North littered with landslides and damaged houses

MANGAN, 14 SEPT:

Apart from disrupting road con-nectivity, landslides triggered by incessant rainfall have also damaged several houses in North

The homes of Som Bahadur Sharma, Jagat Bahadur Limboo, Nar Bahadur Sharma, Som Bahadur and Tika Ram Sharma at Ralak, under Mangshila-Tibuk GPU, have been severely damaged.

Another landslide at Tareng village in Lower Dzongu has also damaged the house of Sherab Lepcha with his cattle also being washed away. The said landslide has also blocked the road leading

to Gor and Sagyong-Sangtok.

Houses at Upper Tingzey and
Upper Zusing Wards and the PMGSY road have also been damaged by landslides.

At Zusing, Man Kumari Sharma and her 15-year-old son were injured when a houlder smashed into

their kitchen on 13 Sept. They have been forwarded to the District Hospital in Mangan for treatment

One ekra house belonging to Sherap Lepcha at Nom in Dzongu has also been severely damaged due to a landslide in the area.

Apart from these, houses in and around Mangan have reported damages and a retaining wall at Mangan Girls' Senior Secondary

School has also collapsed.

One wooden house of Senpi Lepcha of Bringbong Dzongu was also washed away on 13 Sept. Landslides have also hit Rafong

Khola, Ambithang, Lanthey Khola, Meyong and Wang Khola making even transshipment of passengers at these spots very dangerous. However, the Forest Territorial Division has constructed log bridges at Rafong and Ambithang for commuters to cross the area.

Area MLA cum Deputy Speaker, SLA, Sonam Gyatso Lepcha, Forest Minister Tshering Wangdi Lepcha, along with District Collector

North, Karma R Bonpo, Divisional Forest Officer, Territorial, James S Lepcha, Zilla member, Zomin Lim-boo, and other Panchayat members visited these spots today to take stock of damages.

Many commuters have been stranded beyond Lanthey Khola which is one of the worst affected sections along the North Sikkim highway. Road connectivity in the dis-

trict has snapped at various places beyond Mangan and all of Upper Dzongu has been cut off due to landslides and the district is lit-

tered with damaged houses.

The DC North had directed all schools of North district to be shut

Responding to the statement given by Sikkim Democratic Front spokesperson, KT Gyaltsen, published on a local daily with regard to demand of evidence to back corruption allegations against SDF allegations against SDF government, HSP spokesperson. Birai Adhikari, today said that the proof can be found in the Comptroller and Auditor General [CAG] reports of the past 25 years. "CAG reports of the last

25 years point out high levels of irregularities in financial transactions, all of which have not been investigated till date by any in-dependent body. Proof can

also be found in the thousands of "Burmaloot" and "Mahaloot" books circulated by the late NB Bhandari through which the CBI found enough prima facie evidence to register a case and approach the State Government for permission to investigate," Mr Adhikari stated.

He alleged that instead of allowing the CBI to investigate, the State Government issued a notification refusing permission for the

"This action of the State Govt can be considered as definitive proof. Since a lot of MLAs are to be investigated, even the sacrosanct Legislative Assembly has heen misused and that is why no case could ever

come up to the courts," claimed Mr Adhikari. On SDF's alliance with NDA, Mr Adhikari said, "We are not worried about that. In fact we want to caution other NDA allies in the interest of Sikkim that their alliance partner, SDF, has been misusing every democratic institution to stop the CBI from investigating the Chief Minister. Surpris-ingly, when we align with the NDA, we are shouted down saying that we are associating with 'outsid-ers' while when the SDF can align with the NDA, it becomes in the interest of Sikkim."

Petrol, diesel rates scale new highs

New Delhi, Sep 14 (PTI): Petrol and diesel prices Friday scaled new highs as rates were increased on account of rupee depreciation and rise in international oil rates.

While petrol price was increased by 28 paise a litre, diesel rates went up by 22 paise, according to a price notification of state-owned oil marketing companies.

Petrol in Delhi now costs Rs 81.28 per litre and diesel is priced at Rs 73.30 a litre.

In Mumbai, petrol is retailed at 88.67 per litre, for Rs 84.49 in Chennai and Rs 83.14 in Kolkata. Diesel costs Rs 77.82 per litre in Mumbai. Rs 77.49 per litre in Chennai and Rs 75.36 per litre in Kolkata, according to the notification.

