The students thanked Chief Minister PS Tamang [Golay] and Sikkim House, Guwahati for making all arrangements for their safe evacuation.

BS Panth speaks to Union Civil Aviation Minister, requests early resumption of flights from Pakyong **SUMMIT REPORT**

GANGTOK. 19 MAY: Tourism & Civil Avi-Lation Minister, BS Panth, in a telephonic conversation with Union Minister for Civil Aviation, Hardeep Singh Puri, yesterday, urged him to expedite the resumption of flights from Pakyong now that the airport has been upgraded and all components, the lack of which, had led to the suspension of flights, have been incorporated there.

Speaking to this correspondent, Mr Panth informed that he has briefed the Union Minister about the issues which had held up the required civil works at the airport and about how those problems have now been resolved and how the airport has been ready for flights since January but is yet to resume operations.

SpiceJet, the only carrier allowed to operate in Sikkim, had suspended operations here in June last year citing landing strip limitations and unfavourable weather conditions.

Pakyong Airport falls under category 2C of Director General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) norms and now meets all the specifications.

During the conversation, the Union Minister is reported to have informed that his Ministry was in consultation with the Airports Authority India and has explored introduction of Instrument Landing System (ILS) and Required Navigation Performance-Authorization Required (RNP-AR) with the help of International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO).

Delhi HC tells 2 private schools New Delhi, May 19 (PTI): The Delhi High Court has directed two private schools here not to collect from students any

The directions came on the schools' plea challenging the Directorate of Education's (DoE) April 22 finding, that the two institutions had illegally hiked fees and compelled parents to pay that along with arrears, and its recommendation to lodge an FIR against the management and seal the premises.

The court issued notice to the Delhi government, the police and the DoE on the plea and sought their stand by June 8.

It asked the school management or officials to join the police investigation into authenticity of some e-mails sent to the two schools allegedly by the DoE allowing them to hike their fees.

The DoE has lodged a complaint with police regarding the e-mails, the court noted and directed the Cyber Cell to file a report with regard to genuineness of the e-mails. The court further di-

rected the police that, meanwhile, no coercive steps be taken against the schools' management till the next date of hearing on June 8.

COVID-19 cases reach 1,01,139; death toll touches 3,163

New Delhi, May 19 (PTI): The number of coronavirus cases crossed the one lakh mark in the country on Tuesday, while the death toll due to the infection touched 3,163, according to the Union Health Ministry.

A total of 134 deaths and 4,970 COVID-19 cases were reported in the country in the past 24 hours since 8 pm on Monday, it said

The total number of coronavirus cases has risen to 1,01,139, the ministry said

The number of active COVID-19 cases stood at 58,802 while 39,173 people have recovered and one patient has migrated, it said.?

"Thus, around 38.73 per cent patients have recovered so far," a senior health ministry official said

The total confirmed cases include foreigners

Of the 134 deaths reported since Monday morning, 51 were in Maharashtra, 35 in Gujarat, 14 in Uttar Pradesh, eight in Delhi, seven in Rajasthan, six in West Bengal, four in Madhya Pradesh, three in Tamil Nadu, two each in Punjab and Jammu and Kashmir, and one each in Bihar and Telangana

Of the 3,163 fatalities, Maharashtra tops tally with 1,249 deaths. Gujarat comes second with 694 deaths, followed by Madhya Pradesh at 252,

West Bengal at 244, Delhi at 168, Rajasthan at 138, Uttar Pradesh at 118, Tamil Nadu at 81 and Andhra Pradesh at 50

death toll The reached 37 each in Karnataka and Punjab and 35 in Telangana

Jammu and Kashmir has reported 15 fatalities due to the disease, Haryana has 14 deaths while Bihar has registered nine and Kerala and Odisha each have reported four deaths

Jharkhand, Chandigarh and Himachal Pradesh each have recorded three COVID-19 fatalities, while Assam has reported two deaths

Meghalaya, Uttarakhand and Puducherry have reported one fatality each, according to the data provided by the ministry

According to the ministry's website, more than 70 per cent of the deaths are due to comorbidities, the existence of multiple disorders in the same person

According to the health ministry's data updated in the morning, the highest number of confirmed cases in the country are from Maharashtra at 35,058, followed by Tamil Nadu at 11,760, Gujarat at 11,745, Delhi at 10,054, Rajasthan at 5,507, Madhva Pradesh at 5.236 and Uttar Pradesh at 4,605

Railways runs its most powerful Made in India locomotive



NEW DELHI, MAY 19 (PTI): The Indian Railways' most powerful 12000 HP Made in India locomotive made its maiden commercial run between Deen Dayal Upadhaya and Shivpur stations in Uttar Pradesh on Monday, the national transporter said. Built by French com-

pany Alstom under the government's Make in India programme at the Railways' Madhepura factory in Bihar, these engines are the highest-powered locomotives that will run on Indian rails.

All 800 of these locos are being manufactured indigenously while they have been designed at the company's engineering centre in Bengaluru.

The first train, con-

capable of working on railway tracks with conventional OHE lines as well as on Dedicated Freight corridors with high rise OHE lines. The locomotive has air-conditioned driver cabs on either side.

"It is equipped with regenerative braking system which provides substantial energy savings during operations. These high horse power locomotives will help to decongest the saturated tracks by improving average speed of freight trains," the statement from Railways said.

As part of the largest Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) project of the Indian Railways, the Ministry of Railways and Alstom inked a Joint Venture worth Rs 25,000 crore in 2015.

The overall project is for manufacturing of 800 double-section electric locomotives of 12000 HP for freight service and its associated maintenance for a period of 11 years.

The scope also includes setting up of a manufacturing plant at Madhepura (Bihar) for building the e-locos and two maintenance depots at Saharanpur in Uttar Pradesh and Nagpur, Maharashtra.

Minister confers with farmers at Mabong-Sengang

GYALSHING, 19 MAY [IPR]: An interaction program of farmers with Minister Lok Nath Sharma, organized by the Agriculture, Horticulture and KVK was held at the Community Hall, Mabong-Sengang, West Sikkim.

"How can we maintain social distance when we are compelled to share one room? How can we maintain self-isolation if this is the case?" she wrote in her message.

She sent a photo of the room where two beds can be seen stuck together and added that the beds are not even one metre apart.

Responding to a query from Summit Times, she informed that the person she was sharing the room with had also travelled in the same bus. On being told that, this could be the reason why they were asked to share a room, she said that it should have been made clear from the beginning.

