CM provides cash relief to Passingdang flashflood victims

WANGCHUK BHUTIA Dzongu, 29 Jun:

hief Minister, PS Taumang today took stock of damages in Dzongu, Passingdang, North Sikkim which was hit by a flashflood on Saturday night. He visited houses damaged by the flood and Passingdang School building.

A total of 13 families affected by the flashflood in Passingdang were provided relief amount of Rs. 1,01,900 from National Calamity Relief Fund. The Chief Minister also handed over the relief amount of Rs 2 lakh each from the CM's Relief Fund to 48 houses.

The CM directed the concerned department to conduct survey on damaged houses. Highlighting on the damages in Passingdang school, the CM sought the advice from people and the concerned engineers where it



was decided that the said school will run at Lingth-

em JHS for the time being. The CM stated that he does not hold grudges and will work with the people for the development of Dzongu regardless of party affiliations. He also directed the Roads & Bridges Department to immediately

restore road connectivity.

Mentioning that the alternate road of Mantam lake has been approved, he directed the Area MLA to identify an able contractor for the work.

The Area MLA, Pintso Namgyal Lepcha highlighted the damages caused by the flashflood and incessant rain in Dzongu.

The public of Passingdang have submitted the demand for relocation of the village to a safer location as they feel that the village is no longer safe for human habitation.

DM North, TT Kaleon underlined the relief and restoration measures.

The people of Dzongu and Passingdang thanked the Chief Minister for visiting the affected areas within 48 hours despite landslides and road blockage.

The CM was accompanied by cabinet ministers, Lok Sabha MP, Indra Hang Subba, head of the various departments and other officials.

Govt bans 59 apps including TikTok, WeChat

NEW DELHI, JUN 29 (PTI): The government on Monday banned 59 mobile apps, including China's TikTok, SHAREiT and WeChat, terming them

prejudicial to sover-

eignty, integrity and na-

tional security.

In an official statement, the IT Ministry said it has received many complaints from various sources, including several reports about misuse of

some mobile apps available on Android and iOS platforms for "stealing and surreptitiously transmitting users' data in an unauthorised manner to servers which have locations outside India".

"The compilation of these data, its mining and profiling by elements hostile to national security and defence of India, which ultimately impinges upon the sovereignty and integrity of India, is a matter of very deep and immediate concern which requires emergency measures," the statement said.

The Indian Cyber Crime Coordination Centre, Ministry of Home Affairs, has also sent an exhaustive recommendation for blocking these malicious apps.

"On the basis of these and upon receiving of recent credible inputs that such Apps pose threat to sovereignty and integrity of India, the Government of India has decided to disallow the usage of certain Apps, used in both mobile and non-mobile Internet enabled devices," it said.

The statement added that this move will "safeguard the interests of crores of Indian mobile and internet users. This decision is a targeted move to ensure safety and sovereignty of Indian cyberspace".

Single-day spike of 19,459 COVID-19 cases takes India's tally to 5,48,318

New Delhi, Jun 29 (PTI): A single-day spike of 19,459 COVID-19 cases took India's tally to 5,48,318 on Monday, while the death toll climbed to 16,475 with 380 new fatalities, according to the Union Health Ministry data.

This is the sixth consecutive day that coronavirus infections have increased by more than 15,000. The country has seen a surge of 3,57,783 infections from June 1

till date. The number of active cases stands at 2,10,120, while 3,21,722 people have recovered, and one patient has migrated, according to the updated data "Thus, around 58.67 per cent of patients have recovered so far," an official said. The total number of confirmed cases includes foreigners.

Congress seeks white paper on fiscal condition of Goa Panaji, June 29 (PTI):

The Congress in Goa on Monday demanded that the BJP government comes out with a white paper detailing the exact financial condition of the state in view of the CO-VID-19 pandemic.

The Congress Legislative Party (CLP) has also demanded a financial package for weaker sections of society who are worst-hit by the lockdown, said Leader of Opposition Digambar Kamat.

He also demanded that the tenure of the next month's Assembly session be extended from two weeks in view of a string of issues affecting the coastal state.

"The period of two weeks is far less to discuss the budget which would be passed during the session," he said.

With five MLAs, the Congress is the largest Opposition party in the 40-member House. The Goa Forward Party (GFP) has 3 MLAs while the MGP and the NCP each have one legislator.

Independent MLA Rohan Khaunte is also part of the opposition bloc.

Vij, who is also the state home minister, said the recruitment of the assistants for the 'yogshalas' being set up in the state will be done by district-level selection committees, headed by chief executive officers of district councils.

The district ayurvedic officer will be the member secretary of the panel. Besides, a representative of the deputy commissioner, chief medical officer or his representative and the district sports officer will be included in the committee.

During the selection process, preference will be given to the candidate from the village where the yogshala is situated or nearby village, Vij said in an official release here.

The minister said a monthly honorarium of Rs 11,000 will be given to the Ayush assistants, who should be between 18 and 35 years of age for recruitment.

Candidates must have passed Class 12 from the Haryana School Education Board or the CBSE or they must possess a diploma in yoga from any recognised university, he said.

He said these Ayush assistants will work as in-charges of 'yogshalas' and other work will also be assigned to them.

Vij informed that recruitment of 22 Ayush coaches will be done on a regular basis by the Haryana Staff Selection Commission. However, till the completion of the recruitment process by the commission.

Elephant population in Uttarakhand rises to 2,026

DEHRADUN, JUN 29 (PTI): The elephant population in Uttarakhand has increased by over 10 per cent in three years, an official statement said on Monday.

