## **BRO** completes strategic road in Bhutan

NEW DELHI, JULY 22 (PTI): India's Border Roads Organisation has completed construction of a strategically key road in Bhutan, linking the neighbouring country's border town of Phuent-shogling with its capital city of Thimphu.

The nearly 30-km long Damchu Chukha road, which crisscrosses rugged and difficult terrain, has been constructed at a cost of Rs 287 crore under India-assisted development projects in the Himalayan nation, military officials said.

Several India-funded infrastructure projects, including in the power sector, are being implemented in Bhutan, in sync with close bilateral relationship between the two countries.

minder to celebrate our friendship. Let's show-case the world how beautiful the relationship between Bhutan and India is, Bhutan's Prime Minister Tshering Tobgay said after inaugurating the road last week, according to a senior military

## Home Ministry procures 5000 rape investigation kits to distribute to police stations: WCD

NEW DELHI, JUL 22 (PTI): The Home Ministry has purchased 5,000 rape investigation kits which would be given to police stations across the country for speedy probe in sexual harass-ment cases, according to a se-nior Women and Child Development official

The official said that for now five kits each would be provided to randomly-selected police sta-tions and states have also been asked to chip in with their con-

The kits are designed to carry out immediate medical investigation and aid the evi-dence-gathering exercise in sex-

ual assault and rape cases.

"The Home Ministry has procured 5,000 rape investigation kits that would be distributed to randomly selected police stations across the country for

speedy probes in sexual harassment cases," he said.

Each kit comes with a set of test tubes and bottles and costs Rs 200 to Rs 300, the official

Women and Child Development Minister Maneka Gandhi last week urged states to buy such kits and arm their police station with them.

The official said the states have responded positively and the Haryana government has even approved their procure-

"It is often seen that compromised evidence reach forensic laboratories in such cases. So in a bid to overcome that, rape investigation kits would be dis-tributed to all police stations, the official said.

Explaining the functioning of these kits, he said it would

be used to collect various samples -- such as blood, semen and sweat -- of the victim which will be locked and sent to the forensic laboratory. It will carry the time of sealing of the samples and also the names of the police officer and the doctor involved. Gandhi had said there was

no forensic analysis in 13,000 rape cases every year as the country's laboratories lacked the capacity. She had also said her ministry has been looking to plug loopholes in the system to ensure rape cases are investigated expeditiously.

"The first ones we found were in the forensic department. We just have the forensic ability for 1,500 people. We used the Nirbhaya fund and with the help of the Ministry of Home Affairs, we are building five new forensic laboratories that will

increase the capacity from 1,500 to 20,000," she said.

"At times the forensic laboratories receive compromised evidence, that is why there is a need to distribute the rape investigation kits in every police station," she had said.

As many as 1,10,333 cases of rape were registered in the country between 2014-16, according to government figures.

The figures say that 38,947

cases of rape were registered in 2016, 34,651 in 2015 and 36,735 in 2014. Altogether 3,38,954 cases of

crime against women were regis-tered in 2016, while 3,29,243 such cases were registered in 2015 and 3,39,457 in 2014, according to the government figures.

Rape accounts for about 12 per cent of all crimes against women, according to the figures.





## Proposed RTI changes aimed at usurping power from Parl, state legislatures: Info Commission

of dissent has emerged from within the Central Information Commission against the proposed changes in the RTI Act, which many argue would "weaken" information commissions, with a Commissioner urging the panel to write to the government for withdrawing the controversial amendment bill.

With Chief Information Com-missioner R K Mathur on leave, Information Commissioner Sridhar Acharyulu on July 19 wrote to seniormost Commissioner Yashovardhan Azad to convene a meeting of all Information Commission-ers on the subject, sources in the

know of developments have said. The PTI has a copy of the letter that also says the proposed Bill intends to defeat the very purpose of RTI Act 2005, besides being an affront to federalism enshrined as basic feature of Indian Constitu-

A call on Acharyulu's demand is yet to be taken by the Commissioners, sources said.

In the letter marked to all his

fellow commissioners. Acharvulu has requested the CIC to send an official communication to the government asking for withdrawal of the Right to Information (Amend-ment) Bill, 2018, the sources said

"The central government considered CIC as less in status than the CEC (Chief Election Commissioner). The RTI Act says it is 'constitutional right', while the Bill 2018 considers it is not. If CEC that enforces a right under Article 324 (1) is Constitutional institution, how CIC that enforces a fundamen-

Acharyulu says it is not known how the government ignored the fact that Article 19(1)(a) includes in its rubric both the 'right to express choice through voting and also right to information.

