Land Transfer Act restored to original form

PEOPLE DID NOT WANT TO WAIT FOR LONG TERM FRUITS: CM

fresh amendment to the Sik-A fresh amendment to the Sik-kim Regulation of Transfer of Land Act has restored the Act to its original form after having been tweaked barely four months ago. Introduced by Chief Minister

Pawan Chamling who is also the Minister In-Charge for Land Revenue, the amendment was passed today on the second day of the ongoing Assembly

And IPR press release, quotes the CM as explaining the turnaround, thus: "But people did not want to wait for the long term fruit so the Government had to again amend it and restore it in its original form. Thus, with this Amendment Bill passed by the House today, people can continue to buy and sell land as per the existing practice."

He explained that the idea

behind the amendments which were rolled back today was "to ensure that Sikkimese of every community is secure and are not

These amendments, apart from protecting the private land holdings of Limboo, Tamang and Sherpa communities from alienation to other communities, as also those of OBCs and Sched-ules Castes, had also included a proviso which required sellers to retain a minimum acreage, below which they could not sell their lands or would require special permissions to be able to do so.



India leads world charts for MDR TB: WHO

(PTI): India accounted for 24 per cent cases of multi-drug resistant tu-berculosis (MDR-TB) in 2017 -- the highest in the world and followed by China's 13 per cent and Russia's 10 per cent, according to a report by the World Health Organiza-

tion (WHO).

The three countries accounted for almost half of the world's total MDR-TB cases.

The WHO said global efforts have averted an estimated 54 million TB deaths since 2000, but TB remains the world's deadliest infectious dis-

India also ranked the highest among the top-30 high TB burden countries in the world, with 27 per cent of the 10 million people who were diagnosed with tuberculosis last year.

According to the report, under-reporting and under-diagnosis of TB cases remains a ma-jor challenge as of the 10 million people who fell ill with TB in 2017, only 6.4 million were officially recorded by national reporting systems. This left 3.6 million people undi-agnosed, or detected but not reported.

Ten countries ac-counted for 80 per cent of this gap, with India, Indonesia and Nigeria topping the list, the WHO report said.

Globally, an estimated 10 million people developed TB last year and two third of such cases were in eight countries --India (27 per cent), China (9 per cent), Indonesia (8 per cent), the Philippines (6 per cent), Pakistan (5 per cent), Nigeria (4 per cent), Bangladesh (4 per cent) and South Africa (3 per cent).
Only 6 per cent of

global cases were in the European Region (3 per cent) and the Americas (3 per cent), the WHO said.

The report stated that MDR-TB remains a public health crisis and China and India alone were home to around 40 per cent of patients requiring treatment for this, but not reported to be receiving it.



Minister-in-Charge, Roads and Bridges Department, GM Gurung, while replying to a question raised by MLA. Kunga Nima Lepcha informed that the carpeting work has been tendered and shall be issued by the end of rainy season and will be executed in upcoming dry season. The tender cost of the project is 75, 02,601.00 and the contractor for the project is Bikram Lama. He also added that the department is not giving the Middle Syari road connectivity a step motherly treatment as the department is very much concerned about the hardships faced by the local people due to the damages caused by landslide at Zymping ward. To address such problems, the Government has already sanctioned the restoration work. Tendering process has been completed and work will take place during working season after issuance of work order to the contractor. He also informed about the last carpeting/resurfacing of Ranipool/Nandok road which was executed during the period 2009 to 2013 under the Government Contractor named Jogen Mukhia. The unprecedented rainfall in last few years has caused immense damage to road from LLHP to Nandok. This road has very few numbers of natural jhora to divert the water collected from side rain. During rainy season, even minor slips block the drain and water tends to flow over the carpeted surface. Prolonged water flow over carpeted area affects existing surface and more deteriorated state. During the CM's visit in July, emergency surface repairing was done departmentally to provide immediate relief. Now, a proposal has been prepared for strengthening of road surface by using much thicker section of bituminous course to improve the carrying capacity of the road, it is under active consideration.

While replying to the questions put forth by MLA. Kunga Nima Lepcha, Minister-in-Charge of Tourism and Aviation Department, Ugen. T. Gyatso informed about the total number of Domestic and Foreign tourist in Sikkim during 2017-18 such as; Domestic Tourists, 2017 – 13, 75,854, Domestic Tourists, 2018 – 10, 64,042. Foreign Tourists, 2017 – 49,111, Foreign Tourists, 2018 – 32,717. Also, he informed about the total revenue earned

during Financial Year 2017-18 and 2018 - 19 (first quarter) as Rs. 5, 13, 95,818 and 1, 84, 47, 926 respec tively. The revenue earned is deposited in the State

exchequer under the relevant Heads of Account. He also informed about the 81,828 Inner Line Permits which has been issued since January, 2017 to June 2018. And the popular destinations visited on ILP are Gangtok, Rumtek and Tsomgo in East Sikkim, Phodong and Yumthang in North Sikkim, Namchi and Ravangla in South Sikkim and Pelling, Yuksom,

Tashiding and Zongri in West Sikkim

Chief Minister, also the Leader of the House, Pawan Chamling in his valedictory address said that the decisions taken in the two-day Session were directed to safeguard the present and the future of the Sikkime people. He reiterated that the five Amendment Bills passed by the House are people-centric, and will have positive impact on their lives.