There were 1,839 elephants in the state in 2017, and their number has now mounted to 2,026, it said.

An elephant census was carried out in the state for three days from June 6 to 8 this year.

The new population figure of elephants in the state was told during the 15th meeting of Uttarakhand State Wildlife Board chaired by Chief Minister Trivendra Singh Rawat, according to the statement.

The meeting was also told results of a census of aquatic animals conducted in the state from February 22-24 this year, it said.

There are 451 crocodiles, 77 gharials (Gavialis Gangeticus) and 194 otters in Uttarakhand, according to the statement.

A census of snow leopards will also be conducted in the state from 2020 to 2022, it said.

During the meeting, the chief minister said decisions taken by the state wildlife board should be implemented within a given time frame. Rawat asked officials to work on the reintroduction of the hippopotamus at the Corbett and Rajaji tiger reserves in a time-bound manner, the statement said.

Pitching for development of Chaurasi Kutiya within Rajaji tiger reserve, the CM said action plan of the project should incorporate different aspects like wildlife, spirituality and culture.

He also said the rehabilitation of the Gartang Gali trail road at Gangotri National Park should be carried out while preserving its originality.

The chief minister said construction of NH 72-A is a top priority for the state government and necessary clearances for the project should not be delayed, according to the statement.

The Minister explained the economic viability of agriculture as a profession. He said that Agriculture, Horticulture and Animal Husbandry Departments have focused more on the fields rather than files. He added that all the officers are totally involved with the farming community and are eager to lend all required assistance.

The Minister informed of several agricultural schemes to ensure that agriculture will be the most viable profession. He also explained the concept of Green Economy. He informed of the Credit Subsidy Programme being launched from West Sikkim and subsequently in other districts. The Minister also urged the beneficiaries who received the agricultural inputs today to utilize them to the optimum.

He also informed the Terrace Farming scheme for urban dwellers to keep them healthy and happy.

Earlier, it was also announced that the long pending aspiration of the people of Khamdong for the establishment of National Institute of Technology (NIT) in Khamdong has materialized, and the same has been sanctioned by the Government.

Rs 46.61 cr sanctioned for Sikkim MSMEs as additional working capital loans

SAGAR CHHETRI GANGTOK, 29 JUNE:

The Guaranteed Emergency Credit Line [GECL] announced by the Government of India offers an additional 20% working capital on outstanding amount to help MSMEs augment their net working capital to meet operational liabilities and restart their businesses. Accordingly, an amount of Rs 46.41 crores has already been sanctioned to 2,389 borrowers so far from different banks in Sikkim under this scheme.

Regarding the same, the Commerce & Industries Department convened a special State level Bankers Committee meeting today chaired by the Secretary HK Sharma.

No more demand for Shramik Special trains, says Railways

NEW DELHI, JUN 29 (PTI): erations from June 1, was There is no demand for Rs 20-22 crore per day. Shramik Special trains from any state now, the cupancy in the 15 pairs of Railways said Monday, but offered to run more if states request for them.

At a press conference, railway spokespersons said no Shramik Special ran on Sunday and none is scheduled for Tuesday either.

236 new cases of COVID-19 found in Ahmedabad; 9 more die

AHMEDABAD, JUN 29 (PTI): The number of coronavirus cases in Ahmedabad rose to 20,716 on Monday with the addition of 236 new cases, while nine more patients succumbed to the infection, the Gujarat health department said.

The COVID-19 death toll in the district, the worst hit by the virus in the state, increased to 1,432 with nine more fatalities, it said.

The district also reported recovery of 171 patients, taking the number of discharged people to 15,831, the department said.

Areas under the Ahmedabad Municipal

Corporation (the city) reported 222 new CO-VID-19 cases, while the remaining part of the district registered 14 infections. Out of the 14 cases reported from outside the corporation limit, four each were detected from Dholka and Sanand talukas, three from Daskroi, two from Viramgam, and one from Bavla, the

department said. With this, the number of cases in the district panchayat limit rose to 814, of which 656, or 80 per cent, patients have been discharged following recovery, it said.

The Ahmedabad corporation limit has reported recovery of 78 per cent of the cases so far, while it has recorded a COVID-19 mortality rate of 7 per cent.

The city's west zone has reported 22 per cent of total active cases, followed by south zone at 15 per cent, north zone at 14.9 per cent and south west zone at 14.8 per cent, among others.

Meanwhile, the AMC has identified seven new micro containment areas in the city, taking the number of such areas to 44 with a little over 27,500 people residing in them.

The district accounted for 236 of the 626 coronavirus cases reported in the state on Monday.

On the other hand, ITC, Sun Pharma, Nestle India and PowerGrid were among the gainers.

In the previous session, the BSE barometer closed 329.17 points, or 0.94 per cent, higher at 35,171.27, and the broader Nifty surged 94.10 points, or 0.90 per cent, to finish at 10,383.

Foreign institutional investors were net sellers on Friday, offloading equities worth Rs 753.18 crore, provisional exchange data showed.

Axis Bank shares tank over 5 pc after S&P rating cut

New Delhi, Jun 29 (PTI): Shares of Axis Bank on Monday declined over 5 per cent after S&P Global Ratings lowered its ratings of the lender due to increased economic risks for banks operating in India.

The stock plunged 5.21 per cent to Rs 402.90 on BSE. On NSE, it tanked 5.29 per cent to Rs 402.35.

"We lowered our ratings on Axis to reflect our expectation that heightened economic risks facing India's banking system will affect the bank's asset quality and financial performance, S&P said on Friday.

