Ganga Prasad appointed Governor of Sikkim

Ganga Prasad
has been appointed the Gov-ernor of Sikkim by the President of India as per a notification issued today. Along with him, the President has appointed Gov-ernors of six other states. Governor

Shriniwas Patil's tenure had ended on 13 July and has been on extension since then.

Ganga Prasad was earlier appointed as Governor of Megalaya in October 2017. Mr Prasad was a member of the Legislative Council in Bihar or 18 years and a former leader of the opposition in the Bihar Assembly He was a businessman by profession but started his political career as a Jan Sangh member in 1967 and held various organisational posts in it as well as in Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP).

Ganga Prasad was born on 08 July, 1937 in Patna, Bihar. He holds a B



Com degree and is a se-nior political leader who has had life-long affiliations with BJP. In the year 1994, he was elected as a Member of Legislative Council (MLC), a position he held till 2012.

As his political career progressed, he grew in prominence as well. When NDA came to power in Bihar, Ganga Prasad held the crucial position as the leader of Bihar Legislative Council. During his tenure as an MLC, he led the opposition from the front for 5 years in the State Assembly. He has also been the General Secretary of BJP

To rebuild lives, Kerala needs doctors, nurses, packed food: Alphons New Delhi, Aug 21 (PTI): Union

Tourism Minister K J Alphons to-day flagged the need for ready-toeat cooked food, doctors and nurses in flood ravaged Kerala, saying people are now getting back to whatever is left of their homes with the waters receding.

The minister also issued an ap-

peal to skilled workers like plumb-ers, electricians and carpenters to come to make homes livable and help the state regain normalcy.

At least 216 people have lost their lives in the rains, floods and landslides and over 7.24 lakh people been displaced.

"As the flood is receding in Kerala people have to move to whatever is left of their homes. Need ready to eat cooked food, clothes and an army of electri-cians, plumbers and carpenters," Alphons said on Twitter today, tagging Prime Minister Narendra Modi and BJP chief Amit Shah.

He issued a series of tweets



highlighting the requirements of

the people.

"I appeal to General Public: What Kerala requires... - pre cooked individually packed dry food, an army of electricians, plumbers, carpenters to make homes livable.

hannesburg. The Chinese defence minister's four-day visit to India, beginning today, is being seen as a significant development by officials on both sides to improve communica-tions and atmospherics between militaries of the two countries after last year's 73-day Doklam year's 7 standoff.

According to official sources here, the primary objective of Wei's visit is to deliberate with Indian defence establishment on implementation of decisions taken by Modi and Xi in their informal summit in Wuhan in April, including for improving mutual trust and avoid repeat of any Doklam-like face-offs.
In the summit, Modi

and Xi had resolved to open a new chapter in ties and had directed their militaries to boost coordination along the border, months after the most serious military faceoff in decades between the two nuclear-armed neighbours in Doklam

SC pulls up WB govt for having only two CWC in 23 districts

NEW DELHI, AUG 21 (PTI): The Supreme Court today pulled up the West Bengal government for having only two child welfare committees (CWCs) working in 23 districts with reports suggesting that children were being sold and trafficked in the state.

Having only two CWCs operational

in 23 districts of West Bengal is "not fair" to the children, the top court said and asked why it had not taken steps to fill up the vacancies in the CWCs.
"You have issues of babies being

sold in West Bengal. You see how serious this problem is. Babies are being sold there. It is a very, very serious problem. Somebody has to wake up at some point of time," a bench headed by Justice Madan B Lokur told the counsel appearing for West Bengal.

"Reports say that there is trafficking of children in West Bengal. If trafficking is going on, these children need to be looked after," the bench, also compris-ing Justices S Abdul Nazeer and Deepak Gupta, said.

When the counsel for the state said interviews were going on to fill up the vacancies in CWCs, the bench asked why was it not done earlier. "It is not that this has suddenly came out of the blue. This is absolutely wrong," the bench retorted.

The issue cropped up when the bench was hearing a matter relating

to exploitation of children living in orphanages.

The bench asked the counsel for the Centre it appeared that not a single CWC was operational in some districts of West Bengal.

Responding to the query, the Cen-tre's counsel said that CWCs were working in only two out of the 23 dis-

"How can only two CWCs look after

23 districts," the bench shot back.
The West Bengal counsel said that process of interviews for CWCs was going on and within a week or two. so more CWCs would become operational in the state.

