Mr Prasad was born on 08 Jul, 1937 in the city of Patna in Bihar. He holds a B.Com degree and is a senior political leader who has had life-long affili-ations with Bharatiya Janata Party [BJP]. In the year 1994, he was elected as a Member of Legislative Council [MLC], a position he held till 2012.

Mr Prasad was earlier ap-pointed as Governor of Meghalaya in Oct 2017. He was a member of the Legislative Council in Bihar for 18 years and a former leader of the opposition in the Bihar Assembly



#### DSA unimpressed with dilution of Article 371F if Sherpas brought under Revenue Order No 1 argument

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 22 AUG

Denzong Sherpa Association [DSA] has asserted that if Chief Minister Pawan Chamling cannot protect the rights of the Sherpa community, then he has no right to speak against the community either. The association alleged that instead of speaking on related issues on the occasion of World Entrepreneurs' Day, a com-ment attributed to the CM on the day proves to DSA that the existence of the Sherpa community

was in danger.
Addressing a press conference here today, DSA spokesperson, Passang Sherpa, criticised the CM's statement that his government would be toppled and that the Bhutias and Lepchas will not agree to provide land protection for Sherpas under Revenue Order No 1 as is being demanded

On the same, he stated that the statement in-dicates that Sikkim Government is being completely "blackmailed". He mentioned that

Sikkimese Sherpa com-munity has only been

demanding for liberation from a historical injustice by seeking protection of their lands under Revenue Order No 1 like is being enjoyed by the Bhutias and since Sherpas are also now counted among the Bhutia community.

He went on to con-tend that blackmailed by feudal thoughts, the State Government will not able to protect the rights of

the Sherpas.
While criticising the CM's statement that since Old Laws of Sikkim are protected by clause (k) of the Article 371F, providing land protec-tion to Sherpas under Revenue Order No 1 would violate clause (k) and hence Article 371F itself, Mr Sherpa referred to several other Old Laws that have been repealed in Sikkim.

Mr Sherpa further stated that if the CM was sincere towards Article 371F, Old Laws and upentrepreneurs coming entrepreneurs of the State, then he should have spoke about the present status of the Registration of Companies (Sikkim) Act, 1961 to entrepreneurs on the occasion of World Entrepreneurship Day.

### CM's statement on Doklam standoff 'anti-national' says SKM

GANGTOK. 22 AUG:

Sikkim Krantikari Morcha has registered its strong objection to Chief Minister Pawan Chamling's statement on the Centre not informing Sikkim about Doklam stand-off published on 21 Aug in a national newspaper. The party has demanded that the CM withdraw his statement immediately and apologize to the Centre, Army and the people of Sikkim and India for his statement

According to SKM, in an article published in The Economic Times, the CM has said that during the Doklam stand-off with China, the State Government was kept in the dark by the Centre and neither the Central Government nor the Army had informed him about

Addressing a press conference here today, SKM spokesperson, Jacob Khaling, stated that the Constitution has demarcated duties and responsibilities of the Union and the State. He added that the Centre and the Army has full right to choose not to disclose sensitive international and border issues

While thanking the Centre and the Army



for standing firm during the Doklam standoff, he expressed that a Chief Minister giving such statements on a sensitive issue very unfortunate and anti-national.

Mr Khaling demanded that the Centre immediately investigate the intension behind the statement of the CM. He stated that such statements will discourage the villpower of the Army and be beneficial for

He further alleged that earlier too China had taken advantage of the CM's statement wherein he had said - "Sikkim did not merge

with India to become a sandwich between China and Bengal".

Likewise, SKM acting president, Kunga Nima Lepcha, stated that such irresponsible and anti-national statement by the CM will jeopardize national security. He added that the CM should consult with his think tanks before speaking on such sensitive issues.

China may again misuse the statement and the CM should stand with the decision of the Centre instead of questioning it, Mr

### Draft policy: Compulsory genetic screening of pregnant women to curb genetic disorders

New Delhi, Aug 22 (PTI): The Centre has prepared a draft policy proposing compulsory genetic screening of all pregnant women to prevent inherited disorders such as thalassemia and sickle cell anaemia along with putting in place advanced facilities for comprehensive care of

such patients.

The policy advocates for pro vision of medicines, including iron chelating agents, leukocyte filters and infusion pumps free initiative, the draft policy also advocates for promotion of manufacture of the equipment and chemicals in the country and "waiver of GST and custom duties to reduce cost of treat-

ment for the affected families".

Titled "Policy For Prevention and Control of Hemoglobinopathies Thalassemia, Sickle Cell Disease and variant Hemoglobins In India", the draft note has been put up on the website of the health ministry seeking comments and suggestions from

The policy recognises that for prevention, the focus should be on creating awareness of these disorders in the community for better acceptance of carrier screening.
"This is recommended for

all pregnant mothers, based on automated red cell counts with confirmation by HPLC analysis for Hb A2 and other hemoglobin

For women identified to be carriers, their husbands will be screened and in couples where


both the partners are carriers, prenatal diagnosis will be offered to ensure that they have a baby unaffected with a clinically significant hemoglobinopathy,"

the draft read. Carrier screening could also be undertaken for high school and college students.

As per the draft policy, all subjects screened would be given a card indicating their status, whether normal, carrier or diseased through systems of colour-coding.

During the programme, IPL trainers conducted demonstration sessions on nursery management for tomato, cauliflower and cabbage seeds. Sessions on seed and soil treatment using fermented cow urine, pseudomonas and Trichoderma viride were also conducted.

Field executive, IPL, Pushpa Pushpa Lal Bastola, demonstrated treatment methods for cauliflower [Suhasini variety], cabbage [Maharani variety] and tomato [Romeo varietyl in nurseries through line sowing method.

### Draft policy: Compulsory genetic...

For sickle cell disease, policy recommended newborn screening to be initi-ated in areas of high prevalence. "Thalassemia and sickle cell diseas-

es are two common genetic disorders that are chronic, life-restricting and require long and specialized treatment. They cause severe distress and financial loss to the family and are a great drain on the health resources of the country.

