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Sikkim ends Ranji campaign in 5th position

Arunachal humbled by 10 wickets in Sikkim's last match of the Plate Division

GANGTOK, 09 JAN:
Sikkim completed its
first Ranji Trophy season on a winning note to-day, humbling Arunachal Pradesh by 10 wickets. This was a good debut outing for Sikkim which closed its season with 27 points winning half its eight matches and standing on the fifth po-sition in the Plate Divi-sion of the tournament. It also registered some record-breaking individ-ual feats with Milind Kumar of the Sikkim squad emerging as the highest run-scorer of the season and also making it to the record books as the second-highest run-getter in a Ranji season for his 1,331 runs scored in eight matches.

Sikkim won its matches against Arunachal Pradesh, Manipur, Mizoram and Nagaland, drew against Meghalaya and lost to Bihar, Puducherry and Uttarakhand.

As for its last match,

Sikkim won the toss and elected to field first and restricted the opponents to just 169 runs with Milind Kumar taking 5 wick-ets, Ishwar Chaudhary three, and Bipul Sharma and Lee Yong Lepcha scalping one wicket each. In its chase, Sikkim made 262 runs, earning a

lead of 93 runs to which Lee Yong contributed with his first half-century on the season at 58 runs, Milind (51), Bibek (37), Bipul (31), Jahan and Karma (27) each and Ashish (13).

Brilliant bowling in the second inning saw

Arunachal bundled out for 109 runs. Ishwar took seven wickets, Bipul (2) and Milind (1). Sikkim made quick work of the chase with Milind scor-

ing 19 runs. Chaudhary

Sikkim bagged points for this win.

Milind Kumar made history with his last knock of the season rising to number 2 in the list of most runs in a Ranji Trophy season, beating Shreyas Iyer's record by 10 runs. As mentioned, he scored 1,331 runs in 8 matches. He is also the top scor-

er of the season and is 432 runs ahead of Punit Bisht of Meghalaya on second place. He scored six centuries and four half-cen-turies, belted a record 185 fours and stroked 17 sixes in the season.

Ishwar Chaudhary, the leading wicket-tak-er for Sikkim, bagged 51 wickets and is on 3rd position of most wickets of the current Ranji Trophy season with five 5-wicket hauls and 4 wickets in an innings three times. He also took 10 wickets in a match twice.

Cave Sikkimese Save Sikkings Comments [SSS] has criticized the Sikkim Democratic Front and its Lok Sabha MP for supporting the Citizen-ship (Amendment) Bill 2019 in the Lok Sabha.

The organisation has asserted that support of the ruling party to this Bill endangered the distinct identity of Sikkim.

Addressing a press conference here today, SSS coordinator, Passang Sherpa, contended that the SDF and its Lok Sabha MP have made a "terrible political blunder" by supporting the contentious Citizenship (Amendment) Bill 2019.

He pointed out that the Citizenship (Amendment) Bill was passed by Lok Sabha to provide cit-izenship to religious minorities from countries like Afghanistan, Paki-stan and Bangladesh who came to India before 31 December 2014 and was applicable to all states and Union

This bill is a direct threat to Article 371F and the Sikkim Subject Regulation Act 1961. If the Bill is passed and implemented, Sikkim will have to open its gates for anyone seeking residence in Sikkim," Mr Sherpa argued.

He also asserted that when the political situation has turned volatile in Assam, West Bengal and other north eastern states over the introduction of the said Bill, it was incomprehensible why the Sikkim government blindly supported the Bill without considering future implications.

He said, "Chief Minis-ter of Sikkim is lamenting that the Central government is not recognising Sikkim as a stakeholder in the Union of India in his public speeches, but openly supporting the ill-conceived Bill which can wipe out the distinct identity of Sikkim."

"The recent an-ouncement of SC and OBC certificate to non OBC certificate to non COI/SSC holders and yesterday's support to the Citizenship Bill 2019 clearly shows the conspiracy of SDF government to do away with Article 371F and its provisions," Mr Sherpa claimed.

Punishing a Generation With Boredom

Sikkim continues to prove itself to be an uncaring parent

Whith the winter break now rather deep into the holidays and outstation vacation season also drawing to an end, the near complete lack of outdoor options for the children must be becoming obvious for most families in Sikkim. Yes, there are some winter camps and coaching options, but nothing really at a pan-Sikkim policy level of social culture. With the long school hours no longer available to dodge the guilt of the boredom we impose on the kids, there is no hiding from the embarrassment of Sikkim consistently proving to be an uncaring parent.

For those who might think otherwise, take a look around. How many parks and playgrounds does Sikkim make available for its children. Even the few that do exist are horrendously designed and although they might look pretty, are not the best of spaces to let children play around unsupervised. Even as the population has increased, the public spaces for children to play around have decreased. Children's parks have been reclaimed as car parks and the grounds that are available are neither maintained nor always open. Almost every locality is now built up to the level of blocking out the sun and the wind, allowing not even the corners or gullies where the kids could be left to play un-chaperoned. Little surprise then that playing games has now become an engagement with screens. Even homes are no longer residential areas which used to have earlier have some space for children to run around and find devise their timepass. Sequestered into flats and "rooms", we are grooming a generation on boredom.

