED ARAB in his performance.

Taking to the stage at the recent Dubai Comedy Festival, Jobrani broke into an Iranian dance routine to one of DuaLipa's hit pop songs, drawing laughter from an audience eager to be out as the coronavirus pandemic still rages across much of the world. The United Arab Emirates has one of the world's highest per-capita vaccination rates and its economy largely has reopened. Being on stage has

become a luxury for comedians, Jobrani said, with some not being able to perform for over a year. After venues shut down last year, extra creativity was required. First, Jobrani started doing shows on Instagram, updating his fans on

what he did daily during the lockdown, or doing workouts using random objects.

Then he tried drive-in shows, which posed the same problem for standup comedy as online video calls: "You don't hear their laughter," he said. "You need to remind them: 'If you like what I'm saying, if you like the joke, please honk," he recounted. "So people would honk at you, you tell a joke (and) they would honk at you."

In some U.S. states, he performed at outdoor venues to a limited capacity audience. At others he performed indoors. In Arizona and Florida he performed in comedy clubs, where he said he felt nervous because it was before the

vaccine was rolled out.

"Comedians need interaction — we're best in a room, with an audience, laughing, talking," he said. "And this remote world took that away from us but again I think we adapted, a lot of people adapted."

Jobrani, originally from Iran, moved to California at age 6 with his family. Like many Iranians they had fled the country's 1979 Islamic Revolution. He grew up in the San Francisco area.

His acting credits begin just after the Sept. 11 attacks with a major role in the American action series "24," in which he played a member of an Afghan militant group hoping to detonate a nuclear bomb in Los Angeles.



DHAKA, 31 MAY [AFP]: Several thousand Rohingyas staged "unruly" protests Monday against living conditions on a cyclone-prone island off Bangladesh where they were moved from vast camps on the mainland, police said.

Since December, Bangladesh has shifted 18,000 out of a planned 100,000 refugees to the low-lying silt island of Bhashan Char from the Cox's Bazar region, where some 850,000 people live in squalid and cramped conditions.

Most of them had fled a brutal military offensive in neighbouring Myanmar in 2017 that United Nations (UN) investigators concluded was executed with "genocidal intent".

Monday's protest involved up to 4,000 people, police said, and coincided with an inspection visit by officials from the refugee agency, United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR).

"The Rohingyas, who are there, became unruly the moment the UNHCR representatives landed (on the island) by helicopter today," local police chief Alamgir Hossain told

Serena, Federer roll back years at French Open

PARIS (AP): The Latest on the French Open (all times local):11:00 a.m. Evergreen 39-year-olds Serena Williams and Roger Federer will be attempting to roll back the years on Day 2 of the French Open, where firstround play is underway on the sun-kissed clay courts and Iga Swiatek will begin the defense of her title.

Federer, the oldest player in men's singles this year, is scheduled for the third match on Court Philippe Chatrier. It will the first Grand Slam match since the 2020 Australian Open for the holder of 20 major titles, making a comeback from double surgery on his right knee.

Federer plays Denis Istomin from Uzbekistan. Istomin reached the main draw via the qualifying competition. He has not advanced beyond the second round in 10 previous Roland Garros appearances. Federer is seeded eighth this year.

Williams plays after Federer vs. Istomin, in the last match on Philippe Chatrier, not scheduled to start before 9 p.m. Matches at last year's tournament — held exceptionally in autumn — also stretched late into the night on newly floodlit courts. But scheduled night sessions are a novelty this year at Roland Garros.

Williams. chasing a record-tying 24th Grand Slam singles title, plays Irina-Camelia Begu from Romania. Begu's best result in nine previous appearances in Paris was reaching the fourth round in 2016.

Swiatek opens her title defense against Kaja Juvan of Slovenia, in the first match on Chatrier. Swiatek, who turned 20 on Monday, didn't drop a set on her way to victory



Australian softball squad flies to Japan for Olympic camp

SYDNEY (AP): Australia's Olympic softball squad left Sydney bound for Japan on Monday and will be among the earliest arrivals for the Tokyo Games.

The so-called Aussie Spirit will be in camp in Ota City, north of Tokyo, and will narrow the squad down from 23 to 15 ahead of their opening Olympic game against host Japan on July 21 — two days before the official opening ceremony.

The softball squad will be arriving at a time of mounting pressure on Japanese organizers, with polls in Japan showing a majority of people want the Olympics delayed again or canceled because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Fans from abroad have already been barred from attending the Olympics, and there's increasing speculation that games will be held in empty stadiums.