"With the fall in infant mortality rate due to control of communicable and nutritional disorders in the last decade in India, these disorders have become important causes of morbidity and mortality," the draft policy stated.

According to the draft note, it is estimated that there are almost 3.6 to 3.9 crore carriers of -thalassemia in India and about 10,000 to 15,000 babies with thalassemia major are born each year.

For sickle cell disease there are about 25,00,000 carriers of the gene (Hemoglobin AS), and about 1,25,000 patients of sickle cell disease.

The draft policy has proposed creating of centres of excellence in states that will have advanced facilities required for comprehensive care of patients with thalassemia and sickle cell disease, including a bone marrow transplant unit and a prenatal diagnostic centre.

The centres of excellence will pro-

vide technical support for thalassemia in medical colleges, tertiary care hos-pitals, district level health facilities and primary health centers, as well as impart training to the health profession-

The draft note has recommended creation of a hemoglobinopathy unit in government medical colleges, tertiary care facilities as well as in district level hospitals to carry out therapy as well as preventive activities.

It also recommended setting up of a patient registry for thalassemia and sickle cell disease to obtain information on the number of persons affected and the number of carriers to estimate patients who require various services

#### Hating to Love?

Really, is Indian pride so fragile that an out of turn hug can hurt it?

So, Navjot Singh Sidhu, the former cricketer, one-time road-rage murder accused, TV reality show fixture and now Legislator from Punjab, finds himself in a soup. His "crime" - having hugged the Army Chief of Pakistan during his recent travel there for the swearing in as PM of another cricketer-turned-politician, Imran Khan. And why was that such a boo-boo? Well, because Pakistan supports terrorists with evil designs on India. And while that may be true, why should personal animosity be necessary when the establishments already hate each other so much? If the premiers of the two countries can shake hands and earn praise for it, why should hugging be sacrilege? After all, hugging is to a Punjabi what shaking hands is to the more reserved. But the issue has been dusted up as a national outrage. Must be the timing so close to I-Day, when the nationalism of the easily offended gets an uptick and when distractions are also necessary to divert attention from the more real worries and concern. Remember, it was almost to the day this time two years back when Ramya, an actress who is also a former Congress MP, was facing a private complaint in a Court in South India seeking action on sedition and other charges against her for "insulting" Indian patri-

ots with her remark that "Pakistan is not hell".

There cannot be a better example than these two episodes to understand the problems of nationalism versus the confidence of patriotism. Schools and colleges across the country should take these episodes to debate what they want from the future citizens – compassionate souls or boorish clowns infected with blind faith, because in these instances, we have examples of both. It all started with some Union Minister referring to Pakistan as "hell". As expected, the right-wingers loved this pronouncement. There also appears to be a law in the land where inciting hatred against another country is also considered a bookable offence. No one appears to talk of that law though.

India and Pakistan have their issues, but these are issues which obsess the governments and leaders. That is not to say that these are not important issues or that they don't affect the citizens at all, but it is also a fact that as far as the people are concerned, Pakistan loves Bollywood and India loves Pakistani TV soaps. Agreed, a very simplistic analogy, but one which works fine to drive home the point that governments are not the same as people; regimes can be hellish and situations nightmarish, but an entire country or all its citizens are not.

The real worry is the mindset which is gaining credence all over; a mindset which requires people to constantly run down everyone else all the time so that they can keep their chest puffed. Blind faith is embarrassing enough, but to demand it of everyone is dangerous, but that is increasingly what is being asked of Indians. These demands used to be made in the past as well, but under the current dispensation at the Centre these come laced with a semblance of authority and are often also backed by the state machinery. The madness of gau-rakshak gangs and the naked aggression against Dalits, students and thinkers – basically everyone who does not worship at the altar of the warped interpretation of nationalism, all these instances stand proof of the fact that the lunatic fringe is on the verge of becoming the new normal.

If the people arrive at an informed choice that they want to become ultra-nationalists, there is nothing one can do. But if they are conned into mouthing nationalism when they would rather be patriots first, well, that would be wrong and needs to be challenged. It is hence important that because there is so much blurring of the lines between nationalism and patriotism, at least schools and colleges make the effort to allow the young to discuss the differences and decide for themselves which pigeonhole they want to lock themselves into. But then again, a generation which has given up its ability to think for itself (because they allow TV anchors to do it for them) cannot make out the difference between nationalism and patriotism, but the young should be encouraged to see the contrast, discover the nuances and make an informed choice.

# Why it matters that teens are reading less

Most of us spend much more time with digital media than we did

a decade ago. But today's teens have come of age with smartphones in their pockets. Compared to teens a couple of decades ago, the way they interact with traditional media like books and movies is fundamentally different.

My co-authors and I analyzed nationally representative surveys of over one million U.S. teens collected since 1976 and discovered an almost seismic shift in how teens are spending their free time

Increasingly, books seem to be

IT'S ALL ABOUT THE SCREENS

By 2016, the average 12th grader said they spent a staggering six hours a day texting, on social media, and online during their free time. And that's just three activities; if other digital media activities were included, that estimate would surely rise.

Teens didn't always spend that much time with digital media. Online time has doubled since 2006, and social media use moved from a periodic activ ity to a daily one. By 2016, nearly nine out of 10 12th-grade girls said they visited social media sites

Meanwhile, time spent playing video games se from under an hour a day to an hour and a half on average. One out of 10 8th graders in 2016 spent 40 hours a week or more gaming – the time commitment of a full-time job.

With only so much time in the day, doesn't

mething have to give?

Maybe not. Many scholars have insisted that time online does not displace time spent engaging with traditional media. Some people are just more interested in media and entertainment, they point out, so more of one type of media doesn't necessarily mean less of the other. However, that doesn't tell us much about what happens across a whole cohort of people when time spent on digital media grows and grows. This is what large surveys con-ducted over the course of many years can tell us.

