Apni Party demands restoration of statehood to J-K

SRINAGAR, JUL 18 (PTI): The Jammu and Kashmir Apni Party (JKAP) led by former finance minister Syed Altaf Bukhari on Saturday demanded the restoration of statehood for the union territory and domicile rights over land and jobs for its people.

A party delegation led by Bukhari, who is the JKAP president, called on Jammu and Kashmir Lieutenant Governor Girish Chandra Murmu here to highlight socio-political and economic issues faced by the people of J-K, a spokesman of the party said.

He said the JKAP leaders held detailed discussions on various issues confronting the people, especially after the implementation of the J-K Reorganization Act, 2019.

The meeting was held in an amicable atmosphere and the Lt Governor gave a patient hearing to the delegation and assured all possible support from the government to redress the issues confronting people of Jammu and Kashmir, the spokesman said.

memorandum highlighting some of the important political and socio-economic issues faced by the people of J-K was submitted to the Lt

Governor, he said. The party leaders demanded restoration of statehood to Jammu and Kashmir, saying an early announcement in this regard would further solidify the idea of pluralism and respectful coexistence in the region.

It is more than essential that restoration of statehood to J-K is considered as an immediate requirement for keeping up the spirit of coexistence and allowing a pluralistic blend to continue to shine in this part of the country. We take this opportunity to remind the government of India through your good office about its promise on restoration of statehood including establishment of a Legislative Council and in providing thereto reservation of seats for socially and economically backward classes, art culture, languages, literature and sports, read the memorandum.

The spokesman said the party also demanded domicile rights over land and jobs for the people of J-K.

While our party has been vehemently demanding domicile rights on land and jobs for the people of Jammu and Kashmir, the recent domicile order issued by the union government vis- -vis the rights of residents of J-K on jobs reflects a casual approach.

COVID arrives simultaneously in Gangtok and Singtam

WITH 19 NEW CASES AND TWO PATIENTS MAKING FULL RECOVERIES, SIKKIM NOW HAS 183 ACTIVE CASES

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 18 JUL:

Cikkim's COVID-19 tal-**J**ly reached 273 with 19 new cases being reported on Saturday. With 90 patients, including two on Saturday, having made full recoveries and getting discharged from hospital, the state has 183 active cases - seven lodged at Aayush Hospital in Gyalshing, West Sikkim, and 176 at STNM Hospital here.

The COVID wing at STNM Hospital currently has a capacity of 200 beds including the Triage facility. The pressure for beds is now being felt and there have been instances when doctors and health-workers on COVID duty have had to struggle with moving beds and making space wearing their cumbersome and uncomfortable PPEs.

This situation has now convinced the concerned authorities to

asymptomatic patients at dedicated quarantine centres established elsewhere with arrangement for regular doctor visits and ambulances on standby to ferry passengers to hospitals if they develop symptoms requiring medical attention.

Meanwhile, in his daily health bulletin on Saturday, Health Department DG-cum-Secretary, Pempa T Bhutia, informed that 12 of the 19 new cases were detected from 285 samples tested through

RT-PCR at the VRD Lab at STNM Hospital on Friday. The seven remaining

cases were through Rapid Antigen Testing of 481 samples, he informed.

While providing details of the new cases, Dr Bhutia informed that six persons tested positive during Rapid Antigen Testing in Rongli area - an SSB personnel from Lingtam, three family members of positive patients from GREF and two secondary contacts.

They have all been shifted to the isolation ward at STNM Hospital.

He further informed that an employee of Agriculture Department also tested positive when she was taken to the flu clinic on Friday.

He mentioned that seven officials and staffs of the department were also sent for testing along with three primary contacts of the patient and results are awaited.

On the same, he added that if these direct contacts return positive, testing of other line contacts will begin. The Secretary in-

formed that during testing of eleven contacts of the Agriculture Department employee at Rangpo, one tested positive.

"We are conducting tests of three others who travelled in the same vehicle as the Agri Deptt employee and around 16 TNA staff who had also attended the funeral for which she had travelled to Rangpo. Our teams are working in Rangpo and Gangtok for contact tracing and all will be taken for the testing," he said. He mentioned even if they test negative, repeat testing will be conducted after seven days.

He informed that three village police personnel from Singtam police station have also tested positive and the police station has been contained and Health Department teams were conducting contact tracing at Rangpo and Singtam.

tally to 10,38,716; death toll reaches 26,273 NEW DELHI, JULY 18 (PTI): With 34,884 people testing positive for coronavirus in the last 24 hours, India's COVID-19 caseload surged to 10,38,716 while 6,53,750 patients have recovered from the disease so far, according to data by the Union Health Ministry.

The death toll due to COVID-19 rose to 26,273 with 671 fatalities reported in a day, the data updated at 8 am on Saturday showed.

At present, there are 3,58,692 active cases in the country, while 6,53,750 people have recovered so far and one has migrated.

COVID-19 cases increased by more than 30,000.

According to the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), a cumulative total of 1,34,33,742 samples have been tested for COVID-19 up to July 17 with 3,61,024 samples being tested on Friday.