Speaking on the Sikkim Anti Drugs (Amendment) Bill, Bill No. 20 of 2018, the Chief Minister stated that it was a historic amendment and will be a matter of wide discussion and praise throughout the country and the world. He reiterated that the Amendment Bill decriminalizes drug abuse and encourages drug addicts to seek medical treatment. He said that the earlier Amendment treated drug addicts as criminals liable to punishment, so they would not share their addiction. Thus, societal and other fears kept them from seeking help and they continued to discreetly abuse contraband substances. With this landmark Amendment, that will completely change and more people will acknowledge their addiction and will seek medical help. This will thus help in curbing drug addiction in our society, stated the Chief Minister.

"We have given drug addicts an encouragement to seek treatment and join the mainstream of the society. This is an initiative of the State Government worth em-ulating by other States and countries," he stated. He added that the other objective of this Amendment Bill is to build an opinion among all stakeholders about the challenge of addiction in society and the way to make Sikkim a drug addiction-free State. Drug peddlers, on the other hand, would be liable to severest punishment which can go upto minimum one year imprisonment

and fine of over one lakh rupees, he added.

Speaking on the Wildlife (Protection) Act (Amendment) Bill, Bill No. 21 of 2018, Chief Minister, Pawan Chamling stated that Sikkim is a unique model of hu-mans coexisting in harmony with the environment. However, the menace of wild animals on private agricultural holdings posed a threat to human sustenance, and the Government was compelled to come out with the Amendment Bill. He reiterated that the Bill passed by the House today would give respite to the farming community of Sikkim. He urged the people to use their responsible minds to deal with any situation of wild life menace and use permissible objects or weap-ons to chase the animals. The Chief Minister also stated that Sikkim is the first State in the world to pass Wildlife (Protection) Act, which prevents killing of wild animals.

On the Sikkim Goods and Services Tax (Amendnent) Bill, Bill No. 24 of 2018, the Chief Minister said that the Bill would help improvise and simplify the Tax for the benefit of all stakeholders.

The Chief Minister stated that the Second Supplementary Demands for Grants for the financial year

2018-19 passed by the House today would fulfil the present demands and priorities of the people of Sikkim. He added that the sanctioned amount should be utilized to fulfil the basic minimum needs of the people as well as provide them with all the facilities. He stated that most of the need-based demands of the people from the recent thirty-two day tour of the Chief Minister were sanctioned and accommodated in the Budget

He informed that 1200 km of road has been sanctioned, which when completed would mean 99% road connectivity in Sikkim. No village, block, or ward would be left out and Sikkim will have the highest road density in the country. The Chief Minister said that due to fragile geology leading to natural calamities, the condition of State and National highways remains an area of concern. He added that the concerned Department should immediately carry out repair and restoration work wherever necessary so that people do not suffer. He called for participation of engineers, contractors and the public to ensure that all ongoing works are qualitative and are completed

within scheduled time.

The Chief Minister further stated that all protec tive works, drinking water schemes, electrification, jhora training, upgradation of transformers, demands for religious places, crematorium centres, community centres, community play grounds, repair of school buildings and other amenities have been sanctioned by the Government.

He further directed the concerned Department to complete the construction of all sanctioned houses under the Rural Housing Scheme, the REDRH Scheme, and complete the house up-gradation work on priority as well as to provide plot of land to the landless. The Chief Minister directed the concerned Department to ensure that the State and National highways and tourism spots should have wayside amenities and washrooms for the convenience of tourists and visitors. All taxi parking places, plaza and stands, should also have washroom facilities, he stressed. Further, all non-functional hostels in Senior Sec-

ondary Schools and Colleges and all vacant Govern-ment Quarters should be made functional immediately.

He also said that budget has been allocated for the cently announced Sikkim Students Welfare Board and Sikkim Senior Citizens' Welfare Board as well as a Senior Citizen Bhawan.

The Chief Minister also announced that Disaster Management will be part of school curriculum from next academic session.