"You cannot say that it will be done within one or two weeks. We do not know how many children will be traf-

ficked by then," the bench said.

When the state's counsel said other agencies were also there to look into the issue, the bench asked, "Why do you have other committees when the law does not permit it? It is not fair to the children. The respon-sibility is of the CWC and not of other agencies".

During the hearing, the bench also expressed shock over the discrepancy in two surveys showing a difference of around two lakh minors residing in child care institutions (CCIs) across the

IMPHAL, AUG 21 (PTI): Functioning at the state-run Jawarharlal Nehru Institute of Medical Sciences (INIMS) was affected after over 100 senion resident doctors (SRs) today launched an in definite ceasework over anomalies" in rules.

senior official of the hospital, who refused to be quoted, said the normal functioning of the hospital was affected by the ceasework and admitted patients were being looked after by nurses. The doctors did not

attend the Out Patient Department clinics and patients had to return, the official said.

The anomalies in rules are depriving the SRs from being promoted to Assistant Professors as the administration is going for direct recruit-ment to those posts, Res-ident Welfare Committee Spokesperson S Bikramaditya said.

There were at least 77 SRs who are being deprived, he said claiming that there is no established scheme for career advancement of the SRs and the INIMS authorities had repeatedly been ignoring their demand on this.

What triggered the doctors' agitation appeared to be an adver-tisement for direct recruitment of Assistant Professors.

Terming "unacceptable", Bikramaditya demanded cancellation of the advertisement.

Accident Prone

Sikkim needs to study why its roads see so many accidents and its hospitals sign so many referrals

around this time last year, there was an enqui-Ary underway on what caused a bus mishap near Mangan in North Sikkim which had claimed three lives and left 40 injured. It was hoped that the enquiry did a thorough enough job to ensure that lessons were learned and corrective measures undertaken to avoid a repeat. To its credit, the SNT bus service is among the most reliable modes of travelling in Sikkim and last year's mishap was after an eleven year gap. That said, there is always room for improvement and only a proper investigation by professionals could have established whether the accident was caused by human error, engine failure or road conditions, because once the cause is established, amends can be made and road travel made even more secure. And the issue is not about buses, because, as already mentioned, they remain the safer modes of passenger movement as compared to private vehicles, jeeps and two-wheelers in Sikkim. It is important to establish whether these mishaps are caused by poor driving skills, poor vehicular health or poor roads.

It might not be out of place here to suggest that

a proper appraisal is made of the reliability of roads in the State. The monsoon has not been kind on road surfaces and repairs have been too piecemeal for too long to inspire much confidence. A proper check-up to verify the load-bearing capacities of roads across the state appears to be in order.

And while the experts deploy their expertise to address the issues flagged above, a parallel soul-searching should also look into the preparedness of health-care infrastructure for situations like the one which visited the district hospital at Mangan on the day of the accident last year. Except one injured passenger, the remaining 39 were referred to Gangtok. While there can be no challenging the fact that injured patients should receive the best of treatment, including referrals if so required, one is also bound to wonder how a district hospital found itself equipped enough to handle only one of the 40 injured accident victims. Staffing does not appear to be the issue and neither can be the efficacy of doctors and nurses, but what even the collective experience of the health workers cannot cover up for is the lack of equipment. Could that be the reason why district hospitals are forced to perform like first-aid centres? If so, then clearly an upgrade is required because district roads are prone not only to mishaps, but the districts themselves also frequently visited by natural disasters which can cause large-scale injuries The district hospitals should hence be equipped with the best possible personnel and equipment to handle

Even to a non-medical mind, referrals appear ill advised when it comes to accident victims because not only do the patients have to be left without a doctor watching over them (for the duration of the road journey), but also because they have to travel over road surfaces which do not lend themselves too well to travel for those with possible internal, or for that matter any, injuries.

The concerned authorities should now resolve to carry out a detailed appraisal of roads and their sta-bility and also check the road-worthiness of the fleets pressed into passenger service here. They should then confer with nurses at the PHSC level to doctors at PHCs, CHCs and district hospitals and specialists at STNM Hospital and invite them to draw up a wish-list of support staff and equipment required to deliver the best possible care for the level of complications they are expected to handle at their level. Once this list is secured, arrange for the funds and make their wishes come true and draw up a check-and-balance system to discourage excessive referrals. If this happens, a giant leap would have been taken towards ensuring improved healthcare in Sikkim like governments are fond of saying, right at the doorsteps of the people.