Of the 671 deaths reported in the last 24 hours, 258 are from Maharashtra, 115 from Karnataka, 79 from Tamil Nadu, 42 from Andhra Pradesh, 38 from Uttar Pradesh, 26 each from West Bengal and Delhi, 17 from Gujarat, nine each from Jammu and Kashmir and Punjab, and eight each from Madhya Pradesh and Rajasthan.

Special plasma donation drive in Patna division

PATNA, JUL 18 (PTI): A special plasma donation drive has been launched in Bihar's Patna division, officials said on Saturday.

AIIMS, Patna has got the nod from the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) to conduct plasma therapy to treat serious COVID-19 patients in the state.

In view of the fast-spreading of Coronavirus cases in the state and low rate of plasma donation, a special plasma donation drive has been launched on Friday at the initiative of Patna, Divisional Commissioner, Sanjay Kumar Agarwal.

Of the nine persons who came forward to donate plasma on the first day of the special drive, three persons were not found fit on the parameters set for donating plasma while six other persons from Nalanda, Khagaria, Buxar and Begusarai districts donated their plasma, Agarwal said in an official release.

Earlier 18 people had donated their plasma before the launch of the special drive.

The official said 20 people have also agreed to donate plasma in next five days.

All the donors will be given 'Thank You Card' and 'Blood Donor Card' by the AIIMS, Patna the **Divisional Commissioner** said, adding that the card will help them receive one unit of blood whenever required for their family within a year.

All the donors will be honoured with 'Corona Yodha Samman' by the respective district administration very soon, Agarwal said.

The Patna Divisional Commissioner has directed all the district magistrates of Patna division to set up a special plasma donor cell in their respective districts.

The DMs will send plasma donors to AIIMS, Patna and ensure proper arrangements especially that of transportation so that plasma donors do not face any problems in commuting from their home for the purpose.

Patna division has six districts - Patna, Nalanda, Bhojpur, Buxar, Rohtas and Kaimur.

AIIMS, Patna has the facility of extracting plasma of four persons in a day, he said, adding that the capacity may be increased.

People will be counselled and motivated to donate plasma for which necessary steps being taken, Agarwal said.

Doctors say that any person, who has recovered from coronavirus and has been keeping healthy in past four weeks, can donate plasma.

TN records all-time high of **COVID-19** cases, fatalities

CHENNAI, JUL 18 (PTI): Tamil Nadu on Saturday reported its highest single day spike in Covid-19 infections as well as the number of daily deaths, with the total infection count crossing 1.65 lakh.

As many as 4,807 new positive cases of Coronavirus were reported from different parts of the state on Saturday, even as over 3,049 people were discharged after recovery.

The state saw 88 fatalities, the highest single day toll so far, pushing the death toll to 2,403, a health department bulle-

With the addition of the new COVID-19 cases, the infection count has gone up to 1,65,714.

Today's recoveries of 3,049 pushed those discharged after treatment

Chennai reported to 1,13,856, the bulletin 1,219 fresh Covid-19 infections. Its overall numbers clocked 84,598 as of Saturday.

According to the bulletin, six of the 88 deceased were persons with "no comorbidities" and the victims included a 31-year-old man from the city who died of 'acute respiratory failure'. Among comorbid cases was a 29-year-old woman from Salem, suffering from systemic hypertension, and she died due to respiratory failure, the bulletin said.

As many as 15 octogenarians were among those who succumbed to

1,219 new infections on Saturday, Tiruvallur (370) and Chengalpet with 323 new cases too reported significantly high numbers.

Vellore recorded 191, Madurai 185, Thanjavur 181, Virudhunagar 179, Sivaganga 170, Tuticorin 160, Tirunelveli 155, Kanyakumari and Theni 144 each, Tiruchirappalli 124, Coimbatore 118, Ranipet 109 cases and Dindigul 104.

Among the new COVID-19 cases reported today, 76 had returned from various domestic and overseas locations.

A government run and a private laboratory each have received approval to conduct testing of samples, taking the number of facilities operating in the state to 111, the bulletin said.

268 new COVID-19 cases in Surat, highest in Gujarat

SURAT, JUL 18 (PTI): Surat district reported 268 new coronavirus cases on Saturday, taking its case tally to 9,973, the Gujarat health department said in a release here.

As in the last several days, the district again reported the highest number of new coronavirus patients in Gujarat. Overall rise in cases in the state was 960 on Saturday.

With ten fatalities,the COVID-19 death toll in the district rose to 426, the health department said.

337 patients were discharged from hospitals after recovery. The number of recovered patients in the district is now 6,315.

Of 268 new cases, 203 were found in Surat city, which also accounted for seven out of ten deaths.

Katargam in Surat city reported 30 cases, the highest among city zones. The area has reported 2,008 coronavirus cases so far.

The local administration said that it has carried out a health survey of 11.34 lakh people so

Amid rising number of cases, some diamond and textile units in the city have temporarily suspended operations voluntarily, while other diamond units were sealed by the authorities after new cases were reported among their employees.

Several diamond units in Umarwada and Varachha localities remain closed.

