Sikkim Krantikari Mor-cha president, PS Ta-mang [Golay], today said contended that Chief Minister Pawan Chamling's recent statements that SDF will contest the 2019 assembly elections to "save" the state from negative forces proves that Sikkim was not safe under his leadership.

Strong 6.6-magnitude quake hits off Indonesia

JAKARTA, JAN 6 (AFP): A strong 6.6-magnitude earthquake struck off the Indonesian coast early Monday, sending residents running out of their homes, but no tsunami

warning was issued. The quake hit at a depth 60 kilometres (40 miles) under the Molucca Sea, some 175 kilo-metres north northwest of the city of Ternate, according to the USGS.
There were no immedi-

ate reports of damage or casualties and Indonesia's geophysics agency did not issue a tsunami alert.

"We felt the quake and some people got out of their house but there was no real panic. There is no damage in my area," said a man from Ternate called

Budi, who like many Indonesians goes by one name. Bani Nasution, a man who was in the city of Manado when the quake struck, told AFP: "I ran out of my house and so did other people here, but we've all returned to our houses now." A series of aftershocks also rocked the area. Indonesia is still reeling

from a deadly tsunami at the end of December triggered by an erupting volca-no in the middle of the Sunda Strait between Java and Sumatra islands that killed more than 400 people.

The vast Southeast Asian archipelago is one of the most disaster-hit nations on Earth due to its position straddling the so-called Pa-cific Ring of Fire, where tec-

The tsunami was Indonesia's third major natural disaster in six months, following a series of powerful earthquakes on the island of Lombok in July and August and a quake-tsunami in September that killed around 2,200 people in Palu on Sulawesi island, with thousands

Nude protests in Delhi against Citizenship Amendment Bill

NEW DELHI, JAN 7 (PTI): organisations Several organisations from Assam Monday staged protests, with some of the demonstrators stripping naked, outside Parliament against the central government's move to amend the Citizenship Amendment Bill.

Carrying placards and raising slogans, about 10 protesters belonging to the Krishak Mukti Sangram Samiti from Assam stripped themselves naked protest the controversial bill.

Within no time, po-lice swung into action and removed the protesters from the highly secured Vijay Chowk.

Another group of people protested out-side the Assam Bhavan in Chanakvapuri, show ing black flag and raising slogans.

Four Raiva Sabha members of the Con-gress, led by APCC president Ripun Borah, also staged protest outside the main gate of Parlia-ment against the bill.

Carrying banners and raising slogans, the Congress MPs demanded that the bill should not be brought in Parliament.

The Union Cabinet Monday cleared the redrafted Citizenship Amendment Bill, which seeks to provide Indian citizenship to non-Mus-lims from Bangladesh, Afghanistan and Pakistan.

The bill is expected to be tabled in the Lok Sabha Tuesday.

The move came with-in hours of the presentation in the Lok Sabha of a report of the Joint Par-liamentary Committee liamentary Committee examining the bill that was first introduced in Parliament in 2016.

Large sections of peo ple in Assam and other northeastern states have been protesting against the bill, saying it would nullify the 1985 Assam

Accord under which any foreign national, irrespective of religion, who had entered the state after 1971 should be deported.

The fresh bill seeks to amend the Citizenship Act 1955 to grant Indian nationality to people from minority communities -- Hindus, Sikhs, Buddhists, Jains, Parsis and Christians -- from Afghanistan, Bangladesh and Pakistan after years of residence in India instead of 12 even if they don't possess any proper document.

MNF now stakes claim to rule CADC

AIZAWL, JAN 7 (PTI): The Mizo National Front (MNF), the ruling party of Mizoram, Monday staked claim to form a new executive body to govern the Chakma Autonomous District Council (CADC) by replacing beleaguered BJP-led administration, officials

MNF Chakma District Council leader Rashik Mohan Chakma submitted a letter to the state secretary for district council affairs claiming that he has majority in the 20-member CADC.

In his letter Chakma

named four members of district council belonging to the Congress claiming that they are now sup-porting his leadership raising the strength of the MNF to 11, the officials said.

In the election to the CADC held on April 20, 2018, the MNF emerged as the largest single par-ty by securing eight seats followed by the Congress which bagged seven seats and the BJP which got five seats. Poll to one seat was stayed by the Gauhati High Court.

Traditional rivals, the BIP and the Congress, joined hands and forged a coalition and staked claim to form the executive commit tribal council. committee of the

However, the BIP headed coalition faced a setback after a few Congress members withdrew support.

The CADC is an au-

tonomous council for ethnic Chakma people, formed under the sixth schedule of the Constitution on April 29, 1972. Council exercises legislative, executive and judicial powers over allotted departments within the territory of CADC.