He said that people of Sikkim should take pride in the fact that it now has the highest literacy rate in the country with 96.72%, which is among the many 'firsts' it has achieved in several fields. Likewise, the development of Sikkim can be measured by its Happiness Index, which is the highest in the country, he

stated. The increase in the life expectancy of the people of Sikkim by ten years is yet another indicator of development recorded by the State, he added. "Sikkim is all set to have the Pakyong Greenfield

Airport inaugurated by the Hon'ble Prime Minister of India Shri Narendra Modi on the 23rd of September. I thank the Prime Minister for taking out time from his busy schedule to visit Sikkim and welcome him on behalf of the people of Sikkim," stated the Chief Minister.
The Airport has been built at an estimated cost

of Rs 605.59 crore by the Airports Authority of India, he informed. Further, he informed that the State Government has provided land compensation to 164 people amounting to Rs 63.13 crore, Further, 257 peole have claimed for compensation but the matter is sub-judice, he informed.

The CM, in his address, also mentioned some of the major infrastructures coming up such as the alter-native national highway, railway project upto Rangpo, new Secretariat, Medical College & Multi Speciality Hospital, Chenrizig Singkham Riwo Potala, Sky Walk Project, Underground Road and City. He also touched upon some of the recent decisions of the Government such as 'Job for Jobless', and implementation of recommendations of the Pay Commission.

In conclusion, the Chief Minister called upon all the concerned to take collective responsibility and ownership to take Sikkim to greater heights of development. He said that the good work done by the Government in the last twenty-four years should be appreciated, and collective and coordinated efforts

should be made to complete unfinished work.

"Determined leader, responsible administration and disciplined people are the three pillars or actors of true democracy," he stated. He urged all to understand and imbibe these values.

The Chief Minister thanked the Speaker of SLA, KN Rai for the smooth conduct of the two-day session. He thanked the Deputy Speaker, Ministers and MLAs for their presence and participation in the debates and discussions during the Session. He also thanked the Secretary and officers of the Sikkim Legislative Assembly Secretariat, officers of the State Government

Seminy secretariat, officers of the state development and members of the press and media. Speaker, KN Rai, in his valedictory address, thanked the Leader of the House, the Ministers, and MLAs for their participation. He expressed hope that the Supplementary Demands for Grants passed by the House would fulfil the aspirations of the people. He also thanked and congratulated the Members of the House for passing five important Amendment Bills. He extended his thanks to the Chief Secretary, Additional Chief Secretaries, DGP, Officers, Printing & Stationery Department, Police Department, IPR Department and Members of the media, and Secretary officers and staff of the Assembly Secretariat.

Blame Games

When everyone plays victim, who will take the initiative?

Anyone who has been following political developments and public statements of public figures in Sikkim, or for that matter at the national level, would have noticed that everyone is quick to take the position of a victim. Students blame teachers, teachers reciprocate, and the blame-game plays on and every-one sulks as a victim. Soon the role-play becomes so convincing that the young start buying in and now a generation is in grooming which is quick to blame everything on someone else, becoming intransigent and perfectly mirroring the very system and situation that they have issues with. Finger-pointing is a preferred pastime that the young see around them every day leaders who fail to convince voters to trust them blame money power or even the EVMs, parties which cannot attract an audience, blame intimidation of supporters; departments which scandalize with their inefficiency, blame blackmailing agents of spreading canards; panchayats who bungle, blame MLAs who blame Ministers who blame babus who blame political pressure... and the buck keep rolling.

The young always inspire hope and keep optimism alive and they do so by rebelling, by announcing that they will be different. Ominously for Sikkim, those claiming to speak for the young are screaming deeper colours of victimhood. SummitTIMES Microplastics are getting into mosquitoes and contaminating new food chains

There is no doubt that plastic pollution in oceans is a growing worldwide problem. The internet is full of images of seabirds and other marine animals entangled in plastic waste, and animals starve be-cause their guts are blocked

with plastic bags.

But the problem goes much deeper than this. Much plastic pollution is in the form of microplastics, tiny fragments less than five microme tres in size and invisible to the

naked eye. Our new research show croplastics are even getting into tiny flying insects such as mosquitoes. And this means the plastic can eventually contaminate animals in a more unlikely environment: the air.

Microplastics can come from larger plastic items as they break down, but are also released directly into waste water in their millions in the form of tiny beads found in many cosmetic products including face wash and toothpaste (though these are now banned in many countries). Many tiny animals can't tell the difference between their food and microplastics so end up eating them. Once inside an animal, the plastic can transfer via the food chain into fish and other creatures and eventually become a potential health problem for humans.

By studying mosquitoes, we have found a previously unknown way for plastic to pollute the envi-ronment and contaminate the food chain. Our new paper, published in Biology Letters, shows for the first time that microplastics can be kept inside a water-dwelling animal as they grow from one life

stage to another.

