62-yr-old Covid patient passes away, Sikkim's toll reaches 110


SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 01 DEC:

OVID-19 related death toll reached 110 in Sikkim with the passing away of a 62-year-old male from IBM Rangpo on Monday. He was passed away at around 6:36 PM Monday evening after suffering a cardiac arrest while under observation at the COVID-dedicated STNM Hospital here.

In the daily health bulletin on Tuesday, Health Department State IEC Officer, Sonam Gyaltsen Bhutia, informed that the patient tested positive for COVID-19 in rapid antigen testing at Central Referral Hospital on 25 November and was admitted to STNM Hospital the same day.

The patient had co-morbidities of hypertension, diabetes and Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disorder.

In the meantime, Sikkim's tally of the confirmed cases of COVID-19 crossed the 5000-mark and now stands at 5,031 with the detection of 42



fresh cases in the last 24 hours on Tuesday.

There are now 284 active cases of COVID-19 in the State, of whom four are in the ICU facility of STNM Hospital.

On the other hand, the number of discharged COVID-19 patients in Sikkim reached 4,549 with the discharge of 14 more patients on Monday.

The 42 new cases were detected from the testing of 213 samples on Monday - while 27

people were found positive in RT-PCR screening of 155 samples, two new cases were reported in TrueNat testing of 16 samples and 13 from rapid antigen testing of 42 samples.

27 cases were reported from East District, two in West District, nine in South District and four in North District.

While providing details of the new cases reported in East District, Mr Bhutia informed that

from Forest Check-post in Chandmari, two from above helipad in Burtuk, one from Manbir Colony, one from Upper Sichey and one from Deorali Bazaar.

Seven new cases have been reported from Tadong area, which includes three persons from 6th Mile, two from 5th Mile, one from Gairi Gaon and one from Tadong Bazaar.

Similarly, five persons from Namchi, one from Kazitar and one from near Bhaichung Stadium in South District, while one person from Daramdin, one from Gangyap, one from Tikjuk and one from Soreng PHC in West District also tested positive for COVID-19.

In North District, two persons from Pentok-Mangan and one from Lingthem in Dzongu were also reported COVID-19 positive. Mr Bhutia mentioned that one person, who is from Development Area Gangtok and went for duty in North District, was found COVID-19 positive in the rapid antigen testing.

SMIMS sets up COVID-19 testing lab

Sikkim finally has another lab for COVID-19 testing with the Molecular Laboratory at Sikkim Manipal Institute of Medical Sciences, 5th Mile, Tadong, East Sikkim, all set to be inaugurated by Governor Ganga Prasad who is also Chancellor, SMU, on 02 Dec.

The inauguration will be held through virtual mode and will also attended by Chief Minister of Sikkim, PS Tamang as the chief guest and Health Minister, Dr MK Sharma, as guest of honour.

Taking cognizance of the directions of the National Medical Commission (NMC) to all the Medical Colleges to set up Virology Laboratories, the Molecular Laboratory at SMIMS in the Department of Microbiology

was set up which meets the criteria of Biosafety level II laboratory confirming to ISO 15189:2012 standards. The Molecular laboratory has the facility for molecular diagnosis by RT-PCR open system and CBNAAT.

It has been accredited by National Accreditation Board for Testing and Calibration Laboratories (NABL) for molecular testing for RNA viruses. Based on the recommendation from the mentor institute NEIGRIHMS Shillong, the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) gave permission to the lab on 25 Nov to begin RTPCR testing for COVID-19. Till now, the VRD Lab at STNM Hospital was the only lab in the state that was conducting RTPCR tests for COVID-19. With SMIMS now providing testing facilities, one hopes that the number of tests will increase in the state.

This scheme is the first in terms of the lowest premium payable by the farmers and the highest value of crop insured. India's COVID-19 tally rises to 94.62 lakh; Nov saw over 30 pc decline in cases

New Delhi, Dec 1 (PTI): India's COVID-19 caseload rose to 94.62 lakh with November registering over 30 per cent decline in both new deaths and cases as compared to October, while total recoveries surged to 88,89,585, according to the Union Health Ministry's data updated on Tuesday.

The total coronavirus cases mounted to 94,62,809 with 31,118 new infections, while the death toll climbed to 1,37,621?after 482 more fatalities were reported, the data updated at 8 am showed.

New infections due to COVID-19 started to decline steadily since the first week of October.

A total 12,78,727 cases were reported in November, a decrease from October's 18,71,498 accounting for about 13.51 per cent of the total instances of the viral infection reported in the country so far.

The past month also saw 15,510 lives lost due to the disease, which is iust around 11.27 per cent of the total 1,37,621 deaths recorded so far.

The number of people who have recuperated from the disease surged to 88,89,585, pushing the national recovery rate to?93.94 per cent. The COVID-19 case fatality rate stands at 1.45 per cent.

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
67th All India Cooperative week celebrated in Namchi

There has criticism of low claim ratios and profits earned by insurance companies including private insurance companies based on incomplete data which leads to unfounded criticism of the scheme. Later when the complete data for the season was available, the claim ratio went up substantially. To address the problem of gaps in data in the public domain Agriculture Ministry has been releasing the season wise data every month to ensure that experts can do analysis of the performance of the scheme on the basis of the most recent data.

On analysing data for Public and Private Insurers for the period of three years (2016–17 to 2018–19) for which majority of the data has been received, claim ratio stands at 98.5% and 80.3% for Public and private companies respectively. For kharif 2019, as CCE data has not been received from states of Gujarat, Jharkhand and Karnataka and Rabi 2019–20 data is pending from half a dozen states, final claim ratio for all companies including private companies for 2019–20 is bound to increase significantly on receipt of pending data.

made to allocate work to Insurance Companies for a period of three years which will average out any volatility in terms of high/low claim ratio seasons and will act as an ideal period for the analysis of scheme in terms of claims paid by insurance companies with respect to premium collected.

The primary driver of premiums is the unavailability of historical yield data at granular level and discrepancies on account of human errors in computation /calculation and recording of yield data. Technology based yield estimation through a robost arithmetical model incorporating Satellite imagery, gridded weather data and soil moisture data can go a long way in moderating the premium rates and stabilising the scheme implementation.

Agriculture Ministry has initiated large scale prominent Government, International and private technical agencies and it is expected that a technology based protocol for yield estimation would be in place in next 1 to 2 years. That would lead to a paradigm shift in implementation of crop insurance schemes and would meet the needs of small holder farmers in the long run.

Mr Bhushan, at a press meet today, clarified that the goal is to work towards a critical mass of vaccinated people that would break the chain of transmission.

