The robot designed by one of the


PNG-ATL teams was declared the win-

GANGTOK, 04 SEPT [IPR]: Minister for Tourism, Irrigation, India-Nepal River Development Project, Gov ernment of Uttarakhand, Satpalji Maharaj, along with nine other officials from the Government of Uttarakhand visited the National Research Centre for Orchids at Pakyong in East Sikkim today.

Mr Maharaj and other

generation," he added.

He applauded the organic rement initiated by Chief Minister Pawan Chamling in making Sikkim the first organic State in the country. He further added that being a small Himalayan state, Sikkim has set examples in var-ious fields and the policies implemented towards environmental protection needs to be emulated by the rest of the States as well.

Mr Maharaj strongly advo-cated "Green Bonus" for Sikkim and other hill States of India. He said that Sikkim has been in the forefront in conserving environment and Green Bonus will

give further impetus.

Talking about the mode of connectivity in hilly regions, Mr Maharaj pitched for a network of ropeways across the state and said that this would benefit mode of communi-cation and boost tourism as well. He said that Sikkim is one of the cleanest States and other States of the country have a lot to learn from it.

CJI Dipak Misra ends speculation, recommends Gogoi as his successor

NEW DELHI, SEP 4 (PTI): Putting to rest all speculation, Chief Justice of India Dipak Misra Tuesday recommended to the Centre that Justice Ranjan Gogoi be his successor, eight months after he was part of a revolt against the country's top judge.

Despite the differences, Misra stuck

to convention and recommended Gogoi, the senior-most judge in the Supreme Court after the CJI. If confirmed by the Centre, considered a formality, Gogo will be sworn in on October 3, a day af ter Misra retires.

Highly placed sources said the letter by Misra has been sent by the office of the CJI to the Ministry of Law and Justice for necessary action.

Gogoi will have a tenure of little

over a year. His term is due to end on November 17 next year when he attains the age of 65.

Misra's recommendation is in line with the tradition that the senior-most apex court judge succeeds the incumbent CII on his retirement.

Speculation over Misra's recommendation on the next CJI arose after the court's four most senior judges-Justices J Chelameswar (since retired), Gogoi, Madan B Lokur and Kurian Joseph, had called an unprecedented press conference in Delhi on January 12 this year and criticised him on several es, especially the manner of allocation of cases to certain benches.

The recommendation came after Law Minister Ravi Shankar Prasad recently asked Misra to recommend his successor, setting in motion the process

of a change of guard at the apex court. Gogoi, who is set to become the 46th CJI, was elevated to the apex court on April 23, 2012. He has been part of several key verdicts and is presently seized of sensitive cases including the finalisation of National Register of Cit-izens (NRC) in Assam and the PIL seeking appointment of a search committee

members to select Lokpal.

According to the Memorandum of Procedure, which governs the appointment of members of the higher judiciary, "appointment to the office of the Chief Justice of India should be of the senior-most judge of the Supreme Court considered fit to hold the office".

Under this process, after receiving the CJI's recommendation, the law minister puts it before the prime minister who advises the President on the matter.

"Whenever there is any doubt about the fitness of the senior-most Judge to hold the office of the Chief Justice of India, consultation with other Judges... would be made for appointment of the next Chief Justice of India," the document states.

The law minister recently said the

government's intention on the appointment of the next chief justice of India should not be questioned. He had also said the Executive will take a call when the incumbent names the senior-most judge of the Supreme Court as his successor as per convention.

Khandu draws attention of MHA to situation in Siang river basin



ITANAGAR, SEPT 4 (PTI): Concerned over the unprecedented simultaneous drought and flood situations in different areas of the Siang river basin, Chief Minister Pema Khandu on Tuesday drew the attention of the union home ministry to it.

In a letter to Union Home Minister Rajnath Singh, he sought an assesment of the situation by an inter-ministerial team for further ac-

tion and precautionary measures.

The Chinese government had in a August 29 report, its first river water data share this year, cautioned that Tsangpo river, as Siang is called in that country, was in spate following heaviest rains in

150 years and the various gauge and discharge stations on it had seen a discharge of 9,020 cumec

(cubic metre per second) water.

This had prompted the East
Siang district administration to
requisition IAF for helicopter to evacuate people and high waters of the river had affected over 1,000

families living along it at Mebo.

The chief minister informed
Singh about the reports of Siang River flowing above the danger level and said that many houses have been eroded and washed out under the impact of gushing flood

The sudden rise in the water level and the muddy water flow

ing in the river is causing concern amongst the locals, Khandu said in the letter.

