Violence marks maratha quota bandh in Maharashtra

MUMBAI, JUL 25 (PTI): The bandh in Maharash-tra called by pro-quota maratha groups was today marked by violence and arson even as one more protester died, a day after consuming poison.

In the wake of violence, the bandh in Mum-bai was called off midway, despite which some areas continued to wit-ness incidents like stone

pelting till late evening.
Protesters attacked
buses, indulged in arson and pelted stones at local trains in several parts of Maharashtra, including Mumbai and the adjoining Thane city, during the bandh called by Maratha outfits to press their de-mand for reservation in jobs and education.

Mumbai-Pune and Mumbai-Goa highways were blocked for hours by the protesters.

Three policemen, in-

cluding a Superintendent of Police, suffered inju-ries in stone pelting. Police used force,

including teargas shell-ing and baton charge, to disperse the violent pro-testers at several places.

WILL BECOME FIRST STATE IN INDIA TO IMPLEMENT STATE-WIDE HPV **VACCINATION PROG**

GANGTOK, 25 Jul:

Department of Health Care,
Human Services & Family Welfare will be launching the Human Papilloma Virus [HPV] vaccination programme in Sikkim from 30 July. The programme targets around 30,000 female children across the State between 09-14 years of age.
With this, Sikkim will be-

come the first State in the country to implement a state-wide HPV vaccination programme.



In this context, the Health Department in association with UNICEF organized State Media Sensitization Work-

shop on Human Papilloma Virus [HPV] Vaccine Campaign with Journalists here at a lo-

press release informs.

The workshop programme was attended by Commission-er cum Secretary, Health Department, Vishal Chauhan, Director, Health Service, Uttam Pradhan, State Immunization

Health Officer, UNICEF, Dr Maulik Shah, Surveillance Medical Officer, WHO, Dr Subhendu K Ray, and other officials and representatives of State Health Department, WHO and UNICEF.

Health Commissioner cum Secretary, M. Chauhan, informed that it will be the largest ever immunization campaign in Sikkim. The programme aims to protect girl child from cervical cancer and he also informed that the state government has been giving various vaccines in the state like Hepatitis vaccine in 2001, Measles Rubella in 2009, etc which was later implemented by the Government of India as national programmes, he *turn to pg02*

SIMFED toils to ensure availability of veggies

GANGTOK, 25 JUL:
Sikkim State Co-operative
Supply & Marketing Federation Limited [SIMFED] has been working hard towards procur-ing vegetables from different parts of the State and making the produce available at bazaars to ensure availability of vegetables in the markets for consum-ers and vegetable vendors.

Yesterday, at 5 a.m., two utility vehicles of SIMFED from Gang-tok proceeded towards Lachung in North Sikkim to procure a fresh batch of organic cabbages. After collecting the cabbages, the two vehicles returned to Gangtok via the Dikchu route and arrived at Lal Bazaar in Gangtok at around midnight.

The vehicle drivers, Devendra Chettri and Rinchen Gyatso Bhutia, were accompanied by Field Assistant, Bikash Cintury. "We reached Lal Bazaar only

at midnight since there were problems on the road owing to falling boulders at Lanthey Khola. One of our vehicles almost slipped down the road but we continued our journey as the vegetables had to be dropped in Gangtok on pri-or basis. After reaching here, we slept on our vehicles. We are tired



but satisfied that we delivered the vegetables in Gangtok safely," expressed one of the drivers.

By 6 a.m. today, a team of SIMFED officials and employees including SIMFED inspector, Tshering Tamang, reached Lal Bazaar. They then went about disbursing the cabbages. Vendors and fast food shops in Gang-tok had already placed their or-ders for the cabbages and were provided with the same.

Since there is high demand for fresh cabbages in Gyalshing,

West Sikkim, the excess cabbages were dispatched for Gyalshing immediately after distribution in Gangtok.

Similarly, 300-400 kgs of cabbages have been forwarded for Singtam Bazaar in East Sikkim as per demand.

A certain quantity of cab-

bages has also been stored and will be taken by SIMFED mobile vans around the town for sale to consumers.