Although most microplastic research has fo-cused on the sea, plastic pollution is also a serious problem in freshwater, including rivers and lakes. Much of the freshwater research has concentrated on animals that live in the water throughout their life. But freshwater insects such as mosquitoes start their lives (as eggs) in water and, after several stages, eventually fly away when they grow up.

TESTING THE MOSQUITOES

It occurred to us that aquatic insects might carry plastics out of the water if they were able to keep the plastics in their body through their development. We tested this possibility by feeding micro-plastics to mosquito larvae in a laboratory setting. We fed the aquatic young in their third larvae stage food with or without microplastic beads.

We then took samples of the animals when the

larvae shed their skin to become larger fourth-stage larvae, when they transformed into a non-feeding stage called a pupa, and when they emerged from the water as a flying adult. We found the beads in all the life stages, although the numbers went down

as the animals developed.

We were able to locate and count the microplastic beads because they were flu-orescent. We found beads in the gut and in the mosquito version of the kidney, an or-gan that we know survives the development process intact. This shows that not only do aquatic insects such as mosquitoes eat both sizes of microplastics, they can keep them in their gut and kidney as they develop from a feeding juvenile larva up to a flying adult.

In this way, any flying insect that spends part of its life in water can become a carrier of plastic pollution. And flying insects are eaten in their thousands by predatory insects in the air such as dragonflies as well as by birds and bats.

Our results have important implications since any aquatic insect that can eat microplastics in the water could potentially carry them in their body to their flying stage where they can move the plastics into new food chains. As a result, freshwater plastic pollution is a problem that has implications far beyond those of water quality and eventual marine

Clearly these results raise a number of questions, including what effect microplastics have on the survival and development of mosquitoes through their life stages. And we still need to examine the effect of different types and sizes of plastics on more species to see how widespread an issue this could become.

Aline up along the streets
of St. James and Cedros to admire the vibrant floats with beautifully bedecked models of mausoleums. Their destina-tion is the waters of the Caribbean, where the crowds will push them out to float.

This is part of the Hosay commemorations, a religious ritual performed by Trinida-dian Muslims, that I have observed as part of the research for my forthcoming book on Islam in Latin America and the

What fascinates me is how a prac tice from India has been transformed into something uniquely Caribbean.
RE-ENACTING TRAGEDY

During the 10 days of the Islamic month of Muharram, Shiite Muslims around the world remember the martyrdom of Hussein, Prophet Muhammad's grandson, who was killed in a battle in Karbala, today's Iraq, some 1,338 years ago. For Shiite Muslims Hussein is the rightful successor to Prophet Muhammad.

Ashura, the 10th day of Muharram, is marked by public mourning and a re-enactment of the tragedy. Shiite Muslims put on passion plays that include inflicting suffering, as a way to remember Hussein. In Iraq, Shiite are known to beat themselves with swords. In India, mourners whip themselves with sharp blades. Some Shiite also visit Hussein's shrine in

Iraq.
The commemoration has also become a symbol for the broader Shiite struggle for justice as a minority in



EARLY HISTORY

In Trinidad, the 100,000 Muslims who make up 5 percent of the island's total population, celebrate the day of

Ashura, as Hosay – the name derived from "Hussein." The first Hosay festival was held

in 1854, just over a decade after the first Indian Muslims began to arrive from India to work on the island's

sugar plantations.

But Trinidad at the time was under British colonial rule and large public gatherings were not permit-ted. In 1884, the British authorities issued a prohibition against Hosay commemorations. Approximately 30,000 people took to the streets, in Mon Repos, in the south, to protest against the ordinance. Shots fired to disperse the crowd killed 22 and injured over 100. The ordinance was later overturned.

The "Hosay Massacre" or "Mu-

harram Massacre," however, lives in COLORFUL FLOATS OF TRINIDAD

These days, Hosay celebrations in St.

James and Cedros not only recall Hussein, but also those killed during the 1884 Hosay riots. Rather than recreate the events through self-flagellation or other forms of suffering, how ever, people in Trinidad create bright and beautiful floats, called "tadjahs," that parade through the streets to the

Each tadjah is constructed of wood, paper, bamboo and tinsel. Ranging from a height of 10 to 30 feet, the floats are accompanied by people parading along and others playing drums, just as is the practice in India's northern city of Lucknow. Meant to reflect the resting place of Shiite martyrs, the tadjahs resemble mausoleums in India. To many, their domes might be a reminder of the Taj

Mahal.

Walking ahead of the tadjahs are two men bearing crescent moon shapes, one in red and the other in green. These symbolize the deaths of Hussein and his brother Hassan – the red being Hussein's blood and the green symbolizing the supposed poisoning of Hassan.