MOVIES AND BOOKS GO BY THE WAYSIDE
While 70 percent of 8th and 10th graders once went to the movies once a month or more, now only about half do. Going to the movies was equally popular from the late 1970s to the mid-2000s, suggesting that Blockbuster video and VCRs didn't kill going to the movies.

But after 2007 – when Netflix introduced its

video streaming service – moviegoing began to lose its appeal. More and more, watching a movie became a solitary experience. This fits a larger pattern: In another analysis, we found that today's teens go out with their friends considerably less than previous generations did.

But the trends in moviegoing pale in comparison to the largest change we found: An enormous decline in reading. In 1980, 60 percent of 12th graders said they read a book, newspaper or magazine every day that wasn't assigned for school.

By 2016, only 16 percent did - a huge drop, even though the book, newspaper or magazine could be one read on a digital device (the survey question doesn't specify format).

The number of 12th graders who said they had not read any books for pleasure in the last year nearly tripled, landing at one out of three by 2016. For iGen – the generation born since 1995 who has spent their entire adolescence with smartphones books, newspapers and magazines have less and

less of a presence in their daily lives.

Of course, teens are still reading. But they're reading short texts and Instagram captions, not longform articles that explore deep themes and require critical thinking and reflec-tion. Perhaps as a result, SAT reading scores in 2016 were the lowest they have ever been since record keeping began in 1972.

It doesn't bode well for their transition to college, either. Imagine going from reading two-sentence captions to trying to read even five pages of an 800-page college text-book at one sitting. Reading and comprehending longer books and chapters takes practice, and teens aren't getting that practice.

There was a study from the Pew Research Center a few years ago finding that young people actually read more books than older people. But that included books for school and didn't control for age. When we look at pleasure reading across time, iGen is reading markedly less than pre-

vious generations THE WAY FORWARD

So should we wrest smartphones from iGen's hands and replace them with paper books?

Probably not: smartphones are teens' main

form of social communication.

However, that doesn't mean they need to be on them constantly. Data connecting excessive digital media time to mental health issues suggests a limit of two hours a day of free time spent with screens, a restriction that will also allow time for other activities - like going to the movies with friends or reading.

Of the trends we found, the pronounced decline in reading is likely to have the biggest negative impact. Reading books and longer articles is one of the best ways to learn how to think critically, understand complex issues and separate fact from fiction. It's crucial for being an informed voter, an involved citizen, a successful college student and a productive employee.

If print starts to die, a lot will go with it.

### Kofi Annan: a complicated legacy of impressive achievements, and some profound failures

Kofi Annan (80) was an important historical figure who played a critical role in many key events of the 1990s and 2000s. His death is there-fore an opportunity to both celebrate his life and to begin honestly assessing his contributions to the world.

The Ghanaian diplomat's legacy is

complicated. He served as both head of the United Nations peacekeeping and as Secretary General of the UN. His tenure in these high offices - from 1992 to 2006 – were marked by great human tragedies as well as episodes of progress. His role in these events raises difficult questions about indi-vidual responsibility and the role of international organisations and their leaders in creating a more peaceful and just world.

On the plus side, his contributions were impressive. He was an effective diplomat, a shrewd negotiator and an intelligent strategist. He was such a successful bureaucratic operator that he was the first UN employee to rise to the position of Secretary General.
When he took over the organisa

tion it was facing numerous challenges. They included a tense and often hostile relationship with its most powerful member state, the US, a difficult budgetary situation and what appeared to be an inability to fulfil its core peacekeeping, human rights and development functions.

By the end of his term, things

looked very different. Relations with key member countries had been re-stored, the UN had a sound fiscal position and both he and the organisation had won the Nobel Peace Prize.
In addition, the organisation had

launched some important new initiatives. It had adopted the Millenium Development Goals, which contributed to significant gains in health, education and human welfare in many countries around the world. The initiative was so successful that it was succeeded by the even more ambitious Sustainable Development Goals.

In addition, the international community had established the International Criminal Court and had

begun prosecuting war criminals for their deeds in the wars in the former Yugoslavia and Rwanda

He had also initiated the process of getting corporations to recognise and accept their responsibility for the environmental, social and human rights consequences of their activities. This process moved slowly. But his efforts ultimately led to the UN Human Rights Council unanimously endorsing the Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights in 2011. These have now been incorporat ed into the human rights policies of many companies and have led to a number of countries adopting national action plans on the human rights responsibilities of business.

After he left the UN. Annan con tinued to do good work with both the Elders, a group of global leaders working for peace and human rights, and his own foundation. In these capacities he had some notable achievements. He helped resolve the post-election violence in Kenya, helped ensure peaceful elections in Nigeria and a number of other countries, and helped promote more productive and sustainable agriculture and good governance across Africa. He also tried, albeit unsuccessfully, to end the civil war in Syria and the campaign against the Rohingyas in

But there's also a darker side to

THE TRAGEDIES

Annan was the head of UN Peacekeep ing operations in the 1990s when two of the biggest failures in UN history happened. Under his watch both the Rwandan genocide and the massacres in Srebrenica took place.

In both cases his commanders on the ground requested authority to take stronger action to limit the risk of tragedy to those under their protection. In both cases he declined their request –with tragic results.

In addition, under his leadership UN peacekeepers in a range of countries, including Liberia, Sierra Leone and the Democratic Republic of Congo, were found to be sexually exploiting those they were charged to protect. The UN failed to respond promptly to these actions and they continued into the 2000s.

In most organisations, a leader who is responsible for such profound failures would be held accountable. If not fired, or forced to resign, they would at the very least be moved to a position of lesser authority. But this didn't happen because the UN has poor mechanisms and a weak culture of accountability. In fact, the UN and its member states, decided to promote Annan, selecting him to replace the first African Secretary General Boutros Boutros Ghali who was deemed to be too independent minded by the US.

