The State Level Advisory Committee was no-tified in July earlier this year following directions of the Supreme Court and as per guidelines received from the National Disaster Management Disaster Authority on School Safe-

The Chief Secretary further directed that fire extinguishers be installed in all the schools and structural safety of the school building to be included as one of the preconditions by HRDD while granting recogni tion to any private school.

He also desired that more training on pre-paredness to be imparted to school teachers in association with NDMA, preferably at the state level.

A bench headed by Chief Justice Ranjan Gogoi said that the CVC's

inquiry into the allegations made in the August 24 note/letter of the Cabinet Secretary with regard to Verma would be supervised by retired apex court judge Justice A K Patnaik "We make it clear that

entrustment of supervision of on-going enquiry by the CVC to a former judge of this court is one exception which has been felt necessary by this court in the pe-culiar facts of this case and should not be understood to be casting any reflection on any authority of the Government of India," said the bench, also comprising Justices

S K Kaul and K M Joseph. It further said that a

list of all the decisions taken by Rao between "October 23, 2018 and up to this hour including decisions with regard to transfer of investigations, change of investigating officer(s) etc will be furnished to the court in a sealed cover on or before November 12, 2018 whereafter orders as would be appropriate will be passed by the court."

The court made it clear that from now on Rao, who is a Joint Director of CBI, would only perform the routine tasks.

"Rao who has been

entrusted with the task

of looking after the duties of the Director of the CBI by the impugned order dated October 23, 2018 of the Secretary, Department of Personnel & Training, shall, as of from now, not take any policy decision(s) or any major decision(s) and will only perform the routine tasks that are essential to keep the CBI functional," the bench said.

During the hearing, the court at first remarked that decisions taken by Rao since October 23 are not be implemented but later it refrained and ordered that it would decide on that aspect only after perusing the decisions

The bench sought responses from the Centre and CVC on the plea of Verma who has also sought a stay on the Centre's order giving interim charge of his post to Rao. However, this prayer was not raised during the hearing.

The bench also dealt with the separate plea by NGO, Common Cause, which has sought a probe by special investigation team against CBI officers including Asthana, and issued notices to the Centre, CBI, CVC, Asthana, Verma and Rao asking them to respond to it by November 12.

"The enquiry in re-

spect of the allegations made in the note/letter of the Cabinet Secretary dated August 24, 2018 as regards the present Di-rector, Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) Alok Verma shall be completed by the Central Vigilance Commission (CVC) within a period of two weeks from today," the bench noted in its order.

Gehlot said the deci-

director was "illegal".

"The chief justice of India, the leader of the opposition and the prime minister can together take a decision to remove him, but not the prime minister alone," he told reporters.

"Our demand is to reinstate the CBI director...The prime minister should tender an apology to the nation for destroy-ing the image of the premier investigating agen-cy," Gehlot added.

The government has strongly defended its decision, saying it was "abso-lutely essential" to maintain the CBI's institutional integrity and the move was based on recommendations by the Central Vig-

ilance Commission.

The Congress' protests in the national cap-ital were replicated in other parts of the country.

State Congress lead-ers led demonstrations in their regions against what

the Congress described as the "illegal, unconstitutional and illegitimate removal of the CBI director by the Modi-Shah duo that has shamed India and its premier investigative agency".

In Patna, for instance, Congress workers, including scores of women sat on a dharna outside the gate of the CBI office at Bailey Road, carrying

Meghalaya court acquits B'desh ex-minister in trespassing case

SHILLONG, OCT 26 (PTI): A court here on Friday acquitted former Bangladesh minister Salahuddin Ahmed who was arrested three years ago for allegedly tresspassing into Indian territory.

The trial in the case had concluded in August in the court of Judicial Magistrate D G Kharshiing, who reserved October 26 as the date for pronouncement of the judgment.
"My client has been

acquitted of all charges as the prosecution failed to provide any evidence against him," Ahmed's legal counsel S P Mahanta

The court has also directed the Meghalaya Police to deport Ahmed to his "country of origin", but the process will take some time, he said.

Altogether 11 witnesses, including police officers, were examined during the course of the trial, which lasted for over three years.

Bangladesh Nation-

al Party (BNP) leader, Ahmed, was found loitering at Golflinks area of Shillong on May 11, 2015, reportedly two months after he went

missing in Dhaka.