"The Supreme Court time and again said that the right to vote and RTI are fundamental rights. Hence the CIC and CEC stand on equal footing and rightly placed at par by RTI Act 2005 after thorough debate and consultations," he

wrote.
The Commissioner wrote that Parliament ensured certainty and continuity of CIC as a norm through the RTI Act, 2005, which says that a Commissioner will hold office for five years or up to his age of 65 years (whichever is earlier)

Acharyulu said that through the Bill, the executive attempts to usurp that power from the hands of the Parliament and state legislatures also.

Noting that though the pro-visions will not affect the service conditions of the sitting Commissioners. he said, "It is our responsibility to inform the government and the people of the possible consequences of these changes, and its effect on the working of the RTI Act, especially regarding the independence of the Central and State Information Commissions and Commissioners."

"As per the Constitutional scheme of distribution of powers between the Centre and States, the

on subject of access to records under the control of States. But the Centre took shelter under the profound aim of effectuating fundamental right under Article 19(1) (a) saying the Right to Information

is its intrinsic part," he said. He said the RTI Act 2005 recognises sovereign authority of states to select their SICs, the Bill of 2018 strangely does not allow states to decide their term, status and salary as it proposes the Centre will prescribe it from time to time.

"The RTI is the only legislation after the Constitution of India, which had broad base of peoples' representation, consultation and discussion. It is a truly democratic piece of legislation that can empower people to challenge the misgovernance. While Centre intends to affect Central and State ICs, it did not consult them," he said.

The government had on July 18 said it was considering a proposal to amend the Right to Information (RTI) Act, 2005 to frame rules on salaries and services of Chief Information Commissioner (CIC) and Information Commissioners (ICs).

The proposed amendments, circulated among Members of Parliament, seek to do away with the parity given to information commissions with the Election Com-mission in terms of salary, allowances and conditions of service.

The proposal has been opposed by several opposition parties and leaders including Congress president Rahul Gandhi who has said these changes will render the law

New Delhi, Jul 22 (PTI): The National Council of Educational Research and Training (NCERT) has initiated the process of introduc-ing QR code in their textbooks, a move aimed at helping students under-stand chapters better by watching a film or read-ing additional content on laptops and digital boards.

Quick Response (QR) Code is a machine-readable code consisting of an array of black and white squares, typically used for storing web-links or other information for reading by the camera on

a smart-phone.

We have started the process of identifying relevant supplementary material including videos, animations, pow-er point presentations, maps and e-content, a senior NCERT official

said.
These will be mapped with the content of each textbook from class 1 to 12 and will be linked with QR code, which will be printed in the textbooks, the official added.

The codes are likely to be introduced from the 2019 academic session by when the required content would have been generated.

### The Challenges of Being Local

N ow that some public interest has been generated on local-nonlocal issues and the issues of belonging to Sikkim, the State should discuss the issue threadbare

The Local-Nonlocal issue is an easy divide to tease; something that lazy politicians and even lazier agent provocateurs are wont to tickle often and whenever they feel the need to be noticed. With an election cycle arrive times of irrationally high aspirations, in-flated senses of entitlement and shrinking opportunities, a refusal to share becomes an easy position to adopt. And while one may wish for society to be more open and accommodating, a refusal to be so, while unhealthy, is not necessarily illegal or unconstitutional What is worrying however is when the public domain becomes occupied by voices which mistake protection to mean an exclusive club put together at the cost of denying others. For them, even some basic courtesies extended to those outside the club tantamount to di-lution, and because those who understand the issues better do not speak up, noise routinely blanks out reason whenever such situations arise.

One sees such insular positions taken on a rou-tine basis in locations as diverse as North India and the North East Region where the local-nonlocal argument often collapses into violence. It is disturbing to see what appear to be sane, "educated" and informed voices try and justify expressions of hate, but when appeals are made based on the belongingness of peo-ple, such positions become difficult to avoid, even for the sane, educated and the informed. Admittedly, irrational positions and shallow nationalism are not rare outpourings even in Sikkim, but the State has thus far been spared the ugliness of the more aggressive posturing or even sabre-rattling beyond the limited circulation of press conferences or the slightly wider, but socially limited, network of social media.