SILTAC lashes out against LTVC, will boycott meeting called by LTVC

Sikkim Limboo Tamang
Apex Committee [SILTAC] has lashed out against Lim-boo Tamang Voluntary Com-mittee [LTVC] for allegedly misleading people on the LT Assembly seat reservation issue. Filing RTI applications and disclosing information is not the solution for any issue, SILTAC has said further accusing LTVC of instigating and provoking people on this

Addressing a press con-ference here today, SILTAC vice-chairperson, Tamang, stated that LT Assembly seat reservation is a sensitive issue but different organizations and political parties have been trying to take credit by accusing each

He alleged that different organizations have been try-ing to take advantage of the ignorance of Limboo and Tamang community members. He mentioned that LTVC has always been speaking against



SILTAC and SDF but has never come up with any solutions.
"We have never pointed

fingers at anyone and instead, have always taken this issue to the right platform for its solution at the earliest. SILTAC and SDF government have always worked for its solution," Mr Tamang said.

He alleged that LTVC and political parties have always brought about confusion on this issue by placing only those provisions before the

people which can hamper Assembly seat reservation

SILTAC has taken the opinion of experts on the Constitution and other such areas, and found that (f) of the Article 371F is the only key to a solution on the issue, said Mr Tamang. He added that Article 371F is the only hope for seat reservation in the earliest.

"No one should use the organization to make a polit-

ical career. Politically ambitious people should join po-litical party and avoid using social organisations to fulfill their ambition," he said.

SILTAC chief advisor, Kalawati Subba, shared that SILTAC has plans to approach the Centre once again on this

Speaking on the propos-al of LTVC to hold a daylong all-Sikkim strike on this issue, SILTAC chairperson, CB Subba, said that it is import-

ant for the organization to justify such a step. He mentioned that SILT-

AC will never support such an initiative which will affect the peace and tranquility in the State. He also clarified that SILTAC will not partici-pate in the meeting called by LTVC on 16 Sept.

He mentioned that SILT-AC is about to finish its ongoing constituency-level meetings and then it will organise district-level and State-level

meetings within this month on this issue. He informed that a SILTAC delegation has also met the new Governor on 07 Sept and that the Gov-ernor has assured to take this demand to the Centre.

SILTAC stands by the 40 eats formula of the State Government as it is scientific and in the interest of the people of Sikkim, Sushil Tamang stated further adding National Commission

He asked LTVC to do research and homework before giving any statements on the issue. He also questioned issue. He also questioned SKM's Sangha leader, Sonam Lama's claims about giving LT seats in 10 days time if his party came to power, SKM is underestimating LT people, he added.

A combination of a dip in rupee value against the US dollar and rise in crude oil prices has led to a spike in pump prices since mid-August. Petrol price has since risen by Rs 4.20 per litre and diesel by Rs 4.53 - the most in any one-month period since the daily revision in fuel prices was intro-duced in June last year.

Rates vary from city to city and from pump to pump depending on local taxes and transportation

pumps of Indian Oil Corp (IOC) in Delhi cost Rs 81.28 per litre, the same at stations owned by Hindustan Petroleum Corp Ltd (HPCL) comes for Rs 81.37. Diesel at HPCL pumps in Delhi costs Rs 73.39 and comes for Rs 73.30 at IOC outlets.

IOC is India's largest oil firm with almost half of the market share.

In Mumbai, petrol at IOC pumps costs Rs 88.67, while it comes for Rs 88.72 at BPCL outlets and Rs 88.75 at HPCL stations.

Diesel in Mumbai

at BPCL outlet costs Rs 77.87, at HPCL pumps Rs 77.90 and at IOC outlets

Rs 77.82 per litre.
While crude oil rates flirted with the USD 80 per barrel mark, the rupee has plunged against the dollar. The combination of the two makes imports costlier.

Don't Burden Education with Employability

There is already too much confusion in the classrooms

In an aping of a national obsession, one gets to hear a lot about how the education system and the syllabus in schools need to be made more job-oriented While there is no denying that the education system, like any other System we have inherited, could do with an overhaul, the clamour to make education 'job-oriented' is perhaps not as advisable as it appears convincing on first look.

As a nation, we already suffer an education system drafted by the British to keep a people subservient; to consciously start grooming people for jobs right from school would be a regressively disturbing pursuit of a colonial model, albeit for a different master and also possibly a new disaster. Of course, it would be wonderful to have education which also made stu-dents 'employable', but employability is too dispersed a spectrum to lend itself to any easy packaging into a curriculum. Come on, we already know that even secondary school is too early for students to decide their "stream," to also have them decide their jobs this early would just suffocate their dreams. Also, since it is not possible to fashion an 'employable' curriculum, it makes sense to let that aspect be left alone and concentrate instead on working towards an education that returns to its true purpose – grooming confident people who can apply themselves to learning and who have a thirst for knowledge. If we can pull this off, the schools will automatically churn out well rounded graduates who can adapt to the challenges and requirements of the job market, even in these fickle times of post-demonetization and GST-inspired recession.

