expressed




desire to promote pole sports in the State in the

KOTA, OCT 25 (PTI): Pushing for the participation of more women across various levels in the Congress, Rahul Gandhi on Thursday said he would like half his party's chief ministers in the country to be women in the next five to seven years.

Extend collaborations to reinforce quality governance

 $W^{\rm hat}$ is worse? A society that is ill-informed and at times intentionally ignorant, or the one that is dismissive and disinterested? They are both bad, and what is worse for Sikkim is that both conditions exist in almost equal measure here.

Sikkim has a continuing problem with substance abuse, suicides, even child labour and also, of late, sexual abuse of minors. And yet, even as these stories make frequent headlines, one is yet to see any coherent societal engagement to address any of these issues. It is not rare to hear of people reading of drug busts and commenting that the right palms must not have been greased, or others subscribing to ill-informed and shallow explanations for the suicides or crimes or un-employment. What should worry Sikkim is that in the absence of civil society interventions to address social challenges, one is left with the government stepping in and experimenting with possible solutions. Such interventions, while welcome in the absence of any other alternatives, are also woefully incomplete because they compromise the public participation quotient required for effective governance and go on to seed the beginnings of a big-brother administration. Take the ban on firecrackers for Diwali, or even the more recent ban on import of vegetables. Sikkim would have been counted among the most enlightened of societies if these bans had been enforced by children convincing elders not to blow up money on polluting firecrackers or public consensus had first been built to support local growers and eat healthy. Unfortunately, such efforts either failed or never even materialised until the cops and bubbling babus stepped in and took to public address systems to warn of "strict action".

The firecracker ban was effective as was the hassle of buying affordable vegetables as if one was purchasing contraband, but was the capitulation of the society towards its responsibility to come together and unanimously endorse, or for that matter oppose, a policy disruption, a healthy development?

What Sikkim should consciously remind itself is that democracy demands people's involvement more often than the once-every-five years elections. An uninvolved people is not healthy for anyone, not the people and definitely not governance. Quality of governance, it is universally accepted, is reinforced by longstanding traditions of civic engagement. Voter turnout is only part of it, and other signs of civic engagement manifest in such indicators as newspaper readerships, involved membership in social organisations, sports clubs, school management committees, neighbour-hood clubs etc. Such organisations exist in Sikkim, but most are staffed, at least at the executive levels, by government officers or nominees and appointees. For more people to be involved in these groups, they need to be made for genuinely representative, and dare we say, democratic. If that happens, they become hall-marks of a successful region. In fact, historical analyses suggest that these networks of organisational reciprocity and civic solidarity, far from being a result of socioeconomic and socio-cultural modernization and growth are a prerequisite for it.

Admittedly, the solutions are not simple and straightforward, and hence cannot be directed by law, but what they can, and should, receive is nurturing Mechanisms through which civic engagement and social connectedness produce such results as better schools, faster economic development, lower crime and more effective governance- are multiple and complex. Such networks of civic engagement facilitate coordination and communication, amplify representation/ concerns and allow dilemmas to be resolved through dialogue and timely interventions. These engagements also help resolve points of conflict because when social connectedness becomes instinctive economic and political negotiation becomes embedded in diverse networks of social interactions. These are engagements in which an enlightened society becomes good at because it lays the foundations for a strong sense of belonging and provides the template for future situations and challenges. If these become too complicated organisations to form, then let's just begin by celebrating rationality and from there alone several solutions and networks will be born

Community engagement, when genuinely crafted automatically leads to spontaneous involvement. And one is not referring only to substance abuse and suicides in this regard. Look at how consistently silent the people and their organisations have remained in Sikkim through its several challenges and travails. The only voices that engage are politically inspired and hence "vested", and the lay citizens remain aloof because they have not cobbled together organisations which are not only not politically compromised, but also forceful and forthright. In this vacuum, issues are manufactured and forced on the people and genuine confusions remain unaddressed.

