Sikkim gets IoT based real-time landslide warning system

net of Things (IoT) based re-altime landslide warning system has been installed in Sikkim, the first of its kind in the Himalayan region by Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham (AVV) University, a AVV director said here today.

The system has been installed under the aegis of the Ministry of Earth Sciences at a cost of Rs 5 crore, director of the Centre of Wireless Networks and Application of the institute, Maneesha Sudheer

said.
"The data has started flowing in from the project site to the control room. There are 200 sensors that goes as deep as 13 metres underground and reading of the various data for analysis get-ting transmitted. It is almost three years since we started the journey," she said.

To improve the systems reliability and enhance the early warning duration a

three-level Landslide Early Warning Model has been developed, she said.

The project was given to AVV University after it successfully deployed and managed similar IoT based landslide warning system in the western ghats region of Munnar in Kerala since 2009 that continues to protect lives with successful warnings, Sudheer said.

The Sikkim project, which is the second one, is being implemented in collaboration

with Sikkim State Disaster Management Authority, AVV vice-chancellor Venkat Rangan said.

It will monitor a densely populated area spanning 150 acres around Chandmari village in Gangtok district and be a life saving system for at least 5,000 people, Sudheer said.

This area has seen several landslides in the past with the first one reported in 1997, she

said.
She said AVV has been se-

lected as the only Indian institution as the world centre of excellence in landslides and risk reduction till 2020.

Sudheer said Sikkim was selected after scanning 17 landslide prone zones in some north east states and Uttarakhand. The project was delayed due to difficult terrains and work conditions but the major challenge was vandalism of critical sensors and equipment at least twice causing time and monetary

loss of about Rs 40 lakh to Rs 50 lakh.

A report by Indian Roads Congress estimates that 15 per cent of India's landmass is prone to landslide hazard, including areas like Western Ghats and Konkan Hills, Eastern Ghats, North East Himalayas, and North West

Himalayas.
In North East Himalayas, the Sikkim-Darjeeling belt is at the most risk of landslides,

Cabinet nod to bill overturning apex court order on Dalit atrocities law

New Delhi, Aug 1 (PTI): The Union Cabinet today approved a bill to restore original provisions of a law on prevention of atrocities against people of scheduled castes and tribes, a move seen as a reach-out by the BJPled NDA government to Dalits days ahead of their proposed August 9 nationwide protest with this key demand.

The bill rules out any provision for an anticipatory bail for a person accused of atrocities against SC/STs, notagainst SC/SIs, not-withstanding any court order, while it also pro-vides that no prelim-inary enquiry will be required for registering a criminal case and an arrest under this law would not be subject to any approval.

Dalit groups have been asking the government to overturn a Supreme Court ruling of March 20, saying it had "diluted" and rendered "toothless" the law against atrocities faced by the weakest sections of the society by putting additional safeguards against arrest of the accused.

nationwide protest on April 20 had turned violent in several states, leaving at least 12 dead, while call has been given for another 'Bharat Bandh' on August 19 with several opposition parties also offering their support this time.

Pending Issues Difficult Delhi or poor follow-up?

Any time the Chief Minister or other leaders, whether from the government or outside of it, visit Delhi and call on Union Ministers and Central leaders, they submit memorandums which reiterate a substantial list of "pending issues" with the Centre. The list of demands has remained unchanged for a while, and this not because Sikkim is unimaginative, but because the demands have remained pending and hence continue to be petitioned for. Delhi has acquiesced to Sikkim's demands/ requests in too piecemeal a fashion - IT exemption for the Sikkimese and ST status for Limboos and Tamangs - are the only major demands that have been granted in a long while now, and these too after too many years of dithering and delaying and both, in their own ways, incompletely see through. The list of demands and its follow-up has been so static that one does not even need to await an official communiqué any more before putting out a report on what Delhi was reminded about and received a patient hearing

That is how routine the pending nature of Sikkim's demands has become!

