Responding to Gna-thang-Machong MLA, DT Lepcha's press state-ment given on Friday, Sikkim Krantikari Morcha has today said that it is unfortunate that the MLA does not recognize people from his constituency.

Mr Lepcha had refut-ed SKM's claims of SDF families from his constituency joining SKM. However, SKM has again claimed that SDF CEC members, former Panchaats and ward workers of SDF from the constituency have joined SKM and their names were also announced publicly during a meeting.

The party has stated that it is ready to provide not only the list of people who have joined SKM but will also provide their voter cards if the area MLA contacts the SKM party office.

On Friday, Mr Lepcha had challenged SKM to provide a list of families who had left SDF.

# **Making the Right Choice**

The world that we are living in today is rife with different communities and groups trying to preserve and protect their identities- be it communities all around the world are trying to demand certain rights and privileges from the state which has led to 'politics of recognition' being at the forefront of identity pol-itics in almost every society. Within this environment, every state is also trying to advance forward with their agenda of progress and development agenda of progress and development whilst keeping their population con-tent and secured.

Every community at some point in their lives have raised their voices in different forms of protest to pro-

tect their community, their people, and their cultural identity whenever they felt insecure in the face of vari-ous events that somehow threatened their existence. This has been possible due to various reasons, but most importantly due to the space that the democratic functioning of a state pro-vides. The democratic machinery of governance provides a set up where each community while integrating with the whole also creates spaces where individuals and groups can maintain their uniqueness and difference. In other words, a state with a democratic functioning of governance while integrating different individuals and groups into a single large identi-ty like a national identity by virtue of markers such as citizenship status, also at the same time opens up spac-es where the same communities and es where the same communities and groups can maintain their uniqueness and exclusivity by endorsing other forms of their identity like their ethnic and cultural identity. Sikkim and international delitity. Sikilii and cultural groups provide a perfect setting where different groups coexist harmoniously while also maintaining their exclusivity and uniqueness.

The world has witnessed protests, revolutions and even wars when it comes to protection of their 'own'. One aspect common to all of these movements and demands is the significant role that a 'leader' plays in making these movements possible in the first place. While there is no denying the fact that ev-ery movement and demand has at its centre the people who support the movement, a huge part of a movemovement, a nuge part of a move-ment and the change it seeks to bring about is dependent on the leader. History is flooded with examples of such 'leaders' who have not only been successful in bringing a certain movement to fruition but also in creating a massive change in the society which has left an indelible imprint in the entire world. Leaders such as Nelson Mandela, Martin Luther King, Mahatma Gandhi have inspired generations and still continue to do so till this day. All these leaders and many more have been simple people like you and me, who have been dissatisfied with the way things were at some point in their life and sought to do something about it on their own. The only difference between 'us' and 'them' is that they went ahead and actually made a change. We all are very familiar with the 'Montgomery Bus Boycott' that Martin Luther King Jr. led in 1955 which was the start of a revolution in the Civil Rights Move-

a revolution in the Civil Rights Move-ment in American history. Leadership is therefore not only about performance but it's also about meaning. It is rather an amalgamation of both performance and the meaning it carries. A leader who seeks to make a difference is therefore not someone who is concerned just about the outcome but rather in the way a plan or a certain policy is carried out. He/she is concerned more about the purpose and the meaning behind working out

a certain agenda or goal. Outcome is important but that is not given the inspiration but rather the process of reaching that desired result. Another significant requirement for effective leadership is the ability of the leader to observe and understand existing situations and act accordingly. Goffee and Jones call this 'situation sensing' which involves a mixture of sensory and cognitive abilities. A leader has to be able to reframe a situation in a way that benefits those they 'lead' (their followers) instead of themselves.<sup>2</sup> In the more than two decades of ruling the state of Sikkim, Pawan Chamling has given and shown immense int of these leadership assets in understanding the context of a situa-tion and putting the best foot forward. The best example of this can be seen in his effort to make Sikkim the 'first organic state' in India. This effort of bigains state in india. Insert of this was recognized by the country when he was awarded the prestigious 'Sustainable Development Leadership Award' in 2016 by the then President, Pranab Mukherjee during the World Sustainable Development Summit or-ganised by The Energy and Resources Institute (TERI) at Vigyan Bhawan in New Delhi. <sup>3</sup> Not only this, the efforts of Chamling and his administration were also recognized by the global community when he was awarded the 'One World Award 2017, Grand Prix for his exemplary work in the field of organic farming in Legau, Germany.<sup>4</sup> At a time when the entire world is grappling with environmen-tal problems at a large scale, Sikkim has achieved remarkable heights in terms of preserving and maintaining its ecology and has come out as an ex-

ample for the other states in India and abroad. This wouldn't have been possible without the vision, involvement and dedication of the Chief Minister.
Pawan Chamling is someone who
has lived and experienced a time in