"After completing the dis-

update the accounts and note down the quantity that had arrived and was dispatched. Then a report is sent to the head office of SIMFED. We also take updates of demands of vegetables being made from different bazaars and coordinate with the field functionaries for their procure-ment. We often receive calls from farmers requesting us to take their produce to the market," said SIMFED field inspector, Tshering Tamang.

"Our government has decided to provide HPV vaccine free of cost to girl children between 09-14 years and the vaccine has been approved by Drug Controller General of India and it was done under strict monitoring of WHO and UNICEF," said

Mr Chauhan.

Director Health Services, Dr Pradhan, said, "Earlier, Punjab undertook it as a pilot project in districts but Sikkim will be the first State to be covering all the four districts."

He further said that HPV vaccine in Sikkim is being introduced not to achieve the status of being the first State in the race but to protect girl children from cervical

"This vaccine is one of the most cost effective vaccines for protection of girl children from cervical cancer and in more than 70 countries of the world, this vaccine has been given to girl children since past 10-15 years. The introduction of HPV vaccine in the State will be a huge milestone in the health sector and I am sure other States of India will also follow suit and introduce HPV vaccine in their respective States. Health department is confident that this

raccine is well tested and has been backed by WHO and UNICEF," said Dr Pradhan.

Officer, Health UNICEF [NE States]. Dr Shah, gave a brief about the facts about immuni-

zation and HPV vaccine.
State Immunization
Officer, Dr Denzongpa, said that HPV vaccination will be implemented in one-go approach in the State and all the schools both government and private, will be covered.

Surveillance Med-ical Officer, WHO, Dr Ray, informed that WHO has recommended HPV vaccination for girls between 09-14 years old He added that WHO recommends that the two doses of vaccine should be separated by a minimum interval of six months and no more 12-15 months.

HPV vaccine will be available in all Dis-trict Hospitals, Primary Health Centres, Community Health Centres and Primary Health Sub Centres. UNICEF is providing the vaccine at Rs 400 while the real cost of the vaccine is Rs 3000. The cost has been discounted for developing countries, it was informed.

The workshop pro-amme ended with open discussion between officials of Health Department, UNICEF and WHO.

However, the bandh in the financial capital of India, which began this morning, was called off just before 3 pm after various parts saw violence.

"We only wanted to prove that we are together and proved it. We never wanted protests to get violent and therefore, we are calling off our bandh in Mumbai for today," Virendra Pawar, leader of the Morcha, told reporters

"We suspect some people carried out violent activities with political mo-tives. Otherwise, it was supposed to be peaceful like before. But considering the reports of violence coming from outside Mumbai, we decided to call it off," Pawar added.

Another leader of the Morcha said a bandh may be called again on August 9 but a final call in this regard will be taken after consulting all senior members of all maratha morchas.

The Maratha Kranti Morcha had given the call for the bandh, demanding an apology from Maharashtra Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis for alleging that some members from the community were planning violence at Pandharpur

were planning violence at Pandnarpur town in Solapur district. Fadnavis, who was scheduled to perform puja at a temple on 'Ashadhi Ekadashi' on Monday, cancelled it after the Maratha outfits threatened to disrupt the event.

"Whatever we had to convey to the government, we have done so. But we have been disappointed by the gov-ernment's response over the last two years," Pawar said.

The agitation leader said not a single representative from the govern-ment had reached out to the protesters.

Attacking the chief minister, the agitation leader said Fadnavis has been "confining himself to his AC room" and

While imposing the bandh, protesters pelted stones at some local trains as well as buses and set ablaze a bus of the state-owned Brihanmumbai Electric Supply and Transport (BEST) in suburban Mankhurd.

"Till 1 pm, three buses were damaged by stone pelting and nine buses were damaged by deflating their tyres," BEST spokesperson Hanumant Gofane

At around 1.30 pm, protesters set a bus on fire after pouring petrol on it, which was later doused by the fire brigade, he added.