Apart from the obvious health issues that we are imposing on the young, there are also the mental and social handicaps that we are straddling them with. Boredom never delivered positive results, and needs no further reiteration here. Further, even though the young might not notice the obvious, at least at a subconscious level, the denials must be getting internalized, and that can't be healthy either. How can we question them decades later when Sikkim also becomes a place where the elders are also left uncared for? If for nothing else, then for our own selfish reasons of securing more dignified senior citizen years, we should look out for the young in more earnest, motivated less by civil-engineering possibilities. What we tend to also forget when we crowd children out of public spaces is that apart from schools and among relatives, it is in parks and grounds that children build social skills and learn about social responsibility. Replace the parks with smart-phones and we are replacing social contract with social media. That is not even an option and can have disastrous consequences in later years.

And yet, that is how we continue to "look after" our young. There are many issues which continue to get addressed only from top down-substance abuse, skill enhancement, competitiveness to name a few. Efforts directed at all of these could be reinforced if we also looked into the options we offer our children for their leisure hours and months. The society, the people, the parents, however, still don't appear concerned enough to join the discussion. No one has really tried to understand what issues concern the young; and then we wonder why nothing works...

Hidden women of history: Caterina Cornaro, the last queen of Cyprus

The life of Caterina Cornaro could easily be the plot of a novel or TV drama. One of the most significant woman of Venice's golden age, Cornaro (1454-1510) was an important figure in Renaissance politics, diplomacy and arts. She reigned as the queen of Cyprus for 16 years under immense pressure.

As a patron of the arts, she was painted by greats such

As a patron of the arts, she was painted by greats such as Dürer, Titian, Bellini and Giorgione. Yet today she is relatively little known outside of Venice and Curvus

as buter, intain, beammant on goine: Let today site is reattively little known outside of Venice and Cyprus. Caterina was the last monarch of the Kingdom of Cyprus between 1474 and 1489. Her tragic reign saw the Mediterranean island transfer from the hands of the Lusignan dynasty who had dominated the island since the Crusades, to the Republic of Venice, one of the clearest signs of the mercantile nation-state flexing its imperial muscle.

ing its imperial muscle.

This significant event took place against the backdrop of interference from Venice's rival, Genoa, and the rise of the Ottoman Empire in the east. Despite the complex political intrigue, Caterina became a much-admired figure in contemporary European society. Still, separating the real Caterina from the romanticised version of her can be a challenge.

Caterina was born in 1454, into one of the most noble and influential Venetian families. (It had produced four Doges, the senior-most elected official of the Republic.) She grew up in the family palace on the Grand Canal. Amongst the family's many financial interests were rich sugar plantations on Cyprus. They developed close relations with the Lusignan family who had reigned over Cyprus since 1192.

After a period of instability, James II became King of Cyprus in 1468 and chose Caterina as his wife. The marital bond was supported by Venice: commercial rights on the island were now secured for Venetian interests. She was presented with a dowry of 100,000 ducats; a not inconsiderable sum of gold and silver coinage.

She and James married by proxy in St Mark's

She and James married by proxy in St Mark's Cathedral on 30 July 1468 when Caterina was 14-years-old. She set sail for Cyprus in 1472 to finally meet her husband.

Caterina arrived and married James in person at the Cypriot harbour city of Famagusta. James, however, died a mere ten months after the two met, leaving the heavily pregnant queen consort to become regent to her newborn son James III. Tragedy struck the young queen again on 26 August 1474 when her son and last legitimate heir to the Lusignan line died. The child's passing left Caterina as queen regnant, a role she would hold for 16 years. Rumours spread that James II had been poisoned by the queen's relatives.

Thrust into a position of power and prestige through the title, Caterina was immediately the centre of various intrigues within the court. She survived conspiracies from within to overthrow her, and pressure from Naples and the Papal state.

It was Venice that exerted the greatest threat to Caterina. Control of Cyprus would consolidate the Republic's influence over the entire Mediterranean, so they removed many of the queen's trusted advisers and replaced them with commissioners and counsellors influencing decision making. While it is easy to portray her as a victim of Venetian manipulation, for years she faced down considerable pressure by the Republic to surrender the throne.

REMOVAL FROM CYPRUS

In 1489 Caterina finally relented to the Republic's exertions, mediated by her brother, to abdicate. Although she lost political power, she was still able to stage manage her image successfully. Contemporary chronicler George Boustronios's account tell us "on 15 February 1489 the queen exited from Nicosia for Famagusta to leave ... she went on horseback wearing a black silken cloak, with all the ladies and the knights in her company Her eyes, moreover did not cease to shed tears throughout the procession. The whole population was bewailing."

The reality was more complex. Cyprus was locked

The reality was more complex. Cyprus was locked into a feudal system which was retained by the Venetians; for most Cypriots life would not change with their queen's exile and the collapse of the monarchy.

The pageantry of the fleet carrying the exiled Queen home was played as a brilliant piece of propaganda by both the Doge and by the former Queen. Her disembarkation in Venice became a common scene in contemporary painting.

OUEEN OF THE ARTS

On return to Italy, Caterina was granted for life the fiefdom of Asolo, a town in the Veneto region of northern Italy, in 1489.

Under Caterina, it became a flourishing court for Late Renaissance art and learning. Painters such as Gentile Bellini and poet Andrea Navagero were welcomed. The reputation of the Queen's court soon spread, particularly after humanist Cardinal Pietro Bembo used it as the setting for his famed dialogues on platonic love, Gli Asolani.

