Dowry deaths account for substantial share of female homicides in India: Report

UNITED NATIONS, NOV 27 (PTI): Dowry deaths continue to account for a substantial share of all female homicides in India despite legislation prohibiting it, according to a UN study which says the home is the most dangerous place for women around the world.

Around 87,000 women were killed around the world last year and some 50,000 - or 58 per cent - were killed at the hands of intimate partners or family members. This amounts to some six women being killed every hour by people they know, according to new re-search published by the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC).

In India the female homicide rate in 2016 was 2.8 per cent, higher than the rate in Kenya (2.6), Tanzania (2.5), Azerbaijan (1.8), Jordan (0.8) and Ta-jikistan (0.4). Further, in India 33.5 per cent of women and girls aged 15(irrespective of perpetrator) at least once in their lifetime and 18.9 per cent in the past 12 months, according to data from 1995-2013.

Dowry-related deaths in India continue to be a matter of concern. The study noted that available data on dowry-related killings from the National Crime Records Bureau indicate that female dowry deaths account for 40 to 50 per cent of all female homicides recorded annually

in India, representing a stable trend over the period 1999 to 2016. "Despite legislation adopted by the Indian Government in 1961, prohibiting the payment of dowry, the practice continues throughout the country and dowry deaths continue to account for a substantial share of all female homicides," it said.

Sorcery accusations also affect

Africa, Asia and Oceania and can be the driver behind gender-related killings. Data from Papua New Guin-ea and India on homicide resulting from sorcery accusations show that, although in small proportions, this phenomenon still exists.

"While data are not sex disaggregated, it is likely that women account for a large share of the victims," it said.

The study, released for the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women, examines available homicide data to analyse the gender-related killing of women and girls, with a specific focus on intimate partner and family-related homicide and how this relates to the status and roles of women in society and the domestic sphere.

While the vast majority of homicide victims are men, women continue

gender inequality, discrimination and negative stereotypes. They are also the most likely to be killed by intimate partners and family," UNODC Execu-tive Director Yury Fedotov said. "Targeted criminal justice respons-

es are needed to prevent and end gender-related killings. UNODC is releas-ing this research for the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women 2018 to increase un-derstanding and inform action."

Looking at the rate of female victims of homicide by intimate partners or family members, the study found that the global rate was around 1.3 vic-

tims per 100,000 female population.
In terms of geographical distribution, Africa and the Americas are the regions where women are most at risk of being killed by intimate partners or family members.

343 died. Rs 1.600 crore lost in HP due to rains, untimely

Shimla, Nov 27 (PTI): Himachal Pradesh Chief Minister Jai Ram Thakur said Tuesday the state had suffered a loss of Rs 1,600 crore since July 1 this year due to monsoon rains and untimely snowfall in tribal areas that also claimed 343 lives.

The chief minister said this while presiding over the meeting of an inter-ministerial central team at Mandi, which is on a state visit to assess the damages caused to the state due to untimely snowfall and heavy rains.

Thakur said the Pub-Works Department (PWD) suffered major

snowfall this monsoon: CM roads and bridges. The total losses on this account have been assessed at around Rs 930 crore. He said 405 incidents of land-slides and 34 cloudbursts were reported in the state. The Irrigation and Public Health department suffered losses worth Rs 430 crore while damages to agriculture crops and infrastructures cost Rs 130.37 crore, he added.

The chief minister said that 343 people lost their lives due to flash floods, landslides, cloud bursts and road accidents -- all during the monsoon fury.

In Africa, the rate was around 3.1 victims per 100,000 female population, while the rate in the Americas was 1.6 victims, in Oceania 1.3 and in Asia 0.9. The lowest rate was found in Europe, with 0.7 victims per 100,000 female population.

According to the study, tangible progress in protecting and saving the lives of female victims of intimate partner/family-related homicide has not been made in recent years, despite legislation and programmes devel-

oped to eradicate violence against women.

The conclusions highlight the need for effective crime prevention and criminal justice responses to violence against women that promote victim safe-ty and empowerment while ensuring offender accountability. The study also calls for greater coor-dination between police and the justice system as well as health and social services and emphasizes the importance of involving men in the solution, including through early education.

Jack Ma, China's richest man, is a Communist Party member

BEIJING, NOV 27 (AFP): Jack Ma, founder of Chinese tech giant Alibaba, is among the world's richest people but he has now emerged as a member of another club: China's 89-million-strong Communist Party.

The billionaire's Com-

munist bona fides were revealed by the People's Daily, the party's official mouthpiece, in an article praising contributors to China's development. He is not the first nor likely the last Chinese super-rich capitalist to join the party, which counts property titan Xu Jiayin and Wanda Group founder Wang Jianlin among its billionaire members.

But Ma's membership had not been widely known until now as China's richest man had previously suggested that he preferred to stay out of politics. In Monday's article, the People's Daily said Ma was a party member who has played an import-ant role in pushing China's Belt and Road global trade infrastructure initiative -a pet project of President Xi Jinping.

He has also been

honoured as one of the "outstanding builders of socialism with Chinese characteristics in Zhejiang Province", where Alibaba is based, the daily said. Joining the party can be helpful to private businessmen and women in the country as they navigate a complicated business environment where the state-led economy dominates many industries and private business can be unwelcome. In China, company chiefs need the backing of the Communist Party to get rich, but they also need it to survive.

Meghalaya govt rules out CBI probe into activist assault case that the government has

Shillong, Nov 27 (PTI): Turning down the op-position's demand for a CBI probe into the recent attack on an RTI activist, Home Minister James K Sangma said Tuesday the government has decided to form a fact-finding committee to carry out an independent investigation into the incident.

