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'Vikram' lander tilts after hard hit, but unbroken: *ISRO*

BENGALURU, SEP 9 (PTI): The 'Vikram' lander lies on the lunar surface as a single piece, unbroken and it is in a tilted position following a hard landing while efforts to re-establish link with the probe were on, an ISRO official said on Monday.

Vikram, which encases rover 'Pragyan' went out of contact during its final descent, when it was just 2.1 km above the lunar surface, in the early hours of September 7.

"The lander is there (on lunar surface) as a single piece, not broken into pieces. It's in a tilted position," an ISRO official associated with the mission claimed.

Though the lander hit the surface hard while landing, it was still very close to the scheduled touchdown site as per the images sent by the orbiter's onboard camera, he said.

"We are making allout efforts to see whether communication can be re-established with the lander," the official said.

"An ISRO team is the on the job at ISRO Telemetry, Tracking and Command Network (IS-TRAC)," he added.

Chandrayaan-2 comprises an orbiter, lander (Vikram) and rover (Pragyan).

The mission life of the lander and rover is one lunar day, which is equal

to 14 earth days. ISRO Chairman K Sivan had said on Saturday that the space agency would try to restore link with the lander for 14 days, and reiterated the resolve on September 8 after the orbiter's camera spotted it on the Lunar surface.

An ISRO official said chances of restoring link with the lander were bleak since its system functionality was a prerequisite to achieve that. turn to pg02

WORLD SUICIDE PREVENTION DAY

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Suicide numbers continue to remain worrisome, understanding even more so

Poday, 10 Sept, is World Suicide Prevention Day and the right time to look at the challenge of suicides that Sikkim has been facing for many years now.

Sikkim lost 572 lives to suicide between 2016 and 2018 and has been among the top three states of the country when it comes to high suicide rates for the past many years.

What is particularly unfortunate is the fact that a majority of the victims fall in the 18-45 years age group, the most productive years of life.

As per police records from 2016 to 2018, 401 of the 572 suicide victims were in the 18-45 years age group.

The second highest number of 96 suicide victims fell in the age group of 45-60 years.

51 persons aged below 18 suicides have been attributed to years took their own lives between 2016-2018 while 24 were aged above 60 years.

Records also show that suicide is more prevalent among males with 412 males completing suicide in the last 3 years.

The highest number of 273 suicides was reported from East district while West recorded 161 suicides between 2016-18. South recorded 125 suicides and only 13 were reported in North Sikkim.

Determining the cause of suicide has always been a challenge and Sikkim has been slow to take up this challenge with inquiry into the reasons behind the high suicide rate in the State being few and far between.

This is made evident by the fact that 'unknown' is the top cause of officially recorded reasons for suicide in Sikkim. 212 18003453225/03592-202111.

SBI cuts loan, deposit prices again; chairman says expect more

MUMBAI, SEP 9 (PTI): The largest lender SBI on Monday slashed its lending rates by 0.10 percent for the fifth time since April and signaled towards more softening ahead, as the government and Reserve Bank try to push up the sagging growth with cheaper loans.

The bank described the move to slash both deposit and loan prices as a result of the excess liquidity in the system as well as it, and the falling interest rate scenario.

It can be noted that system-wide bank credit and deposits have been hovering around 12 percent since the beginning of the year.

This is the fifth rate cut by State Bank this fiscal, and takes the quantum of the decreases to 0.40 percent, yanking down its one-year benchmark rate to 8.15 percent. The cuts are effective Tuesday. The bank has cut its marginal cost



cent and the one-year MCLR, to which its key loans like home mortgages are aligned, stands at 8.15 percent now. The same one-year

MCLR of its private sector rivals ICICI Bank and HDFC Bank stands at 8.30 percent and 8.35 percent, respectively.

The bank has also cut the retail term deposit rates by up to 0.25 percent, and the bulk term deposit rates by up to 0.20 percent.

Speaking to PTI on e sidelines of an event.

bank chairman Rajnish Kumar said there will be further "softening" in the rates by the bank going forward, and affirmed its commitment to support the economy till there is credit demand.

The bank's moves in the future will also be dependent on the calls which the Reserve Bank takes at its next review in October, he said.

For the RBI, the rate call is a function of the movement in inflation, Kumar said, adding it is "under control" at present. Kumar said the a cumulative 110 bps economy needs a de-

mand-side stimulus at present, and made clear that interest rates will not go up. It can be noted that the RBI is peeved at lenders for not passing the entire quantum of its rate calls to final borrowers, while the banks claim it generally takes time for liabilities to repriced before the transmission can happen.

As a solution, the RBI has made it mandatory for all lenders to have their lending rates linked to an external benchmark like the repo rate, at which it lends to the system.

SBI has a majority of its deposits and loan products now linked to external benchmarks.

However, it can be noted that lending rates are still much higher than the RBI's repo rate of 5.40 percent-- which is at a nine-year low after in four successive moves, the central bank cut the repo rates by since February

"Unless and until everything is intact (in lander), it's very difficult (to re-establish contact). Chances are less. Only if it had soft-landing, and if all systems functioned, then only communication can be restored. Things are bleak as of now."

Another space agency official, though felt that chances did exist for restoring link, however, listed the limitations involved.