There is some debate about who really spent time in Asolo, leading to one historian to describe the "mirage of Asolo". Whatever the true nature of the court; the image of the cultured Queen in exile was manipulated by Caterina. She became a standard figure of portraitists. In later life, and in even in death, Cornaro had far greater control than she ever did during her reign.

In 1510 she died in Venice. The crowds wanting to participate in the funeral of Caterina were so large that a bridge of boats was constructed to allow greater pedestrian movement. She was buried in the church of San Salvador near the Rialto Bridge.

LEGACY

Death was not the end of Caterina's story. Even centuries later she continued to influence the arts. The audience hall of Caterina's castle at Asolo was converted to a theatre in 1798; the theatre itself was later purchased by the John Ringling Museum of Art where it has been reassembled in Sarasota Florida.

where it has been reassembled in Sarasota, Florida.

In 2017, a portrait of Caterina from a private collection underwent conservation and was exhibited in the Leventis Museum in Nicosia in Cyprus for the first time. The conservation work included both art historical research and scientific analysis and confirmed a 16th century date for the portrait.

Copies of original portraits of the queen continued to be made into the 18th and 19th centuries. The University of Sydney has within its art collection a large oil painting of unknown hand, but from the tradition of a lost Titian. The queen wears a black widow's gown, a coronet and necklace.

Women seeking asylum for family violence don't have an easy time getting it

Saudi teenager Rahaf Mohammed al-Qunun's story has travelled around the world this week, highlighting Saudi Arabia's repressive treatment of women and that not only those who seek asylum by sea face perilous journeys to safety.

For now, al-Qunun remains in Thailand, where the UN's refugee agency (UNHCR) is assessing her need for international refugee protection. If she is found to be a refugee, Australia has said it will consider granting her asylum.

Reports say al-Qunun fears, if she

Reports say al-Qunun fears, if she is returned to Saudi Arabia, she will be abused and killed by her family for renouncing Islam and asserting her independence. Sadly, al-Qunun's fear of being harmed by those closest to her is not unique.

is not unique. Worldwide, an estimated 35% of women have experienced family or domestic violence. In some countries, the figure is closer to 70%. Not all those at risk will be entitled to international refugee protection, however. Only those who meet the definition of a "refugee" can make a valid claim for asylum.

Women fleeing family and domestic violence must deal with a unique range of legal and practical hurdles before the threat of being returned will truly have passed.

REFUGEE PROTECTION FOR GEN-DERED VIOLENCE

The international refugee convention of 1951 defines a "refugee" as a person outside their own country who fears persecution because of their race, nationality, membership of a particular social group or political opinion.

lar social group or political opinion.

This legal definition was devised in Europe in the aftermath of the second world war, primarily with the political refugee in mind. Although the convention isn't limited to those fleeing political persecution, women fleeing gender-based violence must overcome a number of hurdles to show they meet the definition's criteria.

The most fundamental require-

ment for refugee protection is that the applicant be outside her country of origin. This alone precludes most women from accessing international protection. The cost of travel and the danger it entails – women and girls face heightened risks of sexual violence, trafficking and exploitation

during their journeys – make seeking asylum a dangerous endeavour.

For women living under repressive regimes such as in Saudi Arabia, where permission to travel is required from a male guardian, leaving the country may be impossible. For those who do leave, trying to prove they are at risk of persecution poses further challenges.

Beyond obvious physical signs of

Beyond obvious physical signs of mistreatment, obtaining evidence of domestic violence is notoriously difficult. In most refugee cases, the priThe UNHCR advises states that women are a clear example of a social group "defined by innate and immutable characteristics, and who are frequently treated differently than men".

treated differently than men."

However, the worldwide prevalence of family and domestic violence, coupled with concerns about "opening the floodgates" to women seeking asylum, have seen this approach to gender-based refugee claims rejected on a regular basis.

mary means of establishing the applicant's claim to asylum is her testimony. Lasting effects of trauma, potentially significant cultural and language barriers, and being surrounded by often male interpreters, decision-makers and legal representatives, can make the burden of proof for such women overwhelming.

Moreover, the refugee definition

Moreover, the refugee definition itself was not designed with the experiences of women in mind. In cases like al-Qunun's, failure to conform to religious expectations will likely play a role. But the tendency of refugee status decision-makers has been to see violence by family members as a private matter, and not attributable to one of the five grounds of persecution: race, religion, nationality, membership of a particular social group and political opinion.

lar social group and political opinion.

When refugee claims involving family and domestic violence succeed, it is usually on the basis women may constitute a particular social group. Accepting that women in a particular country constitute a particular social group allows refugee status decision-makers to provide protection to women who fear persecution because they are women.

The universal definition of a refugee has been incorporated into Australia's domestic legislation – the Migration Act of 1958. In addition, Australia's refugee status decision-makers routinely consider the claims of women at risk of family and domestic violence, trafficking, forced marriage and so-called honour killings if returned to their home country.

Two recent refugee decisions by the Administrative Appeals Tribunal provide insight into how Australian decision-makers approach such claims.

In the first, the Tribunal held the

In the first, the Tribunal held the violence experienced by a Turkish woman, who had been twice hospitalised due to injuries inflicted by her husband, was personal in nature. So, it could not be attributed to one of the five grounds of persecution.

five grounds of persecution.

Nevertheless, her claim was upheld on the basis Turkish authorities failed to protect her from such violence. Because of the country's lack of enforcement of laws protecting women and widespread social attitudes linking domestic violence with family honour, the applicant was considered a member of a particular social groun - women.

lar social group – women.