The police arrested him on the charge of trespassing into the country without valid documents. He was hospitalized soon after as the officers apparently found him "mentally unstable".

shifted to North Eastern Indira Gandhi Region-al Institute of Health and Medical Science at Mawdiangdiang near here, as he complained of "chest pain".

The court of Additional Deputy Commissioner (Judicial) B Maw-

riehad granted him bail in June, 2015, on a bond of Rs 2 lakh, under three conditions -- he should not leave the jurisdiction of the court (Shillong), he should report at the office of East Khasi Hills superintendent of police, and appear before the court when summoned.

Ahmed, who had served as the commu-nications minister from 2001 to 2006, claimed he was abducted from Ban-gladesh and had no idea how he reached Shillong.

His family member too, corroborated claim and said the BNP leader was picked up from Dhaka's Uttara area on March 10, 2015.

fixed by this court," it said.

Asthana has also moved the Supreme Court with a separate petition in the matter. The bench told Attor-

ney General K K Venugopal, appearing for the Centre, that it would examine the matter and CVC's inquiry should be completed within 10 days under the supervision of a sitting apex court judge.
"We want to see pre-

liminary probe report in 10 days to decide wheth-er it requires further probe," the bench said.

Solicitor General Tushar Mehta, appearing for CVC, said the commission was under the process of conducting inquiry and keeping

Later, the court granted two weeks to CVCV to complete the inquiry.

Not Honking? Good!

Let's try and curtail mobile phone urges now

 D^{rive} out to any section of road in Sikkim where traffic cops are unlikely to spy on the driving habits of the hands controlling the wheels, and you are bound to come across drivers chatting away on their mobile phones. An occasional driver might have the hands-free option to service his telecom-dependence, but a majority will have a hand pressed to their ears to keep conversations going. The frequency of such sightings is unnerving, but the practice continues. As the town limits approach, so do the artful dodges to evade detection. And this is only one of the risks and irritations one suffers on Sikkim roads.

Driving into Gangtok is not an experience recom-nended for those short on patience. The windfall of EMI-option ownerships has littered the roads with more vehicles than can move unhindered on the capital's hemmed by buildings roads. For a highway, a national one at that, NH10 in Gangtok is ridiculously ambushed by bottlenecks in its course up the Gangtok hill, and any drive to town needs lurching and stalling through serpentine stretches of idling vehicles and groaning engines and moaning passengers. What is now noticeably missing from the experience is the harassment of near ceaseless honking by the more impatient drivers who used to believe that the horn helps clear jams. Well, they didn't, at least not in Sikkim, but the relative calm of reduced honking on Gangtok roads has made the traffic snarls slightly less stressful. This, largely thanks to the bordering on facetious sight of traffic police personnel who went to town to discourage honking. Initially, of course, like most things in Sikkim, it started with an outright ban. Drivers and commuters are not used to traffic cops making 'appeals', given that its reprimands or tough traffic management that they are normally seen doing, and it was perhaps for that reason that the placard effort was initially ei-ther not noticed, or suspected of being even a prank. But the uniform is a powerful medium to convey messages it seems, and thus, without any challans being cut or drivers embarrassed on the highway, the Gang-tok propensity to honk every time the vehicle ahead so much as slowed down, has been quelled. Of course, the occasional instinctive pressing of the horn still happens, but more and more drivers are learning to control their urge only because the cops have been strict.

The honking on Gangtok roads has come down for this reason and not because of a realisation that it is irritating, disturbing, unnecessary or [noise] pollution-causing, and with that is reinforced the dejection that despite everything, even etiquette, unfortunately, needs to be enforced. Since the traffic personnel have achieved so much so quickly for Gangtok and Sikkim's other towns, it is hoped that they also fashion some means of saving commuters from irresponsible driving common on Sikkim roads, the perpetually talking on phone syndrome requiring immediate attention. And this effort needs to move beyond the city roads and needs interventions along the otherwise not-po-

What Turkey's Erdoğan is seeking to gain in wake of Saudi journalist Jamal Khashoggi's murder

urkey's President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan initially referred to the disappearance of Saudi journalist Jamal Khashoggi on October 2 as "very, very upsetting". Three weeks later, he told the Turkish parliament that Khashoggi was killed in a premeditated and savage murder. Saudi Arabia has belatedly admitted that Khashoggi was mur-dered at its consulate in Istanbul, but has blamed a "rogue operation" and denied the involvement of the crown prince, Mohammed bin Salman.