Migrant caravan members have right to claim asylum - here's why getting it will be hard

oughly 5,000 people, mostly from Central America's violent and unstable "Northern Tri-angle" of Guatemala, El Salvador and Honduras are reportedly making their way through Mexico with the intention of claiming asylum at the U.S. border. The so-called "migrant caravan" is attracting ntense social and political attention, with U.S. President Donald Trump declaring it a "national emergency." He has also claimed, erroneously, that the migrants "have to" claim asylum in Mexico first.

Migrants aren't obligated to claim asylum in any country, but have a right to seek asylum in a country of their choosing, the right to a fair process in that country, and crucially, a right not to be sent back to a country where they will face persecution or even death.

I've been working with asylum-seekers in Europe and the U.S. since 2008. Over the last decade I have witnessed firsthand the increasing pressure on the asylum system to manage complex situa-tions at borders. The reality is that even if the migrants currently traveling through Mexico are able to claim asylum at the U.S. border – a big if, considering they are still more than 1,000 miles away

the legal path to safety is challenging.

What has always been a difficult process has been made more difficult by growing governmental and public concern that asylum-seekers are gaming the system or that asylum itself has become a backdoor route for economic migrants.

Pressures like these lead to ever-narrowing legal protections for asylum-seekers.

The asylum system is flawed, and ensuring fair access to genuine protection requires making sig-nificant improvements to the broader legal, administrative and social contexts

THE LEGAL FRAMEWORK

The international legal framework for asylum is the 1951 Convention on the Status of Refugees, which was developed at the end of WWII by the United Nations.

The convention established five categories on

which asylum claims can be based: race, nationality, religion, political opinion or membership in a particular social group.

From the beginning, however, these protection categories were political. Much like recent efforts to limit protections for those fleeing domestic or gang violence, these categories have always pro-tected some, but not all persecuted people. For example, the 1951 convention excluded Germans expelled from Eastern Europe and those forced to flee partition of India and Pakistan

Many of the people displaced or persecuted today also struggle to fit their experiences into the boxes created by the law. For example, despite broad global support for the rights of women and



LGBTQ persons, no specific categories exist gender or sexuality.

The 1951 Convention is not useless - far from it. However, it contributes to a legal environment in wh successful asylum-seekers must have rather narrowly iences in order to be protected

THE ADMINISTRATIVE PROCESS

When a person seeks asylum - not just in the U.S., but in any country that is a party to the refugee convention – they have to prove they have been persecuted because of their race, nationality, religion, political opinion or membership in a particular social group. What's more, they have to prove that they cannot live safely in their country of origin. Their proof depends in large part on being able to demonstrate credibility. In other words, they have to share their experiences in such a way that their claim is believed to be true and their fear of persecution is found to be genuine.

This process is made more challenging by suspicions that asylum-seekers are abusing the system. For example, in January 2018, U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services, which manages the administrative process, changed their policy regarding interviews so that those who have claimed asylum more recently are interviewed first.

The assumption by USCIS is that newer applications are more likely to be fraudulent and quicker interviews will deter people from "using asylum backlogs solely to obtain employment authorization by filing frivolous, fraudulent or otherwise

non-meritorious asylum applications."

In the meantime, those who have been waiting years to be interviewed will wait even longer. In January 2018 more than 300,000 people were waiting. USCIS used to publish a bulletin of wait times, but discontinued it when the interviewing policy changed in January. The last published bulletin showed that, for example, people in Miami were waiting nearly four and a half years to be interviewed.

In addition to confronting suspicion that they are abusing the system, asylum-seekers face a lack of legal support for making claims, and the reality that decision-makers have a great deal of discretion in deciding their fate.

No legal representation is automatically pro-vided for asylum-seekers. Many manage the entire process, including going before an immigration judge, entirely on their own. Unsurprisingly, those who do have an attorney are five times more likely to be granted asylum.

Research also regularly shows that the chances of being granted asylum vary considerably depending on the applicant's nationality and the location within the U.S. where they seek asylum. In 2017, almost 90 percent of claims from Mexicans were denied, compared to only 20 percent of Chinese cases. All three Northern Triangle countries – El Salvador, Honduras and Guatemala – are in the top five most frequently denied, with more than 75 percent of claims being refused. Similarly, a case is more likely to be granted in New York or San Francisco than in those courts closer to the border in Texas or Arizona.