Kofi Annan understood the limits of diplomacy, as well as why it's important never to give up

Kofi Annan served as Unit-ded Nations Secretary-General during a pivotal decade in modern world history – from 1997 to 2006. I would argue that his most important legacy was to focus the UN more on preventing and resolving deadly conflict within its sov ereign members, while still trying to maintain peace and

security among them.

How he developed and pursued ways and means to do this began much earlier in his UN career and persisted until his untimely death last

The UN was created in 1945 by 51 sovereign states and empires that had just sur-vived two of the worst wars in history. With the winding

down of empires, UN mem-bership grew to nearly 200 countries. By the late 1990s most countries were at peace internation ally. And despite their continuing ideological and other differences, they have, ever since, avoided another world war.

But domestic peace was to prove more illusive.
The UN lacked the norms, institutional capacity
and political resolve, to prevent and resolve deadly conflicts within states, while maintaining peace among them. Although Africa accounted for nearly a third of the UN's members, it was also the world's poorest and most conflict-ridden region. And it lacked the means to effect major reforms in the world body's post-World War II hierarchy, struc-

tures and procedures.

Annan knew the UN system and its strengths and limitations better than anyone. He had spent 35 years working on the problems of refugees, management and finance, and peacekeeping having joined it in 1962 as a young budget officer in the World Health Organisation.

He had also felt the sting of governments and

public opinion that regarded the UN as a necessary last resort, when all other options have failed, due to lack of national or regional capacity, resources or political will. This was most evident when it came to complex emergencies in Africa.

HIS MESSAGE FOR AFRICA

Six months after becoming Secretary-General, Annan chose to address the 1997 summit in Harare of leaders of the Organisation of African Unity (OAU)

in a way that none of his predecessors had done.

His central point was that Africa's peace and development required Africa's leaders to hold one another more accountable to how they managed their domestic affairs. This was particularly true when it came to the protection of human rights and

In language uncharacteristically passionate for such occasions he declared:

"I am aware of the fact that some view this con-cern a luxury of rich countries for which Africa is not ready ... I find these thoughts truly demeaning.... Do not African mothers weep when their

sons or daughters are killed or maimed by agents of repressive rule? Are not African fathers saddened when their children are unjustly jailed or toured? Is not Africa as a whole impoverished with even one of its brilliant voices is silenced?"

He concluded by emphasising that "human rights are African rights", noting that "Africa needs external assistance, and Africa deserves it, but in the final analysis what steads between the conductive of the con the final analysis, what stands between us and the future is ourselves".

Four years later, the OAU was replaced by the

African Union (AU). What was notable was the unprecedented inclusion of a provision for collective intervention to protect any group of Africans facing

local threats of mass violence or genocide.

Less extreme, but more generally applicable, was the principle of non-indifference in each other's internal affairs. This is most evident in its auxiliary African Charter for Democracy, Elections and Governance which was unanimously endorsed in

2007 and finally ratified in 2012.

As a result, all African governments are now obligated to hold regular periodic national elections. They are also obliged to invite the AU to send teams of pan-African observers to monitor and judge whether they are a credible reflection of the popular will.

Annan would not claim credit for these developments. But, his efforts were surely prescient and gave political impetus and legitimacy to the hard diplomatic work of South Africa's President Thabo Mbeki, President Olusegun Obasanjo of Nigeria, and other advocates of a more capable regional organisation and sub-regional organisations.

EMBRACING CIVIL SOCIETY

Also notable in his 1997 address to the OAU was his call for civil society to play its part. This reflected what was to become one of his major innovations as UN Secretary-General – his openness and willingness to reach out, listen too, cooperate with and occasionally adopt policies advocated by civil society groups.

I personally know of at least four examples. All were Africa-related but also global in nature and very much to his credit as we honour his legacy.

ipated in a series of efforts by the International Peace Academy, an NGO established to help train and better inform and prepare for expected UN peacekeeping operations, mostly in Africa. This capacity should have been institu-tionalised in the UN, but was thwarted by the US and Soviet Union. Both feared that the other might somehow gain a Cold War advantage. The NGO never fully succeeded and would have probably failed without Annan's frequent personal and sustained engagement.