RTI activist Agnes Kharshiing and her aide Amita Sangma were assaulted near a coal mining site in East Jaintia Hills district on November 8. Kharshiing, who received serious head injuries in the attack, is currently undergoing treatment at North Eastern Indira Gandhi Regional Institute of Health and Medical Sciences here.

ordered a fact-finding inquiry into the matter. I do not see the need for a CBI inquiry because an independent committee is in the process of getting instituted," Sangma told a special session of Assembly here. Former chief minister and Leader of Opposition in the Assembly, Mukul Sangma, had pitched for a probe by the central investigation agency, citing "complete lawlessness" in the coal mining belts of the state.

Congress MLA Ampareen Lyngdoh, who heads the Assembly committee on women empowerment, tabled a preliminary report on the incident in the House, expressing her dissatisfaction at the pace of progress in the case

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Needed - Rural Pragmatism, Not Urban Vainglory

Empower, for real, panchayats to shoot down superficial projects

now, the panchayats should be rather comfort-By now, the palichayars should 22 ably ensconced in their posts, busy with the tasks of Panchayati Raj, and still, rather frequently, one reads of Panchayats undergoing awareness and orientation or being told what to do. They are still taken through the processes on which amendments to which Acts made their election possible, given the drill on the usual stuff about working for the people in collaboration with line departments etc etc. These are the basics that one expected the elected Panchayats to already know when they filed their nomination papers, but wait, too many of them were elected unopposed and had no need to understand either the Act or their tasks so long as they kowtowed right for the "ticket". But that we leave for another time. And that said, one still hopes that such sessions, beyond making Panchayats "aware" about how and why they are more empowered today and whether earnest plans are afoot to divest even more powers to them, also get reassured that they can call the shots and need not "obey" babus or other politicians when it comes to the affairs of the villages they represent.

The next progression should see them flex their

muscles and shoot down scatter-brained projects and proposals that only somnolent bureaucrats can dream up. For instance, if a "file" was moved to invest 55% of an Innovation Fund to purchase plastic chairs and a PA system, they should be able to laugh it out of the Panchayat Bhawan. For those scoffing and claiming that such "projects" are not mooted, a quick read of the Annual Technical Inspection Report on PRIs and ULBs for the year ended 31 March 2014 by the office of the Principal Accountant General (Audit), Sikkim, is recommended. Apparently, in 2013-14, the East Zilla Panchayat blew up Rs 55 lakh (out of Rs 1 crore) towards purchase of plastic chairs and sound systems on the argument that these assets would help in "dissemination of information about welfare schemes" and would also "generate revenue" for the Gram Panchayats through rentals. The Panchayats might need plastic chairs and even sound systems, but such purchases cannot be called "innovative". Apparently, the Thirteenth Finance Commission had recommended formulation of District Innovation Fund "with a view to support and promote innovation for better alternatives, reducing costs, increasing the efficiency of capital assets, improving service delivery and governance". This Fund was expected to fill "vital gaps in public infrastructure already available in the district, which is not being fully utilised for want of a relatively small investment". So, how did they propose this one they already had the floor space and needed chairs to fill it up for "full utilization" or that they had speeches ready, but needed a sound system to broadcast them? The guidelines suggested drawing up of an Annual Plan for utilisation of funds after carrying out Strength Weakness, Opportunity and Threat (SWOT) analysis to "trigger innovative measures" with a view to make Government accountable and accessible to all section of the society. And they came up with this? The dodge must have been originally drafted and processed by babus not panchayats and the latter must have just fallen in line. Real empowerment will see them advise and demand better and be able to reject and amend.

There is another glaring evidence of civil works and expense-driven problem-solving superficiality. Apparently, the Rural Management & Development Department (RMDD) (through ZP, South) developed a water harvesting structure at Tamley lake in 1998-99 to provide potawater to the three villages of Mungram, Guptigaon, Sirubari and Rajarukgaon. It should come as no surprise that this project did not age too well, and in 2008, the villagers complained that water supply was poor. By Feb 2008, RMDD-Jorethang had a DPR for Rs 79.51 lakh ready to repair the water harvesting experiment. The funds were expended and work completed two years later. So, did the people go without potable water for two years? Thankfully, no. They repaired the existing pipes carrying water from a distant source. It cost them Rs 2.08 lakh to do this! Meanwhile, the Rs 79.51 lakh spent by the RMDD delivered repairs to a water harvesting structure that does not serve as a source of water to the nearby villages! The obvious need for more rural pragmatism to direct the development and investment priorities cannot be stressed more tellingly than this example.

One needs to understand that the reason the nation has empowered the rural voters is because all other attempts at fixing accountability have failed. When Panchayats decide, and if they decide from their own wits and not departmental chits, more projects will achieve fruition. When decisions are taken through informed and involved gram sabhas, then the whole village knows; when the whole village knows, the whole village watches and because it is about them and about facilities they and their children will use, they are also expected to monitor. When projects fail, the blame ends at the village boundaries and the buck can actually stop at the right door. When such accountability becomes real, the bastis will begin noticing real improvements. Urban naiveté and vainglory need to be played out of the villages and rural pragmatism allowed back in and supported to express itself more forcefully.

Trump's fascist efforts to demolish democracy

scist politics is once again on the rise in the Pascist politics is once again.
United States, Europe and Latin America.

As an echo from the past, its principles and attitudes are re-emerging in a populist rhetoric that embraces extreme forms of nationalism, the cult of the leader, systemic racism, a culture of fear, a hatred of dissent and an utter disdain for the truth.

Driven by a hatred of "the other" and infused with narratives of decline and victimization, fascist politics trade in an incendiary rhetoric of fear, deonization and violence.

It creates divisions by targeting groups it de-fines as criminal, less than human, and then expands its hate-mongering to other groups as part of an attempt to deepen and expand a culture of terror, insecurity and disposability.