Speaker suspends four more MPs for disrupting proceedings

New Delhi, Jan 7 (PTI): Lok Sabha Speaker Sumitra Mahajan on Monday suspended three AIAD-MK MPs and one TDP lawmaker for two days for disrupting proceedings of the House

The Speaker had last week suspended 45 members for unruly behaviour. The Winter session of Par-liament is scheduled to conclude on January 8.

The members started their protests as soon as the House met this morning, forcing Mahajan to adjourn proceedings.

AIAMDK MPs K N Ramachandran, P Venu-gopal and K K Gopal were protesting over proposed construction of a dam by Karnataka on the Cauvery river while TDP MP Naramalli Sivaprasad, whose party has been raising the issue of special status to Andhra Pradesh, played a Tamil

song in the house.

for sporting different

was dressed like former Tamil Nadu chief minister M G Ramachandran

and held a whip in his hand.

As the House reconvened at noon, the members continued to protest in the Well despite warning from the Speaker.

With Bangkok, Dhaka flights, Guwahati may be first city to get international connectivity under UDAN

DELHI, JAN 7 (PTI): With the Centre finalising bids for the Guwahati-Dhaka and Guwahati-Bangkok routes, the Assam's largest city is likely to be the first to connected interna tionally under the UDAN scheme, a senior official said Monday.
While multiple bids

were received by the government on these two routes, there were no takers for four other destinations -- Singapore, Yangon in Myanmar, Kathmandu in Nepal and Kuala Lumpur in Malay-

"There was competition for these two cities. There were more than one bid. We have finalised the bid for Bangkok as well as Dhaka. The file is already with the minister, the day he signs it, we will announce," said the aviation ministry official.

Under the UDAN scheme for affordable international connectivity, Assam government is likely to provide a subsidy of Rs 2.370 and Rs 4.400 for a certain number of seats on flights operating on the Guwahati-Dhaka and Guwahati-Bangkok routes, respectively.

"For the last one year they (Assam) have been pursuing the ministry and they have committed the funds. They are keen that whatever money is

there should be used to We got the bids for two airports: Bangkok and Dhaka. For the remaining four, we got invalid bids," said the official.

internationmode of the UDAN scheme, the subsidy will come from the states and not the central government. Moreover, unlike the domestic scheme, no airline will be given exclusivity over a particular route under the international one.

On October 14 last year, the central govern-ment invited proposals from interested air operators for the international scheme as it seeks to enhance air connectivity from India to select overseas destinations.

The government, in an effort to make flying affordable, had in October 2016 announced the UDAN (Ude Desh ka Aam Nagrik) scheme with fares capped at Rs 2,500 for one-hour journey through subsidised ticket rates and to provide air connectivity

to smaller towns.

Five airlines were mandated to fly on 128 regional routes in the first phase of the bidding in March 2017, and 15 airlines on 325 regional routes, including those having chopper opera-tions, in the second phase in January last year.

Free football coaching at Bojoghari Musk lays foundation of USD 7 billion Tesla plant in China

CEO Elon Musk on Monof a USD seven billion plant in Shanghai, be-coming the first company to benefit from a new Chinese policy of allowing foreign vehicle manufacturers to set up wholly-owned sub-sidiaries in the Asian

Till now, foreign au-tomakers in China were required to forge joint ventures with domestic firms for establishing manufacturing plants, which means sharing profits and technology with local partners.

The plant, which is Tesla's first outside the US, is located at Lingang, a high-end manufacturing park in the southeast harbour of Shanghai.

It has an annual production capacity of 500,000 electric cars.

Tesla signed an agreement with the Shanghai municipal government in July 2018 to build the factory. In October, the company got the approval to use an

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864,885 sq mt tract of land in Lingang for its Shanghai plant. Musk and

hai government ficials attended ground-breaking cere-

"This will be the most advanced Tesla gigafactory...With sources here, we are able to build this factory in record time, and we are hoping to have ini-tial production of Tesla Model 3 toward the end of the year and volume production next year," 47-year-old Musk said.

The Tesla factory, which will be built with an investment of over 50 billion yuan (USD seven billion), is the largest foreign-invested manufacturing project in Shanghai's history, state-run Xinhua news agency reported. Aiming at reinforc-

ing its presence in the world's largest market for electric cars, Tesla brought its Model S, Model X and Model 3 to the China International Import Expo held in November 2018 at Shanghai.

-- the company's first mid-price, mass-market vehicle, in 2018 world-

wide.
China set a milestone record of selling one million new energy vehicles (NEVs) in 2018. The country aims at doubling the sales to two million in 2020.

The production at the Shanghai plant will help Tesla significantly lower its cost and prices, giving it more edge in the market competition.