There is never room for complacency though be-

cause issues have a habit of occasionally growing unexpectedly big in Sikkim – the protest by truck drivers, the Rule 4(4) protection movement and the college students' showdown in recent years for instance. Hence, it is advisable that the divisive Frankenstein of local-nonlocal positioning is not allowed to grow any larger in Sikkim. The best way to do this would be to address all related issues in an open manner. To begin with, Sikkim should also realise that in the issues related to Residential Certificates, the groups receiving these documents are nonlocal only as far as their status on official documents in concerned, as far as the social milieu is concerned, they have been part of the local mix for more than forty years now and widely accepted as such. What is also apparent is that they will not be claiming anything which is exclusively protected for the Sikkim Subjects and are essentially being extended gestures which allow them a more dignified access to rights they already enjoy.

But let us leave what privileges accrue to whom and whose share gets compromised for a later debate, for now, let's extend the need for Sikkim to leverage such debates to discuss more issues more extensively and more openly. The quickness with which the Merg-er happened in 1975 and the short-sightedness with which several rules were drawn up and put into practice have led to situations which extend beyond just the demarcation of locals and non-locals in Sikkim. There is a staggered segregation even among the "locals" with official government notifications drawing up up to five categories of people who can be issued Certificates of Identification and among these five categories are three groups which enjoy different levels of privileges even though they are all "Sikkimese". Complicating matters further are existing ambiguities and nonexistent guidelines for officials on who is to be certified as what in Sikkim. Added to this whole mix is the literal interpretations of the English in rules, something which the grandchildren of non-locals who were in service of the Sikkim Government on or before 31 December, 1961 were shell-shocked by and what will dismay the great grandchildren of Sikkim Subjects in less than a decade.

Too many complications have become rather vexed  $% \left( x\right) =\left( x\right) +\left( x\right)$ because they remained unaddressed for too long. Now, a situation has been created which has opened an opportunity to untangle the confusions. All that will be required will be for everyone to seek out transparency, fair-play and open minds. Invest these to the public debate and this will not be a very difficult prob-lem to solve. And the "locals" will have to take the lead in opening such dialogues for it to have any durable results...

## **SummitTIMES** Who owns the moon? A space lawyer answers

Most likely, this is the best-known picture of a flag ever taken: Buzz Aldrin standing next to the first U.S. flag planted on the Moon. For those who knew their world history, it also rang some alarm bells. Only less than a century ago, back on Earth, planting a national flag in another part of the world still amounted to claiming that territo-ry for the fatherland. Did the Stars and Stripes on the moon signify the estab-

Ishment of an American colony?
When people hear for the first time that I am a lawyer practicing and teaching something called "space law," the question they ask most frequently, often with a big smile or a winkle in the eye, is: "So tell me, who owns the moon?

Of course, claiming new national territories had been very much a European habit, applied to non-European parts of the world. In particular the Portuguese, the Spanish, the Dutch, the French and the English created huge colonial empires. But while their attitude was very Eu-rope-centric, the legal notion that planting a flag was an act of estab-lishing sovereignty quickly stuck and became accepted worldwide as part and parcel of the law of nations.

Obviously, the astronauts had

more important things on their mind than contemplating the legal meaning and consequences of that planted flag, but luckily the issue had been taken care of prior to the mission. Since the beginning of the space race the United States knew that for many people around the world the sight of a U.S. flag on the Moon would raise major political issues. Any suggestion that the moon might become, legally speaking, part of U.S. backwaters might fuel such concerns, and possibly give rise to international disputes harmful to both the U.S. space program and U.S. interests as a whole.

By 1969, decolonization may have destroyed any notion that non-European parts of the world, though pop-ulated, were not civilized and thus justifiably made subject to European sovereignty – however, there was not a single person living on the moon; even life itself was absent.

Still, the simple answer to the question of whether Armstrong and Aldrin by way of their small ceremony did transform the moon, or at least a major part thereof, into U.S. territory turns out to be "no." They, nor NASA, nor the U.S. government intended the U.S. flag to have that effect.