While Axis Bank's asset quality is superior to the Indian banking sector average, its level of non-performing assets will likely remain high compared to international peers, it noted.

The agency said economic conditions have turned adverse for Indian banks due to COV-ID-19 and drastic efforts to curtail the spread of the virus have resulted in a sharp economic contraction.

Mumbai adds 1,247 new cases, 92 deaths

Mumbai, Jun 29 (PTI): On the 100th day of the lockdown, the coronavirus tally in Mumbai increased to 76,294 on Monday with the addition of 1,247 new cases, while the death toll rose to 4,461 after 92 more patients succumbed to the infection, the city civic body said.

Brihanmumbai

Municipal Corporation (BMC) release stated out of the 92 deaths, 21 occurred in the past 24 hours and the remaining 71 earlier, but they were added to the fatality count on Monday.

The civic body said the number of recovered COVID-19 patients increased to 43,545 with 391 patients discharged from

hospitals. According to the release, presently the city has 28,288 active cases, while 763 new suspected COVID-19 patients were admitted in hospitals.

Environmental Concerns

The real ones, not the ones that babus deem as important

The US is grappling with the embarrassment of ▲ having a President who prefers pollution over protection (of the environment) and has torn up the fate of an international accord which would have scaled down emissions which have been harming the planet for far too long. An oil plant in Assam has been spewing natural gas for close to a month now, contaminating the environment and nearby water bodies and a toothless state pollution control board which had snarled for a brief while was scolded back into its office by its political masters. Meanwhile, the developing world wants the developed countries to clean up their act and reduce their unloading of greenhouse gases. What cannot be denied is that the developed countries remain predominant producers of these gases and therefore need to take the lead in reducing harmful emissions. The developing world, because this section also needs to provide for its people and has a lot of catching up to do, is also a major contributor now, although their per capita contribution to the ruining of Earth is comparatively much lower. But then again, most of the people on this planet reside in the developing segment so the quantum becomes too large to ignore. These are part of the global debate on the environment which has been going on for many years. The developed countries have been asking the poorer nations to desist from practices that harm the global environment while the developing countries have pointed the finger right back at the richer countries over the hothouse gas issue.

Blame game is not going to cool this planet down or stop it from overheating. While both sides make valid points, the unavoidable fact is that all of us, the rich and the poor, have to live together on spaceship Earth. We have to be collectively responsible for making the world environmentally sustainable.

While the developing countries need to ensure that their factories move up the technological ladder and adopt manufacturing methods that are safer, the richer countries must help with transfer of technology to the poorer countries so that they can become environmentally responsible. The developed countries cannot dictate terms in this regard and have to listen to the reasonable arguments of the poorer nations.

While the debate between the developed and the developing heats up further, it is time that we started another debate at the national level - one between the highlands and lowlands. In Sikkim, as must surely be the case with any other hill state, we suffer because of rules framed by policy-makers sitting in the airconditioned confines of Shastri Bhavan posturing concern for glaciers like Zemu or Gangotri. They read somewhere that using wood for fuel puts undue pressure on the environment. While this might be true, they don't realise that a villager in Labdang in west Sikkim does not have as easy an access to even kerosene oil as the babu in Delhi has to LPG. He has no alternative, but to depend on the forest for his needs. Why the policy framers can't comprehend the fact that villagers don't exploit the forest resources, but only share it in sustainable models refined over centuries, defies all logic. Maybe it doesn't, because, sadly for the peripheral states like Sikkim, policies are framed with dry statistics in mind by even drier officials. Local concerns are ignored and the colonial hangover sees to it that the natives need to be told what to do. So even though Sikkim and Himachal lost a lot of their forests to provide timber for the railway berths which never even made the climb to towns in the two states, the locals are made to pay. All of a sudden someone realised that the forest cover was shrinking and the forests were made out of bounds for the locals who might have even protested earlier when the plains denuded their hills.

Since we sit on the lungs of the entire country, it is time that Sikkim and other states like it are given a greater say in the framing of environmental policies. And no, the Forest Rights Act, at least in the form it is understood and implemented is not the only way to go. The rest of the country, the section which ruined the environment, should listen to regions which have conserved well and lived responsibly.

History's crystal ball: What the past can tell us about COVID-19 and our future

During this pandemic, historians have been consulted like the Oracle of Delphi. Is COVID-19 like the Black Death? The 1918 flu? What lessons of history can be applied to today?

But can history show us what we want to know? In some ways, yes. In others, no. And we need to broaden what we ask.

As a historian of medicine, North Africa and France, I find we are using some lessons but ignoring others. Pandemic histories are useful, but how they connect with race, public health, revolution, labour, gender and colonial histories will help us explain the present and predict the future.

LESSONS LEARNED: COVID-19 RESPONSES USING PANDEMIC HISTORY

Some history lessons have been put to use right away, like social distancing.

At University of Michigan, Dr. Howard Markel compared cities in the United States during the 1918-19 flu pandemic and showed the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention how early, strict social distancing measures worked to slow infection rates. Countries around the world now use his concept, "flattening the curve."

Not bad for the history of medicine, a field the Lancet declared "moribund" in 2014.

LESSONS IGNORED: POVERTY AND RACISM MAKE YOU SICK AND DEAD

Other pandemic lessons have been ignored, and they tragically unfold anew.

The poor, the vulnerable and workers die in greater numbers. Social reformer Dr. Rudolph Virchow wrote in 1848: "Medical statistics will be our standard of measurement; we will weigh life for life and see where the dead lie thicker, among the workers or among the privileged."