Train movement on a section of the local network was affected due to the

protests, police said.
Superintendent of Police Sandeep Patil suffered a minor injury in stone pelting in Satara, while two other po-licemen were injured in Kalamboli in Navi Mumbai, an official said.

tion on conviction for certain offences.

He stated that laws related to conviction under the PCA clearly mentioned that a person convicted under it and sentenced to imprisonment shall be disqualified from the date of conviction and shall continue to remain disqualified for a further period of six years from the date of release

On the same, he argued that since nobody was above the law and the Constitution then the possibility of a person convicted under PCA for at least six more years does not arise.

About his differences with Mr Tamang, the SDF Spokesperson stressed that it was a difference of ideologies and that there was nothing personal he held against him. He stressed it was important for the party to take the fact to the people based on the law.

Mr Gyaltsen also strongly criticised and condemned a recent press statement of TN Dhakal of SKM on the issue of tribal status to eleven left-out communities of Sikkim.

He stated that Mr Dhakal has misrepresented all facts and presented a totally incorrect and fabricated scenario in his press statement.

He mentioned that the SDF govern-ment has been working tirelessly and consistently on pursuing the tribal status for all left-out communities of Sik-

He added that the State government has been taking up this issue with the Centre with facts and as per the law. He reiterated that opposition needs to understand that this was a Central subject and the State was very hopeful that

On the private member's resolution placed by SKM MLA. Kunga Nima Lepcha in the recent Sikkim Legislative Assembly session, Mr Gyaltsen stressed that the resolution was a big conspiracy and intended to dilute Article 371F and to bring division among the people of

He also questioned the motive of the resolution to interfere with Revenue Order No 1. He further added that it was an attack on the Old Laws of Sik kim and intended to dilute the Article 371F.

He mentioned that the Chief Min ister Pawan Chamling has proved his statesmanship and leadership by passing a strong bill for the protection of the land-holdings of the Sherpa community


After having successfully com-

After employability, instill the desire to excel

m news.\,Or\,maybe}$ because it is on everyone's minds, that it appears to be in frequent discussion as well and through that affiliation, also getting mentioned often in press releases and becoming standard fare in political pronouncements. Meanwhile, the State Government started with a youth-empowerment year a little over a decade ago and has since developed the initiative into skill development which now has a directorate of capacity building dedicated to it, an institute and livelihood schools in all territorial constituencies and now a whole start-up programme dedicated to supporting young entrepreneurs. Scholarships are also on offer, as are attractive student loans. In a scenario such as this, the focus of those wishing to address the challenge of unemployment should be in expending more energy on ensuring that the skill development initiative, the effort which makes the job-seekers employable, are more effectively carried out. Unfortunately, more energy has traditionally been directed at embarrassing the clutch of officers serving on service extensions. The aspiration for government employment is still so strong that these "extensions" still irk many even though their retirement will only open up a sliver of positions. But can one really blame the unemployed who still aspire for government employment at the cost of compromising their chances in private sector advancement or self-employment options? The salary differential is so staggering and the work ethic requirements so relaxed, that it is really unfair to shoo the youth away from government employment and have them pursue opportunities in the private sector.

But this, in a way, is a lost pursuit. There can never be enough government jobs for the youth hoping for employment and it is only a matter of time before government offices are slimmed down and openings shut even tighter. It goes without saying that when the crunch comes, the survival instinct will kick in and the youth of Sikkim will explore and attain new options and livelihoods. But why wait for resoluteness to evolve only when the going gets tough. Sikkim is undoubtedly among the few places which are lucky enough to have the chance of staving off tough times if they "get going" while the going is still good. Few re-gions have been as pampered and are as blessed with lucky breaks and opportunities as Sikkim is. For a State that has no political clout by way of parliamentarian strength in Delhi, Sikkim has had a good run with the powers-that-be in getting its demands met and problems resolved even in these times of absolute "sevaks" when larger states have been cold shouldered. Many opportunities have been created and continue to be offered. Even a cursory listing of new investments in Sikkim will bear out that opportunities abound in a diverse range of activities, from trading to academics to white-collar jobs. What is now required is for these opportunities to be seized.