Recalling ISRO's experience of recovering a spacecraft that went out of contact in the geostationary orbit, he said the lander's case was dissimilar.

In the case of Vikram, "that kind of operational flexibility is not there," since it is already on the lunar surface and it cannot be reoriented, he said.

A vital aspect is positioning of antennas and these have to be pointed towards either the ground station or the orbiter, he said.

"Such an operation is extremely difficult," he said adding "we will have to keep our fingers crossed." The official said, however, the lander's generating

power was not an issue since it had solar panels all around it and encompasses internal batteries as well which are not used much.

Vikram carried three payloads--Radio Anatomy of Moon Bound Hypersensitive Ionosphere and Atmosphere (RAMBHA), Chandra's Surface Thermo-physical Experiment (ChaSTE) and Instrument for Lunar Seismic Activity (ILSA).

Dr Teruo Higa: The Pioneer of Effective Microorganisms The world is currently facing a time of usually collected several strains all in the same bucket competitiveness and develop a new way of life based



great change and upheaval. I believe this condition has arisen mainly because of our present civilization becoming increasingly structured along the lines of competitive principles. An excessive reliance on competition certain-

ly does not excite feelings of generosity and sharing." (Teruo Higa, 1996).

The world today and Sikkim in particular is quite **▲** familiar with the term Effective Microorganisms or EM technology. When Sikkim commenced its Organic Mission in 2003, EM Technology developed by Prof. Higa at the EM Research Organization (EMRO), Japan and provided through Maple Orgtech Inda Ltd. became a part of this mission. Today EM is a familiar name to most of the farming community at Sikkim.

The seed of what was to become EM germinated when Dr. Higa was researching mandarin oranges for his doctorate in Horticulture at Kyushyu University Graduate School. It was there that he realized the potential of microorganisms in agriculture and this discovery took his research in a new direction.

In those days, orange farming relied heavily on agricultural chemicals. Dr. Higa was interested in microorganisms but advocated of the use of chemical fertilizers and pesticides because, with his farming experience, he knew that farming was extremely labor intensive, especially the production of good compost. While he was involved in growing oranges, he noticed an overall decline in his health and he started to break out in rashes. His symptoms got progressively worse as he continued to work in proximity with agro-chemicals. That experience deeply influenced his thinking and he made microorganisms the main focus of his research. However, in those days it was common to work with only one type of microorganism at a time and there were many different types of microorganisms to test. His research generated no results of any significance even after five years of hard work.

After he returned to University of the Ryukyus in Okinawa, he continued his research with safe and harmless microorganisms only. For this reason, he in order to dispose of them at the end of the day. One day, he felt it was such a waste to flush these strains down the drain, considering their costs, and decided to sprinkle them on a patch of grass instead. A week later, an obvious difference was noticed on the spot. The growth of grass was significantly better than the grass around the spot. As none of his students did experiments on that spot, he was certain that that mixture of several different types of microorganisms he sprinkled was the cause of the difference. That was when he realized that the key was the combination of microbes.

After many trials and errors, Dr. Higa discovered an optimal mix in 1980 that promoted healthy plant growth and coined the name "EM 1" for that group. EM 1 is a soil conditioner that can be used on gardens or crops. The soil conditioner creates healthy soil to allow plants and vegetables grow to their maximum potential. EM 1, is a liquid bacterial product that is made up of three main microorganisms. These microorganisms are Yeast, Photosynthetic Bacteria, and Lactic Acid Bacteria. All products using EM Technology contain EM 1 in some part of their manufacturing process. Dr Higa's development of EM has brought him international recognition and now he provides guidance and assistance in the application and research of EM around the world.

One of the most fundamental beliefs in Dr. Higa's philosophy is that "the essential condition for human happiness is the ability to do what one really loves, whatever that may be, throughout the course of one's lifetime." (P. 327, Teruo Higa, An Earth Saving Revolution)

In order for human society to prosper, it is essential that the environment, food supplies and medical treatment be considered the common property of every man, woman and child on earth. Once we are able to establish a system by which this may be accomplished, humanity will move closer to a state of truth and people will attain greater maturity, receive veneration as they get older and be able to serve as assets of society. In order to attain such a state, it is necessary that human kind abandon its penchant for

on coexistence and co-prosperity.

He insists that authentic technologies, including EM products, have the power to overcome many problems associated with a competitive society and help make a society based on co-existence and co-prosperity come true.

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CBI moves court for summoning Kalyan Singh in Babri Masjit demolition case LUCKNOW, SEP 9 (PTI): The CBI on Monday moved a special court here trying the Babri masjid demolition conspiracy case involving former Deputy Prime Minister L K Advani and other BIP stalwarts, for summoning former Rajasthan Governor Kalyan Singh to stand trial in the case.

The investigative agency moved the court weeks after the 87-yearold leader quit the governorship, a constitutional post which offered him immunity from the trial for conspiracy in the Babri Masjid demolition case.

The court accepted the CBI application after ascertaining from the agency that Singh, also a former Uttar Pradesh chief minister, is no longer holding any constitutional position.

As the trial is being conducted on a day-today basis, the CBI application may be taken up for adjudication on September 11.

The other BJP leaders, who are facing trial in the December 6, 1992 demolition case include Muli Manohar Joshi and Uma Bharti.