THE SOCIAL CONTEXT

Lastly, asylum has in many ways become an outlet for broader social anxieties about borders, security, terrorism, economic inequality and multiculturalism. Research shows us that migrants and refugees are in fact not more likely to commit crime than citizens. Nor are they likely to be terrorists. In fact, th contribute to local economies in positive ways. But until these social attitudes and assumptions change, the prospect of there being sufficient political will to create workable legal solutions will likely remain low

The legal and administrative frameworks can only really be addressed once adequate social and political will exists to make the kinds of changes that would support a just and humane asylum system. [the writer is PhD Candidate, Uni-

What is the greatest challenge to the future of human rights? We the people are

STEPHEN HOPGOOD

When considering the future of human rights and whether they will be viewed as more, or less important in the years to come, many potential challenges come to mind: climate change, nationalism, inequality, growing authoritarianism. Ultimately, many of these different threats are linked to one another in complex ways - for example, inequality has foment-ed nationalism, and climate change can increase inequality. But they also depend on the answer to a deeper question: "How important are the hu-

man rights of others to us generally?"

For the thing most likely to stall human rights progress is people around the world simply not considering them to be as important as their advocates would have us believe. When it comes to a trade off between numan rights and other things people hold dear - their material well-being, their security, their children's oppor-tunities and accomplishments – there are plenty of examples to suggest that people are reluctant to make sacrifices to realise other people's rights.

Let's take three obvious examples First, inequality. Even in the most rights-observing societies, there is often reluctance among key sectors of the population to redistribute in-come through higher rates of taxation. For many poorer people, nothing would make more of a difference than reliable access to high-quality education and healthcare. But in the US and UK, public funding for both is constantly being squeezed. We know that reliance solely on private sector solutions creates significant inequali-ty, but too many people simply aren't willing to pay more to give everyone



the highest possible standard of medical treatment and schooling.

Or take the treatment of refugees. As many scholars have recognised, we are never so alone and never more in need of our human rights than when we do not have the protection of a national government. When we are refugees, all we have is our "humanity"

But far from this triggering deep concern among affluent populations, instead it seems to have fuelled a kind of moral panic about immigration in Europe and has led to the rise of rightwing politicians. The courageous de-cision by German chancellor Angela Merkel to open up German borders to a million refugees from Syria has weak-ened her politically, and allowed into German politics far-right parties and movements. When we add Islam into the mix, regardless of the importance of the right to one's religious beliefs,

things get even less rights-friendly.
Finally, torture. Nothing would seem to be more of a poster child for a commitment to human rights than the claim that no one should be tortured. Yet, when we look at opinion surveys of attitudes to torture, we discover widespread support for torture designed to tackle national We can also see this punitive logic in death penalty cases in many places, where the only reason to resist the death penalty that gets any traction is the fear of executing an innocent person, rather than the fundamental human right to life.

In fact, we can see such attitudes repeated across a whole range of civil liberty issues from freedom of information to freedom of the press, from freedom of speech to freedom from surveillance. When faced with significant threats, people will actually sacrifice a good deal of liberty – the liberty of others but eventually their own, too – to keep what they have safe from harm.

'OUR IOBS, OUR LAND'

I've always been struck by the lack of attention given to Article 29 of the Universal Declaration. It talks of our duties to the community, not our rights. Its second paragraph states:

In the exercise of his rights and freedoms, everyone shall be subject only to such limitations as are determined by law solely for the purpose of securing due recognition and respect for the rights and freedoms of others and of meeting the just requirements of morality, public order and the general welfare in a democratic society.

Authoritarian states can easily use this article to suppress rights in the name of public morality or to crush dissent and remove (or embed) property rights. But this is not how democratic states are supposed to act. Dem-

ocratic states must, however, meet the demands of some coalition of their citizens. If they lose enough support among key groups within their citizen-ry, then the government will lose power or the democratic state itself might

come under threat of being toppled.

