ANGTOK, 6 JAN: The Nishani Kali tem-

The Nishani Nair Comple at Pendam Garhi in East Sikkim is deeply revered by people living in the area and also attracts visitors in strong numbers from elsewhere. With Chief Minister Pawan Chamling laying the foundation of a major project there today, the temple complex is set to receive a Rs 63.84 crore facelift with statues of Nishani Kali Devi and Lord Shiva.
Residents of the area

revere Nishani Kali Devi as the guardian deity of the village and the temple complex also houses the local water source highly vener-ated by the residents of Pendam area.
"This is a huge mile-

stone for the people of this area and State as well. Once the temple is completed, tourists will flood this place.



This place not only has immense potential of strengthening the economy of the people but also has great potential for generation of employment opportunities, the CM said, while add-ing that the State Government has made continuous effort and elaborate contributions towards

of the project reveals that the main statue complex will be established on the commanding hill top over Pendam Garhi spread over 5 acres and will feature two statues of Nishani Kali Devi in standing pose and Lord

Shiva in supine pose.

The statue will be 54 ft in height and tower at

70 feet when measured

from the base.

The Kharga Nisani Kali Marg will lead the devotees to the main temple complex.

The temple complex will include an exhibition hall, a prayer hall, waiting lounge, offices, storage facilities, including water storage, electricity transformer sub stations and a parking area half a kilometre below the main temple complex.

Roles of Festivals

RONGNYOO LEPCHA

Restivals are an important part of every culture. It is a time for merry-making and relaxation from the rigmarole of daily life. I have had the opportunity to visit some of the local festivals with my fellow researchers, and every festival made it clear that it was more than just the celebration of say a new year or a harvest but had many layers of functioning to them.

but had many layers of functioning to them.

One of the festivals I attended was the Chasok Tangnam festival of the Limbus. Chasok Tangnam is among one of the most important Kirat Limbu festivals, Chasok, referring to the first harvest offered to the gods and deities, and Tangnam meaning festival. This festival falls in the month of December though no specific date if fixed on the Gregorain calendar since the Limbus follow the lunar calendar and allot a date within a full moon cycle.

In Sikkim, the festival is held at Saramsa Kheth (Saramsa, East Sikkim) where Limbus from all over Sikkim gather and celebrate together. Traditionally, Limbus celebrated Chasok Tangnam festival at an individual level with the first harvest being offered to Yuma Sammang (Limbu ancestor goddess). The festival was not celebrated in a social group until recently. Earlier, Chasok worshipping was done at home by individual families, especially by the woman of the house who has borne a child.

Limbus being an agrarian community, hold this festival in celebration of a good harvest and fertility of the land. Chasok Tangnam developed as a festival among Limbu people for harvest and their ancestors for handing down the teachings of agriculture. The ceremony starts with the Phedangma (Limbu priest) reciting the story of Limbu ancestors leading a life of hunting and gathering, then, they were taught to plant and harvest various crops by Yuma Sammang. The Limbus offer the harvest as offerings to their supreme god Tagera Ningwaphumang and the ancestor goddess Yuma Sammang for the knowledge of agriculture bestowed on them by them. It is strongly believed that any harvest consumed without first being offered to the gods would bring bad luck and misfortune.

The festival hosts traditional games like tug of war and juggling of stones which the people take part in enthusiastically. Stalls with various traditional foods and traditional items are

put up, a small replica of a Limbu traditional Khim (house) with various materials items of the community displayed for visitors to get in touch with the old but valuable traditional relics. It also includes the traditional Chyak Brung dances with the traditional drums matching the footsteps imitating various animal movements. The drums echoing the rebirth of Limbu identity and culture.

As I was working on a festival myself for my own fieldwork, I attended one of the more important festivals of the Lepchas, the birth anniversary of Pano Gaeboo Achyok. The festival is a community event, celebrated on the 20th of December every year at Kalimpong. Like any other festival, it started small at the village level initially but soon grew bigger and is today celebrated in a grand manner with Lepchas from all over gathering at one place to show solidarity and to pay homage to the last Lepcha king, Pano Gaeboo Achyok.

The festival starts with a visit to Damsang Gree by Bongthings who offer prayers there. The old ruins of the fort are lit up once a year with lamps made of banana and bamboo oil. The area is cleaned by the Pedong Lepcha youth a day before the festival and prayers and offerings made in the old ruined room of the fort.