In its application, the CBI submitted to the court that Kalyan Singh had been was charge-sheeted in the case in 1993.

It added the Supreme Court in its April 19, 2017 had said that Kalyan Singh, who was the chief minister of Uttar Pradesh when the Babri Masjid was demolished in 1992, could not be made to face trial as an accused owing to the constitutional immunity granted to governors under the Article 361 of the Constitution.

The apex court, however, had allowed the CBI to seek his summoning as an accused as soon as he would cease to be a governor.

Terrible on Terror

No plan, not even a specific law to combat

Tomorrow is 9/11, that infamous 9th of Sep-I tember, 2001, when terrorism became a truly global enemy. While most are not comfortable with USA's aggressive ways post-9/11 and the continuing failure of that approach, there is no denying the fact that the crackdown on international terrorism has been strong in the past sixteen years. Nations, ignored for long by even their neighbours were all of a sudden finding themselves surrounded by sympathisers in the fight against homegrown extremists. Even Pakistan was forced to publicly crackdown on terrorist outfits it had sponsored in India, but as the years passed, new arrangements were made and exporting terrorism continues. There is pressure on Pakistan again, but that is also a passing phase and unless a comprehensive and unanimous approach is worked out to address terrorism, the problem is not going away anywhere soon.

Our country has suffered much in the hands of the dealers of terror. Countless lives, including two prime ministers, have fallen to their bullets. The assassination of the Father of the Nation was also an act of terror. And yet India seems to be the only country without a clear plan on terrorism. Its approach remains so uncertain that even though the state has had recourse to a draconian Act in Manipur for the past more than four decades it has failed to contain extremist activities there. A special Act is for extreme times; its life is supposed to be short and effectiveness quick and decisive. The Armed Forces [Special Powers] Act in Manipur is neither. Only the people seem to have suffered under it and yet the Centre is not willing to repeal or withdraw it. The Act has been universally thumbed down, and yet it persists, the irony being that it is modeled on the Armed Forces (Special Powers) Ordinance promulgated by the British on 15 August, 1942 to suppress the 'Quit India Movement'. The Ordinance was made into an Act by free India, and continues to be imposed on some of its own people, an embarrassment which has also given the nation the Iron Lady Irom Sharmila and her nearly two decade long hunger strike in protest against AFSPA.

But we digress here.

Even as the GoI persists with AFSPA, it is not even consistent in its hardline approach and remains a study in vacillation. The Centre is convinced that Manipur needs the Act for its own security, but does an about-turn on national security and delivers a situation where the country does not have an anti-terror law even as its leaders keep finding new groups to brand terrorists. India does not have any specific legislation in place to combat terrorism. This confusion in intent continues to defeat any attempt at curbing sponsored violence in the country. For a country which has grappled with terrorism in some form or the other ever since its inception in 1947, this is a completely indefensible position. But that is how things are and can be expected to remain till such time that our politicians keep themselves so busy settling personal and petty ideological scores that national issues keep getting deferred.

Genetic engineering and human-animal hybrids: How China is leading a global split in controversial research

If you want to conduct groundbreaking but con-Last tentious biological research, go to China. Last year, Chinese scientist He Jiankui announced he had created the world's first gene-edited human babies, shocking the world at a time when such practice is illegal in most leading scientific nations. More recently, US-based researcher Juan Carlos Izpisua Belmonte revealed he had produced the world's first human-monkey hybrid embryo in China to avoid legal issues in his adopted country.

Yet if China is fast becoming the world capital of controversial science, it is not alone in producing it. More babies produced using the "CRISPR" gene-editing technology are now planned by a scientist in Russia, where another researcher is also hoping to conduct the world's first human head transplant. And Japan has recently lifted its own ban on human-animal hybrids.

The world is rapidly moving towards a two-tier system of cutting-edge medical research, broadly divided between countries with minimal regulation and those that refuse to allow anything but the earliest stages of this work. The consequences of this split are likely to be significant, even potentially affecting your own access to healthcare.

The births of the CRISPR babies in China led to uproar among the scientific community, which criticised He Iiankui, and inspired calls for a halt in any CRISPR research on human embryos. In around 30 countries, gene editing of human embryos is already banned outright or at least tightly controlled. For example, in the UK only a handful of research groups have been granted a licence to conduct experiments, and certainly not with any aim of bringing an embryo to term.

But in most countries, things are less clear. The Chinese establishment was quick to condemn He's work and declare it illegal. And some commentators have made the point that, despite outside perceptions, Chinese science is far from unregulated. Yet the fact remains that He was able to conduct the work unimpeded, with evidence suggesting he may have even received state funding.

With a technology moving as quickly as CRIS-PR, many nations will not have had the time nor expertise to develop a comprehensive stance. As a result, it seems likely that we won't be able to avoid a two-tier system for this kind of research. Nations with developed regulation for biotechnology will be able to adapt more quickly and easily to the latest advances and put restrictions in place. Other states will scramble to keep up, leaving scientists to proceed without having to consider the ethical or social implications of their work. And that's assuming all governments want to restrict this kind of research, which they may not.