Sikkim in the past where even basic needs for livelihood were not easily needs for livelinood were not easily available. In his own words, "people had to scrape through without even basic amenities like water supply, electricity and roads." The Sikkim that he envisioned in the future or perhaps the reality that we are living today has been born out of that hard past that he and his family and the entire community living in those days had to experience. He longed to study and attain education in the univer-sity which remained unfulfilled but this did not stop or deter his love for books and literature. Growing up in a small village in Yangang to farmer rents, education was the only way out of poverty, a way of changing his life and his family's life and also his village at large. This link between education and poverty has therefore been an essential right from the very beginning of his career in politics. His gradual rise to power has thus always been grounded in his roots, where he came from and a simple but crucial need to change his hometown for the better. This can be seen in the kind of education policies and poverty alleviation programs that he and his adviation programs that he and his administration have come up with. Sik-kim has become the only state in India where education is absolutely free up to the graduation level. For students from the BPL category, education is free right up to the post-doctorate level.<sup>6</sup> Apart from this, there is a list of scholarships and grants available for students with the sole purpose of the post-doctorate in unhindered education for the youth like "The Chief Ministers Meritorious Scholarship Scheme' for school students from the 5<sup>th</sup> standard onwards,

tion for the Sikkimese students purng MBBS in the soon-to-be-set-up State Medical College.
Pawan Chamling is a leader who has risen from the ground, seen and has risen from the ground, seen and lived the harsh realities of life in a society which knew very little about 'freedom' and individuality. In his own words, "I have learnt through the hard knocks of life"s and it is this experience of living the ground re-alities of his time and the challeng-es he has handled up till date that makes Pawan Chamling a leader of the masses, a champion of the poor simply because he was one of them and still is, in his heart and mind a simple folk with humble origins who sought to change his life and the lives of many. This is what makes him 'real'- an authentic leader. This is perhaps why he has been able to build a strong connection between him and his people. Leadership is created by both parties .i.e. the 'leader' and the 'led' and a leader has to ensure that this relationship is cul-tivated and nurtured.9 "Our policies should be people-centric" has always been the mantra of the Chief Minister and he has maintained this from the very beginning. The fact that he has been the longest serving CM in the country is a testament to the relent-less support that the people have had towards him and his adm inistration. So what is meaningful leadership then? This is rather a difficult ques-tion as there is not one definite an-

swer for it. It becomes very important to realise that "there are no univer-

sal leadership characteristics. What works for one leader will not work for another." As Goffee and Jones say in their book, each leader has his/ her "own personal leadership assets" which they deploy at the right time and in the right circumstances. 10 We must also however agree that, not every leader has the finesse and the calibre to do so and not every leader is born with these assets. Some cultivate it with time and experience and out things which are fed to them by others in the group. A leader who is enacting things out is thus not a leader but rather a 'clone' (noisy or quiet) and we do not want a 'clone leader We want a real leader, don't we?
We want to be led by a person, not
a role holder or a 'position filler' or
somebody with a vindictive agenda. We want someone who is flesh and bones and has an immense ar of experience and is wise enough to take decisions and challenges that time has to offer. In the present scenario in Sikkim, it isn't very difficult to see who has the tools and traits to offer 'meaningful leadership'. Nev-ertheless for those of you who've seemed to lose track and forgotten or have been misled (which can happen in life), it is time to look back and see, reflect on the many (many) years that have gone by under the humble leadership of Mr. Pawan Chamling. Why? Because we have a choice to make and it's imperative that we make a 'good one' for ourselves, for our loved ones, for our future gener-ation and most significantly for this beautiful, blessed land, ::

### North District preps for disaster management mock exercise MANGAN, 29 SEPT [IPR]:

A preparedness meeting for conducting the State level mock exercise to be held on 10 Oct was held today at Zilla Bhavan in Mangan. The meeting was chaired by District Collector, North, Karma R Bonpo, and attended by Superintendent of Police, North, Sub Divisional Magistrates and other of-ficers of the district.