Poor neighbourhoods have the highest death tolls. Reformers' maps from the 1800s demonstrated this in the United Kingdom (Edwin Chadwick, 1834) and France (Réné Villermé, 1832). The same pattern has emerged in 2020 in New York (the Bronx) and Montréal (North Montréal).

A pandemic is not the great equalizer, contrary

to Madonna's "Reflections from the Bathtub."

Inequality of income, housing, work and opportunity are the inequities that made death "a social disease" for social reformers Chadwick, Villermé and Virchow. We now call these factors the "social determinants of health."

That is why structural racism can be a death sentence. Data show that pandemics have disproportionately affected African Americans and Indigenous Peoples. Virchow demanded social justice as the solution: full employment, higher wages and universal education.

Policy-makers had months to protect vulnerable populations from COVID-19. Why didn't they? History explains that too.

CHOLERA: CHANGE HAPPENS WHEN PEOPLE RISE UP

If history shows one thing, it's that rich people and politicians do not want to pay for sewers, schools, hospitals, old age pensions or worker safety. The deaths of the poor themselves did not move politicians in France, Germany or Britain to big policy changes.

Like the 19th-century economist Thomas Malthus, some elites even argued that such deaths are "natural," or in Texas recently, beneficial to society. So how does change come?

Change came because people rose up in a series of political revolutions across Europe in 1848. Workers rose in massive strikes and revolutionary action. The fear of Marxist revolution brought health care and the welfare state to the people in Bismarck's Germany.

And cholera pandemic also showed elites their vulnerability. If enough people are sick, if the air and water are contaminated, even rich people can die. Today you can tour the magnificent sewers of Paris and drink filtered water in Hamburg, because the rich realized they can get sick too.

Madonna was right on that one. HEALTH AND RIGHTS ARE INSEPARABLE

If enough people get sick and hungry and angry, there will be revolution.

We wave flags for France on July 14, the anniversary of the storming of the Bastille in 1789 that launched the French revolution. But the day

before, "bread riots" broke out and people carried food away. The combination of tyranny and physical suffering started the revolution.

Health and human rights are inseparably tied together. A government that does not allow its citizens to survive, to eat, to breathe, to live, is illegitimate. By what right does it rule? The current protests in the U.S. demanding recognition of African American lives illustrates this fundamental nature of politics.

A contemporary example of revolution to demand health and rights was the Arab Spring in 2011. A young man, Mohamed Bouazizi, lit himself on fire and his fellow citizens saw themselves in his suffering: I also cannot eat, work, have shelter or raise a family in this country. Tunisia toppled its president and wrote a new constitution.

Authoritarianism is bad for health, because public health relies on good governance.

Democracy is good for health. In 1794, French revolutionaries created the first public health system, for the "citizen-as-patient."

LESSONS FROM COVID-19 TO GLOBAL HEALTH HISTORY

COVID-19 is also teaching history new lessons. For one, pandemics were widely considered a thing of the past.

The "developed" world expected that modern sanitation and medicine would eliminate infectious disease as a primary cause of death, known also as the "epidemiologic transition thesis."


But "re-emerging infectious diseases" challenge this story. They are produced by modern economic and social practices.

Environmental destruction opens pathways for viruses to jump from animals to humans; CO-VID-19, SARS, AIDS, H1N1 and the 1918 flu are all such "zoonotic" diseases.

Modern injustices like labour exploitation, inhumane incarceration and overcrowded refugee camps directly contribute to disease spread by creating unsafe living and working conditions.

COVID-19 is helping societies rethink their histories, and how we should write history itself.

It's easy to hate a Trump or an Epstein, but what about those who enable them?

Where is Ghislaine Maxwell? Where? I sat through the four episodes of Filthy Rich, the Netflix documentary on Jeffrey Epstein. I had to force myself, not because it was so upsetting - which, of course, it also was – but because the tales of his sexual abuse were so monotonous. Brave and defiant, his victims had to numb themselves slightly to tell and retell what happened to them when they were as young as 14. The interviews with the monster himself, as always, were disappointingly banal. Monsters often are tediously ordinary. The magnetic charm, the immense intellect, is one of the biggest delusions of "true crime". See also Ted Bundy.

Anyway Ghislaine, accused of procuring underage girls for Epstein, is said to be a free woman in Paris, living in the swanky 8th arrondisement. French law prevents her extradition. Many of those implicated in Epstein's world of obscene exploitation, including all the art world and socialite scum, must have a clue where she is. Alleged scum, I should say. They love their children just like we do. Sure.

When I watched the speech to university graduates that Ivanka Trump had recorded the other day, I felt a surge of blood-thumping hate so hard I thought I might be having a mini-stroke. Is she actually worse than her father? Is this my internalised misogyny? Is she not just an-

other victim, like Ghislaine?
But it's not just women, is it? I see the collaborators everywhere. I have thought about this since I was a child and read about the second world war. I thought from a young age about who would fall into line if told by some authority that this was the right time to round up the "undesirables". I have always known myself to be an "undesirable".

To this day, I can walk into a chichi party and pick them out. Most of them would do it not because they were "bad" people but because they had mouths to feed and rents to pay. In the end, it's all just paperwork and nothing ever really happens, they would say. Some would do it because they cover themselves in muck every day as they climb the greasy pole, and call it "human nature". Some would do it in a halfhearted way, losing a little sleep but wondering also if the undesirables hadn't got a bit out of hand lately.