Khashoggi's elimination on Turkish soil was a political trigger that may provide Erdoğan with ammunition against Saudi Arabia - his main rival for political leadership of the Muslim world. With Islam's two holiest cities of Mecca and Medina under their guardianship, the rul-ing Saud family boasts the title Custodians of the Two Holy Mosques and govern the Hajj and Umra, pilgrimages that all

Muslims are expected to make. Yet shortly after accusations about Khashoggi's alleged murder were drip-fed by Turk-ish authorities, Erdoğan spoke at a meeting with faith leaders as part of his bid to cement his religious legitimacy. He was quoted by Turkish agencies as saying that Turkey "is the only country that can lead the Muslim world".

From his 2002 election as prime minister to his current

presidency, Erdoğan has eroded Turkey's historically secular framework. The Islamisation of Tur-key has tilted it away from the West and toward the Middle East. Erdoğan "is focused on making Islam the centrepiece of Turkish politics and sees the country's foreign policy role as being primarily anti-Western", explains Soner Cagaptay of the Wash-

le Saudi Arabia's royal family may be custodians of the two holy mosques, Erdoğan is drawing on the glory of the Ottoman past, investing in the expansion of Ottoman ports that served as transit hubs for Mecca and Medina, while also increasing his leadership activities in the Organisation of Is-lamic Cooperation (OIC).

CROWN PRINCE'S IMAGE DAMAGED

In so doing, it's inevitable that Erdoğan will clash with Saudi Arabia's Mohammed bin Salman. Colloquially known as MBS, Saudi Arabia's crown prince presents Islam as a "sensible, simple religion that is being hijacked", arguing that his domestic reforms are an attempt to counter radicalisation and return Islam to a liberal stance. Domestic reform, however, is contrasted with disastrous military operations in Yemen and Syria, as MBS seeks to prove

his military might and leverage regional conflict to counter Iranian influence.

Despite the humanitarian costs of regional

battles, MBS has cultivated the image of a liberal young leader for Western audiences. So while Erdoğan pushes an Islamic Turkey to lead the Muslim world, MBS prefers courting the West while treating how he handles domestic affairs, whether through arrests or worse, as separate from his US and British alliances.

With the disappearance of Khashoggi, however, the liberal image palatable to Western audiences is under threat. The Washington Post, where



US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo met Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan in Ankara on October 17.

Khashoggi was a columnist, is now writing about the crown prince's "dark and bullying side". MBS is a split royal, friendly to the West but ruthless in the

The pattern is clear: MBS's Saudi Arabia uses reforms as cover to purge rivals of status and wealth. This was clear during the Ritz Carlton Roundup in November 2017, in which princes and investors were detained in a luxury hotel as part of an anti-corruption purge until agreeing to forego much of their assets. Other reforms serve to distract in-ternational media by letting women drive while female activists remain jailed.

Saudi Arabia has led the ongoing blockade of Qatar, which Turkey opposed. Turkey and Qatar's mutual investments are not the sole reason. Both countries maintain relations with Iran and support the Muslim Brotherhood, which Saudi Arabia regards as a threat to traditional monarchy.

Investors, sponsors and media partners of Sau-di Arabia's Future Investment Initiative conference, on 23-25 October in Riyadh have pulled out. The IMF has followed suit and even US President Donald Trump is being pressured by senators to nunish Saudi Arabia for Khashoggi's fate.