The elaborateness of the tadjahs continues to increase each year and has become somewhat of a status symbol among the families that spon-

A BIT CARNIVAL,

A BIT ASHURA
While the festival is certainly a somber one in terms of its tribute, it is also a joyous occasion where families celebrate with loud music and don festive attire. This has led some to compare Hosay to Trinidad's world-famous car-nival with its accompanying "joie de vivre."

But there are also those who be-lieve that the occasion should be a more somber remembrance of the martydom of Hussein. More con-servative Muslims in Trinidad have made attempts to "reform" such celehrations These Muslims believe local customs should be more in line with global commemorations like those in

Iraq or India.

What I saw in the festival was an assertion of both the Indian and Trinidadian identity. For Shiite Muslims, who have dealt with oppression and ostracism - both in the past and in the present – it is a means of claiming their space as a minority in Trinidadian culture and resisting being pushed to the margins. At the same time, with its carnival-like feel, the festival could not be more Trinidadian.

Indeed, the celebrations each year illustrate how Indian and Trinidadian rituals and material culture merged to create a unique festival.

Why you can smell rain

When those first fat drops of summer rain fall to the hot, dry ground, have you ever noticed a distinctive odor? I have childhood memories of family members who were farmers describing how they could

always "smell rain" right before a storm.

Of course rain itself has no scent. But moments before a rain event, an "earthy" smell known as petrichor does permeate the air. People call

it musky, fresh – generally pleasant.

This smell actually comes from the moistening of the ground. Australian scientists first documented the process of petrichor formation in 1964 and scientists from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology further studied the mechanics of the process in the 2010s.

Petrichor is a combination of fragrant chemical compounds. Some are from oils made by plants. The main contributor to petrichor are actinobacteria. These tiny microorganisms can be found in rural and urban areas as well as in marine environments. They decompose dead or de-caying organic matter into simple chemical compounds which can then

become nutrients for developing plants and other organisms.

A byproduct of their activity is an organic compound called geosmin which contributes to the petrichor scent. Geosmin is a type of alcohol, like rubbing alcohol. Alcohol molecules tend to have a strong scent, but the complex chemical structure of geosmin makes it especially notice-able to people even at extremely low levels. Our noses can detect just a few parts of geosmin per trillion of air molecules.

During a prolonged period of dryness when it has not rained for sev eral days, the decomposition activity rate of the actinobacteria slows down. Just before a rain event, the air becomes more humid and the ground begins to moisten. This process helps to speed up the activity of the actinobacteria and more geosmin is formed.

When raindrops fall on the ground, especially porous surfaces such as loose soil or rough concrete, they will splatter and eject tiny particles called aerosols. The geosmin and other petrichor compounds that may be present on the ground or dissolved within the raindrop are released in aerosol form and carried by the wind to surrounding areas. If the rainfall is heavy enough, the petrichor scent can travel rapidly downwind and alert people that rain is soon on the way.

The scent eventually goes away after the storm has passed and the

ground begins to dry. This leaves the actinobacteria lying in wait – ready to help us know when it might rain again. [the writer is Instructional Assistant Professor of At-

here Thursday. Siang river, which originates in Tibet, was in spate in August and September due to heavy

Over 1,000 families living in the catchment areas of East Siang district were affected in the flood.

Arunachal Pradesh Disaster Management Secretary Bidol Tayeng called on Rijiju in New Delhi Tuesday to apprise him of the situation in the district, the release said.

Stressing the need for "flood protection" along Siang river, the secretary pressed for early visit of



a central team to inspect the dis-

trict and assess the losses, it said.
The Union minister of state for home affairs, on his part, said he was yet to receive a requisi-tion letter from the state government in this regard.

However, he promised to send an inter-ministerial team for assessment at the earliest.

"The team of experts will be visiting the district and file a report, based on which plans will be made to tame the Siang river," the

official release said quoting Rijiju. Meanwhile, the All Arunachal Pradesh Students' Union (AAP-SU) here has expressed "deep concern" over the issue of largescale siltation on Siang river bed and erosion of catchment areas

AAPSU general secretary Tobom Dai said people had to flee their homes after the "ma-rauding" flood waters of Siang entered into the villages.

In a statement Thursday, Dai said the river water is turning muddier and its flow more turbulent with time, adding to anx ieties in the minds of people in

the Siang valley.

"The alleged apathy of the governments, both in the state and at the Centre, in providing a concrete solution to the problem has created confusion and a sense of deprivation in the minds of affected people," Dai



High security arrangements for Muharram in WB

ed and there will be po-lice posting along with the processions," an officer of Kolkata Traffic Police said.

The city police was also keeping a close watch on social media to keep a check on the spread of any fake news or rumour in connection with Muharram proces-

sions, the officer said.