CBI vs CBI: SC to pronounce judgement on Tuesday The Centre had

NEW DELHI, JAN 7 (PTI): The Supreme Court is scheduled to pronounce on Tuesday its verdict on CBI Di-rector Alok Kumar Verma's plea against the Centre's decision to divest him of powers and sending him on leave.

The Centre had tak-en a decision against Verma and CBI's Speverma and CBI'S Spe-cial Director Rakesh Asthana after their feud become public as they made allegations of corruption against each other. Verma has sought

quashing of three orders of October 23, 2018 -one by the Central Vigilance Commission (CVC) and two by the Depart-ment of Personnel and Training (DoPT), as being without jurisdiction and in violation of Articles 14, 19 and 21 of the

CBI's Joint Director M Nageswara Rao, a 1986 batch Odisha-cadre IPS officer, was given the charge of interim chief of the probe agency.

bench headed by Chief Justice Ranjan Gogoi had on De-cember 6 reserved the judgement after hearing arguments on behalf of Verma, the Centre, the CVC and others.

The court had also heard the plea moved by NGO Common Cause which had sought a court-monitored SIT probe into the allegations of corruption against various CBI officials, including Asthana.

Verma's two-year tenure as CBI director ends on January 31. He has moved the top court challenging the Centre's decision.

justified its decision to divest Verma of his duties and sending him on leave before the apex court saying he and Asthana were fighting like "Kilken-ny cats", exposing the country's premier investigating agency to "public ridicule".

Get Fired-Up about Fires

Time to address disaster preparedness better

Sikkim should consider itself lucky that the current winter has been reasonably wetter than recent years because it has saved the State from fires which are frequent during winter months. There haven't been reports of bush fires thus far this season or even blazes at home, save of course the notorious fire in Power Department record room recently. Sikkim should also consider itself even luckier, because given the erratic nature of power supply of late, one would have feared more bonfires roaring out of control.

Over the past few years, the State has had to grapple with a rash of forest fires and some huge blazes in its towns and villages. The recent history of fires might have been more dramatic, but fact remains that such fires have always been around. Many of the State's $monasteries \, and \, other \, important \, buildings \, have \, gone \,$ down to fires since the remote past to current times. Unfortunately, like most other concerns, fire safety continues to remain largely unaddressed. It is to the Fire & Emergency Department's credit that the force is much better trained now and adequately staffed to battle blazes, but they come in only when safety measures are not adequate and by the time they are called in, avoidable losses have been suffered. Yes, Sikkim requires better fire safety awareness.

The monsoon was healthy last year, and this winter has, as mentioned earlier, seen healthy enough precipitation as well. That said, the darelo season, when people clear out the weeds and burn out the stubble in their fields, is barely a couple of weeks away, and the chances of forest fires breaking out have traditionally been high during that phase. Meanwhile, the mercury has been slipping low as well, and as temperatures fall, the need for artificial heating in the phenomenally climate-insensitive Sikkim homes increases. With this, comes the danger of short circuits or stray embers sparking fires. Although casualties to fires have been rare in Sikkim, when it comes to flames, life and property are always at risk.

If the loss of lives and property has been low of late, it is only because the State now enjoys the services of a much improved fire-fighting team. Their quick response, aided by better equipment now at their disposal, has ensured that Sikkim and its people have not paid as dearly for their recklessness as the situations had potential for. That said, fire-fighters arrive at a scene only after human error [in most cases] has sparked a fire, and almost immediately are confronted with a host of obstacles, when, in an ideal situation, they should receive infrastructural and human assistance to expedite fire-fighting. Cheek-by-jowl constructions, selfish encroachment of feeder roads, blocked out alleys and irresponsible parking rob firefighters of the two requirements to ensure effective fire-fighting - access and information. Just about every fire is combated with fingers crossed in the hope that the resolve and bravery of the fire-fighters will carry the day. That cannot always happen.

It thus becomes important for better groundwork to be laid by residents of every area to ensure that when the professionals arrive, they know exactly what they are up against. The much touted civil defence teams, stitched together after the disastrous 1997 landslides in Gangtok, it appears, have run out of steam. Most towns of Sikkim now have urban local bodies to look out for their affairs. They should probably start doing more than issuing trade licences or joining cleanliness drives, and start addressing real urban woes - safety being an important concern. It will not take much imagination to achieve this. Disaster preparedness plans can be formalised for every ward. These plans should include scenarios ranging from earthquakes to landslides to fires to stampedes to even burst sewage pipes.

What DRC's flawed election means for emerging democratic culture in Africa

On December 30, 2018, 46 million citizens cast their votes in a historic election in the Democratic Republic of Congo. There hasn't been a peaceful transition of power in this country since the end of Belgian rule in 1960. If this election produces a result that's widely viewed as credible, it will cement a new era of representative government in Africa.