My friends, I can mostly say, would be incapable of collaboration. Partly because they are my friends and partly because they could not be bothered to fill in the forms, or would

felt a surge of blood-thumping hate lose them. The resistance would hapso hard I thought I might be having hazard, messy, argumentative – but it

would be fierce. Every day I see them, the enablers, in big ways and small. I have a list; it could fill this entire newspaper. Let's go with names you know. Dr Anthony Fauci: man, you are a doctor yet for so long you watched as Trump spouted drivel. Dr Deborah Birx: I know you haven't been seen since he started talking about drinking bleach, but why didn't you start wailing like a banshee? Mike Pence: you will get your comeuppance. One day you will be alone in a room with a strange woman, and believe me you won't like it. The entire Republican party: you sink this low for power? Really? The evangelical right: you think the president has Christian values?

As for the Democratic party – you think some creepy guy is better than many smart women?

Chris Whitty, Patrick Vallance and you scientists who stand alongside floundering politicians talking of our Covid-19 success: why allow your presence to support this lie? The Johnson family: blood is not thicker than water, it's just thick. Why pretend Boris Johnson is the right man for the job or should even be back at work? The cabinet: you have the collective moral fibre of a whelk. Shops before schools? What?

Nick Clegg: you could have been a contender and now you're shilling for Zuckerberg. That level of collusion

knows no bounds.

All you civil servants who loyally carry on working for Dominic Cummings, even though he openly disrespects you: one rogue tweet ain't enough. The part of the Labour party that could not and would not listen to what the electorate was saying because it did not fit its purity spiral of a world view: ever thought you got it a teensy bit wrong?

Nagaland govt extends lockdown till July 15

The state government through different notifications earlier had relaxed agricultural activities, movement of essential commodities, opening of religious places, or public and plying of local taxis and also rickshaws.

Kronu said that the inter-state borders connecting Assam, Manipur and Arunachal Pradesh will continue to remain sealed and the number of police personnel on duty in the inter-state check gates will be increased.

Meanwhile, 19 people, including 18 Army personnel tested positive for COVID-19 in Nagaland, taking the state's tally to 434 on Monday, state Health Minister S

Pangnyu Phom said. Of the total 434 CO-VID-19 cases, 266 are

active while 168 have re-

covered.

A total of 19 new cases of COVID-19 have been reported out of 322 suspected samples tested on Monday, he said.

Eighteen are from Jakhama Army Camp Quarantine Centre under Kohima district and one from Peren district. the minister said, adding that four patients - three from Dimapur

and one from Kohima - recovered on Monday.

The districts with COVID-19 cases are Dimapur 183, Kohima 112, Peren 89, Mon 38, Tuensang 8, Zunheboto 3, and one in Phek district, a Health department said.

The first test was conducted on Sangma, who is also the NPP president, on June 22 and the second one on Sunday, an official at the CMO said.

He had made a trip to

Manipur capital Imphal on June 21 to meet the four party MLAs, who switched allegiance from the BJP-led ruling coalition to the Congress. He again went there on June 23, and travelled subsequently to Delhi along with them and returned on June 25.

As a precautionary measure, the chief minister will be under home quarantine for four more days before he resumes office, the official added.

The CMO official said the team of officials and police, who accompanied the Chief Minister to Guwahati were also tested negative and they are also under home quarantine.

Meanwhile, two BSF personnel tested positive

for coronavirus infection on Sunday, taking the states COVID count to 50.

Health and Family Welfare Minister Alexander Laloo Hek said one of them returned from Haryana on June 26 and another is a driver engaged in transporting troopers from Assam to the BSFs Meghalaya Frontier Headquarters here.

"Both the troopers are asymptomatic and are now admitted at the isolation ward of the composite BSF hospital," he said.

With these new two fresh positive cases, Meghalaya now has seven active cases with one casualty while 42 patients have recovered.

Monkey hanged to death in Telangana; video goes viral



HYDERABAD, JUN 29 (PTI): In a case of extreme brutality, a monkey was hanged to death from a tree by three people in a bidto scare other simians in Khammam district of Telangana, about 275 KM from here, forest department officials said on Monday.

"The perpetrators, who admitted their guilt, are being booked under the Wildlife Protection Act," Sathupalli Forest Range Officer A Venkateswarlu said.

The incident hap-

pened on June 26 in Vemsoor village and the video of the primate being hanged using a rope went viral, prompting the officials to investigate.

"The accused wanted to scare other monkeys by hanging the one which was caught.We found the carcass in a decomposed

The accused are being booked under the Wildlife Protection Act," the official told PTI.

According to Venkateswarlu, people at Sathupalli and surrounding areas are suffering from monkey menace with the simians raiding the orchards giving sleepless nights to the locals.

The official said as per a Telangana government directive 30 per cent of the area in Sathupalli forest range during afforestation will have edible wild fruit species to enhance the food base of monkeys and other wild animals so that when they are rehabilitated, there will be sufficient food available.

Saliva test used to test for virus in Australia

(AP): Health authorities are using what they describe as a world-first saliva test for coronavirus in Australia's secondlargest city where the disease is spreading at an alarming rate.

Officials say 49 people tested positive to COVID-19 in Melbourne on Sunday and only four cases were detected elsewhere in Australia.

Deputy Australian Chief Medical Officer Nick Coatsworth told Australian Broadcasting Corp. on Monday the saliva test was being rolled out in Victoria state, where Melbourne is the capital, and its effectiveness was still being tested.

Coatsworth said the less-comfortable nasal test remained the preferred option and may be more accurate, but the saliva test will be great, particularly for kids.