Disaster National Management Authority [NDMA] is conducting a mock exercise in the four districts of Sikkim and ten districts of West Bengal on 10 Oct. The mock exercise will simulate a scenario of a massive earthquake in the North East India which has caused huge devastation. The objective of enacting the scenario is to put into place a quick response system to tackle such disasters. Departments like Health, Police, and Civil Supplie Fire, Forests, Human Re-Development Department along with volunteers have been assigned specific roles to be performed during mock scenario. A preliminary meeting on the same was already held and was chaired by the Chief Sec-

retary of Sikkim.

In order to conduct
the mock exercise in North District, the District Disaster Management Authority has prepared five scenarios and the mock exercise will be held in Mangan and Chungthang.

The DC North informed all the stakeholders on their roles and responsi-bilities under the Incident Response System [IRS] and according to the mock exercise various officers will have to perform those roles. He stated that it was the aim of the District Ad-ministration to fully functionalize the IRS system so that the district is better prepared to tackle big disasters in the near future.

He stated that entire administration will take part in the mock exercise along with Indian Army, Tibetan Police Force and the Hydro Power de-velopers. He also stated that the participation of the NGOs and communities is a must to make the exercise successful in the district.

The NDMA will be sending observers from the Indian Army to see the preparedness of the District to tackle disasters and accordingly will be provid-ing feedback to improve the disaster preparedness of the district.

### Political Violence

### Head it off before the boundaries are pushed

Sikkim prides itself over being a peaceful state and often highlights its Buddhist ethos of nonviolence. In fact, there are many who believe that even the formation of the kingdom was a peaceful process. Be that as it may, can Sikkim genuinely lay claim to being a nonviolent society? Its members seem to succumb to violent outbursts too often for a peaceful people.

The last elections were among the more violent political episodes in Sikkim's recent history, and sporadic instances that occurred for at least a year since reinforced the suspicion that when opportunity presents, Sikkim collapses rather conveniently to violent expressions. Let us qualify this by specifying that those who have already secured a place in the public domain appear to be on a hair-trigger when it comes to vio-lence. At least that is what the easy instigation of social media and desperation of political futures proved in the last election cycle in Sikkim. The cold brazenness with which some of the pre-poll violence was launched in 2014, because it was not condemned widely enough by the lay people and their civil society organizations, ended up claiming two lives before Sikkim voted. The fear of continued and violent score-settling might have been one of the factors which played a deciding role in the final verdict, but people need to reject vio-lence more forcefully than that. Because they haven't, or perhaps because there is a staggering trust-deficit in how the Opposition engages the establishment and vice versa, violence, even if not of the physical pre-poll scale, continues to occur in the language used and attitudes flaunted. It's ugliest post-election explosion was during the college showdown in July 2014, but there have been sporadic moments since then. It will not surprise anyone if students complained that the authorities were haughty, dismissive and disinterested and that this led to some in their support groups to get into shoving and loud slanging matches. It is important to bear in mind that violence need not always be physical. If the tendencies are not clipped every time the boundaries are tested, violence will occur more often, and each time with increasing intensity and the physicality will arrive too. Sikkim needs to keep in this mind as it readies itself for another election and the potential even this one might hold for violence if the lay people, the voters every leader wants to woo so desperately, do not convey a clear signal that while they welcome heated ideological debates, they will not tolerate actual violence.

After all, if violence, and one is still not speaking scale here, highlights public expression, it should wor ry the Sikkimese society at large.

What Sikkim is seeing of late is a spike in aggressive posturing which is always only a step away from violent aggression. Most instance of violence typically ignite without much planning. They start as a collection of earnest believers, adherents and supporters as inspired by the ideology [or need] which brought them to the streets as by the lure of defying authority. Typically, the groups have a very small percentage of agent provocateurs who play on egos and pride to egg the group into trouble. There will always be those who will try to instigate groups into violence, and they are not always consciously playing villains; sometimes and more dangerously, they believe it to be the only recourse and are convinced of the morality of their stands. That should not however mean that violence cannot be curbed. A good place to begin will be in the vocabulary used to describe violence. Violence is often reported and explained as being caused by "anger" and "disenchantment" by "disaffected youth" or "wronged sections". Such messages end up legitimizing lawlessness. Violence is wrong. Period. Keep justifying it and one will soon reap the proverbial whirlwind. Violence is a criminal expression. See it as such and demand that it is tackled as such, and may be civilized debates and lobbying will become possible. Sympathetic portrayals of criminal activity propagate free-for-alls. When institutions fail to repudiate violence, it not only lasts longer but also pops up more often.

