# Why progressive youth marched to Gangtok

"We are not demanding anything extra, just what is prescribed by norms"

GANGTOK, 27 JAN:
Cikkim Progressive Sikkim Progressive Youth Forum started off in 2016 as a collective of youth finding common ground in their desire to instill progressive out-look and a scientific bent of mind among the young here. And that is the aim they pursued until their other expressed aim of protesting injustice and denial gathered steam and brought them to the streets and into the front pages of newspapers. Some hundred of them are currently on dharna outside the District Administrative Centre in Gangtok, their residence here since they marched into Gangtok after covering 110 KMs from Gyalshing on foot on 23 January demanding that the State Government live up to its written commitment of appointing the 100-bedded District Hospital at Gyalshing, West Sikkim, with facilities and man-power prescribed under the Indian Public Health Standards of the National Health Micropa Health Mission.

They remain unsatis-fied with the State's response, and on Republic Day, which also marks their foundation day, took their protest to the next level by issuing a statewide appeal to all organizations. whether non-governmental, so-cial or political, to support their cause and join their protest. This, with the caveat that the supporting groups do so exclusively in pursuit of the demand for basic [as dictated by IPHS] health facilities at the Gyalshing District Hospital and not to further their own organizational or political agendas. Political par-ties, for instance, have



been invited to join the protest so long as they leave their flags and

agendas behind.
So what is it that has riled the SPYF, this collection of youth aged primarily between 19 to 26, so much that they have put all their other plans

engagements on hold to invest time and energy to try and ensure that the Gyalshing District Hospital provides at least the basic health services to people of the district?

We noticed that the healthcare infrastructure in West district was espe-

cially weak; people with even minor health conditions would get referred elsewhere for treatment. This was discomfiting because many who visit government hospitals in West Sikkim cannot even afford the travel costs to

#### SPYF refused to participate in discussion: **Health Secy**

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 27 AUG:

Health Secretary, Vishal Chauhan, in a press communiqué issued on 25 January, informs that Sikkim Youth Progressive Forum members refused to participate in a discussion when he approached them accompanied with senior department officials for the same at their dharna site on Friday.

SPYF, it may be recalled, is demanding that the Department deliver on its written commitment made last year to provide facilities and manpower as prescribed in the Indian Public Health Gyalshing district hospital They have been sitting on a dharna outside the District Administrative Centre here since 23 Ian, the day they arrived in Gangtok after a 4-day march from Gyalshing.

The Health Secretary informs that he had approached the protestors at the dharna site accompanied by Dr Pemba T. Bhutia Principal Direc-tor-I , Dr Uttam Pradhan [Principal Director] and Dr Bimal Kr Rai, MD National Health Mission.

SPYF, it may be mentioned here is insistent that discussions involve the Health Minister as well since he signed the

assurance letter of August last [read accompanying report for detailsl.

The Health Secretary adds that earlier as well, Dr Pemba Bhutia and Dr Uttam Pradhan had called on the protestors on the evening of 23 Jan at Titanic Park and explained to them action taken by Health depart-ment for improvement of

Gyalshing hospital.

The Health Department has appealed to SPYF "to cooperate and give their suggestion and advice to health depart-

ment through discussion."
"Health department is making all efforts to improve health facilities in district hospitals and PHCs/ PHSCs," the Secretary adds while detailing that the Department recently restructured the health cadre and created several posts of doctors and specialists.

"As a result, recent-ly 47 doctors and 261 Staff Nurses have been appointed. Recruitment process for more than 50 no of specialists through SPSC is on and is likely to be completed in the first week of February 2019. Once these specialists are recruited many will be posted at district hospitals, which strengthen all d hospitals and STNM Hospital." he informs.

GUWAHATI. IAN 27 (PTI): Minister Assam Chief Sarbananda Sonowal Sunday said the Citizenship Bill was a national policy and once it becomes an act, the burden of new citizens would be borne by the

entire country.

Attempts are being made to confuse people but the state govern-ment which has come to power with a popular mandate would do nothing to harm the interests of the local people, Sonowal said.

Speaking at the foundation stone laying ceremony of the Nalbari Med-ical College and Hospital at Borigaon, Sonowal said the bill can never threaten the existence of the indigenous people of Assam which has a legacy of great personalities like Srimanta Sankardev. Azan Fakir, Lachit Bor-phukan, Bagh Hazarika and other.

The chief minister also urged the All Assam Students Union (AASU) to extend full coopera-tion in successful implementation of Clause 6 of the Assam Accord for ensuring constitutional, administrative and legislative safeguard for the indigenous people.

He asked the intelligentsia to present the true picture of the bill before the people of the state, while crit-icising the previous Congress government for neglecting development in the region as well as the interests of the local people.

The previous Congress governments im-posed IMDT Act in the state to protect illegal immigrants and made no significant efforts to update the National Register of Citizens (NRC), Sonowal said.

The parade started from Deorali with banners and placards and walked along the National Highway to Hospital Dara and then down to Paljor Stadium where it concluded at the Fish Pond area.

the core and expands out to include around 60 actively involved members. We have a horizontal, collective leadership by discussion," explains Mr Karki.

Members of the collective are all products of government schools and govt colleges with most of them hailing from rural corners and belonging to farming households.

In fact, when SummitTimes reached the venue of the dharna late on the eve-

ning of 26 January, the protesters were in the midst of animated "discussions," something, we are told, they engage in on a regular basis especially before and  $\frac{1}{2}$ after a major decision is taken.