Victorian Chief Health Officer Brett Sutton said authorities were close to losing control of the spread while pandemic restrictions were easing elsewhere in Australia.

l think it's a genuine challenge now. I think we're right at the edge in terms of being able to manage it, Sutton said.

We know that as

three-quarters of the country goes back to normal way of living, it becomes even more challenging to tell people that it's not the same here and that they've got to go on with a more constrained life, Sutton added.

Melbourne and Sydney, Australia's largest city, began with the largest numbers of cases because of the large numbers of international travellers they receive, Sutton said.

Melbourne's colder weather during the current Southern Hemisphere winter might also play a part in the city's great community transmission, he said.

Chardham yatra to open for Ukd pilgrims from July 1

DEHRADUN, JUNE 29 **(PTI):** The Uttarakhand Devasthanam Management Board on Monday decided to open the Chardham yatra' for pilgrims from within the state from July 1.

The four famous Himalayan shrines of Badrinath, Kedarnath, Gangotri and Yamunotri in Uttarakhand's Garhwal region are known as Chardham'.

An order permitting Uttarakhand residents to visit the four temples from July 1 subject to various anti-COVID precautionary measures and restrictions was issued by the Board's CEO Ravinath Raman on Monday.

The number of pilgrims visiting the temples daily, however, will be limited and they will not be allowed to enter the sanctum sanctorum and adjoining wings of the temples.

The pilgrims will not be allowed to make any offerings or touch deitemples, the order said. Pilgrims from con-

tainment and buffer zones cannot visit the temples, it added. The SOP for pilgrims

visiting the temples makes it mandatory for them to apply online for e-passes to the board on its website.

They can embark on

the yatra only after they are issued the e-passes.

People above sixty years, children below ten years and those with cough, cold and fever have been advised not to apply for e-passes and embark on the journey.

Hand-sanitising, wearing masks and ties' idols either at the maintaining physical distance will be mandatory during the pilgrimage.

A similar decision was taken by the board earlier this month but had to be withdrawn following protests by priests who were averse to opening the yatra even for locals as COVID-19 cases were on the rise at that time.

Virus death toll drops to 5 in NY, once the US epicenter

New York, Jun 29 (AP): Five people died Saturday from the coronavirus in New York state, the lowest daily death toll the state has reported since March 15.

Saturday's total compared to 13 fatalities the day before as the number of fatalities caused by the virus continues to plummet in the state. During the peak of the pandemic in April, nearly 800 people were dying a day from coronavirus.

We are on the exact opposite end, Gov. Andrew Cuomo said in an interview with NBC's Meet the Press. New York still leads the nation in COVID-19 deaths with nearly 25,000, according to the state's official tally, which doesn't include people who likely died of the disease. Meanwhile, fewer than 900 patients were hospitalized Saturday for COVID-19, down from a peak of over 18,000 in April.

The governor cautioned that the numbers could spike again if New Yorkers let down their guard down and fail to follow social distancing and mask-wearing requirements.

I'm now afraid of the spread coming from other states because we are one country and people travel, Cuomo said. I'm afraid the infection rate in the other states will come back to New York and raise that rate again.

Confirmed daily infections in the U.S. hit an alltime high of 40,000 on Friday, prompting officials in Texas and Florida to reverse course and close down bars in their states again.

Brilliant Benzema helps Madrid go 2 points clear of Barca

BARCELONA, JUN 29 (AP): A brilliant back-heeled pass by Karim Benzema helped Real Madrid take a step toward reclaiming the Spanish league title with a 1-0 win at Espanyol.

With Espanyol about to make it to halftime with a clean sheet, Benzema cleverly unlocked the hosts' defense on Sunday. He used a no-look pass with his heel to poke the ball through the legs of defender Bernardo Espinosa and meet Casemiro's move into the heart of the box.

Casemiro's resulting goal and some flawless defending were all Madrid needed to win and move ahead of Barcelona by two points at the top of the table.

"I see things, that is what football is to me," Benzema said about the goal.

"The assist is good, but Casemiro puts it in and gave us the three points. (This win) is very important. I won't say that we don't pay attention to Barca, of course we do, but we are focused on our matches and each game left is a final for us."

Zinedine Zidane's team took advantage of Barcelona's 2-2 draw at Celta Vigo on Saturday by securing a fifth straight win since the league resumed following a threemonth stoppage as Spain contained its COVID-19 outbreak.

The title rivals have six games left. Madrid holds the tiebreaker on head-to-head results in the event they fin-



ish level on points. The run-in seems tougher for defending champion Barcelona, which faces third-place Atl tico Madrid on Tuesday at Camp Nou.

G mez scored 19 goals in 52 games for Wolfsburg before rejoining Stuttgart in 2017.

Altogether he scored 170 goals in 328 Bundesliga games, seven in the second division, and 26 in 36 German Cup matches. G mez also scored 26 goals in 44 Champions League games. "I'm very grateful for the time I had at Stuttgart," G mez said. "It was always my biggest dream to give something back and to end my career that I couldn't have imagined here." G mez missed Germany's World Cup win in 2014 due to an injury-blighted season. He scored 31 goals in 78 appearances for the national team.

WHO announces new worldwide daily virus record

GENEVA, JUN 29 (AP): The World Health Organisation has announced another daily record in the number of new confirmed coronavirus cases across the world - topping over 189,000 in a single 24-hour period.

The tally Sunday from the UN health agency eclipses the previous record a week earlier at over 183,000 cases, showing case counts continue to progress world-

Brazil recorded the most new cases over the one-day span at more than 46,800, followed by the U.S. at over 44,400. India had nearly 20,000.