It attempts to build power through aggressive

attacks on the media, critics and the judiciary.

Resentment based on real economic and existential insecurities become fodder for cult-like figures to misdirect anger, feed collective hate and foster a climate of shared fears and social divisions.

Fascist politics is inseparable from the culture of violence, which it uses as its primary tool of communication and weapon of choice.

TRUMP'S ATTACK ON THE 'OTHERS'

One recent example can be found in U.S. President Donald Trump's ongoing escalation of attacks on migrants. He has referred to the caravan of refugees from Central America as an invading criminal force against whom he is mobilizing as many as 15,000 troops, more than currently serve in Afghanistan.

According to Trump, the caravan of migrants had "violently overrun" Mexico and were on the verge of invading the United States.

Prior to the midterm elections, he called immigrants "predatory" and "the worst scum of the world." After the midterms, he ramped up the violence by authorizing "U.S. troops guarding the border against migrant caravans to use deadly force if necessary."

Trump's language does more than promote a decline in civility, it also advocates state terrorism while functioning as a savage nod to the most extremist elements of his base of support.

For instance, he has threatened to order U.S. soldiers to shoot migrants and refugees from Central America if they throw rocks at them. In addition, he has pledged to use an executive order to rewrite the U.S. constitution and annul birthright citizenship.

Trump's rhetoric and policies point to a terrifying new horizon for the political arena and its modes of governance. It shows that domestic terrorism is alive and well.

It's evident in Trump's refusal to condemn Saudi Arabia for the assassination of the journalist Ja-mal Khashoggi. Trump has made clear that human rights and even murder can be overlooked if dictators have money to spare in order to purchase U.S. military hardware. In the fascist playbook, commercial deals take precedent over human rights, justice, and liberty.

Trump has unleashed what Frankfurt School theorist Theodor Adorno once called an "au-thoritarian irrationality," the dark and men-acing underside of a racist and totalitarian psychology and politics.

Trump may not be Adolf Hitler, but there are disturbing similarities in his language and reactionary policies.

RECOGNITION AND RESISTANCE

It's precisely these historical lessons that should be examined carefully so that the plague of fascism can be both recognized in its current form and resisted so that it will never happen again.

The entrepreneurs of hate are no longer con-

fined to the dustbin of history. The architects of fascist politics are with us once again, stoking dystopian fantasies in the decaying communities and land-scapes produced by 40 years of a savage capitalism. Angry loners, displaced workers and bitter na-

tivists looking for a place to park their misdirected anger are vulnerable to cult leaders. They've found one in Trump.

Campaigning for the midterm elections, Trump

His call to "Make America Great Again" reveals his nostalgia for a white Christian past. Allan Nairn, the award-winning investigative journalist, gets it right in arguing that Trump and the Republican Party want "to abolish democracy...because that's the only way they can perpetuate their power" and $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right) \left($



reached for the fascist playbook and calculatedly promoted racism, hatred and ignorance in a cynical move that should send alarms ringing across the globe.

Amid an outbreak of violence that included the killings of two African-Americans in a grocery store in Kentucky, a campaign of mail bombs sent to high-profile Democrats and critical celebrities, allegedly by one of his fervent supporters, and the mass murder of 11 people in a Pittsburgh synagogue, Trump refused to acknowledge that his toxic rhetoric has fanned the flames of racism and anti-Semitism.

Instead, he blamed the media for the violence and labelled them "the true enemy of freedom."

He also called Democrats the "party of crime" determined "to unleash violent predators and ruthless killers" onto American streets.

In addition, he has ratcheted up his demoniza-tion of immigrants by branding them not only as rapists, drug dealers and criminals but also as Mideast terrorists.

He's also publicly and proudly stated that he's a nationalist (code for a noxious strain of beliefs espoused by racists and white nationalists), em-boldening right-wing extremist groups such as the Proud Boys, the American equivalent of the Nazi

'WEAPONIZES LANGUAGE'

Incapable of both empathy and self-reflection. Trump uses language in the service of lies, vilification and violence.

His inflammatory rhetoric does more than legitimize and accelerate acts of violence; it weaponizes language as a tool of political opportunism without regard for the suffering and misery it inflicts on inals and entire groups considered disposable

He thrives in creating social divisions and merges ignorance and power to fuel conspiracy theories, eliminate the line between fact and fiction and give credence to the expanding media village of the extreme right.

Trump attempts to criminalize political opposition, maligns immigrants and others as losers and revels in his role as a national mouthpiece for white nationalists, nativists and myriad extremist groups.

He's unconcerned about the power of words to inflame, humiliate, and embolden some of his followers to violence. Instead, he displays a sadistic desire to relegate his critics and those he views as create a form of "domestic fascism."

What's so duplicitous and dangerous about Trump is that he hides behind the institutions of representative democracy, which he attempts to destroy by stealth and through an accumulation of assaults rather than through an outright suppression of civil liberties and political rights, though

that may be on the horizon.

Part of Trump's demolition of democracy is his tactic of turning his almost daily assaults into a form of political theatre. It's evident in his ongoing rallies that overflow with menace, not unlike the

fascist Nuremberg rallies of the 1930s.
As the master of the spectacle, Trump normalizes through sheer repetition his ongoing attempts to fuel hatred, racial divisions and the destruction of social bonds, all of which is necessary for fascist politics to flourish.

In the Trump era, the line between deadly vi-olence and the rhetoric of a fascist politics is dangerously thin. And as historical memory fades and civic literacy is disparaged, the rise of barbarism and brutality are on the rise. USING LANGUAGE TO RESIST

That's why critically addressing Trump's language is a crucial act of political resistance.

Trump's hateful rhetoric also proves that education is central to politics, because it's through language and diverse forms of communication that power materializes to shape consciousness, desire, identity and values.