Erdoğan is moving quickly. As the Saudis cancelled their annual diplomatic reception in Washington, Erdoğan received US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo in Ankara. The meeting gave Turkey a chance to push its perspectives on Syria and its demands that the Kurdistan Workers Party, or PKK, abandon Syria's narrow Manbij region near key's border, a request the US has been slow to ac-

Having returned US pastor Andrew Brunson from Turkish imprisonment to US soil, Khashog-

gi's death and the pressure it is placing on Trump is providing Erdoğan with a springboard to gain a closer relationship with the United States while using the incident to deflect Saudi portrayals of Turkey as a security

> Erdoğan is using the Khashoggi incident to gain closer relations with the US and push Turkey's interests. On October 22, the Turkish press reported that Erdoğan and Trump shared a phone conversation and agreed that Saudi Arabia must come clean on all details of Khashoggi's

Yet Erdoğan's dreams of leading the Muslim world may not be realised by the Khashoggi affair. Saudi investment in Turkey at a time when the Turkish lira re-mains weak must be balanced nt with Erdogan's ambitions and rivalry. The OIC, headquartered in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia, has officially sided

with Saudi Arabia in the wake of the Khashoggi affair, praising the proposal of a joint Turkish-Saudi investigation and arguing that Riyadh is "above

suspicions".

The world seems to disagree with the notion that Riyadh is "above suspicions". However, com mentators have pointed to Iran as the main bene-ficiary of a Saudi exile's death on Turkish soil. With Saudi Arabia's reputation on the line, Riyadh is in no position to portray Iran as a threat to the region.
"Iran has repeatedly seized on Saudi miscalcu-

lations to gain leverage and protect itself from re-gional isolation," says Chatham House's Sanam Va-kil. While Saudi Arabia is cornered and the world distracted by the brutality of what happened to Khashoggi, Iran can continue quietly building its missile program, rework the nuclear agreement and sell its oil before US sanctions resume in Nonber. Tehran may even consider relations Saudi Arabia, its Sunni counterpart. After all, how many friends will Saudi Arabia have left?

The fear making Chinese women reluctant to have more children

Twas waiting in a lashioned cafe for Tang Xiaohe* in the Dongshimen district in Beijing Every bit of the décor in the café was waiting in a fashionable signalled the prosperity of China's capital city. So did the price of a cup of cappuccino.

Xiaohe is a 35-year-old mother-of-one who works in a large tourism company. She contacted me when I put a call out via WeChat seeking women born under China's one-child policy in the 1980s who were willing to talk about their transitions to employment and parenthood for my ongoing research. Xiaohe chose this café, which is two miles away from her office, to avoid any lunchtime haunts frequented by her col-

So far, I've interviewed 82 women, and I always ask them how many children they have – and if they want another one. Xiao-he gave a resounding no. But this was hardly a surprise. According to the National Bureau of Statistics, the overall birth rate increased by 0.9% between 2015 to 2016, after the end of the one-child policy in late 2015. Although there was a rise in second births in 2017, there is little prospect of a new baby boom now couples are allowed two children. Urban Chinese families no longer want more children

In recent months the Chinese overnment has even hinted that it may relax the current two-child policy even further as way to solve problems caused by an ageing population.

HEMMED IN

Women born under the one-child policy between 1980 1987 are the generation of Chinese nen in many years to be given an opportunity to have more than one child. Yet this is a generation sandwiched between the responsibilities of child rearing and looming old-age care elderly family members.

Xiaohe was born

and raised in a small county in Hebei, northern China. Like many girls of her generation, she passed China's gaokao uni-versity entrance exam with flying colours, went to university and subsequently worked in Beijing, which she now calls home. Like many generations before her, she manages the childcare for her sixyear-old daughter with help from her parents and in-laws and is committed to looking after them in old age. Looking after her daughter

top of a senior management role, challenging but manageable

But these are not the main reasons she gave me for not having another child. It was her fear.

Her fear of poisoned milk powder and of lead-covered toys. Her

ever-rising property value, the urban hukou or residency permit, and the associated benefits such as access to good-quality schools and healthcare. These so-called "pocketbook" factors keep them loyal to the state. The middle class tend to

resist social reforms that would



fear of dermatologically untested nappies, unsafe vaccines and child abuse in nurseries, followed by cover-ups. Under the glossy metropolitan lifestyle and outward apearance of having made it in the big city, Xiaohe confessed her anxiety and the worries which some-

times keep her awake at night.
It's the urban middle class who have been the main beneficiaries of China's economic growth. It has led to increasing personal income,

bring down the barriers between urban and rural citizens, between wealthy eastern and poorer west-ern regions, or would introduce changes to the education system that might undermine their privi-