Overall the U.S. still has far and away the most total cases, At more than 2,450,000 - roughly twice that of Brazil.

China forces birth control on Uighurs to suppress population

BEIJING, JUN 29 (AP): The Chinese government is taking draconian measures to slash birth rates among Uighurs and other minorities as part of a sweeping campaign to curb its Muslim population, even as it encourages some of the country's Han majority to have more children.

While individual women have spoken out before about forced birth control, the practice is far more widespread and systematic than previously known, according to an AP investigation based on government statistics, state documents and interviews with 30 ex-detainees, family members and a former detention camp instructor.

The campaign over the past four years in the far west region of Xinjiang is leading to what some experts are calling a form of demographic

The state regularly subjects minority women to pregnancy checks, and forces intrauterine devices, sterilization and even abortion on hundreds of thousands, the interviews and data show.

Even while the use of IUDs and sterilization has fallen nationwide, it is rising sharply in Xinjiang.

The population control measures are backed by mass detention both as a threat and as a punishment for failure to comply.

Having too many children is a major reason people are sent to detention camps, the AP found, with the parents of three or more ripped away from their families unless they can pay huge fines. Police raid homes, terrifying parents as they search for hidden children.

After Gulnar Omirzakh, a Chinese-born Kazakh, had her third child, the government ordered her to get an IUD inserted.

Two years later, in January 2018, four officials in military camouflage came knocking at her door anyway. They gave Omirzakh, the penniless wife of a detained vegetable trader, three days to pay a 2,685 fine for

having more than two children. If she didn't, they warned, she would join her husband and a million other ethnic minorities locked up in internment camps often for having too many children.

God bequeaths children on you. To prevent people from having children is wrong, said Omirzakh, who tears up even now thinking back to that day.

They want to destroy us as a people. The result of the birth control campaign is a climate of terror around having children, as seen in interview after interview.

Birth rates in the mostly Uighur regions of Hotan and Kashgar plunged by more than 60% from 2015 to 2018, the latest year available in government statistics. Across the Xinjiang region, birth rates continue to plummet, falling nearly 24% last year alone compared to just 4.2% nationwide, statistics show.

The hundreds of millions of dollars the government pours into birth control has transformed Xinjiang from one of China's fastest-growing

This kind of drop is unprecedented....there's a ruthlessness to it, said Zenz, a leading expert in the policing of China's minority regions. This is part of a wider control campaign to subjugate the Uighurs. The Chinese Foreign Ministry

referred multiple requests for comment to the Xinjiang government, which did not respond. However, Chinese officials have said in the past that the new measures are merely meant to be fair, allowing both Han Chinese and ethnic minorities the same number of children.

For decades, China had one of the most extensive systems of minority entitlements in the world, with Uighurs and others getting more points on college entrance exams, hiring quotas for government posts and laxer birth control restrictions.

Under China's now-abandoned

'one child' policy, the authorities had long encouraged, often forced, contraceptives, sterilization and abortion on Han Chinese. But minorities were allowed two children three if they came from the countryside.

Under President Xi Jinping, China's most authoritarian leader in decades, those benefits are now being rolled back. In 2014, soon after Xi visited Xinjiang, the region's top official said it was time to implement equal family planning policies for all ethnicities and reduce and stabilize birth rates.

In the following years, the government declared that instead of just one child, Han Chinese could now have two, and three in Xinjiang's rural areas, just like minorities.

But while equal on paper, in practice Han Chinese are largely spared the abortions, sterilizations, IUD insertions and detentions for having too many children that are forced on Xinjiang's other ethnicities, interviews and data show. Some rural Muslims, like Omirzakh, are lance apparatus.

punished even for having the three children allowed by the law. Statebacked scholars have warned that large rural religious families were at the root of bombings, knifings and other attacks the Xinjiang government blamed on Islamic terrorists.

The growing Muslim population was a breeding ground for poverty and extremism, heightening political risk, according to a 2017 paper by the head of the Institute of Sociology at the Xinjiang Academy of Social Sciences.

Outside experts say the birth control campaign is part of a stateorchestrated assault on the Uighurs to purge them of their faith and identity and forcibly assimilate them into the dominant Han Chinese culture.

They're subjected to political and religious re-education in camps and forced labor in factories, while their children are indoctrinated in orphanages. Uighurs, who are often but not always Muslim, are also tracked by a vast digital surveil-

World hits coronavirus milestones amid fears worse to come

ROME, JUN 29 (AP): The world surpassed two sobering coronavirus milestones Sunday --500,000 confirmed deaths, 10 million confirmed cases -- and hit another high mark for daily new infections as governments that attempted reopenings continued to backtrack and warn that worse news could be yet to

COVID-19 has taken a very swift and very dangerous turn in Texas over just the past few weeks, said Gov. Greg Abbott, who allowed businesses to start reopening in early May but on Friday shut down bars and limited restaurant dining amid a spike in cases.

California Gov. Gavin Newsom rolled back reopenings of bars in seven counties, including Los Angeles. He ordered them to close immediately and urged eight other counties to issue local health orders mandating the

More Florida beaches will be closing again to avoid further spread of the new coronavirus as officials try to tamp down on large gatherings amid a spike in COVID-19 cases. Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis said interactions among young people are driving the surge.

Caution was thrown to the wind and so we are where we are," DeSantis said.

South Africa's health minister warned that the country's current surge of cases is expected to rapidly increase in the coming weeks and push hospitals to the limit. Health Minister Zwelini Mkhize said the current rise in infections has come from

people who moved back into the workplace.