It's crucial therefore in the age of Trump to use the language of resistance, one that's rooted in compassion for others, expands the reach of justice and encourages us to confront the forces of tyranny.

Language is the precondition for education, and education is central to politics itself. We need a new language that both inspires and energizes people to think otherwise in order to act otherwise.

The current crisis of politics is not simply about the rise of fascist politics, it is also about the crisis of language, memory, and agency. Now is the time for individuals and social movements to give new meaning to the recognition that without an informed citizenry, democracy cannot survive and individual and collective resistance will disappear.

What India could learn from Ethiopia about food security

Despite India's fast economic growth and poverty reduction over the past few decades, food insecurity remains very high. This puzzle has been named the "South Asian enigma". Some indicators of food insecurity, especially child undernourishme rates, are now worse in India than in Ethiopia. This is despite the fact that Ethiopia has only a quarter of India's per capita income and has suffered many famines in the 20th century.

A comparison of how the govern-nents of these two countries manage food insecurity suggests that the key to resolving the South Asian enigma lies in the nourishment and sanitation of children in their first 1,000 days of life – from conception to their second birthday.

SUPPORT FOR PREGNANT WOMEN

The malnutrition of Indian children often starts in the womb. Just over half of adult Indian women are ron deficient, compared with 23% Ethiopian women. Iron deficiency in pregnancy can lead to the child having a low weight and health problems.

One reason for the difference is

the lack of support for poor pregnant women in India India's Nation

al Food Security Act, passed in 2013, ruled that all pregnant Indian women should receive a stipend of 6,000 rupees. But the money usually manages to cover only the costs of delivery. It is also given only in a woman's first pregnancy, excluding more than half of India's annual births.

Many poor Indian women bear heavy workloads throughout their pregnancies, which compromises both their own and their unborn children's nourishment. In contrast, poor Ethiopian women receive support from the government-run Pro-ductive Safety Net Programme from the fourth month of pregnancy until their child's first birthda

INFANT NUTRITION

As a result of the nutritional deficiencies in pregnancy, proportionally more children in India than in Ethio-pia are born "very small". This difference in average weight widens with age. While 36% of Indian children under five years old are underweight, only 24% of Ethiopian children are.

Different trends in child weaning in these countries contribute to the growing gap. The World Health Organisation (WHO) recommends supplementing infants with solid or semi-solid food after six months of age when breastmilk alone no longer

meets their nutritional needs. But almost a third of Indian one-year-old children still consume only liquids.

The Ethiopian government made nutrition education for parents an important part of the latest version of their Productive Safety Net Programme. Government-funded childcare centres, called Anganwadi centres, have traditionally provided nutrition education in India but their workers, mostly women, are severely underpaid and their service consequently poor

CLEAN INDIA

As well as unbalanced diets, children's undernourishment across the world has been increasingly linked to sanitation. Both India and Ethiopia have suffered from high rates of open defecation, associated with frequent diarrhoea and slower growth among young children.

Indian governments have tried to fight the practice by building toilets. As part of the latest Swachh Bharat (Clean India) campaign, millions of

ew latrines have been constructed.

But many Indian families refuse to use the toilets, often for reasons to do with caste. Sanitation work in India has traditionally been reserved for the low-est ("untouchable") caste, as a result, many people from other castes are unwilling to clean or empty their own toilets and would rather defecate outside.

Unlike the Indian government, the Ethiopian government approached open defecation as a public health problem and focused on providing sanitation and hygiene education. The approach was widely praised by the WHO as Ethiopia reduced open defecation rates

from 92% in 1990 to 29% in 2015.
India's reduction in that time frame was much smaller, from 70% to 46%. But even in the most recent sanitation campaign, India's government devoted only 1% of the campaign's budget to providing sanitation education to communities.

India sees itself as an emerging

world power, but doubts about the direction of its development remain The country's global image would undoubtedly improve if it finally managed to overcome the South Asian enigma and substantially im-proved its food security. Ethiopia's recent success in this respect indicates that focusing on the nutrition and sanitation of pregnant women and young children may be the most effective way forward.

Mamata flays Purulia dist officials for failing to make a single Kisan Mandi operational

KOLKATA, Nov 27 (PTI): West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee Tuesday flayed district officials for failing to make a single 'Kisan Mandi' fully operational in the backward district.

BIP had made a dent in Purulia in the May rural polls this year. "Tell me why not a single 'Ki-san Mandi' has become fully operational in your district. What is the reason behind it ?" Banerjee asked an official in an administrative meeting in Purulia district. The official replied that it was taking time to make the 'Kisan Mandis' fully operational as all the farmers do not like to come to the place for locational reasons. Besides, there are

To this Banerjee said Kisan Mandis should come up at a place which will be convenient for farmers, where they can bring the agricultural produces for sale and have facilities like cold storage.
The chief minister also

expressed dissatisafaction over distribution of Kishan credit card among the people in Purulia district and said banks should be more active to facilitate it. When informed that 66,000 Kisan credit cards remained to be distributed among the poor in Purulia, she urged the official of a PSU bank present at the meeting to speed up the process.

The district official

present claimed that the cards had been dispatched from their end to banks. When told by the government official that 36,000 Kisan credit cards have only been distribut-ed so far, Banerjee asked the district magistrate to involve the district coop-erative bank in the process to fast track the same.

Pointing out that a sizeable portion of farm land in Purulia is not favourable for cultivation of paddy crops, she said if such land cannot be used for alternative farming, the farmers, including tribals should be employed in 100 days' work scheme

She expressed hap-piness that Purulia district had been occupying the number one position in respect of 100 days' work years in the past and called for more involvement of people in such project. The chief minister also asked for speeding up work for the road link to the proposed place of airport at Charra in Purulia district.