Many Western countries have long overlooked Article 29 because, for the most part, wealthy democracies have been in the ascendant since 1948. But now they're under pressure, and the basic social contract - the deal that these democracies strike with their citizens - is suddenly in question. New threats, such as inequality, climate change, and the replacement of manual work by AI and machines, mean those who fear that the old social contract is no longer in their interests are making their voices heard. They say, "these are our jobs", "this is our land", "our community has certain shared values", and "people like us are the only real citizens". These sentiments, echoing around the presidency of Donald Trump or during Brexit, are in direct opposition to human rights.

States don't much like rights -they're an annoyance or an embarrassment. The survival, and flourishing, of human rights requires people, the citizenry, the populace, to say that these rights are important and to demand that their governments observe them. And by that same logic, the people can sink them, too. In the end it is us, we – however we define that prob-lematic term – who will make the difference between the failure or success of human rights, whatever the external and internal threats we face.

KHADC resolution seeks introduction of inner line permit

SHILLONG, OCT 25 (PTI): The Khasi tribal council in Meghalaya Thursday tabled a resolution urging the Governor to introduce the inner line regulation to check and control mi-gration of outsiders into the areas under the juris-

diction of the council. The Khasi Hills Autonomous District (KHADC) council has jurisdiction over the tribal areas in East Khasi Hills, West Khasi Hills, South West Khasi Hills and Ri-Bhoi district and is one of the three autonomous district councils in the state.

Tabling the Khasi Hills Autonomous District (Inner Line as adopted from the Eastern Frontier Regulation, 1873) regulation Bill, 2018, KHADC chief executive member H S Shylla said there was "mass migration" arising out of the implementation of the National Register of Cit-izens in Assam in tribal areas under the jurisdiction of the council.

He said the unchecked

migration of Indian citizens into tribal areas is also posing "grave dan-ger" for the ethnic Khasi tribe who are recognised as Scheduled Tribes in the Constitution. Meanwhile the coun-

cils chief executive member has also tabled the first amendment of the Khasi Hills Autonomous District (Khasi Social Custom of Lineage) Act, 1997 which is aimed at protecting the matrilineal system of the Khasi tribe.

The new bill was ne-

cessitated to be tabled after the Governor and

the District Council Affairs department of the state government had returned a similar bill passed in July this year forcing the council to appoint a consultative committee to redraft the bill.

The bill laid down conditions, including marriages, for which a including Khasi tribal has to follow to ensure that his/ her offspring also will be considered a tribal.

DJ Bravo signs off from international cricket but will play T20 club cricket



(PTI): A big-hitter on the field and a hit DI off it. West Indies all-rounder Dwayne Bravo Thursday retired from interna tional cricket to prolong his career as a professional player available for Twenty20 franchise events all over the world.

The 35-year-old Bra-yo, who is not a part of the team which is currently engaged in a series in India, played 40 Tests, 164 ODIs and 66 T20Is since making his debut back in 2004.

His last appearance for the West Indies was more than two years ago. Outside cricket, he also found fame for his hit track 'Champions' that became the West Indies anthem during their tri-umphant 2016 T20 World Cup campaign in India.
"Today I want to con-

firm to the cricket world that I have officially retired from international cricket in all formats of the game...I will continue my professional career as a cricketer and entertainer living as a true cham-pion," Bravo, who has competed for Chennai Super Kings and Mumbai Indians in the IPL, said in a statement.

"After 14 years when made my debut for the West Indies, I still remember that moment I received the maroon cap before walking onto the Lords Cricket Ground against England in July 2004. The enthusiasm and passion I felt then, I have kept with me throughout my career," he added.

The Trinidadian said his decision was also based on a desire to vacate the field for younger talent in the national team.

"However, I must accept that for me to preserve my longevity as a professional cricketer, I must do as others before have done, leave the international arena for the next generation of play ers," he said.