A state of emergency in Tokyo, Osaka and other prefectures was last week extended until June 20 as COVID-19 cases continue to put the medical system under strain.



Cancellation pressure grows daily on Tokyo organizers and the International Olympic Committee as more questions arise about the risks of bringing 15,000 Olympic and Paralympic athletes from more than 200 countries and territories

into Japan. The IOC says more than 80% of athletes and staff staying in the Olympic Village on Tokyo Bay will be vaccinated. They are expected to remain largely in a bubble at the village and at venues.

Australia Softball chief executive David Pryles said the squad, which hasn't played international opposition since February 2020, would be taking the "utmost care" in terms of keeping themselves and the public safe.

"All staff and players heading to Japan today are fully vaccinated thanks to the Olympic Australian Committee," Pryles said. "They'll also be undergoing stringent testing and checks as soon as they land at the airport and throughout their camp and (the) Olympics."

Pryles said player movements would be restricted to one level of the team hotel in Ota, which would inand gym work, and the stadium where they'll play a series of games against local professional teams and two games against Japan's national

"We're incredibly grateful the people of Ota City and their government for hosting the squad who will respect the restrictions placed upon us," he said.

Nets rout Celtics, Boston fan throws bottle at Kyrie Irving

BOSTON (AP): The Boston Celtics opened up to full capacity just in time for the local fans to jeer and swear — and worse — at Kyrie Irving every time he touched the ball.

It might have been their last chance.

Irving had 39 points and 11 rebounds to quiet the first post-pandemic full house at the TD Garden. and Kevin Durant scored 42 points to give the Brooklyn Nets a 141-126 victory over Boston on Sunday night and a 3-1 lead in the firstround playoff series.

Afterward, as Irving walked off the court he was nearly hit by a bottle thrown from the stands. Irving and Nets guard Tyler Johnson turned to the stands and pointed; police surrounded a man in a Kevin Garnett jersey before leading him out in handcuffs.

"Fans have got to grow up at some point," Durant said. "I know that being in the house for a year and a half with the pandemic has got a lot of people on edge, has got a lot of people stressed out. But when you come to these games you've got to realize: These men are human. We're not animals. We're not in the circus.

"You coming to the game is not all about you as a fan. So have some respect for the game. Have some respect for the human beings. And have some respect for yourself. Your mother wouldn't be proud of you throwing water bottles at basketball players, or spitting on players or tossing popcorn. So grow the (expletive) up and enjoy the game," he said. "It's bigger than you."

The incident mirrored others in which a Philadelphia fan threw popcorn at Wizards star Russell Westbrook and one in New York spit at Atlanta's been banned from their respective arenas.

A spokeswoman for the TD Garden said Boston Police arrested one person Sunday night "for throwing an object."

"We have zero tolerance for violations of our guest code of conduct," spokeswoman Tricia McCorkle said. "And the guest is subject to a lifetime ban from TD Gar-

But Irving said he didn't think banning or even arresting unruly fans would be enough to solve the problem, ascribing it to "underlying racism and treating people like they're in a human zoo."

"People feel very entitled out here," said Irving, who played for the Celtics from 2017-19 and said last week he experienced racism during his time in the city.

"As a Black man playing in the NBA, dealing with a lot of this stuff, it's fairly difficult. You never know what's going to happen," he said. "It's just unacceptable for that stuff to be happening. But we move on."

"One bad seed doesn't mean that the whole fruit is poisoned," Celtics guard Marcus Smart said. "Our fans have been great. We just had a knucklehead do something knucklehead-ish and it got taken care of,

James Harden added 23 points and a career postseason-high 18 assists for Brooklyn. Game 5 is in New York on Tuesday night, when the Nets will try to advance to the Eastern Conference semifinals for the first time since 2014.

The 104 points scored by Durant, Irving and Harden tied an NBA playoff record for three teammates set by Boston's John Havlicek, Jo Jo White and Dave Cowens in 1973 and matched in 1986 by Dominique Wilkins, Randy Whitman and Spud Webb.

Brooklyn coach Steve Nash said he wasn't surprised Irving bounced back after scoring 16 points on 6-for-17 shooting in the Game 3 loss on Friday.

"It's Kyrie Irving. He didn't have a great game last time out. My money's on him any time after a performance he had," Nash said. "I loved his will, to take some of this adversity and have a great game."