Annan continued relying on the

was in office. His son was implicated in the infamously corrupt food-for-oil programme that was initiated to help the Iraqi population during the period

of sanctions against Saddam Hussein.
Eventually, under pressure, he appointed the independent Volcker Commission to investigate the programme. It concluded that, although Annan himself was not guilty of any wrong doing, his actions in response to the abuses were inadequate, in-cluding that he had failed to refer the matter to the UN's independent watchdog agency.

He also tolerated sexual harassment within the UN Secretariat, pro-tecting the former head of the UN refugee agency when he was accused of sexual harassment, penalising his accuser and then relying on the UN's legal immunity to avoid having to respond to her efforts to seek jus-tice. The adverse publicity eventually forced the guilty official to resign


LESSONS TO BE DRAWN
There is no doubt that running a complex international institution like the UN is difficult and requires leaders who are willing to compromise. Given the Secretary General's weak posi-tion, it may also be inevitable that its leaders will have to turn a blind eve to some acts and omissions that have tragic and possibly evil consequences in order to advance higher priorities.

Annan showed throughout his career that he was a master at playing this game. As a result, his record includes both some impressive achievements and some profound failures. It will be up to history to decide if he made the right choices and struck the correct balance between doing good and tolerating evil.

In the meanwhile, we should all draw lessons from the life of this important historical figure about importance of holding leaders and the institutions that govern our world accountable for their actions

and decisions.

#### Brus cancel protest rallv

AIZAWL, AUG 22 (PTI): Bru people lodged in relief camps in Tripura today cancelled their proposed protest rally in Mizoram's Mamit district as the administration did not give them permission to hold the rally, police said.

The inmates of the relief camps in North Tripura district, under the aegis of a newly-formed Mizoram Bru Displaced People's Coordination (MBDPCC) had asked for permission for holding a rally be-tween Kanhmun an Zawlnuam villages, but the permission was not given by the Mamit district administration, police said.

The permission for the rally was not granted as district administration apprehend that the rally may heighten communal tension, officials said.

The MBDPCC, a breakaway group of the Mizoram Bru Displaced People's Forum (MBDPF) is opposed to the agreement of July 3 in which the Centre, Mizoram and Tripura governments and MBDPF were signatories.

The agreement stated that all the Bru refugees were to be repatriated before September 30.

The agreement stip-ulated that Rs four lakh for each repatriated Bru family would be depos-ited in the bank account of the head of the family which would mature af ter three years and pay-ment of Rs 1.5 lakh as housing assistance.
Each repatriated Bru

family would be given Rs 5,000 through Direct Benefit Transfer every month and a free ration

for two years.
Thousands of Brus are lodged in the Tri-pura relief camps since late 1997 in the wake of a communal tension triggered by the brutal murder of Lalzawmliana, a forest guard inside the Dampa Tiger Reserve on October 21, 1997 by Bru National Liberation Front (BNLF) militants.

#### Seven labourers injured as under construction bridge collapses

IMPHAL, AUG 22 (PTI): Seven labourers were injured when an un-der construction bailey bridge collapsed in Manipur's Jiribam district today, police said.

The bailey bridge was being constructed over Gorkhale river to connect Borberkra village to Jattarpur. At around 8 am this morning the bridge collapsed injuring seven labourers, they said.

The injured labourers were rushed to Borbekra health centre from where they were referred to a hospital in Silchar in neighbouring Assam, the police said.

District officials said the 160 feet long bailey bridge was being constructed by a private con-tractor and the project was being funded by the Rural Development Ministry un-der the Pradhan Mantri Gram Sadak Yojana.

### NASA tracks monsoon rains behind Kerala floods

NASA has released a video created using satellite data that provides an estimate of the intense rainfall over India in the past week and shows the spread of the resulting severe flooding in Kerala and parts of Karnataka.

The summer monsoon is a regular feature this time of year in India, and it can bring heavy rains to the region. However, periodically areas of low pressure can form within the general monsoon trough and bring even more rain.

Kerala is facing its worst

floods in nearly a century that has left at least 231 people dead, and forced 3.14 lakh people out of their homes. The Centre has declared this calamity of 'severe nature'. Rainfall accumulations from August 13 to 20 showed two bands of heavy rain across India, NASA said in a statement.

The first band appeared



much broader and extends across the northern part of the peninsula with weekly rainfall totals ranging from over 5 inches towards the west-ern half of the peninsula to as much as 14 inches over parts of the eastern half towards the Bay of Bengal. The first band

monsoon circulation

second band appeared more concentrated and intense and is closely aligned with the southwest coast of India and the Western Ghats where onshore flow was enhanced by an area of low pressure embedded with-

in the general monsoon.

Weekly rainfall totals in this band are generally over 10 inches with embedded areas exceeding 16 inches. The maximum estimated value from the data in this band was 18.5 inches, NASA said.

Although the extreme Himalayan topography is much more well-known, another contributing factor to the heavy rains along the south-west coast of India is the Western Ghats, it said.

Though much smaller than the Himalayas, this mountain range runs parallel to the West Coast of India with many

As a result, the Western Ghats are well positioned to enhance rainfall along the West Coast of India as they intercept the moisture laden air being drawn in off the warm waters of the northern Indian Ocean and Arabian Sea as part of the southwest monsoon circulation.

The Integrated Multi-sat-Retrievals for GPM (IMERG) is used to estimate precipitation from a combination of passive microwave sensors, including microwave sensor and infrared data.

The data is generated every half an hour, thereby allowing scientists to track rainfall across the globe almost in real time.

GPM is the Global Precip-

itation Measurement mission core satellite. GPM is a joint mission between NASA and the Japan Aerospace Agency,

### Nepal forms panel to discuss energy cooperation with China

KATHMANDU, AUG 22 (PTI): The Nepal government has formed a committee to hold talks with China to implement a key bilateral agreement on energy cooperation, which could potentially end the land-locked nation's decades-long dependency on India for its power

Nepal and China had signed the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on Energy Cooperation during the visit of Nepali Prime Minister KP Sharma Oli to Beijing in June.