THE FIRST OUTER SPACE TREATY Most importantly, that answer was enshrined in the 1967 Outer Space Treaty, to which both the United States and the Soviet Union as well

as all other space-faring nations, had become a party. Both superpowers agreed that "colonization" on Earth had been responsible for tremendous human suffering and many armed conflicts that had raged over the last centuries. They were determined not to repeat that mistake of the old European colonial powers when it came to decide on the legal status of the moon; at least the possibility of a "land grab" in outer space giving rise to another world war was to be avoid-ed. By that token, the moon became something of a "global commons" legally accessible to all countries – two years prior to the first actual manned moon landing.
So, the U.S. flag was not a manifes-

tation of claiming sovereignty, but of honoring the U.S. taxpayers and engi-neers who made Armstrong, Aldrin, and third astronaut Michael Collins' mission possible. The two men carried a plaque that they "came in peace for all mankind," and of course Neil's famous words echoed the same sentiment: his "small step for man" was not a "giant leap" for the United States, but "for mankind." Furthermore, the Unit-ed States and NASA lived up to their commitment by sharing the moon rocks and other samples of soil from the lunar surface with the rest of the world, whether by giving them away to foreign governments or by allowing scientists from all over the globe to access them for scientific analysis and discussion. In the midst of the Cold War, this even included scientists from the Soviet Union.

Case closed, no need for space lawyers anymore then? No need for me to prepare University of Nebras-ka-Lincoln's space law students for further discussions and disputes on the lunar law, right?

NO SPACE LAWYERS NEEDED?

Not so fast. While the legal status of

the Moon as a "global commons" accessible to all countries on peaceful

missions did not meet any substantial resistance or challenge, the Outer Space Treaty left further details unsettled. Contrary to the very optimistic assumptions made at the time, so far humankind has not returned to the moon since 1972, making lunar land rights largely theoretical.

That is, until a few years ago when several new plans were hatched to go back to the moon. In addition at least two U.S. companies, Planetary Resources and Deep Space Industries, which have serious financial backing, have started targeting asteroids for the purpose of mining their miner-al resources. Geek note: Under the aforementioned Outer Space Treaty, the moon and other celestial bodies such as asteroids, legally speaking, belong in the same basket. None of them can become the "territory" of one sovereign state or another.

The very fundamental prohibition under the Outer Space Treaty to acquire new state territory, by planting a flag or by any other means, failed to address the commercial exploitation of natural resources on the moon and other celestial bodies. This is a major debate currently raging in the international community, with no unequivocally accepted solution in sight yet. Roughly, there are two general interpretations possible

### SO YOU WANT TO MINE AN ASTEROID?

Countries such as the United States and Luxembourg (as the gateway to the European Union) agree that the moon and asteroids are "global commons," which means that each country allows its private entrepreneurs, as long as duly licensed and in compliance with other relevant rules of space law, to go out there and extract what they can, to try and make money with it. It's a bit like the law of the high seas, which are not under the control of an individual country but completely open to duly licensed law-abiding fishing operations from any country's citizens and companies. Then, once the fish is in their

nets, it is legally theirs to sell.
On the other hand, countries such as Russia and somewhat less explicitly Brazil and Belgium hold that the moon and asteroids belong to humanity as a whole. And therefore the potential benefits from commercial exploitation should somehow accrue for humanity as a whole - or at least should be subjected to a presumably rigorous international regime to guarantee humanity-wide benefits. It's a bit like the regime originally es-tablished for harvesting mineral resources from the deep seabed. Here, an international licensing regime was created as well as an international enterprise, which was to mine those resources and generally share the benefits among all countries.

While in my view the former po-sition certainly would make more sense, both legally and practically, the legal battle by no means is over. Meanwhile, the interest in the moon has been renewed as well - at least China, India and Japan have seri-ous plans to go back there, raising the stakes even higher. Therefore, at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln we will need to teach our students about these issues for many years to come. While ultimately it is up to the community of states to determine whether common agreement can be reached on either of the two positions or maybe somewhere in between, it is of crucial importance that agreement can be reached one way or another. Such activities developing without any law that is generally applicable and accepted would be a worst-case scenario. While not a matter of colonization anymore, it may have all the

This can include things such as focusing attention on reading – but also regulating emotion, in terms of coping with changes of plan or dealing with sibling conflict during play.