In his 40-Test career which began in 2010, Bravo scored 2200 runs, including three hundreds and 13 fifties. He also picked up 86 wickets in

the format.
His 164 ODI appearances vielded 2968 runs and 199 wickets for him, while his T20 International record constituted 1142 runs and 52 wickets

Known to be a powerful-hitter and agile fielder, Bravo is considered an impact player in the T20 format. His last ODI appearance came back in 2014 against India in Dharamsala.

During that dramat-ic tour, the West Indies team flew home midway through the series ov ing to a pay dispute with the Board, Bravo was the captain of the ODI side at that time.

He was subsequently dropped from the West Indies' 2015 ODI World Cup squad but came back the next year and played a pivotal role in the team's T20 World Cup triumph, especially death bowling.

India makes big push to expand tea export to China

BEIJING, OCT 25 (PTI): India made a strong pitch to expand its steadily growing market for black tea in China by organis-ing a tea promotion cam-paign that officials say would help in scaling up the tea trade between the two countries.

People in China, where tea originated, mainly consumes green teas without milk unlike black Indian tea.

The Indian Embassy here in association with the Tea Board of India and China Tea Marketing Association held the In dian tea promotion event here from October 23-25.

During the event, top tea buyers and sellers from both the countries met and interacted over the prospects of scaling up tea trade between the two countries.

Anil Kumar Ray, Dep uty Chairman of the Tea Board of India, the lead-ing Indian tea delegation, told the media on Tuesday that India last year exported about nine million tonnes of tea which constituted about 30 per cent of China's imports.

The Indian delegation comprising of top tea business houses visited China to explore the Chinese market and to expand the export base, he said.

Addressing a seminar attended by tea exporters and importers from both the countries here on Tuesday, Indian Ambas-sador to China, Gautam Bambawale said the tea

"Similarly, in India, people are now beginning to like green tea and herbal tea. It is for this reason that we believe that the possibility of exporting Indian tea to China is rising. That is why we are organising this tea promotion event today," he said.

The Indian delegation has introduced five different type of teas from India at the event. Ray said India has dif-

ferent varieties of teas, including the Darjeeling and Sikkim tea.

"China is a very tra-

ditional tea drinking na-tion... they have a very long history of drinking tea expanding to thousands of years," he said, adding that 'our teas are new but our varieties are more". Similarly, exports of

Chinese green tea varieties to India were also growing. He said India last year

has exported 251 million kilograms of tea. This in-cluded Russia (50 million kilograms).
Other countries of

Indian exports included Iran, the UAE, the UK, Pakistan, the USA and Egypt.

China makes about 2500 million kilograms of tea, he said.

ness representative reacted positively to India's pitch for tea exports to China.

Qin Ling, a representative from the Beijing Tea Chamber, told staterun Global Times on Thursday that "Indian tea producers and exporters are using the European Union product standards. Some Chinese companies' products don't meet those standards."

Wang Qing, chairman of the China Tea Market-ing Association, said that India and China have different categories of tea, and standards don't pose a major problem for Chinese tea exports.

standard. China and India have different prodstructures. China mainly produces strip tea and India mainly pro-duces broken black tea," Wang said. Bern Tsang, the busi-

ness development consultant of Premier's Tea Limited, whose office is based in Hong Kong, said that he is very optimistic about the Chinese market.

Ongoing genocide' against Myanmar's Rohingya Muslims: UN

25 (AFP): A genocide against Myanmar's Rohingya Muslims is still continuing, UN investigators said Wednesday as they presented a report to the Security Council, calling for the issue to be referred to an international tribunal.

Marzuki Darusman, chairman of the UN Fact-Finding Mission on Myanmar, said that be-yond mass killings, the conflict included the ostracisation of the population, prevention of births, and widespread displacement in camps.

"It is an ongoing genocide," he told during

a press conference.
"We consider the genocide intent can be reasonably inferred," he said as he presented the team's report to a United Nations Security Council meeting.
The 444-page re-

port, first made public last month, called on the council to refer the issue to the International Criminal Court in The Hague, or to create an ad hoc tribunal, as was done with the former Yugoslavia.

The explosive report said that Myanmar's top generals, including Commander-in-Chief Min Aung Hlaing, must be in-vestigated and prosecut-ed for genocide in Rakhine state.