After offering prayers and carrying out the rituals at the fort, the Bongthings join the mass rally towards Mela Ground in Kalimpong, When I was there, Lepchas from Kalimpong, Darjeeling, Bhutan of different religious background and different age groups had gathered for this big event. Food was prepared and served to all the people who came to the festival. Cultural events are the star of the event where people enjoy and relax themselves.

While continuing my own research, I also had the opportunity to attend the Bhujel festival of Pugal Parim with another fellow researcher. With the revivalism of the Bhujel traditions, they have been keenly accepting their traditional ways and enthusiastically celebrating their festivals, one of the more important one of which is Pugal Parim celebrated at 27th Mile, Sepkhola (Kalimpong).

One of the main reasons for the grand cel-

One of the main reasons for the grand celebration of this festival is to preserve their culture, arts and traditions. Before the establishment of Bhujel Welfare Society, the Bhujels used to celebrate this festival at their own

homes. Pugal means Bhujel and Parim means meeting. So, the convention of Bhujels at a particular place and celebrating is known as Pugal Parim. Celebrated in a grand manner, it starts early as Pugal families from all over Kalimpong meet at Sepkhola, the Phoros (priests) perform rituals dedicated to nature deities. Sacrifices are made to the river deity, followed by cultural performances. Each family cooks its own food at the festival and there is ofcourse sharing of meals with one another. Another aspect that came to light was that festivals also served

only if the chosen party accepted the proposal, encouraging endogamy within the community. In all of these festivals, people adorn their traditional attires and perform ceremonies recreating the traditional manners. In fact, festivals are events where one can trace back the whole history of material and non-material customs and cultures of a community. One

desired at the festival. Anyone could select the

girl/ boy of their choice for marriage, that is,

can see varieties of cultural ornaments flaunted in the open which otherwise are believed to have perished. Restoration of the old customs are the means by which communities make an attempt to get back in touch with their roots and ensuring the younger generation absorbs all of it so that they can carry it further. Identity becomes very important when it comes to a bigger platform like a community identity. Now that the world is expanding, it becomes all the more important to show one's identity to be recognized. For long, many have been in this unending race. There has been a great deal of effort put in to

stand out in the crowd and festivals provide the perfect platform for communities to show their identity, culture and rituals. Even communities living in close proximity are trying to show their own distinctiveness and how they are prominent.

The predicament of identity has caused communities to proclaim each of their unique ways to stand out from the rest. Currently there are many ethnic communities which are struggling for their identities to be recognized. Festivals reveal and explain current values and social situations which offer a vision of the future about a community. The celebration of festivals has important functions like preserving heritage, encouraging social solidity, releasing tensions accumulated from daily life and inculcating pride and loyalty towards the community. There is also exertion of the community identity to make it known to the world of the community's existence and their rich heritage.

Nepal writes to RBI to declare banned new Indian currency notes legal KATHMANDU, JAN 6 (PTI): Nepal has asked the RBI to declare newly circulated Indian currency notes of denominations higher than Rs 100 legal tender in the country, according to media report on Sunday.

The Nepal Rastra Bank (NRB), the country's central monetary authority, has written a letter on Friday to the Reserve Bank of India (RBI), asking it to make Indian bank bills Rs 200, Rs 500 and Rs 2,000 legal tender in Nepal, The Himalayan Times reported.
The NRB has asked the

India's central bank to issue a notification under the For-eign Exchange Management Act (FEMA), which will make Indian bank notes of denomination more than Rs 100 legal tender in Nepal and to provide the exchange facil-ities to get bills of such denominations, it said. The RBI has only allowed the circulation of Indian currency notes of Rs 100 and less in Nepal and provides exchange facilities for bills of these denomination

Grooming a Generation on Boredom

Sikkim continues to prove itself to be an uncaring parent

With the winter break now rather deep into the holidays and outstation vacation season also drawing to an end, the near complete lack of outdoor options for the children must be becoming obvious for most families in Sikkim. With the long school hours no longer available to dodge the guilt of the boredom we impose on the kids, there is no hiding from the embarrassment of Sikkim consistently proving to be an uncaring parent.

For those who might think otherwise, take a look around. How many parks and playgrounds does Sikkim make available for its children. Even the few that do exist are horrendously designed and although they might look pretty, are not the best of spaces to let children play around unsupervised. Even as the population has increased, the public spaces for children to play around have decreased. Children's parks have been reclaimed as car parks and the grounds that are available are neither maintained nor always open. Almost every locality is now built up to the level of blocking out the sun and the wind, allowing not even the corners or gullies where the kids could be left to play un-chaperoned. Little surprise then that playing games has now become an engagement with screens. Even homes are no longer residential areas which used to have earlier have some space for children to run around and find devise their timepass. Sequestered into flats and "rooms", we are grooming a generation on boredom.

