GRC meets Governor seeking support for fact-finding commission to establish status of Darjeeling SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 02 DEC:

Gorkha Rastriya Congress called on Governor Ganga Prasad here at Rai Bhawan today and petitioned him to help create a cordial atmosphere to initiate the setting up a "fact-finding commission" by the Government of India to "clarify" the political and Con-stitutional status of the Darjeeling Hills as was assured by the Ministry of Home Affairs during GRC's earlier meetings with Ministry officials.

Addressing a press briefing after meeting the Governor, Subodh Pakhrin, the GRC chief convenor, informed that their 6-member delega-tion appraised the Governor about the need for such a commission to establish the status of the

Darjeeling Hills.
GRC is convinced that Darjeeling was absorbed into West Bengal purely for administrative pur-poses in 1949 and that it was never Constitu-tionally made an integral part of West Bengal.

GRC, it may be re-called, believes that Darjeeling belongs to Sikkim and that it should be re-verted to Sikkim from its present status as a part of West Bengal.

Workshop on National Building Code held at NIT Ravangla

RAVANGLA, 03 DEC (IP-R):A workshop on National Building Code was organized by the Institu-tion of Engineers (India), Sikkim State Centre in collaboration with Na-tional Institute of Technology, Sikkim at NIT campus Ravangla. The workshop was aimed to sensitize various stakeholders, including students and practicing engineers associated with the construction of buildings about the recent amendments made in National Building Code.

[Jadavpur University, Kolkata], Prof. DK Baidya [Jadavpur

nology Kharagpur], Er. S. Arun Kumar [Scientist-D, Bureau of Indian Standards (BIS), New Delhi], Er. Ashok Chettri [Divisional Engineer, Buildings and Housing [Divisional Department, Govt. of Sikkim] and Er. Guru Prasad Sharma & Er. Sajal Sarkar [Sikkim Manipal Institute of Technology, Majhi-tar] delivered their talks during the workshop, Dr. Anindya Biswas [Head, Department of Civil Engineering, NIT Sikkim] welcomed the participants in the programme.

Chairperson of the state centre and Additional Chief Secretary Govt. of Sikkim, GP Upadhyaya chaired the programme. In his address, he explained the way the earthquake affects the stability of the building with special reference to Sikkim condition.

Prof. Ghosh discussed various parameters, in-cluding dynamic analysis, and ductility which have been included in revised Building Code. Four virtues, including good configuration, seismic stiffness, strength and ductility have also been given due importance in the recent BIS codes. In his address, Prof. Baidya,

explained different challenges in Geo-technical Engineering. He also shared his experience about various consultan-cy projects and explained the ways and means to handles different hurdles in geotechnical engineering. Liquefaction poten-tial, a very important aspect, is also dealt with

care in recent BIS codes. Er. S Arun Kumar, Sci-

entist-D, BIS explained relevance of various codes revised recently. He explained how the revised codes will help to ensure safety and reduce difficulties in the compliance of the safety provi-sions while executing the construction projects. Er. Ashok Chhetri explained the checks and balanc-es adopted by various departments to ensure safety of buildings. He also narrated various aspects of revised building codes followed during execution of recent important projects includ-ing new hospital building and new building of Secretariat in Gangtok. Er. Guru Prasad Sharma and Er. Sajal Sarkar explained general philosophy adopted in all seismic codes and methods to identi-fy building structure showing distress and required retro-fitting.

The programme was attended by about 100 participants including engineers from Buildings and Housing Department and Human Resource and Development deand Development de-partment, represen-tatives from SMIT, ATTC and faculty members and stu-dents of NIT Sikkim.

The programme concluded with vote of thanks by the Prof. NS Chauhan, the organizing secretary of the workshop and honorary secretary of Sikkim State centre, The Institution of Engineers (India). On arrival at SKVIB Bhavan at Deorali, the Governor was received by Chief Executive Officer,



Remember Ayodhya, Learn From Sikkim

Places of worship can also bring people of diverse faiths together

the anniversary of a disturbing moment arrives As the anniversary of a distance of the anniversary of the passions, and one can expect more disgusting soundbytes now that elections are round the corner. 06 December marks the anniversary of that shameful winter day of 1992 in Ayodhya when an unresolved issue, older than Independent India, snowballed into the tragic demolition of Babri Masjid and pulled the entire nation into a vortex of communal violence. In the communal riots which came its wake, at least 2,000 lives, mostly Muslims, were lost. The downward spiral continues and throws up no victors, leaving behind only victims and an army of agent provocateurs propping up leaders in the wave of hate and paranoia that they lift.