BROKEN CHAIN OF TRUST

Underneath unquestioning support of the state, there is a pathological distrust in the ethics of businesses and manufacturers and the power of local institutions

scandals related to children's welfare. This trust deficit is best captured by a Chinese saying which translates as: "Don't get involved in anything not relating to my own interests and stay aloof like a lamppost from trouble." Instead, people of-ten mobilise their own

resources or networks to solve any problems. Xiaohe turned to a university friend who was studying in the UK and asked her to ship milk powder regularly from the UK. She also begged her relatives or friends to buy for-eign-made nappies when they travelled abroad. She paid much higher premium for all these products and also owed people for their help, known as "returning fa-

vours". Xiaohe explained that this was a common strategy taken by members of the middle class – to solve problems by dipping into their own pockets.

She thought money could make any problem disappear – until a recent vaccine scandal. Her daughter was given the standard vaccines for children against diphtheria tetanus, polio and hepatitis E made by the pharmaceutical company Changchun Changsheng. But in July 2018 it emerged hundreds of thousands of the vaccines were

'My daughter was vaccinated by this product. I was so angry but I am helpless. I thought I could avoid this. I avoided the nursery and the milk power. But there is no escape no matter how much mon-

ey you have."

She added: "Why do I want to bring another child in the world like this? You just cannot trust any one or anything."

The Chinese state has engineered one of the most successful economic transformations in the 20th century, keeping much of the population on-side in the pro-cess. Yet, it might have difficulty in mending the broken chain of trust between people and business, local institutions and society. The state can use every trick in the book to encourage Chinese citizens to have more children, either for the sake of the nation or for the nation's economy. But if couples are wor-ried that their children's welfare will be at risk, they won't see any point in having more children.

KOLKATA, OCT 26 (PTI): The Communist Party of India (CPI) has decided to suspend publication of its Bengali mouthpiece 'Kalantar' from next month due to financial constraints, a senior par-

ty leader said.

'Kalantar', first pub-lished as a daily newspaper in 1966, played a rital role in helping the CPI to expand its political base post the party's split which led to the formation of the Communist Party of India (Marxist) CPI(M) in 1964.

"Due to financial constraints, we have decided to suspend publication of 'Kalantar' from November one. It is not possible for us to run the newspaper by providing a heavy subsidy," CPI state sec-retary Swapan Banerjee told PTI.

"Earlier we used to get both state and central government advertisements. But for the last few years, adver-tisements have stopped coming from both the governments. It has only augmented our financial

problems," he said.

Banerjee said that
during its 52-year-old journey, the party was twice forced to suspend the publication of its

mouthpiece due to finan cial issues.

"Earlier also we had to close down the news-paper but we had, later on, bounced back and had reopened it. We hope this time too we would be able to reopen it." he said.

Earlier was a weekly newspaper since 1965.

A senior official of

information and cultural affairs department said government advertisements were being given careful consideration of various parameters including the budget of the government.

"The claim that just because they are not getting government advertisements they can't run a newspaper is ridic-ulous. How can a newspaper which is run by a private entity claim that government has to give them advertisements. It is the prerogative of the government to decide on it." he said.

Several calls and mes-sages to the Minister of State for Information and Cultural Affairs Indranil Sen went unanswered.



BUDAPEST (HUNGARY), OCT 25 (PTI): Pooja Dhanda became the fourth Indian wom an grappler and first in six years to win a medal at the World Championship, grabbing a bronze with a stunning 10-7 win over the 2017 European champion Grace Jacob Bullen, here on Thursday.

One of the two wrestlers in a medal contention, the 24-year-old Poo-ja executed a four-point throw in each of the two periods in the 57kg contest to deliver the best performance of her career.

It is second big medal for Pooja this season, having won a silver the nwealth Games in Gold Coast.

Tomar Only Alka (2006), Geeta (2012) and Babita Phogat (2012) have won bronze medals for India at the Worlds before Pooja's memorable medal victory.

It is India's second medal at the ongoing championship after Ba-jrang Punia's silver medal performance in the men's freestyle 65kg category

"It's a proud feeling for me. I have done my country proud with this



medal. I am very happy with this effort. In the beginning.I had a chance for a counter attack and I got a good lead. I was confident that I will pull it off," said an elated Poo-

Asked about her opponent, Pooja said she came prepared to tackle

WTO ministerial calls for reform, vows to fight protectionism

WASHINGTON, OCT 26 (PTI): Asserting that the current situation at the World Trade Organization is no longer sustainable, the Ottawa Ministerial on WTO reform Thursday vowed to fight against

Among other things the group comprising top trade officials of 12 countries and the European Union sought for urgent action to develop 21st century trade rules at the WTO.