Being a government-issued order and not a law made by Parliament, the new gazette notification regarding domicile rule for J-K residents is not immune to any judicial review, the spokesman said.

Our demand is that those residents of I-K who have already a valid Permanent Resident Certificate should not be asked for domicile certificates both for possession of land and immovable property or for applying to any government jobs, he said.

The party leaders also demanded security for political activists, the release of detainees, withdrawal of cases against the youth, ensuring J-K Bank's autonomy, support for industry and the manufacturing sector, revival of tourism and restoration of high-speed 4G internet in the UT.

The delegation was assured that a few of the demands mentioned in the memorandum which are exclusively within the jurisdiction of the union government would be forwarded to the concerned quarters with specific recommendations from the J-K government, the spokesman said.

Nepal's ruling communist party's top decision-making body meets to end Oli-Prachanda infighting

KATHMANDU, JUL 18 (PTI): Nepal's ruling communist party's top decision-making body met on Saturday to try and end the tussle for power between Prime Minister K P Sharma Oli and former premier Pushpa Kamal Dahal 'Prachanda'. The meeting of the nine-member Central Secretariat started at around 3.15 pm at the official residence of the prime minister at Baluwatar, according to Oli's press advisor Surya Thapa.

The highest body of the party is expected to discuss the agenda to be presented during Sunday's Standing Committee meeting, which has been postponed five times in recent weeks.

The Standing Committee meeting was postponed until Sunday to give more time to Oli and the rival faction led by Prachanda, the executive chairman of the Nepal Communist Party (NCP) to have more talks to end the intra-party infighting.

Prime Minister Oli, Prachanda, senior leader Madhav Kumar Nepal and Jhalanath Khanal among others are participating in the Central Secretariat meeting.

The meeting will also discuss ways to settle the current dispute surfacing in the party's leadership.

The NCP called a secretariat meeting after the two top leaders agreed to call a conclave of the highest body of the party ahead of the 45-member Standing Committee meeting on Sunday in a bid to strike a power-sharing deal by sorting out their differences.

During previous meetings, Oli has refused to resign or give up his position as chairman of the NCP as demanded by the faction led by Prachanda.

Sunday's Standing Committee meeting is expected to fix the date for the CWC meeting, which will ultimately decide the future of Prime Minister Oli, Ganesh Shah, a Standing Committee member, said. Oli and Prachanda

have held at least eight meetings in recent weeks to sort out the differences between them. But, as the Prime Minister did not accept the condition of a one-man-one-post, the talks failed, party sources said. Top NCP leaders, including 'Prachanda', have been demanding Prime Minister Oli's resignation, saying his recent anti-India remarks were "neither politically correct nor diplomatically appropriate." They are also against Oli's autocratic style of functioning.

The differences grew further after Oli alleged that some of the ruling party leaders are aligning with the southern neighbour to remove him from power after his government issued a new political map incorporating three Indian territories of Kalapani, Lipulekh and Limpiyadhura.

The differences between the two factions of the NCP, one led by Oli and the other led by Prachanda on the issue of power-sharing, intensified after the prime minister unilaterally decided to prorogue the budget session of Parliament.

Chit fund probe panel office closed



CUTTACK, JUL 18 (PTI): The Justice M M Das Commission of Enquiry, which was probing into the chit fund scam in Odisha for nearly six years, has now suspended its functioning after closing its office here on Saturday, an official said.

"The office of the commission was closed following 'no response' from the state government with regard to the extension of its tenure, which had ended in February this year", an official of the Commission said.

Even the state government was yet to respond to the commission's letter with regard to taking possession of the official documents and accessories, he said.

After its seventh interim report and eighth extension, the tenure of the Commission of Enquiry was not extended. Following which, the

commission had written to the state government last month to take possession of the documents and accessories by July 17. "When no response came till yesterday (Friday), we locked the office mendation of the comfrom today", he said.

The commission was set up in July 2013 with Justice RK Patra as its head. Justice Das headed the panel in February 2015 following the death of Patra. The commission had received affidavits from around 15 lakh investors, who had invested their money in about 500 chit fund companies with a combined amount of Rs 3,000 crore.

The state government had set up a corpus fund of Rs 300 crore in 2016 to pay the 'small' investors, who had invested less than Rs 10,000 in various chit fund companies.

Following the recommission, at least 2,000 small investors have got back their invested amount.

Sources said around 8 lakh affidavits from the investors have not been attended to yet.

UIJAIN, JUL 18 (PTI): Devotees from outside Madhya Pradesh will not be allowed to enter the Mahakal temple campus here from July 20 in view of the rising number of COVID-19 cases, an official said on Saturday.

This decision has been taken by the management committee of the temple due to fear that infection might spread if devotees from outside the state are allowed, said temple administrator Sujan Singh Rawat. 'Mahakal' temple is one of the 12 "jyotirlingas" of Lord Shiva which attracts lakhs of devotees every year.

"Amid rising number of cases in Madhya Pradesh, a decision has been taken to ban the entry of devotees coming from other states from Monday," said Rawat.