Jayson Tatum scored 40 points for the Celtics, following up his 50-point effort in a Game 3 victorv. But with Jaylen Brown and Kemba Walker out with injuries, Tatum couldn't save the season on his own.

Smart had 16 points and nine assists for the Celtics, who reached the Eastern Conference finals in three of the previous four seasons.

After dropping the first two games in Brooklyn, the Celtics were hoping their home crowd would help them make a series of it. Tatum delivered one win in front of a quarter-capacity crowd on Friday, before the COVID-19 restrictions were lifted as of Satur-

The Bruins had 17,400 for their playoff game against the Islanders on Saturday — the biggest crowd in the NHL this season. The Celtics left several rows around Trae Young. Both have the benches empty on Sunday and officially announced a sellout crowd of 17,226, about 1,500 fewer than the building's official capacity.

The fans — most of

them attending their first home playoff game in more than two years gave Durant the New York Yankees treatment in pregame warmups, chanting his name derisively and cheering for each missed practice shot. They were even foul-mouthed toward Irving, who professed his love for Boston and the Celtics before opting out of his contract in 2019 to join the Nets.

"We know how these people here are in Boston. We know how passionate they are about Kyrie in particular — they're still upset at him," Durant said. "That's no reason for them to act childish. Glad we got the 'W.' Hopefully, we don't have to come back here this year."

China easing birth limits further to cope with aging society

BEIJING (AP): China's ruling Communist Party said Monday it will ease birth limits to allow all couples to have three children instead of two in hopes of slowing the rapid aging of its population, which is adding to strains on the economy and society.

The ruling party has enforced birth limits since 1980 to restrain population growth but worries the number of working-age people is falling too fast while the share over age 65 is rising. That threatens to disrupt its ambitions to transform China into a prosperous consumer society and global technology leader.

A ruling party meeting led by President Xi Jinping decided to introduce "measures to actively deal with the aging population," the official Xinhua News Agency said. It said leaders agreed "implementing the policy of one couple can have three children and supporting measures are conducive to improving China's population structure."

Leaders also agreed China needs to raise its retirement age to keep more people in the workforce and improve pension and health services for the elderly, Xinhua said.

Restrictions that limited most couples to one child were eased in 2015 to allow two, but the total number of births fell



further, suggesting rule changes on their own have little impact on the

Couples say they are put off by high costs of raising a child, disruption to their jobs and the need to look after elderly parents.

Comments on social media Monday complained the change does nothing to help young parents with medical bills, low incomes and grueling work schedules known popularly as "996," or 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. six days a week.

"Every stage of the problem hasn't been solved," said a post on the popular Sina Weibo blog service signed Tchaikovsky. "Who will raise the baby? Do you have time? I go out early and get back late. Kids don't know what their parents look like."

Another, signed Hyeongmok, joked bitterly: "Don't worry about aging. Our generation won't live long.

China, along with Thailand and some other Asian economies, faces what economists call the challenge of whether they can get rich before they get old.

The Chinese population of 1.4 billion already was expected to peak later this decade and start to decline. Census data released May 11 suggest that is happening faster than expected, adding to burdens on underfunded pension and health systems and cutting the number of future workers available to support a growing retiree group.

The share of working-age people 15 to 59 in the population fell to 63.3% last year from 70.1% a decade earlier. The group aged 65 and older grew to 13.5% from 8.9%.

French magistrates question fugitive auto magnate in Beirut

BEIRUT (AP): A team of French investigators began questioning ex-Nissan boss Carlos Ghosn in Beirut on Monday over suspicions of financial misconduct, Lebanese

judicial officials said. The meeting marks the first opportunity for the auto magnate-turned-fugitive to defend himself against French allegations of financial misconduct since his 2018 bombshell arrest in Japan and escape to Lebanon a year later.

The questioning at the Palace of Justice in Beirut — expected to last several days — was attended by members of the Lebanese judiciary, the officials said. They said seven French judges, most of them investigative magistrates and a prosecutor, were taking part in the questioning, which was attended by Lebanese prosecutor Imad Qabalan.

The officials spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity in line with regulations.

Ghosn is campaigning



in France after Iapanese accusations triggered scrutiny of his activities there. In a wide ranging interview with the AP last week, he said he hopes the visit by French investigators to Lebanon will be his first real opportunity to defend himself. He also said he had much more confidence in the French legal system than the Japanese system he had fled.