"An airport is needed for better connectivity," she said and called for setting up in-dustrial park. Told that there was possibility of drought was possibility of thought in Purulia this year, Baner-jee called for chalking out an action plan to fight the situation. She suggested appointing a nodal officer to monitor the situation in drought-prone districts like lia and Bankur

Banerjee called for bringing the tribal com-munities more under the state-sponsored housing projects and asserted her government wanted that various social welfare schemes of the govern-ment reach a cross section of underprivileged people.

HC directs Centre to release freedom fighter pension to widows

KOLKATA, NOV 27 (PTI): The Calcutta High Court
Tuesday directed the Centre to release freedom fighter pension to two widows, whose husbands had fought for the right since 1981.

A division

comprising Chief Justice Debasish Kargupta and Justice Sampa Sarkar ordered the central government to start paying them pension, as admissible to widows of freedom fighters, within three months of receiving a copy of the order and to pay arrears since 1981.

It was stated before the court that Ekadashi Bhowmick and Tapan Karmakar had participated in an uprising against the British Raj from 1942 to 1943 when an independent government was established at Tamluk in undivided Midnapore district of West Bengal.

The independent government, named Tamralipta Jatiya Sarkar, existed for 18 to 19 months from 1942, their lawyer Ramdulal Manna said

The government had raised two forces - Bidvut Bahini and Bhagini Nivedita Bahini - members of which destroyed all official records of the British Raj at Tamluk.

The Government of India had introduced a Freedom Fighter Pen-sion Scheme in 1972 for those who had an annual income of less than Rs 5.000. Manna said.

In 1981, a liberalised pension scheme 'Swatan-trata Sainik Samman



Pension' was introduced, which did not impose any bar on annual income to receive the honorarium.

According to the scheme, records of incarceration or case files would act as proof, in the absence of which a certificate by another freedom fighter, whose records were approved, could also act as proof, the lawyer submitted.

The district magistrate of Midnapore had said in 1981 that no official records of the period from 1930 to 1946 were found, Manna said.

A freedom fighter, Rabindranath Giri, cer-tified for Ekadashi that he had taken part in the freedom strug-gle during 1942-44 at Tamluk and he applied for the pension on September 29, 1981. The central government rejected the prayer of Bhowmick and Karmakar who had also applied under similar circumstances, which they

challenged before the Calcutta High Court.

Karmakar died on December 4, 1988, Manna said. In 2002, the high court directed the Centre to grant pension to Bhowmick and also to the widow of Karmakar on similar grounds

Their applications were again rejected for erroneous documents. This was challenged

by Bhowmick and Renubala Karmakar again before the high court.

In the meantime Bhowmick died on September 6, 2010. Bhowmick's widow Tulsi Rani and Karmakar's widow Renubala had substituted them as petitioners to fight the case.

On March 24, 2017. the high court set aside the rejection orders and directed formation of a committee comprising an official each of the central and the West government to look into the issue. Challenging the for-

mation of the committee, Tulsi Rani and Renubala moved an appeal before the chief justice's court.

During pendency of the appeal, the committee submitted a report contending that records of the said period was available, but the names of Bhowmick and Karmakar did not appear in those. On November 11 this year, Chief Justice Kargupta directed the SP of East Midnapore East Midnapore district to be personally present in the court with the said records on No-

vember 27. SP Solomon Nesa Kumar informed the court Tuesday that no official record could be found for the period from 1930 to 1946. Manna said.

Having found that the contention of the petitioners were right that the records were not available, the division bench directed the Centre to release the pensions of Bhowmick and Karmakar to their widows.

Bangladeshi court bars Khaleda Zia from contesting next month's polls

DHAKA, Nov 27 (PTI): In a major setback to jailed former Bangladesh prime minister Khaleda Zia, a top court Tuesday ruled that a person jailed for more than two years for more than two years cannot contest polls, effectively ruining her chance to participate in the December 30 polls.

Attorney General Mahbubey Alam said the Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP) chairperson, who is convicted in two graft cases, cannot contest the upcoming 11th general election

11th general next month.

"She is disqualified from taking part in the second elections,"

"" conupcoming elections," Alam told a press conference, hours after the High Court issued a rule saying persons jailed for more than two years even if their appeals are pending with the courts cannot contest the polls.

The 73-year-old ex-premier is currently serving jail terms in two graft cases involving charities named after her slain husband

been in custody since February 8, when Dhaka Special Court convicted her in the Zia Orphanage Trust graft case and sentenced her to five years of imprisonment for embezzling 21 mil-Bangladeshi Taka (USD 252,504) in foreign donations meant for the Trust. On October 30, the High Court doubled her jail term to 10 years.

On October 29, a trial court convicted her in the Zia Charitable Trust graft case and sentenced her to seven years in prison and imposed a fine of Tk 1 million (USD 12,024). The High Court order

came as the BNP, which boycotted the 2014 elections under Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina-led Awami League (AL) government, was set to contest the polls in alliance with the newly formed National Unity Front (NUF) led by eminent jurist Kamal Hossain.

The chief state counsel said even if Zia was released from jail before November 28, the dead-

line of filing the nomination papers, the Constitu-tion would not allow her to contest the polls and "she will have to wait for five more years after her acquittal to take part in the elections".

As per Bangladesh's Constitution, a person sentenced to imprisonment for two years or above for a criminal offence cannot take part in an election unless five vears have elapsed since his/her release.