"Actually we thought that we would be provided a single room where we need not have to share. Actually authorities should clarify this.. cos everyone is confused and everyone thinks in paid quarantine we get single room with no roommate," she said further adding that there is no clarity on how people are being allotted rooms.

While some of her friends were provided single rooms, others were being asked to share rooms.

It should be added here that there are also reports of other quarantine facilities functioning properly and residents being satisfied, and even impressed, with the facilities and services provided.

Clearly, while the need to quarantine and also the standard operating procedure to be followed at quarantine centres is a health issue, when Health Department officials were contacted they said that the management of quarantine facilities was being looked after by the District Administration. It is unclear whether medical advice has been taken on how these centres should be managed.

HC grants bail to convict in Nido Tania death case

NEW DELHI, MAY 19 (PTI): The Delhi High Court on Tuesday granted bail to one of the four persons convicted by a trial court for beating to death 19-year-old Nido Tania, a student from Arunachal Pradesh, in January 2014.

Justice Suresh K Kait granted interim bail for three months to Farman, the main accused who was awarded 10 years jail term, subject to his furnishing a personal bond of Rs 10,000 before the Jail Superintendent.

The high court noted that the convict has "already undergone around seven years of jail term out of the 10 year sentence awarded by the trial court" in September last year.

The CBI, which had investigated the case, opposed the bail plea saying his plea for regular bail was dismissed by the high court on March 23 and there are serious allegations against the applicant/appellant and the application deserves to be dismissed.

Tania, son of former Congress MLA from Arunachal Pradesh Nido Pavitra, was beaten up by several shopkeepers in Lajpat Nagar on January 29, 2014, after he had an altercation with them when they made fun of his hairstyle. Doctors at AIIMS declared him 'brought dead' the next day.

The incident had evoked outrage among the people of the Northeast living in the national capital who had alleged that police had failed to protect him and thereafter, the case was handed over to CBI.

The other three convicts in the case were -Pawan, Sunder Singh and Sunny Uppal.

During the filing of the charge sheet, the CBI had dropped murder charges against the accused, saying Tania's killing was not premeditated but a result of an altercation.

The trial court had convicted and awarded varying jail terms to the four under IPC sections 304 (punishment for culpable homicide not amounting to murder) and 34 (common

intention). Pawan and Surender, were sentenced to seven years and a fine of Rs 20,000, while Sunny Pal, was sentenced to three years.

90 migrant workers leave from Soreng

The Sikkim Govern-■ ment helped 90 migrant workers stranded at various locations of Soreng Subdivision, West Sikkim, to leave for their home states today. They left for Siliguri in three SNT buses from Soreng.

The migrant workers, mostly natives of West Bengal and some from Bihar were stranded at various places of Soreng Subdivision since the lockdown came into force in the state. It was informed that they would head for their native places from Siliguri.

SNT department had arranged food and water for the migrant workers at the place of departure.

Political Secretary to the Chief Minister, Jacob Khaling met the migrant workers today, spoke to them, inquired about their wellbeing and wished them a safe journey.

Some workers shared that they did not have to endure any kind of hardship during the lockdown as the government had arranged free food and other essential items

Some workers expressed that there was no problem staying in Sikkim till the lockdown was over but they wanted to be with their families in the harsh situations in the wake of COVID-19 pandemic.

A worker informed that he had come to West Sikkim in search of work leaving behind his wife and his infant daughter at home. He added that he should

be with his family in these testing times.

"We are happy that we are returning home and we will be with our near and dear ones soon. We will not forget the goodwill and hospitality of Sikkimese people. We thank Sikkim government for arranging for our transportation," the

'My angel': man who became face of India's stranded helped home by stranger

New Delhi, 19 May [TheGuard-**IAN]:** A photograph of a migrant labourer, his face contorted with anguish as he sits on the roadside in Delhi speaking to his wife about their sick baby boy, has come to symbolise the ordeal of India's daily wage workers: penniless, and unable to get home to their families because of the lockdown.

Rampukar Pandit, a construction worker in the Indian capital, had heard that his 11-month-old son was seriously unwell. With no public transport to reach his home in Begusarai in Bihar, 1,200 km (745 miles) away, he started walking. He reached Nizamuddin Bridge where, exhausted and hungry, he could go no further.

Atul Yadav, a photographer with the Press Trust of India, was heading home from work on 11 May when he saw Pandit, 38, sobbing his heart out. Pandit refused his offer of biscuits and water. saying food would "choke" him because he couldn't eat while his son was unwell. "He was so emotional I had to stop shooting. He had been sitting on the road for three days," said Yadav.

'We labourers don't belong to any country," Pandit told Yadav. "All I want is to go home and see my son."

Later that evening, he reached a nearby police station. He was still waiting for the police to help when a group of well-wishers, having seen Yadav's tweet about Pandit, arrived in the area and managed to find him at the station.

By now, he was full of grief. His wife, Bimal Devi, had just called to say their son had died. One of the well-wishers, a woman, paid for and arranged for his train ticket home. "He wept with gratitude at strangers helping him," said Yadav.

Yadav's photograph illustrates the anguish of millions of migrant labourers in India who are desperate to get home to their families. After waiting in vain for the government to provide them with

transport (belatedly some trains are now being laid on for them) they have embarked on astonishing odysseys, from cities all over the country, journeys that have left Indians transfixed and distressed.

Whether by truck, bicycle, auto-rickshaw or on foot, they have been heading out under their own steam, some making journeys of nearly 1,000 km to reach home. Hunger, thirst, and the scorching heat of the Indian summer are slowing them down. Some have died of exhaustion and sunstroke. Last week a group of 16 who fell asleep on a railway line they had believed was not being used were killed by a goods train.

"If I am to die, I want to die with my parents," said one young daily wage labourer leaving Indore, a city in Madhya Pradesh.

An auto-rickshaw driver fleeing Mumbai said: "Even if I starve in the village, I will never come back. My children needed medicines and food and I wasn't able to do anything."

Every day the exodus continues. The residents of Dharavi slum in Mumbai are fleeing in their thousands every day. With living conditions that make it almost impossible to escape the contagion and more than 1,100 confirmed cases of C0vid-19, many people feel they are sitting ducks.

Yadav, 44, has been documenting their plight for the past few weeks, ever since India's lockdown began on 25 March. He has photograph and from people who want to help Pandit. "In my career so far, this is the photograph that has best shown one person's pain," he said.

Pandit reached Bihar last Wednesday and was put into a quarantine centre. There, he developed a temperature and headaches and was sent to hospital, where he has tested negative for Covid-19.