Ujjain contributed 942 COVID-19 cases in the state's tally of 21,082 cases as on July 17, as per the health department.

Lakhs of devotees from various parts of the country visit the temple during the holy month of Sawan.

"Nowadays, 8,000 devotees are being given entry inside the temple every day through the online booking system," he said, adding that facility of online darshan has also been made available.

CapitalTIMES AIIMS panel nod to human clinical trial of Covaxin

New Delhi, Jul 18 (PTI): The AIIMS Ethics Committee on Saturday gave its nod for a human clinical trial of the indigenously developed COVID-19 vaccine candidate Covaxin following which the premier hospital is likely to begin the exercise by enrolling healthy volunteers from Monday.

AIIMS-Delhi is among the 12 sites selected by the Indian Council for Medical Research (ICMR) for conducting phase I and II human trials of Covaxin. In phase I, the vaccine would be tested on 375 volunteers and the maximum of 100 of them would be from AIIMS.

"The AIIMS Ethics Committee gave its approval for starting the human clinical trial of the indigenously developed Covaxin today.

Healthy volunteers having no comorbid conditions and without a history of COVID-19, aged more than 18 years and less than 55 years, would be eligible to participate in the randomised, double-blind, placebo-controlled clinical trial," Dr Sanjay Rai, Professor at the Centre for Community Medicine at AIIMS

"Few volunteers have already registered for the trial. We would start the screening of the individ-

uals and evaluate their health condition from Monday onwards before vaccinating them," Rai, who is also the principal investigator of the study, said.

Anybody willing to participate in the trial can send an email to Ctaiims.covid19@gmail. com or an SMS to or call on 7428847499, he said. The institute may also put up these contact details on its website.

According to Rai, the Ethics Committee had raised few concerns in the protocol submitted for carrying out of the trial. "Those concerns were addressed to following which the EC gave its approval to begin the trial by the premier institute,"

clinical trials from the Drugs Controller General of India (DCGI).

Noting that this was the first indigenous vaccine being developed by India, ICMR Director General Dr Balram Bhargava in a letter to principal investigators of the 12 sites recently had asked them to fast-track the human clinical trial approvals stating it is one of the "top priority projects which is being monitored at the top-most level of the government".

The trials have so far started in AIIMS, Patna and some more sites.

The DCGI has permitted two vaccines -- one developed by the Bharat Biotech International Limited in collaboration with the ICMR and another one by Zydas Cadila Healthcare Ltd to go in for phase I and II human clinical trials.

Bhargava had said these two vaccine candidates have undergone successful toxicity studies in rats, mice and rabbits and these data was submitted to DCGI following which both got clearance to start the early phase human trials early this month.

They have got their sites ready and approximately 1,000 human volunteers would be participating in the exercise for each of the two indigenously developed vaccine candidates, he had said.

Since India is one of the largest vaccine producers in the world, it is the country's "moral responsibility" to fast-track vaccine development process to break the chain of coronavirus transmission, he had said.



if they have come in contact with the positive person. Employees have also been asked to work from home. Good luck with that.

The Working Women's Hostel in Deorali, where the employee was staying, has also been declared a containment zone.

With COVID numbers rising, the Chief Minister chaired a high-level review meeting of the State Task Force on Saturday. Following the meeting, a joint press conference on the decisions taken during the meeting was held which was addressed by Secretary IPR Department, Namrata Thapa, Secretary Coordination, Rinzing Chewang, Secretary Health Department, Dr Pempa T Bhutia, Secretary Transport Department, Raju Basnet and Sikkim Police ADGP [Law & Order], Akshay Sachdeva.

Health Secretary, Dr PT Bhutia informed that the administration is planning to only bring symptomatic patients to the hospital and keep asymptomatic patients in quarantine facilities. This is being done to avoid exposing a large number of health workers to the virus and since asymptomatic patients don't require round-the-clock medical attention.

The pressure for beds in hospitals as the numbers rise is also being felt now and space and resources needed to be conserved for patients requiring medical attention, an eventuality that is bound to arrive now that the numbers are spiking.

Secretary Coordination, Rinzing Chewang, mentioned that gyms and bars were allowed to open even though it went against the National Guidelines but the Ministry of Home Affairs then wrote a letter to the Chief Secretary raising objection to this dilution of the national guidelines. Due to this, the State government has again prohibited the operation of gym and bar in the State. He urged owners of gym and bars to bear with the guidelines for some more time.

Transport Secretary, Raju Basnet said that the main idea of regulating vehicular movement was to discourage movement of people in the present situation. He informed that the movement of essential services is allowed on the production of valid identity card.

Movement of essential good carriers is allowed as usual without odd-even rule but the vehicle has to return on the same day or stay in the transit camp set up by the administration.

He suggested that the management of hardware and pharma companies in the State should not allow driver and helper to come down of the vehicle while unloading goods and in case of any transmission due to violation of protocols, the administration would take stringent action.

Meanwhile, four days after movement of private vehicles was banned in the state, on Saturday the state government allowed private vehicles back on the roads.