The best way to ensure that education does not

lose its focus would be to divorce it from any overt responsibilities of feeding employment. That should be an independent pursuit. Sikkim has made the right start by setting up an independent Directorate of Capacity Building which has thankfully not been clubbed with the Human Resource Development Department which looks after education in the State. The task for this Directorate is straightforward and it is required to groom the interested young for job openings within and outside the State. The focus for the planners of Education should thus solely be on education, as in learning. If education is delivered efficiently, then even the skill development trainings will end up being more effective, because it would be taken by youth who are inquisitive, willing and who respect knowledge. One does not get to see enough of that in the skill development programmes being dispensed across the State at present and that is probably because the schools are not successfully inspiring true learning. Deliver in the latter aspect and everything will fall in place, do not address this issue and burden classrooms with vocational learning as well otherwise the already stressed classrooms will prepare an even more confused generation.

Education should remain exclusively about learning and inspiring inquisitiveness. There are enough professional courses around for those who know what job they want to do. The regular schools and colleges should create minds that further understanding and discovery. Yes, the corporate world will want order takers and meek foot soldiers, but humanity requires the free thinkers and inquiring minds. Education should seek to groom more of these. Throw employability into the mix, and these minds will be lost

Dhaka: How speeding bus drivers sparked a student insurrection

 Γ raffic jams – or "jan-jot", as locals call them – are a fundamental part of life in Dhaka, the capital of Bangladesh. Sometimes the slowness of the traffic can give you a sense of claustrophobia, as you're trapped between vehicles that have become immovable objects. It's easy to see why there is a growing ride-sharing business for motorbikes, which can

weave their way through the traffic more quick-ly. Upmarket apartment blocks even advertise helipad access, to help rich citizens deal with Dhaka's traffic problem.

Although slowness can feel like the norm there, when acceleration becomes possible, it can be deadly. Dhaka's notoriously overworked and underpaid bus drivers race each oth-er to pick up passengers, and earn on commission. Reports of corruption in Bangladesh's transport sector suggest that poorly regulated private companies use bribery to obtain licences for unqualified and inexperienced drivers.

And so when two teenagers were killed by a speeding bus in July 2018, school children and college students took to the streets to do what - in their view – the government should have been doing all along: check the age and licences of drivers, and raise awareness of the dangers faced by citizens The students set up blockades, and the traffic crawled through the streets at an even slower pace than usual.

At first, the government seemed willing to cooperate with the student demands. But there was mistrust on all sides: the government was concerned that a broader conspiracy was unfolding to undermine the regime,



while students believed that links between government and the bus companies would frustrate their de-

nands.Social media shut down
As the protests continued for more than a week, the situation in Dhaka deteriorated. Conflict broke out: police clashed with protesters, and protesters with pro-government groups. Several journalists reported being attacked and harrassed while filming in the streets. And a digital fog descended over the city, as the government blocked mobile internet access, making it harder to share images and information on social media.

Internationally renowned photographer and activist Shahidul Alam took to the street of his city to cap-ture the protests. He shared videos to social media, and criticised the governent's handling of the protests in an interview with Al Jazeera.

Days later, government personnel arrived at his apartment to arrest him for spreading "false" and "provocative" information. Appearing in court the following day, the photographer said he was beaten in custody. In his latest hearing, on September 11, he was reportedly denied bail.

SPEED AND POLITICS Control over movement through the city has long been an obsession for governments the world over. Goods, vehicles and people must be able to move quickly, to promote business and development. But they must also be controlled and monitored, and in this sense the state becomes a system of brakes, imposing checkpoints, border controls, speed ramps, traffic lights and speed limits.

French philosopher Paul Virilio

noted how politicians and bureau-crats agonise about the tipping point where they could lose control of the city, when the streets could be occupied, when the people put a break on circulation or when disorderly circulation results in chaos.

Virilio suggested that the development and design of Paris in the 19th century was orchestrated to ensure that streets could be policed as efficiently as possible - wide boulevards were intended to prevent blockades. Transparency was another obsession, making the city visible, with innovations such as street lighting (Paris, after all, is the city of lights).

Transparency makes city residents more secure – and offers up the urban landscape for surreillance by

urban landscape for surveillance by police and militaries. In recent years,

such activities have intensified. From the police car on the street, to CCTV cameras on buildings, to the drones in the sky, new vehicles and technologies have become vital in re-cording and deterring certain behaviour.

Yet in societies equipped with smart phones, surveillance is no longer the practice of the state alone. As civilians block the streets in revolt, they can simultaneously circulate information and imagery to inform their compatriots about events.

In Dhaka, and across Bangladesh, controlling the movement of infor-mation has become as critical to the state's authority as the movement of people, goods or vehicles through the

Artists and photographers have the ability to circulate images and information in ways that can change how people see the world - and evade the control of the state. As a result, the government has become increasingly paranoid about the rise of "digital Bangladesh", introducing new laws which critics say can be used to

silence opposition.