Apart from the obvious health issues that we are imposing on the young, there are also the mental and social handicaps that we are straddling them with. Boredom never delivered positive results, and needs no further reiteration here. Further, even though the young might not notice the obvious, at least at a subconscious level, the denials must be getting internalized, and that can't be healthy either How can we question them decades later when Sikkim also becomes a place where the elders are also left uncared for? If for nothing else, then for our own selfish reasons of securing more dignified senior citizen years, we should look out for the young in more earnest, motivated less by civil-engineering possibilities. What we tend to also forget when we crowd children out of public spaces is that apart from schools and among relatives, it is in parks and $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right)$ grounds that children build social skills and learn about social responsibility. Replace the parks with smart-phones and we are replacing social contract with social media. That is not even an option and can have disastrous consequences in later years

And yet, that is how we continue to "look after" our young. There are many issues which continue to get addressed only from top down- substance abuse, skill enhancement, competitiveness to name a few. Efforts directed at all of these could be reinforced if we also looked into the options we offer our children for their leisure hours and months. The society, the people, the parents, however, still don't appear concerned enough to join the discussion. No one has really tried to understand what issues concern the young; and then we wonder why nothing works...

How to negotiate infrastructure deals with China: four things African governments need to get right

"You don't negotiate with China !" I was quickly told when I started interviewing African public servants about their infrastructure deals with Beijing. There is a widespread view in Africa that you accept whatever terms are offered, for fear that the money might go somewhere else instead.

China is the leading infrastructure finance pro-vider on the continent – as demonstrated by a recent pledge of US\$60 billion (£47 billion), most of which is for infrastructure projects. Big projects on the slate include hydropower plants in Angola and Guinea, an oil

refinery in Nigeria, and a new city in Egypt. Yet, when you look closely at what happens on the ground, some African countries are much better at negotiating with the Chinese than others. Railway projects in East Africa appear to be a good example. In Kenya, the Standard Gauge Railway is kilometres of track between Nairobi and Mombasa – at a cost of US\$3.2 billion.

In neighbouring Ethiopia, an electric train line from Addis Ababa to Djibouti, which is also Chinese-financed, opened two years ago. The cost for this more expensive type of railway was US\$3.4 billion – for 756 kilometres. Kenya claims that its railway cost more for reasons like the terrain and the need to carry higher volumes of cargo. At the same time, however, many believe other issues to have been at play – including failures around the

negotiation process.

My ongoing research into China funded infra-structure projects is confirming that African governments can learn from best practice in this area. The best deals depend on the following four condi-

1. INVOLVE EVERYONE

The process in Chinese deal-making tends to go like this: Beijing will begin by making financial pledges, often aimed at a number of countries; these are followed by meetings at state level be-tween a Chinese delegation and the African head of state and their senior officials. Infrastructure projects under discussion have often already been passed over by Western donors.

Once a project is broadly agreed, the relevant Chinese contractors, mostly state owned enter-prises, will typically contact African civil servants in the relevant branches of government to get de-tailed negotiations underway – with support from the Chinese trade mission and local embassy. Topics to be discussed will include costs, but also the use of materials and workers; technology transfer; and the effect of national regulations in areas like labour, construction and the environment.

In countries like Togo and Cameroon, key minis-

tries like finance, planning or even the cabinet will

lead the negotiation. In the likes of Benin and Senport or housing, will lead instead or take over. They are supposed to consult with departments like finance and planning, but they often press ahead on their own to speed up the process -

without any experience of dealing with China.

In practice, such deals can be less beneficial to the country in question. Where one arm of government is not clear about what another is doing, it increases the potential for corruption – there has been a corruption investigation in the case of the new Kenyan railway, for example, and I have been told during my research that this was also linked to

coordination failures during the negotiations.

When all relevant government departments are involved in a negotiation, it does take longer.

bridge the differences in Chinese and African ne gotiating styles.

The Chinese often adopt a take-it-or-leave-it

approach. In many cases, Africans are not confrontational enough in return. They don't appreciate that China has a surplus of domestically produced materials they are seeking to offload, for example. Wiser negotiators will play China off against other countries seeking to finance infrastructure projects on the continent, such as South Korea or the United Arab Emirates.