It must have been after a discussion like this that SPYF decided in end-lan 2018, a year back, to address the issue of poor healthcare facilities in West Sikkim. Since most of the members are academically inclined, as they researched the

issue, they learned that as per IPHS norms, which have been place since the year 2012, the government is required to provide an easily verifiable set of infrastructure and medical personnel at its different hospitals and health centres. These were found wanting in West Sikkim.

agine, it costs a villager around Rs 300 to come to Gyalshing for treatment from Karjee, a remote village here. If they are referred to Gangtok, it will cost them around Rs 700 on travel alone. Most people cannot afford even the travel costs. And there are other expenses to take into consideration as well," stresses Prakash Parajuly, another member of the core-group.

Such high costs would be difficult to bear for those who, ironically have to visit government hospitals and cannot afford services of a private hospital.

On 04 Feb, 2018, SPYF initiated its first step towards demands that the IPHS norms be met in West Sikkim, and after a signature campaign in the district, an application demanding the same was submitted to the hospital authorities and the District Collector.

And then they waited.

When nothing came about even till July last year, SPYF called for a rally to press for their demands. Some 1,500 people joined their rally and a fresh memorandum addressed to the Health Minister was drafted. The demand was the same – ensure that all facilities and manpower prescribed under IPHS were provided at the Gyalshing Hospital.

A few days later, SPYF members arrived in Gangtok with the memorandum wanting to submit it to the Health Minister. When the Minister's office refused to accept the memorandum, the youth sat on a dharna outside his office. 22 hours into their dharna at the Health Secretariat, the memorandum was accepted and a written assurance, signed by the Health Minister, the Health Secretary and the Principal Director, issued.

This assurance, marked to the DC, West, refers to the SPYF memorandum and commits "continue to work for the improvement of all District Hospitals, including District Hospital Gyalshing."

Specifically for the Gyalshing Hospital, the letter assures that 90% of the IPHS norms for the 100-bedded District Hospital at Gyalshing "will be achieved within one month and the remaining requirements will be taken care of within 03 months."

SPYF returned confident that their movement had succeeded and returned to their lives. Over the following months, visible efforts were made to improve the conditions at the hospital, but, as per SPYF, not enough was done even to meet the most basic of the norms.

"Yes, they have an ultrasound machine now and occasionally an ultrasound is also done. They hold surgeries sometimes also, but there is no consistency in the service despite all the claims and promotions," insists Mr Parajuly.

The three-month deadline assured by the Minister ended in November last and when the basic IPHS norms remained unmet, SPYF decided on its Gangtok Chalo march and began their walk from Gyalshing on 20 January, arriving here on the

23rd and have been sitting on dharna here ever since.

The youth on dharna are clearly passionate about the demand and insist they are not being stubborn or misguided. Claims, it may be recalled, have been made

about how they are being unclear and stubborn.

"How can insisting that the authorities abide by prescribed norms and commitments they have themselves made, be called stubborn? As for being unclear, even that is unfair because we are not demanding anything extra, just the requirements prescribed under IPHS norms," Mr Karki points out.

There are also whispers doubting the timing of the protest, coming as close as

it does to the elections.

The SPYF members dismiss this suggestion by pointing out that the Gangtok Chalo march was the culmination of an issue they picked up in February last year when elections were distant, and it stretched this long because the concerned authorities have been dilly-dallying.

"We have been at it since Feb 2018 so one cannot say that our movement is

we have been at it since Feb 2018 so one cannot say that our movement is politically timed or inclined. If anything, the election cycle is intruding," they scoff, adding, "Our demand is now a year old so it is unfair to cast any aspersions of political opportunism on us."

Since the SPYF marchers arrived in Gangtok, they have been visited by

Health officials a few times, but they remain unconvinced. So what is it that

they want first?

"We want the three signatories of the February assurance letter – the Minister Secretary and Principal Director - to meet us together so that we can discuss and debate the situation, otherwise nothing concrete will emerge," Mr Karki explains while addressing the criticism that they have refused offers for discussions by Health officials since their arrival in Gangtok. The offers for discussion have not included the Health Minister thus far

At the time of writing this report, such a meeting had not yet come about, and the youth remain camped at the dharna site, a site which offers no facilities beyond the space to lay out "profiles" and stack their beddings and sleep exposed to the elements. They lack access to water and toilets, and the weather too has not been gentle. But they hold on to their position, buoyed by the spontaneous support they specification of the lay people and boosting their morale and keeping their spirits alive with their progressive songs and evening discussions.

She added that such initiatives would help bring transformation from the grassroots level.

also introduced rojgar yojana (one family, one job) where the state government has provided around 12,000 jobs to unemployed youth of the state.

The State government has proven how much the government is genuinely concerned and dedicated towards the people but is still being criticized by Opposition parties which are claiming that jobs provided by the state government are only for 89 days.

He reminded that before the SDF government come in power, Sikkim was the poorest state of the North East, and that after 24 years of SDF government, Sikkim now is on top of the list in NE.

The SDF government, he stressed has consis-

tently pursued the ideology equality and harmony and said that this pursuit is constantly hounded by groups forming political parties, associations and social organizations with the obvious agenda to sow confusion and disharmony.

The CM said that the people of Sikkim should observe things wisely and defeat nefarious designs to divide and distract the people.