The national expert group on vaccine administration headed by Dr VK Paul has given a mandate one of which mentions that it is not necessary to vaccine those with already formed antibodies, Mr Bhushan said.

Dr Balram Bhargava, the chief of Indian Council of Medical Research, the country's nodal organisaton for the battle against COVID-19, agreed. "If we are able to vaccinate critical mass of people and break the virus transmission, then we may not have to vaccinate the entire population".

"Many other nations are looking into whether they need to deliberate when one has already developed antibodies from a prior covid infection before vaccinating him. Does he have enough antibodies? There has been no final decision on this. But this is a topic of discussion among scientific community and other nations," Mr Bhushan said.

Vietnam reports 1st local infection in 89 days

HANOI, DEC 1 (AP): Vietnamese authorities are conducting intensive contact tracing after discovering the country's first confirmed local transmission of the coronavirus in 89 days.

State media said Tuesday that a 32-yearold man in Ho Chi Minh City tested positive for the coronavirus on Monday after visiting a flight attendant who was undergoing self-quarantine at his home following his return from Japan two weeks ago.

The flight attendant tested positive on Saturday, the Tuoi Tre newspaper said.

Health authorities ordered 137 people who had been in close contact with the man to stay in a central quarantine facility and shut down an English center where he works as a teacher, the newspaper said.

The new case ended Vietnam's streak of 89 days without any known local transmission of the

Earlier, it went 99 days without local trans missions until a cluster of cases broke out at a hospital in Da Nang in central Vietnam in July.

Vietnam's borders remain closed in an attempt to keep out the virus. Only limited international flights are operating to repatriate Vietnamese nationals and transport foreign diplomats and experts.

The country has reported 1,347 coronavirus cases, including 35 deaths. Nearly half of the confirmed cases were imported, according to the Health Ministry.

In other developments in the Asia-Pacific region: Coronavirus quarantine restrictions will continue in the Philippine capital during the Christmas season in Asia's largest Roman Catholic nation.

President Rodrigo Duterte said in televised remarks late Monday that the general community quarantine will continue during December in Metropolitan Manila and seven other cities and provinces.

The restrictions ban large public gatherings, in-person school classes and entertainment businesses, but allow shopping malls, restaurants and essential stores, including barbershops, to operate with required safeguards.





Self Determination

Encourage involvement, even forcefeed it to nourish democracy

If one were to take the 1857 Sepoy Mutiny as the beginning of Indian revolt against British rule and aspiration for self determination, then it took the nation ninety years of struggle to achieve it. Compared to that, Sikkim's democratic aspirations were realised much faster. Barely three years of struggle in the final push saw it get incorporated into the Indian democratic institution. Yes, there is the whole merger/ annexation debate, but maybe more on that some other time.

As for democracy, it was perhaps in disbelief of the ease with which it came about that even though more than four decades have passed since, one still hears whispers that the democracy sown in 1975 is yet to get institutionalized or become an instinctive condition. If this is true, then either the democratic institution itself is flawed or the Sikkimese have still not realised what self-expression is all about. Forty-five years is after all a long time to get used to something. Of course, neither of these contentions is entirely true. The Sikkimese electorate did after all elect nine governments and displace three in the ballot when it got the chance and felt the need. Politics is hotly debated in the villages and concerns, whether justified or unfounded, are voiced openly, and often even belligerently. The size of the ruling and Opposition benches in their original composition after each election is also something that should excite political observers. A majority of the elections - besides the aberrations of 1989, 2004 and 2009 - have sent relatively evenly balanced Assemblies to five-year-terms in Sikkim. An absolute majority for one party has almost always been balanced by a reasonable Opposition.

How this composition changed midterm ever so often is there for all to see. If anyone has failed democracy, it has to be the leaders, one would surmise. Sikkimese democracy could have been even more vibrant had floor-crossing not started with the first democratically elected Assembly in 1979 itself. That set the trend and from then onwards, it became a routine which continues to this day. A contributing factor to this has been the involvement of the State Government in all spheres of activity - developmental, social and day-to-day. Belonging to the Opposition cut-off constituencies from the developmental loop [or at least put the fear of getting cut off]. Realignments were forced almost as soon as the election verdict was declared and was facilitated further by the general lack of ideology among the politicians. Politics in Sikkim came to mean about being in 'power'. While every politician should aspire to be in office, they should be held accountable for the means they adopt towards that end. That said, floor-crossing is not something that can be banned either, because there can be valid and important reasons prompting it. That should be the aspect that is highlighted in more detail than the established routine of superficial explanations and excuses. If this is done, it reflects a semblance of respect for the electorate because in its absence, the decision becomes a unilateral one, something which a public representative should not be imposing on the people. But then, these are days of unilateral diktats with Delhi itself setting the tone That does not excuse it though, and democracy in Sikkim would be served well if its leaders explained themselves in proper detail more often than the appeals/claims they make of being earnest.

It would also help India and its leaders and Sikkim and its leaders if the government started reducing its role in the public domain. The leaders are there to frame policies, not run our lives. But they do so increasingly and have now taken the involvement to new levels of control with the powers usurped in the name of COVID-19. What the State should do more consciously, especially in the wake of a change in government and unprecedented challenges, is to make decentralization more genuine. Devolution of power to the panchayats will make governance more intimate and accountable. Start from there because it is an already promised by policy commitment and then ensure that all social, community, sports, school and whatever other collective has a formal association, hold proper elections. Discourage the practice of unopposed elections because while that might work well to "keep things together" they compromise democratic expression, and that has to be an involvement which is force-fed at every level or democracy will end up malnourished.

By declaring a climate emergency Jacinda Ardern needs to inspire hope, not fear

There is no question that we must act, and act fast, on climate change. This week's climate emergency declaration by the New Zealand government acknowledges the urgency of the climate crisis and the need to collectively confront it.

But a declaration is not the same as action. Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern has been frank that the declaration is a symbolic gesture: "It's what we invest in and it's the laws that we pass that make the big difference."

In saying this, she echoes the sentiments of some local councils during the first wave of climate emergency declarations in mid-2019.

For all that, it is wrong to imagine a declaration will make no difference at all. Language has power. Words like "emergency" have an impact in the real world, especially when endorsed by political leaders.

Political language frames how we interact with one another and the planet, and how we imagine our collective future. In that respect, the consequences of such emergency declarations — with their attendant sense of panic and fear — remain unsettlingly vague.

WHAT DOES 'EMERGENCY' MEAN?

On one hand, a declaration is a way for campaigners to hold the government to account. For the young people in the School Strike 4 Climate movement who made an emergency declaration a key demand, it may prove a moment of inspiration and empowerment.

