

# Two young women enter Sabarimala, finally

SABARIMALA/THIRUVANANTHA-PURAM, JAN 2 (PTI): Cloaked in black veils and shrouded in early morning darkness, two women of menstruating age group made history on Wednesday when they stepped into the Sabarimala temple of Lord Ayyappa, breaking a centuries-old tradition defying dire threats from the Hindu right.

The development sparked vio-lent protests across Kerala by the BJP and Hindu right outfits, with the state secretariat turning into a veri-table war zone for nearly five hours as the ruling CPI(M) and workers of the saffron party clashed, pelting each other with stones.

Police used water canons and burst teargas shells to bring the situation under control.

Chief Minister Pinaravi Vijayan's effigy was burnt at Malap-puram and four activists of the BIP's Mahila Morcha were arrested when they forced their way close to the chief minister's office in the secretariat complex. The two dauntless women--Kanakadurga and Bindu--aged 44 and 42, stepped into the hallowed precincts guarded by police three months after the Supreme Court's historic judgement lifting the ban on entry of girls and women be-tween 10 and 50 years of age into the shrine of Lord Ayyappa, its "eternally celibate" deity.

The duo, draped in black and

their faces covered in veils, entered the temple at 3:38 am, a day after over 35 lakh women stood shoulder-to-shoulder across the national highways in Kerala, creating a 620 kmlong human 'wall' from the northern end of Kasaragod to the southern tip in Thiruvananthapuram as part of the state-sponsored initiative to uphold gender equality.

As the news spread like wildfire from the hill shrine, protests erupted at several places, with Hindu right-wing activists blocking high-ways and forcing closure of shops and markets. The ruling CPI(M)'s offices were vandalised at several places causing tension, police said.

State-owned KSRTC bus-es were damaged at Konni and Kozhencherry in Pathanamthitta district where the temple is located besides several other places. Devaswom Board offices attached to temples across the state were also locked up.
Several policemen were in-

jured in the violence.

People from media were also attacked by BJP activists in front of the secretariat, officials said.

Sabarimala Karma Samithi, an umbrella organisation of various pro-Hindutva groups, spearheading protests against the Supreme Court's September 28 verdict, and Antarrashtriya Hindu Parishad (AHP), have called a state-wide shutdown on Thursday, when the Congress-led UDF said it would observe a "black day".

The agency warned that in several countries many babies will not even be named as they won't make it past their first day. According to UNICEF, in 2017, about one million babies died the day they were born, and 2.5 million in just their first month of life.

## Rural farmers and youth trained on mushroom cultivation at ICAR

GANGTOK, 02 JAN (IPR): Twenty-one women and rural youth from Marchak, Ranipool, East Sikkim were trained on organic mushroom and spawn production technology providing them an opportunity to carve out a livelihood option for themselves.

ICAR-National ganic Farming Research Institute, Tadong under the leadership of Joint Director, Dr. RK Avasthe, has been playing a pivotal role in developing and popularizing scientific organic oyster mushroom and its spawn production technology among the farmers of Sikkim. The premier institute conducted a three-day organic oyster mushroom production training for entrepreneurship development for the rural youth and women folk of Sikkim from 26-28 Dec 2018.

She enlightened the participants on the organic oyster mushroom cultivation in Sikkim and emphasized on the economic and social importance of mushrooms in the communities of Sikkim and called upon the farmers to take up mushroom cultivation as a good option for sustaining a healthy livelihood.

Shweta Singh detailed about the various activities to be undertaken

during the training. She also explained the crop production and manage-ment of oyster mushroom cultivation and the spawn production technology developed at ICAR-NOFRI. The management of

## Govt tables bill to allow voluntary use of Aadhaar for SIMs, bank a/c

New Delhi, Jan 2 (PTI): The government Wednesday introduced a bill in the Lok Sabha that will allow individuals to voluntary offer biometric ID Aadhaar as a means of identity verification for obtaining services like opening a bank account and getting a mobile

The bill, which seeks to amend three separate laws governing Aadhaar, telecom sector, and banking regulation, also gives a minor an option to opt out of the 12-digit identity scheme on attaining the age of 18 years.

The Aadhaar and Other Laws (Amend-ment) Bill 2018, moved by Law and IT Minister Ravi Shankar Prasad in the Lok Sabha, bans storing of core biometric information as well as Aadhaar number by service providers in cases of individuals who have voluntarily offered the national ID as a means of authentication. It also makes it clear

that anyone not offering Aadhaar cannot be denied any service, be it a bank geted Delivery of Finan-

cation, can also leverage the central Government.

The Bill also seeks to lay down the procedure for offline verification of an Aadhaar number holder, and confers enhanced regulator-like power on Unique Identification Authority of India (UIDAI) to give directions as it

#### Bitter war of words between govt, Opposition in LS over Rafale

New Delhi, Jan 2 (PTI): The Opposition and the words on the Rafale issue in Lok Sabha on Wednes-day, with Rahul Gandhi saying that Prime Min-ister Narendra Modi "does not have guts" to face questions in Par-liament and Finance Minister Arun Jaitley accusing the Congress chief of peddling "lies" and "falsehood".