New clusters of cases at a Swiss nightclub and in the central English city of Leicester showed that the virus was still circulating widely in Europe, though not with the rapidly growing infection rate seen in parts of the U.S., Latin America and India.

Wearing mandatory masks, social distancing in lines and carrying their own pens to sign voting registers, French voters cast ballots in a second round of municipal elections. Poles also wore masks and used hand sanitizer, and some in virus-hit areas were told to mail in their ballots.

In Texas, Abbott appeared with Vice President Mike Pence, who cut campaign events from upcoming visits to Florida and Arizona because of rising virus cases in those states.

Pence praised Abbott for both his decision to reopen the state, and to roll back the reopening plans.

You flattened the curve here in Texas ... but about two weeks ago something changed, Pence

Pence urged people to wear masks when unable to practice social distancing. He and Abbott

wore face masks as they entered and left the room, taking them off while speaking to reporters.

Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azar, meanwhile. defended the fact that President Donald Trump has rarely worn a mask in public, saying he doesn't have to follow his own administration's guidance because as a leader of the free world he's tested regularly and is in very different circumstances than the rest of us.

Addressing spikes in reported coronavirus cases in some states, Azar said on NBC's Meet the Press that people have to take ownership of their own behaviors by social distancing and wearing masks if possible.

A reported tally Sunday from Johns Hopkins University researchers said the death toll from the coronavirus pandemic had topped 500,00.

About 1 in 4 of those deaths more than 125,000 have been reported in the U.S. The country with the next highest death toll is Brazil, with more than 57,000, or about 1 in 9.

The true death toll from the virus, which first emerged in China late last year, is widely believed to be significantly higher. Experts say that especially early on, many victims died of COVID-19 without being tested for it.

To date, more than 10 million confirmed cases have been reported globally. About a quarter of them have been reported

in the U.S. The World Health Organisa-

tion announced another daily re-

cord in the number of confirmed

coronavirus cases across the world - topping over 189,000 in a single 24-hour period. The tally eclipses the previous record a week earlier at over 183,000 cases, showing case counts continue to progress worldwide.

Overall the U.S. still has far and away the most total cases. At more than 2,450,000 - roughly twice that of Brazil. The number of actual cases worldwide is much higher.

New York, once the nation's pandemic epicenter, is now on the exact opposite end, Gov. Andrew Cuomo said in an interview with Meet the Press. The state reported five new virus deaths Saturday, its lowest reported daily death toll since March 15.

During the state's peak pandemic in April, nearly 800 people were dying every day. New York still leads the nation in COVID-19 deaths with nearly 25,000.

In the state of Washington, Gov. Jay Inslee put a hold on plans to move counties to the fourth phase of his reopening plan as cases continue to increase. But in Hawaii, the city of Honolulu announced that campgrounds will reopen for the first time in three months with limited permits to ensure social distancing.

Britain's government, meanwhile, is considering whether a local lockdown is needed for the central English city of Leicester amid reports about a spike in COVID-19 among its Asian community. It would be Britain's first local lockdown.



Anthony Mackie criticises Marvel for lack of diversity

Los Angeles, Jun 29 (PTI): Actor Anthony Mackie has called out Disney's Marvel Studios for its lack of representation in the cast and crew. The actor, who has been part of the Marvel Cinematic Universe (MCU) since 2014 as Sam Wilson aka Falcon, said now that he is leading Disney Plus series The Falcon and the Winter Soldier, he hopes to help the crew look a little less white.

When The Falcon and the Winter Soldier comes out, I'm the lead, Mackie told actor Daveed Diggs during the pair's recent Variety Actors on Actors interview.

When Snowpiercer' came out, you're the lead. We have the power and the ability to ask those questions. It really bothered me that I've done seven Marvel movies where every producer, every director, every stunt person, every costume designer, every PA, every single person has been white, the actor added responding to Diggs question on how he was interacting with Black Lives Matter.

Mackie has appeared in MCU movies Captain America: The Winter Soldier , Avengers: Age of Ultron , Ant-Man , Captain America: Civil War, Avengers: Infinity War and Avengers: Endgame.

The actor said he wants to promote diversity in Hollywood through every project he joins.

I find a lot of my interactions are just trying to make things better in the gigs I have in front of me how can I affect different kinds of representation? What is the thing you feel compelled to do? What is your participation

in this moment? Criticising Marvel for ignoring the need and importance of diversity, the 41-year-old actor said till now the studio has only had one Black producer, Nate Moore, • who was behind Black Panther.

Mackie believes the fact that the studio decided to have an all-black cast and crew on : the Oscar-nominated 2018 movie made it feel even more racist to him.

We've had one Black producer; his name was Nate Moore. He produced Black Panther.' But then when you do Black Panther,' you have a Black director, Black producer, a Black costume • designer, a Black stunt choreographer.

And I'm like, that's more racist than anything else. Because if you only can hire the Black people for the Black movie, are you saying they're not good enough when you have a mostly white cast?

The actor said people should be cast on the basis of their caliber and gender or color biases should not govern the choices the studios and filmmakers make while roping in the

My big push with Marvel is hire the best person for the job. Even if it means we're going to get the best two women, we're going to : get the best two men.

Fine. I'm cool with those numbers for the * next 10 years. Because it starts to build a new • generation of people who can put something • on their r sum to get them other jobs. If we've got to divvy out as a percentage, divvy it out. And that's something as leading men that we : can go in and push for, he said.