Nepal, which used to import its en

tire energy needs from India, turned to China in 2015, after facing crippling oil supply shortages following the economic blockade at the Indo-Nepal bor-

der by agitating ethnic Madhesis. The Madhesis, who are Indian-ori-gin inhabitants of the Terai region bordering India, alleged that Nepal's new constitution promulgated by the then government did not give them sufficient political representation.

At the height of the economic block-

ade, which triggered a wave of anti-India sentiments in the country, Nepal began strengthening ties with China, courting infrastructure investments and signing deals on energy.

To implement the MoU with China,

Energy Secretary Anup Kumar Upadhyay has been appointed as the co-chair of the seven-member committee. The panel includes representatives from Nepal Electricity Authority and the Energy Ministry as its members, officials

The committee meeting, which will be held in Kathmandu on September 27 and 28, will deliberate on energy cooperation and progress on investment exchange in the sector, they said.

The committee will prepare the ground for creating a conducive environment to promote investment in the energy development from both govern-ment and private sectors. Nepal had signed a similar energy

cooperation agreement with Bangla-desh also earlier this month.

### Croc nesting season comes to end at Bhitarkanika Park

BHITARKANIKA NATIONAL PARK

(ODISHA), AUG 22 (PTI): Altogether 36 estuarine crocodile babies have emerged from the artificially hatched eggs at Bhitarkanika Na-tional Park, marking the culmina-tion of this year's nesting season for the reptile, a senior forest official said.

The hatchlings will be released in a "captive pond" in the park and reared till they grow up to one metre, he said.

"Of the forty eggs collected from the wild for artificial nesting, 36 have hatched. The sight of baby crocodiles breaking out of eggshells and crawling aimlessly around the breeding centre was a visual treat. Divisional Forest Offi-cer, Rajnagar Mangrove (wildlife) Division, Bimal Prasanna Acharya, said.

Earlier this month, naturally bred crocodile fledglings had broken out of their eggshells to make their way to water bodies in and around the park. he said.
"The emergence of

baby crocs from the nests, both in captivity and in the wild, marks the culmination of the annual breeding season of these reptiles," Acharya stated.

Usually, it takes three

years for a baby to grow up to one metre, the DFO said.
"The baby crocodiles

are not immediately released in the wild as there is possibility of predators devouring them.

The mortality rate of croc hatchlings is exceedingly high. Out of five hundred baby crocodiles, only one reaches adulthood," he claimed.

The forest officials had kept the national park closed from May 1 to July 31 owing to the nesting period of the reptiles.

Funded by the ited National Development Programme and Food and Agriculture Organisation, the rear and release programme crocodiles has been going on here since 1975, Acharya said.

The number of crocodiles at Bhitarkanika has increased from 96 in 1974 to 1,698

this year, he said.

"Adequate conser-vation measures by the state forest department have led to a systematic rise in the number of these reptiles over the years," the DFO added.

Bhitarkanika is also

home to a 23-foot-long salt-water crocodile, which figured in the Guinness Book of World Records in 2006 as the largest crocodile in the

### Stalemate continues in Bengali serial industry

KOLKATA, Aug 22 (PTI): The stand-off between artistes and producers of Bengali TV serials remained unresolved for the fifth day today, with no shooting taking place in any of the eight studios of the city.

The producers' association said it was ready for talks with no pre-condition, while the artistes body maintained that dialogue would start only after get-ting a formal letter from the other side.

Following a call by the Artists' Forum demanding regularisation of their payment, the actors were on a ceasework from August 18.
A spokesman of the Welfare Association of Television Producers (WATP)

said the producers were ready for talks with the Forum but there should not be any pre-condition. Forum General Secretary Arindam

nguly maintained that talks with the WATP can take place only after getting a formal letter from the producers invit-ing it for dialogue. Ganguly said the Forum wanted that

all artistes should get their dues as decided in a meeting between the Federation of Cine Technicians and Workers of East India and the producers on July 7 and they should not be forced to work for more than 14 hours.

The WATP spokesman said the 14hour stipulation may not be feasible during outdoor shoots, as it takes time to make all arrangements before a shoot. But still they were ready for talks on every issue without any pre-conditions with the Forum which had "unilaterally called the ceasework from August 18", he said.

Ganguly, on the other hand, said the actors had turned up at studios and were ready to begin shoots on August 18. but the WATP showed no urgency in addressing their wage problem.

The Forum demands that payment

of salaries of every artiste be paid within the 15th of the next month and hourly basis of payment if the shooting schedule of an artiste exceeds 10 hours.

It said this arrangement has been agreed upon in the July 8 meeting between the Federation of Cine Technicians and Workers of East India, the Forum and the producers.

The WATP, however, said the July 8 meeting did not pass any resolution about arrangement of payment and only recorded the minutes.

Ganguly said many producers paid the wage of the artistes in the given time, but many did not and the Forum took up the agitation in the interest of every artiste



#### **000,8 IIA** candidates fail exam for accountant's posts in Goa

PANAJI, Aug 22 (PTI): As many as 8,000 candidates appeared for an examination conducted for 80 posts of accountant in the Goa government, but all failed the test.

The candidates, all graduates, needed to secure a minimum of 50 marks out of the total 100 to qualify but none got it, a senior official said on condition of anonymity.

Goa's director of accounts, in a notification issued yesterday, said none of the candidates, who appeared for the initial recruitment examination held on Janu ary 7 this year, secured the minimum qualifying marks required to get through.

The directorate of accounts had advertised 80 posts of accountant in the common account cadre in October last year.

The five-hour examination included a 100 marks paper on English, general knowledge and accounts-related questions, the official said.

The successful candidates were supposed to go through a round of oral interview before the final selection.

Aam Aadmi Party's

Goa general secretary Pradeep Padgaonkar criticised the delay in announcement of results and said the failing of all 8,000 candidates is a sad commentary on the "collapse" of the state's edu cation system.

It is a "big shame" on the Goa University and the commerce colleges that produce these graduates, he added.