In West, South and North Sikkim, since COVID infections there are relatively low, intra-district movement of people and vehicles, both private and taxis, is allowed following the odd-even rule. People can vehicles can move freely within individual districts. Private vehicles also includes two-wheelers.

In East district, where the numbers have jumped, movement of people and vehicles [both private and taxis following odd-even rule] is allowed only within the respective town limits. So for instance, people of Gangtok can move around within the town but cannot go to Rumtek or Singtam. Intra-district restriction on movement of people means that even transhipment to move from one jurisdiction to the other is also not allowed.

The ban on inter-district movement of people and vehicles is still there while movement of goods is allowed unhindered and without the odd-even regulation.

DC South has issued an order directing all BDOs of the district to activate Village Level Monitoring teams to track any person who may have entered their block from Pakyong or Rongli in the last 10 days i.e from 8 July. If found, such persons should be made to undergo 14 day home quarantine and not allowed to mix with local population.

Residents contracting the virus is a new development for Sikkim and has understandably got everyone worried and scared. It is important to bear in mind that if the prescribed precautions like wearing masks, maintaining social distancing and hand hygiene are observed, people can keep safe. Take for instance the fact that the Sangha MLA has also tested negative. He had reportedly met a COVID-positive person from Rongli recently.


Sanitiser - a fire HAZARD!

Education to Connect, Not Alienate

Make space for the traditional in modern education

The generation that grew up in the seventies and Leighties, even the sixties, went through an education of alienation from their roots. The generation before them received Western education, but also had a strong sense of purpose in desiring to use their learning and education to help in the nation-building process, or, for the generation of the twenties and thirties, securing a free nation for themselves and a future worth looking forward to. By the time the seventies rolled out, although a nation had been acquired, the idealism of nation-building had been jaded by the business of surviving and nepotism. With nothing left to reconnect them to their roots, this generation was deeply indoctrinated by modern education. They learned the subjects well, but lost the perspective and worse still, because they grew up at school, as against also learning at home like the previous generations, they lost cultural nuances and even developed a bias against everything "desi". The generations that have come since have tried to reclaim their roots, but the challenge is stiff because we have lost an entire generation to disinterest. The communication gap is now being bridged with shallow nationalism and palpably aggressive identity politics. We see this in varying degrees all over the world, across India and among the various communities which call Sikkim home or have made the neighbouring regions home. But it need not be so. A slight tweaking of how and what we teach in schools could undo the damage wrecked by the superficiality.

Cultural heritage and traditional knowledge and values are best imbibed in the formative years when the pursuit of knowledge becomes instinctive. And yet, the moment a toddler steps into school, we begin the process of getting them to unlearn everything they have inherited at home and replace it with alphabets, words and numbers which they are made to learn by rote. It is ironic that where monolingual societies are trying to get their young conversant in at least two languages because of its obvious benefits, we, with children who grow up in homes where at least two languages are spoken and can pick up a third at school, begin classes by penalizing multilingual skills!

And from there begins the subconscious alienation from their selfs.

With their language somehow made to appear inferior, because speaking in it attracts punishment and fines, the children subconsciously begin believing everything local/rural/unlettered as somehow being unworthy. This is not a debate over whether local cultures are superior or whether western models are better. What this is setting out to argue is that sidelining of local references and traditional knowledge base is ill-informed and dangerous because it has been grooming generations which don't fit well anywhere – neither at home nor in the global ranks. As the cliché goes, strengthen their roots, and they will weather through life well. As mentioned earlier, since early childhood education draws most of its influences from Western education and curriculum, it alienates children from their own culture and traditions. The morals, values and life-lessons that the story-reading sessions in schools seek to deliver definitely has many examples in the local languages and cultures. If these were included into the curriculum, children would grow up with a more confident idea of self and less suspicious of outside influences because they will have reference points from their own homes and cultures to distil and explain the world. A good place to begin will be to set aside one section at least every week where local elders are invited to narrate local folktales to children and also explain proverbs from local languages. This will make the elders feel required, make the young appreciate the depth of their cultural heritage, and will also be fun. Over time, these could be worked into the formal curriculum and expanded to cover stories of local places of interest, practices and rituals. One could also consider reworking the school timings so that the students can participate in local economies and practices more meaningfully. The current timings are too strict to allow for this. The school in a village dependent on dairy farming could adjust timings to allow children to help with livestock chores, and elsewhere, timetables could be adjusted to allow for kids to help at paddy fields or with cardamom harvests... and the options could go on. Connect them so and the children will receive an education which connects them better to their roots. Don't do it, and education continues alienating.

Formal education has its benefits and one of its strongest aspects is its adaptability. Unfortunately, in the hands of uninspired school managements, this fluidity of learning is compromised, even sacrificed. Where classrooms should celebrate learning, they end up force-feeding lessons. Where local communities should be invited to participate in how their children are taught and educated, they are made passive recipients of a centrally dictated, Department driven model of education.



Herd immunity: Why the figure is always a bit vague

Mearly 100 years ago, two British researchers, William Topley and Graham Wilson, were experimenting with bacterial infections in mice. They noticed that individual survival depended on how many of the mice were vaccinated. So the role of the immunity of an individual needed to be distinguished from the immunity of the entire herd.