The two-judge High Court bench comprising Justice Mohammad Nazrul Islam Talukder and Justice KM Hafizul Alam passed the order, rejecting separate petitions filed by five BNP leaders, including Zia's adviser Amanullah Aman, seek-ing a stay on their convictions and sentences in graft cases

The Attorney General said, "If the court allows them to take part in the next general election by staving their conviction. it will go against Article 66 of the Constitution...so the court scrapped their

pleas." Zia was made vice-chairperson of the BNP, the largest political opposition of the country, in March 1983 after the assassination of her husband. She became chairperson of the party on May 10, 1984, a post she is holding till now

In her 35 years of po-litical career, Zia went to the jail several times. 2007-

During the 2007-2008 tenure of the armv-backed caretaker government, she was in jail for about a year on charges of corruption.

Diana used position against me, coach Powar humiliated me: Mithali writes to BCCI

New Delhi, Nov 27 (PTI): Senior Indian woman cricketer Mithali Raj Tuesday slammed Committee of Administrators member Diana Edulji and coach Ramesh Powar, saying the two are biased against her and have tried to "destroy" her.

In a scathing e-mail to the BCCI, which is in possession of PTI, Mithali said her axing from the World T20 semifinal against England reduced her to tears and left her the most deflated in her over two-decade long career.

In the note to BCCI CEO Rahul

In the note to BCCI CEO Rahul Johri and GM (Cricket Operations) Saba Karim, one of India's finest batswomen alleged that she was disrespected by the duo of Edulji and Powar.

"...I felt deflated, depressed and let down. I am forced to think if my services to my country are of any value to a few people in power who are out to destroy me and break my confidence," Mithali, also the ODI captain, wrote in her mail.

While Powar refused to comment on Mithali's allegations, Edulji could not be reached for a response

response.

Mithali spoke about how Edulji's stance backing her axing, made her feel "vulnerable". Edulji, in an interview to PTI, had stated that the team management's decision



could not be questioned on selec-

tion matters.

"To put things in perspective, I have always reposed faith in diana Edulji and have always respected her and her position as a member of the COA.

"Never did I think she will use her position against me, more after hearing what all I had to go through in the Caribbean as I had spoken to her about it," Mithali wrote. A source alleged that Mithali was forced by Edulji to divulge the details of her meeting with Johri and Karim on Monday. "Her brazen support in the

"Her brazen support in the press with regard to the decision of my benching in the semi final of the T20 World Cup has left me deeply distressed, more because she knows the real facts having spoken to me," the player wrote.

Mithali has played 85 T20Is for India and has scored 2288 runs. She averages more than 50 in both the Test and ODI formats.

"May I say that I am aware that by writing this email I am making myself even more vulnerable. She is a COA member while I am just a player," she lamented.

"But the brazen support of a COA member is a clear sign of bias and also that a stance has already been taken against me. By saying 'I don't support someone' and then going all out to support my benching in the press is prejudice of the

clearest sort," said Mithali.

She, however, made it clear that she has no hard feelings for T20 captain Harmanpreet Kaur, who was a party to the decision of her being dropped for the semi-finals and stood by it even after the defeat. However, her relationship with Powar hit nadir in the West Indies and Mithali said she still hasn't understood the breakdown.

"My issues with the coach started immediately as we landed in the West Indies. At first there were small signs that his behaviour towards me was unfair and discriminatory," she alleged.

natory," she alleged.

She said that Powar's behaviour caused her "stress".

"For instance, walking off if I am sitting anywhere around, watching in the nets when others bat but choosing to walk away when I am batting in nets, if I try to go up to him to talk to start looking into his phone and keep walking," she said

"It was embarrassing and very evident to everyone that I was being humiliated. Yet I never lost my cool.

"Finding the situation completely out of control and realising that it is important to resolve issues as it affects the team I reached out to the team manager and conveved my grievances." According to Mithali things went from bad to worse after that.

"After the meeting his behaviour turned worse. He would not even acknowledge me. To him I didn't exist in the team.

"If I was around he would im-

"If I was around he would immediately move away from the scene, if I looked to wish him he would deliberately start looking in other direction. He continued to behave badly as I have already informed you yesterday. It appeared to me that for him the meeting had hurt his ego."

Mithali said she was even asked not to show up at the ground by Powar during the game against Australia. "In the evening after the team meeting before the Australia game, Ramesh rings up in my room and instructs me not to come to the ground as the media will be there," she alleged.

"I was taken aback as to what

"I was taken aback as to what media has to do with me being with the team. I was told I was not to be with my own team in one of our biggest games. I was shell shocked."

Mithali said Powar also deliberately ignored her at nets to make it clear she won't play the semi-finals after which she broke down.

"It was worrying and insulting because the coach was out to destroy and humiliate me," she wrote.

Coach Harendra defends selection of junior players in World Cup squad

The current Indian team has seven out of 18 players from the junior World Cup squad, which under Harenedra clinched the world title two years ago in Lucknow.

Junior players such as Harmanpreet Singh, Varun Kumar, Sumit, Mandeep Singh and golakeeper Krishan Bahadur Pathak were selected in India's squad.

"Constitution gives us the right to marry after 18. So this is not a young team. It's a team that can create history," Harendra said on the eve of Indias opening match against South Africa on Wednesday.

day.

"You have to have patient. Selectors have considered the young players to be good enough to wear India colours, so we need to be proud of them. Every player in the team understands it. My advice to the players would be to stick to the basics and strategy and consider crowd as 12th man and use their ener-

gy," he added

Citing the example of Ireland, who went on to win the women's World Cup earlier this year despite being rated as underdogs, Harendra said India first aim would be to top Pool C and qualify directly for the quarterfinals. "Did anyone think Ireland will reach women's hockey World Cup final and Croatia will make it to FIFA WC final. Every team works on their strategy. It's about that particular day. We want to top the pool and avoid crossovers because then we will get an extra day and know who we will play in the quarters," the chief coach said.

Eight-time Olympic

Eight-time Olympic champion India's only glory at the World Cup came way back in 1975 at Kuala Lumpur when Ajit Pal Singh and his men created history for the past masters of the game.