Ghosn has not so far been charged with anything in France, but could be, given preliminary charges of fraud, corruption, money laundering, misuse of company assets, or aggravated breach of trust.

The French investigators are looking into

multiple legal challenges parties Ghosn threw at — complete with period costumes and copious Champagne — as the head of the Renault-Nissan car alliance, as well as 11 million euros in spending on private planes and events arranged by a Dutch holding company, and subsidies to a car dealership in Oman.

Ghosn told the AP he has done nothing wrong and hopes the investigations are eventually dropped.

Ghosn was arrested in Japan in November 2018 on accusations of financial misconduct and was kept in solitary confinement for months without being allowed to speak with his wife. Monday's interro gation comes days after Ghosn was questioned by French investigators as a witness in a different case — a probe over Renault's pollutant emissions, according to two Lebanese officials.

Renault, along with other carmakers, is facing a probe that dates back to 2017 over cheating emission tests, a charge the company denies. The probe follows earlier investigations by French anti-fraud authorities who found abnormally high emissions from some of Renault's diesel engineered cars.

In post-pandemic Europe, migrants will face digital fortress

PEPLO, GREECE (AP): As the world begins to travel again, Europe is sending migrants a loud message:

Stay away! Greek border police are firing bursts of deafening noise from an armored truck over the frontier into Turkey. Mounted on the vehicle, the longrange acoustic device, or "sound cannon," is the size of a small TV set but can match the volume of a jet engine.

It's part of a vast array of physical and experimental new digital barriers being installed and tested during the quiet months of the coronavirus pandemic at the 200-kilometer (125mile) Greek border with Turkey to stop people entering the European Union illegally.

A new steel wall, similar to recent construction on the U.S.-Mexico border, blocks commonly-used crossing points along the Evros River that separates the two countries.

Nearby observation towers are being fitted with long-range cameras, night vision, and multiple sensors. The data will be sent to control centers to flag suspicious movement using artificial intelligence analysis.

"We will have a clear 'pre-border' picture of what's happening," Police Maj. Dimonsthenis Kamargios, head of the region's border guard authority, told the Associated Press.

The EU has poured 3 billion euros (\$3.7 billion) into security tech research following the refugee crisis in 2015-16, when more than 1 million people — many escaping wars in Syria, Iraq and Afghanistan fled to Greece and on to other EU countries.

The automated surveillance network being built on the Greek-Turkish border is aimed at detecting migrants early and deterring them from crossing, with river and land patrols using searchlights and longrange acoustic devices.

Key elements of the network will be launched by the end of the year, Kamargios said. "Our task is to prevent migrants from entering the country illegally. We need modern equipment and tools to do that."

Researchers at universities around Europe, working with private firms, have developed futuristic surveillance and verification technology, and tested more than a treating foreign nationdozen projects at Greek borders.

AI-powered lie detectors and virtual border-guard interview bots have been piloted, as well as efforts to integrate satellite data with footage from drones on land, air, sea and underwater. Palm scanners record the unique vein pattern in a person's hand to use as a biometric identifier, and the makers of live camera reconstruction technology promise to erase foliage virtually, exposing people hiding near border areas.

Testing has also been conducted in Hungary, Latvia and elsewhere along the eastern EU perimeter.

The more aggressive migration strategy has been advanced by European policymakers over the past five years, funding deals with Mediterranean countries outside the bloc to hold migrants back and transforming the EU border protection agency, Frontex, from a coordination mechanism to a full-fledged multinational security force.

But regional migration deals have left the EU exposed to political pressure from neighbors.

Earlier this month, several thousand migrants crossed from Morocco into the Spanish enclave of Ceuta in a single day, prompting Spain to deploy the army. A similar crisis unfolded on the Greek-Turkish border and lasted three weeks last year.

Greece is pressing the EU to let Frontex patrol outside its territorial waters to stop migrants reaching Lesbos and other Greek islands, the most common route in Europe for illegal crossing in recent years.

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North accuses US of hostility for S. Korean missile decision

SEOUL, SOUTH KOREA (AP): North Korea said Monday the U.S. allowing South Korea to build more powerful missiles was an example of the U.S.'s hostile policy against the North, warning that it could lead to an "acute and instable situation" on the Korean Peninsula.

It's North Korea's first response to the May 21 summit between the leaders of the United States and South Korea, during which the U.S. ended decades-long restrictions that capped South Korea's missile development and allowed its ally to develop weapons with unlimited ranges.