One understands that the wheels turn slow in Delhi, and now that the current dispensation in office there is trying to reinvent the wheel itself, Sikkim will need to learn afresh how to get things moving in the Capital. But even as Sikkim and its representatives try and find their way around the new Delhi, a question that still needs to be asked is why Sikkim needs to keep returning to Delhi with "pending issues". At one level, the reason is simple - because Delhi needs to be constantly reminded about them since concerns of a State that sends only one MP each to the two Houses of Parliament are rarely priority. There is nothing that Sikkim can do about that "tyranny" of slim representation. But there must be more reasons behind Delhi's easy amnesia on Sikkim's pending issues, for one the possible fact that Sikkim still does not have officers diligent enough to follow up on proposals which have even the PMO's backing. Once the politicians raise a demand with Central leaders and the same gets forwarded to the respective ministries, the bureaucracy comes into play and the files start moving. Files don't however move if there is no one pursuing them, and experience bears out that Sikkim officials rarely do so. What is worse, sometimes, they don't even respond to queries from the Centre. There have been enough inances even in the recent past when recalcitrance has defined follow-up from Sikkim's departments.

Sikkim should have figured out by now that Delhi lacks the capacity and the time to figure out Sikkim's 'issues". Most of the pending issues, however, need to be resolved by Delhi which lobs the ball back into Sikkim's court and expects a neatly packed and formatted solution to be recommended by Sikkim for enforcement by Delhi. In complicated matters, the State also needs to provide the supporting arguments and watertight justifications and a ready reckoner on Sikkim's special status and the leeway it allows. For more routine issues, sometimes it is as simple as placing the right proposal on the right table. Since this is clearly not happening as fluidly and as professionally as is required for new demands to be framed (since too many of the old have not yet been granted), what else can the elected representatives do but keep trooping down to Delhi to raise issues that are still pending even after everyone has cleared them in principle? Sikkim needs a bureaucratic machinery at home to troop through the doors that its leaders open in Delhi. Till that happens, an annual Delhi pilgrimage with a dusty list of pending demands will remain and constant feature.

The Laos disaster reminds us that local people are too often victims of dam development

On July 22, the Xepian-Xe
Nam Noy hydropower
dam under construction
in Laos' Attapeu Province collapsed. Flash flooding inundated eight villages, killing at least 29 people and leaving 131 officially reported missing. The final number of casualties could

be much higher.

Disaster response activities are ongoing. The deputy secretary of the province claimed that more than 1,100 people were still unaccounted for,

as of July 27. Laotian authorities are investigating whether the collapse was caused by heavy rainfall, inadequate construction standards, or a combina-

tion of the two.

The dam is part of a larger joint venture between Laotian, Thai and South Korean companies, which are reportedly helping with the rescue and restoration effort. The companies are also sending experts to assess the damage and investigate the cause of the disaster.

This is not the first time that a hydropower

project in Southeast Asia has been in the spotlight. It again raises questions about the benefits of such projects for local communities, considering the risks to which local people are exposed.

Not only do large developments interfere with ecosystems, but they often affect local communities even in the absence of catastrophe. This was indeed the case for the Xepian-Xe Nam Noy project, which had already cost many villagers their land and livelihoods before disaster struck.

As much as we tend to focus on the "natural" triggers for disaster - in this case heavy rain - the eality is more nuanced. These incidents are often also the result of flawed development, and as such they are social and political disasters too.

So, was this disaster just a terrible accident? Or is it emblematic of a development agenda that is out of sync with the needs of a healthy environ-

THE IMPACTS OF HYDROPOWER

Hydropower projects in Southeast Asia, and particularly in the Mekong catchment, have long exposed vulnerable communities to risk while developers reap the rewards. Millions of people depend on the

Mekong river for water, fish, transport and irrigation.

Dam developers promise that their projects will deliver a wide array of benefits: renewable energy, bountiful reservoir fishing, profitable reforesta-tion, harmonised water allocation, and better flood control. But these controversial projects often dramatically change local livelihoods for the worse.

We have seen this before, both in Laos and in its

neighbouring countries. The Nam Song Diversion Dam, completed in 1996, affected more than 1,000 Laotian families – first by removing their access to productive agricultural land and causing a severe decline in fish stocks. Since then, deliberate water surges – for electricity generation – have been blamed for three deaths and widespread loss of boats and fishing equipment.

The Nam Theun 2 Hydropower Project boasted

rigorous social and environmental safeguards - but these soon became broken promises. This project also followed a disturbing trend relating to hydropower development in Southeast Asia: the dispossession of already marginalised ethnic minorities.