On the government's inaction towards workers separated from their families, Pandit said he was not surprised. "I am a nobody, I'm like an ant, my life doesn't matter. The government is only concerned with filling the stomachs of the rich," he said.

Pandit cannot wait to reach his home and family. Once there, he plans never to return to Delhi or go to any other city for work, even though he has no land or any other means of support. "However I manage, I will manage. My family and my parents will be with me. That's enough for me," he said.

If he does ever return to Delhi, though, it will be to meet the woman who paid for his ticket and booked it for him. Before leaving, she gave him her address lest he needed further help to get home. "I would like to meet her again. She was my angel," he said.

The buses should be provided at Kaushambi and Sahibabad bus stands, he said in the let-

He also said, "500 buses should be provided to the District Magistrate of Gautam Buddh Nagar at the ground near the Expo Mart."

Directions have been issued to the district magistrates to utilise the buses immediately after checking the permit, fitness, insurance, driving licences of the drivers and details of the conductors, Awasthi said.

SC refuses to transfer cases to CBI, grants protection to Arnab Goswami for 3 weeks

New Delhi, May 19 (PTI): The Supreme Court Tuesday refused to transfer to CBI the criminal cases lodged against Republic TV Editor in-Chief Arnab Goswami for alleged defamatory news show telecast on April 21 in connection with the Palghar mob-lynching case.

Observing that Journalistic freedom lies at the core of freedom of speech and expression, the top court quashed all other FIRs except the initial one, which was registered at Nagpur and subsequently transferred to Mumbai for joint investigation with the complaint of the journalist regarding the alleged assault on him.

A bench of Justices D Y Chandrachud and M R Shah Goswami asked Goswami to seek quashing of FIR before competent court and protected him from coercive action for next 3-weeks.

 $U_{\mathrm{Guterres}}^{\mathrm{N}}$ Secretary-General Antonio Guterres issued an alert urging the international community to put more effort to protect those facing increasing mental pressures. Every 40 seconds, somewhere in the world, someone takes his own life. The main causes of suicide are unemployment, terrible illness, family strife, struggle in marital life, poverty, mental disorder, failure in examination, in love. There are failures, economic disputes, political situations. Men commit more suicide than women. Similarly, a mental disorder due to mental disorder, extreme anxiety, mental instability, neurological, always suffering from the feeling of inferiority, being surrounded by despair, being overly emotional, angry or slave to desires, etc. are the major mental disorders under which a person commits suicide. It does. An addict commits suicide even when unable to keep pace with social life due to a plethora of personal defects such as alcoholism, gambling, sexual assault, or criminal acts.

But today there are some cases around the world where people take their own lives due to fear of Kovid-19 infection, social stigma, isolation, depression, anxiety, emotional

and inappropriate knowledge, financial and future insecurity. Have been With the recent suicide reports, we can estimate the impact of this virus on the incidence of suicide worldwide. The United Nations report also mentions the 'Lancet Commission' warning on global mental health and sustainable development, according to which many people who manage themselves properly in the past may also face difficulties because of the epidemic. Many types of pressures have arisen due to this. There are many uncertainties before people and addiction to alcohol (alcohol), drugs, tobacco, and online games to handle themselves in these situations are increasing. There is something different from before due to increasing suicides during the course Today, the first reason is social isolation or distance which is very important to avoid corona today, but this separation creates a lot of concern among the citizens.

Today people of all ages are surrounded by depression and loneliness. Due to which, suicidal thoughts are overflowing in them sitting empty. Isolation disrupts normal social life and causes psychological fear and feeling trapped indefinitely. The advice of working from home has restricted our social life. The lockout of

imbalance, economic shutdown, lack the worldwide economic recession has led to insecurity leading to panic over the emerging economic crisis, massive unemployment, poverty, and homelessness, possibly increasing the risk of suicide or increasing suicide attempts in such patients. Will increase. Stress, anxiety, and pressure in medical health professionals are at their peak today. 50 Percent of medical staff in British hospitals are ill. In London, a young nurse took her own life while treating Kovid-19 patients, social exclusion and discrimination have also added some cases to the Kovid-19 suicide list. For example, the first Kovid-19 suicide case in Bangladesh, where a 36-year-old man committed suicide due to social avoidance by neighbors and to prevent the virus in his community.

Indeed, the increasing trend of suicide is purely a sociological phenomenon. Today, the person is stealing from the harsh truths of his life and filling himself with frustration and discontent. Sociology of suicide suggests that a person's frustration begins with the stress that leads him to suicide. It is surprising that in a religious and spiritual-rich country like India, about one-third of the total population is living in a state of severe depression. There is a need to set limits on Covid-19 related news

social, and digital platforms to evacuate people from emotional distress and all of which should be authentic from the WHO. Today, we need to maintain connectedness and solidarity despite physical distance. Individuals with suicidal thoughts, panic and stress disorder, low self-esteem, and low self-worth are easily susceptible to paranoid thinking such as suicide in a viral epidemic. We need to look at the causes of suicide very carefully, where people often say 'I am tired of life', 'No one loves me', 'Leave me alone' and so on.

On suspecting such behavior in person, we can bring people struggling with suicidal tendencies to feel loved and protected. Social rehabilitation is needed for social rehabilitation, there is a need to implement Tele counseling with a 24×7 crisis response service for emotional, mental, and behavioral support. The person should be given psychological help and care. The state can seek help from non-governmental organizations as well as religious missionaries for this purpose. Strengthening the existing National Mental Health Program and District Mental Health Program, as well as focusing on training resources and streamlining funds may be some other ways to fight depression and suicide. Long-

from local, national, international, term solutions such as helping unemployed people, finding meaningful work, or sending trainers to communities to identify people at risk of a mental health crisis are critical.

> Suicide is preventable. People who are contemplating suicide often warn about their distress. We can spend time with our families, connect with friends on social media. and they will continue to engage in mindfulness activities until we all win this battle. These figures of the death toll, of course, Are scary, but this trend can be stopped. For this, it is necessary to understand the reasons behind suicide and work in that direction. Life is very sweet, do not let death conquer it under any circumstances. If someone around you seems to be frustrated with life, then take a little time and try to bring hope in his life again. Chinese man abducted as toddler 32 years ago reunited with parents

EMMA GRAHAM-HARRISON LONDON, 19 MAY [THEGUARDIAN]:

A Chinese man who was stolen from his family as a toddler has been reunited with his parents after 32 years.