The discussions ended abruptly midway after Speaker Sumitra Maha-jan suspended 24 AIAD-MK members for five days due to the "grave disorder" they caused with their protests in the Well of the House.

In an embarssment to the Narendra Modi government, its ally Shiv Sena also supported the Opposition's demand for a joint parliamentary committee (IPC) into the Rafale deal, claiming that people say the aircraft is good but the deal is bad.

Following Gandhi's hard-hitting attack on the government, Jaitley led the government's charge in a scathing counter- attack as he referred to alleged defence scams during the Congress rule and said "conspirators" of past defence scams had the "audacity" to target the Modi dispensation.

He also ruled out a JPC probe- a demand made by most opposi-tion leaders, including Gandhi- saying there was no need for it as the Supreme Court has already satisfied its "conscience on the issue.

Targeting Gandhi, the BJP leader said he would have played in the lap of 'Q', an apparent reference to Ottavio Quattrocchiallegedly invoved in the

Bofors case.

Jaitley also mentioned the recent disclosure allegedly made by AgustaWestland accused Christian Michel and referred to terms like "Mrs G" and "the Italian lady and "her son" to attack the Congress leadership.
Attacking the Con

gress president, he said "There are some peo-ple who have a natural dislike for truth. Every word spoken for the last six months on this subiect, including in this House (by them) are false....He has a legacy of speaking falsehood"

#### Care for the Children

Yes, they continue to be employed even before they are 14

It is now twelve years since a ban was imposed in October 2006 [under Child Labour (Prohibition & Regulation) Act, 1986] against employment of under-14 year olds in "any" kind of work. At that time, spirits were high as one expected the prohibition of employing u-14's in "any" work would clear out the grey areas under which we had continued to put children at risk. Unfortunately, we also underestimated the wickedness of our society, because thirty years since we sought to save children from laboring, and a full 12 since we clarified that they could not even be engaged as domestic servants, we continue to bond them into labour.

The Act had already been in place for 20 years before employment of minors even as domestic servants or helpers in restaurants and tea shops was banned. Ideally, expanding the definition of work and widening the net to include more "employers" into the criminal bracket if they continue to engage child labour should have come after the original act had delivered exceptional results and the safety nets had been reinforced to catch the newly liberated. These had to be backed with the right legislations and trainings to enforce this important law. Thirty years on, it is with a heavy heart that one highlights that none of these happened. Yes, under-14-year-olds are occasionally rescued from hazardous places of work, but those rescues were taking place earlier as well and even before child labour was "prohibited and regulated". How many private citizens has one heard of getting hauled to court for having employed minors at home?

The Act was never implemented in earnest in any of its forms and protection hence remains only on paper. While most of the focus on child labour, in Sikkim at least, has revolved around their employment as do mestic servants, albeit without any real effect or even embarrassment, fact remains that many minors continue to work hazardous and much more strenuous occupations as well. Children who do not look more than 12 years old, and many, who appear to be borderline 14 year olds, can be seen employed at work sites, some even government sanctioned projects, and recently, some were even rescued from some shops in Singtam. The bonded-labour tendencies of the employers or their selfish intent to maximise profits by employing minors [since they can be paid less and fired at will], are not the only reasons why child la-bour continues to confront Sikkim at home and outside; a larger share of the blame lies with whichever authority it is that is shouldered with the responsibility to inform the people and enforce the ban.

No genuine attempt has been made to educate and police against the continued abuse of the law. Had such an attempt been made, there would not have been such avoidable conundrums as figuring out how or which agency is supposed to establish the age of an illegally employed child. When it comes to children who choose a depressing workplace over school, it is too much to expect them to circulate their CVs with their birth certificates attached. It will also be impractical to expect employers to prove the lawful age of their workers. So who does it then? And how? One could theorise on this aspect here, but the best people to work out an implementable guideline would be those who have worked at enforcing the ban. Only they would know the limitations of the existing rules provided of course, they have worked at implementing it. Children continue to fall through the gaps which can only get plugged once some hands-on experience is on call. There does not appear to be much of that available. Such a scenario thirty years since the Act was promulgated and a full decade since it was expanded is not how childhoods can be saved.

# Who are Yemen's Houthis?

MYRIAM RENAUD

Fully half of Yemen's population – 14 million people – are on the brink of starvation. Some analysts blame their inability to access basic foodstuff on escalating conflict between two religious factions: the country's Sunni Muslims and its Houthis. The Houthis belong to the Shiite branch of Islam. Saudi Arabia, which shares a border with Yemen

and is predominantly Sunni, has been helping Yemen's government forces try to regain control over Houthi-held parts of the country. For several weeks, a Saudi-led coalition has unleashed near-continuous airstrikes on Houthi strongholds including access points for the majority of humanitarian aid coming into country.

What are the Houthis' religious beliefs?

#### ROOTS OF HOUTHI MOVEMENT

Just as the Protestant tradition is subdivided into Methodists, Presbyterians, Congregationalists and others, Shiite Islam is also subdivided. Houthis belong to the Zavdi branch.