How to curb this trend? The community has to reject all forms of violence. This rejection should occur loudly and clearly. The police and public officials should be allowed to expose and take legal action against those who break the peace. While on this aspect, the people should also follow police action on breakdowns of law and order situations and demand better case preparations. Isn't it surprising that thus far no one has ever been convicted for rioting or mob violence in Sikkim even though such incidents have occurred. What could also work in puncturing politi-cal violence tendencies is subjecting it to frequent and scathing public ridicule, stripping it of the alpha-male celebrations that are usually attached to it. Do nothing, continue ignoring it, and these elections, which are not very far away, will definitely be more violent and vicious

# Speaking out about sexual violence on social media may not challenge gendered power relations

■eminists are celebrating a new generation of women who fearlessly share their stories of sexual violence on social media and other digital platforms, confronting established limits on talking about rape.

But as past analyses conclude, not all forms of speaking out challenge the gendered power rela-

### tions that perpetuate sexual violence. POLITICS OF SPEAKING OUT ABOUT RAPE

The feminist movement of the 1970s broke ground by publicly telling personal stories of sexual violence. Those women described the problem as one of patriarchal power and women's oppression. Yet as public attention to sexual violence became increasingly common in the late 20th century, it came to be depoliticised as an issue of individual trauma,

a starting point for personal self-transfo rmation and empowerment that sat well with neoliberalism.

A new generation of sexual violence survivors have been speaking out on social media. most famously with the #Me-Too movement, which gained mainstream media attention. However, ordinary people have been telling their sexual violence stories online, sometimes anonymously but in many cases not, in ways that have garnered less attention.

One trend I recently investigated is the "my rape story" genre of YouTube videos. I analysed 48 such videos

by 40 individual creators, along with the creators' YouTube channels and linked social media.

"My rape story" videos are typically produced by regular YouTubers who maintain a channel where they post stories about themselves, expound on various topics, and promote products or services while exhorting viewers to "click, comment, subscribe". These videos mostly appear on channels where other posts seem designed to attract female viewers, with a focus on female fashion, shopping, and in some cases motherhood.

A few are on channels of aspiring singers, writers or actors. Most such YouTubers do not win huge followings or become celebrities, although many seem to hope to.
YOUTUBERS' RAPE STORIES

In one example, Esther's (all names are pseudonyms) YouTube channel includes many reviews of cosmetics and links to her beauty website, which promotes various products. A vivacious speaker. Esther posts videos in which she tells stories about her life. Her rape story video begins by promoting one of her other videos and asking viewers to share her videos so her channel can grow. She concludes


her weight loss advice, including a self-published book on weight loss. She also offers advice on positive thinking and self-branding. She presents herself as healthy and resilient, referring to herself as a guru. She tells her rape story calmly, without tears, saying she is sharing it so others can learn from her experience. In a third, Emogirl's videos present her as vul-

### RAPE STORIES AND SELF-BRANDING

In their rape story videos, creators usually show

her story by reminding viewers she posts new con-tent every day. In another, Destiny's YouTube channel markets

nerable and in need of support. Pale, with heavy black eyeliner, her first ever YouTube video told of her rape as a teenager. She followed this up with videos telling of how she was bullied at school fol-lowing her rape and how she started to self-harm



their face and speak directly to the camera, although some like Emogirl use cue cards – holding up handwritten messages and telling their story a few words at a time.

Most film themselves at home, often from their bedroom. These videos share a DIY aesthetic, which characterises much YouTube vlog content. They appear as homemade productions, crafted by ordinary people with a simple digital camera. This aesthetic, now often imitated by corporate and mainstream media, lends the content a sense of authenticity.

The videos unfold in similar ways, with the storyteller describing how she knew the perpetrator, the events leading to the rape, the rape itself in varying levels of detail, and the aftermath of the rape. Only two of the videos I analysed told of a rape by a stranger. Most told of rape by someone close to the storyteller – a relative, friend or boy friend. Some told of rape by someone they had re cently met, typically a date.

Why do people tell such personal stories on YouTube? Social media incites self-disclosure by requiring users to self-consciously construct online personae through carefully curated personal shar-

ing. Such personal sharing serves to construct an online personal brand by creating a particular emotional experience and connection with followers.

Both Destiny and Esther say they feel an obligation to share their rape story so their followers can know them better. Their stories serve Destiny's self-positioning as a guru who can guide others in self-transformation, and Esther's as a girlfriend who gives cosmetic and hairstyling tips while occaonally delving into deeper territory.