The second case concerned a refu-

gee claim by a mother of five from Papua New Guinea, who had experienced repeated attacks by her husband and his family members for refusing to accept her husband's infidelity. The Tribunal rejected the proposition women from Papua New Guinea constituted a particular social group, due to their diverse ages, backgrounds, religions and economic circumstances.

However, it accepted the more narrowly defined groups "married women in Papua New Guinea" and "married women in Papua New Guinea for whom a bride price has been paid" as particular social groups and awarded refugee status on this basis.

In some countries, such as Ireland and South Africa, "sex" or "gender" has been added as a potential ground of persecution in domestic legislation. This removes the need to argue whether women are a particular social group in any given society.

Australia has adopted a complementary protection regime, which offers additional protections to people at risk of such harms as torture or inhumant reatment. Australia also has a specific visa for refugee "women-at-risk".

visa for refugee "women-at-risk".

Individual refugee status decision-makers have also set out alter-native paths for protecting women from family and domestic violence. In a notable New Zealand case, the decision-maker held the risk of domestic violence faced by the applicant was for reasons of her political opinion. They described her decision to leave her husband as an act of "self-emancipation" from the "structures of power and inequality" that had sanctioned the abusive relationship.

Even if the UNHCR determines al-

Even if the UNHCR determines al-Qunun is a refugee, her future remains uncertain. Thailand is not a party to the refugee convention and there are doubts as to whether she would receive effective protection there. Resettlement in a country such as Australia is possible, but obtaining the womanat-risk visa would be at the discretion

of the government.

The attention on al-Qunun should at least help ensure her claim for protection gets the consideration it requires. Let's hope it generates similar support for the countless other women in urgent need of international protection.

Bharat Bandh 2nd day: Violent protests, rail blockades witnessed in many states

in West Bengal and Kerala and rail blockades in certain states were witnessed Wednesday on the second day of Bharat Bandh, which also saw a partial disruption of banking and insurance ser-vices across the country.

Other sectors like mining. road transport, power supply too bore the brunt of strike call given by country's 10 major central trade unions, except RSS affiliate Bharatiya Mazdoor Sangh, to protest against the government's alleged anti-labour policies and unilateral labour reforms. They had given a call for a two-day Bharat Bandh on January 8 and 9.

Stray incidents of violence were reported from various parts of West Bengal Wednesday. Stones were pelted at school buses in Howrah district. Similar incidents were reported on Tuesday as well. There were similar incidents of stone pelting in other parts of the state too.

In Kerala, a treasury branch

of the State Bank of India in Thiruvananthapuram was attacked and trains were blocked in various parts of state on the second day of strike. At the Thiruvananthapu-

ram railway station, Thiru-vananthapuram-Hyderabad Sabari Express and Venad Express were stopped, while the Kottayam-Nilambur passen-ger train in Kalamassery was held up for a while. At many places in Kerala, shops and commercial establishments remained shut, and buses and auto-rickshaws were also off roads in the state.



were stopped by protesters at a few places in Tamil Nadu and banking services in some public sector banks interrupted in Telanga-na but life largely remained unaffected on Wednesday.

However, some impact of the strike was seen in Goa as private buses and tourist taxis remained off roads. Long queues of passengers were seen at various bus stands after the private bus-es association in the state shut operations.

In Mumbai, lakhs of com-uters faced hardships as an indefinite strike called by BEST, the city's civic transport undertaking, continued.
There were only five buses plying on city roads.
Over 32,000 BEST em-

ployees went on an indefinite strike Tuesday over various demands, including higher salaries.

Causing severe inconve-nience to commuters in Bengaluru, hundreds of protest-

ers from the Left trade unions disrupted bus services at Majestic, the Central Bus Stand, The Karnataka State Road Transport Corporation (KSRTC) buses also remained stationed in their respective denots across the state as protesters damaged the vehicles.

Train services in Eastern Railway zone were disrupted Wednesday after supporters of the Bandh resorted to blockades at many places. A suspect-ed bomb was found on the railway tracks at Ashoknagar in Sealdah-Bongaon section that led to suspension of train services in the route.

In Odisha, train services were hit on the second day of the strike as trade union activists staged 'rail roko' at several places including Bhubaneswar, Balasore and Berhampur. Several trains were delayed due to blockade of railway tracks by strike supporters, leaving a large number of passengers stranded at many places.

Many states invoked essen-

tial services maintenance laws while the Centre had issued a stern warning to refrain from the stir Tuesday.

Banking services were also partially affected for the second day, as a section of PSU bank employees came in sup-port of the strike call.

All India Bank Employees' Association (AIBEA) and Bank Employees' Federation of India (BEFI) have supported the strike, which has impacted banking operation where these two unions are strong.

However, the operation in SBI and private sector banks remained unaffected as other seven unions in the banking sector are not part of the strike

According to AIBEA General Secretary C H Vekatchalam, cash transactions, clearance of cheques, remittances, bills dis-counting and foreign exchange transactions were impacted.

Cheques worth about Rs 20,000 crore could not be cleared by clearing houses all over the country on Tues-

Sabha General Secretary Harbhajan Singh Sidhu said there is 100 per cent strike in Assam, Bihar, Odisha, Manipur, Meghalaya, Maharashtra and Goa and mining activity was almost

stopped across the country.

"We got good response
in industrial areas in Punjab, Haryana and Rajasthan as well. In our protest march from Man-di House to Parliament in the capital, around 4.000 workers came on road to express their anguish...," he added.