Mao Yin was snatched in 1988 when he was walking home from nursery with his father, aged just two and half. His parents finally embraced him again on Monday afternoon, in the western city of Xi'an, where he was born.

After Mao vanished, his mother Li Jingzhi quit her job and launched a decades-long search for her son, that included sending out over 100,000 flyers, and appearing on numerous television shows.

That long campaign helped 29 other families find their own missing children, but it was only in late April this year that a tip-off led to

In late April, police received information about a boy from Xi'an who had been sold to a family just over 600km (370 miles) away, for 6.000 vuan. A DNA test confirmed Mao Yin's identity.

"I would like to thank the tens of thousands of people who helped us," Li told Xinhua news agency. "I can't believe that after helping 29 missing children find their fami-



lies, I am able to find my own son." Renamed Gu Ninging, he had been brought up in the city of Mianyang, without any idea that he was the target of a decades-long

He now plans to spend several days with his parents, before returning home to deal with the implications of having his life turned upside down overnight. "To be honest, I'm not quite sure about the future yet," he told Xinhua news agency.

Child abduction has been a problem in China for decades. Some of the children snatched from their parents have been directly exploited by adult criminals and coerced into begging, pick-

pocketing, forced labour or the sex trade. Others feed a market for adoptees, both among Chinese couples who want to have a son, and from orphanages seeking the large donations that foreign adoptive parents are obliged to make.

In the last year alone, Chinese authorities have reunited over 6,300 snatched children with their families using DNA tests, Xinhua reported.

But that is probably just a tiny fraction of the children who have gone missing. The Chinese government does not provide figures, but the US state department has estimated that 20,000 children are abducted annually, or 400 a week, according to the BBC.

Kota family opens up kitchen to the needy amid lockdown

As we started cooking food at home and distributing meal packets among the needy at CAD circle and other slum areas of the city, help started pouring in with handsome contribution for the continuity of food distribution from 'Ghar Ki Rasoi' . Richa said.

I and my mother-inlaw cook the food while my husband and fatherin-law make the packets and distribute them among the needy, she said, claiming they distribute nearly 400 meal packets every day.

Many people and groups, including the Kota Super Moms headed by Kritika Shringi and Abhilesha Club of

women and also some neighbours, have come forward with funds for the Ghar Ki Rasoi' to strengthen the mission of helping people in these difficult times, Richa said.

The food packets were also being distributed to coaching students stuck in hostels and PGs due to the lockdown but most of them have now left for their native places, she said. We are also supplying free food packets on call and if required dry ration bags are also given to the

Ruskin Bond turns 86, Speaking Tiger brings out book



Instead of Bans, Practice **Better Management**

To stop things is a short-term measure

A super-cyclone kissed Sikkim today and soon the monsoons will be upon the State as well. Among the many routine orders which will get passed will be the one ordering a stop on all ongoing construction works and unloading of construction materials on roadsides. While such control mechanisms are welcome, they are reflective of how little the State has learnt and prioritised its defence against monsoon-related calamities. The practice of ordering a halt on constructions is welcome because construction sites are invariably poorly managed tinder boxes with the potential to amplify the damage that rains can wreak. Given that most roadsides already have buildings on them, new constructions are coming up behind these, and this requires for construction material to be dumped on the road and then carried by the head-load to the sites. Most of the drains run along the roads, and sand and stone chips flow fast when it rains and add to the debris content of slush which routinely tear up tarmac and clog drains. Trucks dripping construction material on the highway are potential disasters in the making as well and travel could become more relaxed without them on the roads at this time of the year. Construction sites with their rudimentary safety measures are other accidents in the making during wet weather that the State can do without.

For all these reasons, the direction to stop all construction works during monsoons is welcome. But it is not enough and is too knee-jerk. To begin with, these need to happen in time, when the norwesters have become a regular phenomenon instead of waiting till the monsoon is upon the State. The decision that construction related works should desist with the arrival of monsoons was taken some years back, but every year, the order gets issued only after the rains have already wreaked some damage. If the state is looking at long-term mitigation efforts as far as constructions are concerned. then the ban should be lifted and instead of that builders should be required to make their sites monsoon-proof. This would entail storing of all construction related material on site with proper care taken to ensure that none of it joins a water courses. A relaxation can be made to accommodate the time taken between unloading on the road side to transfer to work site. Take a drive along the highway and one will invariably come across orphaned sand and stone chip dunes, the lockdown notwithstanding, probably left over from a completed construction as well. They lie unattended and pose a larger danger than kitchen waste which shares the road side with it. A ban on construction during monsoons is a short-term measure that Sikkim has been taking for the past decade, it is time that its officers prescribed and monitored the construction habits better. That will make the town safer than a row of incomplete buildings awaiting the dry winters. What cannot be ignored either that it is not just constructions, but also finishing works which require better material management, and when the focus is on "stopping" construction works, loopholes are found and potential risks continue to remain present, which is why the focus has to be on improved oversights and construction practices.

nandemics change everything, including the way we design buildings.

After the 1918 Spanish flu and the scourge of tuberculosis, there was a push for "healthier" buildings, "full of light and air," as the Swiss architect Le Corbusier put it. This translated into the clean lines and white surfaces of what came to be known as the "International Style" of architecture. The hygienic qualities of these modernist buildings were generally more aesthetic than real, but designs such as Alvar Aalto's competition-winning Paimio sanatorium did provide the abundance of light and air recommended by Le Corbusier.

The COVID-19 crisis is likely to change building design again. Its health effects have not only been physical but also psychological. Our early ancestors evolved mostly outside in constantly changing natural environments. Yet the indoor spaces where we now spend much of our lives separate us from that world. One of the lessons of the current lockdowns is that we may need to change that.

NATURE'S CALMING EFFECTS

Walks in the park, hikes in the forest and strolls along the beach are known to relieve stress. Spending time in nature also improves our ability to focus, and there's even evidence that it helps us to heal physically as well.

For most of us, the recent lockdowns have led to an unprecedented shrinking of our worlds. Even under normal circumstances, however, our ability to spend time outdoors is often limited by work, family responsibilities or a simple lack of mobility. People in the United States, for example, already spent almost 90% of their time indoors long before the current crisis.

Interior plants can help, as can pets. But neither of these seems to have quite the same restorative effects as contact with wild nature, which alone has the capacity to evoke the sublime, a sense of being in the presence of something much larger than ourselves.

Wherever you happen to live, though, the Earth's largest wilderness, its atmosphere, is only the thickness of a pane of glass away. And although buildings

are typically designed to keep the weather out, there are powerful reasons to welcome its movement into our homes – the most important being that it seems to have a unique capacity to calm us.