3. KEEP THE PUBLIC ONSIDE

China tends to be popular in Africa – more so than the US in around 60% of countries on the continent. Yet the public also see negatives: many think Chinese products are poor quality, while there is a growing perception that dealing with China tends

2. EMPOWER THE NEGOTIATORS

The president or his senior advisors also frequently intervene during negotiations. This is likely to be politically motivated – a need to fulfil electoral promises around infrastructure development, perhaps, or pressure from the Chinese authorities.

Where civil servant negotiators are being pressed to hurry up, it can mean that national regulations get ignored. In Benin, for example, during negotiations over road projects several years ago, the Chinese contractors were unhappy about cer-tain conditions being imposed. Then president Yayi Boni agreed to intervene on their behalf to bypass national regulations in areas including labour and construction. Such situations are best avoided.

On the other hand, some outside interventions can be positive. In Togo, Senegal and Tunisia, and the current government in Benin, I've seen examples of the cabinet hiring international law firms with experts who have worked in the Chinese government and its development banks. This can to favour Chinese labourers.

African governments need to bear these con-cerns in mind. If not, they risk being denounced by the media or civil society organisations – as has happened in Kenya over the railway, for instance.

4. INCREASE KNOWLEDGE

African governments are still relatively new to dealing with China; they should take every oppor-tunity to share lessons with one another. There is a role for African universities here. They should set up more centres of Asian studies to close the gap in information and knowledge.

Some have argued in the past that many African governments fail to negotiate successfully with the Chinese because they lack a strategy. I actually see plenty stratagems and tactics on the African side. What is required is a more coordinated and coherent approach - something China has been working on from its own perspective. It is better for African governments to have no deal than a bad deal. With the right approach, they can achieve much more than is often thought to be the case.

CHILDHOOD AND ADOLESCENCE

In childhood, exercise helps control body weight, builds healthy bones and promotes self-confidence and healthy sleep patterns. The government recommends that children should get at least one hour of exer-

- cise a day. As a tip:
 Children should try a variety of sports and develop skills, such as swimming and the ability to hit and kick a ball.
 - Lots of non-scheduled physical activity is great, too, such

as playing in playgrounds.

Exercise habits tend to steadily decline during teen years, particularly in girls. Getting enough exercise promotes a healthy body image and helps manage stress and anxiety. You

- Encourage teenagers to keep one team sport, if possible.
- For teenagers who are not into team sports, swimming or athletics can be a good way to keep fitness levels up.

You are at your absolute physical peak in your mid-20s, with the fastest reaction times and highest VO2 max – the maximum rate at which the body can pump oxygen to muscles. After this peak, your VO2 max decreases by up to 1% each year and your reaction time slows each year. The good news is that regular physical activity can slow this decline. Building lean muscle mass and bone density at this age

helps you retain them in later years.

- Vary your training and keep it fun. Try tag rugby, rowing
- or boot camp.
 If you are a regular exerciser, get advice from an exercise professional to build "periodisation" into your training regime. This involves dividing your training regime into progressive cycles that ma-nipulate different aspects of training - such as intensity, volume and type of exercise - to optimise your performance and ensure you peak for a planned exercise event, such as a triathlon.

IN YOUR 30s

As careers and family life for many intensify in their 30s, it is important that you maintain cardio-vascular fitness and strength to slow normal physical decline. If you have a sedentary job, make sure you maintain good posture and break up long periods of sitting by forcing activity into your day, such as routing your printer to another room, climbing a flight of stairs to use the bathroom on another floor, or standing when taking a phone call so you are moving every half an hour where possible.

- Work smart. Try high-inten-sity interval training. This is where bursts of high-intensity activity, up to 80% of your maximum heart rate, such as sprinting and cycling, are broken up with periods of lower-intensity exercise. This kind of workout is good for the time poor as it can be done in 20 minutes.
- For all women, and especially after childbirth, do pelvic floor exercises, sometimes known as Kegel exercises daily to help prevent incon-
- Diversify your exercise pro-

gramme to keep it interesting. Try boot camp, spin class

or yoga. IN YOUR 40S

Most people start to put on weight in their 40s. Resistance exercise is the best way to optimise calorie burning to counteract fat accumulation and reverse the loss of three to eight percent of muscle mass per decade. Ten weeks of resistance training could increase lean weight by 1.4kg, increase resting metabolic rate by 7% and decrease fat weight by 1.8kg.

- Try kettlebells or start a weight-training programme
- in your gym.

 Take up running, if you don't run already, and don't be afraid to start a more intensive exercise programme. You get more bang for your buck with running versus walking.
- Pilates can be useful to build core strength to protect against back pain, which often starts in this decade.