Fast forward a century and the concept of "herd immunity" is now widely discussed in government dispatches and newspaper articles. But what does it actually mean?

When a disease such as COVID-19 spreads through the population, it leaves some people immune, at least in the short term. The people who become infected later will increasingly have contact with these immune people and not with the susceptible ones. As a result, the risk of infection is reduced and eventually the disease stops spreading. This might happen even if some people in the population are still susceptible.

Vaccination can be used to protect susceptible people and thereby hasten the decline of the epidemic. It can also be used to stop the virus from spreading in the first place.

HOW DOES IT WORKS

Imagine a population in which everybody is susceptible. An infected person (the red dot in the chart below) arrives and the virus spreads with the ever-increasing number of new cases. The epidemic continues until most individuals catch the virus and become immune to it or die.

If some people are protected - for example, in the initial stages of a mass vaccination programme the disease will spread more slowly.

An even more substantial proportion needs to be protected to completely stop the virus, but amazingly it does not need to be the whole popu-

In the 1970s, mathematical epidemiologists found out that this proportion depends on how infectious the disease is, with a simple formula relating it to the reproductive number, R. For measles

this critical percentage is 95%, but for influenza, it could be as low as 35%.

Once the population reaches herd immunity, either through vaccination or naturally by recovering from the disease, any new infection chain will quickly die out. In this way, the population is protected from future outbreaks, but only as long as the immunity levels are maintained.

If the immunity level falls below the critical value, the disease can reemerge. Newborn individuals who are susceptible will need to be vaccinated, and those whose resistance to the disease falls over time might need boosters.

CORONAVIRUS HERD IMMUNITY

The current estimate of R for COVID-19 is around 3, but is perhaps as low as 1.4 and as high as 4. The corresponding herd immunity level is 60% (50% to 75%).

This value is in the absence of any non-pharmaceutical control measures, such as lockdown. Maintaining some levels of social distancing in the long term allows the desired immunity to be lower while keeping the population safe.

A long time might be needed to eventually eradicate the disease, even after the herd immunity level is reached. So the final size of the epidemic, the number of people who have been through infection when the virus is finally eradicated, can be much higher.

ARE WE THERE YET?

It is not easy to determine how close we are to the herd immunity level or whether we will ever

First, the critical assumption is that the coronavirus infection results in a lasting and uniform resistance to future outbreaks. This is far from certain, and if people can catch the SARS-CoV-2 virus more than once, as is the case for the common cold, it will make herd immunity disappear. From large studies to estimate the population immunity, we know that the numbers are currently between 5% and 25%

Second, the reproductive number, R, varies with location, and so does the herd immunity level needed to stop the disease.

Third, studies suggest that some people have a

much higher resistance to COVID-19, perhaps because they suffered from another similar disease in the past or were vaccinated against other diseases.

Finally, there is a large variability in people's response to the virus and in the length of time for which someone preserves the levels of antibodies they use to fight the infection. The immunity might not be equally distributed among those who have been ill with COVID-19.

People who suffer most might come from the areas that are also most at risk. Such diversity might significantly lower the herd immunity levels needed to stop the disease by targeting only these parts of the society where it is needed most. This phenomenon resembles the ring vaccination strategy that was successfully used to combat such diseases as smallpox.

INDIVIDUALS OR THE HERD

The concept of herd immunity, although useful for planning a response to the pandemic, is not without controversy. In a campaign to achieve it, many people are exposed to an increased individual risk to protect the rest of the population.

Not imposing strict lockdown measures or relaxing too early might lead to people becoming immune to COVID-19 sooner, reaching herd immunity earlier. But this also leads to excess deaths of vulnerable people who would have survived otherwise.

Herd immunity needs to be maintained. The level required to stop the disease depends on disease transmission, which in turn depends on human behaviour. When faced with potentially grim consequences, our behaviour is naturally to prevent the transmission, which lowers the herd immunity requirement.

Once this is reached, other factors (social, economic, risk of vaccine complications) become more important, transmission increases as a result of behaviour change, and herd immunity is lost. In devising successful strategies, governments must take into account both the population and individual risks and benefits.

Mandela was a flawed icon. But without him South Africa would be a sadder place

■ watched Nelson Mandela, the South African liberation struggle hero, leave prison on 11 February 1990, and then mount the podium in front of Cape Town's City Hall, expressing the hope that the apartheid government would agree to negotiations so that there might no longer be the need for armed struggle against apartheid to continue. He said:

Today, the majority of South Africans. black and white, recognise that apartheid has no future. It has to be ended by our decisive mass action ... We have waited too long for our freedom.

He appealed to white South Africans to "join us in the safety of a new South Africa. The freedom movement is a political home for you, too."

I was thrilled but also, underneath that, felt concern about the forces against him. I worried about the violence the apartheid military and its proxies would unleash.

I fretted about what I'd seen during my decade of membership of the African National Congress (ANC), the leading liberation movement for which he was jailed: the seeping corruption, elbowing for position, the exile old guard's insistence on primacy. And, as he left prison hand in hand with his wife, Winnie, I feared the influence of a woman who'd already been convicted of kidnapping, and accused of so much more.