Now it seems the government has resorted to a strategy of deterrence. Locking up Alam sends a message: if this can happen to a well regarded, internationally renowned photographer, it can happen to you. But at a time when civilians can share information and take to the streets faster than ever before, the imprisonment of Alam does little more than add to the government's image as a vindictive state, desperate to maintain control.

Is that 'midlife crisis' really Alzheimer's disease?

magine you tell your 55 year-old mom you're go-ling to get married and she's too disorganized to help you with the wedding preparations. Or you put your kids on the bus to elementary school and the 57 year-old driver forgets the route.

These are real scenarios, drawn from my clinical work with patients who have young-onset Alzheimer's disease

This is the other face of dementia - no white hair or wrinkles. And it is relatively common. Approximately five per cent of Alzheimer's patients

are younger than 65.

While the underlying pathology of both young-onset and late-onset Alzheimer's is the same — the abnormal accumulation of proteins called amyloid and tau in the brain — there are significant differences in how the two diseases are experienced.

Patients who are under 65, for example, often

have difficulties with language, visual processing and organizing and planning. They have less of the classic memory complaints.

There is also accumulating evidence that

ung-onset Alzheimer's progresses faster.

DEMENTIA CONFUSED WITH DEPRESSION

The path to a diagnosis of Alzheimer's or other de mentia is often long, meandering and riddled with but especially important for younger people. They are often still working and at risk of losing their jobs. They may have young children. When they tell people that something isn't quite right, they are told they are depressed or must be going through a midlife crisis.

Many times, younger patients will notice changes in their cognition at very early stages. They may notice increased difficulty in organization or planning. They may forget how to do complex tasks or forget appointments. Cognitive impairment is more obvious when completing highly demanding tasks at work or co-ordinating family logistics.
When a young person goes to see their doctor

and reports such changes in cognition, the "d" word brought up is usually depression and not dementia.
Until the correct diagnosis is made, there can be

many misinterpretations of their changes in thinkresulting in conflicts with family, friends and

DIVORCE BEFORE DIAGNOSIS

Initially, a change in personality can be misinter-preted by the partner as indifference, as a midlife crisis or as something else.

There can be a changing of roles within a couple and it is not uncommon for separation or divorce to occur before a diagnosis is even made.

If young children are involved, it can be difficult for them to understand the change in their parent's

Getting services for young-onset Alzheiner's can be especially challenging. There are very few programs that cater to people with dementia under the age of 65.

Support for caregivers and family members of these patients is also lacking. There is a dire need for specialized programs and long-term care facili-ties that can accommodate those under 65.

'USE IT OR LOSE IT'

Although we have no cure for any patients with Alzheimer's, there are clinical trials that are targeting the abnormal proteins that build up during the

There is symptomatic medication — such as acetylcholinesterase inhibitors - that can help

memory.

We also promote a healthy lifestyle that includes aerobic exercise because evidence shows this can slow neurodegeneration. We want people to remain cognitively active and go on learning to help their brain reserve.

Although patients with young-onset Alzhein-er's are impaired in some activities, there are many other activities that they can participate in. "Use it or lose it" is the motto we should live by when it comes to the brain and preserving its function.


Young-onset Alzheimer's is not the only dementia that typically affects the young. Frontotemporal dementia also strikes young people. And although

there are differences in presentation in these two illnesses, many of the challenges facing patients are the same

Ongoing research is required to better understand this disease. While we search for a cure, we need to appreciate the special needs of this popula-tion. We need to target research and services to better serve patients and their families.

Chinese Shoe Stores in Shimla

Earlier this year, I finished reading Chinatown Days – a saga of the Indian Chinese population from Assam who got deported as they were seen to be enemies of the state and are separated from their loved ones. Written first in Assamese and translated into English by the author herself, this book tells the story of how India betrayed her own citizens and sent them to China but the latter was not too keen on having them either. In the process lives are lost, loves are separated and the identity of a people group is neither here nor there.

The familiarity of the Indian Chinese population in our hills is not a new story either. I have cousins who are half-Chinese or grandmother's sisters who have Chinese husbands. Rumor has is that a few Chinese families in our village actually changed their last names to "Lepcha" and stayed back after the Indo-China war.
So the few Chinese shoe stores

Shimla have obviously gotten my attention since the time I got here. Ta-Tung and Fook Chong are the two prominent Chinese shoe stores located in Mall road, Shimla. While you don't see a lot of people entering these shoe stores, there is a definite curiosity among tourists as one can find people taking pictures of their Chinese store signs from the outside and initially I did the same too.