Moving light patterns reflected from a wind-disturbed water surface, of the kind we typically see under boats and bridges, for example, have been shown to have a significant calming effect on heart rate, and can also help to keep us alert.

More recent work has suggested that this kind



of familiar natural movement makes us feel connected to the present moment, in a way that mimics meditative practices such as mindfulness, but without requiring our active attention.

As someone who teaches and writes about architecture, I've spent the last two decades looking at how nature can be more effectively brought into our buildings, beyond just buying fish tanks and potted plants.

A number of buildings already successfully bring the movements of the weather indoors. I first encountered these in Japan, where designers such as Kengo Kuma and Toshihito Yokouchi have produced stunning indoor environments animated by the natural movements of the sun, wind and rain.

'LET THE SUN COME IN, LET THE WIND COME IN'

Designing all buildings this way would clearly take a great deal of money and time. But there are simple ways that you can create such effects in your own home right now, and at minimal cost. All of the following examples were created for less than US\$50 using existing residential windows and balconies.

Placing an insect screen and a net curtain outside a window, for example, will generate moiré patterns that change as the wind varies. This works even on overcast days, but in direct sun the moiré patterns are also cast as moving shadows on interior surfaces.

If you have a deck or balcony that receives direct sunlight, the wind-generated movements of foliage can be projected onto a translucent shade or blind to make them seem part of the interior.

If the foliage is far enough away, wind-animated images of the sun can also be cast on indoor surfaces.

You can also project wind-animated reflected sunlight onto indoor surfaces by placing a shallow tray of water on a sun-facing balcony. This effect can even be recreated at night by directing an external security light onto the water surface. The same setup can also project ripples

Let the sun come in, let the wind come in, let

the rain come in." We might do well, it seems, to also heed Osho's advice in the design of our homes.

Delirium, depression, anxiety, PTSD the less discussed effects of COVID-19

ough, fever, loss of sense of smell ... Lathese are the symptoms of COVID-19 that we all know about. But did you know that confusion affects 20% or more of patients in hospital with COVID-19? Or that previous coronavirus outbreaks have been linked to high rates of mental illness in the aftermath?

As psychiatrists working in a general hospital, we are used to seeing patients with depression, desire to self-harm, dementia and psychosis. What we noticed when COVID-19 started was that we were being referred a lot of patients who were disorientated, confused and sometimes hallucinating. Taken together, these are hallmarks of a condition known as delirium.

Delirium is a short-term confused state resulting from illnesses such as COVID-19. Patients can change within as little as a few hours and not know where they are or what is happening to them. Add to this the paranoia and visual hallucinations that many encounter and you can see why it can be a pretty frightening experience.

LEARNING FROM THE PAST There have been two previous outbreaks of severe coronavirus infections: severe acute respiratory syndrome (Sars) starting in 2002, and Middle East respiratory syndrome (Mers) in 2012. When patients were unwell with these infections, more than 25% experienced symptoms such as poor concentration, confusion and rapid fluctuations in mood - all of which suggest a delirium. From the early data we have, it looks as though the figures are similar for patients in hospital with COVID-19.

If delirium is a short-term state, why does it matter? Patients who have delirium are at least twice as likely to die in hospital. Patients who develop delirium while in hospital remain in hospital for about a week longer than other patients. This means that there could be real problems in freeing up beds for new patients.

Obviously, we don't have longterm data for COVID-19, but looking at past epidemics can give us some idea of what to look out for in the next few months and years. When patients with Sars and Mers were assessed a few months later, 15% had depression and 15% had an anxiety disorder. Mental illness is common, though, so it's hard to know how many of these people had longstanding problems or were struggling for other reasons.

was that rates of post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) were more than 30%. This is huge and hard to attribute to anything except the experience of the infection and its treatment. Fatigue also seemed to be a big problem: 19% of patients were still reporting this even months after "recovering".

We have to be careful in applying these findings to the current pandemic because all these results are from patients in hospital and we know that most patients with COVID-19 can be safely treated at home. You also can't add up the numbers for each disorder as many patients may have presented with more than one.

Interestingly, there seemed to be a few groups that were at higher risk of developing mental illness after infection. It is not surprising that those who had a more severe physical illness and those who had lost a loved one tended to have a poorer psychological outcome. What we did not expect to find was that three studies identified healthcare workers as being at higher risk of subsequent mental illness.

THE HEALTH SERVICE NEEDS TO **BE PREPARED**

Whatever the cause, we need to be prepared. But interventions need What was really striking, though, to be evidence-based and – crucially

- should avoid making things worse. Psychological debriefing, where a therapist encourages you to talk through a traumatic event in detail, sounds sensible, but there is convincing evidence that it might actually make things worse, increasing the risk of subsequent mental illness.

There are many possible reasons why people develop these problems and your guess may be as good as ours. It might be that the virus affects the brain directly or that the body's immune system goes into overdrive. Equally likely is that psychiatric consequences are the result of being socially isolated or the psychological trauma of having a severe illness.

What we should be doing is screening for delirium, identifying these patients as seriously unwell and using treatments that we know are both safe and effective.

Fortunately, we can expect that most people who suffer from COVID-19 will not have a mental illness in the aftermath. However, for those who do, there needs to be psychiatric help available and support in returning to the workplace.

Assam COVID-19 fatalities rise to 4; total cases now 115

GUWAHATI, MAY 18 (PTI): Two people died of COVID-19 in Asssam and 15 fresh cases were reported on Monday, taking the total number of deaths to four and coronavirus cases to 115 in the state, Health Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma said.

A person died on Monday night before he was tested positive and a 71-year-old man, who was suffering from neck cancer and tested positive last week after returning from Mumbai by bus last week, died due to respiratory distress during the day, the minister said.

Both the patients died in Guwahati Medical College Hospital.

Besides these two deaths, a Tablighi Jamaat returnee from Hailakandi had died at Silchar Medical College and Hospital and a 16-year old girl who was also detected to be positive after she died in B Barooah Cancer Hospital in Guwahati

Meanwhile, seven positive cases were reported from Guwahati and one of them died, three from Sarusajai Quarantine Facility and three others who were contacts of a migrant worker who had tested



positive last week, the Minister said.

The migrant labourer worked in a potato godown in Fancy Bazaar area, the commercial hub of the city, and subsequently 15 others in contact with him also tested positive last week.

A total of 19 people are now positive from the potato godown area and several areas of the commercial hub have been declared as a containment zone. Eight other cases were reported in the state during the day with four from Golaghat, two from Cachar and one each from Nagaon and Jorhat.