### Rahi becomes first Indian woman to shoot Asiad gold

Rahi Sarnobat today became the first Indian female shooter to win a gold at the Asian Games, achieving the rare feat after a nerve-wracking 25m air pistol finals here today.

The 27-year-old held her nerve to pip Thailand's Naphaswan Yangpaiboon in a heart-stopping contest after both were tied at 34 points following 10 series of five shots each, taking it to a shoot-off.

Both found the target four times in the shoot-off, leading to another shoot-off where Rahi shot three and the Thai two, ensuring a historic gold for the Kohlapur-born shooter. The bronze went to South

Korea's Kim Minjung. Rahi was in the lead for

the major part of the final and her first 10 shots were on tar-



get. She got a five out five even in the sixth series.

With her stellar effort. Rahi became the second gold medallist from the Indian

shooting contingent after 16-year-old Saurabh Chaudhary had shot a gold in the 10m pistol finals yesterday.
She is also the sixth Indian

to shoot a gold at the Games joining Chaudhary, Jaspal Rana, Randhir Singh, Jitu Rai and Ronjan Sodhi. Her 34 in the finals also ended up as a

The talented Manu Bhaker cracked under pressure to finish sixth in the finals. The 16-year-old had a remarkable morning as she had shot 593 to equal the Games qualification record. Rahi had sneaked into the finals in seventh

place, shooting 580. Rahi, who had become India's first pistol shooter to win a gold in World Cup back in 2013, had suffered a serious elbow injury last year. Realising that she needed a tweak in her technique, Rahi roped in Munkhba yar Dorjsuren, a two-time world champion and Olympic medallist from Germany.

"I had to change her technique and I also worked on her a lot on the mental aspect of the game. She was already a high-level shooter and needpared her for the shoot-off," Dorjsuren, who moved to Ger-

many from Mongolia, told PTI. Mongolian-German coach also knows the legendary Gabriele Buhlmann well. Buhlmann had coached Abhinav Bindra to India's only in-

dividual Olympic gold in 2008. Rahi is a double gold medallist at the 2010 Delhi Commonwealth Games and had a bronze in the 25m pistol pairs event at the 2014 Incheon Asian Games.

In the women's Rifle 3 Positions event, Anjum Moudgil and Gayathri Nithyanandam failed to qualify for the final. Moudgil had a great start to the qualification but flopped in the standing series to bow out of the competition.

#### Dipa pulls out of artistic team finals as knee injury flares up

JAKARTA, AUG 22 (PTI): Star Indian gymast Dipa Karmakar today pulled out of the artis-tic team finals of the ongoing Asian Games here after a career-threatening knee flared up again.

"...there was risk of a dangerous injury, so she could not be her best. We will give her rest from the team event but she will definitely do well in (balancing) beam finals," Dipa's coach Bisweswar Nandi told PTI

Asked if competing in beam finals will affect the knee adversely, Nandi said, "No, the landing is not hard on balancing

A sobbing Dipa blamed it on a jerk felt during the 'podium practice' and insisted she will strive to make up for the lost op-portunity by shining in the bal-



Dipa, who attained global fame attempting the death-defying 'Produnova' vault at a stage no less than Olympics for a fourth-place finish in 2016, could not even qualify for her pet event here.

"I felt jerk during podium training. I could not do my best. I had trained hard for this," Dipa

After the high of Rio, Dipa a knee injury and had made a comeback only recently at the

World Challenge Cup in Mersin Turkey, where she won a gold in vault.

It was her first event after undergoing an Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL) surgery in Mumbai, last vear

in July. She was forced to skip the Commonwealth Games too.

Nandi said Dipa was incon-solable after failing to qualify "She said, vault is my iden-

tity, what will people say? I told her that it was not her fault but she was very upset. She did not have dinner last night and now she is refusing to breakfast too," Nandi said.

Explaining how the injury flared up, Nandi said, "On Mon-

day she started feeling a jerk in her knee while landing. The surface here is hard and the one in Delhi was soft (foam) which would absorb the ierk.

"We consulted the IOA doctor here and he advised that she should not push, otherwise it will aggravate."

Despite the heartbreak, Dipa can take solace from the fact that she is the first Indian gymnast to qualify for beam finals at the Asian Games

Nandi said she will consult Dr Anant Joshi, who is conducted her ACL surgery, after returning to India but he is confident that Dipa will make a comeback soon.

"It's a jerk and a two-week rest would be enough. We just did not want to aggravate the injury, so speed had to be com-promised. She will be back and

She won the first set 54 minutes and took only 27 minutes to claim the second set.
Raina came back from

behind to take the first set 6-4 against Chong of Hong Kong. Raina was trailing 0-3 and 1-4 at the beginning of the match before staging a comeback.

Raina thus assured herself of at least a bronze medal.

## After Bindra, another German hand produces a champion in Rahi Sarnobat

PALEMBANG, AUG 22 (PTI): There is something about Germans and his toric moments in Indian shooting.

It was a German, the legendary Gaby Buhlmann, at the helm when Abhinav Bindra became India's first and till now the only individual Olympic gold medallist back in 2008.

Ten vears later, another German hand, Munkhbayar Dorjsuren, played a pivotal role as Rahi Sarnobat became the first Indian woman shooter to win a gold at the Asian Games today. Rahi fell just short of saving that

today's performance would not have been possible if it was not for Dorsformer Olympic medallist, world champion.

Dorsjuren is originally a Mongolian who moved to Germany and claimed an Olympic bronze for the country back in 2008, the same year Bindra scripted history for Indian shooting.

"It is like a mother-daughter re-

lationship. Her daughter is nearly my age. We have been together for almost a year," said Rahi, who rushed to hug Dorsjuren after winning a



tense shoot-out in the final. The coach kissed her in return.

Dorsiuren has instilled a champi on mindset in Rahi and it was on full display with the Pune-resident not giving up till the final shot.

"She has achieved a lot so her attitude towards competition and per-formance is really different and that matters a lot. More than the technical things, these things matter," said the 27-year-old who is a deputy collector in Maharashtra.