If it is taken as a sign that social movements can effect political change, reset the agenda and compel governments to listen, the declaration could embolden efforts to hold the government to its word — and to implement the laws and investments that will deliver emission reductions and adaptation to climate risks.

On the other hand, the politics of emergency come with baggage, established in precedent and law, by which ordinary political processes are suspended to expand state power.

AN UNSETTLING LEGACY

It's important to recognise that this notion of

emergency politics, like the idea of climate emergency declarations, was imported to Aotearoa New Zealand. It is another example of New Zealand's "fast follower" approach to climate policy.

The low-emissions transition has accelerated under Ardern, but largely by way of policy transfer from the UK and EU, not by homegrown innovation. The climate emergency concept made a parallel journey via



social movements such as Extinction Rebellion.

Yet the state's emergency footing, where ends justify extraordinary means, is inherently problematic in the context of recent colonial history. Legislation such as the Public Works Act, for example, empowered the Crown to compulsorily acquire land for infrastructure development — land often owned by Māori.

A climate emergency might only be symbolic, but its language carries this legacy of alienation and disenfranchisement. Moreover, it risks reviving those imperialist tendencies, by treating processes of consultation and consent as impediments to urgent action.

WHERE DOES DEMOCRACY FIT?

Emergency is also risky to democracy, especially when the crisis is not temporary but long-lasting, as the climate crisis is. Although many climate campaigners prioritise justice and equity as essential to the low-emis-

sions transition, others treat democracy as a barrier to climate action rather than a vehicle for it.

The emergency response to the Christchurch earthquakes is a case in point. Limiting civic participation in the rebuild led to public ambivalence over the results, which were too often determined by the interests of the state rather than the aspirations of local communities.

Of course, it isn't inevitable any tyrannical urges will be unleashed. Arguably, the meaning of climate emergency is still to be determined. From one angle, it is a blank page, an empty signifier, which means nothing in particular.

But the flipside is that the term has a surplus of meaning — that is, it means many things to many people. Some of these meanings are not easily dismissed, including those that conflict with justice.

THE LONG EMERGENCY

Campaigners for a climate emergency will continue to use this language to ratchet up ambition, but they should be aware of these tensions. If a climate emergency is to be compatible with other ideals like democracy and decolonisation, then it must be fought for on those terms.

For example, the School Strike 4 Climate demands a climate emergency declaration must "uphold our democratic values and obligations under Te Tiriti o Waitangi".

If climate change is an emergency, it is a "long emergency". It has taken decades, even centuries, to create — and will take comparable timeframes to undo. It requires us to reimagine the structures of our societies, cities, economies and our politics.

If Aotearoa New Zealand is to shift from being a follower to a leader or pioneer in climate governance, it must involve local knowledge, especially Māori knowledge and leadership, to respond in ways that reflect our local circumstances.

If action is to be sustained over years and decades, it requires behaviour that springs from hope, not fear.

Conflict between Tigray and Eritrea – the long standing faultline in Ethiopian politics

The missile attack by the Tigray People's Liberation Front on Eritrea in mid-November transformed an internal Ethiopian crisis into a transnational one. In the midst of escalating internal conflict between Ethiopia's northernmost province, Tigray, and the federal government, it was a stark reminder of a historical rivalry that continues to shape and reshape Ethiopia.

The rivalry between the Tigray People's Liberation Front and the movement which has governed Eritrea in all but name for the past 30 years – the Eritrean People's Liberation Front – goes back several decades.

The histories of Eritrea and Ethiopia have long been closely intertwined. This is especially true of Tigray and central Eritrea. These territories occupy the central massif of the Horn of Africa. Tigrinya-speakers are the predominant ethnic group in both Tigray and in the adjacent Eritrean highlands.

The enmity between the Tigray People's Liberation Front and the Eritrean People's Liberation Front dates to the mid-1970s, when the Tigrayan front was founded in the midst of political turmoil in Ethiopia. The authoritarian Marxist regime – known as the Derg (Amharic for 'committee') – inflicted violence upon millions of its own citizens. It was soon confronted with a range of armed insurgencies and socio-political movements. These included Tigray and Eritrea, where the resistance was most ferocious.

The Tigrayan front was at first close to the Eritrean front, which had been founded in 1970 to fight for independence from Ethiopia. Indeed, the Eritreans helped train some of the first Tigrayan recruits in 1975-6, in their shared struggle against Ethiopian government forces for social revolution and the right to self-determination.

But in the midst of the war against the Derg regime, the relationship quickly soured over ethnic and national identity. There were also differences over the demarcation of borders, military tactics and ideology. The Tigrayan front eventu-

ally recognised the Eritreans' right to self-determination, if grudgingly, and resolved to fight for the liberation of all Ethiopian peoples from the tyranny of the Derg regime.

Each achieved seminal victories in the late 1980s. Together the Tigrayan-led Ethiopian People's Revolutionary Democratic Front and the Eritrean front overthrew the Derg in May 1991. The Tigrayan-led front formed government in Addis Ababa while the Eritrean front liberated Eritrea which became an independent state.

But this was just the start of a new phase of a deep-rooted rivalry. This continued between the governments until the recent entry of prime minister Abiy Ahmed.

If there's any lesson to be learnt from years of military and political manoeuvrings, it is that conflict in Tigray is unavoidably a matter of intense interest to the Eritrean leadership. And Abiy would do well to remember that conflict between Eritrea and Tigray has long represented a destabilising fault line for Ethiopia as well as for the wider region.

RECONCILIATION AND NEW BEGINNINGS

In the early 1990s, there was much talk of reconciliation and new beginnings between Meles Zenawi of Ethiopia and Isaias Afeworki of Eritrea. The two governments signed a range of agreements on economic cooperation, defence and citizenship. It seemed as though the enmity of the liberation war was behind them.

Meles declared as much at the 1993 Eritrean independence celebrations, at which he was a notable

But deep-rooted tensions soon resurfaced. In the course of 1997, unresolved border disputes were exacerbated by Eritrea's introduction of a new currency. This had been anticipated in a 1993 economic agreement. But in the event Tigrayan traders often refused to recognise it, and it caused a collapse in commerce.

Full-scale war erupted over the contested border hamlet of Badme in May 1998. The fighting swiftly spread to other stretches of the shared, 1,000 km long frontier. Air strikes were launched on both sides.

It was quickly clear, too, that this was only superficially about borders.

It was more substantively about regional power and long standing antagonisms that ran along ethnic lines.