We have seen what happens when there is this kind of international disconnect with other biotechnologies. "Medical tourism" has become a boom sector within the healthcare industry. People travel from all over the world to private clinics that provide – or claim to provide – stem cell therapies unavailable in their home countries. There have been high-profile cases of people travelling from the US to Mexico in order to skirt national laws and access mitochondrial replacement therapy.

So it's safe to assume that those with the means to do so might try to access gene editing abroad when it's not available in their own countries, perhaps to avoid passing on a known heritable condition they carry. And with home DNA-testing kits becoming widespread (although not necessarily accurate), the number of people wanting to edit their genome before having children is likely to increase.

A lack of or loose medical regulations also tends to produce predatory clinics that charge huge amounts for what sounds like wonder cures but might be, at best, a sugar pill or, at worst, something actively harmful. And, perhaps worst of all, regulatory problems might contribute to destroying the reputation of promising developing medical technologies. The more nasty incidents that are attributed to an unregulated therapy, the less and less willing people will be to support legitimate medical trials.

This kind of two-tier system of medical regulation could also lead techniques such as gene-editing to become much more culturally accepted in some countries than others. Our society continues to struggle with xenophobia and racism, so we may also find prejudices and legal dilemmas developing for genetically engineered humans (never mind human-animal hybrids).

Would people born using technologies such as CRISPR be allowed to visit or emigrate to countries where their very creation was illegal? Would it be illegal for them to have their own children and spread their genetically altered genome? This kind of conflict between international human rights legislation and domestic policy is yet to be tested but could have grave consequences.

WORSENING HEALTH INEQUALITY

On the other side of the divide, if countries with strong regulations move too slowly to allow treatments that may be lifesaving or disability preventing, it could worsen health inequality. We already have serious global problems with distributive justice, the ways in which services or technologies are only accessible to the privileged. If a particular illness could be prevented through CRISPR, is it right that someone should have to risk their child developing the disease just because they cannot afford to travel to a country where the technique is legal?

Unfortunately, the obvious solution – internationally agreed standards and regulations - may be a pipedream. We have consistently failed to find global consensus on gene editing issues, just as with embryo research. Even if it is possible to reach common ground, developing and implementing mutually acceptable terms that are flexible enough to handle the inevitable further technological progress, will take many years. For now, proposals for concerted effort to keep track of gene editing research may be the best we can do.

It's difficult to predict what could happen in the meantime. But it seems likely that more and more gene editing and other controversial practices will take place in a variety of regulated and unregulated circumstances. Sadly, it may be the case that little progress is made until the types of problems outlined above become all too real.

What research reveals about drivers of antiimmigrant hate crime in South Africa

 $M_{\mbox{\footnotesize eign-owned}}^{\mbox{\footnotesize obs}}$ have attacked for- eign-owned businesses on the streets of at least three South African cities in recent days. This has caused outrage across Africa. There have even been retaliatory attacks. The South African government, under pressure to protect her large international migrant community, quickly defused the attacks.

Such attacks are not new. For more than two decades, this type of crime has bedeviled the country. There is growing frustration that so little has been done to stop it.

To combat anti-immigrant hate crime, we need to understand its drivers. Scholars at the Human Sciences Research Council have recently made new discoveries about the drivers of anti-immigrant hate crime in South Africa.

We found that a significant share of the general population hold anti-immigrant views and blame foreign nationals for many of the socio-economic challenges facing South African society. Yet there is little empirical evidence that immigrants are driving problems like crime or unemployment.

But beliefs about the role played by foreign nationals in the country clearly influence how people think about anti-immigrant hate crime. Anti-immigrant statements by politicians also feed into the problem.

TRACKING

Data from the South African Social Attitudes Survey, conducted annually since 2003, was used. The survey series consists of nationally representative, repeated cross-sectional surveys. It is designed as a time series and is increasingly providing a unique, long-term account of the speed and direction of change of public participation in anti-immigrant behaviour in contemporary South Africa.

Using this data, researchers have found that anti-immigrant hate crime is more widespread than previously thought.

Beginning in 2015, the following item was added in the survey questionnaire:

Have you taken part in violent action to prevent immigrants from living or working in your neighbourhood?

People may be disinclined to disclose this type of potentially incriminating information during faceto-face interviews. But community research suggests that the stigma attached to participation in xenophobic activities may not be as great as we may imagine. Still, the reader should be aware of this possible under-reporting of anti-immigrant behaviour

A minority of the South African adult population reported that they had participated in this form of anti-immigrant aggression. The share of the general public who admitted engaging in violence fluctuated within a very narrow band over the **ANTI-IMMIGRANT** period 2015-2018. This shows the

when reviewing the survey's results.

willingness of survey participants to respond to this question varies by only a small margin between the two periods. It also suggests a linear relationship between behavioural intention and attitudes.

The survey results demonstrate the ugly reality of violent anti-immigrant hate crime in South Africa. Although this is an important and dangerous type of prejudice, such crime is not the only form that xenophobia may take. Other forms of peaceful anti-immigrant discrimination are also

evident in South African society. Research has shown that more peaceful forms of anti-immigrant activities are often the first step in a process of escalation that leads to xenophobic violence. Past participation in peaceful anti-immigrant activity (such as demonstrations) was found to be a major determinant of this type of violence.