Emogirl's rape story video was her first. In sub-

sequent videos she tells followers how important their emotional support is for her, and encourag-es them to visit her Instagram, where she posts her artwork. Thus, the circulation of these stories speaks to the commodification of personal experi-

### WRESTLING WITH SELF-BLAME

The rape stories YouTubers tell mostly treat rape as an individual trauma perpe-

trated by, in the words of one, "shitty people". The videos' main theme typically revolves around the storyteller's ef-forts to "take back control" of her life. Many tell of how the experience made them stron-ger and situate it as part of their journey to wisdom and

self-reliance.
Few link their experience with wider social patterns or treat sexual violence as a social problem with political solutions. Rather, they treat it as a risk women must man age. They urge other women

to avoid drinking too much, to watch their drink when socialising, and to be cautious about trusting men – even those they think they know. Thus, these video creators often fall into self-blame and reiterate well-worn rape myths that suggest their own behaviour (drinking, trusting too easily) contribut-

ed to their rape.

Nevertheless, some feminist influence appears in these videos insofar as the creators push back against slut-shaming and victim-blaming. Most seem painfully aware of how others could blame them for their rape. They urge other women to speak out about their own rape and to not blame themselves, no matter how drunk they were or what they were wearing.

These videos thus intertwine a kind of female olidarity and resistance to rape myths with neoliberal therapeutic thinking and social media incitements to self-branding.

# Just because you're thin, doesn't mean you're healthy

ccording to the Australian Institute Aof Health and Welfare, 63% of Australian adults are overweight or obese

But it's much harder to estimate how many are within a healthy weight range but have poor diets or sedentary lifestyles. These can cause significant health problems that will often be missed because the person appears to look "healthy"

# HOW DO WE JUDGE THE HEALTH OF WEIGHT?

Obesity statistics often take estimates of body fat using body mass index (BMI). Although BMI isn't perfectly correlated with body fat percentage, it's a quick and easy method for collecting data using just the person's height and weight. If the BMI is higher than 25, a person is considered "overweight". If it's above 30, they're considered "obese". But BMI doesn't tell us how healthy someone is on the inside.

Using additional lifestyle measures, such as diet and exercise frequency over the last year, a recent report from the Queensland Health department estimated 23% of those who are not currently overweight or obese are at risk of being so in the future.

These figures indicate that the percentage of unhealthy-weight individuals does not accurately capture the percentage of unhealthy-lifestyle individuals, with the latter number likely to be much higher

### IF YOU'RE NOT OVERWEIGHT, DOES A HEALTHY LIFESTYLE MATTER?

Many people think if they're able to stay lean while eating poorly and not exercising, then that's OK. But though

you might appear healthy on the outside, you could have the same health concerns as overweight and obese individuals on the inside.

When considering risk factors associated with heart disease and stroke or cancer, we often think about health indicators such as smoking, cholesterol, blood pressure, and body weight. But poor diet and physical inactivity also each increase the risk for months following the initial incident

# FOR YOUR BODY, BUT WHAT

ABOUT YOUR BRAIN?
Recent research has also shown overconsumption of high-fat and high-sugar foods may have negative effects on your brain, causing learning and memory deficits. Studies have found obesity is associated with impairments in



heart disease and have a role to play in the development of some cancers

So even if you don't smoke and you're not overweight, being inactive and eating badly increases your risk of developing heart disease.

Little research has been done to compare the risk diet and exercise contributes to the development of heart disease in overweight versus skinny but unhealthy individuals. However, one study measured the risk of different lifestyle factors associated with complications following acute coronary syndrome – a sudden reduction in blood flow to the heart.

It found adherence to a healthy diet and exercise regime halved the risk of having a major complication (such as stroke or death) in the six

cognitive functioning, as assessed by a range of learning and memory tests such as the ability to remember a list of words previously presented some minutes or hours earlier.

Notably, this relationship be-tween body weight and cognitive functioning was present even after controlling for a range of factors in-cluding education level and existing medical conditions.

Of particular relevance to this discussion is the growing body of evidence that diet-induced cognitive impairments can emerge rapidly — within weeks or even days. For example, a study conducted at Oxford University found healthy adults assigned to a high-fat diet (75% of energy intake) for five days showed impaired attention, memory, and mood com-

pared to a low-fat diet control group.

Another study conducted at Macquarie University also found eating a high-fat and high-sugar breakfast each day for as little as four days resulted in learning and memory defi-cits similar to those observed in over-weight and obese individuals.

These findings confirm the results of rodent studies showing specific forms of memories can be impaired after only a few days on a diet con taining sugar water and human "junk" foods such as cakes and biscuits.

Body weight was not hugely dif-ferent between the groups eating a healthy diet and those on high fat and sugar diets. So this shows negative consequences of poor dietary intake can occur even when body weight has not noticeably changed. These studies show body weight is not always the best predictor of internal health.