The situation is now normal following improvement in weather condition, officials said.

In contrast to it many areas of Namsing circle also in Mebo sub-division of East Siang district, areas of Siang, Upper Siang and parts of Lower Dibang Valley dis-tricts are facing drought-like situation, the letter said.

He requested the ministry to depute an inter-ministerial team to visit the flood and drought af-fected areas of the state for a clearer picture for immediate remedial measures, it added,

Crime is Never Petty Social bankruptcy feeds antisocial tendencies

 $S_{\mbox{\footnotesize edition}}$ to the old-timers, or leaf through a vintage edition of the Guinness Book of World Records, and chances are that you will learn that Sikkim, at one time, figured in the book under the enviable entry of a state with "zero crime rate." The data that earned Sikkim this status is obviously suspect, since not reporting or documenting crimes is not the same as not having any, but no one can deny that Sikkim has been a safe place for a long time. Of course there have always been crimes committed; that, after all, is something every society has to live with. Of late, however, the nature of crimes has been showing a disturbing trend. Not only is violence entering the crime roll in higher numbers, but an increasing number of petty-burglaries with big hauls have become common, again, not all of them get reported to the police. News-reports arrive often about the nature of crimes now becoming increasingly common in the State – a planned burglary in which specific items are lifted, then a drug bust which occurs too routinely only because addiction rates are climbing, and then the rare murder which occurred over a minor issue. The other worrying statistic is the involvement of juveniles and the very young in too many crimes. One needs to only look at the criminal graph of the notorious "spiderman" of Sikkim to realize how minds and hearts, once inured to minor crimes can graduate to the more dangerous crimes. "Spiderman" started off as a petty burglar who climbed into hotel rooms and stole from tourists. He has since be involved in murders and violent jail-breaks. There have been other instances when masked gangs have carried out dacoities in villages and attempted heists, although that trend has thankfully subsided.

What continues to occur too often, and what should worry everyone, are the opportunist crimes. Ask anyone who lives in the urban sprawls of Gangtok and Namchi, and they will know of a neighbor who had stepped out for a brief errand only to return to find the house burgled. This has happened often and have rarely been solved. It was obviously someone who has noticed habits and patterns and is familiar with the place, perhaps even the target persons, to pull off a quick job like that.

For a state already grappling with a host of social challenges ranging from runaway substance abuse to growing number suicides to a high school drop-out rate, crime has clearly become the latest cause for distress. Although each of these challenges will require individual attention, they should not be seen in isolation because they are essentially interconnected in that they result from the socio-cultural and socioeco nomic changes that have visited the State as part of 'development', modernity and mainstreaming. None of these are essentially negative influences but have collaborated to change lifestyles in Sikkim and while this change could have been eased with a more responsive society, fact remains that people at large were left to their own devices to 'adjust'. The spurt in crimes and the involvement of kids too young to be held responsible for their deeds is possibly a product of imitative consumption which is too disquietingly common, especially among the younger generation. The obvious income inequality does not help matters and this situation, when catalysed by a largely absent civil society, eases the path leading to crime.

The inference made above is admittedly speculative, and it should be a worrying sign when journalists end up speculating on social trends when these are better handled by professionals trained in making sense of such issues. But that is not happening in Sik-kim, is it? And that is where the main problem lies. For all the profusion of NGOs in the State, there is none of any consistent commitment to issues of the youth. It is important that the people and their representative organisations notice the trend and arrest the slide by first understanding what it is that drives some of its young to such easy delinquency and then setting the aberrations right. The situation demands a collective response, which, if not addressed soon, will snowball into a presence that cannot be erased as easily later. The cops will obviously do their job of rounding up suspects and finding the culprits, but until the root cause is not corrected, the problem will persist. What is worse, disinterest will from a hardened crop of anti-socials, because juveniles in obvious need of compassionate counseling would have received only 'police action' and derision. Antisocial tendencies are not fed by economic poverty, it is social bankruptcy that

SummitTIMES Google at 20: how a search engine became a literal extension of our mind

We are los minds to are losing our Google After 20 years, Google's products have become integrated into our every-day lives, altering the very structure of our cognitive architecture, and our minds have expanded out into cyberspace as a consequence. This is not science fiction, but an implication of what's known as the extended mind thesis", a widely accepted view in philosophy, psychology

nd neuroscience.