In neighbouring Cambodia, the Kamchay Dam displaced thousands of people, jeopardised their livelihoods, and caused irreparable damage to the environment. The Pak Chom Dam in Thailand similarly put local livelihoods at risk. So despite providing clean re

So despite providing clean renewable energy, many hydropower projects in Southeast Asia have also deepened inequality and marginalisation.

PEOPLE VS PROFIT

This latest disaster should therefore be seen in the context of broader criticism concerning damming the Mekong and its tributaries.

Some analysts have argued that local communities in the Mekong delta are being caught in the middle of a cross-border water grab. Private and state-backed actors from China, Thailand, and Laos profit handsomely from hydropower projects, but critics argue that all too often the negative impacts of dams are ignored.

Local protests against development projects are often suppressed, and governments regularly

align with private interests to maximise profit and protect developers from any repercussions. In re-cent years, affected communities have made some gains, but displacement and disempowerment are still rife.

The exploitation of the Mekong river is only likely to increase. China has a clear energy agenda and Laos aspires to be the "battery of Southeast Asia". But while exporting much of its hydroelectric power to Thailand, Vietnam and Cambodia, the Laotian government imports the same power back at in-

creased cost from Thailand. Local people feel that mething is amiss.

Communities from the Mekong villages of Mo Phu and Pak Paew villages have been told to pre-pare for resettlement due to the planned construction of the Phou Ngoy Dam. They face uncertainty as to the living conditions at their new location. DEVELOPMENT ISN'T ALWAYS POSITIVE

The World Bank ranked Laos as the 13th fastest growing economy of 2016, and the Asian Develop-ment Bank predicts that its economy will grow at 7% a year for the remainder of this decade

Hydropower is a major contributor to this economic growth. But hydropower projects promote displacement, put livelihoods and food security at risk, and destroy biodiversity and ecosystems. Without considering both international and local social and environmental costs, hydropower development exacerbates everyday struggles for many people in Southeast Asia.

Many of the destructive projects on the Mekong are supported by the World Bank and the Asian Development Bank. These powerful international stakeholders should not be above criticism

The kind of development that is primarily concerned with profits for corporations always occurs at the expense of the most marginalised communi-ties and individuals. All too often their voices are silenced and political accountability is absent.

The evidence indicates that it may not be so simple to decouple economic growth from environmental harm.

Imran Khan: from cricket pitch to politics, Pakistan's next prime minister has played the long game

Being cavalier about death is a prerequisite in Pakistani politics. The country's first prime minister, Liaquat Ali Khan, was assassinated – and a number of subsequent leaders have shared the same fate, variously being executed by order of the state, blown up on planes and at political rallies. In the aftermath of 9/11, Time magazine described governing Pakistan as one of the world's toughest jobs. Nevertheless, the man elected to be the country's next prime minster, Imran Khan, has spent more than two decades seeking the office. On

death and politics, Khan is casual, in deed. "You've got to go sometime his response - and he'd rather go for

Born in Lahore in 1952, Khan was educated at the prestigious Aitchison College – a relic of Empire nestled in the pleasant green land of the Punjab – before going on to study PPE at Oxford. An Oxbridge education has, of course, begun the political career of many a world leader, including the founding father of Pakistan, Muhammad Ali Jinnah, and a number of suc-

Khan has played the part of leader before. He was captain of Pakistan's cricket team when it won the World Cup in 1992. After cricketing success, he turned his hand to politics, founding his Party for Justice, Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) in 1996. His political journey has been a long one.



But his perseverance has now paid off – he will now take the helm of a country which he claims has been left on the brink of failure after years of

DYNASTY BREAKER

Electoral choice has been scant in the Pakistan's short history. In its 70 years, it has been ruled intermittently by political dynasties and the military. Khan is disparaging about this legacy: "Never has a country's ruling elite, for personal benefit ... betrayed their people as much as in Pakistan". He billed himself as the "anti-status quo" candidate – anti-corruption, anti-nepotism.