The Eritrean government's indignant anti-Tigray front rhetoric had its echo in the popular contempt for so-called Agame, the term Eritreans used for Tigrayan migrant labourers.

For the Tigray front, the Eritrean front was the clearest expression of perceived Eritrean arrogance.

As for Isaias himself, regarded as a crazed warlord who had led Eritrea down a path which defied economic and political logic, it was hubris personified.

Ethiopia deported tens of thousands of Eritreans and Ethiopians of Eritrean descent.

Ethiopia's decisive final offensive in May 2000 forced the Eritrean army to fall back deep into their own territory. Although the Ethiopians were halted, and a ceasefire put in place after bitter fighting on a number of fronts, Eritrea had been devastated by the conflict.

The Algiers Agreement of December 2000 was followed by years of standoff, occasional skirmishes, and the periodic exchange of insults.

During this period Ethiopia consolidated its position as a dominant power in the region. And Meles as one of the continent's representatives on the global stage.

For its part Eritrea retreated into a militaristic, authoritarian solipsism. Its domestic policy centred on open-ended national service for the young. Its foreign policy was largely concerned with undermining the Ethiopian government across the region. This was most obvious in Somalia, where its alleged support for al-Shabaab led to the imposition of sanctions on Asmara.

The 'no war-no peace' scenario continued even after Meles's sudden death in 2012. The situation only began to shift with the resignation of Hailemariam Desalegn against a backdrop of mounting protest across Ethiopia, especially among the Oromo and the Amhara, and the rise to power of Abiy.

What followed was the effective overthrow of the Tigray People's Liberation Front which had been the dominant force in the Ethiopian People's Revolutionary Democratic Front coalition since 1991.

This provided Isaias with a clear incentive to respond to Abiy's overtures.

TIGRAY'S LOSS, ERITREA'S GAIN

A peace agreement between Ethi

A peace agreement between Ethiopia and Eritrea, was signed in July 2018 by Abiy and Eritrean President Isaias Afeworki. It formally ended their 1998-2000 war. It also sealed the marginalisation of the Tigray People's Liberation Front. Many in the Tigray People's Liberation Front were unenthusiastic about allowing Isaias in from the cold.

Since the 1998-2000 war, in large part thanks to the astute manoeuvres of the late Prime Minister Meles Zenawi, Eritrea had been exactly where the Tigray People's Liberation Front wanted it: an isolated pariah state with little diplomatic clout. Indeed, it is unlikely that Isaias would have been as receptive to the deal had it not involved the further sidelining of the Tigray People's Liberation Front, something which Abiy presumably understood.

Isaias had eschewed the possibility of talks with Abiy's predecessor, Hailemariam Desalegn. But Abiy was a different matter. A political reformer, and a member of the largest but long-subjugated ethnic group in Ethiopia, the Oromo, he was determined to end the Tigray People's Liberation Front's domination of Ethiopian politics.

This was effectively achieved in December 2019 when he abolished the Ethiopian People's Revolutionary Democratic Front and replaced it

with the Prosperity Party.

The Tigray People's Liberation
Front declined to join with the visible
results of the current conflict.

Every effort to engage with the Tigrayan leadership – including the Tigray People's Liberation Front – in pursuit of a peaceful resolution must also mean keeping Eritrea out of the conflict.

Unless Isaias is willing to play a constructive role – he does not have a good track record anywhere in the region in this regard – he must be kept at arm's length, not least to protect the 2018 peace agreement itself.

Fulham overcome penalty woes to inflict surprise defeat on Leicester



LEICESTER, 01 DEC (REU-TERS): Fulham fixed their penalty jinx as Ivan Cavaleiro's spot kick eased them out of the relegation zone with a shock 2-1 win at high-flying Leicester City in the Premier League on Monday.

Scott Parker's struggling side were leading thanks to Ademola Lookman's well-taken 30th minute opener before Cavaleiro beat Kasper Schmeichel from 12 vards.

There was huge relief on the Fulham bench when Cavaleiro netted as the London side had failed to convert their last three Premier League penalties.

Cavaleiro had missed

in their last game against Everton while in the game before that Lookman inexplicably attempted a 'Panenka' penalty against West Ham United -- his embarrassing miss costing his team a point.

Leicester dered their chance to join league leaders Tottenham Hotspur and Liverpool on 21 points in a disappointing display, although an 86th-minute effort by Harvey Barnes set up a tense finale. Fulham rode their luck in stoppage time as they held out for their second win of the season to climb to 17th place with seven points from 10 matches.

Things might have been different for Leicester had they not been denied by the woodwork twice in the space of seconds early on when Youri Tielemans's volley struck the post before Wesley Fofana thumped the rebound against the crossbar.

Fulham made the most of their luck to take the lead with a superb

counter-attacking goal. Andre-Frank Zambo Anguissa surged forward over the halfway line and slid the perfect pass through to Lookman who showed great composure to guide his shot past Schmeichel.

Lookman celebrated by going to the side of the pitch and raising a Senegal shirt of former Fulham player Papa Boupa Diop who died, aged 42, at the weekend.

Six minutes later Christian Fuchs clipped Decordova-Re-Bobby id in the area and after a VAR check a penalty

was awarded. Cavaleiro strode up and planted his kick high past Schmeichel who had no doubt reminded the Fulham man of his side's recent pathetic record from the spot.

"I was very pleased and relieved for Cav (Ivan Cavaleiro) that he scored. We've missed some big penalties and it's cost us some big points but we've scrutinised everything possible and I'm pleased it worked today," Parker said.

Leicester laboured to try and open up Fulham's defence after the break but Lookman could have avoided any late nerves when he fired a great chance at Schmeichel.

When Barnes thumped home it looked as though all Fulham's hard work might be undone but they breathed a sigh of relief as Leicester's Kelechi Iheanacho slipped when in a dangerous position at the death.

"We'll go away and analyse how we could be better but we can't dwell on it for too long," Leicester manager Brendan Rodgers said. "We've shown some good moments in the first 10 games, now we'll need to dust ourselves off."

Twelve infections were detected through rapid antigen tests and one during TrueNat tests, he said. Arunachal Pradesh now has 817 active coronavirus cases, while 15,411 people have recovered from the disease and 54 patients have succumbed to the infection to date, he said.

The state's positivity and fatality rates stand at 5.35 per cent and 0.33 per cent respectively, the official said.

The Capital Complex region, comprising Itanagar, Naharlagun, Nirjuli and Banderdewa areas, has the highest number of active cases at 586, followed by West Kameng (58), Lepa Rada (24) and Changlang (21), Jampa said.

The state has so far tested 3,59,123 samples for COVID-19, including 829 on Monday, he added.