As Secretary-General he made cooperation with the independent Carnegie Commission on Preventing Deadly Conflicts his personal prior-ity. He attended commission

meetings and encouraged the involvement of key offices across the secretariat. As a member of the commission staff, I appreciated how extensively he used policy relevant scholar-ship by teams of academics on a range of conflict prevention topics. His aim was to build support within and beyond the UN for more comprehensive efforts to prevent complex emergencies within

 After leaving office he continued to promote, and often lead, civil society efforts to help the UN and the world, beginning in Africa. In 2006 he became the founding chair of Alliance for a Green Revolu-tion in Africa (AGRA). AGRA aims to increase the incomes and improve the food security for 30 million farming households in 11 African countries by

- In his home country Ghana, I watched with admiration how his Foundation sponsored presiden-tial debates in which candidates publicly pledged to support the decision of the national electoral commission. And when the opposition won by less than .005% of the votes in the 2008 election, their pledge held.

And, best known, has been his chairmanship of the Elders, a group of world leaders committed to advancing peace, especially in Africa, and founded by Nelson Mandela.

THE IMPORTANCE OF PERSISTENCE

I last met with Annan several years ago when he was on Elders' business and I asked what he thought of Robert Mugabe holding on to power more than a decade after his pro-democracy appeal to the OAU Summit in Harare.

He told me that near the end of his UN term he had visited Mugabe and inquired whether he might consider bidding farewell to his people after de-cades of service. He said, Mugabe asked in reply:

"Why? My people aren't going anywhere."

Annan noted that this response was both a sign of the limits of diplomacy, as well as the reason never to stop trying

Pakistani elections are flawed, but poor rural voters are taking control

Despite being dogged by allegations of electoral engineering and vote-rigging, this year's hotly contested general election in Pakistan should be - cautiously - celebrated. As a new government is sworn in, the country is marking a milestone in its tumultuous politi-cal history: the first time three democratic elections held in a row at regular intervals.

This is a big step forward

- and for some Pakistanis more than others. Repeated competitive elections are a very good thing for all of Pakistan's voters, but above all, they are good news for poorer rural voters. And, if the country's political parties want to sustain what is still a fragile and tee-

tering democracy, they need to start building a support base among these

The Pakistani electorate is widely thought of as deeply polarised, hav-ing dug in its heels behind one or the other of the largest competing par-ties. But this is a largely urban phe-nomenon. Most of Pakistan's voters about 65% - live in rural areas and



are far less inclined to identify with political parties than their urban counterparts. This doesn't mean they don't care about politics - they turn up in sizeable numbers to vote during elections (in recent local government elections, they even exceeded those in urban areas). So, without a strong identification with political parties and their agendas, why do they vote in such reliable numbers?

in such reliable numbers:
With very little research available

to explain this, it's not surprising that all kinds of stereotypes abound. Two ideas in particular have become entrenched: on the one hand, that rural voters are effectively electoral can-non fodder – unthinking, uneducated, ignorant and coerced by enduring feudal lords – and on the other, that they simply sell their votes to the highest bidder.

The truth is rather more complicated. While there are indeed some

others who will happily sell their vote, my research shows that a majority of rural voters know the value of their vote and wield it quite strategically in an increasingly competitive

environment. **KEEP THEM GUESSING**

In my forthcoming book, Crafty Oligarchs, Savvy Voters: Democracy Under Inequality in Rural Pakistan, I looked in detail at the politics of 35 villages in Punjab, the political heartland of the country, and found that these sorts of explanations don't capture so-cial and agrarian changes in Pakistan's rural areas.

Local landlords, who often play a role as local power-bro-

kers, can no longer wait at home for supplicants to come to them. Instead, they're obliged to regularly canvass voters on the door step. On top of this, they're faced with ever more demands from myriad groups of voters, very few of which relate to money: requests for greater action against absent teachers and doctors, for a veterinary hospital, for road repairs and, most often, for street paving and drainage systems.

But this time, many families have decided against any festivities.

Sixty two-year-old Sister Christabelle, former Principal of St Te-resa's college in Kochi, said there will be no onam celebration for the regular and retired staff this year and the money will be used for relief works for flood victims.