Since then India has failed to match the standards of the Europeans
-- Netherlands, Germany -- and Australia, who have been ruling the game for over four decades now.

The inability to defend the Asian Games title earlier this year will remain Harendra's biggest failure but the coach said that episode

is a thing of the past now. "The hard fact is that all of us have forgotten the Asian Games defeat and you should also forget. We learn from history, gain experience but there is no point recalling it. We took collective responsibility. We don't talk about it now in our meetings, he said.

Ranked 10 places above world no. 15 South Africa, India will go into their tournament-opener as overwhelming favourites.

"We understand that the first match is important in every tournament. It releases 40 to 50 per cent of pressure. We want full points from the first match. But for points, we can't forget and sacrifice the basics of hockey, the strategy," he said.

"We won't compromise on playing attacking hockey against any team. We want to think ahead of the opponents."

With two matches scheduled for each day, there are significant gaps between matches in the 16-team World Cup and Harendra supported the format, saying it will help all the teams to come out with fresh legs in every game.

legs in every game.
"I support this format

as a coach. Hockey is a fast-paced, result oriented, highly demanding game. It (the gaps) will help us to come out with fresh mind and legs in every match," he said.

Conceding last minute goals has been India's perennial problem in the last few years but Harendra said it' is with all hockey playing nations.

"We always discuss India concede last-minute goal to lose. It has happened in the last 4-5 years, including the Asian Games. But that doesn't only happen with the Indian team. I can give you history where other teams also have lost the same way," he said.

India captain Manpreet Singh too said that their main focus is on topping the pool and avoid cross-overs. "We are not focus-

"We are not focussing on crossovers. If we top the pool, we should not worry about it. We are focusing on our first match," he said.

not worry about it. We are focusing on our first match," he said.

"We have improved over the last 3-4 years. Before that we had never won FIH medals but now we have won Hockey World League bronze, then silver at the Champions Trophy (earlier this year). Now it's the World Cup and we have to show that we have improved at the highest level."

Putin warns against 'reckless' moves | After Khashoggi, Saudi prince after Ukraine declares martial law

Russian President Vlad imir Putin warned warned against Ukraine "reckless acts" on Tues-day after Kiev declared martial law in response to Moscow's seizure of three of its navy vessels.

The Ukrainian parliament late on Monday vot-ed in favour of President Petro Poroshenko's request for the introduction of martial law in parts of the country for 30 days.

The decision came as Ukraine and Russia face their most dangerous crisis in years after Russian forces fired on, boarded and captured Kiev's ships on Sunday off the coast of Crimea.

The incident was the first major confrontation at sea in the long-running conflict pitting Ukraine against Moscow and Russian-backed separatists in the country's east.

It has raised fears of

a wider escalation -- in a conflict that has killed more than 10,000 people since 2014 -- and prompted international calls for restraint and offers of mediation.

Martial law gives Ukrainian authorities the power to mobilise citizens with military experience, regulate the media and restrict public rallies in affected areas.

Moscow has accused Kiev of planning Sunday's confrontation as a provocation aimed at drumming up support for Poroshenko ahead of elections next year and convincing Western gov-

One of the sailors is heard saying "the actions of the Ukrainian armed vessels in the Kerch Strait had a provocatory charac-ter" -- parroting the verter" -- parroting the ver-sion of events put forward by Russian authorities.

Western governments have rallied behind Kiev in the dispute, accusing Russia of illegally blocking access to the Sea of Azov and of taking military action without justification

Kiev urged the United States and European Union to impose more sanctions on Russia over the latest incident.

Britain, Canada, France, Germany and others expressed support for Kiev on Mon-day, with EU President Donald Tusk calling for Russia to return the

Ukrainian sailors and ships and "refrain from further provocations".

The United Nations

Security Council met in an emergency session on the crisis on Monday, where US envoy Nikki Haley called the seizure of the ships an "outrageous violation of sovereign Ukrainian ter-ritory" and slammed "yet another reckless Russian escalation".

She did not, how-

ever, threaten further sanctions on Russia and President Donald Trump suggested it was up to European governments to handle the crisis.

"We don't like what's happening and hopefully it will get straightened out. I know Europe is not -- they are not thrilled. They're working on it too. We're all working on it together," Trump told reporters at the White House

close allies in the Middle East before attending the Group of 20 summit in Argentina on Nov. 30, where he will come face to face with President Donald Trump, who has defended US ties with the kingdom, as well as Eu-ropean leaders and Turkey's president, who has kept pressure mount-ing on Riyadh since Khashoggi was killed and dismembered in the Sau-di Consulate in Istanbul on Oct. 2.

"It's really going to be about can you travel to the rest of Western capitals for the foreseeable future and expect to sort of shake people's hands, and I'm not sure that that's the case," said H A Hellyer, a scholar at the Royal United Services Institute and Atlantic Council.

The trip, aimed at rebuilding his image and reinforcing ties with allies, promises to offer a contrast to the prince's lengthy tour across the United States in April, Bloomberg, Rupert Murdoch, Disney chief Bob Iger, Google co-founder Sergey Brin, Apple's Tim Cook and former President George H. Bush, among many others.

"There's no way he could do that sort of trip right now," Hellyer said.

The crown prince's plan to attend the G-20 summit in Buenos Aires "tells me that he feels that he's ridden out the storm, or that in order for him to ride out the storm this is exactly what he needs to do."

After denying any knowledge of Khashog-gi's death for weeks, Saudi authorities eventually settled on the explanation that he was killed in an operation aimed at forcibly bringing the writer back to the kingdom.

Saudi prosecutors say the plan was master-

minded by two former advisers to the crown prince and are now seek-ing the death penalty for five people allegedly in-

volved in the killing.