Unfortunately, this is where Sikkim is found lacking. Opportunities require hard work for success. It is this drive that Sikkim needs more of. The technical qualifications apart, every job requires only a few more qualities from prospective candidates - diligence, commitment to quality and a tenacity to compete. The faster Sikkim rediscovers these strengths, the sooner the opportunities will start delivering. The Livelihood Schools, apart from the subject-specific trainings they impart, should also include sessions on work-culture and introduce trainees to real achievers from around them and from elsewhere so that they complete their courses inspired to sweat it out, compete, stumble and stand up again.

BRICS summit in Johannesburg: here's what the five countries are looking for

All eyes are on Johan-nesburg for the 2018 BRICS summit, as the likes of Vladimir Putin, Xi Jin-ping and Narendra Modi take their places at the table. It marks the tenth annual gathering for this international organisation of the leading emerging economies. So what can we

expect?

The summit of the BRICS countries - Brazil, Russia, China, India and South Africa – started in June 2009 at Yekaterinburg, when Russia hosted the leaders of this bloc, though it did not originally include South Africa. BRIC became a formal institution the following year, aimed at facilitating glob-al political and economic transformation, and South Africa officially joined in 2011.

Much has been written

about this group's threat to the Western-dominated world economic order, BRICS formed the New Development Bank in 2014, the first major international development bank with no participation from the OECD countries. The following year it established the BRICS Contingent Reserve Arrangement, widely regard-ed as a rival to the International Monetary Fund. The bloc has also been trying to find new ways of engaging in international affairs by leading on key issues such as climate change, regional security

By 2016, the BRICS bloc had 41% of the world's population and just under 30% of the territory. The five countries control 23% of global GDP, worth about US\$40.6 trillion (£30.9 trillion), and 18% of trade. The group is growing impressively if you take it as a single entity, averaging 3.8% in 2015, 4.2% in 2016 and 5.1% in 2017 – though China and India are growing much faster than the rest. Xi Jinping in 2017 referred to the countries' "gold-en decade", though it does depend on who you are talking about.

The summit comes at a time when the West is arguably in decline. We see the US threatening trade wars with most other countries, above all China, but also even allies like the EU. The threat to global trade will be top of the agenda at the BRICS sum-mit – hardly surprising when China's economic weight gives it such a powerful role within the bloc Russian economy minister Maxim Oreshkin said

"The summit is about the context ... We are at a time when the US and China announce new mea sures almost every week."

Johannesburg will see much emphasis on consolidating members' trade relations through the

likes of reduced tariffs. This might boost trade between the countries, which has been stagnant or declining in recent years.

Africa and sustainable development will also receive much attention this year. Despite the heavyweight delegates list, South African leader Cyril Ramaphosa will no doubt do his best to steal everyone's thunder both as host and debutante president. His country's economy has been shrink-ing, with sectors such as mining and farming in the doldrums, made worse by corruption problems that came to symbolise his predecessor Jacob Zuma's administration.

Ramaphosa will be hoping to secure extra investment and trade agreements from his counter-parts. The leaders of other African countries and institutions are also attending the summit as part of BRICS' ongoing outreach programme, following tours of the region both by Modi and Xi. These representatives will be particularly interested in the progress of China's Belt and Road Initiative to re duce barriers across Asia, perhaps in the hope that it could one day involve them, too

Meanwhile, the Brazilian delegation will be looking for new forms of co-operation that can benefit their tenuous economy, which is threatened by various knock-on effects from the American trade and currency war – with China its main trading partner. Brazil also stands in the shadow of debt problems that are troubling much of Latin America. Expect to see President Michel Temer seeking more financial support from the New Development Bank, though his bigger goal should be deepening trade relations that will help his country's balance of payments in the longer term.

THE PUTIN EMBRACE

We are perhaps not expecting President Putin to provide significant economic leverage to other

members, but Russia's substantial political influence will be his main card to play at the summit At a time when Russia is on the verge of being a pariah to some countries, not least the UK, it will suit Putin to demonstrate warm relations with his fellow BRICS members.