The deferral of representative government in the DRC has a long history. After the Berlin Conference (1884-85), Belgium acquired the Congo as a colonial territory and, from Léopold II to King Baudoin I, Belgian administrators oversaw one of the most brutal regimes on the continent. In 1960, Patrice Lumumba became the first prime minister, sharing power with Joseph Kasa-Vubu as president. A confluence of internal and external factors unleashed a crisis that led to Lu-mumba's assassination in 1961 and Mobutu Sese Seko's rise to power in 1965. With the support of Western nations, Mobutu presided over the looting of his country's natural wealth as one of the most tenacious gatekeeping dictators of the 20th century. He clung to power for more han 30 years.

In 1997. Laurent-Désiré Kabila took over as resident in the midst of conflict that spilled over rom the Rwandan genocide in 1994. Assassinated by his bodyguard in 2001, Kabila père was suc-ceeded by his son Joseph who has been in office ever since. Violent protests followed rigged elec-

ons in 2006 and 2011.

The quiet work of pro-democracy activism has been ongoing in the Congo since 2012 and the process of cultivating a demanding citizenry is visibly yielding results. A recent example was when 21 civic organisations mobilised, vowing to e non-violent protest to defend the outcome

There can be little doubt that a paradigm shift historic importance is underway.

Widespread irregularities have been docu-

ented in the recent election despite the presence of 40,000 observers. Nonetheless, prelim inary reports by the powerful Catholic church with direct knowledge of the process, claim that one presidential candidate has clearly won. Dip-lomatic sources identify the winner as Martin Fa-

Once results started to come in on December 31, confirming Fayulu's overwhelming victory, the government shut down the Internet, Radio France Internationale's FM broadcasting signal, and cell phone service across the country. Many believe Kabila's attempt to fix the election in fa-vour of his handpicked successor, Emmanuel Ramazani Shadary, didn't work. They interpret the information blackout as stalling and censorship, rather than a means of avoiding false news as al-

As the world waits amid growing international pressure for the national electoral commission to make official the results, it's already possible to see that significant change has come to the Massive voter turnout under very difficult circumstances is compelling evidence of the people's commitment to a democratic transition. WAVE OF PROGRESSIVE POLITICAL CHANGE

Recent civic engagement in the DRC has emerged as part of a pan-African trend. In 2012, students in Goma founded La LUCHA, shorthand for "strugBREAKING A CYCLE OF VIOLENCE

Fayulu is an anti-corruption reform candidate. He ran on a platform promising to restore dignity, to invest in education and to enforce the rule of law. Educated in France and the US, he was an executive at Exxon Mobile before being elected to Parliament in 2006.

gle for change," La LUCHA is a non-partisan citizen movement with as many as 3,000 activists who engage in non-violent campaigns to raise awareness of human rights and cultivate a demanding citizenry.

Another citizen's movement is Filimbi,

which means "blow of the whistle" in Swahili.

In 2011, rappers and journalists in Senegal founded Y'en a marre ("We are fed up"). They protested against unreliable electricity and cor ruption, registered young voters and ousted Abdoulaye Wade. In 2013, hip-hop artist, Smockey Bambara, and reggae artist, Sams'K le Jah, joined forces in Burkina Faso to create Balai Citoyen ("Citizen's Broom"). They led an uprising that evicted Blaise Compaoré after 27 years and then swept the streets as a symbolic gesture of civic engagement inspired by Thomas Sankara.

In 2015 and 2016, massive mobilisation in the DRC, supported by activists from Senegal a Burkina Faso, put pressure on Kabila, who ultimately decided not to cling to power. A coalition in the DRC formed the "2016 Citizen's Front," including Filimbi, la LUCHA, Katumbi, Fayulu calling for Kabila to respect the Constitution.
In 2016, la LUCHA shared Amnesty Inter-

national's Ambassadors of Conscience Award with Angelique Kidjio, Y'en a marre and Balai ture, tourism and develop local expertise to add value to the Congo's natural resources. He was backed by an opposition coalition and supported by two powerful figures: Jean-Pierre Bemba, a former warlord, and Moïse Katumbi, a wealthy businessman from Katanga.

If Favulu becomes president, the cycles of violence that brought dictators to power will have finally come to an end. There's no disputing that Kabila's regime did use violence to intimidate citizens during the election process. But it doesn't appear to have completely undermined the process.

To be sure, some observers will dismiss the election as late, flawed and a chaotic mess. Doubt-less more remains to be done to guarantee the integrity of future elections. And whoever wins will have much to do to recover from decades of corrosive violence and autocratic rule.

Yet it's also possible to look at this election as evidence of the people's commitment to de mocracy, even when the process is messy. The fact is that this election – and its promise for the future – adds to a wave of progressive political change across Africa led by students, musicians, journalists and activist citizens.

the Pixar animated film "Inside Out," most of the plot plays out inside protagonist Riley's head, where five emotions – Joy, Sadness, Fear, Disgust

and Anger – direct her behavior. The film was released to glowing views. But director Pete Docter latr admitted that he always regretted that one emotion didn't make the cut: hadenfreude.