Myanmar has jected accusations that its military committed atrocities in the crack-down last year that forced 720,000 Rohingya to flee over the border to Bangladesh.

The conflict has also seen about 390 villages destroyed and 10,000 Rohingya killed, Darus-

The conditions are not in place for a safe, dignified and sustainable return of the Rohingyas in Bangladesh" to Myanmar, he warned, adding any attempt would just risk more deaths.

At the end of an October 10-20 visit to the country, the UN's Special Envoy to Myanmar, Christine Schraner Burgener, said that accountability and "inclusive dialogue" two important pillars for national reconciliation.

"Credible fact-finding is the first step towards accountability," she said.

Myanmar ernment rejected the UN mission's findings, ques-tioning its independence had itself established an independent investiga-tive commission made up of Asian diplomats.

Darusman said how-er that Myanmar's internal inquiries have "proven to be ineffective failures" so far.

The Security Coun-

meeting was called by Western powers but opposed by China and Russia, allies who have friendly ties with Myanmar's military and have regularly shielded the nation from criticism.

Myanmar maintains that the violence in Ra-

The military has denied almost all accusa-tions of genocide levelled against it, insisting that "clearance operations" were necessary to fight

Rohingya militants.
But the UN fact-finding mission said there were reasonable grounds to believe that the atrocities were committed with the intention of destroying the Rohingya.

It found that the military's tactics had been "consistently and grossly al security threats", and that estimates that some 10,000 people were killed in the crackdown was likely a conservative figure.

'China, Russia listening to Trump phone calls

WASHINGTON, OCT 25 (PTI): China and Russia eavesdrop on President Donald Trump as he uses his unsecure cellphone to "gossip, gripe or so-licit" his friends' take on how he is doing, the New York Times reported on Wednesday, citing US intelligence agencies.

Trump's aides have repeatedly warned him that his cellphone calls are not secure, and they have told him that Russian spies are routinely eavesdropping on the calls, as well, the paper said.

But aides say the voluble president, who has been pressured into using his secure White House landline more often these days, has still refused to give up his iPhones. White House officials say they can only hope he refrains from discussing classified infor-mation when he is on them.

Trump's use of his iPhones was detailed by several current and former officials, who spoke on the condition of anonymity so they could discuss classified intelligence and sensitive security arrangements. The officials said they were doing so not to undermine Trump, but out of frustration with what they considered the president's casual approach to electronic security.

Chinese spies are often listening these phone calls and putting to use invaluable insights into how to best work the president and affect administration policy," The New York Times said cit-ing unnamed current and former US officials

"American spy agen-cies, the officials said, had learned that China and Russia were eavesdropping on the president's cellphone calls from human sources inside foreign governments and ficials," the daily said.

According to the dai-ly, US intelligence officials have determined that China is seeking to use what it is learning from the calls how ments tend to sway him and to whom he is inclined to listen to keep a trade war with the United States from escalating further.

Malaysia ex-PM, ex-treasury, spy chiefs charged with graft

KUALA LUMPUR, OCT 25 (AP): Former Malaysian Prime Minister Najib Razak and his ex-treasury chief were jointly charged Thursday with criminal breach of trust involving 6.64 billion ringgit (USD 1.6 billion), while ex-spy agency head was charged with misappropriating USD 12.1 million.

The six new charges ainst Najib come on top of 32 earlier counts of corruption, breach of trust and money laundering that he face linked to the multibillion-dollar looting of the 1MDB state invest-

ment fund.

Malaysia's new government has stepped up pros-ecution of Najib and other former officials over the 1MDB scandal and other alleged graft cases since its stunning electoral victory in May that led to the country's first change of power since independence from

Britain in 1957.

Both Najib and former treasury treasury secretary-gen-eral Mohamad Irwan Serigar Abdullah pleaded not guilty to misappropriating government funds between December 2016 and December 2017

The charge sheets said part of the money involved a subsidy for the poor and an airport management budget but gave no further details.