Khan, of course, has many critics. ome argue that in his quest for political power he has made alliances with conservative hardliners, includ-ing the Taliban and others who see his victory as a triumph for Pakistan's all-important military. On a more personal level, his second wife, to whom he was married for less than a year has written a tell-all book. Khan does not come out of it well at all. "I have never claimed to be an angel," he said of his playboy past. It's doubtful if an angel would make it Pakistani politics. But his first wife, the British heiress Jemima Goldsmith, the mother of his two sons – to whom he was married for nearly a decade - publicly congratulated Khan on his victory. Khan served as the chancellor of

Bradford University between 2005-2014, in the British city which has one of the highest concentrations of citizens of Pakistani ancestry. Described by Bradford's vice chancellor as "a wonderful role model for our students". Khan has been a hero for diaspora Pakistanis since his cricketing heyday in the 1980s. This was the decade which saw Pakistanis in Britain hit the headlines as a troversial headteacher Ray Honeyford fuelled division with comments about the damaging affects of multiculturalism. Then, later, author Salman Rushdie was the subject of a fatwa for his book, The Satanic Verses. What became known as the "Rushdie Affair" led to Britain's Pakistani community being commonly seen as a Muslim community unable and unwilling to integrate into British life.

In Pakistan, Khan first appealed to a small but loval, educated middle class which saw in him the chance to

change the perpetually neg-ative narrative of their country. In 2011, broadcaster Andrew Marr described Pakistan as "overcrowded. nuclear armed, Taliban touched and in some senses paranoid" – hardly an endorsement for a holiday destination. And, yet, tourism is part of the vision Khan has for a new Pakistan.

Khan proclaims himself to be Pa-kistan's only political leader to make their money outside Pakistan, while keeping it all in Pakistan. He sold his London flat to buy a jungle on the outskirts of Islamabad, with cows for milk and yoghurt, a vegetable patch and even his own wheat – a picture of idyllic self-sufficiency. Now he just has to recreate at least somethin that vision for the country which he has been elected to govern.

"We have resolved the Doklam issue with diplomatic maturity without losing any ground. There is no change in the status quo (on the ground). There is not an iota of change.

The face off at sight has been resolved on August 28, 2017," she said during Question Hour.

The External Affairs Min-ister said the Wuhan informal summit was held without any agenda and without having any objective to discuss any specific issue.

Before the summit, the for-eign ministers of the two countries decided that the leaders should not be restricted to any specific issue, she said.

"The decision to host Wu-han was taken not to resolve any issue but to create a conenvironment. Three main objectives were to ensure mutual comfort, mutual understanding and mutual trust. In all the three objectives, we have achived success," she said.

Swaraj said as a follow up to the Wuhan summit, the Chinese Defence Minister is coming to enhance military coop eration while the Foreign Minister will arrive later this year as part of efforts to enhance the people-to-people contact.

The first informal summit tween Modi and Jinping was held at the Chinese city of Wuhan on April 27-28.

India and China were locked in a face-off in the Doklam area of the Sikkim sector for over 50 days after Indian troops stopped the Chinese Army from building a road in the area.

China claimed it was con-structing the road within their territory which India had objected saying the territory does not belong to China.

To another query, Swaraj also made it clear that the boundary dispute between Bhutan and China was continuing and it was a matter between those two countries.

"Our concern was related only to the tri-junction area (India-Bhutan-China)," she said.

(PTI): PV Sindhu and Kidambi Srikanth notched up contrasting wins to progress to the pre-quarterfinals but world no 11 H S Prannoy suffered a shock defeat to unheralded Brazilian Ygor Coel-ho to bow out of the World Championship here today.

Olympic silver medallist Sindhu, who had got a bye in the first round, opened her campaign with an easy 21-14 21-9 win over Indonesia's Fitriani.

The 23-year-old Indian, who won the silver medal last year, will face Korean Sung Ji Hyun, a 2015 World Championship bronze medallist, in the next round.

Srikanth, seeded fifth, re-covered from a slump during the hard-fought contest to see off Spain's Pablo Abian 21-15 12-21 21-14 in a second-round match that lasted 62 minutes. Srikanth, who had clinched



four titles last year, will lock horns with Malaysia's Daren Liew, a former world no 10, who had won the 2012 French Open Super Series.

B Sai Praneeth also en-

tered the next round after dumping Spain's Lu s En-rique Penalver 21-18 21-11 to set up a meeting with Den-mark's Hans-Kristian Solberg Vittinghus.

Prannoy, seeded 11th, couldn't hold on to the momentum after breezing through the opening game to eventually lose 21-8 16-21 15-21 to Coelho, ranked 39th in the world.