For this reason, we suggest in our study, "policymakers should consider non-violent anti-immigrant activities as early warning signs of forthcoming anti-immigrant hate crime."

CONCLUSION

One of the most troubling findings to have emerged concerned possible participation in anti-immigrant aggression among those who had not taken part before. More than one in ten adults living in South Africa reported in the 2018 survey that they had not taken part in violent action against foreign nationals - but would be prepared to do so.

This finding is quite disturbing

given that there may be under-reporting of the propensity for violent action. Anti-immigrant stereotypes were shown to be a robust driver of this kind of behavioural intention. This suggests that anti-immigrant attitudes could have a mobilising effect, spurring individuals towards acts of violent xenophobia.

The results of this study show that millions of ordinary South Africans are prepared to engage in anti-immigrant behaviour. So it is vital that the resources dedicated to combating xenophobia be equal to the size of the problem.

The South African government has a national action plan to combat racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance. The progressive measures put forward in the plan include immigrant integration, better law enforcement, civic education and increased immigrant access to constitutionally entitled rights.

Recent research suggests that many of these measures have a degree of public support. The plan was approved in March this year. If it's to work, it requires adequate resources and support from all sectors of South African society.

Instead of focusing on shortterm solutions civil society, foreign governments and the general public must work with the state to progressively implement this plan.

Scientists help farmers take up aromatic crops' cultivation in hilly areas

SEP DHARAMSHALA, **9 (PTI)**: Scientists are helping farmers in remote areas in the hills take up cultivation of aromatic crops to double their income under the CSIR Aroma scheme, officials said.

Cultivators been facing problems of non-remunerative turns and increasing incidents of crop loss due to wild and stray animals.

CSIR-Institute of Hi-Bioresource Technology (IHBT), Palampur Director Sanjay Kumar told PTI that aromatic crops are cultivated around the world for essential oils which earn a high revenue and are used in agrochemical, flavoring, perfumery and pharmaceutical industries.

Crops such as wild marigold, damask rose, lavender. rosemary, lemongrass and mushkbala are good for cultivation in marginal and waste lands.

"To promote cultivation of aromatic crops, a complete package of agro and processing technologies has been developed to help farmers realize the profits. Depending upon the quality and quantity of essential oil, they can earn a net profit of Rs 0.8 to 1.5 lakh per hectare annually," Kumar said.

He said the essential oil extracted from aromatic crops has a huge demand in perfumery, flavour and fragrance industry in India and abroad.

"During the last two years, CSIR-IHBT has brought more than 500 ha area under these crops. Cultivation of wild marigold has resulted in production of 7.6 tonne

of essential oil in Himachal Pradesh with revenue generation of Rs. 5.56 crore, benefitting 861 farmers," he said.

'To promote cultivation of aromatic crops for doubling farmers' income, small societies of progressive farmers have been formed in different states. Nineteen processing units have been set up for these societies for production of essential oils," Kumar said.

With CSIR-IHBT's efforts, Himachal Pradesh has become the largest producer of high-quality wild marigold essential oil in India, meeting the demand of perfume, flavouring, and condiment industries, he said.

The main wild marigold growing regions in Himachal are Bhatiyat and Salooni in Chamba district, Seraj and Gogardhar in Mandi district, Banjar in Kullu, and Rampur in Shimla district. Batote and Kishtwar in Jammu and Kashmir and Bageshwar and Nainital in Uttarakhand are also important wild marigold growing regions.

Journalist arrested after taking pictures of kids mopping school floor



AZAMGARH (UP), SEP 9 (PTI): Azamgarh district magistrate on Monday ordered a probe into the arrest of a journalist allegedly after he took photographs of some children mopping the floor in their school.

The journalist was arrested on false charges of extortion and obstructing public servants from discharging their duty, alleged a fellow journalist Sudhir Singh, who, along with other journalists met District magistrate N P Singh to apprise him of the alleged illegal arrest.

"No injustice will be meted out to the journalist. We will look into the matter," said Azamgarh DM N P Singh.

Singh also ordered a probe into the

Local journalist Santosh Jaiswal was arrested here last week on Friday after he took photographs of school children, mopping the floor and called up police to apprise them of the illegal practice by school authorities," said Sudhir Singh.

Singh said the police, responding to Jaiswal's call reached the school and took both the journalist and principal Radhey Shyam Yadav of the Oodpur primary school to the police station.

At the Phoolpur police station, the school principal lodged a complaint against Jaiswal on the basis of which an FIR was registered against him and he was arrested, said Singh.

The FIR No 237 registered on September 6, 2019 against the journalist quotes the school principal as saying that Jaiswal often visited the school and misbehaved with both male and female teachers and students and tried to persuade them to subscribe to the newspaper published by him.

Yadav said in the FIR that on the day of the incident Jaiswal came to the school and ordered some school children to mop the floor to facilitate him take their photographs.

Yadav said he objected to his act, following which Jaiswal fled the school premises leaving his vehicle there and later demanded money from him.

Sudhir Singh, who also met the Azamgarh district magistrate along with other journalists to complain against Jaiswal's arrest, refuted the charges against the arrested journalist.

Tripura: Three BSF jawans among five injured in clash

AGARTALA, SEP 9 (PTI): Three BSF jawans were among five people injured in a clash between the troops and local residents in West Tripura district, police said on Monday.