Make no mistake about it, this is a seismic shift in human psychology, probably the biggest we have ever had to cope with, and one that is occurring with breathtaking rapidity – Google, after all, is just 20 years old, this month. But although this shift has some good consequences, there are some deeply troubling issues we urgently need to address.

Much of my research spans issues to do with personal identity, mind, neuroscience, and ethics. And in my view, as we gobble up Google's AI driven "personalised" features, we cede ever more of our personal cognitive space to Google, and so both mental privacy and the ability to think freely are eroded. What's more. evidence is starting to emerge that there may be a link between technology use and mental health problems. In other words, it is not clear that our minds can take the strain of the virtual stretch. Perhaps we are even close

to the snapping point.
"Where does the mind stop and

the rest of the world begin?"

This was the question posed in 1998 (coincidentally the same year

Google was launched) by two philos-ophers and cognitive scientists, Andy Clark and David Chalmers, in a now famous journal article, The Extended Mind. Before their work, the standard answer among scientists was to say that the mind stopped at the bound-aries of skin and skull (roughly, the boundaries of the brain and nervous

But Clark and Chalmers proposed a more radical answer. They argued that when we integrate things from the external environment into our thinking processes, those external things play the same cognitive role as our brains do. As a result, they are just as much a part of our minds as neurons and synapses. Clark and Chalmers' argument produced debate, but many other experts on the mind have since agreed.

OUR MINDS ARE LINKED

WITH GOOGLE

Clark and Chalmers were writing be-fore the advent of smartphones and 4G internet, and their illustrative examples were somewhat fanciful. They involved, for instance, a man who integrated a notebook into his everyday life that served as an external memory. But as recent work has made clear, the extended mind thesis bears directly on our obsession with smartphones and other devices connected to the web.

Growing numbers of us are now locked into our smartphones from morning until night. Using Google's services (search engine, calendar, maps, documents, photo assistant and so on) has become second nature. Our cognitive integration with Google is a reality. Our minds literally lie partly on Google's servers.

But does this matter? It does, for

vo major reasons.

First, Google is not a mere passive cognitive tool, Google's latest upgrades, powered by AI and machine learning, are all about suggestions. Google Maps not only tells us how to get where we want to go (on foot, by car or by public transport), but now gives us personalised location suggestions that it thinks will interest us.

Google Assistant, always just two words away ("Hey Google"), now not only provides us with quick information, but can even book appointments for us and make restaurant reservations

about what we want to type. And Google News now pushes stories that it thinks are relevant to us, personally. But all of this removes the very need to think and make decisions for ourselves. Google – again I stress, literally – fills gaps in our cognitive processes, and so fills gaps in our minds. And so mental privacy and the ability to think freely are both

ADDICTION OR IN-TEGRATION? Second, it doesn't seem to

be good for our minds to be spread across the internet. A grow ing cause for concern is so-called "smartphone addiction", no longer an uncommon problem. According to recent reports, the average UK smart-phone user checks his phone every 12 minutes. There are a whole host of bad psychological effects this could have that we are only just beginning to appreciate, depression and anxiety

being the two most prominent.

But the word "addiction" here, in my view, is just another word for the integration I mentioned above. The reason why so many of us find it so hard to put our smartphones down, it seems to me, is that we have integrated their use into our everyday cognitive processes. We literally think by using them, and so it is no wonder it is hard to stop using them. To have one's smartphone suddenly taken away is akin to having a lobotomy. In-stead, to break the addiction/integration and regain our mental health, we must learn to think differently, and to reclaim our minds.

Idris Elba: isn't it time for a black James Bond?

A black Bond? It's an apparently unproblematic
and straightforward question, right? Well,
not quite. When suggested quite quizzically by
a colleague, it sparked a series of reactionary positions in the staff room, especially from the 007

In fact, whispers that the very suave indisputably black – actor Idris Elba could poten-tially play Bond have ignited social commentaries about race, filmic representation and literary integrity around the world.

The issue was shaken and stirred (sorry, I couldn't help myself) by a recent report in the Daily Star, in which director Antoine Fuqua recalled a discussion with Bond producer Barbara Broccoli, who allegedly said "it is time" for a black actor to star as 007 and that she is confident "it will happen

Interestingly, this little nugget sat at the top of a story about Fuqua launching his latest business venture – an app that allows people to listen to movies online with surround sound. But reporters know how to sell stories to their editors and so the headline, main picture and the first half dozen paragraphs were devoted to Elba's Bond prospects.