Odisha medical colleges to reopen from Tuesday



BHUBANESWAR, NOV 30 (PTI): The Odisha government has allowed re-opening of medical colleges across the state from Tuesday, even as it authorised the School & Mass Education and Higher Education departments to decide on resumption of classroom teachings.

COVID-19 safety protocols will have to be followed in the medical

institutes. "All medical colleges of the state shall reopen with effect from 1st December, 2020. Medical college authorities shall follow all the SOPs/ guidelines with respect to social distancing and prevention of spread of epidemic issued by the central/state government, scrupulously," a government order said on Monday

The government asked the School and Mass Education Department to consult all stakeholders and decide on the date of re-opening of schools for classes from 9 to 12 in a graded manner.

Similarly, the Department of Higher Education was also authorised to take the decision about re-opening of colleges and higher education institutes in consultation with the relevant stakeholders, the order

It said that all academic, technical, skill development institutions - except medical colleges - will remain closed till December 31 or till such date as decided by the departments concerned.

Notwithstanding the closure of these institutes, the authorities can conduct examinations, evaluate answer papers and carry out other administrative activities, the order said adding that online distance learning shall be permitted and encouraged.

It said that all Anganwadi Centres will remain closed till December 31, and the arrangement for supply of ration to the beneficiaries must con-

On the opening of places of worship, the order said, "Local authorities like district magistrates, municipal commissioners may permit public worship in religious/ places of worship with appropriate restrictions, based on local assessment of the situation with regard to spread of

COVID- 19." Cinema halls, swimming pools, entertainment complexes, theatre, auditorium and similar places will continue to remain closed. However, open air theatres were allowed to function subject to compliance of safety protocols such as mandatory face masks and physical distancing.

Large meetings of members of associations, clubs, institutions and other organisations should be avoided till December 31, it said.



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Personal, pure and symbolic: Messi's perfect Newell's homage to Maradona

BARCELONA, 01 DEC [THEGUARD-IAN]: Lionel Messi could feel the weight of Diego Maradona's No 10 on his back. It was the final moment before kick-off in the 917th game of his career, the first without Diego, and Europe's largest stadium stood virtually empty and entirely silent. At each end of the ground, maternity hospital on one side and cemetery on the other, a picture of Maradona was projected on the screens, in the directors' box a man held a framed shirt, and on the pitch Barcelona's and Osasuna's players gathered around the centre circle where a floral offering was made, four days after his death. Among them, Messi looked at his feet, knowing there was something he had to do.

So he did. Ninety minutes later and with 18 left in the match, Messi scored the goal that gave him the opportunity to make an offering of his own. Barcelona were already three up, it wasn't the afternoon's best goal, not after Antoine Griezmann's volley had almost torn the net off, and it certainly wasn't the best of the 712 - seven hundred and twelve! - Messi has in a career which is reaching a close. But for a moment it felt like it might have been the most important, most meaningful of all. For a moment, he was taken back to where it all began, the circle completed, a legacy laid before everyone.

The ball hit the net and Messi's teammates came to him: first Ousmane Dembélé, then Óscar Mingueza, then the rest. He embraced them, smiled slightly, but wanted to be alone: just him and Diego. When at last he was, there was a solemnity, a simplicity to what followed, a humility that made it more heartfelt. Standing by the north end, the cemetery end, Messi pulled down the captain's arm band and the black cloth wrapped around it. Then he took off his Barcelona shirt, untucked the shirt underneath and carefully straightened it so it could be seen: half red. half black, with Yamaha written on the front and Zanella on the back,



above a No 10.

He reached to the heavens, towards God, and raised both arms. Then he crossed himself, picked up his Barcelona shirt and headed back towards the centre circle, where Antonio Mateu Lahoz was waiting with a yellow card. "Messi Cuccittini, Lionel Andres, was booked for the following motive," the referee's official report would say, "for taking his shirt off after scoring a goal to reveal another shirt: that of Newell's Old Boys from the 93/94 season with a No 10 on the back."

Messi could have chosen anything, or nothing: a message, a photo, a Barcelona shirt, an Argentina flag. Instead he opted for something that expressed the connection, something that brings them together even more than all that – which at times, in fact, may have served to push them apart.

Messi has not won a World Cup, nor reached the status Maradona has, the iconography, the emotional power. Maradona did not win what Messi has at Barcelona, nor reach his status in Catalonia: just a Copa del Rey, a league cup and memories tinged with regret, what could have been but for a broken leg and a hepatitis which might not

have been hepatitis. There were more goals than many recall – 38 in two seasons – and moments, like the applause from Madrid fans when he walked the ball in, cutting back on the goal line and sending Juan José sliding by like a cartoon character, clang!, into the post. But it ended with a pitch battle and defeat and a sense that it could not continue.

On some level, a tribute in a Barcelona shirt, the shirt in which Messi has eclipsed Maradona, might not have felt right. Even an Argentina shirt might not, the weight of expectation implicit in it. No one expected a Newell's shirt but it worked better. For Messi, certainly, it was more personal, purer: his homage, not some cold choreography. One that takes him to his childhood and places him at Maradona's feet, looking up. In the Camp Nou dressing room for a long time, there was only one picture on Messi's locker: a painting someone had given him of his son sleeping in red and black pyjamas, dreaming, as his father had, of playing for Newell's. Maradona actually did, even if it was only seven games.

Messi wasn't born when Maradona played at Barcelona. He wasn't alive when Maradona won

the World Cup, either. But he was there the day Maradona came to play for his team. He was only six and he can't remember it but he was in the ground with his dad Jorge when Maradona made his debut for Newell's Old Boys in October 1993, scoring the winner in a friendly against Ecuadorian side Emelec. It was Maradona's only goal for Messi's club, but it was enough. A connection had formed that only deepened, for good and bad, and was expressed on Sunday.

Not just expressed; rediscovered. Little gems were dusted off and given new meaning by the homage, and as each layer was peeled back, each fact recalled, each new detail added, the parallels and points of contact were made even clearer. With that, Messi's tribute became more powerful, more perfect, the symbolism deeper. Take the shirt, for example: not just a replica from the right era, Daniel Arcucci revealed in El Gráfico, but a shirt Maradona actually wore at Newell's. Not the first that was handed to Fidel Castro and is now in a museum in Havana - but a real one, given to him by a judge and a shirt collector named Sergio Fernández a couple of years ago. Fernández paid a fortune for

it; imagine what he would pay now for a match-worn shirt played in by both Messi and Maradona.

And if Maradona hadn't scored a goal in it, Messi now had.

Maradona's goal.