In this decade, aches and pains may crop up and chronic conditions, such as type 2 diabetes and cardiovascular disease, can manifest. As oestrogen declines in postmenopaus-al women, the risk of heart disease

- Do strength training twice a week to maintain your muscle mass.
- Weight-bearing such as walking, is recom-mended. Walk fast enough so that your breathing rate increases and you break a
- Try something different. Tai chi can be excellent for balance and relaxation.

people accumulate Typically, more chronic conditions as they get older, and ageing is a major risk factor for cancer. Maintaining a high level of physical activity can help prevent cancers, such as post-menopausal breast cancer, colon cancer and cancer of the womb, and it reduces the risk of developing chronic conditions, such as heart disease and type 2 diabetes.

Physical activity tends to decline with age, so keep active and try to buck this trend.

- Try ballroom dancing or other forms of dancing; it's a fun and sociable way to exercise.
- Incorporate strength and flexibility exercises twice a week. Aqua-aerobics can be a great way to develop strength using water as resistance.
- Maintain cardiovascular exercise, such as brisk walking.
 70s AND BEYOND

Exercise in your 70s and beyond helps prevent frailty and falls, and it's important for your cognitive function. If you have a period of ill health, try to keep mobile, if possible. Strength and fitness can decline rapidly if you are bed bound or very inactive, which can make it hard to get back to previous levels.

- Walk and talk. Instead of in-active visits from family and friends, go for a walk together. It will keep you motivated and boost your health more
- than solitary exercise. Incorporate some strength, balance and cardiovascular exercise in your regime. But get advice from a physiotherapist or other exercise professional, especially if you have several chronic conditions.

The main message is to keep moving throughout your life. Sustained exercise is what benefits health most.

India on course for historic series win despite rain-hit day four

CHETAN NARULA SYDNEY, JAN 6 (PTI): Fickle weather on day four prevented India from closing in on a big win in the fourth Test but they were well on course for their maiden series victory in Australia after forcing the hosts to fol-low-on at home for the first time since 1988.

Bad light and intermitted rain led to substantial loss of play with only 25.2 overs bowled

Australia placed at 6-0 in 4 overs after Kuldeep Yadav's five-wicket haul in his maiden Test Down Under helped India bowl the home team out for 300 in the first innings.
Umpires took players

off the field with eight minutes remaining in the belated afternoon session, Marcus Harris (2) and Usman Khawaja (4) were the unbeaten batsmen with Australia still

trailing by 316 runs.

But play didn't resume at all once the scheduled tea break was over, as bad light hampered proceedings once again. The umpires waited for nearly an hour, coming out for inspec-tion in between, before making a decision at 5 pm local time

The match officials were ready to wait until



but a slight drizzle put paid to the wait and the day was called off at 5.20 pm local time.

This was after Australia were bowled out for 300 runs (104.5 overs) in their first innings and were asked to follow on, surrendering a lead of 322 runs. Kuldeep Yadav took 5-99, making instant impact in his first game of the series.

After the morning

session was washed out,

local time with 230 minutes lost to bad light and rain since day three.

India took the second ball immediately and made quick inroads Mohammed Shami (2-58) bowled Pat Cummins (25) with a ball that kept low on the sixth ball after resumption of play.
At the other end, Jas-

prit Bumrah (1-62) set up Peter Handscomb (37) who played on after Peter Handscomb a resilient innings facing 111 balls. Yadav then trapped Nathan Lyon (0) lbw as Australia lost hree wickets for 22 runs in the space of 44 balls.

And he could have immediately completed his five-wicket haul, but Hanuma Vihari put down a skier from Josh Hazlewood (21) at mid on. In the process, Vihari hurt his left shoulder whilst fielding and didn't take the field later on in the session, with Hardik Pandya coming on as a substitute fielder

Hazlewood Mitchell Starc (29 not out) then added 42 runs for the 10th wicket as Australia reached 300 despite another pitiful batting display.

Yadav got his reward thereafter with Hazlewood trapped lbw on a close umpire's call, and the decision stayed in the wrist-spinner's favour despite DRS.

were then Australia forced to follow on for the first time in Test cricket since 2005 when England had enforced the same in Nottingham. On their home soil, this was the first instance of Australia following on since 1988, again in Sydney, versus England.

Earlier, incessant rain and bad light prevent-ed the start of play. It couldn't commence at the scheduled early 10 am local time start due to bad light and wet conditions from overnight

The light improved in some time and the two umpires stipulated 11 am local time as the start of play, but rain arrived to prevent that

Qatar coach to 'isolate' team from Gulf politics at Asian Cup



DOHA, JAN 6 (AFP): Qatar coach Felix Sanchez has vowed to "isolate" his players from politics at the Asian Cup, which is taking place in the United Arab Emirates during a diplomatic crisis be-tween the countries.