Tributes flow as Aussie golfer Lyle halts cancer treatment

SYDNEY, AUG 1 (AFP): Australian golfer Jarrod Lyle has moved into palliative care and is bracing for the worst after ceasing treatment for cancer, sparking an outpouring of sadness Wednesday from fellow players.

The 36-year-old former US PGA

Tour stalwart said his body could take no more after a third battle with acute myeloid leukaemia, which returned last

"My heart breaks as I type this message,' his wife Briony said in updating Lyle's social media pages on Tuesday

evening.
"Earlier today Jarrod made the decision to stop active treatment and begin palliative care. He has given everything that he's got to give, and his poor body cannot take anymore. We'll be taking him closer to home in the next couple of days so he can finally leave the hospital."

Lyle, who has two young children, overcame acute myeloid leukaemia as a 17-year-old before suffering a recurrence in 2012.

That diagnosis was delivered when he sought treatment from his local doctor for an infection from an insect bite he sustained in Mexico after a tournament. He won that battle and made his re-

turn to professional golf at the Australian Masters in November 2013.

But his health deteriorated again in

recent months, with the latest diagnosis seeing emotional tributes from fel-

bloke. It's not fair he's going through this," said former world number one and fellow Australian Jason Day.

Another Australian, Adam Scott, told reporters ahead of the World Golf Championships-Bridgestone Invitational in Ohio that Lyle had been a pernal in onto that byte had been a per-nal inspiration. "He is one of the best blokes there is.

US Open champ Stephens makes triumphant hardcourt start



Open champion Sloane Stephens began the summer hardcourt campaign ahead of defending her Flushing Meadows crown by beating Bethanie Mattek-Sands 7-5, 6-4 Tues-day at the WTA and ATP Washington Open.

Third-ranked Stephens, who captured her first Grand Slam title last year in New York, booked a second-round match against Germany's Andrea Petkovic.

"I'm super excited about the hardcourt season again," 25-year-old Stephens said.

"I'm still young and still have so much more to go and look forward to." Stephens, who won her first WTA title at

Washington in 2015, fired her sixth ace on her first match-point chance to advance after one hour and 53 minutes.

"I knew I was in for a real test from the very beginning," Stephens said. "I knew I had to stay patient and be within myself."

Stephens became the top-rated player in the draw when world number two Caroline Wozniacki, the reigning Australian Open

champion, withdrew due to a right leg injury. Denmark's Wozniacki, who won her 29th career WTA title in June at Eastbourne, was ousted from Wimbledon in the second round and had a right leg issue in a Monday practice session.

"It's just something that has been nag-ng for a little while," Wozniacki said. "Hopefully it will be fine." On the men's

side, top-seeded defending champion Alexander Zverev of Germany was scheduled to open later against Malek Jaziri.

Third-ranked Zverev beat Jaziri in last year's third round at Washington but split two clay meetings with the 34-year-old Tuwho reached his first ATP final in

Zverev has never faced his brother Mis-

cha, the 15th seed, in an ATP event but they could meet in a third-round match, with Mischa set to face US wildcard Tim Smyczek.

Three-time Grand Slam winner Stan Wawrinka, coming back after a left knee injury, was to face US qualifier Donald Young. The 198th-ranked Swiss waited through rain until 1 a.m. Tuesday to play Young but was rained out.

"There's rain in the forecast the next four days. Everyone has played late matches here," said US second seed John Isner.

"Whoever deals with that the best, whoever doesn't mind playing at two in the morning, is liable to win the event."

The only remaining women's top-five seed other than Stephens is Japan's 17th-ranked Naomi Osaka, the reigning Indian Wells champion who won her Washington debut match 6-2, 7-6 (7/4) over American

Trump could raise tariffs further on Chinese goods: reports

WASHINGTON, AUG 1
(AFP): US President (AFP): US President Donald Trump is now considering a 25 per cent tariff on USD 200 billion in Chinese imports, rather than the 10 per cent previously touted, reports have said.

The US imposed tar-

iffs of 25 per cent on USD 34 billion of Chinese products earlier this month, with plans to add another USD 16 billion of imports yesterday.

Trump initially threatened to levy 10 per cent on an additional USD 200 billion but that figure may now rise to 25 per cent, sources told the Washington Post and Bloomberg.
It would represent a

ramping up of pressure over Washington's trade standoff with Beijing.