From the ninth century onward or for a thousand years, a state ruled by Zaydi religious leaders and politicians existed in northern Yemen. Then, in 1962, Egyptian-trained Yemeni military officers toppled the Zaydi monarchy and replaced it with a republic. Because of their ties to the ancient regime, Zaydis were perceived as a threat to the new government and were subjected to severe repression.

Nearly three decades later, in 1990, the region

known as south Yemen merged with north Yemen to become the Republic of Yemen. Zaydis remained a ma-jority in the north and west of the country, and also in the capital city of Sanaa. However, in terms of the overall population, they became a minority.

According to a 2010 CIA estimate, 65 percent of Yemen's people are Sunnis and 35 percent or Yemen's people are Sunnis and 35 percent are Shiites. The majority of those Shiites are Zaydis. Jews, Bahais, Hindus and Christians make up less than 1 percent of inhabitants, many of whom are refugees or temporary foreign residents.

To reduce the dominance of Zaydis in the north, government authorities encouraged Muslims belonging to two Sunni branches with links to Saudi Arabia - Salafis and Wahhabis – to settle in the heart of the Zavdis' traditional territories

#### START OF HOUTHI INSURGENCY

Contributing to this trend, in the early 1990s, a Yemeni cleric founded a teaching institute in the Zaydis heartland. This cleric, educated in Saudi Arabia, developed a version of Salafi Islam.

His institute proselytized with the goal of reforming Muslims through conversion. It educated thousands of Yemeni students and, in less than three decades, the new religious group grew large enough to

compete with older groups such as the Zaydis.

According to scholar Charles Schmitz, the Houthi insurgency began in the early 1990s, spurred, in part, by Zaydi resistance to growing Salafi and Wahhabi in-

fluence in the north. Hussein Badreddin al-Houthi, son of a prominent Zaydi cleric, gave the grassroots movement its name. He coalesced support among his followers around a narrative of Houthis as defenders and revivers of Zaydi

#### SUNNI VS. ZAYDI SHIITE BELIEFS

What beliefs set Zaydis apart from Sunni Muslims?
That is an old story, dating back to the seventh century
when the Prophet Muhammad died.
Shiites and Sunnis disagree about who should

have been selected to succeed Muhammad as head



of the Muslim community. Two groups emerged after his death. One group of the Prophet's followers - later called Sunnis – recognized four of his companions as "rightly guided" leaders In contrast, another group – later called Shiites – recognized only Ali, the fourth of these leaders, as legitimate.

Ali was the Prophet's first cousin and closest male

blood relative. He was also married to Fatima, Muhammad's youngest daughter. For these and other reasons, Shiites believe that Ali was uniquely qualified to lead. In support of this claim, they cite sources describing Muhammad's wish that Ali succeed him. Shiites consider Ali second in importance only to the Prophet

Over time, further divisions took place. Allegiances to different descendants of Ali and his two sons, Hassan and Hussein, split Shiites into sub-branches. A grandson of Hussein called Zayd gave the Zaydis their name. To them, he is the fifth imam after Muhammad, giving the Zaydis their other name: "Fivers."

Zayd earned the respect of his followers when he rose up against the powerful Muslim rulers of his time, whom he believed to be tyrannical and corrupt. Though his rebellion was ill-fated, his fight against op-

Pression and injustice inspires Zaydis to actively resist.

A key Zaydi belief is that only blood relatives of Ali
and Fatima are eligible to serve as religious leaders, or
imams. In Yemen, these relatives form a notable class of people called Sada. Hussein al-Houthi, the first leader of the Houthis, came from a prestigious clan of Sada IMPACT OF SECTARIAN DIFFERENCES

Not all Zaydis have a favorable view of Sada elites. When north and south Yemen merged in 1990, the republican government, led by a Zaydi president sought to reduce their outsized influence

Some members of the Sada reacted to the country's changing political landscape by joining electoral politics to secure honor and exercise power. This path was initially followed by Hussein al-Houthi but, after

he decided it was ineffective, he abandoned it.

Other members of the Sada, particularly the youth, reacted by pledging to teach and promote Zaydism

g their peers who had forgotten their tors' religion. To accomplish this, they founded the Believing Youth organization and set up a cultural education program based on a network of summer camps in the north. Hussein al-Houthi joined this organization in the early 2000s and later transformed it into a political movement critical of the Yemeni government's ties to the West.

Security forces sent to arrest Hussein al-Houthi touched off the first war with the Houthis. Hussein was killed during the conflict and leadership passed to Hussein's father and then to Hussein's youngest brother, Abdul-Malik Badreddin al-Houthi. Abdul-Malik helped transform the Houthi movement into a pow

Five additional wars followed over the next six years until, in 2010, the rebels had grown strong enough to repel a ground and aerial offensive launched against them by Saudi Arabia. During these wars, the Houthis pushed beyond their traditional base and cap-tured vast sections of territory.

Many Yemenis, according to one expert, believe that the Houthis are fighting to restore a state like the

one prior to 1962, led by imams who came exclusively Sada families

#### COMPLEX FACTORS TODAY

Houthis continue to focus on protecting the Zaydi region of north Yemen from state control. However, they have also forged coalitions with other groups – some of them Sunni – unhappy with Yemen's persistent high unemployment and corruption.