The demolition, irrespective of what it achieved for political ambitions, left the nation scarred. It's now nearly two and a half decades since a 1.5 lakh strong mob stormed the mosque and pulled it down. The first title suit over the disputed land [a 47 acre tract] was filed in the Allahabad High Court way back in 1950. Several other suits and petitions followed and it was only in September 2010, sixty years later, that a verdict was delivered. Closure, even if it is only legal and not emotional, however continues to evade this issue and the verdict has since been stayed by the Supreme Court. The lesson is clear - matters of faith, even when packaged in dry legalese as a title suit, are best left out of the courts. These should be left for the believers to resolve. But when it comes to matters of faith and belief, politics monopolises the divisions and does not allow resolutions. The Babri Masjid was constructed in 1528 CE; the first officially recorded communal riots over it were in the 1850's, when, after seven years of such violence, the British fenced the area to divide the places of worship of the two faiths in question. The issue conflagrated again in 1949, when idols of Ram, Sita and Laxman were smuggled into the Babri Masjid and placed there. With the horrors of the Partition violence still fresh in everyone's minds, the Government sealed off the area. Since then, the issue has surfaced often and confrontation peaked in 1992 when the Babri Masjid structure was demolished by a mob. The destruction was a huge blow to our country's secular credentials and an oft-quoted incident used to fan passions and communal hatred by both sides. This is not an issue likely to be resolved any time soon and the latest political wind in the BJP sails appears to be a revisit different aspects inspired by the jingoistic nationalism that worked so well in 1992.

When one speaks of allowing the believers to resolve issues among themselves, the example one has in mind is the Guru Nanak Lama Sahib of Chungthang in North Sikkim. This institution has an interesting history. A Gurudwara sits alongside a plot which the Sikkimese believe to have been blessed by Guru Rinpoche during his travels here in the 8th Century CE. The field, marking in a way the northernmost extremity to which rice grows in Sikkim, is believed to grow paddy from the rice sprinkled there by Padmasambhava and there is a rock there with an eternal spring of holy water, again, bless ed by Guru Rinpoche. Sitting in the Gurudwara's porch is a gnarled tree, believed to have sprouted from Padmasambhava's walking stick. Given the reverence Guru Rinpoche commands in Sikkim, it was in a sparkling gesture of confidence and harmony that the Chungthang residents apportioned a plot in this sacred tract for the construction of a Gurudwara when the army personnel posted there required one. Admittedly, this sharing was not always amiable, but it was never confrontational or spiteful either. And the arrangement that was eventually worked out is a brilliant example of confraternity. When the Assam Rifles was moving out of Chungthang many years back, the fate of the Gurudwara worried ev ery mind, until, yet again, a remarkable resolution was worked out. The Gurudwara is now, in principle, the administrative responsibility of the Chungthang residents who used to sit on its prabandhak committee in what is loosely referred to as the Lama Committee [for a Gurudwara!]. This facility was of great service in the wake of the $18\,$ September Earthquake, accommodating a relief camp and operating an open kitchen, Sanjha Chula - a very Sikh concept and practice, for all. It continues to be a Gurudwara, one that calls itself "Guru Nanak Lama Sahib", and is managed and looked after by the Buddhist residents of Chungthang, who ensure that Granthis are hosted properly when they visit and that the prayers and sanctity of this Sikh place of worship is maintained. It is not whether the committee is effective or even functional, but the fact that the idea was mooted and promulgated which is praiseworthy.

This is a model of mutual respect that the rest of India could learn from on this anniversary of the Babri Masjid Demolition. Admittedly, Chungthang is a very small town and the Gurudwara there was never the nerve centre of communal politics. But it could easily have become one in the hands of more radical minds; but the people, the real believers, stepped up first and charted a more admirable course.

How to develop the mental health care that refugees really need

From the migrant caravan that has travelled across Central America, to the ongoing exodus from Syria, the plight of refugees has become a

There are currently more refugees and asylum seekers fleeing conflict and violence around the world than ever before. The media lays out the trauma of this forced migration on our screens: Children who have witnessed parents assaulted or murdered; families forced to leave everything behind as they risk their lives on over-crowded, un-

aworthy boats between Africa and Europe.

Most of these refugees end up stuck in camps for years, lacking basic necessities. Women and children face sexual or physical violence and human traffick-ing. The lucky ones make it to Canada — with a renewed sense of hope for a safer, better life.

When refugees arrive in Canada, they meet a alth-care system that is often ill-equipped to address their complex social and psychological needs.

Our research team at Western University, which included clinical project staff Rita Van Meyel and Heather Harder, assessed the preparedness of mental health care services in London, Ont., to meet the needs of immigrants and refugees, including those experiencing trauma. We explored staff experiences as well as resourc-es, supports and training for working across cultures and languages. We probed for relationships between the hospital and community agencies for examples of shared care.