Children can be helped to take responsibility by

tivity choices. If your children have a permitted ac-count of daily screen time, or a pocket money budget, help them to manage that themselves. Tangible markers of time or money (such as sand timers or coins) help even younger children see what they have to spend, and what's left.

2. BE A PARENT CHEERLEADER
A child can achieve something bigger and more satisfying with a parent's help. And by praising

"Autonomy support" looks to be an effective approach – this is the idea that instead of nagging or arguing, show concern and praise effort to help your child achieve self control. ## Tourist inflow takes a toll on Meghalaya's root bridges

RANGTHYLLIANG (MEGHALAYA), JULY 22 (PTI): Deep in the tropical forests of Meghalaya, an uncharted territory even two decades ago, the aerial root bridges that bear testimony to the ingenuity of Khasis are dying a slow death, overburdened by tourist inflow.

The living-root bridges, which surfaced in popular imagination only a few years ago, have now become a hotspot tourist selfies, say local

People come to visit the suspensions bridges regularly, but not much is done to preserve these "botanical architectures". said Morningstar Khongthaw, a resident of Rangthylliang, who along with a group of local youths, has taken up the task of creating awareness on the issue.

The root bridges were con-

ceived by the Khasis centuries ago for crossing turbulent streams, especially during the monsoons. The locals trained the roots of fig trees on either side of the river to grow laterally, forming a suspension bridge

over a period of 10 to 15 years. Khongthaw, who established Living Roots Foundation here said mass tourism has greatly affected the bridges as people come here in hordes.

"There are a number of liv-ing bridges along the southern slope of the state, especially in the Khasi Hills region, the most photographed among them being the double-decked bridge at Nongriat below Sohra," he said.

The activist, who dropped

out of school a few years ago due to poverty, travels to nearby villages with his team to encourage local people there to build more

such bridges, besides protecting the existing ones.
"The double-decked bridges

at Nongriat and Nohwet villages have come under threat as there is no mechanism to control the number of visitors. Also, the bridges are badly in need of maintenance," he asserted.

Last month, a drive was initiated on World Environment Day to build at least five new living bridges in the Khasi Hills region, Khongthaw, who is in this early

"There are about 50 root bridges that we have identified for preservation. We are working closely with the stakeholders at these villages to give them an idea about controlling crowd on the bridges. Besides, they would also guide the tourists about the place, its history and significance," he added.

Lauding the initiative, Tourism Department officer B Nongkynrih said the present government's objective is to harness the untapped rural tourism prospects of the state.

The Tourism Department is focusing on rural tourism to generate employment opportunities and promote sustainable livelihoods in villages. In such a scenario, organizations, such as Living Roots Foundation, would go a long way in sustaining envi-ronment," he claimed.

Satyajit Rao, a scientist at the Eastern Hill University told PTI that some of the bridges in these tropical forests of southern Meghalaya are believed to be hundreds of years old.

"A proper study is yet to be conducted on the bridges to determine their exact age," he

PRAIA GRANDE, BRAZIL, JUL 22 (AFP): Brazil superstar Neymar admits that after his nation's quarter-final defeat to Belgium at the World Cup he couldn't look at a hall and didn't want to see any of the remaining matches.

"I wouldn't go as far as to say I didn't want to play again but, I didn't want to see a ball, or to see any more football played," 26-vear-old Nevmar told AFP in an exclusive interview on Saturday.

Saint The Paris Germain forward was talking at his Neymar Praia Grande institute where the Red Bull Ney-mar Jr 5's (five-a-sidesoccer) tournament was

being played.

Dressed in a sleeveless t-shirt, with his six-year-old son Davi Lucca sat upon his knee, the striker was however in a relaxed mood as he ex plained his post-World Cup blues.
"I was in mourning,

I was really sad about it, but sadness passes, I have my son, my fami-ly, my friends and they don't want to see me moping around. I've got more reason to be happy than sad," said Neymar, reflecting on his team's 2-1 quarter-final defeat to Belgium. Asked about reports in Spain linking him with a transfer to Real Madrid the forward said "that's all speculation from the press.

"The guys who come up with these stories seem to know more about my life than I do. I won't respond to this type of question because nothing happened," he scoffed. The Brazilian superstar, who moved to PSG for a world record 222 million euros (264 million) last year, insists that the burden of expectation on his shoulders -- whether with his club or country -- does not weigh heavily.