Following Putin's recent bilateral talks with Donald Trump, the summit is a chance for Russia to enhance its global position and undermine Western containment, particularly the economic sanctions imposed after the Crimean crisis in 2014. The ever closer ties between Russia and China will presumably be a theme, after China's foreign minister recently described them as being at "their best

As for India, the role it plays at the summit will be very interesting. On the one hand, Modi will be seeking new deals for his country, the second larg-est economy in the bloc after China. On the other hand. India is playing a delicate geopolitical game with the US, China and Russia as their spheres of influence wax and wane across Asia and the Middle East. Show excessive favour to one side and there is the potential for ramifications across the

In all, the summit is a useful opportunity for these countries to remind the world of what mul-tilateralism can achieve, and chart new strategies for the coming decade. We may not see any significant leap forward as discussions get underway, but we'll certainly see the emerging powers attempting to loud-speak their influence at a time of growing protectionism and uncertainty. This bloc has yet to create anything resembling a new world order, but the celebrations from the global south in Johannesburg will certainly reverberate around the world.

Why does my phone battery die so fast?

Why do batteries die? And, why can they only be recharged so many times before they won't hold a useful amount of charge? My young son asked me about that years ago when his battery-powered toy car stopped moving, wondering about what he called an "everlasting battery." And this same question has probably crossed the mind of every cellphone user trying to send one last text before the screen blinks off.

Research, like mine, continues around the world to make batteries that charge faster, last longer, and can be recharged and discharged many more times than today's. But as much as you and I would like, it's impossible to make a truly everlasting bat-

tery. I have taught thermodynamics for more than 30 years. So far, there is nothing that suggests we can break the fundamental laws of science to get that elusive battery.

Battery scientists and engineers call the main problem "capacity fade." Regular people wonder about it with questions like "Why won't my battery hold a charge?" and complaints like "I just recharged this thing and it's already out again!



It's a result of the second law of thermodynamics, which states that whenever some real process happens, it creates a certain amount of wasted energy along the way that can never be recovered. Any time a battery is charged or discharged, there's a little bit of wasted energy – a little bit of wasted capacity in the battery that cannot be recovered.

To envision how this works, think about battery use like transferring water between two cups. Using a battery is like emptying the water from one cup into the other, and charging the battery involves pouring the water back into the first cup. Even if you do it one or two times without spilling a drop, there's always just a little tiny bit left in each cup that you can't

Now imagine pouring back and forth hundreds or even thousands of times over a period of two or three years (for a cellphone battery) or 10 to 20 years (for an electric car). Over

and big things that go wrong add up to quite a bit of water going missing. Even spilling a barely visible drop – say one-tenth of a milliliter – adds up to an entire liter if it happens 10,000 times. That doesn't even include the possibility of one cup failing in some way that loses even more water – like springing a leak or heating

up and causing evaporation.
Just as water inevitably
goes missing when pouring
from one cup to another, more
energy is required to charge the battery than it actually stores, and less energy comes out than is stored in it. The proportion of wasted energy to stored energy grows over In fact, the more you use a

battery, the more energy gets wasted, and the sooner the battery will reach a point where it's dead and can't usefully be recharged. I and others are studying ways to have those discharging-recharging cycles run more smoothly to reduce the amount of waste, but the second law of thermodynamics will always make sure that there's no way to get

Trump: US ready to make "real deal" on Iran nukes

WASHINGTON, JUL 25 (PTI): President Donald Trump has said the US is ready to make a "real deal" with Iran over its nuclear programme, days after he warned Tehran of historic consequences for threatening America.

Trump in May pulled the US out of the 2015 Iran nuclear agreement struck by the Obama administration by calling it the "the worst" deal ever negotiated.

Addressing the tional convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Trump said his administration stands ready for Iran to come back to the negotiating table.

'I withdrew the United States from the horri-ble one-sided Iran nucle-ar deal," he said.

Iran, as a result of his decision, is not the same country any more, he asserted.