"Look closely at these groups and you will find the same agent provocateurs backing all divisive organizations," he said.

'The people of Sikkim have to realize who the leaders are and who are the people behind such parties and organizations," he stressed, add-ing that despite claims of belonging to different groups, such mindsets invariably came together on an anti-development, anti-Sikkim platform before elections.

He also accused these groups of paying lip-service to issues like the Limboo-Tamang seat reservation demand while they collaborated with agencies which have sabotaged the demand through the years with their communal arguments in Delhi.

He pointed out that Opposition insistence of carving out LT seats from the existing 32 seats in the Assembly was inherently communal be-cause it went against the rights and expression of the majority community here, something which the Opposition is aware of but pretends to ignore.

He also shared that he had earlier decided not to contest the 2019 elections, "but seeing the growing activity of racist and communal forces and their unethical propaganda on important issues. I am compelled to contest this election because the fu-ture of Sikkim is at stake".

The CM also said that SDF was confident of winning all the 32 seats in the legislative assembly and needs no coalition partners. "We needed no coalition in 1994 when we were first voted into office and definitely need no opportunist alliances this time either," he said.



Tackle Corruption with Accountability

Corruption should not be catergorised, it should be removed

m he}$  Second Administrative Reforms Commission had tabled its recommendations to the Central Government a decade ago. The report covered 15 topics, of which around eleven have been "considered" by a Group of Ministers thus far, and some, like the Right to Information and the idea of Lokpal, have already been implemented with varying degrees of success. There are several aspects that this document delved into but it did direct special focus on ways and means to tackle corruption.

As mentioned, the Lokpal initiative was mooted in it, and although that recommendation obviously has an uphill journey to negotiate to be able to deliver with any real consequence, the recommendations had made it obvious that the administration required reforms because it has been too compromised by bureaucratic extortion. The realization was welcome, even if it had come late, because the planners are normally satisfied by the fact that India ranks lower than Pakistan in the list of most corrupt nations. The Panel on Ethics in Governance had suggested that corruption in the administration be split former kind covers the corruption that lay people are made to suffer on a daily basis - the need to grease palms to get even routine jobs like processing a request done. Collusive corruption, the Panel had defined as corruption that sees governance join hands with the briber and assist in the subversion of laws, dodging rules and avoiding dues which should accrue to the State exchequer. Interestingly enough, it was the latter kind of "corruption" that the Panel recommends for stricter action. Why, because it bleeds the State exchequer of its dues. But what about the internal hemorrhage that democratic principles bleed when the public is made to dance circles unless they pay up the public servants to do their jobs?

The irony cannot be missed. Penalize shortchanging of revenue returns more strongly than the denial of rights! The revenue of course, some will defend, gets pumped back to the people in the form of populist measures. This can be countered with the argument that more populist measures mean even more powerful babus and and even more invasive governance which will automatically lead to even more corruption. The nexus of the corrupt figures out loopholes in every new rule even ahead of its implementation since they are invariably drafting these in consultation with the sections they are in collusion with. The suggestion to approach corruption in two categories - coercive and collusive, is flawed because there cannot be kinds or grades of corruption; there is either corruption or honesty. At least in this case, there are blacks and whites. The categories and grades can be used for the purpose of understanding corruption, but not to

The rot of corruption has set in too deep and if corruption is to be tackled, amputations are  $required. \ Since \ governments \ cannot \ be \ expected$ to prune their staff strength, the least they can do is prune powers and then make the powerful more accountable. There are too many desks that every request has to move through before it is decided for there to be accountability clearly defined. These can be reduced and the accountability established by setting a time limit on every process and requiring officials to provide specific explanations every time a deadline is missed or request denied. This gets everyone on record, and because it is the bureaucracy one is dealing with here, taking away anonymity from the process will ensure everyone becomes judicious. Even this experiment might fail, but given the nation's seventy years of continuing failure in containing corruption, it is worth giving a shot.

# Venezuela: how Latin American tolerance of illiberalism let a nation slide into crisis

Venezuela today finds itself at the centre of Latin America's tension between liberal and illiberal al forces. These forces are domestic in origin but have powerful international backers. On one side, the United States and a host of Latin American gov-ernments have recognised opposition leader Juan Guiadó as the new legitimate president of Venezuela. On the other, Nicolás Maduro clings to pow with the backing of Russia and Cuba.

Illiberalism in Venezuela paved the way for an unprecedented humanitarian disaster in the country, spurring today's contest over Maduro's legitacy. Despite the current growing support for Guaidó, for a decade, most Latin American neigh-bours quietly tolerated Venezuela's erosion of denocracy and markets

After the Cold War, Latin America embraced the principles of liberal international order perhaps more than any other part of the world. But rising illiberalism now spans the political spectrum. In ome cases, has drawn support at the ballot box. Populist legislator Jair Bolsonaro became Brazil's president in spite of – or perhaps because of – his lack of concern for human rights or the rule of law. Mexico's president Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador is using questionable "popular consultations" to justify decisions that ignore significant opposition. In Honduras a right-leaning president has extended his power and tolerated violence against social movements. In Nicaragua, a former leftist guerrilla leader has turned authoritarian and is repressing

#### A GLOBAL STRUGGLE

Latin America was supposed to be past all this. But patterns there reflect wider challenges to the liberal international order, exemplified by the election of President Donald Trump and the UK's decision to leave the European Union. The order also seems threatened from the outside by Russian attacks on democracy – and most recently, Russia's explicit support of Maduro. China, long a major Venezuelan creditor, poses a subtler, but grander, challenge to the existing international rulebook. Discussions of this crisis of confidence in inter-

national liberal principles have often ignored Latin America. Comparisons have been made of Trump and Bolsonaro, but democratic backsliding in Latin America is hardly limited to the spread of the populist right and has very little to do with Trump's rise. As Venezuela's own history shows, Latin America has experienced both bouts of illiberalism and passionate movements towards democracy and human rights over decades. These should be understood in the context of the fickle relationship between Latin America and the liberal world order.