As I will show, these concerns were borne out. But, three decades on since his release, it still feels that without Mandela South Africa would be a sadder place.

The "Great Man" take on the past so often misses the undercurrents that keep greatness afloat, and yet there are few moments in recent world history where one person made quite such a difference.

Mandela's extraordinary gifts -

– set him apart. Towards the end of his 27 years in prison, that meant leading in a direction that felt uncomfortable to some, through conducting secret talks with the government.

COMPROMISE AND BARGAIN

Throughout this period he kept Oliver Tambo's exile leadership of the ANC informed. But there were misgivings about his role. Mandela later went out of his way to allay these

The example I recall most vividly (because I had to rush around closing secret offices and bank accounts) came six months after his release when the leadership of "Operation Vula" (the ANC and South African Communist Party's underground network) were rounded up.

FW De Klerk, the last apartheid president, used the arrests to demand that the Communist Party leader Joe Slovo be dropped from the ANC's negotiating team. But Mandela, who'd once been a party member, dug in. De Klerk backed down, and eventually indemnified the group.

The four years of negotiations saw more people killed in political violence - mostly from the state and its proxies, with an estimated 14,000 people dying. Mandela could not prevent this mayhem, but his authority and gravitas kept the negotiations to end apartheid afloat. Authority and momentum seeped from De Klerk into Mandela.

Still, he and his team had to make compromises. One was that the apartheid military were mollycoddled because of the danger they presented. Another was that the ANC had to allow Inkatha, the Zulu-nationalist party led by Mangosuthu Buthelezi, control of KwaZulu-Natal.

In the end, Mandela's team got more than many expected - a

MANDELA'S PRESIDENCY

Mandela's five years as president were more ambiguous. He helped keep the peace through gestures like appointing De Klerk and Buthelezi to his cabinet, wearing Springbok colours in presenting the rugby World Cup trophy to the victorious South African side in 1995 and securing the formation of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission.

There were real changes, including houses for the poor and water supplies for three million, with two million connected to the electricity grid. But job-creation programmes were abandoned and the gap between rich and poor remained even if the ranks of the rich became more racially mixed - and crime rates remained disturbingly high.

It is sometimes said that the corruption that engulfed the country started during Thabo Mbeki's presidency (June 1999 to September 2008) and became endemic under Jacob Zuma (May 2009 to February 2018). But the seeds were sown earlier, and Mandela did little to curb its growth within the ANC while leader.

He also neglected the HIV/AIDS pandemic while president. When I discussed this with Edwin Cameron, the Constitutional Court judge and HIV/AIDS activist, in an interview published in South Africa's Sunday Independent in 2001, he shook his head sadly.

Of all the leaders of the 20th centurv who might have had an impact, Mandela was the one who could have done the most - without doubt this was one of the grievous omissions of his presidency... He did 199 things that contributed to our nation's salvation but the one thing he didn't do as president was take a lead on AIDS -

his integrity and self-discipline, in- one-person, one-vote election and a and it's not because he wasn't begged litical runes was not always matched by his ability to read people. Internal political leaders who'd publicly criticised Winnie were sidelined but his patrician's hope that he could have a benign influence on her evaporated. They separated in 1992 and divorced in 1995.

SECURE LEGACY

Mandela's tendency to defer to the exile leadership came at a cost. He appointed several dud former exiles to his cabinet, including the dozy Alfred Nzo as foreign affairs minister and the corrupt Joe Modise as defence minister.

He also conceded to pressure from exile leaders to appoint Mbeki rather than Cyril Ramaphosa as deputy president, despite having earlier swapped them as negotiations head, regarding Mbeki as thin-skinned and inflexible, according to his official biographer, Anthony Sampson. Yet Mandela increasingly delegated power to his dauphin, who displayed the paranoia and obduracy he'd feared.

Mandela left at the right time in 1999, when the country still seemed in a healthy state, after which he consolidated his international reputation, while throwing himself into the HIV/AIDS campaign on learning that his son, Makgatho, was HIV-positive. He described it as a war that had killed more than "all previous wars".

This 18th of July marks what would have been his 102nd birthday. His legacy is secure, the rough edges smoothed - a figure of reconciliation more than a guerrilla leader, a statesman, not a former communist, an icon solidified in sculptor's stone rather than a magnificent, flawed and complex human being.

BHAGALPUR (BIHAR), JUL 18 (PTI): A number of senior administrative officials in Bhagalpur have tested positive for the coronavirus, crippling the day-today government work in the district, sources said.

Deputy Superintendent of the state-run Jawaharlal Nehru Medical College and Hospital (JLNMCH) Gaurav Kumar said Saturday that Bhagalpur Divisional Commissioner Vandana Kini is the latest to test positive for the virus on Friday, following which she has gone into self-quarantine.

She joins a long list of the infected officials, including District Magistrate Pranav Kumar, Deputy Development Commissioner Sunil Kumar Singh and Additional District Magistrate Rajesh Kumar Jha.