Our findings, published in Public Health Reviews, are not reassuring. Health-care providers felt poorly prepared and supported to provide transcultural trauma-informed care.

COMPLEX HEALTH CHALLENGES

The events forcing people to flee, and their difficult journeys across dangerous terrain and hostile borders, can have a devastating effect on mental health, according to our respondents working with refugees in mental health.

The struggle to adjust and to establish a life in a new country can also be distressing, if not traumatizing. Many refugees face downward social mobil-ity as their professional credentials and experience are not recognized. Intergenerational and gender conflicts emerge, as families are assailed with pres-sures to assimilate. Deep-seated trauma is often buried under burdens with more immediacy.

Refugees need comprehensive social and psychological supports to overcome trauma and begin a healing path. But the fragmentation of mental health services leaves patients experiencing little to no coordination of care.

Refugees experiencing trauma who present with multiple complex health challenges often end up retelling their trauma story to several different care providers. In one of our focus group sessions, social workers noted that the poor coordination and information sharing between care providers



often meant that multiple people would each ask the same refugee patient to explain their trauma.

Universal problems of overcrowded spaces

and long waitlists, hallmarks of "hallway medicine," have repercussions throughout the health-

Many staff in mental health that we interviewed felt overworked, that they could never catch up with the demands of their complex caseloads. Our study participants noted that they often do not have enough time to develop the trust needed for a therapeutic relationship with their clients, particularly in the initial assessments of clients experienc-

TRAUMA EXPERIENCES ARE COLLECTIVE

Patient-centred care requires that patients can share their experience and expectations. Allowing them to tell their story and share their goals takes time. When care providers facilitate these personal narratives, it helps to identify what the real challenges are and to develop tailored solutions.

A psychiatrist with training and expertise in transcultural mental health emphasized in a research interview that the identification of trauma

and mental health itself is a culturally-biased process. How we express or understand mental health concerns varies across cultures and individuals.

A patient may take comfort in hearing the voice of their ancestor or muse, while the care provider calls it psychosis, and the family thinks they're

cursed. Building shared understandings take time.

Our health-care system is oriented to providing services for individuals. Many refugee families share a collective trauma experience. Their healing journey must also be a shared process.

Care providers must consider the impact of trauma on the whole family. At the same time, they must analyse how ach family member is coping through one-on-one time with a

BUILDING INTERDISCIPLIN-ARY PARTNERSHIPS

Our research suggests that the current bottlenecks in the system could be resolved with effective task shifting and in-terdisciplinary models of teambased care. A social worker shared with us that when they collect and share the family nar-

ratives with the mental health team, psychiatrists

can focus on treatment and recovery.

Staff told us they need time for training and access to resources around trauma-informed care. Care providers want skills for working in transcul-tural contexts, where services can integrate multiple cultural perspectives.

Although the Diagnostic and Statistical Manu-al (DSM5) now provides a guide for transcultural mental health assessments, care providers want a flexible approach and need sufficient time, allow-ing them to judge when patients are ready to share their stories

Such a skill set would in fact be valuable for working with anyone needing mental health support And let's face it, most visits to the hospital are due to a scare that leaves all of us feeling vulnerable.

Building trauma-informed skills and support-

ive community partnerships will result in better mental health services for everyone — based on the compassion and caring that we all crave in our time of need.

Why massive effort needs to be put into growing trees on farms

 $\mathbf{I}^{t's}$ now over 50 years since the world was first warned that resources were being used at an unsustainable rate. It has now been esti-mated that almost one quarter to one third of the world's land is degraded

Degradation refers to land that's lost nutrients, or has changed physically, and therefore produces less or supports less life. This is mostly caused by the loss of soil, changes in the quality of the soil, or changes to land cover – like trees being cut down.

About 20% of agricultural land and 40% of forests are degraded. Degradation reduces our capacity to feed a world population that will reach at least 9 billion people by 2050 and it destroys ecosystem services - like the supply of clean water. Also when soil is degraded and trees destroyed, the carbon they contain is released into the atmosphere. Having high levels of carbon in the atmosphere is a major cause of climate change.

Because a great deal of land has been changed to produce food, agroforestry, the practice of deliberately introducing trees into farms, is an important way to restore degraded

have tremendous commercial and ecological value.

Because of this, agroforestry is increasingly being recognised as practice, supporting nine out of the 17 sustainable development goals the global action to end poverty and protect the planet.