The incident occurred at Rayermura village near the India-Bangladesh border on Sunday evening.

"A BSF patrol detained three people who were allegedly throwing packets of some contraband items from the Indian side of the international border to Bangladesh at Rayermura village on Sunday evening," DIG of police, Arindam Nath said.

He said when the BSF personnel prevented the alleged smugglers from throwing the contraband items to Bangladesh, some villagers attacked the jawans and other local residents joined them. "The BSF jawans had to open two rounds of pump-action gun on the attackers, causing injuries to two of them,"

Nath said. The BSF personnel have lodged an FIR against the attackers, he said. BSF DIG, C L Belwa, confirming Nath's version, said that his jawans had opened fire on the villagers in self- defence from pump-action guns causing minor injuries to two of them.

Three BSF personnel, including a company commander, were injured in stone-pelting by the alleged smugglers, he said.

The injured persons were given first aid at Tripura Medical College.

TMC, CPI, NCP defend national party status before EC NEW DELHI, SEP 9 (PTI): why their 'national parthe EC amended its rules,

The CPI, TMC and the NCP on Monday urged the Election Commission not to take away their national party status, saying they should be given a fresh opportunity to improve their electoral performance.

They three told the Commission that they are old parties and have played a key role in national politics. Hence, their status should not be based on recent electoral performance only.

The parties had appeared before the Commission for a personal hearing on Monday.

Earlier, responding to a show cause notice, the three had told the poll panel that their national party status should not be revoked based on their performance in the Lok Sabha elections this year.

The Election Commission had earlier issued them notices asking ty' status should not be revoked following their performance in the Lok Sabha elections. The CPI is learnt to have said that after the Congress, it is the oldest party in the country which had been the principal opposition party in Lok Sabha.

The Left party said though it may not have fared well in the recent Lok Sabha elections, it has been in power in several states and has played a key role in strengthening the Constitution.

The TMC is learnt to have said that it was given national party status allowed to continue with it at least till 2024.


The CPI. BSP and the NCP were facing the prospect of losing their national party status after their dismal performance in the 2014 Lok Sabha elections as well.

However, they got a reprieve when in 2016 whereby national and state party status of political parties are to be reviewed every 10 years instead of five.

The Bahujan Samaj Party (BSP), which won 10 Lok Sabha in the last parliament polls, and some assembly seats, does not face the possibility of losing its national party status now.

According to the Election Symbols (Reservation and Allotment) Order, 1968, a political party can be recognised as a national party if its candidates secure at least six per cent of votes polled in 2014 and it should be in four or more states in Lok Sabha or assembly elections, and, in addition, it has at least four members in Lok Sabha.

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Rafael Nadal cherishes moment at US Open as clock ticks on golden career

m oments}$ finals of his career, Rafael Nadal sat exhausted in his seat as endorphins and adrenaline coursed through his body. Overhead on the big screen of Arthur Ashe Stadium, footage of all 19 of his triumphs played out one by one. The Spaniard stared upwards and thought of all the obstacles and injuries he had overcome, and then he wept.

Nadal's fourth US Open title marks another crowning achievement to an incredible year. He is now 27-1 in his last five events, with titles in Rome, Roland Garros, Montreal and New York, and is now the frontrunner to finish the year as world No 1.

Roger Federer stands only one grand slam away, yet whenever asked about the possibility of catching his great rival, Nadal issues the same mantra. "As I always say to you, and is true: I would love to be the one to have more [grand slams than Federer], yes, but you cannot be all day frustrated or all day thinking about what your neighbour has better than you. You have to be happy with yourself."

It is easy to forget how

arduous Nadal's path has been in recent years. He spent much of his 2018 season battling a constant stream of different injuries. He withdrew or retired from 11 of the 12 hardcourt events he played and, after ankle surgery at the end of the year, was forced out of the spring US hardcourt events Indian Wells and Miami with a hip injury. When he returned on his beloved clay in April, the constant blows had finally taken their toll. He said that incessantly worrying

about his body had sapped

his confidence dry.

Nadal went to Monte Carlo, a tournament he had won a record 11 times, and was humiliated in the semi-finals by Fabio Fognini. The next week, at his home tournament in Barcelona where the public worship him and the stadium court bears his name, he found that he could not play. The 33 year-old's anxiety was so crippling he retreated to his hotel room alone and considered if he should stop playing tennis for a while in order to refresh his mind. He decided to play on, and slowly the shackles fell away as he found his form again.

This summer has marked Nadal's first stretch of total good health in years. He is not as fast as he was at 20 years old, but he has adapted and improved. He flattens out his forehand more, he takes

the ball earlier and his matches are far more efficient. Over the past few years, his backhand has become a potent weapon in itself and his serve has improved immeasurably. Despite not playing to the best of his ability on Sunday night, Nadal kept his opponent, Daniil Medvedev, constantly guessing. He mixed

As Medvedev bore down on Nadal by recovering from two sets down and generating double break point at 1-0 in the fifth, the 33 year-old reacted by storming to the net behind his serve and executing a great half volley winner. His subsequent hold would prove the turning point

Nadal's tears were a reminder that it was a moment to cherish, because it will not last for ever.