That seems to have settled the matter for Trump, who issued an extraordinary statement last week saying the US would not take further action after sanctioning 17 individuals linked to

the killing.

Trump has brushed aside assessments by US intelligence and other experts that the crown nrince must have been involved in the high-lev el operation, and said he would maintain close relations with Saudi Arabia in part because of its oil wealth and its multi-billion-dollar purchases of US arms.

Trump's contention that "maybe he did, may-be he didn't" order the killing appears to have helped pave the way for the crown prince's return

to international forums.

But even if Trump shakes his hand at the G-20 summit, the crown prince could still remain persona non grata with-in Washington's beltway, where members of Congress from both parties have demanded stronger action, as well as Wall Street and Silicon Valley

He could also get icy reception from other leaders at the G-20.

In Europe there have been calls to end arms sales to Saudi Arabia, and Canada could still be smarting from a diplomatic row sparked by Saudi anger at its criticism over human rights in the kingdom.

Turkish President Re-

cep Tayvip Erdogan, who is expected to attend the summit, was instrumental to the global backlash the prince now faces.

Despite the inter-

national outrage, crown prince's decision to travel to Argentina signals that he still has the strong support of his 82-year-old father, King Salman, and faces no major threat at home.

On his first stop on the tour, in the United Arab Emirates, the crown prince was embraced on the tarmac by Abu Dhabi Crown Prince Moham-med bin Zayed, a close ally who has reportedly served as a mentor to the 33-year-old royal.

The crown prince at-tended the Formula One Grand Prix in Abu Dhabi. where he was filmed in a VIP box chatting with the former King of Spain Juan Carlos and Chechen leader Ramzan Kadyrov.

In possible a sign changes underway, Prince Mohammed embarked on his foreign tour with figures who may take on greater prominence as he re-draws his circle of advisers. Those include Minister of State Mohammad Al Shaikh, Chief of General Intelligence Khalid al-Humaidan and royal court adviser Prince Turki bin Mohammed bin Fahd, among others.

"There's a real un-derstanding, I think, in the kingdom, that there needs to be serious structural change to ensure that something like this can never happen again," Alyahya said.

"I think we're going to see definitely some return to institutional-ism, some return to a consensus-based sion-making process and commitment to defined procedures."

Still, it remains to be seen whether a wider circle of advisers will be consulted, whether they will challenge the crown prince and whether he will listen to them.

oup, Survival Intergroup, national, said that any attempt to recover the body would be dangerous for both, the Indian authorities and the Sentinelese, who face being wiped out if any outside diseases are introduced.

"We urge the Indian authorities to abandon efforts to recover John Allen Chau's body. Any such attempt is incredi-bly dangerous, both for the Indian officials, but also for the Sentinelese who face being wiped out if any outside diseases

International's Director Stephen Corry said in a statement on Monday.

"The risk of a deadly epidemic of flu, measles or other outside disease is very real, and increases with every such contact. Such efforts in similar cases in the past have end-ed with the Sentinelese attempting to defend their island by force," he said.

Corry said the body of Chau "should be left alone, as should the Sentinelese." The Sentinelese are generally considered the last pre-Neolithic tribe in the world.

Till June, a foreigner was allowed to visit 29 islands in the Andamans, including the North Sentinel Island, only after taking special permis-sion - the Restricted Area

This "transformation" is the key to his acting and keeps the process intriguing and interesting, Bale said in an interview to PTI.

"It's not necessarily what everybody does. I greatly admire people who are able to be themselves and be entertaining and be one thing all the time. There is an incredible talent to that. I don't have

that. "I like to see how much I can take myself out of each and every character I play. I actually enjoy that I don't have a particular technique and it change all the time. Sometimes it works, sometimes it doesn't," Bale, who is currently in India to promote Andy Serkis' Mowgli: Legend of the Jungle for Netflix, said

The actor, who has spoiled Batman forever for other artistes with his masterful depiction of the angst-ridden superhero in Christopher Nolan's critically-lauded and commercially successful trilogy, said people often attach the tag of "method actor" to him but the term is alien for him.

Not being a trained performer, the 44-year-old approaches every role with some apprehension and that one question everybody ponders over -- Oh god, how am I gonna do this? "I don't consider myself the master of my craft and I think

that's what keeps me intrigued because I never did train. I literally had couple of weekends at YMCA. I make it up each time and my wife knows this. Every time I get cast, I go, 'Oh god How am I gonna do this.' I change my technique every single time," Bale told PTI.

"People have been saving to me that 'you are a method actor'. That requires training in the method and I have no idea what that means at all. I just make it up as I go along," he add-

ed. While superhero fans just can't see or imagine anyone else playing Batman, cinephiles have always held films such as The Machinist , "American Psycho" and "The Fighter" as exam of how great his cinema is.

The star's portrayal of former US vice president Dick Cheney in Adam McKay's upcoming political drama, "Vice", a part for which Bale gained more than 40 pounds, is generating

another Oscar buzz for the actor.

He got the Best Supporting Actor Oscar for his portrayal of trainer Dickie Eklund in David O Russel's sports drama "The Fighter". Playing real people might limit some actors as there is only a certain way one can be but the opposite holds true for Bale, who said he finds it liberating to be other people.

"When you are playing a real person, I find it actually very liberating because sometimes when you are playing an entirely fictional character, you're concerned that you are trying to

steal scenes by being, perhaps, quite an exhibitionist.

Whereas when you know the actual person is that, then you can turn to the director say 'Look at him for instance,' 'The Fighter', for instance, Dickie, who I'm still in touch with, look at Dickie and just come and hang out with him over dinner. He does all these things. Therefore I can get away with it. It's not just the ego of an actor. I find it actually very liberating to play real people," he said.