Despite the fact that Fuqua's management subsequently insisted that the conversation was "made-up stuff", the question of Elba as the new Bond dominated the comments below the story, which included one reader asking: "What would be the outcry if Martin Luther King was played by a white bloke?" What indeed? Elba himself is keeping

us guessing: "My name's Elba, Idris Elba" he tweet-ed at 9am on August 12, followed three hours later with: "Don't believe the

Elba's no mug. He knows how to fan the flames of speculation. And I'm unashamedly going to fall into his trap. So is it time for a black James Bond? What the heck why not?
TALL, DARK AND

HANDSOME beyond fictionalisa tion - or the limitations of our individual and cultural imagination – to comprehend a reality in which

there's a devilishly handsome and sophisticated black Englishman with an MI6-approved licence to kill. It gives new – or should I say restores (in my humble opinion) the original – meaning to "tall, dark and handsome", right? Everything that Bond is supposed to be.

Wouldn't it be more surprising, and perhaps unsettling, if such an imagining, even in fiction, couldn't withstand the assumed fragility of our liberal mindedness? Especially when we are sup-posed to live in a post-racial society where – ironically - inequalities, discrimination and oppression are nonexistent. If they are nonexistent in the material world, it seems they are alive and well in the figments of our imagination.

Cast your mind back to the media's preoccupation with Prince Harry and Meghan Markle's "racially progressive" interracial union, or France's international posturing as a bastion of ethno-racial equality, with its "colourblind" government prohibition on referencing the race and ethnicity of its citizens. Is that enough to convince you that we live in a multicoloured land of bliss where all is possible?

Rallying against this romanticism are tradi-tionalists – or Bond literalists – who, in all their intransigent preoccupation with conserving the historically white purity and scriptural heritage of the Bond franchise, are irked at a blackened pros-pect. They offer a plethora of counter arguments, not least that in 1953 Casino Royale, the first in Ian Fleming's 12-book Bond series, the secret agent is described as a white Englishman of part Scottish and Swiss heritage who was educated at Fettes

To which I submit: we aren't in the 1950s. The films are no longer time-warped in black-and-white – they have changed and adapted to reflect the cultural zeitgeist of cinematic and contemporary public consciousness

It's interesting to note that these purists are not all white – disproportionally so, yes – but not all. Some non-white Bond enthusiasts have also put in their own two cents' worth, asking producers to "stick to the script" and insisting that being white is integral to Bond's character. But can we racialise character?

Others, meanwhile, have called for their own black, Walther PPK-wielding agent, in the manner of 007, to not only tell their own new or complimentary stories but also avoid falling prey to potential accusations of tokenism in film.

COLOURBLIND CASTING

Meanwhile, JK Rowling decried critics of the cast-ing of black actress Noma Dumezweni as the fic-tional Harry Potter character Hermione Granger, as "a bunch of racists" and that "white skin was never specified", challenging normative assumptions that fictional characters are white, by default.

Supporters of Bond's racial metamorphosis urge for better ethnic minority filmic representation in the spy genre and stress that fiction is not exempt from transformation even in the context of race. It's a sentiment I share.

I realise that my openmindedness unlatches a Pandora's Box of "Whatabout-me-isms". What about a polyamorous, gender-nonconforming, effeminate, anti-misogynist Gujarati Indian as Othello? Or, can I, as a Liverpudlian-accented, shaven-headed, transgen-

dered lesbian, play Sher-lock Holmes? Then again, what about a white Shaft? But wait wouldn't that be "Whitesploitation"? Let's not go there.

Would Elba make a fine Bond? Absolutely. Having seen 007 in all his white iterations, I'm all for a representational shift towards a salt-and-peppered Af-ro-textured, mahoganied urbanite. Too far fetched?

During the search and raid, the team arrested the driver of a vehicle identified as Ravi Kumar, a resident of Sonipat dis-trict of Haryana while other persons managed to escape from the spot, the officer said.

Bridge in busy Kolkata locality collapses, one killed

KOLKATA, SEP 4 (PTI): A portion of the arterial Majerhat bridge in south Kolkata collapsed Tuesday evening, snuffing out one life, trapping several people and crushing many vehicles, police

The 40-year-old bridge in the crowded Alipore area caved in around 4.45 pm during rush hour over rail tracks. It runs over the Majerhat Railway Sta-tion and connects the city centre to Behala and other southern

While police confirmed the death of one person, fire brigade personnel engaged in the res-cue work said 25 injured were pulled out from the rubble.