Unfazed by final losses, Sindhu eyes medal at Worlds and Asiad

New Delhi, Jul 25 (PTI): A title has eluded P V Sindhu this season despite three summit appearances but the Indian ace says she is unde-terred by the heartbreak and will aim for a fresh start in the upcoming World Championship in China and the Asian Games in Indonesia

Sindhu has been in impressive form ever since winning the silver at the Rio Olympics in 2016. Last year, she won three titles out of the six finals that she reached.

However, loss in the finals

in World Championship, Hong Kong Open and Dubai Super Series Final earned her the choker's tag.

This year too she has reached the summit clash at India Open, the Common-wealth Games and the Thai-land Open but failed to cross the final hurdle, prompting many critics to once again describe her as the "perennial bridesmaid".

"I know sometimes I have been losing in the finals. See there are always negatives and positives. When you lose in the quarterfinals or semifinals, you actually learn a lot from those mistakes. You play



well but sometimes you can't through it," Sindhu told PTI in an interview.

"It doesn't bother me, beause coming to the finals is the next best thing to winning, I mean losing in the first and second round is much worse, reaching the finals means anything can happen," added the Hyderabadi.

The 23-year-old youngster will be leaving with the Indian team on Saturday for the World Championship in Nanjing, China beginning on July 30.

"I really want to do well the World Championship. I have been preparing well. Also there is the Asian games, which I want to do well. It is going to be a tough draw in the world championship, so I can't take it easy," she said.

"It is not like that I can relax till the pre-quarterfinals. It is a draw of 64. I will play Fitriani in my first game. I have played her before. She is playing well and anything can happen."

Her epic final against Ja-n's Nozomi Okuhara at

Glasgow last year went down as one of the greatest matches of all time clocking 110 minutes and Sindhu might have to upstage the defending champion as the two finalists are drawn to meet in the quarter-

know everyone is talking about Nozomi and my match but I can't afford to think so far ahead. Before that there is Sung Ji Hyun, who is not an easy player. Recently I have lost to her in Asia Badminton Championship, she has got good strokes and I can't take her easy. So that round would be equally important," she said.

Remind her of the Glasgow final and Sindhu says: "I take that (match) in a positive way because it was a good game. She also played well. But it is over now and it is a new start and another new year of world championship."

Sindhu had played Nozomi in the finals of Thailand Open last week and she said it will help in her preparation if she needs to face her again in the world championship.

At least 27 feared dead in Myanmar jade mine landslide

YANGON, JUL 25 (AFP): At least 27 people are feared dead following a landslide at a jade mine in northern Myanmar, police said today, as heavy rains hampered the search for survivors.

The poorly-regulated and notoriously corrupt multibillion-dollar in-dustry in remote Kachin is frequently hit by fatal disasters, and the victims often come from poor ethnic communities.
The latest disaster hit

remote Set Mu sub-township early Tuesday following heavy rains in the area, burying at least 27 people, mostly from the impoverished ethnic Rawang group, local police officer Aung Zin Kyaw told AFP.

"We haven't found any dead bodies yet. We will search again today with the Red Cross and fire brigade," he said.

With only about 70,000 members the mainly-Christian Rawang are one of Myanmar's smallest ethnic groups and live predominant-ly in the mountainous north, with many em-ployed in the informal mining sector.

With few regulations and little oversight in the hugely profitable sector mostly fuelled by soar ing Chinese demand conditions are often dangerous, especially during the wet months.

"Before the rainy season, the people looking for jade were destroying the land. Now it is raining and the ground is not sta ble and very muddy," local resident Shwe Thein told AFP Wednesday.

Dozens of people have been killed by land-slides this year in the slides this year in the Hpakant region of Kachin state, where a major inci-dent in November 2015 left more than 100 dead.

Watchdog Global Witness estimated that the jade industry was worth some 31 billion in 2014, a huge proportion of which did not reach state coffers.

Jade and other natu-

ral resources, including timber, gold and amber, help finance both sides in a decades-long conflict between ethnic Kachin rebels and the military as they battle to control the mines and the income they bring.

Since a 17-year cease fire broke down in 2011, more than 100,000 people have been displaced due to the fighting, many multiple times.