Unfortunately policymakers have not yet caught up. Very few agricultural policies around the world promote agroforestry and few agricul-tural universities and training insti-tutes include it in their syllabuses.

This needs to change if agrofor-estry is going to be widely adopted across all farms to meet local and global challenges of food production, environmental protection and the alleviation of climate change

PROTECTING TREES AND SOIL

Trees are vital to a healthy and balanced environment as they store carbon – trees hold three quarters of the carbon found in agricultural land which affects climate change, and protect soil. Soil supports the growth of plants, also stores carbon and is key for nearly all agricultural production.

The international community has

recognised this and is in a battle to restore degraded forests. Countries have pledged to restore about 170 million hectares of land worldwide.

These are massive commitments and the question is where the efforts can be placed and land will be found.

The International Union for Con-servation of Nature has identified 160 million hectares of land, in 26 countries, with restoration potential.

But most of these areas will be "mosaic" land where trees would need to grow within managed, mainly agricultural, landscapes. The reason is very simple: most of the forest that has been lost has been transformed into agricultural land, and that land won't be recovered as long as the de-mand for food continues to grow. If we need more trees, many will have to be introduced into managed agri-cultural mosaic landscapes.

Fortunately, trees can be valuable and profitable parts of agricultural systems. They provide timber, food and fuel. They make soils more fertile, and protect the ecosystem services that agriculture depends upon. Trees on farms bring immediate benefits to farmers and contribute 17% of gross income in tree-growing households in sub-Saharan Africa.

SLOW UPTAKE

Increasing tree cover on farms is more than an ambition, it's already happening around the world, especially on smaller, mixed farms. Recent research shows that 45% of farms worldwide have more than 10% tree cover.

But, for its part, mainstream agri-culture – still tends to ignore the need to plant trees and there are two reasons for this.

Firstly, agroforestry as a modern approach to farm production and land management – in contrast to agroforestry as a traditional farming practice - is a relatively new idea, dating back only to the 1970s. Agriculture and forest institutions around the world have been slow to

adapt themselves.
Secondly, agroforestry gets lost between agriculture and forestry ministries and departments, often hosted in one institution and ig-nored by the other. This precludes the joining of forces of different spe-cialists needed to push the agenda of trees on farms.

Some countries are breaking this trend. India, for example, has developed a pioneering national agroforestry policy, supported at federal level, funded down to state level and with incentives for state universities to reform their agricultural syllabuses to include agroforestry.

Last week, CPI(M) councillor Bilquis Begum had moved the Calcutta High Court, challenging Hakim's election on the ground that he was not a councillor from any ward of the civic body. The high court on Friday re-

fused to stay the election.

The ruling TMC has 122 seats in the KMC House, the Left Front 14. the BJP five, the Congress two, while one seat remains vacant. Sources said one TMC councillor gave Monday's election a miss due to ill health.

Hakim, who is also the urban development and municipal affairs minister, was chosen as the mayor designate by Trinamool Congress (TMC) councillors, following Sovan Chatterjee's resignation from the post.

Chatteriee visited the KMC headquarters in New Market area of the city to cast his vote

Talking to media after the announcement of the results. Chatteriee extended his best wishes to Hakim. "I am sure the KMC will function well under the leadership of the new mayor."

Nine NDFB(S) cadres arrested in Arunachal

ITANAGAR, DEC 3 (PTI): In a joint operation by the Army and police of-ficers, nine cadres of out-lawed NDFB(S), including a teenager, have been arrested from Jairampur in Arunachal Pradesh.

The rebels were infiltrating into India from their training camp in Myanmar when security forces apprehended them Sunday, Director General of Police SBK Singh said.

A huge cache of arms and ammunition, includ-ing pistols and AK- 56 rifles, were recovered from

their posession.

"Acting on a tip-off, a joint team of Red Horns Division of Assam Rifles and Jairampur Police ambushed the National Democratic Front of Bodoland (Songbijit) rebels on their infiltration route," Singh said, adding that the operation has dealt a "body blow" to the militant outfit.

Fake encounter in Assam: CIC threatens penal proceedings against Home Secretary

New Delhi, Dec 3 (PTI): The CIC has given a "final opportunity" to Union home secretary Rajiv Gauba to produce records related to alleged fake encounter in Assam last year, reported by then CRPF IG Rajnish Rai, before initiating penal proceedings against him for "obstructing" the flow of information.

Irked by the stance of the Home Ministry to not present records for the Central Information Commission's perusal, the statutory body said since the decision in the matter has "undoubtedly" been taken at the highest level, the Secretary of the Ministry of Home Affairs is desig-nated as deemed Public Information Officer (PIO).