He also said that there was 100 per cent strike in 22 dis-tricts of Madhya Pradesh and 20 districts of Karnataka.

According to unions, the strike was affected due to UGC exams, which started from Tuesday as some state transport departments decided not participate complete-ly in the strike in the interest of students. The exams were scheduled in some states on Wednesday as well.

They have alleged that the government has failed to cre-ate jobs and grossly ignored unions' 12-point charter of demands

They also said that Group of Ministers headed by Finance Minister Arun Jaitley on labour issues has not called unions for any discussion since September 2, 2015, strike which left them with no other option but to go on another strike.

Farming communities, through their associations, have also extended support to the strike. Student and teacher organisations of various universities have also declared support, the statement had said.

BJP govt polarising the country on the basis of religion:Gogoi

Guwahati, Jan 9 (PTI): Terming the passing of the Citizenship (Amendment) Bill. 2016 by Lok Sabha on Tuesday as a "Black Day" for Assam and the country, former chief minister Tarun Gogoi accused the BJP government of polarising the country on the basis of religion. "By passing the bill. the BIP government has polarised citi-zens as Hindus and Muslims and accepted Jin-nah's politics of dividing the country," the senior

Congress leader said. "The bill has endangered Assam's culture, heritage, existence for whose preservation Assam's people have been agitating for long, Assam Accord was signed at the end of the 6-year long Assam Agitation (from 1979), 855 became martyrs during the agitation and even Congress people be-came victims", he said.

Gogoi claimed that even in the Assam Accord those illegally entering Assam after midnight March 24, 1971 would be detected as foreign-ers. Aliens are not to be identified on the basis of religion. Our country is a secular one, it is in our Constitution's Preamble.

"BJP MPs, MLAs took accordingly. passing the bill on religious ground they have insulted their oath. What is the difference between them and Jinnah who

basis of religion", he said. Gogoi, who was a former three-time chief minister of the state claimed that "Assam is burning. BJP wants to destroy Assam and push the future of the youth

to darkness". He said "this will cause loss to both the North East region and the country. If such un-rests continue, Assam will always remain disturbed and troubled".

The senior Congress leader said "This Bill is a jumla...through it BJP is hoping to get Bengali speaking people's vote.

He criticised the Centre's decision to appoint a high level committee to go into Clause 6 of the Assam Accord as "it is already stated there that Constitutional, leg-islative and administrative safeguards shall be provided to protect, pre-serve and promote the cultural, social, linguistic identity and heritage of the Assamese people

Gogoi said that Assam Finance Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma is "misleading the peo-ple" by claiming Assam will go Jinnah's way if the Citizenship Bill is not passed, and that people are opposing it in a reactionary way with the in-tellectuals trying to build a wrong narrative.

"Sarma claim suggests that Assamese people weak and so need Bangladeshis to come in and strengthen them", he said.

Upbeat India face UAE test in AFC Asian Cup



ABU DHABI, JAN 9 (PTI): If Thailand was big, India are faced with a bigger test in hosts United Arab Emirates in the AFC Asian Cup here Thursday, overcoming whom will require them to play out of their skins.

Four days after creating a flutter with a stunning 4-1 drubbing of Thailand, India are now looking an upbeat lot in

the continental showpiece.

While the result against Thailand, who have three J-League players in their ranks, was no mean feat, it will be a bigger achievement if the Indians are able to put it across the hosts who are gunning for the title.

Currently ranked 79th to India's 97th, the United Arab Emirates were placed as high as 24 in the FIFA chart in January 2015. Coach Stephen Constan-

tine will be pleased with how the second half against Thai-land turned out. India not only managed to shut down a lethal

Thai attack after being tied 1-1 at the break, but also threatened at the other end through quick transitions in attack

That stupendous show earned India three valuable points, a place on top of the group and a goal average of plus three.

"We have a very young side here and they are excited. Of course, hosts UAE will be a dif-ferent game. They are a very good side but they are just another team standing in our way," said Constantine.

As far as the Indian team is concerned, Sunil Chhetri hogs the limelight wherever he goes, and the Blue Tigers will again look up to him upfront.

It will not exactly be appropriate to say that Chhetri will be high on confidence after his double strikes against Thailand, which saw him go past Argentine superstar Lionel Messi in the goal-scoring chart among active international players, because that is an ingredient the Indian talisman never lacked. He is never overconfident, though

In a team sport like football, a squad heavily dependent on Chhetri would not have experienced a 13-match unbeaten run on way to qualifying for the tournament.

Over reliance on 34-year-old striker would not have seen them maul Thailand the way the did.

And that is a good sign for Constantine's team, which will enhance its prospects of qualifying for the second round of the tournament for the first time in over 50 years if it is able to win or at least draw against the UAE.

It is even better for the team that for all his achieve-ments over the years, Chhetri remains grounded.

Minutes after coming off

the bench against Thailand, Jeje Lalpekhlua found the back

Anirudh Thapa.

However, the surprise package was rookie forward Ashique Kuruniyan, Udanta Singh being the livewire down wide right.

Udanta, in fact, set up a couple of goals including the inch-perfect cross from right flank, which Chhetri slammed

home for India's second goal. Chhetri and the FC Pune City winger had their eyes on goal whenever they were on the ball and the direct running of the latter and the technique and finishing prowess of the former left the opposition's defence helpless. More of the could be expected against a su-perior opponent in UAE.