"That's a challenge for us. We are keeping an eve on social networking sites so that no fake news, photographs or hate messages lead to communal commotion here. Anybody found forwarding such rumours will attract strict action, he said.

A senior officer of state police said precautionary measures have been taken in connection with the Muharram procession.

"We have taken every possible measures to avoid any unwanted incident during tomorrow's Muharram's processions. We will not allow anyone to create disturbance in the state," he said.
"We have alerted the

administration and asked them to take necessary measures to ward off any problem during the processions anywhere in the state. We want absolute peace during Muharram processions," state Ed-ucation Minister Partha Chatterjee told reporters

at the secretariat.

He said the administration has been asked to ep a note on the spread of hate messages to disrupt peace in the state.

Welcoming the new French Consul General in Kolkata, The New Town School Principal Satabdi Goswami Bhattacharjee said her institute was the "first in the country" to host a French teacher in the European Common framework for languages.
"For the first time,

the French consulate and embassy has appointed Melissa Camille Abrantes as teaching assistant for The New Town School for a nine-month course.

curriculum for students of Classes V to X," Bhattacharjee said.

Her school will initiate a cultural exchange programme with two French schools from 2019, under which 10 to 15 students would be travelling to France and an equal number will be hosted by families of students here, she said.

Laetitia Lompech, the consulate's linguistic attach confirmed that Abrantes was the first French teacher in a school in India, who was directly engaged by the consulate. She also said plans

were afoot to take the initiative to other academic institutes in the eastern part of India.

to say that I love the food French is a part of the IIT-KGP develops model to predict variability and trends in rainfall in India KOLKATA, SEP 20 (PTI): Research ers at IIT Kharagpur have developed a new statistical model which can be used to predict variability and trends in rainfall over different climate regions of India The model, developed by researchers of the Centre for Oceans Rivers, Atmosphere and Land Sciences (CORAL), takes into considm eration both local and remote factors causing weather changes, an IIT-KGP statement said Thursday.

Many of these, local and re-mote, factors that affect weather conditions have been known to the scientific community, the statement said, adding, most weather forecast models typically consider local factors or a single factor that affects rainfall or use of statistical models of correlation to establish the impact of various factors.

Because of this, there used to

be significant uncertainties in such predictions as each independent factor has a certain impact, which may not match with actual conditions, it said.

'Our study finds that the summer monsoon rainfall variability is governed by the surface tempera-tures of the Eastern Pacific, Central Pacific. Atlantic and the north Indian Oceans, and equatorial zonal winds," the statement said quoting

Prof Jayanarayanan Kuttippurath.
However, the winter monsoon
rainfall variability is largely controlled by the surface temperature of the North Atlantic and extratropical oceans, Kuttippurath said.

"In our model we have used a technique which removes the impact of individual factors to find the trends in rainfall. The model 19792017. can be used to find the contribution of individual factors to rainfall and can be applied to estimate the trends and variability of rainfall," Dr Prijitha J Nair, the lead research-

the statement. The model can predict any type of weather conditions, anywhere in the world only by changing the relevant factors affecting the changes, he explained.

The model, which has been developed by using data over a period of 38 years, has predicted significant changes in Indian rainfall in the per-

The data analyses conducted during the study revealed significant positive trends (0.43mm/ day/dec) in the north-west for summer rainfall during the period

There are scientific evidences of major climate shifts over centuries. These do not happen overnight but through gradual changes in weather conditions over time," Professor Arun Chakraborty, who supervised the research, was quoted as saying in the statement.

"The data shows there has been an incremental shift of Indian monsoon from east to west. However, this would require further studies," Chakraborty said.

The novelty of the model has been reported through a research paper 'The local and global climate forcings induced inhomogeneity of Indian rainfall' in the much-cov-eted Scientific Reports by the Nature, the IIT statement said.



Jet Airways flight: 5 passengers suffer 'mild conductive deafness'

Mumbai, Sep 20 (PTI): Five Jet Airways passengers, who suf-fered nose and ear bleeding Thursday after the crew failed to turn on a switch that controls cabin air pressure, were diag-nosed with "mild conductive deafness" and later discharged from hospital, officials said.

The five passengers -- Anveshan Ray (39), Mukesh Sharma (31), Vikas Agarwal (31), Da-modar Das (37) and Ankur Kala (38) -- were examined by ENT specialists at the Dr Balabhai Nanavati Hospital, a civic official

Nanavati Hospital's chief operating officer Rajendra Patankar said their health condition was stable and they did not require admission.

As per their examination by ENT doctors, the five passengers suffered "barotrauma" of ear, which is caused due to a change in air pressure, Patankar told reporters here.

"The five patients, all males, have mild conductive deafness, a temporary condition which is likely to take a week or 10 days to heal. They are advised not to fly till then.