"The current situation at the WTO is no longer sustainable. Our resolve for change must be matched with action: we will continue to fight protectionism; and we are committed politically to moving forward urgently on transparency, dispute settlement and developing 21st century trade rules at the WTO," said a joint communique issued by Ottawa Ministerial on WTO Reform

Ministers and Heads of Delegation representing a dozen "like-minded" WTO members and the Europe n Union met in Ottawa on October 24 and 25 to discuss ways to strengthen and modernise the world body, which of late has been at the receiving end

The meeting was chaired by Jim Carr, Can-ada's Minister of International Trade Diversification Other countries renresented in the group were Australia, Brazil, Chile, Japan, Kenya, Korea, Mexico, New Zealand, Norway, Singapore and Switzerland. The group is scheduled to meet next in January 2019. India, China, and the US are not part of the meeting.

Acknowledging that concerns that have been raised about the functioning of the dispute settlement system, the group said it is ready to work on solutions, while preserv-ing the essential features of the system and of its Appellate Body.
Asserting that WTO

must reinvigorate its nego tiating function, the group underscored the need to conclude negotiations on fisheries subsidies in 2019 consistent with instruc-tions from WTO Ministers at the 11th ministerial conference (MC11) held last year in Buenos Aires.

Expressing their concern with the overall re-cord of compliance by WTO members with their notification obligations, the group agreed that im-

wide Nations League.
So far, only a consortium featuring Japan's SoftBank that has offered 25 billion in guaranteed revenue has been identified.

But European soccer's federation remains a thorn in the side of Infantino, who wants council members on Friday to agree in principle to replace

Japan, China strike deals during Abe visit as ties improve

BEIJING, OCT 26 (AFP): Japan and China signed USD 2.6 billion in business deals and touted their warmer ties on Friday during a rare visit to Beijing by Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe as both face trade challenges from US President Donald Trump.

Premier Li Kegiang greeted Abe as Japan's flag flew outside the opulent Great Hall of the People across from Tiananmen Square, and they reviewed an honour guard before going inside for talks.

Relations between Asia's two biggest economies have improved in recent years after they sunk to new lows in 2012 when Tokyo "nation-alised" disputed islands

claimed by Beijing.

Addressing a joint press conference, Abe said that the two leaders had agreed to "play a constructive role for the sake of this region's peace and prosperity".

"I believe active trade will deepen ties between Japanese and Chinese peoples further," he said.

"Now, international conditions are unstable, and uncertainties have increased," Li said, adding that the countries' eco nomic cooperation would "henefit the development of global free trade

The relationship has rapidly warmed up as Trump has slapped massive tariffs on China while also targeting Japanese exports in his effort to cut US trade deficits, despite touting his personal bonds with Abe and Chi-

nese President Xi Jinping. Abe travelled with Abe travelled with nearly 1,000 delegates from Japanese compa-nies, who struck 500 deals worth a total of USD 2.6 billion, Li said, without providing details.

The companies are eager for increased access to China's massive market, while Beijing is interested in Japanese technology and corporate know-how.

"Though the US is quite an influential factor in China-Japan ties, the effect is limited," China's na-tionalistic Global Times said in an editorial.

"If Beijing and Tokyo intend to plan their future bilateral relationship based on Washing-ton's attitude, they will only get lost," the staterun daily said.

The two leaders also oversaw the signing of several political agreements, including a cur-rency swap deal and a mechanism to avoid accidental clashes between their militaries.

Knife-wielding woman injures 14 children at China kindergarten

BEIJING, OCT 26 (PTI): A woman armed with kitchen knife on Friday attacked children at a kindergarten in China's southwestern city of Chongqing, injuring at least 14 of them before she was stopped by teachers and guards, in the latest such incident on children in the country.

Police in the Chongqing city said, the children were slashed by the 39-year-old woman about 9:30 a.m. (local time) as they were re-turning to class after their



morning exercises at the Yudong New Century Kindergarten in the Banan district, police said.