India can expect the UAE to come hard at them after a 1-1 stalemate against Bahrain in the tournament opener.
They wouldn't be satisfied

with their performances, especially in the attacking third. It

Ahmed Khalil that saved them

the blushes.

Midfielder Ismail Hammadi is also a key player in UAE's scheme of things. UAE will look to dominate

the midfield where Anirudh Thapa and Pronay Halder will come up against a tightly-knit unit. India will also be required to be vigilant at the back as the likes of Ali Mabkhout and 2015 Asian Player of the Year Ahmed Khalil are goal-scorers with predatory instincts in the

attacking third.

Mabkhout is seven goals shy of becoming UAE's all-time top scorer. The central defen-sive pairing of Sandesh Jhingan and Anas Edathodika will be kept busy at the back, and so could be goalkeeper Gurpreet Singh Sandhu.

India's grand opening seem to have also left the UAE football association concerned, which has adopted a unique strategy to fill the stands at the stadium with fans of the home team.

It has been reported that the UAE FA has purchased 5,000 tickets for the game against India and plans to distribute it only among the local fans on the match day for free to pack the stands with home support. India will hope to not get carried away by all these, something their coach stressed a day after the win against Thailand.

"We don't go into a match expecting to win 4-1 or 5-1. However, we are not trying to get carried away with the emotion. We still have two games left and we still need another two points to qualify from the group stages," Constantine had said. "After we have qualified, we can get a little bit excited, but our primary job is still to qualify out of the group stages." Only time will tell what's in store.

Harendra Singh removed as Indian men's hockey coach



New Delhi, Jan 9 (PTI): Indian men's hockey coach Harendra Singh was Wednesday sacked from the position following a disappointing 2018 and offered the task of helming the junior squad by the national federation.

Constant chopping and changing of coaches is a frequent phenomenon in Indian hockey and Harendra, who was appointed in May, is the

latest casualty.

"Though the year
2018 was very disappointing for the Indian Men's Hockey Team with results not going as expected, Hockey India (HI) believes investing in the junior program which will reap long-term benefits," HI said in a statement explaining the reasons behind Harendra's axing. The Junior World

Cup-winning coach took charge after India's medal-less showing at the Gold Coast Common-wealth Games but was unable to change the team's fortunes.

India were also below-par in the Asian Games in Indonesia, settling for a bronze after going into the tourna-ment as the defending champions. They ended the year with a quarterfi-nal loss in the World Cup in Bhubaneswar.

"Hockey India will shortly be advertising and will invite applications for the position of the Chief Coach of the Indian Men's Hockey Team which will be returning to training camp in February 2019 for the Sultan Azlan Shah Cup scheduled to commence from 23 March 2019.

"In the interim, the team will be overseen by Hockey India High Performance Director, David John and current Analytical Coach, Chris Ciriello," the statement added.

The decision to reas-

sign Harendra was taken by the HI High Performance and Development Committee on Monday with an aim to build a "strong base" ahead of the 2021 Junior World Cup and the 2020 and 2024 Olympics.

The meeting was attended by Chairman R Committee P Singh, including members Olympians Harbinder Singh, B P Govinda and Syed Ali.

"The offer (of junior head coach) has been made to Harendra Singh for taking charge of the Junior Men's team commencing from the camp slated to start in March 2019," HI said.

Harendra took the junior team to the World Cup title in 2016. As women's chief coach, he had swapped places with Dutchman Sjoerd Marijne to join the men's squad ahead of the August-September Asian Games.

India's practice of firing coaches at regular intervals has been criticised by many experts of the game including legendary Australian captain and coach Ric Charlesworth.

Changes in the sup-port staff were expected following India's quarterfinal loss to Belgium in the World Cup at home last month. The fifth-ranked Asian team was aiming to win its first World Cup medal since 1975.

"It is completely un-professional from Hockey India. With less than two years to go for the Olym-pics, this is the last thing India needed. But seeing the trend (of changing coaches frequently) it is not a surprise anymore. You can't expect the team to win like this," former India captain Zafar Igbal told PTI.

"Even Germany lost in the semi-finals but that doesn't mean their team was bad," said Iqbal.

Sports Minister Rathore launches '5MinuteAur' challenge



New Delhi, Jan 9 (PTI): Sports Minister Rajya-vardhan Singh Rathore played table tennis with both hands and spoke at the same time while launching a '5MinuteAur' challenge as part of the Khelo India movement.

The athletes will compete in 18 different disciplines, of which six are team sports.

School Games 2018, Haryana won 38 gold, 26 silver and 38 bronze medals, while Maharashtra finished with 36 gold, 32 silver and 42 bronze medals.

After flood fury, Kerala's Munnar woos tourists with sub-zero temperatures

MUNNAR, JAN 9 (PTI): With broken roads and landslide carved mountains, this hill sta-tion had been a mute reminder of the deadly August floods in Kerala, the worst in a century, which ravaged the state.

But Kerala's Munnar, fondly called the 'Kashmir of the South' by travel buffs, has once again turned out to be a paradise for tourists, thanks to the unexpected chilly weather and snow. Located 1.600 meters above sea level, the tourist town was once the summer resort of the erstwhile British government in South India.

The mercury level has plunged to minus degree Celsius in the last few days, spread-ing a blanket of snow across its lush greenery and tea plantations, which has wooed a large number of holidayers, both domestic as well as foreigners. The photos of snow-sprinkled grasslands and reports of the frozen climate of the place have gone viral on the social media also in no time.