The accusation of U.S. policy being hostile to North Korea matters because it said it won't return to talks and would enlarge its nuclear arsenal

as long as U.S. hostility persists. But the latest statement was still attributed to an individual commentator, not a government body, suggesting North Korea may still want to leave room for potential diplomacy with the Biden administration.

"The termination step is a stark reminder of the U.S. hostile policy toward (North Korea) and its shameful double-dealing," Kim Myong Chol, an international affairs critic, said, according to the official Korean Central News Agency. "It is engrossed in confrontation despite its lip-service to dialogue."

"The U.S. is mistaken, however. It is a serious blunder for it to pressurize (North Korea) by creating asymmetric imbalance in and around the Korean

Peninsula as this may lead to the acute and instable situation on the Korean Peninsula now technically at war," he

The United States had previously barred South Korea from developing a missile with a range of longer than 800 kilometers (500 miles) out of concerns about a regional arms race. The range is enough for a South Korean weapon to strike all of North Korea but is short of hitting potential key targets in other neighbors like China and Japan.

Some South Korean observers hailed the end of the restrictions as restoring military sovereignty, but others suspected the U.S. intent was to boost its ally's military capability amid a rivalry with China.

The commentator Kim accused Washington of trying to spark an arms race, thwart North Korean development and deploy intermediate-range missiles targeting countries near North Korea.

The South Korean government said it "prudently watches" North Korea's reaction, but Unification Ministry spokeswoman Lee Jong-joo wouldn't comment otherwise, since the remarks were attributed to an individual, not an official statement from the North Korean government.

The North Korean statement comes as the Biden administration shapes a new approach on North Korea amid long-dormant talks over the North's nuclear program. During their summit, Biden and South Korean President Moon Jae-in said a new U.S. policy re-

view on North Korea "takes a calibrated and practical approach that is open to and will explore diplomacy" with the

U.S. officials have suggested Biden would adopt a middle ground policy between his predecessors — Donald Trump's direct dealings with North Korean leader Kim Jong Un and Barack Obama's "strategic patience." Some experts say Biden won't likely provide North Korea with major sanctions relief unless it takes concrete denuclearization steps first.

The North Korean statement criticized the Biden administration's review indirectly, saying the new policy was viewed by other countries "as just

Ex-'Tarzan' actor among 7 plane crash victims in Tennessee

SMYRNA, TENN. (AP):Investigators on Sunday continued searching for the bodies of seven people believed killed in the crash a day earlier of a small jet into a Tennessee lake, including an actor who portrayed Tarzan in a 1990s television series.

Rutherford County Fire Rescue Capt. John Ingle said in a statement Sunday that recovery efforts were ongoing at Percy Priest Lake near Smyrna. He said efforts also were focused on examining a half mile-wide debris field in the lake.

County officials identified the victims in a news release late Saturday as Brandon Hannah, Gwen S. Lara, William J. Lara, David L. Martin, Iennifer J. Martin, Jessica Walters and Jonathan Walters, all of Brentwood, Tennessee. Their names were released after family members had been notified.

Gwen Shamblin Lara founded the Remnant Fel-

wood in 1999 and wrote a faith-based weight loss book. Her husband of nearly three years, known as Joe Lara, was an actor featured in the TV series "Tarzan: The Epic Adventures."

The Federal Aviation Administration said the Cessna C501 plane was heading

from nearby Smyrna Rutherford County Airport to Palm Beach International Airport when it crashed Saturday morning. Authorities did not release registration information for the plane.

Smyrna is located about 20 miles (32 kilometers) southeast of Nashville. Percy Priest Lake is a reservoir created by the J. Percy Priest Dam. It is a popular spot for boating and fishing.

"With dive teams in the water, we are strongly urging civilian boaters to stay away from the public safety boats," Ingle said.

The National Transportation Safety Board had a lead investigator at the site.

Fueling box office rebound, 'Quiet Place' opens with \$58.5M

NEW YORK (AP): Moviegoing increasingly looks like it didn't die during the pandemic. It just went into hibernation.

John Krasinski's thriller sequel "A Quiet Place Part II" opened over the Memorial Day weekend to a pandemic-best \$48.4 million, according to studio estimates Sunday. Including the Monday holiday, the studio forecasts the film will gross \$58.5 million in North America. It added another \$22 million in ticket sales overseas.