But I would eventually enter both the



stores more than once and make conversations that have only made me wonder more about these shoemakers.

One afternoon Ta-Tung was closed for lunch and Fook Chong was open so I en-

tered the latter.

Between the two, Fook Chong seems more current with their promotions and passive aggressive sales pitches. There is a banner in Fook Chong entrance that actually reads "make in India" while encouraging customers to buy genuine, handmade leather shoes. Their display of shoes is also neatly arranged and they have an "Indian" salesman while the "Chinese" owner sits behind the counter and takes care of the payments. They accept master cards so if tourists chance on the store, they need not worry about cash as they buy what some people might see as slightly expen-sive shoes because the asking price is usually between Rs. 1,800 to Rs. 2,000. And if you want

to bargain, you are in the losing team. Because the owner is quick to say that their quality cannot be compromised and refuses to decrease the price.

Ta-Tung on the other hand is not a very welcoming sight. The shoes are piled on top of each other and their store looks dusty and that it has not been cleaned for a while. It looks like a store from the yesteryears. But if you ask me, this place has more character and is more popular among the locals –also because the owner used to train at Shimla's open-air natural skating rink (another write-up on the rink when winter comes), apparently represented India at the Asian Winter Games held in Japan in 1986.

There is a sense of history and lin-

gering memory in Ta Tung's store. There is often a young Chinese man at the store who does not seem too friendly nor eager to sell. But the last time I was there, there was a college-going girl who seemed very friendly and did not mind answering my many questions about the store. She said there were not many Chinese families in Shimla and there are only four shoe stores here. As I was checking out the shoes, she picked one and mentioned that it was her grandfather's design. The workshop seemed close by as I saw shoe dummies, scissors and a sewing machine that is probably used to make those shoes. There were stacks of old files and red Chinese pa-pers stuck in the shoe rack probably during some occasion. The shoe dis-play racks also had Chinese vases and

one wondered if those were for decoration or just for sale. The more I looked around, it looked like a world waiting to be explored and I was only too excited to be in it. But I did not want to overstay her welcome and changed the topic to the leather boots she was wearing. It was calf length black leather boots and I asked if we could get those made here as well. She said yes but that her father was not around and asked me to come some

other day.

I look forward to going back to Ta-Tung and ordering my black leather boots before winter comes, but I am equally intrigued about these few Chinese families in Shimla. My historian friend tells me that the Chinese shoemakers were brought to Shimla to make shoes for the army (and I heave a sigh of relief that they did not suffer the same fate as Rita Chowdhury's Assamese Chinese) but I need to go through colonial records to verify this. As for now, there reputation seems legendary as my friend adds how Sonia Gandhi also goes to Shimla to get her shoes made. I wonder if she goes to these Chinese shoe makers or some other shoe makers in Shimla. I am only hoping that when I go to order my leather boots, I get to hear more about the past, present and future of these Chinese shoe makers in Shimla.

Delhi court orders framing of charges against former TERI chief RK **Pachauri**

NEW DELHI, SEP 14 (PTI): A Delhi court Friday ordered framing of molestation charges against former TERI chief R K Pachauri in a case of alleged sexual ha-rassment lodged by his former colleague. Metropolitan Mag-

istrate Charu Gupta or-dered framing of charges under sections 354 (outraging modesty), 354 A (making physical contact, unwelcome and sexually coloured remarks) and section 509 (teasing and using vulgar gesture and actions) of the Indian Penal Code.

The court, however, discharged him of certain other sections and said it

will formally frame the charges on October 20.
On February 13, 2015, an FIR was registered against Pachauri and he was granted anticipatory bail in the case on March 21.

The former TERI chief had earlier secured an interim order from Additional District Judge making it mandatory for media houses to publish or telecast the coverage of the case with a title that "In any court, the allegations have not been proved and they may not be correct."

This order had also said "when such informa-tion is published in any page of a magazine or report, then it should be in middle of the page in bold letters and it should be five times larger than the font in which the ar-

ticle is being published."

Over 1,400-page charge sheet was filed by the Delhi Police on March 1, 2016, saying there was "sufficient evidence' against Pachauri that he had sexually harassed, stalked and threatened the complainant.

A supplementary charge sheet was filed in March 2017 after the po-lice said it had retrieved several deleted emails and chats exchanged be-tween the accused and the complainant.

The final report had said the deleted WhatsApp chats, text messages, retrieved from the cell phones, computer hard disks and other devices, were "not fabricated".

The charge sheet, which was filed a year after the former research analyst of TERI lodged the complaint, had said Pachauri had committed offences under various sections of IPC. Pachauri has denied all the allegations against him

Play Usain Bolt in defence, says Spain's World Cup-winning coach

SYDNEY, SEP 14 (AFP): World Cup-winning coach Vicente del Bosque some advice sprint king Usain Bolt's new Australian club -play him in defence.