"It's true that when it comes to me, there are double standards. I have been aware of this responsibility, not only for Brazil, but also in club fotball, since I was 17, 18

It is based on cognitive behavioural therapy (CBT) that helps people with depressive symptoms, Gupta said.

The effectiveness of CBT is well established for many mental illnesses, including mood and anxiety disorders.

Based on the proven methodology of CBT. TreadWill uses simple language to help users to identify involuntary negative thoughts and behaviour, Gupta said, adding that users are subsequently taught techniques to work on modifying their thoughts

## Protesters march to office of Malayalam weekly over controversial novel



NEW DELHI, JUL 21 (PTI): A group of protesters today marched to the office of a Ma-layalam vernacular magazine here raising slogans, claiming that a novel serialised in the publication defamed Hindu women and the Brahmin community.

Gayathri, which claims to be a socio-cul-

tural organisation of Namboodiri Brahmins. marched to the office of Mathrubhumi, prominent Malayalam media group, against the novel 'Meesha'.

Author S Hareesh, a 2018 Kerala Sahitya Akademi Award winner, had decided to withdraw his novel after the magazine published three chapters following threats allegedly by right-wing elements on social

This was confirmed by Kamalram jeev, an editor with the weekly, on Twitter.

"S.Hareesh withdraws his novel meesha', literature is being mob lynched, darkest day in kerala's cultural history, lightless days to

follow," Sanjeev tweeted

The novel, which deals with the lives of backward communities in southern Kerala, courted controversy soon after its second chapter was published.

Gayathri said the governments in Kerala were giving more space to litterateurs who are defaming Hindus.

"We wonder on what basis the Kerala

government gave the state Sahitya Akademi Award to a writer like Hareesh," a protester

Controversy erupted over a conversation in the novel in which a male character says that women who dress up to go to temples subconsciously declare readiness for sexual

The character goes on to say that reason women don't visit temples for four to five days a month is to make it clear that they are not ready for sex on those days.

He adds that Brahmin priests were well

Congress MP Shashi Tharoor, who himself is under attack from right-wing activists over his Hindu Pakistan' comment, came out in support of Hareesh and said those who didn't believe him might learn from what happened to Hareesh.

"Those who do not believe my warnings about the emergence of a Hindutva Taliban might learn from what has just happened to Malavalam writer Hareesh (& even more chilling, the threat to chop off his hands, Taliban-style)," Tharoor tweeted.

Renowned Tamil writer Perumal Muru-gan had earlier announced his decision to give up writing in 2015 after his novel 'Madhorubhagan' faced protests from local Hindu and caste-based organisations.

The website of Gayathri says the organisation was founded in 1985 as a platform for Namboothiri brahmins in Delhi to come together and is now a cultural organisation.

Motiwala has chosen the water tap as his election symbol.

Water is a highly charged issue with experts saying Pakistan faces "absolute scarcity" -- less than 500 cubic metres available per person

nationwide -- by 2025. "Vote for me -- but even if you don't -- please remember that clean water is the need of hour,

Radesh Singh Tony is the first independent candidate from Pakistan's Sikh minority to run in conservative, northwestern

Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province.
The odds are already heavily stacked against Tony in a constituency populated with around 130,000 mostly Muslim registered

voters, compared to just 160 Sikhs. His two opponents come from parties backed by hardline religious organisations with links to militant groups.

The contest comes just months after local Sikh community leader Charanjeet Singh was shot dead, and weeks after an bomb attack killed over 20 people at an election rally in the provincial capital.

If elected, Tony has vowed to rve all communities equally, but is still wary of simmering threats.

"We are vulnerable targets." Tony says. "We are campaigning in an atmosphere of fear.

## Indian-origin entrepreneur's UK startup set to combat fake news

ADITI KHANNA LONDON, JUL 22 (PTI): An Indian-origin entrepreneur's UK-based start-up that uses a machine-learning algorithm to sift fact from fiction is set to combat fake news around the world, including plans for a project spe-

cifically targeted at India.

Lyric Jain, a Cambridge University engineering student originally from Mysore, set up Logically last year and has since developed the West Yorkshire-based start-up into a ma-chine-learning platform to filter real from fiction.

The platform, which is currently going through technology trials with partners and advisors. will have its full public launch in September for the UK and the US, and hit India by October.