The injured have been admitted to SSKM and CMRI hospitals, the police said.

State minister Chandrima Bhattacharya said she has heard about the death of five persons but it is yet to be confirmed.

NDRF DG Sanjay Kumar said

"We have to take into ac-count the safety aspect while clearing the debris", he said.

Black night as Federer, Sharapova crash at US Open

er Federer and Maria Sharapova crashed out of the US Open on Monday in back-to-back seismic shocks under the Arthur Ashe Sta

Federer, the five-time champion and looking to end his 10-year wait to add to his total in New York, was beaten by Australia's world number 55 John Millman 3-6, 7-5, 7-6 (9/7), 7-6 (7/3).

It was 20-time major winner Federer's first loss against a player outside the top 50 in 41 meetings at the US Open.

He finished with 77 unforced errors and 10 double faults.

"It was very hot. I felt I couldn't get any air and I was sweating more and more and became more and more uncomfortable." explained Federer.
"I guess I was happy when the

match was over."

He added: "John dealt with it better -- he's from Brisbane, one of the most humid places in the world!" It was the world number two's earliest defeat at the tournament since a fourth round loss to Tommy Robredo in 2013.

The result meant there would be no quarter-final showdown with old rival Novak Djokovic who will now face Millmann instead.

"I have so much respect for



Roger and everything he's done for the game. He's been a hero of mine," said Millman.

"Today he was definitely not at his best. But I'll take it." Sharapova, the 2006 champion, suffered a second successive last-16 exit in New York, blasted off court by Carla Suarez Navarro.

The Spanish player marked her 30th birthday in style with a memorable 6-4, 6-3 win over the fivetime major champion whose last

Slam title was in Paris in 2014.

Federer had cruised through the first set against Millman who was appearing in his maiden last-16 at the majors.

But the Swiss, who lost in the quarter-finals at Wimbledon where he was defending champion, began to look every bit the 37-year-old he is as he struggled in the suffocating humidity.

He squandered two set points second set and another in the third set tiebreak as the errors

Federer was 4-2 up in the fourth set but was reeled in and two back-to-back double faults sent him 1/4 down in the tiebreak.

- 'Break a leg' -The contest was over shortly before 1 a.m. when he hit a weary

forehand wide.

Djokovic reached the quarter-finals with a 6-3, 6-4, 6-3 victorv over unseeded Ioao Sousa.

Djokovic, who ended a 54-week title drought with his 13th Grand Slam title at Wimbledon said he was relieved to get past 68th-ranked Sousa in straight sets

"Very happy to get this one done in straight sets," said Djokovic, who left the court for a medical evaluation early in the third set but returned to

wrap things up in exactly two hours. Marin Cilic, seeded seven, beat David Goffin of Belgium 7-6 (8/6), 6-2, 6-4 and next takes on Japan's Kei Nishikori who saw off German veteran Philipp Kohlschreiber 6-3, 6-2, 7-5.

Cilic defeated Nishikori in the 2014 final when he won his only Slam title.

Sharapova, the 2006 champion who was trying to reach the quarter-finals for the first time since 2012, hit 38 unforced errors and dropped serve six times

The defeat also ended the for-mer world number one's perfect record of 23 wins -- 22 of them on Arthur Ashe Stadium -- in night sessions at Flushing Meadows.

"I thought she played really well. I thought in today's conditions, her ball was getting up on me a little bit more, much more than my previous three opponents that I played," said Sharapova.

"I didn't take care of the chanc-

the balls that were a little bit short-Suarez Navarro, who was also a quarter-finalist in New York in 2013, goes on to face American 14th seed Madison Keys, the runner-up in 2017.

"Maria has played here at night many times so I knew I needed to be aggressive, focussed and play solid,"

said the 30th seeded Spaniard.

Meanwhile, Naomi Osaka
reached her first Grand Slam quarter-final, beating Aryna Sabalenka of Belarus 6-3, 2-6, 6-4, tearfully admitting she was prepared to

"break a leg" to win the match. The 20-year-old became first Japanese woman in the US Open last-eight since Shinobu Asagoe in 2004.

Osaka, seeded 20. came back from a break down in the final set to take the tie on a fourth match point when Sabalenka served up an eighth double fault.

"I would never have forgiven

myself if I had lost that match," said a tearful Osaka.

Hyderabad Masters is the seventh stage of the FIBA 3x3 World Tour and is the first time an international 3x3 basketball tournament is being played in India.