Almost since independence in the early 19th

century, Latin American states have been only partially included in the rules-based, liberal world.

The international rules of the liberal order were only sporadically applied across the continent because great powers, including the United States, granted themselves exemptions to protect their interests in the region. Latin American elites also often found their attempts to be properly included in the development of international law and diplomacy were frequently rebuffed. And when Latin American states got involved in international institutions and global markets, it was often only to entrench the power of elites who practiced illiberal politics and crony capitalism at home.

Powerful states in the liberal world have often gladly ignored this, focusing more on their own economic and political priorities than on whether liberal principles and practices were being upheld domestically within Latin America. This has been exemplified most recently by Bolsonaro, who almost boasts of his illiberalism at home while courting the favour of global markets and business. On the left, Venezuelan largesse dampened the regional response to its democratic decline, until the money ran out and the crisis started spilling over

#### TURNING A BLIND EYE

Latin America's experiences shed light on how life at the margins of the liberal international order means that, domestically, the gains of liberalisa-tion are shared narrowly and the commitment to democracy and human rights is often paper-thin. These problems aided the rise of former president Hugo Chávez in Venezuela two decades ago, gradually setting the stage for today's crisis. As it turns out, similar dynamics are at the core of the liberal international order's problems today.

Champions of these liberal principles in Latin America should combine the region's own rich liberal traditions and interstate cooperation to shape international rules about domestic conduct. This liberal tradition was poorly reflected by a new wave of regional organisations during the 2000s that largely served to protect and legitimise incumbents, including Maduro. The region's leaders would do better to revive the ideals of the collective defence of democracy, with a focus on prevention. They are rooted in the 1907 Tobar Doctrine and the 1945 Larreta Doctrine, which encouraged multilateral engagement with the internal affairs of states which violated human rights or whose governments had come to power through unconstitu-

These proposals emphasised regional peer pressure on governments and collaborative re-sponses to undemocratic practices. They must be applied early and consistently to prevent illiberalism's next crisis, regardless of whether it emerges from left or right.

In Venezuela, this diplomatic pressure and isolation signals an important reversal of earlier toler-ance and comity. Regional breathing room allowed Maduro to consolidate his power, dramatically reducing the prospects for peaceful solutions. In the future, preventative regional pressure on illiberal activity would be more effective than turning to punitive actions once disaster is already upon us, as is the case with Venezuela's suffering millions.

To regain its vitality, the liberal international project in Latin American and elsewhere must ensure that the economic, social and political gains of the international order are available consistently and to everyone. Latin Americans need not look abroad for solutions to this crisis of international order, but to their own liberal heritage.

Regulating our emotions is something we all do,

every day of our lives. This psychological process means that we can manage how we feel and express emotions in the face of whatever situation may arise. But some people cannot regulate their emotions effectively, and so experience difficult and intense feelings, often partaking in behaviours such as self-harm, using alcohol, and over-eating to try to escape them.

There are several strategies that we use to reg-ulate emotions – for example, reappraisal (chang-ing how you feel about something) and attentional deployment (redirecting your attention away from something). Underlying neural systems in the brain's prefrontal cortex are responsible for these strategies. However, dysfunction of these neural mechanisms can mean that a person is unable to nanage their emotions effectively.

Emotion dysregulation does not simply occur when the brain neglects to use regulation strategies. It includes unsuccessful attempts by the brain to reduce unwanted emotions, as well as the counterproductive use of strategies that have a cost that outweighs the short term benefits of easing an intense emotion. For example, avoiding anxiety by not opening bills might make someone feel better in the short term, but comes with the long-term

cost of ever increasing charges.

These unsuccessful attempts at regulation and counterproductive use of strategies are a core feature of many mental health conditions, including anxiety and mood disorders. But there is not one simple pathway that causes the dysreg-ulation in these conditions. In fact research has

#### 1. DYSFUNCTIONAL NEURAL SYSTEMS

In anxiety disorders, dysfunction of the brain's emotional systems is related to emotional responses being of a much higher intensity than usual, along with an increased perception of threat and a negative view of the world. These characteristics influence how effective emotion regulation strategies are, and result in an over-reliance on maladaptive strategies like avoiding or trying to

suppress emotions.

In the brains of those with anxiety disorders,



the system supporting the reappraisal does not work as effectively. Parts of the prefrontal cortex show less activation when this strategy is used, compared to non-anxious people. In fact, the higher the levels of anxiety symptoms, the less activation is seen in these brain areas. This means that the more intense the symptoms, the less they are

Similarly, those with major depressive disorder (MDD) – the inability to regulate or repair emo-tions, resulting in prolonged episodes of low mood struggle to use cognitive control to manage negative emotions and decrease emotional intensity. This is due to neurobiological differences, such as decreased density of grey matter, and re-duced volume in the brain's prefrontal cortex. During emotion regulation tasks, people who have depression show less brain activation and

metabolism in this area.