The aim is for the service to work as a news aggregator as well as an indicator of factual accuracy.

Logically platform 'The gathers the biggest news stories from over 70,000 domains and determines the credibility of the claims across each article. It does this by using a machine learning algorithm that is designed to detect logical fallacy, political bias, and incorrect statistics," the 21-year-old techie



"By illuminating the quality of information across these ar ticles, Logically provides users with a transparent and insightful view that allows them to determine how trustworthy the news they read really is," he said.

With a growing number of cases of fake news being ex-changed over the WhatsApp messaging service in India, his start-up is exploring ways for artificial intelligence (AI) to accurately assess the validity of information faster than any human can.

India has over 200 million WhatsApp users and with the system being encrypted, it becomes extremely difficult for law enforcement to intervene and stop fake stories from ading.

"Because of the highly emotive nature of these stories. people are quick to react. This means the time it takes to disprove compelling fake news stories is often too long to prevent action being taken," Jain said.

"We are still exploring op-tions such as an instant verification chatbot on WhatsApp and will announce our plans by the end of the year," he said.

Logically has a board of advisers made up of alumni from both Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) in the US and

and has raised 1 million pound in funding. It employs 38 people across the UK, India and the US and is planning to almost double that figure.

Cambridge University in the UK

Jain believes there is an urgent need for great-er education around the issue of fake news and

misinformation being spread, largely via online networks.

"The technology we are developing will equip people with the tools they need in order to navigate a complex and con-fusing information landscape better than before, but govern-ments still need to do a better job educating people on the real dangers of interacting with misinformation," he said.

His platform, which com-

bines AI and human intelligence as well as complex analytics, is planned as a first-of-its-kind "intelligent news feed" that he believes may prove to be the future of journalism.

### American officials meet former Afghan Taliban leaders: report

22 (PTI): American officials are meeting former AF-7 officials are meeting former Afghan Taliban leaders amid intensifying efforts by the Trump administration to seek a negotiated settlement of the country's longest war, according to a media

report.

The talks have occurred at undisclosed locations in Qatar, Afghanistan and the United Arab Emirates, the NBC News claimed, citing Taliban sources.

Quoting one negotiator, it said Taliban dele-gations had been joined by "never more than five" Americans for a series of meetings in hotel suites in Doha, Qatar.

The gatherings were "very friendly" with "tea and cookies" being served, the report said, Quoting the "Doha meeting participant".

The negotiator said security is "very tight in and outside," with hotel staff not allowed to enter.

According to the re-port, the Taliban often use a "network of former commanders and political leaders" as interlocutors. Some of those used as interloc-utors have previously been imprisoned by the US or Afghanistan and no longer have active roles

The Taliban delegates are taking steps to not be identified by the intelligence services of Russia, China and Arab coun-

"We don't go to the hotel together," the nego-tiator said. "We never go to the meeting place first. Once they (the Americans) reach the meeting place, then we go there one by one. We use the elevator for some of the floors and then take the stairs out of security considerations."

The source said hotels were chosen because the Taliban and US offi-cials initially "didn't trust each other.

Quoting an Afghani-stan-based Taliban commander, the report said

that another gathering happened earlier this month in the United Arab Emirates. "Americans are meet-

ing with our former members in the UAE and Kabul," he said, "Those former Taliban then convey to us their messages from the talks with mul-tiple options."

"Our stance is quite clear and that's the same old one," he said. "The US would need to withdraw its military forces from Afghanistan and exchange prisoners and let the Afghan people decide their issues as per their culture and traditions," the Taliban commander said.

US officials were taking an "unprecedented" interest in the peace process in recent months,

the commander added.

A State Department spokesperson did not confirm that any meetings had taken place, but did say the Trump administration was eager to resolve the

conflict.
"The US is exploring all avenues to advance a peace process in close consultation with the Afghan government," the spokesperson said.

The US has lost more than 2,400 soldiers in Afghanistan since late 2001, when it invaded the country after the 9/11 terrorist attacks.

Donald President Trump is keen to with-draw the approximate-ly 14,000 American troops who remain in Afghanistan, a promise he made on the campaign trail. Last month, Pompeo

said the US was ready to "support, facilitate and participate" in discus-sions with the Taliban over the role of international forces in Afghanistan but that the peace process would be Afghan-led.