"A final opportunity is granted to the MHA to produce relevant records of the case. The Union Home Secretary shall produce the relevant records before the Commission in person or through his authorised representative on December 19, 2018 failing which, ex parte decision shall be announced," the order said.

The Commission also said that in

case records are not produced penal proceedings can be initiated against him for obstructing the process of "adjudication of the Commission and causing obstruction to the flow of information. "Under the RTI Act, no records can be withheld from



this Commission under any pretext, the order said. It said the CIC has statutory power and the same has also been acknowledged by the Su-preme Court. "The unusual resistance exhibited by the MHA in producing the records before the Commission cannot be countenanced and the Commission perceives the same to be a direct onslaught on the RTI regime," it said.

It said contention of the MHA on the applicability of relevant clauses under Section 8(1) of the RTI, which

exempts certain information from being made public under certain conditions, is still not concluded and the Commission has not yet decided on the same.

"Apart from a bald assertion made by PIO, MHA, there is nothing on record to substantiate the argument of NHRC/ Assame SHRC having ruled out violation of human rights. No records or findings from any court of Law are produced before the Commission," it said.

The Commission clarifies that

genuineness of an encounter killing/ extrajudicial killing and allegation of human rights violation are two dis-

"Lawful justification of extrajudicial killing cannot be confused with the right of citizenry to know the truth," it said.

The matter pertains to an RTI ap-plication seeking to get a copy of the report filed by Rajnish Rai, the then CRPF IG. Rai has alleged in the report that a joint team of the Army, the As-sam Police, the CRPF, its jungle warfare force Sashastra Seema Bal (SSB) conducted the encounter on March 29-30, 2017 in Simlaguri area of Chirang district and killed what they called were two insurgents of the banned group NDFB (S). The copy was denied by the CRPF claiming that its an exempted organisation under the RTI Act.

The applicant had said even if it is an exempted organisation, the information held by it pertaining to allegations of human rights violation is not covered under that exemption.

Agreeing with the view of the applicant, the Commission said the information will not come under blanket exemption to the CRPF from RTI Act and asked for the report to adjudicate whether it attracts Section 8 of the transparency act.

The CRPF then said the report was with the Home Ministry.

The Home Ministry in spite of repeated orders to produce the report did not comply and later claimed the information was not held by it.

"Denial of information to appellant cannot be a ground to deny a record to the CIC. Irrespective of the outcome of the present appeal, there is nothing to fetter power of the Commission to call for any record in process of adjudication of present appeal," the Commission said in its latest order.

the fish caught in Pava-na Dam, about 17 cm in length and weighing 2.5 kg, as the 'alligator gar', which is called so due to its resemblance to the American alligator, par-ticularly the broad snout and long, sharp teeth.
"Upon being alerted

by local fishermen, we took the view of fish experts who confirmed that it was the alligator gar. It is carnivorous and kills other fish in the water body it inhabits," said A M Gadwal, a section engineer at Pavana Dam. "The experts told us

that it is an exotic fish found exclusively in North America," Gadwal added. Fisheries Devel-opment Officer Janak Bhosale confirmed the find and said the 'alligator gar' can adversely affect the bio-diversity of the water body as it tends to kill other fish for surhave been apprised of the issue and have been told to alert the Fisheries department if they come across these fish again.

Speaking on how the exotic fish might have found its way into Pavana Dam, Bhosale said, "It is possible someone may have brought this fish to keep in an aquarium. He may have later released it into Pavana Dam."

The fish, according to experts, can adapt to water bodies with different levels of salinity and is an ambush predator using stealth and strategy rather than speed to kill

Speaking specifically about the first Test, Hazlewood said early breakthroughs will hold the key.

"If we can make some early inroads in this first Test, it's always crucial and the first innings. If we can get on top of them early, hopefully that will filter through the rest of the Test."

India have been touted as favourites against Australia in the absence of the banned batting duo of Steve Smith and David Warner but Hazlewood said it would be an even contest.

"I think it's pretty even. They're obviously number one Test team in the world but we play some good cricket at home. So I think it's very even heading this," he said

"With our bowling attack we're very confident and based on last year, we had quite a good template there and it worked pretty well (in the Ashes). So we'll be looking to replicate that and test it against one of the best batting orders in the world."

Women continue to occupy only 1 in 10 seats in LS despite high success rate in 2014 polls: book

New Delhi, Dec 3 (PTI): The success rate of women candidates in 2014 general elections was higher than that of their male counterparts, yet women in India still occupy just over 1 in 10 seats in Lok Sabha, notes a new book.

Titled "Women Mem-

Titled "Women Members in the Indian Parliament", the book edited by Shirin M Rai and Carole Spary, demonstrates the barriers faced by women in accessing the lower house of the parliament.

house of the parliament.