Schadenfreude. which literally means "harm joy" in German, is the pe-culiar pleasure people derive from oths' misfortune

You might feel it when the career of high-profile celebrity craters, when a articularly noxious criminal is locked up or when a rival sporting team gets

Psychologists have long struggled with how to best understand, explain nd study the emotion: It arises in such wide range of situations that it can seem almost impossible to come up with some sort of unifying framework. Yet that's exactly what my colleagues and I have attempted to do. SCHADENFREUDE'S MANY FACES

One challenge continues to plague use who research schadenfreude: There's no agreed-upon definition.

Some think it's best to study the notion in the context of social comparison, so they'll tend to focus on the ov envy or resentment interacts with

Others view the emotion through the lens of justice and fairness, and whether the sufferer deserved his or ner misfortune.

Finally, the last group thinks that schadenfreude emerges out of inter-group dynamics – members of a group deriving joy out of the suffering of those outside of the group.

In our view, the different definitions

point to multiple sides of schadenfreude, each of which might have distinct developmental origins.

BLOSSOMING OF SCHADEN-THE FREIIDE

Perhaps the writers of "Inside Out," when deciding to jettison "Schaden-freude," thought that it would prove too difficult for children to grasp.

There's evidence, however, that children begin to experience schaden freude early in life.

For example, at four years old, children found someone else's misfortune

– like tripping and falling into a muddy puddle – funnier if that person had pre-viously done something to hurt other children, such as breaking their toys.

Researchers have also found that two-year-old kids primed to be jealous of a peer experience glee when that peer suffers a mishap. By the age of seven, children feel more pleased after winning a game if a rival lost than when both won the game. Finally, in a 2013 study, research-

ers had nine-month-old infants observe puppets interacting with one another. Some puppets "enjoyed" the same types of food that the infants enjoyed, while others had a different set of tastes. When some puppets "harmed" the other puppets, the researchers discovered that the infants would rather see the puppets who didn't share their tastes be hurt over the ones who did share their tastes. BRINGING IT ALL TOGETHER Together, these studies show that

schadenfreude is a complex emotion that seems to be deeply ingrained in the human condition.



Psychologists Scott Lilienfeld. Philippe Rochat and I wondered if there could be a way to unite the multiple facets of schadenfreude under same umbrella.

Eventually, we settled on seeing schadenfreude as a form of dehumanization – the act of depicting and viewing another person as less than

When most people hear the term 'dehumanization," they probably go to the worst-case scenario: a complete denial of someone's humanity, a phenomenon relegated to torture chambers,

battlefields and racist propaganda.

But this is a misconception. Psychologists have shown that people often view their own group in more human terms, and – in subtle ways – can deny the full humanity of those outside of their group.

In our review, we hypothesized that the more empathy someone feels

toward another person, the less likely they are to experience schadenfreude when that person suffers.

So in order for someone to feel schadenfreude toward another person whether it's a rival, someone in an outgroup or someone who's committed a crime – they'll need crime to subtly dehuman-ize them. Only then does the sufferer's

misfortune become rewarding.

This theory hasn't been tested

yet, so at the end of our review, we suggest ways schadenfreude's early origins and individual differences can be placed under scientific scrutiny to

study this novel hypothesis.

Linking schadenfreude with dehumanization might sound dark, especially because schadenfreude is such a universal emotion. But dehumanization occurs more often than most would like to think - and we believe behind the pang of pleasure you feel when you see someone fail.

where the birds were spotted last time, no sighting was made this time, they said.

Despite the drop in the number of migratory birds, hordes of rare and endangered avian spe-cies were sighted along wetland spots.

"The enumerators have spotted rare groups of winged species at the wetland spots of the national park. This is a clear indicator that Bhitarkanika is still a conge-nial spot to attract birds,"

Hamid administered the oath of office to 71-yearold Hasina at the Bangabhaban. It is Hasina's fourth term in office.

Her ruling Grand Al-liance won 96 per cent of the seats contested in the election, which was marred by accusations of ballot stuffing, voter intimidation and violence. Hasina and her ruling party have dismissed the accusations.

Hasina's cabinet is mostly made up of new faces. Thirty-one members of the new Cabinet are first-timers. The Cabinet exclusively consists of members of the Awami League.

On Thursday, she was chosen as the lead-

er of the House for the fourth time.

New Delhi, Jan 7 (PTI): Indian football captain Sunil Chhetri Monday said his team's first win in the Asian Cup after more than five decades was the best match of his illustrious international career in which he has out-scored superstar Lionel Messi.