A 2015 U.N. Security Council report estimates that

the Houthi movement includes 75,000 armed fighters. However, if unarmed loyalists are taken into account,

they could number between 100,000 and 120,000.

Sectarian tension is only one factor in the complex set of interlocking factors responsible for violence and starvation in Yemen. But it is, without a doubt, a contributing factor.

## Digital Earth: the paradigm now shaping our world's data cities

Today's smart cities rely on networks: squillions of semiconductor devices that constantly pulse electromagnetic waves (light and radio frequencies) through telecommunications satellites.

Another genre of satellites, equipped especially for Earth observations, is accelerating a more advanced form of ur-banism: data cities. These realms are not only "smart and connected" but also increasingly responsive to electronic evidence revealing real situations and

In various publications and a new book, Data Cities: How satellites are transforming architecture and design, I explain how this century's Earth observation science paradigm is des-tined to transform traditional practic-es among built environment profes-sionals. That includes land surveyors, architects, engineers, landscape designers, property developers, builders and urban planners.

HOW DO ALL THE SATELLITE DATA AFFECT URBAN DESIGN?

In essence, much more detailed and accurate information about local environmental conditions will be sup-plied to development teams before new building concepts are designed. This should be more informative and less time-wasting than current routines. At present, planning authorities deter-mine building proposals based on environmental impact assessment reports prepared after the design phase

Architects and engineers already share the on-screen construction of building information models. They should benefit from obtaining more site-specific information earlier than is now usual. This would allow them to calculate more useful parameters, and receive more accurate performance predictions, for their virtual buildings and landscapes.

Earth observation satellites carry sensor and scanner systems that bounce different signals to and from the Earth. These systems constantly monitor and display many environmental conditions that normally are invisible to humans.

Some innovations in sat-imaging include: the patterns of street lighting that reliably map different cities at night; thermo-imaging (infrared) of the surface temperatures and energy losses of buildings; and high-res overviews of areas affected by drought, flooding, fires, chemical spills, eruptions, wars and other disasters.

Earth observation satellites are not new. In 1946, a camera aboard a V-2 (aka A-4) missile launched from New Mexico took the first picture of Earth from space. The first satellite weather map was broadcast through small black-

and-white television screens in 1960.
Today, more than 650 Earth observation satellites operate beyond the Earth's atmosphere. Some orbit the planet to allow scanning in swathes. Others hold geostationary positions ve specific places.

These satellites also operate at dif-

ferent distances from the Earth. And they carry different types of scanning and sensing equipment. As a result, they produce a diverse range of im-age resolutions, styles and scales of ground coverage.

The satellites record various kinds of environmental information, depending on which waves of the electromagnetic spectrum are used. These data are analysed and processed using precise algorithms.

A common example is data visualisations – often 2D or 3D video maps recorded over time. Typically, bright co-lours are applied to highlight contrasting conditions. For example, temperature data are colourised to show heat islands in cities. The same thing is done with aerosol data to depict patterns of carbon pollution.

#### WHAT'S AUSTRALIA'S ROLE IN THIS?

Australia does not fly satellites yet. But in July 2018 it launched the Australian Space Agency (ASA). Headed by former CSIRO director Megan Clark, it has an initial budget of A\$300 million.

The ASA is working with Geoscience Australia (GA) on a A\$225 million program to improve data positioning accuracy – to 3cm in cities with mobile coverage. Another A\$37 million is going into developing the Digital Earth Australia program for environmental data simulations.

Digital Earth, a term Al Gore coined in his 1992 book. Earth in the Balance. in his 1992 book, Earth in the Balance, is an international science agenda to use Earth observation systems to update the ancient cartography ambition to "present the known world as one and continuous".

This dream was championed most influentially in the 20th century by US scientist Richard Buckminster Fuller, with his evolving concepts for an Air-Ocean World Town Plan (1928), Dymaxion map (1943), Geoscope (a giant electronic space-frame globe, 1962) and his book, Operating Manual for Spaceship Earth (1969).

In the early 2000s, NASA (World and Google (Google Earth) launched the first internet-enabled "vir tual globes".

In 2005, major nations established

the Group on Earth Observations (GEO) ally networked administration and on-line access system for geospatial data. These data are mainly from satellites at this stage.

The Global Earth Observations System of Systems (GEOSS) program now involves more than 200 national gov-ernments, United Nations data agencies, and global science and non-government

Australia's representative on GEO is Geoscience Australia's environmental division chief, Stuart Minchin. Working

with Minchin, a GA team led by Adam Lewis produced the world-leading Data Cube system for rapidly analysing time-series stacks of American Landsat images covering Australia's 40-plus zones of latitude and longitude.

European scientists are now using this method to compile a data-layered map of human settlements around the world.

## Mizoram: 2018 saw Cong losing its last fort in Northeast

AIZAWL, JAN 2 (PTI): Political developments dominated 2018 in Mizoram and as the year drew to a close, the state saw installation of a new government led by rebel-turned-politician Zoramthanga, who was back with a bang after being in political wilderness for two assembly terms. Zoramthanga's Mizo

National Front (MNF) trounced the Congress to bring to an end its 10year rule since 2008 in the state in December. Seventy-four-year-

old Zoramthanga was sworn in as the chief minister for the third time on December 15. He had earlier headed the government in 1998 and 2003.