The film's performance cheered a movie industry that has been punished and transformed by the pandemic. Paramount Pictures' "A Quiet Place Part II," which was on the cusp of opening in March 2021 before theaters shut, was the first big film this year — and one of the only larger budget COVIDera releases beside Christopher Nolan's "Tenet" — to open exclusively in theaters.

Chris Aronson, distribution chief for Paramount, called the opening "an unqualified success."

"It's a huge sigh of a relief and a sense of optimism for sure," Aronson said. "Movies, moviegoing, movie theaters aren't dead. Yes, they've been threatened but they're proving once again that they're resilient and that people do want to have that communal

Many studios have trotted out hybrid release plans during the pandemic, debuting films simultaneously in the home. The Walt Disney Co. did that this weekend with its live-action PG-13

Cruella De Vil prequel, "Cruella," making it available to Disney+ subscribers for \$30. In theaters, it grossed \$21.3 million, Disney said, and an estimated \$26.4 million over the four-day weekend. "Cruella" also added \$16.1 million in 29 international territories. Disney didn't say how much the film made on the company's streaming plat-

"A Quiet Place II" will also turn to streaming after 45 days in theaters when it becomes available on Paramount+. One clear result of the pandemic is that the theatrical window has shrunk, probably permanently. Three months was once the customary length of a movie's run in theaters. The year's previous best debut belonged to Warner Bros.' "Godzilla vs. Kong," which opened with \$32.2 million, or \$48.5 million over its first five days, while simultaneously streaming on HBO Max.

strategies between "A Quiet Place Part II" and "Cruella" offered a test case for Hollywood. How much does a day-and-date release cost a movie like "Cruella" in ticket sales? Is it worth it? Without knowing how much "Cruella" benefitted Disney+, a true comparison isn't possible. But the strong returns for the theater-only "A Quiet Place Part II" are telling, says Paul Dergarabedian, senior media analyst for data firm Comscore. He called it a "pivotal weekend" for the movie industry that proved predictions of the movie theater's demise "flat-out wrong."

"That 'Quiet Place Part II' did so well makes a strong case that a theatrical-first release for a big movie is the way to go," Dergarabedian said. "This is the best possible news for an industry that's been dealing with probably the most profoundly challenging chapter in the history of the movie theater."

The debut of "A Quiet Place Part II" was much watched throughout Hollywood as the kickoff to its delayed summer movie season. After largely sitting out the pandemic, or diverting to streaming platforms, a lineup of blockbusters are again queuing up. On tap are Warner Bros.' "In the Heights," Universals' "F9" and Disney's "Black Widow."

Last week. Universal Pictures' ninth installment in the "Fast & Furious" franchise, "F9," opened with \$162 million in ticket sales in eight international markets, and \$135 million in China alone. due to pandemic. The contrasting release In its second weekend, "F9," which opens in North America on June 25, raced toward \$230 million worldwide.

"A Quiet Place Part II" had already had its red-carpet premiere in March last year, and spent some of its marketing budget. But it opened remarkably in line with predictions of how many tickets it would sell before the onset of the pandemic. In the intervening months, Paramount sold off many of its films to streamers — "Coming 2 America," "The Trial of the Chicago 7" — but Krasinski and the studio felt strongly that the hushed intensity of "A Quiet Place Part II" worked best on the big screen.

In an interview ahead of the film's release, Krasinski said a theatrical release was "non-negotiable." And Krasinski worked hard to stoke excitement, traveling the country in the week leading up to release to surprise moviegoers. Still, given the circumstances, he had little idea whether audiences would come out.

"As bizarre as the entire year has been is how bizarre whatever opening weekend is," Krasinski said. "I don't really know what it is anymore."

In the end, "A Quiet Place Part II" performed a lot like how the first one did. That 2018 hit, which ultimately grossed \$340 million globally on a \$17 million budget, launched with \$50.2 million in North American ticket sales. Sequels usually do better than the original but "Part II" had far more challenges

Rich Gelfond, chief executive of IMAX, where "A Quiet Place Part II" earned \$4.1 million domestically, called the film "the first domestic release this year to cross the threshold from 'great opening weekend given the pandemic' to 'great opening weekend, period."

Memorial Day weekend, usually one of the busiest for theaters, still didn't look like it normally does at the movies. Total box office exceeded \$80 million but that's about a third of the holiday weekend's normal business. Last Memorial Day, when nearly all operating theaters were drive-ins, ticket sales amounted to \$842,000, according to Comscore.