People with MDD sometimes show less effective function in the brain's motivation systems network of neural connections from the ventral striatum, located in the middle of the brain, and prefrontal cortex – too. This might explain their difficulty in regulating positive emotions (known as anhedonia) leading to a lack of pleasure and motivation for life

#### 2. LESS EFFECTIVE STRATEGIES

There is little doubt that people have different abilities in using different regulation strategies. But for some they simply don't work as well. It's possible

that people with anxiety disorders find reappraisal a less effective strategy because their attentional bias means they involuntarily pay more attention towards negative and threatening information. This can stop them from being able to come up with more positive meanings for a situation - a key

aspect of reappraisal.

It's possible that reappraisal doesn't work as well for people with mood disorders either. Cogni-tive biases can lead people with MDD to interpret situations as being more negative, and make it difficult to think more positive thoughts.

#### 3. MALADAPTIVE STRATEGIES

Although maladaptive strategies might make people feel better in the short term they come with long term costs of maintaining anxiety and mood disorders. Anxious people rely more on maladaptive strategies like suppression (trying to inhibit or hide emotional responses), and less on adaptive strategies like reappraisal. Though research into this is ongoing, it's thought that during intense emotional experiences these people find it very difficult to disengage – a necessary first step in reappraisal – so they turn to maladaptaive sup pression instead.

The use of maladaptive strategies like suppression and rumination (where people have repetitive negative and self-depreciating thoughts) is also a common feature of MDD. These, together with difficulties using adaptive strategies like reappraisal, prolong and exacerbate depressed mood. It means that people who have MDD are even less able to use

reappraisal during a depressed episode.

It's important to note that mood disorders don't just come from neural abnormalities. The research suggests that a combination of brain physiology, psychological and environmental factors are what contributes to the disorders, and

While researchers are pursing promising new treatments, simple actions can help people loosen the influence of negative thoughts and emotions on mood. Positive activities like expressing gratitude, sharing kindness, and reflecting on character strengths really do help.

# Road to Mandalay



CK LEPCHA

was a rather uneventful journey from the border town of Tamu to Mandalay. Every-one slept except for that one time in Kalaymyo when we stopped for food. Thereafter every-one was quiet despite a toddler in the white van. At 6:30am, we reached Mandalay and we could see we had arrived in a city of high rise buildings and bustling activities.

We walked past a very busy morning market where fresh vegetables were being bought and we soon found ourselves in a lo-cal food joint. It was a full meal and the cost for one was about 40 Indian rupees. Fresh healthy food at such affordable rate would follow us throughout the trip and we knew

we would be eating lots in Myanmar.
Our first destination was the Mandalay
Palace –the royal palace of the last Burmese king. It looked well fortified surrounded by high walls and remains of its grandeur was still visible. The gold colored roofs today were actually made of gold and glass had replaced the different stones that was used to decorate its walls. The wooden interiors were intricate and made of Burmese teak as the pagoda architecture was to be expected. History tells of how the British plundered their wealth and sent their last king Thebaw Min -the owner of Mandalay palace to exile in India (they also sent the last Mughal emperor of India to exile in Myanmar which is another story for next time).

The palace is a popular tourist destination -for both domestic and international visitors as we saw students, families and lone travelers appreciating the remains of a grand past. Seeing the palace made me realize how Myanmar used to be a rich and

wealthy nation till the British took over and left them in a predicament that they are still recovering from.

The next day we booked a one-day tour to the ancient cities of Sagaing, Ava and Amarapura. And it was the beginning of our temple hopping exercise which would follow us in our travels across the country.

Myanmar is also known as the land of pagodas so there are hundreds of pagodas as if there is a pagoda for almost each family or more. There was a time when the ancient city of Bagan alone boasted of 10,000 pagodas but it has since been destroyed, forgotten and the practice of constructing pagodas has disappeared. It was believed that to make up for one's wrong doings, one has to build their own pagoda and someone else could not build a pagoda for the other per-son. So perhaps there was a time when each citizen would've built their own pagoda

Besides pagoda hopping, our tour also included a visit to a local handicraft shop and that was equally impressive. Myanmar used to be famous for its Burmese teak and teakwood is often known by the former name. At the workshop, artists were busy carving elaborate designs of furniture, show pieces and statues of Buddha and other emperors. Majority of their craft is exported to China and they also take orders from customers abroad.

We were soon to find that Burma was rich in mineral resources. In the same workshop was a corner where they sold jade artefacts, showpieces, bangles, necklaces and earrings. Jade is mined and manufactured in Myanmar so if one wants to bring back a souvenir from





Myanmar, jade is a must. It is easy on the eye and equally easy on the budget because one can afford smaller pieces of jade jewellery if at all. But jade is also mostly exported to the Chinese and other Asian nations.

Before leaving for the trip, a Manipuri friend had told me to buy gold because "gold was cheap in Burma". But then I found out that other precious stones like ruby and sap phire were easily found and could be bought too. I did not buy gold but got myself a small jade necklace as a reminder of Myanmar and the country's wealth. I kept thinking how they were naturally blessed in landscape and mineral resources but that the course of history has not been kind to them.