For the last eight days, the mercury level has gone down to below zero degree Celsius.

It was -2 degree Celsius at the tea plantations and zero

degree Celsius at the town area Tuesday, according to the

weather report.

Local people said it was very rare for the frozen climate to last for over a week.

Seeking to tap the oppor-

tunity thrown in by the unex-pected weather conditions, Kerala Tourism had updated its Twitter handle with information and photos of the cool weather. "We can't get enough of this rather unexpected, but

dreamy Munnar weather.

We can't get enough of this rather unexpected, but dreamy Munnar weather," one of the

tweets said. The chilly weather has also given renewed energy to the tourism sector, which had faced the brunt of the deluge that had ravaged Munnar in August last year. Hoteliers, home-stays and

resorts are receiving good bookings due to the sudden inflow of tourists.

However, the unexpected snowfall has caused extensive damage to tea plants, local people said. Wildlife photog-rapher Praveen Muraleed-haran said that the minus degree temperature at high altitudes and deep forests of

Munnar was common during December end and the first week of January.

"This may not be a positive

sign. It is due to drastic climate change. We need to conduct proper research into it. Unfortunately, many are

marketing the phenomenon in Munnar as a snow-fall destination in Kerala," he told PTI.

Located in the biodiversity hot spot of the Western Ghats, Munnar is a sought-after tourist destination, known for its vast tea plantations, pristine valleys and scenic mountains and exotic flora and fauna.

Senior UN official calls for peaceful solution to Myanmar's Rohingya crisis

UNITED NATIONS, JAN 9 (PTI): Expressing concern over the deteriorating situation in Myan-mar's restive Rakhine State, a senior UN official has urged all sides to in-tensify efforts to find a peaceful solution to one of the world's worst ref-

ugee crises. Acting Resident Coor-dinator and Humanitari-an Coordinator for Myanmar Knut Ostby said he "deeply concerned" over the January 4 violence in which 13 Myanmar police officers were killed in raids by ethnic Rakhine rehels

Around 350 militants from the Arakan Army stormed four police sta-tions in the northern Rakhine State on Friday, "killing 13 policemen and wounding nine others", according to a statement released by the Army chief's office.

Ostby is "deeply concerned about the situa-tion in northern and central Rakhine State" where an estimated 4,500 peo ple have been displaced so far due to fighting between the Arakan Army

and Myanmar's security forces. Stephane Dujarric, Spokesman for UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres, told report-

ers on Tuesday.

Dujarric said Ostby
was shocked by the reports of attacks on January 4, regrets the loss of life and offers his deepest sympathies to the fami-lies of the police officers who were killed.

Ostby urges all sides to ensure the protection of all civilians and uphold their responsibilities unmanitarian and Human Rights Law.

He also appeals to all sides to intensify efforts to find a peaceful solu-tion to the situation and to ensure humanitarian access to all people affected by the violence, Dujarric said.


The United Nations has been in close contact with the Myanmar authorities in recent weeks and has offered to support ongoing efforts to respond to the humanitarian needs of those affected by the violence," Dujarric said.

According UN estimates, nearly 700,000 minority Rohingya Muslims have fled to Bangladesh to escape violence in Myanmar's Rakhine State since August 25 last year when the army launched a military crackdown.

Myanmar does not recognise Rohingya as an ethnic group and insists that they are Bangladeshi migrants living illegally in the country.

N Korea's Kim ends Beijing visit as Trump summit looms

Beijing on Wednesday after the North Korean leader visited his key ally on a trip seen as a strategy session ahead of his expected summit with Donald Trump.

Kim arrived in Beijing on Tuesday for his fourth visit to Pyongyang's sole major diplomatic friend, reportedly visiting a fac-tory and meeting President Xi Jinping.

The North Korean leader's motorcade was spotted arriving at the Beijing central railway station early afternoon, and the train departed shortly after on a day long ride back to the northeast border, according to AFP journalists.
The unannounced

trip was largely shrouded in secrecy. Beyond confirming his presence in Beijing, no details have been provided by either North Korea or China on his schedule.

Kim met for one hour with Chinese President Xi Jinping on Tuesday -believed to be the North Korean leader's birthday and the two later dined with their wives at Beijing's Great Hall of the People, according to South Korea's Yonhap news agency.

The meeting focused on Kim's expected meet-ing with Trump, according to Yonhap.
In a New Year speech,

Kim warned that Pyongyang may change its approach to nuclear talks Washington persists with sanctions.

Relations between China and North Korea had deteriorated in recent years over Pyong-yang's nuclear activities, but Kim has made sure to keep Xi informed about his dealings with the United States and South Korea as ties appear to have warmed.

"In order to resist the high pressure of the US, must communicate with Xi in advance to see what steps he can take to deal with Trump," Beijing-based independent Hua Po told AFP.

"Kim needs the sup-port of Xi so as to ask the US to make substantial such as providing assistance to North Korea and normalising relations with North Korea," Hua said. Kim chose China for his maiden official trip abroad last year before holding meetings with South Korean President Moon Jae-in and Trump.

Trump said Sunday that the United States and North Korea are negotiating the location of their next summit.

Discussions between the IIS and North Korea over Pyongyang's nucle ar arsenal have stalled since Kim and Trump's high-profile summit in Singapore in June where they issued a vague-ly worded declaration about denuclearisation.