If Messi has watched Maradona's goal for Newell's many times since, you may not have seen it at all until Sunday, when suddenly it was everywhere. In it, Maradona runs across the front of the area from right to left, avoiding opponents, and then suddenly strikes the ball back in the direction he came from, cutting across it to send a superb shot, from left to right, high into the top corner. You may also have seen the goal Messi scored against Osasuna and dedicated to Diego. If you haven't, it goes like this: Messi runs across the front of the area from right to left, avoiding opponents, and then suddenly strikes the ball back in the direction he came from, cutting across it to send a superb shot, from left to right, high into the top

It is exactly like the only one Maradona ever scored for his team, as if he had continued the Lord's work, as if fate decided, as if this was one last tribute to Maradona. As if Messi had planned it that way, like he refused to score unless it was the perfect replica – and the absurd thing is that's almost believable. He could actually do that. What is unthinkable is the possibility that he hadn't scored, the tribute unshared. This after all is the man who already replicated the goal against England, and even the hand of God. If imitation is the sincerest form of flattery, no one paid greater homage to Maradona than Messi. On Sunday and every day.

There is just one flaw: the image has been flipped to make them look more alike. Maradona's is actually the other way around, with the other foot, heading in the other direction. But it doesn't matter: it remains a mirror image if not a carbon copy and even being a bit like Diego, a deity, is an impossibility. Or so everyone thought until Messi, at which point it became the expectation with which he had to live. If Maradona was omnipresent for most Argentinians, imagine for Messi in whose image he sometimes seemed to be made, in whose shadow he exists, an impossible task that he somehow, sometimes, made possible. It is quickly forgotten now, but there were many New Maradonas before Messi and none got close. Here at least, Messi exceeded him.

After the game, Messi posted the picture of himself with arms raised alongside Maradona in the same shirt and the same pose. Yet there is a photo, unplanned, that captures it better, better than words: one that is destined to become perhaps the iconic image to honour the greatest icon of all. It is a portrait of a reincarnation, a legacy passed on, a promise made. Messi dresses like Maradona, gestures like Maradona but as he pulls his Barcelona shirt on again cameras catch the moment from the back, like a superhero getting changed only this time they're both superheroes. In the picture, the two 10s are laid over each other, perfectly aligned as one, Messi's Barcelona shirt slowly coming down over Maradona's Newell's shirt until it is covered again, unseen but always there.

Does Maradona's greatness really have to stand in opposition to something else?

LONDON, 01 DEC [THEGUARDIAN]: It's a tribute, but there's more to it than that. It's a shirt, but there's more to it than that, too. For a fleeting moment, as Lionel Messi stands at the Camp Nou in 2020 wearing the No 10 jersey that Diego Maradona wore for Newell's Old Boys in 1993, past and present are aligned. Messi isn't just paying homage to Maradona; in that moment he is Maradona, two as one. Then, as if re-entering the earthly plane, he slips his Barcelona jersey back on and dutifully collects his yellow card.

So yes, here we are: another paean to Maradona, this time - usefully! - from someone who never actually saw him play. I have a few vague, pointless memories of the 1994 World Cup, a tournament at which I later learned Maradona was not - pharmaceutically speaking - at his purest vintage. But this isn't a personal history, or any sort of history, or really very much about Maradona at all. It's about football now; about magic and where you find it; about joy, and how you pass it on.

I'm writing this on a Monday morning. The death of one of the world's greatest footballers was announced on Wednesday evening. And yet already his name has disappeared from most of this country's leading sports pages, save for some ickyclicky stories about his personal doctor. Day five of the sun going out of the sky, and already newsrooms have decided this is no longer relevant.

You, find me a criminal angle. Police suspect foul play in sun disappearance. You, write me a culture war take. Did woke leftists cancel the sun? I mean, can we at least dwell on this a little? Do we ever actually mourn any more? Or do we merely consume, excrete, move on?

crete, move on? Perhaps the most peculiar and dissonant strain of Maradona tribute has been the sort that sees in his passing the disappearance of something larger and more important, that masks in an affection for the past a distaste for the present. We hear that today's game is too sterile, too corporate, too technocratic, too ubiquitous. We hear that Maradona represented an era of the game that is now gone for ever: an era of

boggy pitches, thrilling

lawlessness and unimaginable freedom. We are informed, with appropriate tutting, that both Maradona's goals against England in 1986 would have been ruled out by VAR.

Let me tell you how

all this sounds to a younger ear. We will never see another Diego Maradona! (This also applies, by the way, to everyone who has ever died.) The greatest! You can't possibly imagine the joy and the romance! Football will never be this good again! Lol, sorry you missed the best bit! Perhaps this is simply what the Maradona generation had to put up with from the Pelé generation, and no doubt what future generations will have to put up with from ours ("The thing about Messi, you see, was that he was incomparable, in ways you'll never grasp"). But it strikes me as a curious framing. Does Maradona's greatness really have to stand in opposition to something else?

Meanwhile, going for ever is just what eras do; indeed the very point of eras in the first place. The ball is different. The boots are different. The pitches are different, the tactics are different, the picture is different.

And yet it seems to me that to home in on the difference has always been a weirdly literal way of interpreting football, a sport that has never been defined by a single time, a single geography, a single aesthetic, but by plurality and flux.

"You can't possibly compare players across different eras", you often hear people saying: the 24-carat hallmark of someone taking themselves far too seriously. As it happens, you can't strictly compare players across different leagues, climates or bodies either. It doesn't matter. Nobody's asking you for a scientific standard of proof here. This isn't the Lancet. Now play the game, you intellectual coward.

Maradona, for his part, never seemed to succumb to any of this. The game was ugly then and is ugly now, and yet he never loved it any less, never stopped adoring football and footballers. adoring And on some level perhaps this was because Maradona recognised that football could never simply be some nostalgic museum piece, to preserve behind glass, to sanctify and weep

over. It lives. It breathes.

And when one part of

it dies, the light simply passes to another.

Because when you

strip away the artifice and projection, the game is the same. The ball is the same. The boots are the same. The pitches and the tactics and the meaning are the same. Most important, the joy is the same. It spreads and multiplies and diffuses. Perhaps this is why I found Messi's tribute on Sunday so strangely moving. It was acknowledgement an of a lineage, an inheritance, the debt we all owe the previous generation for the game they bequeathed.

From Maradona to Messi to the next guy (and there will be a next guy). Maradona dies, but Maradona lives. And not just in grainy video footage or selective memory, but in the joy he gave, the joy he passed on. Maradona lives in the dribbling of Messi and the vision of De Bruyne and the skills of Neymar and the guile of Sancho and the movement of Miedema and the speed of Mbappé and the cunning of Ronaldo. It's there in the park and the playground and the street and the imagination. It's all there.