The tournament represents the first visit by he Qatari national side to the UAE since the beginning of a row that has transformed the Gulf and left Doha cut off from its neighbour-

ing former allies.
Since June 2017, the UAE and other regional powers have imposed a boycott on Qatar, accusing it of backing terror-ism and being too close to Iran.

Two of the other na-tions who have enforced the boycott also have teams in the tourna-ment, Saudi Arabia and Bahrain.

Qatar denies the charges and says neighbours are seeking regime change in Doha.

With the dispute now into its nineteenth month, the Asian Cup is the most high-profile sporting competition so far between the former allies turned bitter rivals.

And nothing is likely to be more high-ly-charged than the ly-charged than the meeting between Saudi and Qatar in a Group E match in Abu Dhabi on

January 17.

As if the on-pitch weight of expectation

Oatar's surrounding Qatar's young team ahead of hosting the 2022 World Cup was not enough, now they have to navigate a delicate off-field situation.

Sanchez though has vowed to concentrate

solely on football. This [political situation] is something we've discussed with the players," he told AFP.

"They are very con-scious and I am con-vinced that during the competition they will be able to maintain their focus on the sport and to isolate ourselves from the rest of it all."

The team arrived in UAE on Saturday, hav-ing to fly via Kuwait in the first sign this is no ordinary trip -- a ban on direct flights has been imposed against Doha by the UAE, Saudi and Bahrain. who have played in the UAE or Saudi in the AFC Champions League have previously spoken of delays at airport immi-gration and comments about Qatar, or encountered rival captains re-fusing to shake hands before the match.

However, goalkeeper Saad al-Sheeb said the players would remain unaffected.

"In the end this is football," he said. "We just control ourselves and play football."

On the pitch, Qatar have shown a distinct im-provement since Spaniard Sanchez took charge in 2017.

Initially seen as a stop-gap appointment at the end of a failed World Cup qualification campaign, the 43-year-old has trans-formed the team.

He has placed emphasis on young, largely Qatari-born players -- rather than imported stars
-- who have progressed through the Aspire Academy, an expensively-built Doha training centre which seeks to hothouse local talent.

These include forward Akram Afif, the first Qatari to play in Spain's La Liga, and defender Abdulkarim Hassan, just voted the AFC 2018 player of the year.

In November, Qatar achieved its most nota-ble international victory, beating Switzerland 1-0

The average age of Qatar's starting line-up in Switzerland was 24 years and 195 days, and 13 of the 25 players who ravelled to Europe were Aspire graduates.

Sanchez is proving a unique problem for Qa-tar football association bosses who like to hire and fire coaches.

Since the beginning of the century Oatar has hired 15 separate coaches, and one of those twice, as they desperate-ly seek to put the team on the world stage.

Federer, Kerber cautious on new Aus Open tie-break rule



PERTH, JAN 6 (AFP): Star players Roger Federer and Angelique Kerber have cautiously wel-comed new tie-break rules for the deciding set at the Australian Open.

The year's opening Grand Slam, starting Jan-uary 14, will for the first time feature an extended tie-break in the final set when the score reaches 6-6, rather than a traditional full set.

To win the decisive

tie-break, a player will need to be the first to 10 with an advantage of at least two points.

The move means all four Slams now use different rules, with only the French Open holding off from introducing a tie-break in the decider.

Speaking at the Hop-man Cup in Perth this week. Federer -- who said he had been asked for his opinion on the change by tournament officials -- admitted mar-athon final sets would be missed by some

"We will miss the 70-68 in the fifth, so that's a pity," he said, referring to the famous final-set marathon between John Isner and Nicolas Mahut at Wimbledon in 2010.

But Federer, aiming for his third successive Australian Open title and seventh overall, said he was personally "a bit torn" between the options. "I am okay with any format really," he said. "Thing is, when it goes to six-all in the fifth, you've had plenty of chances to win it, or lose it, so from that standpoint how it ends is secondary

in my opinion."

Kerber -- who has based her game on superior physical fitness -- suggested her advane could be diluted shortened deciders Melbourne, where she won her first Slam in 2016. "I like physical matches and if you come here to Australia you have be really fit," she said. "With the weather,

'Heartbreaking': tennis stars lament potential end of Hopman Cup

PERTH, JAN 6 (AFP): The likely demise of the Hopman Cup after three decades of the unique mixed teams tennis tournament has been greeted with sadness by players at this year's edition, with Serena Williams calling the prospect "heartbreaking".