"(In 2014) ... 9.3 per cent of women candidates (were) successfully elected (or 62 out of 668 women candidates) in comparison to 6.3 percent of men candidates (or 481 out of 7,577 candidates)," the book said.

The women's presence in the Lok Sabha at present is around 12 per cent, which is only 7 per cent, which is only 7 per cent higher than what it was in the first general elections in 1951 when there were 24 women members out of a total 489 MPs. The Lok Sabha has 545 seats including the two seats for Anglo-Indians nominated by the president.

In 2014 general elections, 62 women were elected to the 16th Lok Sabha, to a house of 543 seats, or just over 11 percent. It further rose to 66 in 2015 as a result of bye-elections and nominations bringing women's presence to around 12 per cent.

Of the two largest national parties, according to the book, Congress has historically nominated a greater proportion of women, and over time BJP's nomination of women has also in-

creased

However, the BJP in 2014 nominated fewer women candidates than in 2009 (44 in 2009 to 37 in 2014). In contrast, the Congress nominated a higher number and proportion of women candidates: 59 women in 2014 compared with 43 women in 2009.

women in 2009.

And even though the number of women contesting the elections has increased considerably, "from 355 in 2004 to 556 in 2009 and 668 in 2014", the book sates that men have still been constituting the "majority of candidates" -- 92 to 93 per cent in the last three general elections.

"In the general elec-

"In the general election of 2014, women represented 8.1 per cent of total 8,251 candidates contesting for 543 seats, an increase of only 1 per cent over the previous two elections when women constituted around 7 per cent of all candidates," said the book quoting the Election Commission of India (ECI) data.

The proportion of women among total candidates has remained relatively the same because the number of male candidates had also risen in 2014 elections it added

2014 elections, it added.

That said, the book, observed that women are nominated in greater proportion in the SC and ST category seats, compared to general seats.

"In the 2014 election,

"In the 2014 election, though women candidates constituted only 8 per cent of candidates overall, they constituted 14 per cent of all candidates contesting SC reserved seats," it read.

Air pollution: NGT slaps 25 crore fine on Delhi govt

NEW DELHI, DEC 3 (PTI):
The National Green Tribunal Monday asked the Delhi government to deposit Rs 25 crore with the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB) for their failure to curb the problem of pollution in the city. A bench headed by NGT Chairperson Justice Adarsh Kumar Goel also asked the AAP government to furnish a performance guarantee of Rs 25 crore with the apex pollution monitoring body to ensure that there is no further lapse in this regard.

It said despite its clear directions, there is hardly any action for compliance of orders of the tribunal and pollution continues unabated in blatant violation of law and under the nose of the authorities "who have hardly done anything concrete except furnishing excuses and helplessness". The green panel said that even after more than four-and-a-half years, the complaint of the aggrieved parties is that the pollution caused by the unregulated handling of plastic continues to remain unabated.

The tribunal was hearing pleas filed by Mundka village resident Satish Kumar and Tikri-Kalan native Mahavir Singh alleging pollution caused by burning of plastic, leather, rubber, motor engine oil and other waste materials and continuous operation of illegal industrial units dealing with such articles on agricultural lands in Mundka and Neelwal villages. The tribunal had earlier directed the Delhi chief secretary to co-ordinate with the concerned municipal authorities and other officers responsible for compliance of orders of this tribunal already passed referred to ensure compliance at the ground-level forthwith.

MUMBAI, DEC 3 (PTI): Driven to despair by being offered a meagre 20 paise per kilogram for his brinjal production, a farmer in Maharashtra destroyed the entire plantation on his land to save himself from incurring further losses.

self from incurring further losses. Rajendra Bawake, from Sakuri village in Rahata tehsil of Ahmednagar district, claimed he earned only Rs 65,000 after investing Rs 2 lakh and putting in all his energy to cultivate the brinjal crop.

Frustrated with the low income, the distraught farmer uprooted all brinjal plants from his field and threw them away on Sunday.

"I had planted brinjal on two acres

of land and laid pipes for drip irrigation. I used fertilisers, pesticides and modern mulching techniques to enhance the production. The total investment came to around Rs 2 lakh. In return, I earned only Rs 65,000," Bawake told PTI on Monday. The cultivator said he now

The cultivator said he now owes dues worth over Rs 35,000 to fertilisers and pesticides suppli-



er. "I don't know how I am going to raise that money," he rued.

Bawake claimed that when he tried to sell his produce at the wholesale markets in Nashik (Maharashtra) and Surat (Gujarat), he fetched merely 20 paise per kg.