Civilian leader Aung San Suu Kyi said on coming to power in 2016 that ending the country's myriad conflicts was her top priority but an ongoing peace process is yet to yield any significant

India, Uganda pledge to fight terrorism; renew calls for UN Security Council's reform

KAMPALA, JUL 25 (PTI): India and Uganda to-day voiced their strong commitment to combat terrorism in all its forms and manifestations, and reaffirmed the need for the UN Security Council's comprehensive reform to make it more effective to the geo-political realities of the 21st century.

According to a joint statement issued after talks between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Ugandan President Yoweri Museveni, the two leaders underlined the traditionally warm and close ties between the two countries

They agreed that the terrorism poses a grave threat to global peace and stability and reiterated their strong com-mitment to combat it in



all its forms and manifestations, it said.

They stressed that there could be no justification for acts of terror on any grounds whatso-

The leaders asserted that strong measures

should be taken against terrorists, terror organtheir networks and all those who encourage, support and finance terrorism, or provide terrorism, or provide sanctuary to terrorists and terror groups, it said.
They also under-

scored the need to ensure that terror organisations do not get access to any weapons of mass destruction or technologies and committed to cooperate for the early adoption of the Compre-hensive Convention on

International Terrorism (CCIT), the statement

India had proposed the CCIT more than two decades ago in the United Nations as an instrument for a global alliance of nations against terrorism.

Prime Minister Modi and President Museveni reaffirmed the need for a comprehensive reform of the UN Security Council, including its expansion, to make it more representative, accountable, effective and responsive to the geo-political real-ities of the 21st century, the statement said.

India along with Brazil, Germany and Japan has been pushing for the expansion of the UN Security Council for long, saying that the current UN and its powerful Security Council do not re-flect the ground realities of the 21st century.

They reiterated their commitment to intensify their cooperation in the UN and other multilateral organisations in order to address current global challenges such as climate change and to foster international and regional peace and secu-rity, as well as sustain-

able development. The two leaders emphasised the need for regular convening of bilateral mechanisms, including at Foreign/External Affairs Ministers level, to review the overall state of bilateral relations, and for the expeditious implementation of the economic and development cooperation projects. Pakistan goes to polls; 35 killed in suicide blast

ISLAMABAD, JUL 25 (PTI): Pakistanis voted today in a tense election to choose a new government as at least 35 people were killed in an ISIS suicide attack and poll-related violence, amidst charges of manipulation by the powerful Army and concerns over the participation of Islamic hardliners.

Hours after polling began for the

general elections, an Islamic State suicide bomber blew himself up outside a polling station in Bhosa Mandi area of Balochistan's provincial capital, Quetta, killing 31 people, including policemen.

In separate incidents, four per-sons were killed in poll-related violence. Clashes erupted between rival parties outside several polling stations, reports said.

Nearly 10.6 crore people are registered to vote for members of the lower house of parliament and four provincial assemblies. The election marks the second democratic transition of power in the nation's 70-year

The voting started at 8 AM local time on more than 85,000 polling stations. The counting of votes will be done on the spot soon after the conclusion of the polling process at 6 PM and results will be announced

within 24 hours.

While polling stations officially opened for voting at 8 AM, enthu-siastic citizens queued up outside their respective stations as early as

Pakistan Army chief General Qamar Javed Bajwa cast his vote in



Rawalpindi.

Shahbaz Sharif, the president of the Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) who is hoping to become the next prime minister, was among the first to cast his vote in Lahore.

"Just cast my vote. High time that all of you came out to vote for Pakistan's progress and prosperity. May this election be a source of peace and stability for the nation!," he tweeted

Former prime minister Shahid Khagan Abhasi, former Sindh chief minister Murad Ali Shah, MQM-P's Farooq Sattar, Pak Sarzameen Party (PSP) chairman Mustafa Kamal, Pa kistan Tehreek-e-Insaad (PTI) chief Imran Khan, Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) co-chairman Bilawal Bhutto and JUI-F chief Maulana Fazlur Rehman also cast their vote in their respective constituencies.