Swiss duo Roger Federer and Belinda Bencic beat Germans Alexander Zverev and Angelique Kerber in Saturday's final in front of a sell-out crowd in Perth, but it is expected to be the last

instalment of the event.

A dramatic finish to what was arguably the best Hopman Cup ever -- which also saw Federer and Serena face off for the first time in a histor-ic mixed doubles clash -- came down to a single match point shared by both sides in the final.

However, the event is widely tipped to be scrapped to make way for the new ATP World Team Cup, which will start next year. While Tennis Australia has a contract with the West Australian State Government to run the ITF-sanctioned tournament until 2022, the new ATP event would make it very hard for the Hop-man Cup to attract top men's players.

American superstar Serena, who was playing in Perth for the fifth time in her career and has won the title twice, said she was unaware of speculation on the Hopman's fate, but that she was upset by the prospect of it vanishing. "Obviously it would be heartbreaking," she said. German world num-

ber two Kerber, who has reached successive finals



in the past two Hopman Cups, was saddened by the news. "I really love the tournament," she said. "We all will be sad that it is the last time at Hopman Cup.

"Playing here as a

team with your partner, playing the mixed which is exciting, I will miss it."

Launched in 1989 by former Australian players Paul McNamee and Charlie Fancutt and named after Australian tennis great Harry Hopman, the Hopman Cup has been used as preparation for the Australian Open by three decades of players and has held a unique place in the tennis world as the only top level mixed teams tournament. Swiss legend Roger Federer, with five appearances in Perth including one partnered with his future wife Miroslava Vavrinec back in 2002, said it would be "a pity" if the event did not continue. "We had an unbe-

lievable event here for so many years -- the Hopman Cup has been very successful from a

player's viewpoint," the three-time winner said.
"The players have al-

ways enjoyed this event, so let's hope it continues in some shape and form," Federer, adding that he believed a mixed teams event was good for tennis. "Where and ow and what, honestly I don't know," he added.

Frenchwoman Alize Cornet, who played four times at the Hopman and won the title with Jo-Wil-fried Tsonga in 2014, was mortified by the prospect of the event disappearing.
"That would be the worst thing ever," she said. "Losing the Hopman Cup after losing Davis Cup and everything that is happening with the ITF, I think it's a big shame

'Yellow vests' storm French ministry as protests turn violent

returned in force to the streets of France this weekend, clashing with police in several cities and smashing their way into a government ministry in Paris with the help of a forklift truck

The interior ministry put the number of protesters who took to the streets on Saturday at 50.000, compared with 32,000 on December 29 when the movement appeared to be weakening after holding a series of weekly Saturday protests since mid-November.

Government spokes-man Benjamin Griveaux, who was evacuated from his ministry in central Paris when a handful of protesters in high-visibility vests smashed down the large wooden door to the ministry compound, denounced the break-in as an "unacceptable at-

tack on the Republic".

"Some yellow vest protesters and other people dressed in black got hold of a construction vehicle which was in the street nearby and smashed open the entrance gate to the ministry," he told AFP.

They briefly entered the courtyard where they smashed up two cars, broke some windows then escaped, he added, saying police were trying to identify them from security footage.

President Emmanuel Macron did not specifically refer to the incident. but tweeted his condem-nation of the "extreme violence" against "the Republic, its guardians, its

Further south in Toulouse, 22 people were detained following clashes that erupted after 2,000 people turned out to demonstrate. And in the central-eastern city of Lyon, several thousands took to the streets, blocking access to the A7 motorway and causing traffic jams for those returning from Christmas holidays in the mountains.

The vellow movement began in rural France over plans to increase fuel taxes. But it later ballooned into a wider revolt against Macron's pro-market policies and governing style, with 282,000 joining the first Saturday

rally on November 17.

Macron initially re-fused to make any concessions, but in mid-December, after weeks of violence, he scrapped the planned fuel tax hike and promised extra cash for minimum wage earners as well as tax cuts for pensioners. The protests have turned into the biggest political crisis of Macron's 20-month presidency and brought his popularity ratings to an all-time low.

Although public anger appeared to abate following his concessions and over the holiday period, the brief arrest on Wednesday of Eric Drouet, one of the leaders of the movement, appeared to rekindle resentment among his supporters.

The latest opinion poll, published on Thurs-day by Odoxa Dentsu, indicated 55 percent support the protests -- a figure which, although lower than the 75 percent back in November, is still important enough to suggest the anti-aus-terity movement retains political clout.