India thrashed Thailand 4-1 in their group opener on Sunday. The 34-year-old goal ma-chine struck on either side of the lemon break in the country's stunning win, the first in Asian Cup

since 1964.
"It (Thailand match) stays right top there. I'm fortunate to play a lot of good games for my country but this game is right top there. It's one of those games where the team did really well." Chhetri told PTI from Abu Dhabi when asked to rate the Group A match.

In the process, he became the second highest er among active players with 67 strikes from 105 matches. He went past Argentine superstar Messi, who has scored 65 from 128 matches. Portugal's Cristiano Ronaldo is the highest scorer with 85 from 154 matches

Chhetri, who made his India debut in 2005, said his side did not expect to win against Thailand by such a big margin.
"We were confident

of a good show but honspeaking, we did not tit could have been 4-1. They (Thailand) are a very good side, technically very good. I'm sure none of us could think of a 4-1 win but we were confident of a good outing," he said.

"I am very happy with the performance and it has been a great start for us. I think the team unity. team understanding and spirit played the role behind the win. The indomitable spirit of the team actually is one of the important reasons why we won the game," he added.

Generalised farm loan waiver impacts credit culture, says RBI Governor

NEW DELHI, JAN 7 (PTI): Reserve Bank of India (RBI) Governor Shaktikanta Das Monday said any generalised farm loan waiver adversely impacts the credit culture and the behaviour of borrowers, amid various state governments an-

nouncing waivers.

The statement assumes significance in view of three newly elected state govern-ments implementing farm loan waivers in their states in pursuance of poll promises.

When asked about his views on loan write off for farmers by state governments, he said farm loan waiver is related to the fiscal space that a particular state government has.

"Elected governments constitutional mandate to take decisions with regard to their finance but every state govern-ment, before taking decisions on any kind of farm loan waivers, has to very carefully examine its fis-cal space," he said.

"It's also for the individual governments to examine whether they have the fiscal space to meet the requirements and release the money to the banks immediately. Any generalised kind of write-off obviously has adverse effect on the credit culture and the future credit behaviour of the borrowers," he said.

Manto needs intelligent, sensitive

English playwright Ben Jonson famously wrote that William Shake-speare was "not of an age, but for all time".

This iconic quote hardly seems out of place while referring to Urdu writer Sadat Hasan Manto, a maverick whose work has mesmerised millions and continues to whet the appetite of amateurs as well as aficionados.

Actor Ashwath Bhatt, who has proved his mettle in Bollywood movies such as "Raazi", "Haider" and "Manto", said the Urdu writer's work is "timeless" and will remain relevant as long as there is hypocrisy in the

Best remembered as the greatest chronicler of the Partition era, Manto also wrote about prostitutes, pimps and alcohol-ics, and was charged with obscenity six times.

"Manto unmasks hy-pocrisy, he doesn't de-ceive with his words. Speaks truth and is fearless to encounter it. He will remain relevant as long as there is hypocri-sy in the world. The day he ceases to be relevant. I will say we have learnt why India won this series, said Paine.

"Their best players stood up in the big mo-ments or when they were falling behind in a game, one of their good play-ers dragged them back into contest, or when they were in front of the game they put us out of the game like they did in Sydney and Melbourne. We can learn a lot from the way they went about it," he added.

Lanka court dismisses plea to check Sirisena's mental health

Monday dismissed a pe seeking mental health assessment of Pres-Maithripala Sirise na for his sacking of Ranil Wickremesinghe as Prime Minister, a controversial decision which plunged the country into an unprecedented political crisis.

October 26, President Sirisena. 67. sacked Wickeremesinghe as Prime Minister and replaced him with ex-strongman Mahinda Rajapaksa, triggering the never-seen-before political and constitutional impasse which lasted for over two months.

The Court of Appeal dismissed with costs the petition filed by a wom-an named Thakshila Lakmali Jayawardena, saying it had no authority to hear the case. Iavawardena sought

an order directing the police chief to go into Sirisena's state of mind. The petition called for a medical report on the President's mental status.

The court ordered Jayawardena to pay Rs 100,000 as legal costs.

Jayawardena's Attorney said after filing the case that President's unusual action warranted a medical check up on his mental status.

The petition was filed before the Supreme Court order on December 13 which ruled that Sirisena's action to dis-solve parliament to call fresh parliamentary elec-tion was unconstitutional and illegal.

Sirisena move to sack Wickremesinghe was described as a "constitutional coup" by the prime minister's supporters, arguing that the president

had no power to sack a per the 19th amendment to the Constitution.

Sirisena's appoint-ment of Rajapaksa was also questioned in the court as the Wickremesinghe camp questioned as to how Rajapaksa functioned in the prime minister's job when he had failed to prove his

parliamentary majority.
Rajapaksa sought to secure a majority in the 225-member Parliament but failed. Sirisena then dissolved Parliament and called snap elections on January 5.