The participating teams will compete for a chance to qualify for the FIBA 3x3 World Tour Bloomage Beijing Final on October 27-28.

The best international teams like

Novi Sad (World No 1), Piran (No 3),



Belgrade (No 9) and more, along with top international players like Simon Finzgar (World No 8) and Anze Srebovt (No 9) will compete in the event.

NEW DELHI, SEP 4 (PTI): Asian Games gold med-allist Manjit Singh, who doesn't have a regular job, Tuesday requested the sports ministry to include him in the Target Olympic Podium Scheme to prepare for the up-coming big events like the 2020 Tokyo Games.

Manjit, who won a gold in the men's 800m race in the Asian Games. was left without a job in March 2016 after the ONGC refused to extend his contract as he was not producing results.

Despite the odds, he continued training under army coach Amrish Kumar before getting a National Camp call-up.

"I lost my job in
March 2016 as the ONGC

refused to renew my con-tract. They said I was not producing results. I was getting stipends earlier,"

"But now I have won a gold in Asian Games. I hope the sports ministry will take notice of my achievement and the hardships I am facing. I

don't have any sponsor or any company giving me assistance I am hon ing that the Sports Ministry will include me in the TOP Scheme so that I can continue training," Manjit told PTI during an

Manju to...
interaction.
The international season is over now and Manjit said next year will be crucial for him as the Asian Championships and World Championships are lined up.

"I want to do well both the Asian mpionships World Championships next year. After that is the 2020 Olympics but for that I need financial hope the sports ministry will help me out," he added The 29-year-old Man-

jit, a native of village Ujhana in Jind district of Haryana, said he was on the verge of quitting the sport when the ONGC refused to renew his contract two years back.

"I was feeling very low and I did not know what to do. I am from a farmer's family and my family cannot afford to send big amount of money for my training. But somehow I continued with help from my coach Amrish Kumar," he said.

"I briefly thought I

would quit athletics but my father (a former state

level shot putter) said I should continue and so I continued with the meagre income from my family.

Manjit earned a spot the Indian athletics team for the 2010 Commonwealth Games but failed to qualify for the final round. He finished fourth in the Asian Championships in Pune in 2013 and won a silver medal in the Federation

Cup in 2014.
His first and last gold medal until the recent win came in 2013 and he admitted that he mostly finished second in Nationals. He was not selected for the CWG and Asian Games in 2014.

In 2015,

trained under Amrish Kumar, a former Army man who trained athletes at Jat Regiment Centre.

He approached the trainer after 2014 Asian Games bronze medallist Naveen Kumar told him about the training. Manjit then won a silver in the Federation Cup in 2015.

Series win over India on par with Ashes triumph: Bayliss

SOUTHAMPTON, SEP 4 (PTI): The victory against world no 1 India in the ongoing five-Test series is on par with beating Australia in the Ashes, said England coach Trevor Bayliss, who suggested they might experiment in the final match starting at London on Friday.

"It is right up there with beating Aus-

tralia in the Ashes. Obviously India are a very good team, the number one team, and to knock them off is a very good feeling," said Bayliss after England sealed the series with a 60-run win in the fourth Test.

"There were some difficult conditions especially on day one. We have said before. under a bit of pressure these guys have got a bit of character which is a good sign going forward."

With opener Alastair Cook announce ing his retirement after this series, and skipper Joe Root eagar to bat at number four, England will have to figure out their top-order in the final Test as well as in the upcoming series against Sri Lanka and West Indies.

Moeen Ali was promoted to the number 3 spot in the second innings of the fourth Test, paving the way for Root to bat at four and Bayliss said the off-spinner might be an option in that position in the

"I'm sure there will be discussions on a



few things in the next couple of days. Batsmen would like to have a settled position in the order. You always find in any era or team there are one or two guys who have to be a bit flexible," he said.

"Moeen has been that guy for us over the last few years. When Root asked him if he was keen to do it he jumped at it. In

the right conditions I would not put it past

"He works hard at his game. In spinning conditions he can cover that pretty well at the moment but his challenge will be on the faster wickets but we haven't got

Bayliss, however, wasn't sure if Ali

The fifth and final Test begins on Friday at London.



PTI's Arif Alvi elected new Pakistan president: Reports

ISLAMABAD, SEP 4 (PTI): Dr Arif Alvi, one of the founding members of Prime Minister Imran Khan's Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf party, was elected as the new Presi-dent of Pakistan on Tuesday, according to media

reports.
Alvi defeated Pakistan Peoples Party can-didate Aitzaz Ahsan and the Pakistan Muslim League-N nominee Maulana Fazl ur Rehman in a three-way contest to become the 13th president.