The Jamaican super-star has been handed the chance to train with the Central Coast Mariners for an indefinite period in a bid to prove he has what it takes to earn a professional playing contract.

The eight-time Olympic champion made his debut late last month in a 20-minute cameo as a substitute during a friendly, starting in his fa-

voured left wing position.

He nearly scored but tired quickly and admitted he was not match-fit, with Australian pundits say-ing he had plenty of work

ahead to make the grade.

Del Bosque, whose eight-year reign as Spain coach ended after their



last-16 exit at Euro 2016, said it was possible Bolt could fulfil his dream of becoming a footballer, despite being 32.

"For a team that counter-attacks hard and transitions quickly into open space, sure (he would fit in). It would be possible, of course," de Bosque, who guided Spain to the 2010 World Cup title, told the Olympic Channel.

But he suggested the 100m world record holder would be better in defence than up front.
"With space, he could

be a very good footbal-ler," said del Bosque, who also steered Real Madrid to Champions League

success. "He could be a fullback that covers a lot of space, but it depends, be-cause it's not just about covering 100, or 60 or 70 metres of the pitch.

"It's about doing it many times over and that requires stamina which I don't know whether he has or not -- although I'm

sure he has prepared.

a full-back, with his back towards the crowd and the touchline, that's where he would be most useful." Bolt, who retired from athletics last year, has previ-ously tried out with clubs in Germany, South Africa and Norway, to no avail. He has acknowledged

"Without a doubt as

SC modifies its order on dowry harassment cases

Supreme Court Friday modified its order that provided for set-ting up of a committee to deal with dowry harassment complaints by protecting the provision of pre-arrest.


The top court had on April 23 reserved its verdict on a batch of pleas seeking revisiting of a judgement that had reduced the severity of the anti-dowry law on the offence of subjecting a married woman to cruelty by spouse and in-laws.

"We have protected pre-ar-

rest or anticipatory bail provision in dowry harassment cases," said a bench headed by Chief Justice Dipak Misra and comprising Justices A M Khanwilkar and D Y Chandrachud.

The apex court, while modifying the verdict given by its two-judge bench, said that there is no scope for the courts to con-stitutionally fill up the gaps in

"There should be gender justice for women as dowry has a chilling effect on marriage on



the one hand, and on the other hand, there is right to life and personal liberty of the man," the bench had said while reserving

The bench was hearing a plea filed by an NGO 'Nyayad-har', an organisation formed by a group of women advocates district, seeking sharpness in section 498A, claiming that the otherwise "helpful instrument" in the hands of victim women has become "valueless"

The plea suggested that out of the three members in family welfare committees, at least

two should be women and one should have done Masters in Social Work. It had also suggested recording of facts at the time of counselling and said the committee should also consider the economic status of the parties.

A two-judge bench of the apex court in July last year had voiced concern over the "abuse" of section 498 A (subjecting a married woman to cruelty) and passed a slew of directions, including that no arrest should "normally be effected" without verifying allegations as violation of human rights of innocents cannot be brushed aside.

The bench had observed

that many such complaints are not bonafide and "uncalled for arrest" may ruin the chances of settlement.

The apex court had issued notices to Ministry of Home Affairs, Ministry of Women and Child Development and National Commission of Women and sought their responses while disagreeing with the July 27 verdict of the smaller bench

'Afghan conflict could be deadlier than Syria in 2018'

conflict could overtake Syria as the deadliest conflict in the world this year, analysts say, as violence surges 17 years after the US-led invasion.

The grim assessment contrasts sharply with the consistently up-beat public view of the conflict from NATO's Resolute Support mission in Kabul, and underscores the growing sense of hopelessness in the war-torn country.

It suggests that US President Donald Trump's much-vaunted strategy for Afghanistan is, like those of his predecessors, failing to move the needle on the battlefield, observers said, as a generation of Americans born after 9/11 become old enough to enlist.

"The soaring casualties in Afghanistan and the potential endgame in sight in Syria... could leave Afghanistan as the world's deadliest conflict," said Johnny Walsh, an Afghanistan expert at the United States Institute of Peace.

"Most years have become the new 'most violent year'.

This is continually getting worse." The Syrian conflict -- which began a decade after Afghanistan's -- has claimed the lives of more than 15,000 people so far this year, according to the Syrian Observato-

ry for Human Rights. Graeme Smith, a consultant for the International Crisis Group, told AFP some indications "suggest the



Afghan war is on track to inflict than 20,000 battle deaths in 2018" -- including civilians and combatants.