However, the Supreme Court overturned his decision and halted the preparations for snap poll. Sirisena and Rajapaksa suffered reversal setbacks, forcing the president to reinstate Wickremesinghe as the prime minister.

China executes kindergarten knife attacker

Beijing, Jan 7 (AFP): China has executed a farmwho attacked several children with a knife at a kindergarten in a southern Chinese city two years ago, state media

reported Monday.

Yan Pengan was executed last Friday for slashing young chil-dren at the school in the Guangxi Zhuang region, the official Xinhua news agency reported.

Yan went to the kindergarten with a kitchen knife in January 2017 and attacked 12 children, seri-

ously injuring four of them.

A teacher fended off the attack and called

for help as Yan fled the scene. He later surrendered himself to local au-

Knife attacks targeting schoolchildren are not uncommon in China.

Last October, a knife-wielding woman injured 14 children at a Sichuan province kindergarten.
In April 2017, a man

killed nine middle school students as they were returning home in one of the country's deadliest knife attacks in recent years.

The suspect in that case, who was later ex-ecuted, had told police he was exacting revenge lied when he attended the school.

Such events have forced authorities to increase security around classrooms. Violent crime has

been on the rise in China in recent decades as the nation's economy has boomed and the gap between rich and poor has

widened rapidly.
Studies have also described a rise in the prevalence of mental disorders, some of them linked to stress as the pace of life becomes faster and support systems wither.

achievement. Has to be on top of the pile," Kohli said after being the first Indian captain to lead the team to a Test series win in Australia in 71 years.

The skipper then ex plained that why the triumph Down Under will remain more special fo him compared to World

Cup triumph. "I was a part of the 2011 World Cup team but I didn't have the emo-tion of not having been able to win a World Cup before, playing at home and winning it eventu-ally. A lot of the senior players had that emotion. So, for them it was what "we have achieved". Yes. it was a great moment for me to be part of.

"But if you ask me which moment is more emotional, I would say this one because this is my third tour here and I have seen with experience and being in the field as to how difficult it is to win here. So from that point of view this one is more emotional to me," the skipper said.

He is well aware of the history but by his own admission, he never wanted to challenge it.

"History does mat-ter. It's obviously a very proud moment, more so because for the last 12 months, we under-stand what we have gone through as a team. Although changing history or creating history is still not what I am thinking of, it is pure satisfaction of the hard work of 12 months," added Kohli,

For someone, who has time and again emphasized on team effort. Kohli said that Hanuma Vihari's dogged resis-tance against the new in an unfamiliai opening position was as critical as a century or

"If you ask me to single out a contribution, for me Hanuma Vihari playing 70 balls with the new ball in MCG is as big as anyone getting a hundred or anyone scoring 70-80. Trump pushes for steel barrier along **US-Mexico border to end shutdown**

(PTI): US President Donald Trump has offered to erect a steel barrier rather than a concrete wall along the southern border with Mexico to iron out differences with Democrats over the issue which has led to a partial government shutdown for a fortnight now.

The partial shutdown started on December 22 when funding for many federal agencies expired and President Trump refused to sign any spending measure from Congress that did not include USD 5 billion for his US-Mexico border wall.

Democrats con-trolling the House have agreed to fund only USD 1.3 billion for border security.

Trump's remarks on Sunday came after meetings between Vice President Mike Pence and Democratic congressional aides -- House Speaker Nancy Pelosi and Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer.

Trump believes that the shift in mabelieves terials might appease

Democrats.

Democrats have said their opposition to the wall is a matter of morals and effectiveness. Democratic lawmakers have argued the wall would not be a good deterrent to illegal immigration, and that investments should be made in

technology to secure the border. The disagreement has been at the centre of a partial government shutdown.

"They don't like concrete, so we'll give them steel. Steel is fine. Steel is actually more expensive than concrete, but it will look beautiful and it's very strong. It's actually stronger, Trump told reporters explaining the reasons for moving towards a steel-based physical barrier rather than a concrete one.

"What we need is we need a strong border. We have criminals coming in. We have human traffickers coming in. We have drugs pouring in. We have things happen-ing that you don't want to even know about. And it's been that way for decades, and we can't have it anymore, Trump said.

He also threatened to impose national emergency to build the wall.

"We are looking at a

national emergency, because we have a national emergency," Trump told

Trump did not specify on the mode of pay-ment for the border wall if he declares a national emergency.