These thoughts were in my mind as we

went to watch sunset at the very crowded UBein bridge popularized by Amitav Ghosh in the cover of his novel 'The Glass Palace'. It is the longest and the oldest teak bridge supported by hundreds of wooden pillars stretching 1.2 kilometres long. It is iconic and if you are a visitor in Mandalay whether domestic or international, you would make way to this bridge during evening without fail.

But as we walked back to our hotel at dusk, a nearby pagoda caught my eye and we entered its premises. It was lit up in golden vellow and seemed to almost overshadow the troubled times of the country. It was heavenly and exactly how I imagined a Myanmar pagoda to look like.

# Introducing the Faith Restorer

aith doesn't make sense that's why it makes miracles. – John Di Lemme

Numerous religions are followed all over the globe, and each religion has a different set of laws, but the purpose of all religions is to help the faithful live harmonious life. This statement is based on what I believe and I also be-lieve that belief systems vary between individuals which is why the concept of religion gets complex and sensitive.

This article is not about any particular reli-

gion but an attempt to introduce someone not just as a religious leader but as one who is the epitome of belief and faith among the people of Chawang village in North Sikkim. I have writ-ten about other experiences in this field area in my previous articles as well. It seems like there is so much to share because of the fact that we come across so many new and unfamiliar things while on field work. Everything we come across adds more value and meaning to our studies, things, which if ignored, will only fade away with time.

Lepchas, as known to everyone are originally animists and worship spirits of the mountains, rivers and forests. Today, Lepchas can be seen following different religions, especially Buddhism, the influence of which has grown since the eighteenth century. Many Lepchas are seen to be inclined towards Christianity as well. Interestingly, the original shamanistic beliefs and practices can be seen practiced alongside their present faiths, especially among the Buddhist Lepchas.

This article consists of information gained in the field work area of Chawang. It is a Bud-dhist village which has its own monastery and many of the villagers have devoted their lives as monks. With time and space, monkhood has become one of the professions. Trained monks are required to perform most of the Buddhist rituals. As such, monks are offered goods and cash as a gesture of gratitude and they earn their livelihoods with it. Monks are trained in a monastic school known as Sheda. Some start monastic schooling at a very young age while some start only after they have become adults. However, it is not just the schooling that is taken into account, but intense and deep meditation for years is also a way one can attain higher status among monks. One who succeeds in deep meditations for years are known as Chombu. While in retreat, they have to stay away from their homes and families usually in caves or places especially built for such meditational purposes by the monasteries. They attain higher knowledge from the scripts and from intense meditation. They are respected and people have strong faith in them. They are believed to possess supernatural powers and can stop natural disasters through prayers.

One such monk-resident of Chawang is

Aivoo Goolung, During his lifetime, he lived not just as a devoted monk but also as a pillar of faith among the people who knew him. While conducting my fieldwork, I heard many people talk about him with great bewilderment and belief about the miracles he performed. Even after his death, his influence on the people is still strong and fresh which fas-cinated me to learn more about him. His family still resides in the same village and that got me the chance to meet them.

Bhaichung Lepcha, one of the grand neph-

ews of Ajyoo Goolung, gave information about him and the powers people believe he ac-quired through meditation. The real name of Ajyoo Goolung was Tshultim Zangpo Lepcha, the second son of Tengay Lepcha. He has one elder and two younger siblings. He was the successor of Lachen Rinpoche. Ajyoo Goolung devoted his life to attaining Buddhist wisdom through Cham (meditation). He was a respected monk and used to perform all the main rit-uals of the village. He was also one of the head monks of the village monastery situated at the top of the village.

Ajyoo Goolung spent most of his life me

diating and performing rituals. He performed meditation at Ringu, the top of the village. Later, as age caught on and he could not go to the village top for mediation, the villagers, for his convenience, built a Chamdung (place for meditation) near his house which is in the village



area called Kolbong.

Upon enquiring about the miracles he performed, it came to light that he could even stop hailstorms which destroy crops by performing rituals and offering prayers. I was also told that a part of the village prone to landslides was stabilized after Ajyoo Goolung performed rituals and prayers there. The area has been stable ever since. A part of the same area is where the Chamdung and Chorten are built. Ajyoo Goolung, till the end of his days, continued deep meditation. He passed away in the year 2004 and in his memory a Chorten has been built near the meditation house built by the villagers.

When asked about photographs of the

prominent leader, his grand nephew took out a passport size picture from the pages of an old copy. He mentioned that this was the only pic-



ture he has of Ajyoo Goolung.

I was inquisitive to know why there were no more photographs but I realized it was not necessary because the picture he showed was perfect. I took permission and received the picture.

Although a short article is not enough to write about the many years someone dedicated to belief, it is an attempt to share the story of someone who lived as an example of a belief system for the entire village which finds itself fortunate to have someone great as a part of their village and their lives. This is an attempt to tell a brief story about someone who was an important part of the village not because he fought battles but because he dedicated his life to keep faith and hope alive and strong.

# Canada's prime minister fires his ambassador to China

China detained two Canadians shortly after Meng's arrest in an apparent attempt to pressure Canada to release her. A Chinese court also sentenced a Canadian to death in a sudden retrial of a drug case, overturning a 15-year prison term handed down earlier.

McCallum told Chi-

nese media in the To-

ronto area earlier in the week that the extradition of Meng to the United States "would not be a

happy outcome."
He suggested the case was politically motivated and said the US could make a trade deal with China in which it would no longer seek her extradition, and two Canadian detained in China could then be released.