Football needs to catch up and get its house in order over concussion

LONDON, **01 DEC** [THEGUARDIAN]: For too long football has played tiki-taka with the issue of concussion, rather than tackling it head on. It has been passed around from committee to committee, governing body to governing body, without the authorities facing up to its pernicious threat. Perhaps the recent deaths of Jack Charlton and Nobby Stiles will sharpen the focus.

What happened at the Emirates on Sunday certainly should. It was jolting enough to witness Wolves' Raúl Jiménez receiving oxygen and leaving on a stretcher with a fractured skull following a clash of heads with David Luiz. It was almost as worrying when the Arsenal man got up and carried on for another 40 minutes, despite blood oozing through his head bandages.

True, David Luiz passed all the required medical assessments. And the Premier League emphasises that doctors have a long list of clues they use to detect concussion, ranging from a "dazed, blank or vacant look" on a player's face to asking questions such as: "What team did you play last week?" Gone are the days when a dose of smelling salts was applied to the nostrils before the player was shunted back into action.

Even so, was it an unnecessary risk? Scientists have long since established that concussion symptoms do not always show up immediately after a head impact and that playing on can damage recovery. One study in the journal Pediatrics followed 69 high-school athletes who sustained head injuries in American football, ice hockey, soccer and volleyball and found that those who stayed on the field took twice as long to recover

(44 days compared with 22 days). There also remains a wearing sense that football is lagging behind both rugby codes as well cricket, the NFL and horse racing when it comes to head impacts. As Alan Shearer put it on Match of the Day 2: "We are talking about life and death."

He added: "Football needs to get real, it needs to wake up, it needs to get serious. Not next year, next month, now. It is not acceptable, it has been going too far too long."

In rugby union, it used to be regarded as a badge of honour to battle on, no matter how groggy the brain or bloodied the shirt. Attitudes have changed. Incidents such as Wales's George North appearing to be concussed twice in a Six Nations match focused minds – as did the year-on-year rise in the reported incidents of concussion in the Premiership from 2009-10 onwards.

Nowadays if there is any suspicion of a concussion then a player is removed from the pitch for a head injury assessment, which takes 10 minutes. If a player fails any of the cognitive tests, which are measured against a pre-season baseline, they are removed from play. The rules have also been changed in an attempt to make the game safer, particularly when it comes to tackling.

Rugby remains dangerous. Last year, a study in the British Journal of Sports Medicine found that on average, a professional rugby union player is more likely than not to sustain a concussion after 25 matches. But at least there is a sense of the authorities recognising the seriousness of the problem and trying to do something about it. Cricket's attitude to concussion also changed in 2014 after the Australia batsman Phil Hughes died after being struck on the back of the head.

Olympic rings back in Tokyo Bay; a sign of hope in pandemic TOKYO (AP): The five Olympic rings are back in Tokyo Bay.

They were removed for maintenance four months ago shortly after the Tokyo Olympics were postponed until next year because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The rings arrived on Tuesday after a short cruise from nearby Yokohama and are positioned on a barge in the shadow on Tokyo's Rainbow Bridge.

The rings — painted blue, black, red, green, and yellow — are gigantic. They stand about 15 meters tall and 33 meters in length — about 50 feet tall and 100 feet in length.

The rings will be lighted at night and herald the coming of the Tokyo Olympics, which are to open on July 23, 2021, followed by the Paralympics on Aug. 24.

The rings made their first appearance early in 2020, just a few months before the Olympics were postponed late in March.

The reappearance of the rings is the latest sign that organizers and the International Olympic Committee are increasingly confident that 15,400 Olympic and Paralympic athletes can safely enter Japan during the pandemic.

These Olympics are sure to be like no other.

They will hinge partly on the availability of vaccines and rapid testing for COVID-19, and on athletes and other participants following strict rules that could involve quarantines, a limited number of fans in venues, and athletes leaving Japan shortly after they finish their competitions.

Organizers have been vague about exactly how the Olympics will be held. Plans are in flux with dozens of COVID-19 countermeasures being floated involving athletes, fans, and tens of thousands of officials, judges, VIPs, and media and broadcasters.

Protocols should become clearer early in 2021 when decisions must be made about permitting fans from abroad, which will affect revenue from ticket sales.

The meter continues to run on billions in costs, with Japanese taxpayers picking up most of the bills. Reports in Japan this week say the cost of the postponemen t is about \$3 billion.

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As the virus resurges, mental health woes batter France

ROUEN, FRANCE (AP): The panicked 22-year-old is led to Consultation Room No. 2, with its easy-mop floor and honeycombed meshing over the window. Behind her, the psychiatric emergency ward's heavy double doors — openable only with a staff member's key — thud shut.

With anxious taps of her white sneakers, she confides to an on-duty psychiatrist how the solitude of the coronavirus lockdown and the angst of not finding work in the pandemic-battered job market are contributing to her maelstrom of anxieties. She is unnerved that she is starting to obsess about knives, fearful that her mental health might be collapsing.

"The lockdown — let's not pretend otherwise — worries me," the young woman explains through her surgical mask, as the psychiatrist, Irene Facello, listens intently.

"I want to be reassured," the woman says, "that I'm not going mad."

Forcing millions of people to once again stay home cutting them off from families and friends, shuttering businesses they invested in, university classes that fed their minds and nightspots where they socialized — has, for now, begun to turn back the renewed coronavirus surge in France that pushed it in November past the bleak milestone of 52,000 dead.

But the costs to mental health have been consid-

erable. With numbers now falling for French COVID-19 patients in intensive care, psychiatrists are facing a follow-up wave of psychological distress. Health authorities' surveying points to a surge of depression most acute among people without work, those in financial hardship and young adults.

The Rouvray Hospital Center in the Normandy town of Rouen is among places where psychiatrists are finding themselves on the front line of the pandemic's mental-health fallout. They are fearful that a growing crisis of depression, anxiety and worse may be on the horizon as more livelihoods, futures and hopes are lost to the pandemic. Associated Press journalists spent 10 hours in the sprawling 535-bed facility, the day after French President Emmanuel Macron laid out a blueprint stretching into mid-January for the gradual lifting of lockdown restrictions.

At the psychiatric emergency unit, as Facello sends the 22-year-old home with a prescription for anti-anxiety drugs and an appointment to see her again in two weeks, the double doors swing open

It is another young woman, aged 25, a linguistics student. She is steered to Consultation Room No. 1, where she sits silently in the gloom as

On the ward's whiteboard, which lists patients' names and details, an abbreviated initial diagnosis handwritten on a slip of paper uses acronvms to spell out how closely she may have brushed with the irreparable. For the past week, it says, she'd suffered "IDS" — suicidal ideas — and imagined "IMV," or voluntarily ingesting medicines.