They are undergoing all required tests," he said.

"Whatever medication is required for the treatment of mild deafness, has been advised," Patankar said.

After the five passengers were examined and provided treatment, they left the hospital, the civic official said.

The other passengers were attended to by doctors at the Mumbai airport.

The Boeing 737 aircraft returned to Mumbai due to "loss of cabin pressure" and the pilots have been taken off duty pending investigation, a Jet Airways spokesperson said.

Citing initial information, the official said few passengers have nose bleeding.

"Out of 166 passengers on board, 30 passengers are affected... some have nose bleeding, a few have ear bleeding and some are complaining of headache," he added.

Civil Aviation Minister Suresh Prabhu ordered a safety audit of all scheduled airlines and airports.

Korean DMZ: Poignant symbol of divided nation, hope for reunification

KOREAN DEMILITARISED ZONE, SEP 20 (PTI): A 250-km-long mil-itary demarcation line virtually divides the Korean Peninsula into two halves, but many hearts on both sides of the heavily fortified border still yearn to meet.

In and around the dimilitarised zone, better known as the DMZ, that stretches 2 km wide on each side of the dividing line, symbol-ism of reunification run high. From dazzling Dorasan sta-

tion, the last railway station on the South Korean side located about 650 metres from the DMZ, with its 'Unification Platform' to countless colourful ribbons tied to barbed wire fences nearby a preserved railway engine at Imjingak, carry-ing messages from people in the South for the family members lost or left back in the North, the desire to reunite is palpable in the air.

On the Unification Platform, a signboard put by Korail, South Korea's national railway operator, indicates "Pyongyang 205 km- Seoul 56 km" while a huge landscaped poster showing the tracks, carries the message "Not the last station



from the South. But the first station towards the North", signalling the aspiration to reconnect

And, as South Korean President Moon Jae-in and North Korean historic third summit Thursday, the two leaders made gestures, indicating a push towards establishing lasting peace in the region and ac celerating the process of denuclear-

"From the airplane, I observed North Korea's mountains and rivers and the streets of Pyongyang from the time they appeared until we landed. No signs of division were visible at all from that point

of view, Moon had tweeted Tuesday on the first day of the threeday summit.

The two leaders had hugged each other at the Sunan international airport in Pyongyang where Moon flew to from Seoul, becoming the first president to visit the

North Korean capital in 11 years. In his address at the May Day Stadium, Moon greeted people as Citizens of Pyeongyang, our breth-ren in the North . "By developing inter-Korean

relations in an all-embracing and groundbreaking manner, we firmly pledged to reconnect Korea's arteries and to hasten a future of common prosperity and reunification on our own terms, Moon said.

We had lived together for five thousand years but apart for just 70 years. Here, at this place today, I propose we move forward toward the big picture of peace in which the past 70-year-long hostility can be eradicated and we can become one again, he said.

During their summit. Kim agreed to make a visit to Seoul and the two leaders also agreed to create a facility to hold family reunions at any time, work towards joining up road and rail links, and mount a combined bid for the

2032 Olympics.

The desire to become was articulated in 1983, in a song '30 Years Lost' and was used as a themes song for the show 'Search for the Dispersed Families' which was aired on KBS, a Korean channel, from June 30-November 14, 1983, to reunite families torn apart by the Korean War, fought between the two Koreas from 1950-53 before an

armistice brought it to a halt.
A monument to this song has been erected at Imjingak, next to the locomotive, riddled with 1,020 bullet holes a "symbol of the tragic history of the division" into North

and South Korea.
"This song is also well-known in North Korea. And, this monument stands here, waiting for the reunification of north and South Korea, the plaque next to the monument reads.
A 2017 survey by the Seoul Na-

tional University Institute for Peace and Unification Studies showed 53 per cent of the South Korean respondents backed unification.

Imran Khan writes to Modi; seeks to re-start bilateral talks

ISLAMARAD, SEP 20 (PTI): Paki-Khan has written a letter to his Indian counternart Narendra Modi the Foreign Office said here Thurs day, seeking to re-start the bilateral talks on key issues "challenging the relationship" including on terrorism and Kashmir.

In the letter dated September 14, the cricketer-turned-politician, who became the prime minister last month, proposed a meeting between Foreign Minister Shah Mehmood Qureshi and his Indian counterpart Sushma Swaraj on the sidelines of the UN General Assembly in New York this month.

"Building on the mutual desire for peace between our two countries. I wish to propose a meeting between Foreign Minister Makh-doom Shah Mahmood Qureshi and External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj, before the informal meeting of the SAARC foreign ministers the sidelines of the upcoming I General Assembly in New York," Khan wrote.