For the first time, the swearing-in ceremony was marked by Bi-ble reading, prayer and singing of a Christian gospel song. Mizoram is a predominant Christian state.

The Congress managed to bag only five seats while the MNF secured 26 seats in the 40-member legislature.



The Congress's slump was sharp considering the fact that it had 34 seats in the last election in 2013. Though the BJP's pet assertion of "Congress-mukt" came true in the Northeast. the party could not do much in Mizoram where it managed to win only one seat.

After taking oath, Arter taking bath, Zoramthanga said that the MNF has now no intention to leave the BJP-led NDA and the North East Democrat-

though it was under fire for joining hands with saffron forces. The state witnessed a terrible disaster on June 4 when 10 people, seven of them belonging to a family, were killed and one person was injured when a building occupied by two families was swept away by landslide caused by heavy rain in Lunglawn area of south Mizoram's

Lunglei town.
Thousands of homes

were destroyed, hundreds of families evacuated to safer places and hundreds of houses and large areas of cultivation lands inundated by flood due to monsoon fury forcing the state government to close down all the educational institutions for two days, due to heavy rain. Simultaneous out-

break of the dreaded Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome (PRRS) and the Classical Swine Fever (CSF) from early March resulted in the death of around 4,000 pigs across the state and was only declared as contained in early August.

The PRRS had killed

over 8,000 pigs and piglets in 2013 and 2017.

The Mizoram Legislative Assembly on June 28 unanimously adopted a resolution expressing opposition to the proposed Citizenshi Amendment Bill, 2016.

The resolution moved by the then Congress government had said, "That this House resolves to impress upon Government of India its unequivo-cal opposition to the proposed Citizenship Amendment Bill, 2016 that seeks to amend the Citizenship Act, 1955 to make illegal migrants eligible to be given Indian Citizenship on the basis of religion."

"The proposed bill, if enacted could be harmful for states like Mizoram where a huge number of illegal Buddhist migrants from Bangladesh were reportedly residing," it further said.

#### 2019 expected to be warmer: Officials

New Delhi, Jan 2 (PTI): The year 2018 may have ended on a chilly note, but 2019 is expected to be warmer, senior offi-cials said, citing El Nino and the overall trend of rise in temperatures.

According to the World Meteorological Organisation (WMO), the chance of a full-fledged El Nino being estab-lished between Decem-ber 2018-February 2019 is estimated to be about 75-80 per cent.

El Nino is a phenomenon associated with the warming of the Pacific waters and it is largely believed to have an impact on the subcontinent's weather. The weather community is divided over the extent of its impact on the monsoon. Ministry of Earth Sciences Secretary M Rajeevan said as the year commences, the chill that covered large parts of the country is likely to dissipate.

temperature is likely to be above normal. El Nino is one factor while the global warming is another. We have been witnessing above normal tempera tures every day," he said. Since 2015.

Since 2015, ev-ery passing year has clocked high temperatures, From 2015-2017. all years were recorded to be hottest. "In an El Nino vear.

summers and winters witness above normal temperatures," Addition-Director General of India Meteorological Department Mritunjay Mo-

Mohapatra said it is too early to predict whether El Nino would have an impact on monsoon and how would the rainy season be. Raje-vaan also noted that it would be premature to say whether the El Nino would have an impact.

"El Nino is likely to end by April-May. So, it is unlikely to have an impact on the monsoon. But it is too early to predict that." Raieevan said.

## 2018: SC came down heavily on real estate honchos

rate legal battle involving big business houses like Arcelor-Mittal and Nmetal on taking over of Essar Steel and tough stand against the automo-bile industry on emission norms kept the Supreme Court busy in 2018 during which it also gave a body blow to real estate honchos.

Be it real estate majors Uni-

tech Ltd, Jaypee Group and Amrapali or others, all had to bear the brunt of the apex court for taking for ride ordinary citiwhose hard earned money was at stake.

The year gone by saw Uni-tech promoters -- Sanjay and Ajay Chandra -- failing to get relief from the top court in coming out of Tihar Jail and Amrapali boss Anil Sharma and two directors being put under police surveillance away from

their homes. The Jaypee Group also had a tough time throughout the year as investors kept up the pressure for possession of their flats which have been delayed in many cases for more than five years.

Amid the legal developments in the real estate sector, a big corporate battle was seen in the top court when steel and mining major ArcelorMittal approached it challenging the National Company Law Appellate Tribunal (NCLAT) order which had held that Numetal's Rs 37.000 crore offer in second-round bid for Essar Steel was valid.

The top court granted one more opportunity to ArcelorMit-tal and Russia's VTB Bank-promoted Numetal to bid for Essar Steel, provided the two pay off the non-performing assets of their related corporate debtors within two weeks

Another embattled corporate house, Sahara Group, was also in the news in the top court throughout the year over the issue of depositing money in the

SEBI-SAHARA account for which it has been facing tough time for over six years.