"This frustrated me, so I decided to destroy the entire plantation to save

myself from further loss," he said.

As a routine practice, the cultivator had been selling his produce

in cartons on a weekly basis.

"But I never got better returns in the last three-four months

and so, I decided to do away
with the plantation," he said.
Bawake said he rears three

cows at home and needs mon-

ey to buy fodder for the cattle.

"I had hopes from brinjal farming, but now I don't know how to

Notably, an onion-grower from Nashik district, who had to sell his produce for little over Re 1 per kg and fetched only Rs 1,064 for 750 kg of the vegetable, sent his earnings to the prime minister last month to mark his protest.

Several Social activists and political leaders had slammed the Union government on Friday, alleging it did not implement a "single major initiative" for farmers in the past four-and-a-half years and that demonetisation "worsened the agrarian distress" in the country.

At-risk nations to make case at UN climate summit

(AFP): Nations most threatened by rising sea levels and devastating droughts will use a UN summit in Poland on Monday to urge richer countries to pay their fair share in the climate change fight.

The presidents of at-risk states such as Fiji, Nigeria and Nepal are expected at COP24 talks, which aim to flesh out the promises agreed in the 2015 Paris climate accord.

But host Poland -- heavily reliant on energy from coal will push its own agenda: a "just transition" from fossil fuels that critics say could allow it to continue polluting for decades.

The Paris deal saw nations agree to limit global tempera-ture rises to below two degrees Celsius (3.6 Fahrenheit) and under 1.5C if possible.

Delegates from nearly 200 countries now have two weeks of negotiations to finalise how those goals work in practice, even as science suggests the pace of climate change is rapidly outstripping mankind's response. One of the key disputes is finance.

Under Paris, richer nations responsible for the majority of historic greenhouse gas emissions -- are expected to contribute funding that developing nations can access to make their economies greener.



But US President Donald Trump's decision to withdraw from the Paris accord has dented trust among vulnerable nations, who fear there is not enough cash available to help them adapt to our heating planet.

The World Bank on Monday announced USD 200 billion (175 billion euros) in climate action investment for 2021-25 - a major shot in the arm for green initiatives but one which needs bolstering by state-provided funding.

The background to Mon-

day's summit could hardly be bleaker: with just one Celsius of warming so far Earth is

bombarded with raging wildfires, widespread crop failures and super-storms exacerbated by rising sea levels.

"A failure to act now risks pushing us beyond a point of no return with catastrophic consequences for life as we know it," said Amjad Abdulla, chief nego tiator at the COP24 for the Alli ance of Small Island States.

The UN's own expert cli-mate panel in October issued its starkest warning to date.

To have any hope of reaching the 1.5C goal by the end of the century, it said emissions from fossil fuel use must be halved by 2030. Poland is one of many nations heavily reliant on coal, and wants this round of talks to reflect the role fossil fuels play in its economy.

It will unveil a declaration calling on states to "recognise the challenges faced by sectors, cities and regions in transition from fossil fuels... and the importance to ensure a decent future for workers impacted by the transition."

Mohamed Adow, climate

lead for the Christian Aid charity, said richer nations needed to stump up the cash to allow developing countries to make the leap to renewables. "Trudging along the dirty

richer countries will see de veloping nations stuck in the past and pollute their environ ments while ruining efforts to

limit global warming," he said. For some nations, the time to adapt to the effects of cli-

mate change is already here.
Frank Bainimarama, Prime
Minister of Fiji and president of last year's COP, said Poland's submission must result in "a just transition for everyone, especially the most climate vulnerable

The UN's General Assembly chief Maria Espinosa said the choice between the climate or jobs was false. "Societies need to adapt, they need to understand. otherwise we will be in deep trouble, what is at stake now is the very survival of human kind

and of the planet," she told AFP.
Poland has already come in for criticism after it announced three state-run coal companies were sponsoring the two-week negotiations.

Patti Lynn, executive director of the Corporate Accountability campaign group, called for nations to agree to the global greenhouse gas drawdown upon which the fate of the Paris agreement now rests."We need serious solu-tions from serious leaders, not dangerous schemes and political tricks aimed to keep big polluters polluting," she said.

Russian President Vladimir Putin said Saturday he and Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman "have agreed to extend our agree-ment" to limit production as prices slump on global markets.

An existing deal committing OPEC and non-members to cuts expires this year.

While there was no announcement on how much would be cut and for how long, the pact between the world's two biggest crude exporters was cheered by oil traders, with Brent jumping USD 2.42 to USD 53.35 and West Texas Intermediate up USD 2.60 at USD

There was a slight paring of prices after Qatar announced it would be leaving OPEC next year as it looks to concentrate on its gas production, though it would continue to pump crude.

have plunged by about a third since hitting four-year highs at the start of October, hit by a number of factors including easing demand, high production, softer-than-expected US sanctions on Iran and a global growth slowdown.