Mariamma Varghese, Presi-dent of the Elders Forum in Panampilly Nagar in Kochi, said onam celebrations have been cancelled due to floods.

Onam commemorates the return of a mythical, righteous king, Mahabali and brings together Mahabali and brings together communities across the state in



unified revelry probably unheard of in any other part of the country or outside.

Elaborate sumptuous feasts of 'Onam sadya,' with at least 10-15 side dishes, are served in houses with the feast ending with delicious payasam (Kerala dessert), which ensures that the message of oneness and hope is spread far and wide.

The landlords then put these demands to national and provincial politicians. Some are met, others not – and should they fail, the local landlords could lose votes in future elections.

One local landlord, worried about losing votes, explained to me that "it is important to think about what is good for the constituency, and to focus on who can provide it. This is the primary basis upon which political support is decided." To cobble together this support, local landlords have had to change how they

interact with poorer voters.

In some villages, emerging political leaders from poorer groups are demanding a seat at the nego-tiating table whenever politicians come through on the campaign trail. They believe – rightly – that they are better able to represent their own needs than their wealthier village leaders. A common strategy is for voters to put pressure on competing landlords aligned with different parties, and to keep them guessing about whom the voters support until the bitter end.

Armed with this strategy, ru-ral voters can milk elections for all they're worth. And that goes

some way towards explaining why so many of Pakistan's voters de-scribe themselves as "undecided" in pre-election polling.

BOTTOM-UP POWER

Some local landlords seem to be getting the hang of this. One political organiser who represented the poorest groups in his village told me that landlords had now learned to "speak our language". Another suggested that democracy had made landlords humbler in their interactions with voters. Under these circumstances, politics is a matter of negotiation rather than coercion or ideology.

So far, no single political party has locked these votes up. What matters to rural voters isn't the political party their elected representatives belong to, but whether their representatives are close to power and are able to provide goods and services.

This pattern of voting has two major implications. First, it means the collective interests of the rural poor are not projected upwards in national politics. While negotiations between voters and local leaders – and between these leaders and politicians – meet voter demands on an ad hoc basis, voter

interests never become the subject of public policy that can respond to their needs as a whole. Second, this bottom-up model forces Pakistan's political parties to compete by attracting "electable" politi-cians – endlessly manipulable and malleable by non-elected institutions – who come together not to strengthen their parties, but to win

For parties to be able to sur-ive such pressures, and to be able to sustain democracy in the process, they must organise and build core support bases of their own amongst rural voters, represent their interests when in power, and effectively provide public services in order to further reduce the relence of local notables.

Pakistan's teetering democracy is far from ideal, and the 2018 election may well have raised more questions than it has settled. But regular competitive elections ean that poorer voters' votes and voices matter to elites - a situation that has few parallels within Pakistan's extremely unequal socio-economic order.

Malaysian PM to scrap China-backed \$22 bn projects

BEIJING, AUG 21 (AFP): Malaysian Prime Minister Mahathir Mohamad confirmed during a visit to Beijing today that three China-backed projects totalling USD 22 billion will be cancelled until his country can find a way to pay its debts.

The projects include a railway connecting Malaysia's east coast to southern Thailand and Kuala Lumpur, and two gas pipelines.
"I explained to (the Chinese

leaders) why we can't have the ECRL (East Coast Rail Link)," Mahathir told Malaysian reporters at the end of his five-day

"It's about borrowing too much money, which we cannot afford, we cannot repay, and also because we don't need those projects for Malaysia at this moment... our problem now is how to solve our fit cial deficit."

Mahathir is trying to reduce Malaysia's national debt, which has ballooned to some USD 250

"Those in India who targeted him are doing a great disservice to peace in the subcontinent - without peace our people cannot prog-ress," Khan said.

plomacy with China. Wu was quoted as saying by Taiwanese media. He said El Salvador had been

asking for huge funding for a port development project which Tai-wan cannot afford as it would leave both countries in debt.

Refuting the dollar diplomacy charge, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Lu Kang said El Salvador's move is a political judgement and decision rather than a bar-

gaining chip .


"Salvador government has decided to establish diplomatic relations because they recognised the 'One China' principle with no economic preconditions. China highly


Mumbai, Aug 21 (PTI): Actor Maniesh Paul, who will be playing a dark character in short film "Black Briefcase", be-