The United States in-sists that United Nations sanctions must remain in place until North Korea gives up its weapons, while Pyongyang wants them immediately eased. China also wants the sanctions to be relaxed.

But Chinese officials also likely want to im-press on Kim -- who has so far pursued only limited reforms to his statist economy -- the benefits the giant Communist country has enjoyed in its transformation from impoverished nation to economic powerhouse.

Yonhap, citing identified sources,

ported that Kim toured a factory operated by med-icine firm Tongrentang for about half an hour in an economic zone in the Chinese capital.

He then went to the Beijing Hotel where he was ex-pected to have lunch with Xi

before his departure.

"For North Korea itself, 2019 is his strategic turning point. If he wants to shift his focus to the development of the economy, he needs China's co-operation," said Lu Chao, a North Korea expert at China's Liaoning Academy of Social Sciences.

"China will also introduce some successful experiences to Kim to help North Korea achieve ecotransformation and realise the denuclearisation of the peninsula as soon as possible," Lu told AFP. In the New Year speech, Kim focused on North Korea's moribund economy, saying that improving people's lives his top priority and tackling energy shortages was an urgent task. Hua, the E

SC will not allow airing of Indian content as it 'damages our culture', savs Pak CI

ISLAMABAD, JAN 9 (PTI): Pakistan's Chief Justice Saqib Nisar on Wednes-day said that the Supreme Court will not allow Indian content to be shown on Pakistani TV channels as it "damages

our culture".

Chief Justice Nisar made the remarks while hearing an appeal filed by the Pakistan Electronic Media Regulatory Authority (Pemra) against a high court's decision to ban the broadcast of Indian content on TV channels in Pakistan, Dawn reported. Pemra's counsel Zafar Iqbal Kalanauri informed the three-member bench, led by the chief justice, that foreign content had been banned on court orders before a high court issued a stay order against it

Pemra Chairman Sal eem Baig told the court that 65 per cent of the content shown on Filmazia channel is foreign and that the number at times goes as high as 80 per cent, the paper said.

At this, the chief justice said, "we will not allow Indian content to be aired on (Pakistani) channels".

Pemra counsel informed the chief justice that "Filmazia is not a news channel but is an entertainment channel; it does not do any pro-paganda." "It is, however, damaging our culture, the top judge replied.

Nisar observed that

the Pakistan Broadcasters Association's counsel Faisal Siddiqui was not present in the court.

"We cannot pass a judgement without hearing him," he said.

Subsequently, hearing was adjourned till the first week of February. In 2016, Pemra had imposed a complete ban on airing Indian content on local television and FM radio channels.

Developing economies must get ready to cope with possible turbulence: World Bank official

WASHINGTON, JAN 9 (PTI): There is an urgency for emerging markets and developing economies to get ready to cope with possible tur-bulence, a top World Bank official has said as she called on the gov-ernments to concentrate more on their debt management practices and accelerate the pace of reforms

Kristalina Georgieva, the World Bank's CEO, said the global growth is moderating from 3 per cent to 2.9 per cent in 2019. That is still a

robust growth performance.

"But what we see happening are troubling signs in terms of international trade and manufacturing activities," she said.
"In this more challenging envi-

ronment, there is an urgency for emerging markets and developing economies to get ready to cope with possible turbulence and to build fiscal and monetary space, to build policy buffers," she said in a conference call with journalists on occasion of the release of the Global Economic Prospects report.

She said the governments have to concentrate more on their debt management practices, especially in countries where this is already a serious concern.

They need to use borrowing to fund development needs, to use borrowing for productive purposes and they have to work with creditors on transparency and sustainability of lending practices," she said.

Georgieva will serve as the interim President of the World Bank after Jim Yong Kim departs the international financial institution on

Urging countries to accelerate reforms, Georgieva said from the Bank's perspective, this is particularly critical for investing in human capital, lowering barriers to higher investments and boost positivity and make sure that they are integrated in the world economy in a way that helps them to expand and grow.

"They are softening and, on that background, we face two risks that are likely to persist through-out the year. One, trade tensions and two, financial strength in large emerging markets and developing economies," she said. One of the issues of concern

she said, is that the Bank's main focus on poverty reduction is correlated to strong, steady, and equitable economic growth.

"When growth softens, we are likely to see either stalling or even

reversal of poverty reduction. We are also concerned about debt levels and especially debt levels in low income countries where during the period of time of low interest rates, there had been a build-up of debt and now debt service is eating into the government revenues making it more difficult to fund essential social services," she said.

Noting that the majority of low-income countries would be impacted, she said that they would be hard-hit by a sudden weakening in trade or by global financial conditions worsening.


"What I mean by that is situa-tions in which financial flows go into the direction of safer locations and that makes both access and costs for countries more difficult, less favourable, she said.


Ayhan Kose, Director of the World Bank Prospects Group, said that the external environments has been becoming increasingly challenging for emerging market

and all developing economies.

Trade has been slowing, global manufacturing activity has been getting weaker and financial con-ditions have been tightened. These developments have affected the Bank's growth projections, he said.
"In emerging market and de-

veloping economies, we expect growth to stabilise around 4.2 per cent in 2019. However, relative to our June report, we expect .5 percentage points lower growth in this year in these economies, Kose said.

The comedian said the words were "not I said to gay individuals". "I didn't say these words to people, at the time, this was our dumb a**es on Twitter going back and forth with each other. wrong now," he said.