Of the 430 votes cast in the National Assembly and Senate, Alvi received 212 votes, Rehman bagged 131 and Ahsan garnered 81; six votes were rejected, Dawn-News reported, citing unofficial results.
Alvi secured 45 of the

60 votes cast by the Ba-lochistan's newly elected lawmakers, it said.

In the PPP-dominated Sindh Assembly, Ahsan got 100 votes, while Alvi bagged 56. Just a solitary vote was cast in the favour of Rehman.

Pakh-In Khyber tunkhwa Assembly, Alvi received 78 of the total 109 votes, while Rehman and Ahsan got 26 and five votes respectively.

In Pakistan the President is considered as a symbol of the federation and head of the state and exercises all powers on the recommendations of the prime minister.

Outgoing President Mamnoon Hussain's ten-

ure ends on September 8.
A dentist by profession, 69-year-old Alvi is one of the founding members of PTI. He served as the party's secretary general from 2006 to 2013.

He won the National Assembly elections from NA-247 (Karachi) during the July 25 polls. He was also elected member of the National Assembly in the 2013 general election.



Afghan Taliban announces death of Haqqani network leader

iban announced Tuesday the death of Jalaluddin Haqqani, a former CIA asset whose eponymous militant group is now considered one of the most dangerous factions fighting Afghan and US-led NATO forces in Afghanistan.
The Haqqani network was

founded by Jalaluddin, an Afghan mujahideen commander fighting the Soviet occupation in the 1980s with the help of the United States and Pakistan. Now a Taliban affiliate,

it is blamed for some of the most shocking and brutal attacks across Afghanistan since the US invasion of 2001. Designated a terror group by Washington, targeting it is one of the top US priorities in the region.

Long suspected of links to Pakistan's shadowy military establishment, the network was described by US Admiral Mike Mullen in 2011 as a "veritable arm" of Pakistani intelligence.

Jalaluddin gained notoriety for his organisation and bravery during the Afghan conflict of the 1980s, garner-ing attention from the CIA and



a personal visit from US congressman Charlie Wilson.

A fluent Arabic speaker, Jalaluddin also fostered close ties with Arab jihadists, including Osama bin Laden, who flocked to the region during the war. Later, Jalaluddin became a minister in the Taliban regime.

He is believed to have been ill for several years. The network has been led by his son Sirajuddin, who doubles as the Afghan Taliban's deputy leader, for some time now.

The Hagganis are known for their heavy use of suicide bombers. Analysts have long suspected them of being behind some high-profile attacks in Kabul that have been claimed by the Islamic State group in recent years.

Among many spectacular assaults, they were accused of killing around 150 people in the heart of Kabul with truck homb in May 2017 though Sirajuddin later de nied the accusation in a rare audio message.

The network has also been

accused of assassinating top Afghan officials and holding Westerners for kidnapped

That includes Canadian Joshua Boyle, his American wife Caitlan Coleman, and

their three children, who were released last year. They also held US soldier Bowe Bergdahl, who was released in 2014 in exchange for five Afghan Guantanamo Bay de-

Following the US invasion of Afghanistan Talihan fighters flooded across the border into Pakistan, where they regrouped before launching an insurgency against the Amer-

That included the Haqqa nis, who coordinated attacks on NATO from across the border in their stronghold of Mi-ranshah, the biggest town in North Waziristan, one of Pakistan's loosely governed tribal areas along the border with Afghanistar

The US launched repeated drone attacks against the group, while Pakistan's mil-itary conducted successive clearing operations, though sceptical Afghan officials have noted they always seemed to miss the Haqqanis. Islamabad

intensified military operations in North Waziristan in 2014, however, and now insists that there no militant safe havens left on Pakistani soil.

Pakistan sees its arch-nemesis to the east, India, as an existential threat, and has long sought influ-ence over Kabul as a bulwark against New Delhi

The Haqqanis have fre quently been accused of targeting Indian installations in Afghanistan, spurring speculation they were overseen by Pakistani intelligence.