The injured children were all sent to hospitals for treatment. There was

no immediate word on their condition.

The woman, identified only by her surname Liu, has been arrested. Hong Kong-based South China Morning Post quoted a local state-run Chongqing Broadcasting Group as saying.

The motive behind attack is unclear, though some reports on social media say the woman had a grievance against the government.

A mobile recording shared by the broadcast er showed the alleged suspect being dragged away by police, as well as an injured Clinspital stretcher.

Videos circulating an injured child on a hos-

on Chinese social media showed small children bleeding from severe cuts to their faces at the entrance of the kindergarten as stunned adults looked on.

A screenshot of WeChat group said "a woman and her husband were arguing, and to take revenge against society she stabbed the children at the kindergarten with a knife", the report said.

A video from a hospital in the Chongqing showed adults wailing in grief as children covered in blood are rushed from ambulances into the building. In another video, a child with his head in bandages is rushed

Saeed-led JuD, FIF no more on list of banned outfits in Pakistan: Report

SAJJAD HUSSAIN ISLAMABAD, OCT 26 (PTI): Mumbai attack nastermind Hafiz Saeedled Jamaat-ud-Dawa (JuD) and Falah-i-Insaniyat Foundation (FIF) are no longer on the list of banned outfits in Pakistan as the presidential ordi-nance that proscribed them under a UN resolution has lapsed, a media report said on Friday.

In February this year, former president Mam-noon Hussain promulgated an ordinance amending the Anti-Terrorism Act

1997 to declare JuD and FIF as proscribed groups.

During a hearing on

Thursday of a petition filed by Saeed, his counsel informed the Islamabad High Court (IHC) that the presidential ordinance had lapsed and it had never been extended, Dawn newspaper reported.

The petitioner had challenged the ordinance under which his organisations had been banned for being on the watch list of the United Nations Security Council.

Saeed contended in

the petition that he established JuD in 2002 and cut off all ties with the banned Lashkar-i-Taiba but India continued to malign the JuD for its past association with the banned outfit, the report said.

The petitioner said he was kept in detention in 2009 and 2017 due to India's pressure. He said that the UN Security Council had passed a res-olution against the JuD after which the govern-ment of Pakistan put it on the watch list, it said. India has been pushing Pakistan to bring to justice the planners of the November 2008 Mumbai attacks. Saeed is the co-founder of the Lashkar-e-Taiba, which was responsible for the attack in which 166 people were killed.

Saeed's counsel Raja Rizwan Abbasi and Sohail Warraich appeared before Justice Aamer Farooq of the IHC. On a query, Saeed's counsel informed the court that the cur-rent government did not extend the ordinance or table it in parliament to convert it into an act.

Deputy Attorney neral Raja Khalid General Raja Khalid Mehmood Khan con-firmed that the ordi-General nance has lapsed. He, however declined the request of advocate Abbasi for giving a statement on behalf of the interior ministry about the lapse of the ordinance.

Khan told the court that since the petitioner did not cite the interior ministry as a respondent, he could not give a statement unless the petition was amended and the interior secretary added as a party in the petition.

Justice Farooq held

that the petition became infructuous since the ordinance challenged by the petitioner has lapsed

The judge disposed of the petition with an observation that in case the government re-newed this ordinance, the petitioner was at lib-erty to file another petition against the promul-

gation of the law.

The petitioner claimed that the promulgation of the ordinance

was not only prejudicial also contradictory the fundamental rights tution.

He said that any law which was violative of constitutional provisions was liable to be struck down.

According to a list updated on September 5 on the National Count-Terrorism Authority's website, 66 organisations have been banned in the Pakistan and the JuD and FIF are not among them.

New York, Oct 26 (PTI): Google fired 48 employees, including 13 senior managers, over sexual harassment claims since 2016, CEO Sundar Pichai has re-vealed, asserting that the tech giant was tak-ing an "increasingly hard line" on "inappro-priate conduct" by people in positions of au-

thority.

In a letter to employees, the Indian-American chief executive officer said Google was "dead serious" about ensur-ing a safe and inclusive workplace and emphathat none of the sacked people got an exit package when they were



let go

The letter was in response to a New York Times report that Android creator Andy Rubin received a whopping USD 90 million exit package despite facing misconduct allegations.