The ongoing litigation on air pollution took a new turn in the 2018 when the top court hit hard the automobile indus-try by ordering that no Bharat Stage-IV vehicle would be sold or registered in India from April

A tough stand was also taken by the top court to regulate the firecrackers and the industry involved in it got a rude shock before Diwali that only "green crackers" would be allowed to burst across the country for two

hours only.

The order was not limited to Diwali but for other festivals and occasions in which people burst crackers.

The year gone by also saw apex court delivering a significant verdict when it held that courts can scrutinise the rates of interest being charged by banks from farmers in states where debt relief laws are in place to

deal with rural indebtedness.

a judgement having far-reaching consequences, the top court held that foreign lawyers, law firms and companies cannot practice legal profession

In the aviation sector, the apex court disposed of a plea filed by no-frill carrier Indi-Go, challenging a Delhi High Court order to shift its operations partially from Termi-nal-1 (T-1) of the IGI Airport here to Terminal 2.

# Trump has not risen to the mantle of White House: Mitt Romney

Washington, (PTI): Mitt (PTI): Romney, the Republican party's presidential nominee in 2012, has slammed US President Donald Trump. saying his conduct over the past two years, particularly his actions this month, is evidence that he has not risen to the mantle of the office.

Romney, 71, who was elected as a Republican Senator from Utah in November, will be sworn in on Thursday.

"The Trump presiden-cy made a deep descent in December...on balance, his conduct over the past two years, particularly his actions this month, is evidence that the president has not risen to the mantle of the office," Romney said in an op-ed pub-lished in the Washington Post on Tuesday.

His strong-hitting op-ed gains significance that he is unlikely to follow White House position on critical issues given that the ruling party has 53 seats in a 100-member Senate.

On some critical issues Trump would require 60 votes to his legislative agenda passed.

notably Romney, enough, during the Republican presidential primaries in 2016, had described Trump as a con man and accused him as a fraud.

"There's plenty of



evidence that Mr Trump is a con man, a fake. Mr Trump has changed his positions not just over the years, but over the course of the campaign," Romney said in his speech at the Hinck ley Institute on March 3. 2016. "Here's what I know. Donald Trump is a phony, a fraud. His promises are as worthless as a degree from Trump University," Romney had said and warned his party colleagues that Trump if nominated as the Re publican nominee would never be able to defeat the then Democratic candidate Hillary Clinton.

However, went ahead to earn the Republcian presidential nomination by overcoming the challenge from 16 others and surprised political pundits by defeating favourite Hillary Clinton in the November 2016 presidential elections

After Trump's elec-toral victory, the two leaders met over dinner

The then media reports said that Trump considered him for the position of Secre-

tary of State.
However, later Trump gave the position to Rex

Romney, two year later, who is known for being a successful gov-ernor of Massachusetts decided to run for the US Senate from Utah.

He who won with an impressive margin in the November elec-In the weeks thereafter, he has increased his attack on Trump.

In his op-ed, Rom-ney said that Trump cannot take his support for granted.
"I will act as I would

with any president, in or out of my party: I will support policies that I believe are in the best interest of the country and my state, and op-pose those that are not," he said.

said that he would speak out against significant statements or actions that are divisive, racist and anti-immigrant.
"I do not intend to

comment on every tweet or fault. But I will speak out against significant statements or actions that are divisive, racist, anti-immigrant, dishonest or destructive

to democratic institu-

tions," he wrote.

Observing that to a great degree, a presidency shapes the public character of the nation, he said a president should unite us and in-spire us to follow "our better angels."

"A president should

demonstrate the essential qualities of honesty and integrity, and elevate the national discourse with comity and mutual respect," he said.

"As a nation, we have been blessed with presidents who have called on the greatness of the American spirit. With the nation so divided, resentful and angry, presidential leadership qualities of character is indispensable. And it is in this province where the incumbent's shortfall has been most glaring," Romney added.

Noting that the world is also watching, Romney rued that several allies in Europe are experiencing political upheaval.

"Several former So-viet satellite states are rethinking their commitment to democracy. Some Asian nations, such as the Philippines, lean increasingly toward China, which advances to rival our economy and our military," he said.

"The alternative to US world leadership offered by China and Russia is autocratic, corrupt and brutal," Romney wrote.

#### India's retaliatory tariffs to hit US exports worth USD 900 mn: Congressional report

(PTI): India's proposed retaliatory tariffs against US agricultural products including apples, almonds and lentils will have an adverse impact on American exports worth nearly USD 900 million, according to the latest Congressional report. India last

India last year an-nounced higher import duties on many US prod-ucts like apples, almonds, walnuts, chickpeas and ls in retaliation President Donald lentils

Trump's decision to impose heavy tariffs on im-ported steel and aluminium items, a move that sparked fears of a global

However, India the only major country which has been continuously postponing the implementation of the retaliatory tariffs despite announcing it more than six months ago.

In October last year,

Trump described India as a "tariff king" as he reiterated his allegations that New Delhi has a high tariff rate on various American products.

India's proposed retaliatory tariffs is far less than that by China on more than 800 American agricultural products which accounted for approximately USD 20.6 billion in exports to the US in 2017.
China is followed by

Canada (USD 2.6 billion), Mexico (USD 2.5 billion), the European Union (EU) (USD 1 billion) and Tur-key (USD 250 million) in slapping retaliatory tariffs on the agricultural products from the US.