We still don't know much about the mechanism(s) through which these high-fat and high-sugar foods impair cognitive functioning over such short periods. One possible mechanism is the changes to blood glucose levels from eating high-fat and high-sugar foods. Fluctuations in blood glucose levels may impair glucose metabolism and insulin signalling in the brain.

Many people use low body weight to excuse unhealthy eating and phys-ical inactivity. But body weight is not the best indicator of internal well-being. A much better indicator is your diet. When it comes to your health, it's what's on the inside that counts and you really are what you eat.

# Indian Coffee House - Shimla

Dim lighting, good coffee and the chatter of conversations lost in the spinning of an old fan is almost like an indie movie set; except it is the Indian Coffee House in Mall road, Shimla. It opened in 1957 and is last

the country.

While coffee was grown in India before the coming of the British, the idea of coffee houses was popularized during colonial times. However native Indians were not allowed into these places hence the concept of "India coffee house" was started by the Coffee Cess Committee in 1936. There were about 50 of these coffee chains by the 1940s but a change in the administrative policy meant that a lot of these coffee houses were closed down by the 1950s. In the process many of the workers lost their jobs; so under the leadership of A.K. Gopalan, the workers formed societies and began a movement to handover these shops to the workers who would own and run these coffee chains as cooperatives. Hence they the formed the Indian Coffee Workers' Cooperatives and renamed the chain as the Indian Coffee House.

So the Indian Coffee House in Shimla is part of the first few branches that opened and is a good remind-er of our history and the power of everyday people.

Tall wooden ceiling, old furniture and waiters clad in white suits and tur-bans from the Raj times get busy taking

He had visited the place in December 2017 and tweeted "relished coffee at the Indian Coffee House and reminisced old days. The coffee tastes as good as it did two decades ago.." And there are many who get nostalgic as they enter this place.
I once overheard someone who was visiting from out of town say they wanted to meet at this place for old times sake.

Indeed, the Indian Coffee House is full of nostalgia and memories of the good old days. The remains of the yesteryears can be seen in the crowd who frequent this place too. Silver haired men in groups or by themselves can be seen sitting, chatting and sipping coffee. Sometimes elderly women in their own little groups can also be seen eating dosa and drinking coffee. And if a young traveler or two finds himself/

herself in this place, they would surely

be outnumbered.

In the mornings, it is mostly the older menfolk drinking coffee and reading newspapers while a family of tourists might have entered because Indian Coffee House is perhaps one of the few eating joints that open earlier than the rest in Shimla. During after-

noons, especially in week-days, workers from nearby offices also drop in for some coffee and after-of-fice-gossip. Easy laughters and endless conversations are a feature one could get used to at the Indian Coffee House

Interestingly, young people are conspicuously absent

from this joint. They have other hangouts in town where coffees with caramel have replaced the filter coffee that is served here. The other cafés are more attractive with the latest music in background and social media worthy decors as they give Indian Coffee House a miss.

In this generation gap, one could very well wonder how long will the Indian Coffee House in Shimla survive if the youth is not interested in coming here and the fancier multi-national cof-



fee chains take over the place?

The answer clearly rests on the people of Shimla. If you ask me, the Indian Coffee House is the busiest eatery in Shimla. Every time I have been there, I have had to wait for a minute or two for the table to emptied or cleaned. It is a local favorite. And my only hope is that the love for this place runs in the family. May the grandfathers who are regulars at the Indian Coffee House today be able to pass that love for their coffees to the grandfathers of tomorrow.

# No Nobel Literature Prize as Academy's bell tolls

STOCKHOLM, SEP 29 (AFP): In tatters after a #MeToo scandal, the Swedish Academy has postponed this year's Nobel Literature Prize, leaving an empty page for 2018 as it attempts to reform the venerable institution.

Created in 1786 by King Gustav III and mod-elled on its French elder, the Swedish Academy has selected the winner of the prestigious literary distinction since it was first awarded in 1901.

He said Facebook has taken steps to patch the security flaw to prevent this attacker - or any oth-er attacker - from being able to steal additional access tokens.

# **HUNDREDS KILLED IN INDONESIA QUAKE-TSUNAM**

(AFP): Nearly 400 people were killed when a powerful quake sent a tsunami barrelling into the Indo-nesian island of Sulawesi, officials said Saturday, as hospitals struggled to cope with hundreds of injured and rescuers scrambled to reach the stricken region.

The national disaster agency put the official death toll so far at 384, all of them in the tsunami-struck city of Palu, but warned the toll

was likely to rise.