"We have been here for 15 years almost," said Nadal. "At some point, these days, going to happen sooner than later that this era going to end. Is arriving to the end. I am 33. Novak is 32. Roger is 38. Andy is 32, too. The clock is not stopping. That's part of the cycle of life."

Root wants to stay on as England captain after Ashes blow

Jorginho edges Italy closer to Euro 2020 with Finland winner

TAMPERE (FINLAND), SEP 9 (AFP): Jorginho fired Italy to within touching distance of Euro 2020 with a spot-kick winner that beat nearest rivals Finland 2-1 on Sunday and maintained his side's perfect qualifying record.

Chelsea midfielder Jorginho's 79th-minute penalty in Tampere made it six wins from six for Roberto Mancini's side and sent them six points clear of the second-placed Finns in Group J, after in-form Norwich City striker Teemu Pukki had levelled Ciro Immobile's headed opener with a penalty of his own six minutes before.

With two teams qualifying from the group, four-time world champions Italy are flying high with a maximum 18 points with four qualifying games to play, nine points ahead of third-placed Armenia despite their thrilling 4-2 win over Bosnia and Herzegovina earlier on Sunday.

They could now secure qualification for the tournament, which kicks off in Rome next June, against Greece or Liechtenstein -- who surprisingly drew in Athens -- next month.

"The match against Greece could be the one that secures qualification and we hope the Stadio Olimpico will be as full as during the 1990 World Cup when we were young," said Italy coach Roberto Mancini.

Former Italy international Manci-



ni took over last year after the Azzurri's failure to qualify for the 2018 World Cup.

"There was a bit of suffering, but we dominated the game," he added.

"The lads did very well overall, although we had a few scares when it was 1-1.

However seven minutes later Italy were ahead again, with another penalty taken by Jorginho, after being fouled by Robin Lod.

The Brazil-born midfielder netted the winner to ensure all three points with just his second Italy goal, one that has all but booked his team's place at the Euros.

Malaria eradication possible by 2050, says Lancet report

LONDON, SEP 9 (PTI): The world may be able to completely eradicate malaria -- a deadly mosquito-borne disease -within the next 30 years, partly due to improved coverage of current interventions, according to a study published in The Lancet journal.

The study found that more than half of the world's countries are malaria-free today, encouraging discussions about completely eradicating the disease.

The report compiled by a diverse range of experts including malariologists, biomedical scientists, economists, and health policy experts, condenses available evidence with the latest epidemiological financial analyses and demonstrates that with the right tools, strategies, and sufficient funding, elimination of the disease is possible by 2050.

The authors used new modelling methods to predict how prevalent and intense malaria could be in 2030 and 2050.

Their analyses indicate that socioeconomic and environmental trends, together with improved coverage of current malaria interventions, will "lead to low levels of malaria that persist in pockets across roughly ten countries in equatorial Africa in 2050.

The report notes that communities plagued by malaria can choose to commit to a time-bound eradication goal with purpose, urgency, and dedication, instead of gradual efforts to reduce malaria, which comes with the constant threat of resurgence, and a steeping struggle against drug and insecticide resistance.

While global malar-

ia incidence and death rates declined by 36 and 60 per cent respectively since the year 2000, the advancements are threatened by recent plateaus in global funding, together with a rise of malaria cases in 55 countries across Africa, Asia and Latin America, says the report.

The authors also expressed concern about parasite and vector resistance to currently available drugs and in-

There are still more than 200 million cases of malaria reported annually around the world, claiming nearly 50,000 lives, according to the authors.

They add that malaria continues to trap countries in cycles of inequity, with 85 per cent of global deaths reported in 2017 progress, malaria continues to strip communities around the world of promise and economic potential. This is particularly true in Africa, where just five countries account for nearly half of the global burden," said Winnie Mpanju-Shumbusho, Co-chair of The Lancet Commission on malaria eradication.

To achieve eradication within the timeline, the Commission urges that specific and deliberate actions at country, regional and global levels must be taken -- with three ways to accelerate the decline in malaria cases worldwide.

First, the Commission suggests that the world must manage and implement current malaria control programmes better with improved use of existing tools -- what it calls the "software of eradication."

Second, it highlights the need for better "hardware of eradication" with the development and supply of innovative tools that can overcome the biological hurdles in coming from 29 nations. eradication. And lastly, in the collection, analysis, "Despite unprecedented the authors say that ma- and use of data about ma-

laria endemic countries and donors must provide more funds for ultimately eradicating the disease.

As the cost of ridding the world of the disease is unknown, the Commission suggests that an annual increase of about USD two billion would accelerate the progress.

The report emphasises the crucial role played by regional management approaches in eliminating malaria.

Eradication grammes, according to the report, should avoid being overly academic, and employ professionals from the world of implementation, rather than just research, adding that contributions from business schools and the private sector are crucial.

The authors note that training programmes should emphasise practical leadership and management skills which they say would create a global network of malaria eradication professionals over time.

The Commission also anticipates a revolution cade with profound effects on programme management and effectiveness.

Hong Kong tells US to stay out; students form protest chains

HONG KONG, SEP 9 (AP): Thousands of students formed human chains outside schools across Hong Kong on Monday to show solidarity after violent weekend clashes to push for democratic reforms in the semiautonomous Chinese territory.