Countries have imposed tariffs on American agricultural products to retaliate against ac-tions the Trump administration took in Marh. 2018 to protect US steel and aluminum producers and in response to Chinese intellectual property rights and technology

policies. Since then, over 800 US food and agricultural products have been subject to retaliatory tariffs from China, the EU. Turkey, Canada and Mexico, the bipartisan Congressional Research Service (CRS) said in its report 'Profiles and Effects of Retaliatory Tariffs on US Agricultural Exports'.

The CRS, an independent research wing of Congress, regularly prepares reports on various issues for the lawmakers to take informed decisions.

US exports of those

products to the retali-ating countries totaled USD 26.9 billion in 2017, according to the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) export data. It all started on March

23, 2018, when the Trump administration applied a 25 per cent tariff to all US steel imports and a 10 per cent tariff to all US aluminum imports, citing an investigation that showed national security concerns.

"Canada, China, Mex-ico, the EU and Turkey retaliated with tariffs on imports of US agriculturand food products and other goods.

"India has proposed retaliatory tariffs on US apples, almonds, wal-nuts, chickpeas and lenbut it has delayed implementation pending ongoing negotiations with the Trump administration," said the CRS.

Reports of CRS are prepared by indepen-dent experts for the lawmakers to make in-formed decisions and are not an official position of the US Congr

In its report dated December 31, the CRS sad in response to the tariffs the Trump administration levied on US imports of steel and aluminum from India earlier this year, India has threatened to impose has threater retaliatory tariffs on a

al and food products. The date for imposing these tariffs has been pushed back several times, and they are currently set to become effective on January 31, 2019.

"US exports of the targeted products were val-ued at USD 857 million in 2017, comprising 54 per cent of the USD 1.8 billion of total US agricultural exports to India US almond growers, in particular, could feel the effects of India's threatened tariffs should they enter into force," said the CRS, a copy of which was obtained by PTI.

India ranked third as a destination for US apple exports in 2017, purchasing USD 97 million of US apples, or 10 per cent of the total exports.

"The Indian govern-ment proposes to apply a 30 per cent retaliatory tariff on imports of US apples on January 31, 2019," the CRS said. Comparatively, US apple exports to Mexico and China are now subject to additional retaliatory tariffs of 20 per cent and 40 per cent respectively. raising the total tariff rates to 20 per cent and 50 per cent respectively.
The Trump admin-

istration has taken measures to ease the downside effects of the retaliatory tariffs on farmers and ranchers through a USD 12 billion trade aid package.

Under the initiative, USDA has committed to making direct payments to farmers of selected commodities subject to the tariffs, as well as buying up surplus quantities of some commodities and providing funding for additional trade procommodities motion efforts.

India's exports to the US in 2017-18 stood at USD 47.9 billion, while imports were USD 26.7 billion. The trade balance is in favour of India.

#### 14 confirmed dead in Russia highrise blast



Moscow, Jan 2 (AFP): Fourteen people are confirmed dead from the New Year's Eve explosion at a high-rise in central Russia local officials said Wednesday, as rescuers continued to pull bodies

from the rubble.

The local governor's office said 14 bodies had been found and that 27 people were unaccounted for following the gas explosion in the city Magnitogorsk, 1,700 kilometres (1,050 miles) east of Moscow in the Ural mountains.

Five people had been rescued from the rubble including a baby, and 86 residents were located unharmed, it said.

'Work at the scene is continuing," it said.

Battling freezing temperatures, rescuers have been combing through piles of mangled concrete and metal and trying to stabilise what remains of the walls in the Soviet-era apartment block, which had been home to about 1,100 people.

The blast destroyed 35 apartments and dam aged 10 more, leaving dozens of people homeless over the New Year --the biggest holiday of the vear in Russia.

#### Shun independence, embrace 'peaceful reunification' with China: Prez Xi tells Taiwan

BEIJING, JAN 2 (PTI): Talking tough, President Xi Jinpin Wednesday asked Taiwan to re Jinping ject independence and embrace 'peaceful reunification" with China on a 'one-country-two systems' basis, warning that he would not renounce the option of using military force if Taipei persists with the idea of freedom.

In a speech marking the 40th anniversary of issuing 'Message to Compatriots' in Taiwan, president Xi proposed 'one -country-two-systems' on the lines of Hong Kong for the peaceful reunification of Taiwan. "Chinese don't fight Chinese,"

Xi, 65, said, asserting that the peaceful reunification is in the best interests of the compatriots across the Strait as well as to China.

"We make no promise to re-nounce the use of force and reserve the option of taking all necessary means," he said, delivering a strong message to Taiwanese President Tsai Ing-wen, a firm advocate

of Taiwan's independence.

Xi, regarded as the most powerful leader who heads the ruling Communist Party of China (CPC), the military and the presidency, said both Hong Kong and Macau were integrated into China under the 'one-

country-two-systems' basis and have retained their autonomy. "Peaceful reunification and

one-country-two-systems is the best way to achieve national reunification. It embodies the wisdom of the Chinese people that all rivers run into the sea and is inclusive," he said in a speech telecast live all over the country.