In the city - home to around 350,000 people partially covered bodies lay on the ground near the shore, the day after tsunami waves 1.5 metres (five feet) came ashore.

There were also con-

cerns over the where-abouts of hundreds of



preparing for a people beach festival due to start Friday evening, the disaster agency said.

Hospitals were overwhelmed by the influx of injured, with many people being treated in the open air, while other survivors helped to retrieve the remains of those who died.

One man was seen car rying the muddy corpse of a small child.

The tsunami was triggered by a strong quake that brought down buildings and sent locals fleeing for higher ground as a churning wall of water crashed into Palu, where were widespread power blackouts

Dramatic video foot-age captured from the top floor of a parking ramp in

tres (50 miles) from the quake's epicentre, showed waves of water bring down several buildings and in-undate a large mosque.

"I just ran when I saw

the waves hitting homes on the coastline," said Palu resident Rusidanto, who like many Indonesians goes by one name.

The shallow 7.5 mag-nitude tremor was more powerful than a series of ouakes that killed hundreds on the Indonesian island of Lombok in July and August.

Indonesian president Joko Widodo said the military was being called in to the disaster-struck region to help search-and-rescue teams get to victims and find bodies.

Earlier, the head of the

cue agency Muhammad Syaugi told AFP that local staff had found "many dead bodies.

"We're particularly concerned about the impact of the earthquake on children, who are more vulnerable to being swept away in tsunamis," said Tom Howells, NGO Save the Children's Program Implementation Director.

People living hundreds of kilometres from the epicentre reported feeling the massive shake, which came hours after a smaller jolt killed at least one person in the same part of the country.

The quake hit just off central Sulawesi at a depth of 10 kilometres just be-fore 1100 GMT - early evening in Sulawesi - the

US Geological Survey said. Such shallow quakes tend to be more destructive.

Pictures supplied by the disaster agency showed a badly damaged shopping mall in Palu where at least one floor had collapsed onto the storey below, while other photographs showed major damage to buildings and large cracks across pavements.

The agency also said homes and a local hotel were flattened while a landmark city bridge was destroyed.

A key access road had been badly damaged and was blocked by landslides, the disaster agency said.

The main airport in Palu, capital of South Su-lawesi province, was shut after the tsunami struck and was expected to stay

hours, complicating any disaster relief efforts.

Indonesia has been hit by a string of other deadly quakes including a devastating 9.1 magnitude tremor that struck off the coast of Sumatra in December 2004.

That Boxing Day quake triggered a tsunami that killed 220,000 throughout the region, including 168 000 in Indonesia

In 2010, about 430 were killed when a huge guake sparked a tsunami off the coast of Sumatra, while more than 600 were killed in a quake-tsunami disaster on Java island.

### Libva seeks UN "security" support

United Nations, Sep 29 (AFP): After a month of militia clashes that left more than 100 people dead, Libya's UN-backed foreign minister on Friday called for the country's UN political mission to transform into a "security and stability" support role.

Mohamed Siala, foreign minister of the UN-backed Libyan unity government, did not specify if he had in mind a UN peacekeeping mission.

"Priority must be given to security, to stabili-ty," he told the United Nations General Assembly.

"We call for conver-sion of UNSMIL, which is a special political mission, into a mission of support for Libya's se-curity and stability," he without providing further detail.

The United Nations Support Mission for Libya (UNSMIL), led by Ghassan Salame, was set up in 2011 to assist the country's new au-thorities after the NA-TO-backed revolution which ousted Libyan dictator Moamer Kadhafi.

UNSMIL has focused on fostering political dialogue to help the North African country's transition to democracy.

Under a UN-brokered agreement, the unity government was set up in Tripoli but it is not rec-ognised by a rival administration supported by military strongman Khalifa Haftar in Libva's east.

Tripoli itself has been at the center of a battle for influence between armed groups with shifting allegiances. A month of clashes left more than 100 dead south of the city before the unity government on Wednesday an-nounced a ceasefire deal between rival militias.

Siala welcomed the efforts of UNSMIL which he said enabled the conclusion of the ceasefire.

# China says it won't be pushed around by US on trade

UNITED NATIONS, SEP 28 (AP): China warned Friday that its critical relationship with the United States could break "like a glass." and used the most global of stages to warn the Trump administration it wouldn't be pushed around on trade.

"will not be blackmailed" or bow to pressure. "Pro-tectionism will only hurt oneself, and unilateral moves will bring damage to all," he told the UN Gen-eral Assembly gathering of

President

Trump this week cranked up punitive tariffs on Chi-na, and Beijing responded in kind, escalating a trade war between the world's

two largest economies.