But on Thursday McCallum walked back the remarks and said he "misspoke."

Trudeau had earlier dismissed calls to fire McCallum, but he clearly had enough after the envoy spoke off script again. Trudeau and For-eign Minister Chrystia Freeland have stressed that Canada's govern-ment can't interfere po-

litically in the case.

The leader of the opposition Conservative Party, Andrew Scheer, said McCallum should have been fired days

ago because his remarks concerns the politicization of the Meng case.

Scheer said McCallum caused damage to Canada's reputation by delivering different messages through different media on different days.

McCallum's remarks surprised many and fu-eled speculation that Canada might be trying

to send a signal to China to reduce tensions

A year ago, McCallum also made controversial comments about how Canada had more in common with China than the United States under Trump.

McCallum has strong personal ties to China, and he pointed out to

of Chinese ethnicity and his three sons have Chinese spouses.

Guy Saint-Jacques, a former Canadian ambassador to China, said he felt bad for McCallum but said it was the right thing to do. "What is worse is this

is happening in the mid-dle of the crisis when we need all-hands on deck." Saint-Jacques said.

He said the Chinese

will now know that McCallum was not speaking for the Canadian government.

Roland Paris, a former foreign policy ad-viser to Trudeau, said "Mr. McCallum's remarks were continuing to cause confusion about Canada's position.

On a matter of this importance, the Canadian government has to speak with a single, clear voice." Robert Bothwell, a professor at the University of Toronto, said it is not an ambassador's job to speak out of turn. "Of course, McCallum

can obviously take refuge in arguing that what he said was largely true, but he can't escape the fact that it wasn't his job to say it. It does underline the hazards of sending a politician to do a diplomat's job," Bothwell said.

Saint-Jacques said he spoke to China's consul general in Montreal on Thursday who reported that China is furious Meng on behalf of the U.S., which is involved in a trade talks with China.

Saint-Jacques said the consul general told him he thinks a Canadian delegation should visit Beijing for talks. Saint-Jacques believes Canada should appoint a special envoy to try to resolve the crisis.

Trudeau and Freeland have stressed that Canada has an extradition treaty with the U.S. that it must respect. The White House Na-

tional Security Council declined comment on McCallum.

Meng is out on bail in Vancouver awaiting her extradition proceedextradition proceedings. The US has until Wednesday to submit paperwork for the extradition request.

# Venezuela backtracks on order to expel US diplomats

Maduro's gov-backtracked ernment on an order that gave US Embassy personnel 72 hours to leave Venezuela, defusing tensions between the countries just hours after their top diplomats traded ed rhetoric at a special UN Security Council meeting to address the South American country's crisis.

Maduro broke rela-tions with the United States on Wednesday after the Trump adminis-tration recognised opposition leader Juan Guaido as interim president, a move the embattled socialist described as a "vile" coup attempt.

Maduro gave Ameri-

can diplomats three days to leave the country, but the Trump administration refused to obey his order, arguing that the leftist leader was no longer Venezuela's legitimate president. That set the stage for a potentially violent showdown at the hilltop Embassy compound on Saturday night, when the deadline was to expire.
But as the sun set on

Venezuela's capital, the Foreign Ministry issued a statement saying the Maduro government had opened a 30-day window to negotiate with the Trump administration the establishment of a "US interests office" in Venezuela, and a similar office for Venezuela in the United States.

A similar arrange ment governed bilateral relations between the US and Cuba for decades before the Obama administration restored diplomatic relations with the communist-run island.

The State Department did not immediately confirm the Venezuelan government's account, reiterating only that its priority remains the safety of its personnel and that it has no plans to close the embassy.

"That is true diplomacy," Maduro said after reading out the statement on national television.

Earlier in the day, Venezuela's Foreign Af-

fairs Minister faced off against Secretary of State Mike Pompeo at a special UN Security Council meeting on Venezuela's situation.

During the debate -- which was convened by the US -- Pompeo urged all nations to end Venezuela's "nightmare" and support opposi-tion leader Juan Guaido while Russia accused the Trump administration of attempting "to engineer a coup d'etat" against Pres-ident Nicolas Maduro - a reflection of the world's deep divisions over the crisis in the South American country.

Pompeo told the UN

Security Council that it's beyond time to back the Venezuelan people as they try to free themselves what he called Maduro's "illegitimate mafia state" and support Guaido. The young opposition leader has declared himself the country's interim president, arguing that Maduro's re-election was fraudulent.

But Russia's UN Ambassador Vassily Ne-benzia said Venezuela doesn't threaten international peace and security and accused "extremist opponents" of Maduro's legitimate government of choosing "maximum confrontation", including the artificial creation of a parallel government. He urged Pompeo to say whether the US will use military force.

Pompeo later told re-

porters who asked for a response, "I am not going to speculate or hypothesize on what the U.S. will do next."

What has played out in Venezuela and the world's media between supporters and oppo-nents of the Maduro government played out face-to-face in the chamber of the UN's most powerful body, which has failed to take action on the Vene zuelan crisis because of

deep divisions.
The Security Council's five veto-wielding permanent members could not unite behind a statement on Venezuela, presenting

widely differing texts.

The leaders of two

of those council nations - France and Brit-ain - joined Spain and Germany to turn up the pressure on Maduro Saturday, saying they would follow the IIS and others recognising Guaido unless Venezuela calls new presidential elec-tions within eight days. European Union for-

eign policy chief Federica Mogherini said if there is no announcement of new elections in the next days the 28-nation bloc "will take further actions, including on the issue of recognition of the country's leadership".