In Beijing Chinese foreign ministry spokesman Geng Shuang said Wednesday that "black-mail and pressure from the US side will never work on China".

"If the US takes measures to further escalate this situation, we will surely take counter-measures to firmly uphold our legitimate rights and interests," he told a regular briefing. In 2017 the United States had a USD 376 billion trade deficit with China, which it is keen to reduce.

Trump recently threatened to slap punitive tariffs on all Chinese exports to the US, which amounted to more than USD 500 billion last year.

US designates three Pakistanis as global terrorists

WASHINGTON, AUG 1 (PTI): The US has designated three Pakistanis linked to the LeT, the outfit responsible for carrying out the 2008 Mumbai attack, as global terrorists to shut down the militant group's financial network and curtail its ability to raise funds to carry out violent terrorist attacks.

LeT commander Abdul Rehman al-Dakhil was named as a Specially Designated Global Terrorist (SDGT) by the Department of State. Separately, the US Depart-

ment of the Treasury's Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) took action yesterday to disrupt the LeT's fundraising and support networks by designating two of the group's financial facilitators. Hameed ul Hassan and Abdul Jabbar, as Specially Designated Global Terrorists (SDGTs).

A longtime member of the US designated Foreign Terrorist Organisation (FTO) and Lashkar e-Taiba (LeT), Dakhil was an operational leader for LeT's attacks in India between 1997 and 2001. In 2004, Dakhil was cap-



tured in Iraq by British forces, then held in US custody in Iraq and Afghanistan until his transfer to Pakistan in 2014.

After his release from Pakistani custody, Dakhil returned to work for the LeT. In 2016, Dakhil was the LeT divisional commander for the

Jammu region.

As of early 2018, Dakhil remained a senior commander in the LeT.

The designation seek to deny Dakhil the resources to plan and carry out terrorist attacks, the State Department said in a statement.

Among other consequenc es, all of his property and interests subject to US jurisdic-tion are blocked, and US persons are generally prohibited from engaging in any transactions with him.

'Today's action notifies the US public and the international community that Abdul Rehman al-Dakhil has committed. or poses a significant risk of committing, acts of terrorism," the State Department said.

Designations of terrorist individuals and groups expose and isolate organisations and individuals, and deny them access to the US financial system, it added.

Treasury Under Secretary for Terrorism and Financial In-telligence Sigal Mandelker said Hassan and Jabbar were responsible for collecting, transporting and distributing funds to support the terror group and provide salaries to extremists.

"Treasury's designations not only aim to expose and

shut down Lashkar-e-Taiba's financial network, but also to curtail its ability to raise funds to carry out violent ter-

rorist attacks," he said.

As a result of the designa tion, all property and interests in property of Hassan and Jabbar subject to US jurisdiction are now blocked. US persons are generally prohibited from engaging in transactions

As of late 2016, Hassan worked with Falah-e Insaniat Foundation, a front for the LeT, to collect and send funds to Syria. Further, as of early 2016, Hassan worked with his brother, Muhammad Ijaz Safarash, and Khalid Walid to transport funds to Pakistan on behalf of the LeT.

The Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) previous-ly designated Safarash and Walid as Specially Designated Global Terrorists for their association with the LeT in March 2016 and September 2012, respectively.

Additionally, Hassan has

active Twitter account, which identifies him as the leader of the 2008 Mumbai

Hafiz Saeed-led Jamat-ud Dawah in Pakistan-occupied Kashmir.

According to the Treasury, Jabbar is a financial facilitator for the LeT and distributes salaries for the terrorist group. He has worked in the LeT's nance department since round 2000. Additionally, as of mid-2016, Jabbar distributed funds on behalf of the lah-e-Insaniat Foundation.
In December 2001, the De-

partment of State designated the LeT as a Foreign Terrorist Organisation. The LeT was o added to the UN Security Council's Sanctions List in May 2005.

Jamaat-ud Dawa was designated as an alias of LeT pursuant in April 2006 and was added to the UN Security Council's Sanctions List in December 2008. In November 2010, the Department of State amended its designations of LeT to include the alias Falah-e Insaniat Founda-tion. In March 2012, the UN amended its Sanctions List to recognise the Falah-e Insaniat Foundation as a front for LeT.