"That could exceed the toll of any other conflict, possibly even the war in Syria," he added. It would be a record high for

Afghanistan, according to the respected Uppsala Conflict Data Program (UCDP) in Sweden, which put the total number of deaths on all sides of the conflict at 19,694 in

Afghan civilian deaths have al-

ready hit a record 1,692 in the first report showed.

Interior ministry deputy spokesman Nasrat Rahimi esti-mated 300-400 "enemy fighters" were killed every week, but would not provide figures for civilians or government forces.

Data for casualties suffered by Afghan security forces are not available to the public after Washington last year agreed to Kabul's request to classify the numbers.

Before the blackout, according

to figures published by the US Spe cial Inspector General for Afghani stan Reconstruction (SIGAR), there were more than 5,000 each year. Most analysts believe th

number understates the reality on the ground.

This year's death toll for government forces could be "horrific", Smith said.

The total death toll has been

rising steeply since 2014, UCDP figures show, the year NATO combat troops pulled out, leaving Afghan forces with the responsibility for holding back the resurgent

This year, the violence has been fanned by long-delayed parliamentary elections scheduled for October 20 and renewed efforts to engage the Taliban, Afghanistan's largest

militant group, in peace talks.

The Taliban have made significant battlefield gains, and the smaller but potent Islamic State group, which first emerged in the region in 2014, has also ramped up

The conflict has been further fuelled by other countries in the region, particularly neighbour-ing Pakistan, said retired Afghan general Atiqullah Amarkhil, who varned the US had failed to rein in its wayward ally, which is widely accused of providing safe haven to Taliban leaders.

Despite the bloodshed, General

John Nicholson, who until recently was the top US and NATO commander in the country, insisted last month that Trump's strategy, which includes the deployment of thousands of additional US forces and increased air strikes, was working.

US Forces spokesman Lieu-

tenant Colonel Pete Lupo told AFP: "US Forces Afghanistan is committed to being open and telling the truth about this war."

More troops means more fighting and therefore more casualties, Walsh told AFP -- but otherwise

generally a stalemate".

SIGAR data also suggests
Trump's plan has made little progress on the battlefield.

Prepared to take strongest action for not complying with Iranian sanctions: US

WASHINGTON, SEP 14 (PTI): The US is prepared to take the "strongest action" against countries and entities who are found not complying with the Trump administration's sanctions on Iran, including reducing to zero the purchase of crude oil from the country, a senior official has told law-

The US pulled out of the with Iran in May and will reimpose sanctions on the country's oil sector in No-vember. The Trump admin-

istration says it wants to cut Iran's oil exports to zero - which would deprive the Iranian govern-ment of its biggest source of hard currency. "We are prepared to take the strongest ac-

tions possible on people who will not assist us tions possible on people who will not assist us in complying with this new range of sanctions that we are putting back into place," Manisha Singh, Assistant Secretary of State for Econom-ic and Business Affairs, told lawmakers during a Congressional hearing Thursday.

Responding to a question from Congressman Eliot Engel, the Indian-American official said the Trump Administration has been talking to all its allies and partners and trying to convince them to fully implement the new Iranian sanctions which the US has imposed following its withdrawal from the Iranian nuclear deal.

The US has told India and other countries to cut oil imports from Iran to "zero" by November 4 or face sanctions, making it clear that

"In response, we are prepared to take the most serious actions possible on Iran. We need to demonstrate to the Iranian regime that we

will not tolerate its development of a nuclear programme for illicit purposes," Singh said. The flawed Iran nuclear deal was deter-mined not to be the right vehicle to address the range of Iran's malign behaviour, she said.

"We are having conversations with our al-lies, and our goal is to get purchase of Iranian crude oil down to zero by November 5. That's a critical goal for us," Singh said in response to question from Congressman Engel.

"We are talking with all of our allies, including the countries that you mentioned, helping them to understand that the only way that we can achieve this global goal of Iran's nuclear partnership and cooperation with our allies as you have indicated," she said.

"We are trying to explain to them that the bigger picture here is we need to work together on putting this pressure onto Iran, and the sales of oil are a critical way to do that. We are prepared to take the strongest actions possible on people who will not assist us in complying with this new range of sanctions that we are putting back into place," Singh said.

Secretary of State Mike Pompeo and Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin have directed teams from the State Department and Treasury Department to travel together, she

Two Koreas open joint liaison office in North

KAESONG (NORTH KOREA), SEP 14 (AFP): North and South Korea opened a joint liaison office in the Northern city of Kaesong on Friday as they knit closer ties ahead of President Moon Jae-in's visit to Pyong-

yang next week.

"A new chapter in history is open here today," South Korean unification minister Cho Myoung-gyon told a ceremony, calling the office "another symbol of peace jointly created by the South and the North". The nuclear-armed North's chief delegate Ri Son Gwon responded in kind, calling it a "substantial fruit nourished by the people of the north and south".