Rahi had not won a major medal since the Commonwealth Games gold in 2014. An elbow injury which she picked up even before Glasgow set her back for the next two years.

After taking a seven-month break in 2016, she had to try something different. In came Dorsjuren but she came at a huge price.

"I came to know that she retired

Dorsjuren too acknowledged that Rahi needed to be mentally stronger.

"I had to change her technique and I also worked a lot on the mental aspect of her game. She was already high-level shooter and needed some tweak in her game. It was a close final but I had prepared her for

the shoot-off," the 49-year-old said.
Rahi was taken aback when
she was told that she had become the first female from India to win a shooting gold at Asian Games. But this medal was extremely important for her, having also undergone a laparoscopic surgery earlier this year.

"This was important for me to open my mind. It has taken me to the time I was winning medals," said the Kolhapur-born who is now eyeing an Olympic quota place in the upcoming World Championships.
Rahi is an avid reader who never

gets excited. Even what she did today did not excite her much.

"Shooting is life for me." What does she do in her free time? "Shooting only," she said with a hearty laugh. And when she is not shooting, she is reading.

"I have got four books kept in my room at the Games Village. I am currently reading S L Bhyrappa. He is a Kannada writer but I am reading the Marathi translated version. It is about human relations and philosophy. I have three days free so I am going to back to my room and finish it." said Rahi.

Next stop is the Worlds in Changwon in South Korea, the place where she won her only World Cup gold, back in 2013

"I hope Changwon is lucky for me again," Rahi added.

## Brilliant India pull back with 203-run win in 3rd Test



NOTTINGHAM, AUG 22 (PTI): India's cornered cricketers produced a fantastic col-lective performance to outclass England by 203 runs in the third Test to keep the five-match series alive, here today.

Needing only a wicket on the final

morning. India completed the formalities in only 2.5 overs as England were all out for 317, well short of the mammoth victory target of 521 runs.

India now trail England 1-2 but more importantly got some breathing space after a heart-breaking defeat in Edgbaston, followed by the debacle at the Lord's.

The final wicket was taken by Ravi-

chandran Ashwin, who dismissed James Amderson (11), caught by Ajinkya Rahane

The heartening aspect was the kind of domination shown by the Indian team in what can easily be termed as a complete performance under Virat Kohli's captaincy outside the sub-continent.

While openers KL Rahul and Shikhai Dhawan were solid if not spectacular, the

ball bowlers Ishant Sharma (2/32 and 2/70) and Mohammed Shami (1/56

and 1/78) were relentless in their attack Vice-captain Ajinkya Rahane (81 i first innings) and Test specialist Cheteshwar Pujara (72 in second innings) also put their hands up when it mattered the most.

Hardik Pandva (five-for and half-century) produced an all-round performance with wickets and runs to justify his place and make a statement to the sceptics

The slip catching improved by leaps bounds with Rahul taking seven catches

Rishabh Pant showed why he is considered a minefield of talent during his eventful stay at the crease.

Pant might still be a work in progress as far as glove-work is concerned but five catches in the first innings showed that it won't be easy for the first choice Test keeper Wriddhiman Saha to just walk back into the team once he gets fit.

Last but not the least was skipper himself. Easily the best batsmen across both to 440 after knocks of 97 and 103 in the third Test

Call it a coincidence, Kohli has accumu lated exactly 200 runs in the first and third

Test matches.

With two hundreds and two half-centuries. Kohli has made sure that there are no debates on who is the best batsmen in world cricket currently. He has now scored hundreds in Australia, South Africa, New Zealand and England.

The Indian captain's ability to cut down on his scoring shots, showing pa-tience when Jimmy Anderson was on fire was hallmark of his greatness.

Such has been his domination that the second-highest scorer across both the teams is Jonny Bairstow (206 runs) while Jos Buttler, after his maiden Test hundred.

### Temple school in Pak where Muslim woman teaches Hindu students

KARACHI, AUG 22 (PTI): Inside a Hindu temple in a shanty area in Pakistan's Karachi city, Anum Agha wear-ing the traditional Muslim Hijab greets her students with 'salaam' and gets a loud 'Jai Shri Ram' in response.

Anum runs a school inside the temple in the Basti Guru area of the southern port city. The school is situated in the middle of an infor-mal Hindu settlement which is facing constant threats from land grabbers.

But Anum is determined to impart knowledge about education, health and basic rights to the children of the


minority community.

In the settlement, 80 to 90 Hindu families live in a close cluster of wooden huts and some semi-constructed

One can see Anum hold-ing discussions with children of the settlement after her

classes are over.

"Everyone is surprised when I tell them about our school inside this temple but we had no other place to hold

The classes are conducted in the main area of the temple. The walls of the temple are plastered with posters of Hindu deities and statues of Hindu Gods placed up on a higher perch

The lack of basic facilities is noticeable as one moves around the settlement located in Rehman Colony near Mahmoodabad but for land

piece of land. "There have been at least two incidents in the last four years when some huts were set on fire and the Hindu families were threatened and told to get out of the area," Shiva Dharni, a community

Recently authorities also cut electricity and water connections to the Basti, which was set up in the 60s when the Hindu families migrated from Ghotki in interior Sindh

sions a few years ago when a Muslim resident apparently started propagating an idea that a mosque should be constructed over the land.

"These land grabbers try to persuade the Muslim clerics that having a settlement of lower caste Hindu in the center of a proper Muslim neighbourhood is unacceptable, Arif Habib, who heads the non-governmental Initiator Human Development Foun-dation which has brought Anum to run the school in the

temple, said.

"These are vulnerable communities and they are under threat from non-state actors, I mean land grabbers who want them to evacuate the plot where this settle-ment is located," he said.

Anum reluctantly mits that some of the Mus-lim residents living around the settlement don't like her involvement with the sched-uled caste Hindu families and her holding classes.