Analysts say Pakistan ap-

pears to view the Hagganis and more broadly the Afghan Taliban as an asset holding India at bay in Afghanistan

Politicians and retired military officials in Islamabad

having open channels with the Haqqanis is vital, with many insisting that maintaining contact is not the same as

offering support.
With Sirajuddin firmly in charge, Ialaluddin's death may not have much strategic impact

on the network's operations. Washington, which be-lieves Pakistan is playing a double game, has long pressured Islamabad to crack wn on militant groups, with the Hagganis a top priority. Islamabad has repeatedly de-

nied the claims. On Saturday, the Pentagon announced it was cancelling 300 million in aid to Pakistan over its lack of "decisive" ac-

tion against militant groups.

The cut, part of a broader freeze announced by the Trump administration in Jan-uary, is seen as another attempt by Washington to bend

Pakistan to its will.

However, analysts have said the moves are too little. too late, and that until the US addresses Pakistan's fears over India, Islamabad will not shake its support for militant

Myanmar defends Suu Kyi's silence over jailed reporters

YANGON, SEP 4 (AFP): A global outcry over the jailing of two Reuters journalists in Myanmar has been greeted with silence by civilian leader Aung San Suu Kyi, a stony response that an official defended Tuesday as a reluctance to criticise the judiciary. Journalists Wa Lone,

32, and Kyaw Soe Oo, 28, were arrested while reporting on atrocities committed during the violent expulsion by the military of some 700,000 Rohingya Muslims last year.
A Yangon court on

Monday found them guilty under the Official Secrets Act and handed them each seven years in prison, sparking outrage from the UN, EU and US -- all of whom supported Myanmar's emergence from decades of junta rule -- as well as media and rights groups.

Suu Kyi, who was herself subjected to house arrest for some 15 years,



relying on foreign media to highlight her plight, has been widely-con-demned for her silence on the case and verdict. which has posed the sternest test in recent years to free speech in the country.

Aung Hla Tun, a for-

mer Reuters journalist who now works for the government as deputy Minister of Information defended the Nobel Laureate's reticence.

"Criticising the ju-dicial system would be

of court," he told AFP. explaining her silence so far. "I don't think she will do it." Lawyers for the pair will appeal the ver-dict while ultimately the country's president, a close ally of Suu Kyi, can pardon prisoners.

In April the president granted 8,500 jailed people an amnesty, including 36 deemed political prisoners.

But there were still 200 others, including the two Reuters

journalists, facing trials linked to political activities, the Assistance Association for Political Prisoners said at the time.

Erstwhile Suu Kyi advocates overseas have been left dismayed by her attitude to their case so far.

Her one public reference to the Reuters journalists during the court case -- telling Jap-anese broadcaster NHK that the pair had broken the official secrets act --

Russian

air strikes batter Syria's Idlib

BEIRUT, SEPT 4 (AFP): Russian warplanes bat-tered Syria's rebel-controlled Idlib on Tuesday for the first time in three weeks, a war monitor said, as expectations mount of a government offensive in the northwestern province.
Regime ally Moscow

and rebel backer Ankara have held several rounds of talks aimed at averting an assault, but govern-ment troops have been massing near the rebel zone. "Russian warplanes

resumed bombing Idlib province after a 22-day pause," said Rami Abdel Rahman, who heads the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights.

The air raids "came a day after rebel units in Idlib hit regime positions in neighbouring Latakia province, which killed three pro-regime fighters." Abdel Rahman told AFP.

Tuesday's bombardment hit several areas held by the jihadist-led Hayat Tahrir al-Sham alliance, among them the large town of Jisr al-Shu-ghur, but also areas held by rival Turkish-backed rebels, inclu town of Ariha. including

Abdel Rahman could not immediately pro-vide a death toll for the

strikes. Seized from government forces in 2015, Idlib and adjacent areas form the last major chunk of territory still in rebel hands.

The Syrian military

has been deploying rein-forcements to the zone for more than a month and Russian has stepped up its war rhetoric.
"We know that the

Syrian armed forces are getting ready to solve this problem," President Vladimir Putin's spokesman Dmitry Peskov said on Tuesday, calling Idlib a "pocket of terrorism."

Moscow has been carrying out strikes in Syria since September 2015, using aircraft based at the Hmeimim base in

Latakia province.
Russia accuses rebels in Idlib of attacking Hmeimim with weap onised drones and insists jihadist groups in the province must be elimi-

Analysts say there is still a window of oppor-tunity to avoid the humanitarian impact of a full-scale offensive.

The presidents of Turkey, Russia and fellow regime ally Iran are to meet in Tehran on Friday for three-way talks that are expected to focus on Idlib.

An estimated three million people -- half of them displaced from other parts of Syria -- live in the province and adja-cent rebel-held areas.