'Green Book' wins best comedy, 'Bohemian Rhapsody' best drama at Golden Globes

LOS ANGELES, JAN 7 (PTI): In a Golden Globes ceremony full of surpris-ing twists and turns, period drama "Green Book" walked away with max-imum three awards, including Best Motion Picture - Musical and Comedy, while Queen biopic "Bohemian Rhapsody emerged champion with its win in the Best Drama

category.
Hosted by Andy Samberg and Sandra Oh, who became the first Asian to emcee a Hollywood awards show, the ceremony on Sunday night kept the tone light even as the Hollywood Foreign Press Association, the organisa-tion behind the awards, recognised diversity and

women empowerment. Globes, an early indicator of how the Hollywood award season will pan out, are also known for being unpredictable and mixing up categories and this year was no different.

Book' "Green emerged the biggest winner with three tro-phies -- Best Drama, Best Supporting actor for Mahershala Ali and Best Screenplay for its three writers Peter Farrelly, Brian Currie and Nick Vallelonga, on whose father's story the film is based.

The film follows a black pianist, Dr Don Shirley (Ali), and his unusual friendship with his white chauffeur Tony Vallelonga (Viggo Mortensen) as they drive through America's racially-divided south.

"Bohemian Rhapsody", which is the highest grossing musical biopic of all time won the Best Drama trophy, besting front-runners "A Star Is Born" "Black Panther" "If Beale Street Could Talk" and "BlacKkKlansman".

"That was unexpect-ed," producer Graham



King admitted in his acceptance speech.

The film's lead star Rami Malek's win was, however, more on expected lines for his lifelike portrayal of the Mumbai-born British rocker Freddie Mercurv.

"Thank you, Freddie Mercury, for giving me the joy of a lifetime, he said.

Both Malek and King noticeably omitted the film's director Brian Sing-er's name from their thank you speeches. Singer, who also gave the ceremony a miss, was fired from the job just weeks before the film's completion even though he retained the directing credits.

Veteran actor Glenn Close infused warmth in an otherwise dull ceremony with her rousing speech after she won the Best Actress in a Motion Picture - Drama Golden Globe for "The Wife".

Unable to hold back her tears, the 71-year-old actor said, "Oh my God, I iust can't believe this."

"As women, we are nurturers and that's what is expected of us...(But) We have to find personal fulfilment, we have to follow our dreams. We have to say 'I can do that and I should be allowed to do that'," Close said as the room honoured her with

a standing ovation.

While Close was emotional, Olivia Coleman, who won the Best Actress In A Motion Picture - Musical or Comedy category, was playfully irreverential as she thanked "her bitches", Rachel Weisz and Emma Stone her co-

stars in "The Favourite". The period film, directed by Yorgos Lanthimos, revolves around British monarch Queen Anne and the tussle between two women courtiers to become her 'favourite'.

The actor dropped F-bombs, which were expectedly cut out from the live telecast, and said the best part about playing Queen Anne was that she could eat "constantly throughout the film".

"I would like to tell you how much this film means to me but I can't think of it, because I'm too excited," she said.

Christian Bale, who

went through another physical transformation to play former US vice president Dick Cheney, won the Best Actor -Musical or Comedy for Adam McKay's political satire "Vice".

He joked that from

The Best Supporting Actress winner was Regi na King for her role in "If Beale Street Could Talk' and she pledged to include 50 per cent women in all her future projects.

years, everything that I produce, I am making a vow, and it's going to be tough, to make sure that everything that I pro-duce, that it's 50 per cent women, and I just challenge anyone out there who is in a position of power I challenge you to challenge yourselves and do the same," she said.

Alfonso Cuaron's widely-loved Netflix film "Roma" won two awards - The Best Director trophy for Cuaron and in the Best Foreign Film Cate-

gory.
The Mexican filmmaker, who is widely expected to win major nominations at the Oscars again with the

black-and-white drama, said "cinema at its best tears down walls and builds bridges to other cultures".

Cuaron, who earlier won the Oscar for "Grav-ity", said, "As we cross these bridges and experience new shapes and faces, we begin to real-ise that while they may be strange, they are not unfamiliar. We begin to understand exactly how much we have in com-

Best Motion Picture Animated went to Sony's "Spider-Man: Into the Spider-Verse". In a major snub, "A Star Is Born" had to content itself with a lone win for Best Original Song for "Shallow". Both actor-director Bradley Cooper and actor Lady Gaga lost out in their re-

spective categories.

The Best Original Score went to Justin Hurwitz for Damien Chazelle's space drama "First Man", which fizzled out in award season despite critical acclaim.

Actor Chris Pine presented the career award, the annual Cecil B. DeMille honour, to his "Hell or High Water" co-star, vet-eran actor Jeff Bridges.

Christian Bale takes home first Best Actor Golden Globe

LOS ANGELES, JAN 7 (PTI): Christian Bale won his first Best Actor in a Musical or Comedy Golden Globe award for his performance as Dick Cheney in "Vice" and thanked "Satan" for inspiring him to play the role of the former US vice president.