"The concrete implementation of 'one-country-two-systems' in Taiwan will take into full account the reality of Taiwan," he said.

Xi's speech laced with a decisive message to Taiwan comes after President Tsai's Democratic Progressive Party (DPP) suffered major losses in the last month's local government elections follow-ing which she resigned as the leader of the party.

In a veiled reference to the US' growing backing of Taiwan in re-cent months, Xi said his message was not targeted at compatriots in Taiwan, but at the interference of external forces and the very small number of "Taiwan independence" separatists and their activities.

Last September, China de-manded the US to cancel a USD 330 million arms deal with Taiwan, warning "severe damage" to bilateral ties and peace and stability in Taiwan straits separating the inese mainland with Taiwan

Amid the rising tensions with China over the ongoing trade war and sanctions imposed on Chinese military procurement unit for Russian Su-35 fighter jets and S-400 missiles, the US has approved the sale of spare parts and related sup-port for Taiwan's US-made F-16 fighters and other military aircraft. China claims Taiwan, which

was estranged from the mainland, as part of its territory and makes it mandatory for all countries having diplomatic ties with Beijing to observe One-China policy. The US and several other coun-

tries, including India, maintain economic and trade ties with Taiwan without formal diplomatic ties. Taiwan independence goes against the trend of history and will lead to a dead end. Xi said.

We are willing to create broad space for peaceful reunification, but will leave no room for any form of separatist activities," he asserted. The political parties and all sectors on both sides of the Strait may recommend representatives to conduct extensive and in-depth democratic consultation on the basis of the common political foundation of upholding the 1992 Consensus and opposing "Taiwan independence", Xi said.

There are no problems that cannot be solved between family members, he said.

"We sincerely hope all the com-patriots in Taiwan treasure peace as much as they treasure their own eyes, and pursue national reunifi-cation as much as they pursue happiness," Xi said.

# 6 reportedly killed in Danish bridge train accident

COPENHAGEN, JAN 2 (AP): Six people were killed in a train accident Danish bridge linking the central islands of Zealand and Funen, according to the rail operator. Authorities said several others were injured.

Danish Railways told Denmark's TV2 that the six were passengers on a train from the city of Odense, on the central Danish island of Fyn, heading toward the cap-

ital Copenhagen. Police did not confirm the fatalities, only saying several were killed and injured in the accident, which took place about 8 am local time.

spokesman Police Arne Gram said the passenger train "hit an unknown object," but did not further comment

Danish media reported that a tarpaulin on a freight train hit the passenger train, which was going in the opposite direction, prompting it to brake suddenly.


The Storebaelt bridge is part of a system bridges and a tunnel linking the Danish islands.



It was the era of grand commercial films and the romantic hero of the 1960s and the early 1970s was already ceding ground to the 'angry young man', embodied by Amitabh Bachchan. In 1972, he made his debut as a writer with the Java

Bhaduri-Randhir Kapoor teen romance "Jawani Diwani", still remembered for its music and its portrayal of young love.

Khan went on to deliver some of Bollywood's best written screenplays and whistle-worthy dialogues in hits such as "Ag-neepath" and "Shola Aur Shabnam". He stepped in to help shape Bachchan's career after Salim-Javed, who wrote "Zanieer" and "Sholay", went their separate ways in 1982. It was Khan who gave

# Netflix drops satire episode critical of Saudi Arabia

WASHINGTON, JAN 2 (AFP): Netflix confirmed Tuesday that it removed an episode of a satirical comedy show that criticises Saudi Arabia, after officials in the kingdom reportedly complained. The move raises new questions about the limits of free online expression.

In the episode of "Patriot Act with Hasan Minhaj," the American-born Muslim lashed Saudi Arabia after the killing of Washington Post columnist Jamal Khashoggi in the Saudi consulate in Istanbul. He specifically criticised Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, and was also critical of the Saudi-led military

campaign in Yemen.
"We strongly support artistic freedom worldwide and removed this epi-

sode only in Saudi Arabia after we had received a valid legal request -- and to comply with local law," a Netflix spokeswoman said in a statement. British newspaper the Financial Times said Netflix's action came after the kingdom's Communications and Information Technology Commission said the episode violated the cybercrime law.

In December, the US Senate approved two symbolic resolutions blaming Prince Mohammed for the killing of Khashoggi, after intelligence reports pointed in that direction, and urging an end to US participation in the Yemen war, Karen Attiah, Khashoggi's editor at The Washington Post, said Netflix's tion was "quite outrageous." The Saudi Information Ministry did not immedi-

ately respond to requests for comment.

The episode can still be seen in other parts of the world -- and in Saudi Arabia on YouTube.

Online platforms and tech companies face increasing scrutiny and growing public skepticism in the face of con-troversies about data sharing and the steady erosion of privacy.

In October, the press freedom watch-dog group Reporters Without Borders ranked Saudi Arabia as 169th out of 180 countries for press freedom, adding that "it will very probably fall even lower in the 2019 index because of the gravity of the violence and abuses of all kinds against journalists."