"But I do it because these people are not even aware of

dren want to gain knowledge and education. Some of them attended other schools in the area but faced social and reli-

gious issues," Anum said. She said that the Hindu elders were very happy that their children, specially the girls, don't have to leave the

settlement for education. Asked whether she has faced difficulties as a Muslim teacher, Anum said she did

face challenges. "But I never talk about religion and avoid hurting their sensitivities. I try to keep them focused on different subjects and religion is not

one of them," she said.
"I respect them as human beings and they respect me back. That is how we work. We celebrate religious festivals together. I say salaam to them and they respond with Jai Shri Ram."

She feels the school can serve as an example of how different communities can co-exist peacefully in the Muslim majority nation while respecting each other.

#### Rohingya refugees celebrate holiday amid memories of home

KUTUPALONG, AUG 22 (AP): Hundreds of thousands of Rohingya refugees living in sprawling camps in Bangladesh are celebrating the Muslim holiday of Eid al-Adha, praying for better lives as they wonder if they'll ever again celebrate at their homes in Myanmar.

People streamed into makeshift mosques in the camps, the children dressed in new clothing. Those who could afford it feasted on buffalo meat.

Muslims often slaugh-ter sheep, cattle or goats on Eid Al-Adha, and distribute some of the meat

### for victims of terrorism: UN chief United Nations, Aug 22 (PTI): UN Sec-

retary General Antonio Guterres has called for global support for the victims of terror-ism and their families, stressing that it is a "moral imperative" to protect their rights and amplifying their voices will help to chal-lenge the narrative of hatred that terrorism aims to spread.

Recognising the impact of terrorism on the lives of ordinary people worldwide was the focus yesterday to mark the first Inter-national Day of Remembrance of and Trib-ute to the Victims of Terrorism.

The UN General Assembly adopted a resolution last December and proclaimed August 21 as the annual day to honour and support victims and survivors of terrorism.
"Supporting victims and their families

is a moral imperative, based on promot-

ing, protecting and respecting their human rights," the UN chief said yesterday .

Challenge narrative of hatred, division by caring

"Caring for victims and survivors and mplifying their voices helps to challenge the narrative of hatred and division that terrorism aims to spread. We need to provide victims with long-term assistance, including financial, legal, medical and psychosocial

Terrorism continues to pose a serious threat to international peace and security and Guterres pointed out that the UN, too, is regularly targeted.

He recalled that this week marked the 15th anniversary of the bombing of the organisation's compound in Baghdad in which 22 people were killed, while some peacekeeping operations are under constant threat.

Although more countries are being

affected by terrorism, the UN said most victims can be found in just a handful, namely Afghanistan, Iraq, Nigeria, Somalia "But after terrorist attacks, we rare-

ly hear about those who were killed and injured; the ordinary women, men, girls and boys, who were going about their daily business when their lives ended or were changed forever," Guterres said.

"We rarely hear about their surviving families, friends and communities, who must learn to live with the burden of terrorism for their entire lives."

The UN chief said the international day

therefore serves as a reminder "to stop and listen to the victims and survivors of terror-ism, to raise up their voices and recognise the impact terrorism has on their lives.

### Residents prepare as hurricane near Hawaii strengthens

HONOLULU, AUG 22 (AP): Hawaii residents to grocery stores to stock up on bottled water, ramen and toilet paper as they faced the threat of heavy rain, flash flooding and high surf from a powerful and erratic hurricane expected to churn close to the islands or directly over them

On Tuesday night, the National Weather Service announced that Hurricane Lane had strengthened to become a Category 5 hurricane, which means that it is likely to cause catastrophic damage with winds 157 mph or above. The hurricane is about 804 kilometers southeast of Honolulu.

The weather service says that

in a Category 5 hurricane, a high percentage of framed homes will be destroyed.

Roofs and walls will collapse. and the winds will knock down trees and power pole. Power outages will last for weeks to possibly months, and most of an area hit by a Category 5 hurricane will be uninhabitable for weeks or months. the weather service added.

Earlier Tuesday, the weather

service issued a hurricane warning for Hawaii island. A hurricane watch was issued for Maui and other smaller islands, meaning tropical storm-force winds, excessive rain and large swells could arrive starting Wednesday.
It's possible Oahu and Kauai

may later be included in a weather

service advisory for the hurricane.
Hurricane Lane "is forecast to move dangerously close to the main Hawaiian islands as a hurricane later this week, potentially bringing damaging winds and



life-threatening flash flooding from heavy rainfall," the weather service's Central Pacific Hurricane Center warned as it got closer to the state.

The storm had been mov

ing west but is expected to turn northwest toward the state today. There's some uncertainty to Lane's path whether it moves north or outh, meteorologist Gavin Shige-

"It is much too early to confidently determine which, if any, of the main Hawaiian islands will be directly impacted by Lane," the weather service said.

But the hurricane center said the storm will move very close to or over the islands from Thursday through Saturday. Even if the center of Lane doesn't make landfall the islands could be walloped with rain and wind.

Maui County and Big Island schools will be closed starting Wednesday, the state Department of Education said. All after-school activities statewide are canceled for the rest of the week.

Hawaii Gov. David Ige is allowing non-essential state employees on the Big Island and Maui to go on administrative leave from Wednesday to Friday as Hurricane Lane approaches. Employees on Hawaii and Maui islands who work in disaster response as well as in hospitals and prisons are required

to report to their jobs, the governor said.

The east side of

the Big Island has taken the brunt from previous storms and is still reeling after lava from an erupting volcano wiped out entire neighborhoods. But early indications showed that the south

end of the island up to the western side would be taking the brunt of

"At this time, it looks like may-be Puna will be spared," county Managing Director Wil Okabe said of the beleaguered, rural district.
"But you never know." Officials were urging residents across the islands to prepare.

"People are getting ready,



The as-yet untitled film had previously been given a release date of 25 October 2019 in the UK.

The film would have marked a reunion between Boyle and Craig, following the actor's cameo in the director's 2012 Olympics Opening Ceremony production. The producers are yet to announce a replacement for Boyle.