The silent protest comes as the Hong Kong government condemned the "illegal behavior of radical protesters" and warned the US to stay out of its affairs.

Thousands of demonstrators held a peaceful march Sunday to the US Consulate to seek Washington's support, but violence erupted later in the day in a business and retail district as protesters vandalized subway stations, set fires and blocked traffic, prompting police to fire tear gas. Hong Kong's govern-

ment agreed last week

to withdraw an extradition bill that sparked a summer of protests, but demonstrators want other demands to be met, including greater democracy.

Protesters in their Sunday march appealed to President Donald Trump to "stand with Hong Kong" and ensure Congress pass a bill that proposes economic sanctions and penalties on Hong Kong and China officials found to suppress democracy and human rights in the city.

Hong Kong's government expressed regret over the US bill, known as the Hong Kong Human Rights and Democracy Act. It said in a statement Monday that "foreign legislatures should not interfere in any form in the internal affairs" of Hong Kong.

The government said

it was "very much in Hong Kong's own interest to maintain our autonomy to safeguard our interests and advantages under the 'one country, two systems' principle" after the former British colony returned to Chinese rule in 1997.

US House Speaker Nancy Pelosi said in a statement last week that Hong Kong residents deserve real autonomy and freedom from fear. She urged an end to police violence against protesters and said Congress looks forward to "swiftly advancing" the Hong Kong bill.

The unrest has become the biggest challenge to Beijing's rule since it took over Hong Kong, and an embarrassment to its ruling Communist party ahead of Oct. 1 celebrations of its 70th year in power.

Iran installing advanced centrifuges: UN nuclear watchdog

VIENNA, SEPT 9 (AFP): The UN's nuclear watchdog confirmed Monday that Iran was installing advanced centrifuges as the troubled 2015 deal with world powers over Tehran's nuclear programme threatens to fall apart.

International The Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) said in a statement that on September 7 it had "verified that the following centrifuges were either installed or being installed...: 22 IR-4, one IR-5, 30 IR-6 and three IR-6s".

The IAEA's confirmation comes a day after Tehran hit out at European powers, saying they

had left Iran little option but to scale back its commitments under the 2015 Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA).

The IAEA added in its statement that the centrifuges had been installed at Iran's Natanz facility and said "all of the installed centrifuges had been prepared for testing with UF6 (uranium hexafluoride), although

none of them were being tested with UF6 on 7 and 8 September 2019."

"In addition, in a letter to the Agency dated 8 September, Iran informed the Agency that it would reinstall the piping at two R&D lines to accommodate a cascade of 164 IR-4 centrifuges and a cascade of 164 IR-2m centrifuges," the agency's statement said.

World number two Nadal took the top prize of 3.85 million at Arthur Ashe Stadium and added to his US Open trophy haul from 2010, 2013 and 2017.

Nadal, who was in his fifth US Open championship match and 27th Grand Slam final, is the first man to claim five major titles after turning 30. But it took a supreme effort from the Spanish maestro, who nearly became the first player to drop the final after leading by two sets since Ted Schroeder in 1949. "This victory means a lot," Nadal said. "And the way it happened. It was hard to control the nerves. The nerves were so high after having the match almost under control." Nadal, who rose to 22-12 in five-set matches, only lost once at a Slam when up two sets, to Italy's Fabio Fognini in the 2015 US

of Federer's mark, Nadal moved one shy of the Open era record five US Open titles won by Federer, Jimmy Connors and Pete Sampras.

"A 19th Grand Slam title is something unbelievable, outrageous," Medvedev said.

Nadal, who won his only prior meeting with Medvedev in last month's Montreal final, stretched his win streak over Russians to 20 matches since losing to Nikolay Davydenko in the 2011 Doha semi-finals. Fifth seed Medvedev, 23, would have been the youngest men's Grand Slam champion since Juan Martin del Potro at the 2009 US Open. Medvedev, who will rise to a career-best fourth in the rankings, was a champion at Cincinnati and runner-up at Montreal, Washington and the Open. "His summer was one of the best summers I ever saw," Nadal said.

"People saw why he is already number four in the world." Medvedev, who saw his career-best 12-match win streak snapped, would have been the first Russian to win a Grand Slam title since Marat Safin at the 2005 Australian

Open and the first Russian to win the US Open since Safin in 2000. - Electric fifth set -

_____ On a knife's edge at 5-5 in the third set, Medvedev reeled off eight of the last nine points to force a fourth, breaking Nadal in the 12th game with a backhand winner.

Nadal was broken in the 10th game of the fourth set to force a fifth when Medvedev blasted a sterling backhand return winner.Nadal rescued three Medvedev break chances to hold in the second game of the fifth set, fired a backhand volley winner to break Medvedev in the fifth game and seized a 5-2 edge when Medvedev hit an overhead smash long.

Serving for the match, Nadal was broken when umpire Ali Nili issued Nadal a time violation for his first serve and the Spaniard sent his second long, the crowd booing Nili for his call.

Nadal squandered two break and match points in the ninth game as the drama intensified.

Again serving for the match, Nadal rescued a break point then hit a forehand drop volley for his third match point chance and Medvedev sent a forehand return long to end matters. Nadal screamed and fell to the court on his back in joy and exhaustion.