Of the 115 positive

cases in the state, there are 68 active cases, three deaths, two migrated out and 41 have been cured and discharged from the hospital, the minister said. "There is, however, no need to panic as most of the cases detected positive are from quarantine camp and so far community transmission has not

taken place", he said. The health department has conducted community surveillance in 16,000 villages so far and not a single case has been detected, he said.

"The COVID-19 tally will increase in the state but success of Assam's COVID-19 management will depend on the strict quarantine system adopted and it will spread to the community, only if this fails," the minister said.

The state has adopted the policy of "ruthless quarantine with big heart", which implies that all coming from outside will have to undergo "strict quarantine and the government will take care of them", he said.

People are keen to return to their homes "and this is quite natural but we appeal to them to space out their travel so that we can provide them with the best quarantine facilities", he said.

The minister said that so far 48,000 people have returned to the state and more will come but "if they all come together, it will be difficult to provide them with quality quarantine facilities, which will pose a problem leading to possible community transmission of the disease".

The state government was likely to incur an expenditure of Rs 300 crore for quarantine of one lakh people and to provide financial assistance to four lakh people from Assam staying in other states under Assam Cares, he said.

The Assam government is negotiating with the World Bank in this regard and "it will help us considerably, if it works out", Sarma said.

9 migrant labourers killed in road accident in Bihar

BHAGALPUR, MAY 19 (PTI): Nine migrant labourers were killed on Tuesday when the truck carrying them overturned in an attempt to avert a headon collision with a bus in Bihar's Bhagalpur district, police said.

The incident took place around 6 am on National Highway-31 near Ambho Chowk, Naugachhia Superintendent of Police Nidhi Rani said.

The workers, all males, had started their journey on bicycles six days ago from Kolkata and they might have boarded the truck somewhere en route, the officer said.

The driver and cleaner of the truck, which was coming from West Bengal via Katihar district in Bihar, fled from the spot, she said.

Identities of some of the labourers have been ascertained from official documents, Rani said, adding that they hailed from East and West Champaran districts.

Some of the passengers of the bus, which was on its way to Banka from Darbhanga, received minor injuries and were administered first aid at a nearby hospital, she said.

Chief Minister Nitish Kumar expressed grief over the incident and announced an ex-gratia of Rs 4 lakh for the kin of each of the victims, an official release said.

He also appealed to people not to travel on foot or on railway tracks.

Mortician tests COVID-19 positive in Howrah

KOLKATA, MAY 19 (PTI): A mortician who work there to go for home quaranworking at a crematorium in Shibpur area of Howrah city has tested positive for novel coronavirus infection, a state health department official said on Tuesday. The burning ghat is one of the facilities where bodies of patients who died of COVID-19 are being cremated, he said.

The man, employed by the Howrah Municipal Corporation, has been hospitalised while seven people who work with him and three death sub-registrars of the Shibpur burning ghat were sent for home quarantine.

"One mortician working in Shibpur burning ghat has tested positive for tine," the official said.

Meanwhile, around 20 personnel of the Howrah City Police posted at the Shibpur police station have also tested positive since last week, he added.

"They are undergoing treatment at different hospitals.

We have sanitised the police station and taken all precautionary measures to contain further spread of the disease," a senior officer of the force said.

Till Monday, West Bengal has 172 COVID-19 deaths and at least 2,825 confirmed cases.

There are also 72 deaths due to comorbidity conditions where novel COVID-19. We have advised 10 people coronavirus was incidental.

Spitting at workplace punishable with fine: Govt the national directives

NEW DELHI, MAY 19 (PTI): Spitting at workplace will be punishable with fine, the Personnel Ministry has said, citing the national directives for COVID-19 management.

In an order issued to all central government departments, it has asked their heads to ensure strict compliance of this and other directives in this regard.

This order is likely to bring about changes in and around government and private work places, where one can easily spot stains of 'pan' and 'gutka' spitted at some of the corners of walls or areas not frequented by many employees/public.

"Spitting in public and work places shall be punishable with fine, as may be prescribed in accordance with its laws, rules and regulations by the state/union territory local authority," said

issued by the Home Ministry and shared by the Personnel Ministry with all central government departments. It said wearing 'face cover' is compulsory in all public and work places.

In additional directives for the work places, the ministry said as far as possible, the practice from work from home should be followed.

"Staggering of work/ business hours shall be followed in offices, work places, shops, markets and industrial and commercial establishments. Provision for thermal scanning, hand wash and sanitiser will be made at all entry and exit points and common areas," the directives said.

Frequent sanitization of the entire workplace, common facilities and all points which come into human contact e.g. door handles etc., shall be ensured, including between shifts, it said.

"All persons in charge of work places shall ensure social distancing through adequate distance between workers, adequate gaps between shifts, staggering the lunch breaks of staff, etc," the directive said. The Centre on Monday asked 50 per cent of its junior employees, below the level of deputy secretary, to join work in office.

Till now, only 33 per cent of such employees were asked to attend office due to the novel coronavirus lockdown.

Central government employees were asked to work from home due to the lockdown that came into force from March 25

All officers of the level of deputy secretary and above have already been asked to attend office on all working days.

Fresh chance for students to apply for **IEE-MAINS**

New Delhi, May 19 (PTI): Students whose plans to study abroad have been affected due to COVID-19 will get a fresh chance to apply for JEE-Mains, the entrance exam for engineering colleges, the HRD Minister announced on Tuesday.

In view of representations received from various Indian students who were scheduled to join colleges abroad but are now keen to pursue their studies in India due to changed circumstances arising out of COVID-19, the National Testing Agency (NTA) has decided to give an opportunity, HRD Minister Ramesh Pokhriyal Nishank' said.

The application window for Joint Entrance Exam (JEE-Mains), which opened today, will have to be completed by May 24.

Students who were not able to complete their application form due to other reasons can also make use of this opportunity, NTA Director Vineet Joshi said.

The exam will be held across the country from July 18-23.



GUWAHATI, MAY 19 (PTI): The Assam government on Tuesday issued a "high alert" over cyclone 'Amphan' and directed the state disaster management authority to set up a control room to deal with the situation.

Quoting the India Meteorological Department (IMD), Chief Secretary Kumar Sanjay Krishna said there is a strong likelihood of widespread effect of the cyclone in Assam, especially in west Assam districts.