Venezuela's Foreign Minister Jorge Arreaza dismissed the deadline. "Europe is giving us eight days?" he asked the council. "Where do you get that you have the pow-er to establish a deadline or an ultimatum to a sovereign people. It's almost childlike."

Arreaza said Venezuela "will not allow anyone to impose on us any decision or order" and demanded that someone show him where in the country's constitution it states that an individual can proclaim himself president.

As for possible military action to oust Maduro, Arreaza said, "we will not al-low any government or any country to violate our soverand give a pretext for Donald Trump to start a war

The opposition to Guaido was also reflected in the initial procedural vote on whether the 15-member Security Council should even discuss the crisis in Venezuela, which is not on its official agenda. The United States

barely survived the vote to go ahead with the meeting, receiving the minimum nine "yes" votes from the council's six Western nations along with Kuwait, Peru and the Dominican Republic. China, South Afri-ca and Equatorial Guinea joined Russia in voting ʻno" while Indonesia and Ivory Coast abstained.

Pompeo went after Russia and China, accusing them of trying "to prop



up Maduro while he is in dire straits ... in the hopes of recovering billions of dollars in ill-considered investments and assistance

made over the years".

But he saved his sharpest attack for Cuba, saying no country has the nightmarish condition of the Venezuelan people".

He said Cuba has sent

"security and intelligence thugs" to sustain Madu-ro's "illegitimate rule".

"Now is the time for every other national to pick a side," Pompeo said. "No more delays, no more games. Either you stand with the forces of freedom, or you're in league with Maduro and his mavhem."

China's UN Ambas-sador Ma Zhaoxu said his government "firmly opposed" the US accusations and doesn't interfere in the internal affairs of other countries. "We hope the country that accuses others can do likewise itself," Ma told the council. Cuba's UN Ambassa-

dor Anavansi Rodriguez went further, rejecting "the deliberate" and "fake news" cast on the country not only by Pompeo but by Elliot Abrams, the new chief of US policy on Venezuela who sat in the council after the secre-

tary of state left.

The Security Council meeting came a day after Guaido vowed to remain on the streets until his country has a transitional government, while Maduro dug in and accused his opponents of orchestrating a coup.

In rival press conferences, Guaido urged his followers to stage another mass protest next week, while Maduro pushed his

call for dialogue.
The standoff could set the scene for more violence and has plunged troubled Venezuela into a new chapter of political turmoil that rights groups say has already left more than two dozen dead as thousands take to the street demanding

Maduro step down.
Guaido took a symbolic oath of office Wednesday proclaiming himself the nation's constitutional leader on grounds that Maduro's re-election last year was fraudulent - an allegation supported by the US, the European Union and many other nations.

Directives sent Friday the State Department to the Federal Reserve will make it harder for Maduro to gain access to the government's sizoverseas assets, including revenue from oil sales and profits by Houston-based Citgo, unit of the state-owned oil giant PDVSA.

Guaido's move is the ost direct challenge to Maduro's rule despite years of protests at home and international efforts to isolate the regime amid a growing humanitarian crisis fuelled by falling oil prices and government mismanagement.

Maduro is accusing the opposition of working with the US to overthrow him. Though over a dozen nations are recognising Guaido as president, Maduro still has the support of the military and pow-erful, longtime allies like Russia and China.

He said he is still willing to talk with the opposition. Both sides attempted dialogue last year, but it fell apart as Maduro pushed forward with an early election that Venezuela's most popular opposition leaders were barred from running in.

### Sikh separatists protest in front of Indian Embassy in US

WASHINGTON/ NEW DELHI, JAN 27 (PTI): A small group of Sikh sep-aratists held a protest in front of the Indian Embassy in Washington during which they tried to burn the tricolour on the Republic Day, a move slammed by the local Sikh community and termed as a "flop show" by Indian government sources.

demonstration by Sikh For Justice (SFJ) outside the Indian Embassy in Washington was a flop show attended by around 15-20 people They were complete-ly outnumbered by flag waving, enthusiastic and patriotic Indians, official sources said in New Delhi.

It demonstrated the w claim of the SFJ that they enjoy wide support. They are a fringe group backed by Paki-stan clearly bringing out the nefarious design of Islamabad to stir up trouble. In fact, most of the demonstrators were Pakistanis, they said.

The protesters raised "Khalistan Zindabaad" slogans and tried to burn the Indian flag in the presence of a battery of reporters from the local Pakistani media

The Indian govern-ment sources said SFJ's claim on their website that they burnt an Indian flag outside the Embassy "completely false" as the photos/videos show, no such thing took place.

The claim is intended to cover up for their flop show, they said.

The SFJ supporters were outnumbered by

ing 'Vande Mataram' and 'Bharat Mata Ki Iai' slogans with Indian flags flying high in their hand.

Around 2.30 pm on Saturday, the members of the SFJ - in front of a group of Pakistani reporters and cameramen tried to burn the Indian flag. They ended up burning a green flag that had 'S' written on it.

With passions run-ning high between Indian-Americans protesters, the local law enforcement officials had warned against any attempt to burn the Indian flag. In fact, they sought additional security personnel as the standoff continued. A group of mounted police were seen standing a few blocks away.