'Today's story in the New York Times was difficult to read," Pichai and Eileen Naughton, Goo-Vice President of people operations, sa in the letter made public

on Thursday.
"We want to assure you that we review every single complaint about sexual harassment or inappropriate conduct, we investigate, and we take action," they said. In recent years, Goo-

gle has made a number of changes, including taking an "increasingly hard line on inappropriate conduct by people in positions of authority..", they said. In the last two years,

48 people have been terminated for sexual harassment, including 13 who were senior managers and above. "None of these individuals received an exit package," the letter emphasised.

"Because we know that reporting harass-ment can be traumatic, we provide confidential channels to share any inappropriate behaviour you experience or see.

"We support and respect those who have spoken out. You can find many ways to do this at go/saysomething. You can make a report anonymously if you wish," they said.

They said Google was committed to ensuring that it has a workplace where "you can feel safe to do your best work, and where there are serious consequences for anyone who behaves inappropriately."

According to the New York Times report, two unnamed Google executives said then-chief ex-

ecutive Larry Page asked Rubin to resign after the company confirmed a complaint by a female employee about a sexual encounter in a hotel room in 2013. A Google investiga-tion found the woman's

complaint to be credi-ble, the paper reported, but the company has not confirmed this.
Rubin has said he did

not engage in misconduct and left Google of his own accord.

A spokesman for Rubin denied the allegations, the newspaper said.

Sam Singer said Ru-bin decided to leave Goo-

gle in 2014 to launch a venture capital firm and technology incubator

called Playground.

He was given what
the paper described as a "hero's farewell" when he departed.

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Trump imposes sanctions on Hezbollah

LALIT K JHA Washington, (PTI): US President Donald Trump has imposed new sanctions targeting Lebanese militant group Hezbollah to isolate it from the international financial system, as his administration continues its all-out economic squeeze on the Iranian regime that allegedly

regime backs it.

Trump signed the Hezballah International Financing Prevention Amendments Act (HI-PAA) of 2018 into law on the 35th anniversary of Hezhollah's 1983 truck bombing of the barracks in Beirut, which killed 241 US service members and 58 French peacekeepers.

The legislation ramps up reporting require-ments and places further financial and economic sanctions on the group.

"The attack was carried out by Hezbollah, which Iran was instrumental in founding earlier to advance its radical agenda and remains its main patron today. And we're doing a big number on Iran today, in case you haven't noticed," Trump said.

"Hezbollah has kidnapped, tortured, and murdered American cit-



izens, including in its brutal attack in 1983 on our Marine Barracks in Lebanon, which 241 American Marines. Sailors. Soldiers, wounded 128 other American service members, and killed a Lebanese civilian. Another bombing against the French barracks killed 58 French peacekeepers and five Lebanese civilians, White House Press Secre-

tary Sarah Sanders said. The legislation, Sanders said, will further isolate Hezbollah from the international financial system and reduce its funding.

These sanctions will target foreign persons and government agencies that knowingly assist or support Hezbollah, and Hezbollah-affiliated networks that engage in drug trafficking or other trans-

national crime, she said. Trump said over the



past year, his administra-tion has levied the highest number of sanctions ever imposed on Hezbollah in a single year, by far. "Just a few moments ago I signed legislation imposing even more hard-hitting sanctions on Hezbollah to further starve them of them of their funds. And they are

starving of funds," he said.
"We will target, disrunt and dismantle their operational and financ ing networks of which they had plenty. They don't have plenty now. And we will never forget what they did to our great Marines in Beirut. We will never forget," the

US president said.
The US has designated Hezbollah a terrorist organization that also plays a major political role in Lebanon. The bill Trump signed Thursday also expands the list of those who can be sanctioned for doing business with Hezbollah.

Iran, Hezbollah's main sponsor, also has been targeted by US sanctions in recent months. Since May of this year when the withdrew from the 2015 nuclear deal with Iran, the US has imposed a number of embargoes against Tehran.

August, the US

re-imposed a set of sanctions prohibiting Iran's purchase of US dollars and precious metals, which is part of a larger US measure aimed at cutting the country off from the international financial system. A second round of US sanctions in November will target Iran's energy sector.