"In view of the above, you are requested to ensure that both preventive and response systems are put on high alert to avoid any loss of life and property," he said in an "Extremely Urgent" message to all division commissioners, district

Migration of labourers hits bakery units in Mumbai

MUMBAI, MAY 19 (PTI): The bakery business in Mumbai has been badly hit as a number of migrant labourers have gone back to their native places amid the coronavirus-induced lockdown.

Some of those in the business fear that if this situation continues for some more time, there may be shortage of bakery products in the city.

During a visit to 'Metro Bakery' in Kurla area, its owner Habib Ansari was found busy making

toast and khari (a fluffy baked snack) along with his son-in-law and two labourers.

"I have completely shut one of my bakery outlets while I am running this unit with only four people, including myself. I am in this business since last four decades but never saw such a situation in my life," Ansari told PTI.

He said their output has been reduced to just a few kilograms from 400 to 500 kgs of products which they used to make earlier in a day. "We requested our labourers not to leave, but they did



not listen and fled by paying double the amount to a truck driver," he claimed.


Khurshid Ansari, who has a bakery at Mumbra in neighbouring Thane district, said seven to eight bakeries have closed in the area in a week's time since labourers started leaving for their native places in Uttar Pradesh.

"Earlier, there were nearly 35 workers in my bakery, but now it is closed," he said.

Businessman Haroon Siddique said earlier he used to supply yeast ((a leavening agent used in baking) to about 70 bakeries in Mumbai.

"But, in the last one week, 61 bakeries have stopped production and the units closed after labourers left the city," he said. Mushtaq Khan, who runs

'Bakerz Fresh' outlet in suburban Goregaon, told PTI over phone that they are unable to meet customers' demands as the production has gone down due to shortage of labourers. "Many labourers left without informing us or taking their salary. If we do not get labourers in the coming days, consumers may find it difficult to get bakery products," he said.

Fans torn as Spanish football prepares to begin recovery without them

MADRID, MAY 19 (AFP): La Liga's proposed restart next month has left fans juggling the excitement of football's return and the disappointment it will resume without them.

More than two months after the coronavirus pandemic halted the season in Spain, players have begun training in small groups as they aim to be as ready as possible for the planned reboot on June 12.

Yet goals, saves and tackles will all be greeted by silence or at best, artificial cheers approved by authorities to be pumped out of a sound system.

Even for Sevilla against Real Betis, the usually-heart thumping Andalusian derby that encapsulates the importance of supporters more than any other Spanish fixture, the atmosphere will be non-existent on the first weekend

But for clubs, there is a financial necessity given La Liga president Javier Tebas has estimated cancelling the season could cost them 1 billion euros (1.08 billion).

"People need their dose



of football," Adolfo Barbero, a commentator on Movistar, Spain's primary football broadcaster, told AFP.

"There is that want for fans to go to matches but for many now, the priority is to play. They want to see 22 guys, a ball and a green pitch, the rest will be for afterwards.'

UN: Civilian deaths by Taliban and Afghan forces on the rise



KABUL, MAY 19 (AP): The United Nations on Tuesday called for an immediate reduction of violence in Afghanistan, warning that civilian deaths by both the Taliban and Afghan security forces are on the increase.

The UN mission also expressed concern about stepped-up attacks and brutality of the Islamic State group.

A horrific attack last week at a maternity hospital in the Afghan capital has not been claimed by any group, but the United States said it bears all the hallmarks of Afghanistan's IS affiliate targeting the country's minority Shiites in a neighbourhood of Kabul that IS militants have repeatedly attacked in the past.

The Taliban denied involvement in the maternity hospital attack, which killed 24 people, including two infants and several new mothers.

The UN report blamed the Taliban for killing 208 civilians last month and also said that operations by Afghan forces in April had killed 172 civilians.

Civilians are often caught in the crossfire of the fighting and Afghan forces say they are targeting the insurgents, not civilians, in anti-militant operations.

Parties have committed to finding a peaceful solution and should protect the lives of all Afghans and not jeopardize

people's hope for an end to the war, said Deborah Lyons, the UN chief's special representative to Afghanistan.

She added that intra-Afghan peace negotiations need to start as soon as possible."

The UN's call for an end to violence comes as Washington's special peace envoy, Zalmay Khalilzad, began another round of talks with the Taliban to press them to start talking to the newly reconciled Afghan political leadership in Kabul and implement an immediate reduction in violence, said the US State Department.

Khalilzad, who is the architect of a US-Taliban deal signed in February, has been trying to salvage the agreement and jump-start intra-Afghan negotiations between the Taliban and the Kabul government.

power-sharing Α agreement on Sunday between President Ashraf Ghani and his rival, Abdullah Abdullah, ended months of wrangling and raised expectations that the next round of the US-Taliban peace deal, which calls for negotiations between the Taliban and Afghan leaders, can start.

visit Kabul. US Secretary State Mike Pompeo, who said in March that the US would cut USD 1 billion in US aid to Afghanistan unless Ghani and Andullah resolved their differences, has bemoaned the time lost to their bickering.

The United States remains committed to supporting the desire of the Afghan people and the international community for a political settlement that ends the 40-year conflict and ensures Afghanistan never again serves as a platform for international terrorism, the State Department statement said.

The US-Taliban deal provides for the withdrawal of US and NATO troops, but only if the Taliban live up to their end to battle other militant groups, such as the Islamic State affiliate.

We have improved against fast bowling due to Raghu, says Kohli on throwdown specialist

down specialist D Raghavendra's ability to rachet up speeds in excess of 150-155 kmph with the sidearm enormously contributed to Indian batsmen's improvement against fast bowling in recent years, acknowledges skipper Virat Kohli.

The sidearm is a cricketing equipment that is shaped like a long spoon, with its far end designed to hold and

hurl the ball at great speeds. "I believe the improvement this team has shown while playing fast bowling since 2013 has been because of Raghu," Kohli said during an Instagram Live session with Bangladesh star

"He has good concepts about footwork, bat movement of players. He has improved his skills so much that from sidearm he easily hurls the balls at 155 kmph. "After playing Raghu in nets, when you go into the match, you feel there is a lot of time," Kohli added.

It is no surprise that Raghavendra has been a crucial member of the Indian cricket team's support staff for years now. Kohli said he never had self doubts at any time, including while engineering those big chases in high-pressure international matches.

"To be honest, I never doubted myself in game situations. Everyone who is human has doubts and weaknesses. Have their negatives. So in practice during tours, if you haven't had a good session you feel you don't have that flow. "Yes, doubts creep in then and it's at the back of your mind. Key is to keep going and get into that zone till you feel that it was just distraction. If I believe I am good enough, then I am good enough."