The two Bhutto sisters Asifa Bhutto Zardari and Bakhtawar Bhutto Zardari also cast their votes. Bakhtawar posted a picture after casting a vote with her sister

According to the Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP), 3,459 candidates are contesting for 272 general seats of the National Assembly, while 8.396 candidates are running for 577 general seats of the four provincial assemblies - Punjab, Sindh, Balochistan and Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa.

More than 30 political parties

have fielded their candidates for the

elections.

The PTI, led by cricketer-turned-politician Imran Khan,
is looking to unseat the incumbent
PML-N, which was formally led by the now jailed ex-prime minister Nawaz Sharif. The PPP, led by Bilawal Bhutto Zardari, is also in the race.

According to a survey of polls by Gallup Pakistan on the eve of general elections, PTI and the PML-N are running "neck and neck", with the

PTI ahead nationally and the PML-N ahead in the crucial province of

For a smooth polling process, the ECP has de ployed around 1.6 mil-lion staff at polling stations across the country.

About 4,49,465 policemen and over 3,70,000 military per-sonnel have been deployed for security.

In a special message yesterday, Chief Election Commissioner Justice (retd) Sardar Raza Khan urged voters to cast

their vote

A public holiday has been declared across the country today in order to facilitate the voting process.

Pakistan's National Assembly comprises a total of 342 members, of which 272 will be directly elected today whereas the rest - 60 seats reserved for women and 10 for religious minorities - are selected later through proportional representa-tion among parties with more than five per cent of the vote.

A party can only form the go ernment if it manages to clinch 172 seats in total.

The run up to the elections have seen a massive crackdown on the media and allegations that the military has secretly backed the campaign of Khan while targeting his

political opponents.

The military has ruled Pakistan through various coups for nearly

half of the country's history since the civilian rule, the generals have wielded enormous power, setting the agenda for the country's foreign

A spokesperson for the star told MailOnline: "Demi is awake and with her family who want to express thanks to everyone for the love, prayers, and support. Some of the information being reported is incorrect and they respectfully ask for privacy and not speculation as her health and recovery is the most important thing right now.

TMZ first reported that the singer was transported to an undisclosed medical facility in LA shortly before noon on Tuesday after friends called 911.

A law enforcement source confirmed

she was given Narcan when she was found, a medication that's used to try and reverse an opioid overdose.

While it's been speculated that Lovato overdosed on heroin, TMZ reported late Tuesday that the star had refused to disclose to paramedics what she had taken and that no drugs were found at her home.

A source told the website that she had not overdosed on heroin but wouldn't disclose any further details. However, the songstress has previously struggled with cocaine and Oxycontin addictions. According to UsWeekly, the Narcan was kept on hand by one of the singer's friends 'in case something like this happened.'

enforcement told TMZ that there is currently no criminal investigation because they could not determine what drug Lovato was under the influ-ence of. It's reported that the Confident singer's mother Dianna De La Garza is at her bedside.

Demi's aunt, Kerissa Dunn, posted on

the coke the first time that I did it," explained Lovato.

She also spoke about how addiction ran in her family, and her mother's attempts to keep her daughter away from drugs. Brothers that Lovato said her problem ot out of control, resulting in one pe riod where she used drugs ever day for two months.

At 18, she checked into rehab for the first time. She said she felt great after leaving rehab, but soon found herself

relapsing on drugs.

She even gave interviews about her new sober lifestyle while high on drugs she said, whicle cycling through sober

"I started to choke a little bit, and my heart started racing. I remember thinking, "Oh my God, I might be overdosing right now," said Lovato.

Her low point came in 2012 when she partied all night with strangers in a hotel and threw up on the way to her American Idol appearance. That is when her management team informed her that if she did not get sober they would no longer keep her as a client.

For the next six years Lovato stayed clean as her career thrived, though she admitted to dealing with other problems like an ongoing eating disorder. That came back in a big way in 2016 she said after her split for Wilmer Valderama, with the singer saying that being

alone triggers the disorder.
She also hints in her song Sober that she recently relapsed, and has been candid about her struggles with mental health as well over the years.