97 injured as Mexican plane crashes at airport in hail storm

An Aeromexico flight crashed on takeoff during a heavy hail storm in northern Mexico, engulfing the plane in flames and injuring 97 people, officials said.

The Embraer 190 aircraft, which was operating between Durango and Mexico City and crashed around 3:00 pm local time (20:00 GMT), was carrying "88 adults, nine minors, two infants, two pilots and two flight attendants," the airline's director general Andres Conesa told a news con-

ference yesterday.
"It is confirmed that there have been no deaths from the flight #AM2431 accident," tweeted Jose Rosas, the governor of Durango state where the

accident cause two series injuries: a pilot had to undergo a spinal operation, and a young girl suffered burns on 25 per cent of her dy, the governor said.

A total of 97 people

Brazilian

were admitted for treat-ment following the crash, most of them for "very light" injuries, according to Durango civil defense spokesman Alejandro Cardoza. Cardoza said the plane was caught in a heavy hailstorm and the pilots tried to make an emergency landing, after

which the fire broke out.

Conesa thanked the crew "for their professionsm" and said that the air-"was perfectly maintained", but did not provide details on the circu es of the accident.

Dozens of lightly injured passengers were seen leaving the plane, which was engulfed in gray smoke in a field.

An image taken using a drone and obtained by

AFP shows the aircraft immobilised in a field at the end of the runway. "We were on the runway when the visibility grew worse," 47-year-old Jacqueline Flores, who was traveling with her 16-year-old daughter, told AFP.

"When we were al-ready aloft, up high, it felt like the plane was going to level out but just then is when it plunged to the ground. I think we fell back on the runway because it was a hard surface, then we skidded on the ground until it stopped," added the Durango native, a housewife who was on a journey back to Colombia where she lives.

With the plane on the ground amid some bushes and brush. Flores said luggage began sliding down the aisle and she started to smell smoke

belt and saw and realized we had to jump. There was a hole right next to us and the plane had broken up, I told my girl 'We have to jump over here' and we jumped," she added.

Fb removes accounts involved in political influence

WASHINGTON, AUG 1 (PTI): Facebook has removed 32 fake accounts and pages that it says were involved in "coordinated inauthentic behaviour" and political influence campaign to manipulate voters ahead of the November midterm elections in the US.

Though the world's biggest so-

cial media network has not yet attributed the accounts to any group, it says the campaign does bear some resemblance to the propaganda campaign allegedly run by Russia's Internet Research Agency

(IRA) in the runup to the 2016 US presidential election.

Facebook has been grappling with con-tinuing public backlash for

being slow to recognise Russian interference in the 2016 US presidential election, along with widespread concerns over its past data-sharing practices. The company's stock has plunged more than 20 per cent since last week after it reported slower user growth and rising costs for security and safety rograms to crack down on abuse of its platform.

"This kind of behaviour is not allowed on Facebook because we don't want people or organisations creating networks of accounts to mislead others about who they are, or what they're doing," it said.

Noting that Facebook is still in the very early stages of its investiga-tion and does not have all the facts - including who may be behind this, the company executives warned that they were dealing with increasingly sophisticated political operatives, who are finding new ways to abuse Facebook's platforms.

"We've made it harder for inauthentic actors to operate on Facebook," said Facebook chief operating officer Sheryl Sandberg. "Yet we face determined, well-funded adversaries who won't give up and who are constantly changing tactics."

"At this point in our investiga-tion, we do not have enough technical evidence to state definitively who is behind this," said Nathaniel Gleicher, Facebook's head of cybersecurity policy.

However, Senator Mark Warner, the top Democrat on the US Senate Intelligence Committee, issued a statement tying the latest Facebook activity directly to Russia. After its lat-

discovery, Facebook said it had removed 17 profiles and eight pages, along with seven accounts on Ins-tagram, the Face-

book-owned photo-sharing app. The earliest was created in March of last year, while the most recent

was created this May.

More than 290,000 accounts followed at least one of the suspect pages, which had names like Aztlan Warriors, Black Elevation, Mindful Being and Resisters, the company said.

The organisers behind the accounts went to great lengths to conceal their identities including using virtual private networks software that masks the geographic location of computers and Internet-based phone numbers, company officials said.