The prolific scorer added, "Best part about match situation is that you don't need to think so much. You react to situations knowing your role.

"For me I had to change it accordingly to suit my needs. I tried little, little things in my batting as you would never know if you don't try."

Continuing, he said unless a player tries out new things in match situations, he would never be able to perfect them. "... So my advice is even if you try a lot in practice do try out new things in one or two games to check if

A civet cat -- the animal believed to have carried Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS) to humans in another coronavirus outbreak nearly two decades ago -- would fetch 600 yuan.

Neighbouring angxi province has also released plans to help farmers dispose of animals, as well as financial aid. The state-run Jiangxi Daily newspaper reported last week that the

province has more than 2,300 licensed breeders, mostly rearing wild animals for food.

Their stock is worth about 1.6 billion yuan (\$225 million), the report said. Both Jiangxi and Hunan border Hubei, the province where the coronavirus first emerged in December.

Animal rights group Humane Society International (HSI) said Hunan and Jiangxi are "major wildlife breeding provinces", with Jiangxi seeing a rapid expansion of the trade over the last decade.

Revenues

breeding reached 10 billion vuan in 2018, it said.

HSI China policy specialist Peter Li told AFP that similar plans should be rolled out across the country. But he cautioned that Hunan's proposals leave room for farmers to continue breeding exotic creatures as long as the animals are not sent to food markets.

The province's plan also does not include many wild animals bred for fur, traditional Chinese medicine or entertainment.

Although Beijing implemented measures to ban the trade and consumption of wild animals after the SARS outbreak, these failed to bring the trade to a halt.

Li said Chinese authorities are nevertheless now moving in the right direction.

"In the past 20 years, a lot of people have been telling the Chinese government to buy out certain wildlife breeding operations -- for example bear farming," he said.

"This is the first time that the Chinese government actually decided to do it, which opens a precedent... (for when) other production needs to be phased out."

WHO to review virus response as Trump renews attack

 $T^{\text{he World Health Organization Said it}}$ would launch an independent review of its response to the coronavirus pandemic but President Donald Trump renewed his attack on the global body, branding it a "puppet of China" and threatening a permanent freeze on US funding.

Washington is locked in an increasingly bitter spat with Beijing over the new coronavirus pandemic and has also taken aim at the WHO. which on Monday kicked off its first-ever virtual assembly.

A resolution tabled by the European Union called for an "impartial, independent and comprehensive evaluation" of the international response to the pandemic, which has so far infected nearly 4.8 million people and killed more than 317,000.

WHO Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus acknowledged there had been shortcomings and told the virtual assembly he welcomed calls for a review.

"I will initiate an independent evaluation at the earliest appropriate moment to review experience gained and lessons learned, and to make recommendations to improve national and global pandemic preparedness and response," he said.

"But one thing is abundantly clear. The world must never be the same.

"We do not need a review to tell us that we must all do everything in our power to ensure this never happens again," Tedros said.

A wide range of country leaders and health ministers hailed the WHO's efforts but US health secretary Alex Azar said its "failure" to obtain and provide vital information on COVID-19 had cost lives.

"We must be frank about one of the primary reasons this outbreak spun out of control: there was a failure by this organisation to obtain the information that the world needed, and that failure cost many lives," Azar said in a video address to the WHO's main annual meeting.

May 18, Trump alleged that the WHO has failed to publicly call on China to allow for an independent investigation into the origins of the virus, despite the recent endorsement for doing so by its own Emergency Committee.

On Monday, Chinese President Xi Jinping dispelled the criticism of secrecy and cover-up, saying "all along, we have acted with openness, transparency and responsibility. We have provided information to WHO and relevant countries in a most timely fashion.

Trump has accused China of covering up, while Australia and the European Union have called for more transparency in China's COVID-19 control efforts including an independent inquiry into the origins of the virus.

More than 300,000 people have died due to the coronavirus pandemic and over 4.8 million people infected around the world. The US is the worsthit country with over 90,000 deaths and over 1.5 million confirmed COVID-19 cases, according to Johns Hopkins University.

BY YOSHITA SINGH NEW YORK, MAY 19 (PTI): New York City, hit hard by the coronavirus pandemic, is still weeks away from a phased reopening by the first half of June, Mayor Bill de Blasio has said, as authorities are trying to meet all the seven health-related measures necessary for such a step.

New York City, the epicenter of the COVID-19 pandemic in the US, has 191,073 coronavirus cases and 15,983 confirmed COVID-19 deaths, which are deaths following positive COVID-19 laboratory tests.

There's no way we're getting to the City and State indicators before June at this rate. So, June is the first opportunity the first half of June is the first opportunity to relax anything, de Blasio said Monday at a press briefing.

New York Governor Andrew Cuomo has said that regions across the state will have to meet seven criteria before they will be allowed to gradually re-open businesses and institutions.

The seven metrics that will define whether a region can re-open businesses are decline in total hospitalisations,

decline in deaths measured by the three-day rolling average of daily new hospital deaths not exceeding 5, fewer than two new hospitalisations per 100,000 residents, hospital bed capacity regions must have at least 30 per cent of their total hospital beds available before a phased re-opening, availability of 30 percent of ICU beds in a region, diagnostic testing capacity and contact tracing capacity.

Another 4,823 are probable deaths, where the cause is reported as "COVID-19" or equivalent, but no positive laboratory test.

Blasio said the city has made progress in some criteria but in the requirements for number of available hospital beds and number of ICU beds we need to go farther, but we're getting close to those goals.

And I think there's a point in the first half of June when we'll meet those. He emphasised that the city will evaluate very carefully regarding if and when it is ready to open up.

We've got to then make decisions on exactly which restrictions to loosen up, exactly how, and we have to be confident that when we're doing it, we can hold the line. We do not want to reduce restrictions and suddenly see an upsurge that puts us right back in a situation where we have to close down. So there's a real subtle balance that needs to be struck.

But if the question is do we believe we'll meet all seven state indicators? Yes. When? First half of June, he said.

New York state's six regions - Central New York, the North Country, Finger Lakes, Southern Tier, Western New York and Mohawk Valley Regions - have met all seven metrics required to begin phase one of the state's regional phased reopening plan.

These regions have begun opening businesses over the weekend for phase one, which includes construction; manufacturing wholesale supply chain; retail for curbside pickup and drop-off or in-store pickup; and agriculture, forestry and fishing.

The total number of coronavirus cases in New York State stands at 351,371 with over 28,000 deaths.