The ward's chief psychiatrist, Sandrine Elias, gently teases out of the student how the lockdown has left her completely alone, with classes suspended.

It isn't the sole cause of her malaise. Elias learns that the young woman had a difficult adolescence, with suicide attempts. Isolation during the epidemic has only amplified the student's distress. In a quiet voice, she tells Elias that it "confronts us with ourselves."

"I'm a stay-at-home type of person, but this absolute constraint is a real weight," she says.

Elias promptly decides to hospitalize her. Supervised rest and medication, Elias determines, can help her through.

"You need a framework, to be taken into care. All alone, in your studio apartment, it's not possible," the psychiatrist says. "It's very good that you came here."

Not all of those seeking help have previous psychiatric histories. Mental health professionals say lockdowns and curfews have also destabilized people who, in less challenging times, might have talking them through with family and friends rather than ending up in psychiatric treatment wards.

"Being alone between four walls is terrible," Elias says. "The halting of life like this, it reverberates on people. It is not good."

Nathan, a 22-year-old student, came through the emergency ward two days earlier. The log book shows he was admitted at 5:20 p.m. and was moved that evening to a longer-stay unit.

There, in Room 14, he told psychiatrist Olivier Guillin that he'd sought emergency help "because I felt that my morale was declining very rapidly, that I was at the point of tipping over, with suicidal thoughts."

Similar thoughts had first laid him low in the summer, after France's initial lockdown from March to May. They struck again when the country was confined for a second time from Oct. 30. His university shuttered. His political science classes went virtual. Rather than be alone in his student flat, he moved back with his parents in Rouen, severed from his support network and ruminating on his uncertain future.

"The first lockdown didn't really have much of an effect on me," he tells Guillin, but the second one "really sank me."

The security of hospitalization and medication have quickly started to stabilize him. Resting on his bedside table was a Rubik's Cube that he'd solved.

Guillin, who heads several units at the hospital and has 200 medical staff working under him, says they are seeing a sharp increase in young adults seeking help with anxieties, depression, addictions and other difficulties. He's bracing for more.

"We'll very likely see the crest of the wave in the months to come," he says.

The pandemic has also had other mental health repercussions that are less evident but no less devastating.

Guillin still rues the death of a patient who killed herself during the first lockdown, 48 hours after what turned out to be their final appointment. She wore a mask to that meeting, to protect against the virus. It interfered with his reading of the depth of her distress, he says.

"She was a very expressive lady and there, with the mask, I incorrectly evaluated things," he says. "Retrospectively, I tell myself that perhaps, without the mask, I would have been more alert and done more." Patients have also been

Dutch climate activists take Shell to court over emissions

THE HAGUE, NETHER-LANDS (AP): A group of environmental organizations backed by thousands of Dutch citizens is launching a civil case Tuesday against the energy giant Shell, asking a court to order the multinational to commit to reining in its carbon emissions by 45% by the year 2030.

The legal battle led by Milieudefensie, the Dutch arm of Friends of the Earth, is the latest in a string of cases around the world in which activists are using the courts as a venue to fight for action to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from governments and companies.

A victory for climate activists in a Dutch courtroom could spur even more legal challenges.

"Everybody needs to pitch in if we are to tackle the climate crisis, especially big polluters like Shell. But Shell and its shareholders are not taking their responsibility, that's why we are taking legal action," said Nils Mollema of Action-Aid Netherlands, another group involved in the

Ahead of the opening of hearings at The Hague District Court, Shell said that it agrees with Friends of the Earth



cut emissions and has already invested billions of dollars in low-carbon technologies from wind power to electric vehicle charging. But it said the company cannot do it alone.

"What will accelerate the energy transition is effective policy, investment in technology and changing customer behavior. None of which will be achieved with this court action," Shell said in a statement to The Associated Press. The company said it has set "an ambition to be a net zero emissions energy business by 2050, or sooner."

Under the 2015 Paris climate change agreement, the European Union's greenhouse gas emissions target is a reduction by at least 40% case, which has more than 17,000 claimants, follows in the footsteps of a groundbreaking 2015 court ruling — later upheld by an appeals court — that ordered the Dutch government to cut the country's greenhouse gas emissions by at least 25% by 2020 from benchmark 1990 levels.

Dutch Prime Minister Mark Rutte responded by saying: "I can guarantee we will do everything we can to achieve the goal." But it remains to be seen if the target will be met by year's end.

The Urgenda and Shell cases are similar because they are based in part on a duty of care enshrined in Dutch law.

Not all climate cases are successful. Last threw out a lawsuit by three farming families who had taken Chancellor Angela Merkel's government to court and argued that it wasn't doing enough to tackle climate change.

Roda Verheyen, a German lawyer who brought that case but is not involved in the Dutch case, said the outcome of the civil case against Shell could have repercussions for businesses around the world as it poses questions about how businesses balance their bottom line with their duty of care responsibilities.

"The Shell case taken by Milieudefensie and others is the first to actually do this in court," she said. "So whatever comes out will be very interesting. I think you could say globally."

Iran's parliament advances bill to stop nuclear inspections access to the internation-

TEHRAN, IRAN (AP): Iran's parliament Tuesday advanced a bill that would end U.N. inspections of its nuclear facilities and require the government to boost its uranium enrichment if European signatories to the 2015 nuclear deal do not provide relief from oil and banking sanctions. The vote to debate the bill, which would need to pas through several other stages before becoming law, was a show of defiance after the killing of a prominent Iranian nuclear scientist last month.

The official IRNA news agency said 251 lawmakers in the 290-seat chamber voted in favor, after which many began chanting "Death to America!" and "Death to Israel!"

The bill would give European countries three months to ease sanctions on Iran's key oil and gas sector, and to restore its al banking system. The U.S. imposed crippling sanctions on Iran after President Donald Trump unilaterally withdrew from the nuclear agreement, triggering a series of escalations between the two sides.

The bill would have authorities resume enriching uranium to 20%, which is below the threshold needed for nuclear weapons but higher than that required for civilian applications. It would also commission new centrifuges at nuclear facilities at Natanz and the underground Fordo site.

The bill would require another parliamentary vote to pass, as well as approval by the Guardian Council, a constitutional watchdog.

The bill was first tabled in parliament in August but gained new momentum after the killing of Mohsen Fakhrizadeh.