Pakistan and India have an "un deniably challenging relationship", he said, while responding to Mo-

di's letter to him on August 18.
In the letter to Khan, Modi conveyed India's commitment to pursue "meaningful" and "construc-tive" engagement with Pakistan and emphasising the need to work for a terror-free South Asia.



Pakistan's Ministry of Foreign Affairs' Spokesperson Mohammad Faisal said on Twitter: "PM (Imran Khan) has responded to PM Modi, in a positive spirit, reciprocating his sentiments. Let's talk and resolve all issues. We await formal response from India".

In the letter to Modi, Khan wrote: "We, however, owe it to our peoples, especially the future generations, to peacefully resolve all outstanding issues, including the Jammu and Kashmir dispute, to bridge differences and achieve a mutually beneficial outcome".

The Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) chief thanked Prime Minis-ter Modi for his "warm greetings" and best wishes on his assumption of charge as the Prime Minister of

The two ministers (Qureshi and Swaraj) could explore the

way forward, Khan said, adding that the SAARC Summit in Islamabad "will offer an opportunity for you to visit Pakistan and for us to re-start the stalled dialogue

Ties between India and Pakistan nose-dived following a spate of terror attacks on Indian mili-tary bases by Pakistan based terror groups since January 2016. Following the strikes, India announced it will not engage in talks with Pakistan, saying terror and talks cannot go hand-in-hand.

Amid heightened tension with Pakistan over Uri terror attack in which 18 soldiers were killed, In-dia had pulled out of the SAARC Summit to be held in Islamabad in November, 2016. The summit was called off after Bangladesh, Bhutan and Afghanistan also declined to participate in the meet.

Japan's Abe cruises to party vote win, to stay as Prime Minister

TOKYO, SEP 20 (AFP): Prime Minister Shinzo Abe won comfortable re-election as leader of his ruling party Thursday, setting him on course to become Japan's longest-serving premier and realise his dream of reforming the consti-

The 63-year-old conservative secured 553 votes against 254 won by former defence minister Shigeru Ishiba, a hawkish self-confessed "military geek", in a two-horse race for leader of the Liberal Democratic Party.

The win effectively hands Abe three more years as PM, giving him the chance of breaking the record for the nation's longest serving premiership held by Taro Katsura,



revered politician who served three times between 1901 and 1913

Public support for Abe -- a political thoroughbred whose grandfather and father both held power
-- has recovered after he managed to survive a series of cronyism and cover-up scandals.

Now reconfirmed in power, Abe will head to New York this weekend to attend the UN General weekend to attend the UN General Assembly and hold a summit with US President Donald Trump. Abe and Trump, who enjoy each other's company on the golf course and are close diplomatic

allies, are expected to analyse the latest inter-Korean summit. But they will also have to con-

front a growing trade dispute as Trump sees Tokyo among "unfair' trade partners.

While Japanese voters put the economy and social security as their top priorities, Abe aims to use the election to push his dream of reforming the country's post-World War II pacifist constitution.

Indian-origin doctor warns of 'unconscious racism' in UK's state-run health service

LONDON, SEP 20 (PTI): A senior Indian-origin med-ic who heads Britain's leading doctors' union on Thursday called on the government-funded National Health Service to treat its black and minority ethnic doctors more fairly, alleging that there is an "unconscious rac-ism" within the system.

Dr Chaand Nagpaul. chair of the British Medical Association (BMA), said despite making up a third of the National Health Service (NHS) workforce, the Black And Minority Ethnic (BAME) doctors were not proportionately represented at senior managerial levels of the UK's

health service.

BAME doctors are more prone to bullying and being referred to the country's medical watch-dog General Medical Council (GMC) over allegations of misconduct, he



findings of a new survey he launched as the first Indian-origin head of the association to warn against an "unconscious racism" within the system acting as a barrier for BAME doctors in the NHS, many of them Indian.

"As well as a culture of fear and blame, the survey concluded that the BAME doctors remain disadvantaged by the NHS. Only half of ethnic minority doctors feel respected or culturally included in their place of work. "BAME doctors make up more than a third of the medical workforce and play a vital role, day in day out, delivering care to patients across the country. Yet despite their commitment they're more likely to face referral to the GMC


are more likely to have their cases investigated and are more likely to face harsh sanctions following an investigation," he said.

BMA highlights that only seven per cent of very senior managers in the NHS are currently from the BAME back-grounds, something Nagpaul says is not down to "lack of ability".

"BAME staff in the

NHS workforce whole are more likely to experience bullying, harassment or abuse from other staff. Differential achievement in exams and poorer career pro-gression are another worrying factor, and with independent research showing that this is not related to any lack of ability. In the 21st century, that is not acceptable," said Nagpaul, who has been a General Practi-tioner (GP) with the NHS

for nearly 30 years.