Another major reason for the sell-off has been the ongoing trade between and the US, which has seen the world's top economies swap tariffs on imports worth hundreds of billions of dollars fuelling fears about the impact globally.

Qatar will pull out of **OPEC** amid tension with Saudi Arabia



tiny, energy-rich Arab na-tion of Qatar announced on Monday it would withdraw from OPEC, mixing its aspirations to increase production outside of the cartel's constraints with the constraints with the politics of slighting the Saudi-dominated group amid the kingdom's boycott of Doha.

The surprise an-nouncement from Qatar's minister of state for energy affairs, Saad Sherida al-Kaabi, again throws into question the role of the cartel after needing non-members to push through a pro-duction cut in 2016 af-ter prices crashed below USD 30 a barrel.

It also marks the first time a Mideast nation has left the cartel since its founding in 1960.

In a statement, al-Kaabi said Qatar, the world's largest exporter of liquified natural gas, planned to increase its exports from 77 million tons of gas per year to

110 million tons.

He also said Qatar wants to raise its oil production from 48 million barrels of oil equivalent a day to 6.5 million barrels.

"In light of such ef-forts and plans, and in our pursuit to strengthen Qatar's position as a reliable and trustworthy energy supplier across steps to review Qatar's role and contributions on the international energy scene," al-Kaabi said in a statement. There was no imme-

diate comment from Vi-enna-based OPEC, which is to meet this month and discuss possible produc-Oatar, a country of

2.6 million people where citizens make up over 10 per cent of the population, discovered the offshore North Field in 1971, the same year it ecame independent.

World Bank promises USD 200 bn in 2021-25 climate cash

KATOWICE (POLAND), DEC 3 (AFP): The World Bank on Monday unveiled USD 200 billion in climate action investment for 2021-25, adding this amounts to a doubling of its current five-year funding. The World Bank said the move, coinciding with a UN climate summit meeting of some 200 nations in Poland, represented a "significantly ramped up ambition" to tackle cli-mate change, "sending an important signal to the wider global community to do the same".

Developed countries are committed to lifting combined annual public and private spending to USD 100 billion in de-veloping countries by 2020 to fight the impact of climate change -- up from 48.5 billion in 2016 and 56.7 billion last year, according to latest OECD data. Southern hemisphere countries fighting the impact of warming temperatures are nonetheless pushing northern counterparts for firmer commitments.

In a statement, the World Bank said the breakdown of the USD 200 billion would comprise "approximately USD 100 billion in direct finance from the World Bank". Around one third of the remaining fund-ing will come from two

World Bank Group agencies with the rest private capital "mobilised by the

Capital mobilised by the World Bank Group".
"If we don't reduce emissions and build adaptation now, we'll have 100 million more people living in poverty by 2030," John Roome, World Bank senior director for climate change.

"And we also know that the less we address this issue proactively just in three regions -- Afri-ca, South Asia and Latin America -- we'll have 133 million climate mi-

grants," Roome told AFP.
The bank's financing package amounts to "about 40 billion a year, but the direct (finance) is 27 billion per year on aver-

age", Roome said.

He added that in the 2018 fiscal year, running from July 2017 to June this year, the World Bank had committed USD 20.5 billion to climate action, compared with an annual average of USD 13.5 billion for the 2014-2018 period.
Roome said the mon-

ey now being earmarked amounted to "about 35 per cent" of the World Bank Group's total fi-nancing. Much of the climate action financing is heing set aside for reducing greenhouse gas emissions, notably through development of renewable energy strategies.

However, the World ank stated that "a key priority is boosting sup port for climate adaptation," given the millions of people already battling the consequences of extreme weather.

"By ramping up di-rect adaptation finance to reach around USD 50 billion over (fiscal) 21-25, the World Bank will, for the first time, give this equal emphasis alongside investments that reduce emissions," the bank stated.

Given the urgency to act in the face of sea level rise, flooding and drought "we must fight the causes, but also adapt to the consequences that are often most dramatic for the world's poorest people", said World Bank CEO Kristalina Georgieva. By stepping up financial aid to developing countries worst affected, Georgieva said the bank was committed to adapt-ing infrastructure while investing in "climate smart agriculture, sustainable water manage-ment and responsive social safety nets" as well as early response networks.

"Even if we can keep global warming down to 2 degrees Celsius we know you're gonna need a significant amount of adaptation in places like Chad. Mozambique or