Former cinema icon Brigitte Bardot, who is known today for her rightwing views and an-imal rights activism, on Sunday said she understood what motivated the yellow vest movement.

"When I see the millions spent on incredibly trivial things, when I see politicians using prirate planes and chauffeur-driven cars to get around (...) all this money spent is unaccept-able," she told the Midi Libre newspaper.

Russia: Too early to consider exchange of US spy suspect

Moscow, Jan 6 (AP): Russia's deputy foreign minister brushed back Saturday suggestions that an American being held in Moscow on sus-picion of spying could

be exchanged for a Russian citizen.

The brother of Paul Whelan, however, tells
The Associated Press that he can't help but question whether the events are indeed con-nected. "You look at what's going on and you wonder if this is just a large game of pieces being moved around." David Whelan told the AP via Skype from Newmarket, Ontario.

"You start to wonder if all of these things are connected. But at the same time, they could just be arbitrary events."

Paul Whelan, a former US Marine who also holds Canadian, British and Irish citizenship, was detained in Moscow in late December.

His arrest has led to speculation that Russia could be using him to bargain for a Russian who pleaded guilty to acting as a foreign agent in the United States.

Deputy Foreign Min-er Sergei Ryabkov ister Sergei nyas... said that discussing a possible swap involving Whelan and Maria Butina would be premature because Whelan hasn't been formally charged, according to news agencies. Russian

"As to the possibility exchanges of one sort of another, it's impossible and incorrect to consider the question now when an official charge hasn't even been presented," Ryabkov was quoted as saying by state agency RIA-Novosti.

"Charges will be pre-sented in the near fu-ture," he said, according to the Interfax agency.

Some Russian news

reports earlier cited unnamed sources as saying Whelan had been indicted on espionage charges that carry a possible prison sentence of 20 years.

Officials haven't given details of Whelan's sus-pected activities and he was initially identified only as an American.

At least 30 killed in Afghan gold mine collapse: officials

people were killed when a gold MANILA, JAN 6 (AFP): The death toll from a storm that devastated the mine collapsed in northeastern Afghanistan on Sunday, officials said, in the latest tragedy to strike the

war-torn country.

Another seven were injured in the incident in Kohistan district of Badakhshan province, district governor Mohammad Rustam Ra-ghi told AFP. Villagers had dug a 60-metre (200-feet) deep shaft in a river bed to search for gold. They were inside when the walls fell in.

"The people were using an excavator to dig a big hole in the river when it collapsed, trapping dozens of workers," Raghi said.

"At least 30 people have been killed and seven killed and seven wounded." It was not clear why the shaft col-

lapsed, but the provincial gover-nor's spokesman Nik Mohammad Nazari told AFP the miners were not professionals.

The villagers have been involved in this business for decades with no government control over them," Nazari said.

"We have sent a rescue team to the area, but villagers have already started removing bodies from the site." Defense ministry helicopters have been dispatched to deliver cash to the families of the victims and airlift the wounded to hospitals, said Hashmat Bahaduri, spokesman for the National Disas-

ter Management Authority.

Bahaduri confirmed the casualty toll, but warned the figures could change. Families of the wounded will receive 10,000 afghanis (about USD 130) in compensation, while those of the dead will get 50,000 afghanis, he said.

Badakhshan is a remote, mountainous province in northeast Afghanistan bordering Tajikistan, China and Pakistan.

The impoverished region is one to landslides, particularly in the colder months when heavy

snow blankets the province.

Illegal mining is common in resource-rich Afghanistan, with the Taliban relying on the sector for much of its revenue.

But most of the country's minerals remain untapped as the rag-ing conflict and lack of regulation deter international miners from exploiting the huge reserves.

Malaysia's king abdicates: palace statement



KUALA LUMPUR, JAN 6 (AFP): Malaysia's king has abdicated, royal officials said Sunday, ending weeks of speculation about his future after he took a leave of absence and amid rumours he married a Russian former

Sultan Muhammad V's decision marks the first time a king has abdicated in the Mus-lim-majority country since it gained indepen-dence from Britain in 1957.

"The National Palace informs that his majesty has resigned as the 15th king effective

January 6," said a statement from the palace. It did not give any reason for the 49-year-

old royal's move. But there had been a question mark over the reign of the king, who ascended to the throne in December 2016, since he took a leave of absence for medical treatment in November.

Reports then circulated online that he had married a former Miss Moscow in Russia -- although royal officials in Malaysia have so far not commented on the rumours.