Najib's lawyer, Shafee Abdullah, slammed the charges as "foolish," saying the fund was merely being diverted for more urgent needs which were to meet payment datelines mainly for 1MDB as well as for a Chinese-backed

Shafee said the two men had made "executive decisions" to reallocate the funds to avoid debt de-faults that could cause dire

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Mercury biopic crowns enduring majesty of Queen

LONDON, OCT 24 (AFP): The Freddie Mercury biopic "Bohemian Rhapsody" premiered in London in grand style on Tuesday, reflecting the enduring appeal of Queen and their legendary frontman 27 years on from his death.

Fans watched the film in the

12,500-capacity Wembley Arena -- opposite the stadium where the iconic British rock band gave a famous performance at the 1985 Live Aid concert.

Appreciation of the group's legacy and Mercury's unique talent has only grown since his death in 1991 of bron-

chial pneumonia, brought on by AIDS.

Among the world's best-selling artists ever, most of the band's sales

have come since the singer's pass-ing at the age of 45.

And Queen guitarist Brian May and drummer Roger Taylor, now 71 and 69, are still rocking arenas worldwide, resurgent as a live act propelled by the flamboyant US vocalist Adam Lambert.

Rock You", "Another One Bites The Dust" and "Don't Stop Me Now" are set for a further lease of life through

In the pipeline for eight years the film could deliver another smash hit, with Egyptian-American actor Rami Malek winning rave reviews for his performance as Mercury.

Malek has talked about tackling a complex character -- a publicly bombastic yet privately shy individual with a highly unusual path to stardom.
"Freddie Mercury is synony

mous with being otherworldly," the

actor said on the red carpet.
"The guy knew exactly what he was doing. That's why we're celebrating him.

"He was a revolutionary."

Born Farrokh Bulsara in 1946 to a Parsi Indian family living on the East African spice island of Zanzibar and educated at an English-style boarding school in India, he arrived in London when his family fled the



The movie follows Mercury's se to fame and complicated love life, from Queen's formation in 1970 to the band's star turn at Live Aid.

Their 20-minute set at Wembley Stadium was the band's finest hour, often cited as one of the greatest live performances ever

Mercury's demise seemed like the end for Queen -- a band of four equal partners who each wrote

chart-topping hits.

Bassist John Deacon retired in
1997 and has vanished from the

public eye.

Assuming Queen was a chapter closed, May and Taylor tried to move on with solo careers.

However, they gradually came to abrace rather than resist the gravitational pull of their band's legacy. And Mercury's legend only grows with time, yet to be eclipsed by a

more captivating stadium showman.
Even during his lifetime, Mercury was stunned that nobody had written a hit to overtake "We Are The Champions".

But 41 years on, his 1977 singalong anthem remains the go-to tune at sporting finales, and 1975's "Bohemian Rhapsody" is still regularly voted the greatest rock song ever written. With Deacon's blessing to carry

on as Queen, May and Taylor joined forces with bluesy former Free sing-er Paul Rodgers from 2005 to 2008 and played sell-out concerts.

Afterwards, the pair assumed their revival was done.

Then in 2009, on the television show "American Idol", they met Lambert -- someone May describes

Early brief performances sn balled into a European tour in 2012 and world tours in the years since.

May and Taylor are visibly reju-

venated by Lambert's natural ability to handle Mercury's dramatic range

and camp touch.

Oueen fans have embraced the 36-year-old, who does not try to mimic or replace their lost frontman.

Lambert acknowledges before audiences that he's "no Freddie". and asks their permission to cele-brate Mercury with them by singing his lines.

Billed as Oueen and Adam Lamert, they played 26 arena shows in North America and another 26 in Europe in 2017.

But such is the demand that they were back out again this year, touring Oceania and Europe and holding a residency in Las Vegas.

Concertgoers include those old enough to have seen Queen's last tour with Mercury in 1986, but also younger generations thrilled at the chance to experience the band live.

Their tours have rocked Wembley Arena twice in the last 10 months. May and Taylor were back at the in-door venue for the movie premiere. "I think we have done Freddie