They also used third parties to publish paid advertisements on Facebook, in violation of the social-media firm's policies banning foreign entities from buying US political ads.

The accounts spent USD 11,000 to run 150 ads on both Facebook and Instagram between April 2017 and June of this year. Facebook previously said roughly 470 fake

accounts had spent USD 100,000 on more than 3,500 ads surrounding the 2016 election.

Facebook said it all started two eeks ago when it identified the first of eight pages and 17 profiles.

The pages created about 30 events since May 2017. About half had fewer than 100 accounts interested in attending. The largest had approximately 4,700 accounts interested in attending, and 1,400 users said that they would attend,

One fake page called 'Resisters' was involved in co-ordinating a protest in Washington between August 10-12. The 'No Unite the Right 2 DC' event was meant to be a counter-protest to a rally planned by right-wing groups as a follow-up last year's deadly 'Unite the Right' protests in Charlottesville.

Fake accounts contacted administrators of five other legitimate Facebook groups to help plan the counterprotest, including offering support for transportation and logistics, and posting ads to hire an event co-ordinator. Facebook said it had disabled the event and was in the process of contacting nearly 2,600 people who had said they


ere interested in attending.

"These bad actors have been more careful to cover their tracks. in part due to the actions we've taken to prevent abuse over the past year," Facebook said.

For example, they used virtual private networks (VPNs) and internet phone services, and paid third parties to run ads on their behalf.

"We have found evidence of

some connections between these accounts and IRA accounts we disabled last year, which is covered below. But there are differences, too. For example, while IP addresses are easy to spoof, the IRA accounts we disabled last year sometimes used Russian IP addresses. We haven't seen those here," it said.

DEPP ACCUSES EX-WIFE AMBER HEARD OF 'PUNCHING HIM TWICE IN THE FACE' IN LEGAL LAWSUIT

Johnny Depp accused his exwife Amber Heard in court papers of 'punching him twice in the face' for being late to her birthday party in April 2016. The 55-yearold Hollywood legend made allegations as part of a libel law-suit against the Sun newspaper in the High Court, according to an article on Tuesday by the Mirror.

Depp sued after an April 2018 report branded him as a wife beater and criticized his casting in the Harry Potter spin-off Fantasitc Beasts: The Crimes Of Grindelwald.

Court papers filed by Depp's lawyers in the Queen's Bench Division claimed he arrived two hours late for his wife's birth-day dinner in April 2016. Heard, 32, allegedly 'began criticising the claimant for being late,' according to court papers.

The documents added that Depp was 'not drunk or high on drugs' and was in bed when 'Ms Heard, who had been drinking, became aggressive and violent... punching him twice in the face'.

The Edward Scissorhands star 'defended himself by grabbing Ms Heard's arms to stop her punching again and told her to stop,' according to the court filing.

'He pushed her away on to the bed and told her he was leaving and that she should not follow him,' the papers added.

Depp's team also referenced a May 2016 argument that Heard cited in her request for a restraining order against her estranged husband after filing for divorce.

Heard in her restraining order request alleged that Depp 'vio-lently attacked' her in their Los Angeles penthouse apartment and threw a cellphone that struck her in the face with 'extreme force'.

Photos later emerged of Heard with bruises on her face. Depp in his recent court fil-

ing submitted depositions from



two police officers who said they they arrived on the scene.

When one of the officers asked Ms Heard what had hap pened she responded "nothing",' the documents added.

The court filing also alleged that Depp's security team rushed to the penthouse upon hearing Heard yelling.

The security observed [Depp] standing in the kitchen, far away from Ms Heard. At that moment, Ms Heard yelled, "S hitting me, Johnny" into the phone. The claimant was not hitting Ms Heard. Ms Heard was about 25 feet away,' the court documents claimed

An attorney for Heard strongly challenged the claims made in Depp's court filing.

These allegations are totally false. One needs only read the recent Rolling Stone article about Mr Depp and the lawsuit filed against him by a location manager, among many other re-cent news stories and lawsuits, to understand his state of mind, the attorney told the Mirror.

Depp and Heard met in 2011 while filming The Rum Diary together. They were married at their Los Angeles home in 2015 and she filed for divorce in May 2016. Their divorce was finalized in January 2017 after they reached an out-of-court divorce settlement.