Trump upped the ante by then accusing China of meddling in the upcoming US midterm elections because it opposes his trade policies. He has presented little evidence to back up the allegations, which China says are untrue.

Wang, in separate rearks at a think tank, said US-China relationship was at a critical point, four decades since ties were normalized.

"The relationship be-

tween our two countries is a common asset. It must be preserved and valued. It's the result of generations of people's efforts," Wang said. "It's like a glass. It's easy to break it" and would be difficult to repair, he said.

Although Wang presented China as upholding multilateral institutions drawing an implicit contrast with Trump's anti-globalist stance Beijing's top diplomat said the suspicions that China seeks global hegemony and to displace the US as a world leader is false. But he warned it's an idea that is spreading, amplifying differences between the two countries.

"This is a serious strategic misjudgment," Wang told the Council on Foreign Relations in New York, "that will be ex-tremely detrimental to US interests and the future of the United States" He said China rather seeks a path of peaceful development.

He defended Chi-

na's assertive behaviour

where it has built manits sweeping territorial claims that are disputed by its neighbours. He said military facilities on those islands are for defensive purposes to counter military activities by other nations in the area, includ ing the United States.

Wang also defended China's recent participa-tion in military drills with Russia that have added to US anxiety that its key strategic rivals are setting aside historical differences and teaming up against it. He said military-to-military ties are normal to build "mutual understanding."

On human rights, Wang was asked about the re-ported harsh treatment of Uighur Muslims in China's west. He maintained that China had brought law and order to a region once blighted by terrorism The Trump administration is reportedly considering sanctions in response to members of the religious minority being forced into "re-education" camps on a massive scale.
Notwithstanding

these differences, the main driver of the current discord between the U.S. and China is trade.

Trump increased tariffs Monday on USD 200 billion of Chinese goods. Beijing responded by imposing penalties on USD 60 billion of American products. That was on top of an earlier duty increase by both sides on USD 50 billion of each other's goods. The tit-for-tat is fu-elling anxiety that smaller nations will suffer

# Trump orders FBI probe of Kavanaugh, Senate confirmation in doubt

WASHINGTON, SEP 29 (PTI): Agreeing to the demands by Democrats, US President Donald Trump has ordered a limited FBI investigation into the allegations of sexual assault against his embattled Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh, throwing his Senate confirmation in doubt

The FBI has been asked to complete its investigation in a week, meaning the confirma-tion of Kavanaugh, 53, as Supreme Court judge would be delayed by at

least a week.

"I've ordered the FBI to conduct a supplemental investigation to update Judge Kavanaugh's file. As the Senate has requested, this update must be limited in scope and complet-ed in less than one week," Trump announced Friday.

In an accompanying statement issued by the White House, Kavanaugh promised full co-operation in the investigation.

"Throughout this process, I've been interviewed by the FBI, I've done a number of 'background' calls directly with the Senate, and yesterday, I answered questions under oath about every topic the senators and their counsel asked me. I've done everything they have requested and will continue to cooperate, Kavanaugh said.

At least three women have now accused Kava-naugh of sexual misconduct while drunk.

On Thursday, Christine Blasey Ford, 51, during a televised public hearing before the com-mittee recounted the al-leged sexual assault by the conservative judge, which "drastically altered

### Domestic political, electoral compulsions behind India's reluctance to talk: Pak FM

New York, Sep 29 (PTI): Pakistan's Foreign Minister Shah Mehmood Qureshi has alleged that India's "domestic political and electoral compulsions" were behind New Delhi's reluc-tance to talk to the new government in Islamabad.

External Affairs Min-ister Sushma Swaraj and Qureshi were slated to meet on the sidelines of the ongo ing UN General Assembly session in New York.

However, India called off the meeting last week, citing the brutal killings of three policemen in Jammu and Kashmir and Islamabad releasing post-age stamps "glorifying" slain Kashmiri militant Burhan Wani.

"Why are they reluctant? Simply politics, elections...they are scared of the electorate. They have swung the pendulum to such an extreme (that), now they're finding it difficult to bring it back. And (with) the elections round the corner, they (Indian government) felt that it could boomerang," Qureshi said Friday in response to a question at an event organised by the Asia Society here.

India has maintained that there can be no talks with Pakistan unless it stops supporting terrorists.

On Thursday also, Swaraj, in a huge snub to also Pakistan, left a meeting of the SAARC foreign ministers early, which was at-tended by Qureshi.