The two Koreas have sought to pursue joint projects in multiple fields since the April summit between Moon and the North's leader Kim Jong Un in the Demilitarized Zone that divides the peninsula, even as US efforts to secure concrete progress towards Pyongyang's denuclearisation have stalled.

Moon will fly to the North's capital on Tuesday to meet with Kim as he seeks to rekindle the process.

The leaders' first meeting as well as key events during the threeday visit will be shown live on television, Moon's office said after a working-level meeting with the North on Friday.

Moon's trip will mark

his third summit with Kim this year after he or-chestrated a rapid diplomatic thaw on the peninula and brokered June's Singapore summit be-tween the North Korean leader and US President Donald Trump. There Kim backed de-

nuclearisation of the "Ko-rean peninsula", but no details were agreed and Washington and Pyongyang have sparred since over what that means and how it will be achieved The North was "will-

ing to denuclearise". Moon said Thursday, while the US was willing to "end hostile relations" and provide security guarantees, "but there is a blockage as both sides are demanding each other to act first".

Last month, Trump abruptly cancelled a planned visit by Secretary of State Mike Pompeo to Pyongyang, after the North condemned "gangster-like" demands for what it called its unilater-al disarmament. But Kim has since

sent Trump a letter seek-ing a second summit and held a military parade for his country's 70th birth-day without showing off any intercontinental ballistic missiles, prompting warm tweets from the US president and raising hopes of progress.

The liaison office

stands in a city that was initially part of the South after Moscow and Washington divided Korea between them in the clos-ing days of World War II, but found itself in the North after the 1950-53 Korean War, which ended in an armistice rather than a peace treaty.

four-storey The building includes sepa-rate Northern and Southern offices and a joint room Seoul's unification ministry said it would become a "round-the-clock consultation and comconsultation and com-munication channel" for advancing inter-Korean relations, improving ties between the US and the North, and easing military tensions.

Abe aims to rewrite Japan constitution as he seeks 3rd term

TOKYO, SEP 14 (AP): Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe is vying for his third re-election as the ruling party leader next week, extending his stay in power to work on his long-cherished ambition - to revise his country's war-renounce ing constitution.

Abe reportedly has already secured about 70 per cent of sup-port from parliamentarians of the Liberal Democratic Party, and clinching the re-election would allow him up to three more years to work on a possible charter change.

He has to tackle the economy

and other priorities too.

He faced his only challenger,
Shigeru Ishiba, a former defense minister, during Friday's debate, which could be the only public discussion before the September 20 vote.

"I will take on the task of revising the constitution, a postwar challenge that has never been



achieved, in order to open a new era," Abe told the nationally televised event.

The 63 year-old Abe, prime minister since December 2012, is poised to become Japan's lon-gest-serving leader with a historic

He reportedly has the support of least five main factions of the Liberal Democrats, securing some 300 of the 405 votes, as well as many others among local party

With Abe's victory widely expected, the main focus has shifted to who would get key party posts and a Cabinet lineup, or his possible successor.

A revision to the US-drafted 1947 constitution has been the party's decades-old pledge that none of Abe's predecessors could achieve.

It includes Abe's grandfather, former Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi, who also saw the constitution as humiliation following Japan's World War II defeat.

Abe said earlier this week that

he hoped his party could submit a draft revision to a parliamentary session later this year. His coalition government holds a two-thirds supermajority in both houses, whose support is needed for a national referendum on constitutional amendments.

Abe, the main force behind the revision, wants to rewrite Article

9, which allows the use of force for self-defense only and bans it for settling international disputes.

Abe's party has adopted an interpretation of the article to allow Japanese troops to defend Japanese allies under foreign attacks.

Many Japanese are more con-cerned about their salaries, high cost of child care and education. Media polls have also showed a majority of the public oppose the constitutional change under Abe's

hawkish government.

Abe faces other important issues, including the country's aging and declining population and the royal succession in the spring.

He also has to deal with security concerns stemming from North Korea's nuclear and missile threats, as well as intensifying trade friction with the US, which could shake his friendly relations with President Donald Trump.

Abe has enjoyed strong backing from his party members, who credit him for leading the party to major victories in national elections amid

a lack of viable opposition.

He has lasted so long in the absence of policy debates because many party members are primar-ily interested in getting his and other senior lawmakers' backing in next elections, veteran political alyst Soichiro Tahara wrote in

"Many Liberal Democratic law-lakers have become 'yes men' of the leadership," he wrote.

Abe has survived a series of scandals, including cronyism allegations against him his wife, Akie.

Despite attacks from opposi-tion parties and criticism in the media, his support ratings have re-covered to about 40 per cent, con-sidered high for a leader after five years and eight months in office.