Other senior officials like District Education Officer Sanjay Kumar Singh and District Project Manager (Health) Mohammad Faiyaz Alam, Superintendent of JLNMCH Dr Ashok Bhagat besides half-adozen other doctors of the medical college have been found infected. The situation is a lit-

tle better in the police department.

Though Superintendent of Police Ashish Bharti is safe, his four security guards have tested positive following which he has been working from his residential office, sources in the police department said.

Gaurav Kumar, who is looking after the affairs of JLNMCH in the absence of the Superintendent, said Kini is among 901 people found positive for the virus on Friday.

The divisional commissioner and other senior officers of the district administration who have been infected by COVID-19 have been keeping themselves in isolation at their respective homes.

Bhagalpur, known for its unique silk fabrics called "Tussah or Tusser", stands second to Patna in terms of number of COVID cases across Bihar.

Bhagalpur has a caseload of 1,455 cases while Patna has 3,245, according to a health department bulletin.

As per the bulletin, the total number of positive cases has reached 24,997 in the state.

District Magistrate Pranav Kumar, whose wife and children too have been infected, is being treated in Patna.

The DM had tested positive on July 11 at JL-NMCH, after which he handed over the charge to ADM Rajesh Kumar Jha who along with DDC and other officials also tested positive two days later (on July 13).

The total number of people losing their lives in this year's flood and landslides in the state has gone up to 102. While 76 people died in flood-related incidents, 26 were killed in landslides, the official bulletin had said.

Stokes and Sibley tons let England declare at 469-9

MANCHESTER, JUL 17 (AP): Ultra-careful centuries by Ben Stokes and Dom Sibley allowed England to declare against the West Indies on 469-9 and reinforce their command of the second Test two days in on Friday.

Giving themselves an hour to bowl at the visitors, England profited by dismissing John Campbell on 12 to leave West Indies 32-1 at stumps and seeking a face-saving draw.

The West Indies won the first Test in Southampton last week as a front-runner, but it has trailed at Old Trafford for most of this Test after wasting the initiative on Thursday.

Its morale was hammered on Friday as Stokes made 176 and Sibley 120 in a laborious stand worth 260, England's biggest at home in nine years.

The batsmen came together when England was a precarious 81-3 on Thursday afternoon and the West Indies attack was finally focused, but Sibley, the opener, and the mercurial Stokes hunkered down. Their crawl continued on Friday, increasing England's advantage hour by painstaking hour.

Sibley was first to a hundred -- his second in tests -- just before lunch. He gave a big fist pump to celebrate his 312-ball century, the slowest in test cricket since November 2014, when Tamim Iqbal also needed 312 balls for Bangladesh against Zimbabwe.

Stokes, on 99 at lunch, soon after brought up his 10th test hundred with a reverse sweep. It was his fourth hundred in 12 Tests.

Sibley's innings ended when he tried to up the run rate. He smashed spinner Roston Chase to Kemar Roach as he ran round from mid-wicket.

Sibley faced 372 balls for his second highest test score, behind only the 133 he made against South Africa in Cape Town in January. He hit only five boundaries in more than nine hours at the crease.

Ollie Pope was then trapped plumb in front of the stumps on 7 by Chase, but Stokes, joined in the middle by Jos Buttler, had already begun to take advantage of the tired West Indian fast bowlers. Stokes was dropped on 157 by Shai Hope at gully off Shannon Gabriel, and eventually dismissed after tea on 176, his second highest test score.

Stokes tried to reverse Roach and edged behind. He faced 356 balls, and hit two sixes and 17 fours.

IIT-KGP develops weather forecast system to help farmers

Sponsored by the Ministry of Earth Sciences, two projects - 'Gramin Krishi Mausam Sewa' and 'Forecasting Agricultural output using Space, Agrometeorology and Land- based observations' - provide weather information to farmers to improve their economic return, the official said.

weather forecast system ry offers crop selection, planting time, land preparation, input management and yield. It is based on future weather and land characteristics of a specific location," agricultural and food engineering department's professor Dilip Kumar Swain said.

Farmers get awareness on managing inputs such as fertiliser, irrigation and pesticide every week throughout the cropping season.

"Based on a five-day weather forecast, the agro- advisory is prepared on Tuesday and Friday every week and sent to farmers' cell phones, he said. The advisory is being sent in Bengali to about three lakh farmers of West Medinipur, Jhargram, Bankura, Birbhum, and Purulia in West Bengal.

Using the advisory, they can protect their crop from extreme weather events and reduce production cost by need- based irrigation, fertiliser and pesticide applications, the professor said.

IIT Kharagpur director professor Virendra Kumar Tewari said, "Besides sending the agro-advisory, we also conduct training and awareness programmes regularly in villages on organic and integrated farming and advanced production technology for sustainable agricultural growth.



"With what we've done in the last seasons, people will think we're favourites but I've never won a game before because I was the favourite or lost a game because I was not the favourite," he said. "We lost that day [in 2017], it was a tight game, but this period was just the beginning [of my time at City] and we were still getting to know each other."

Guardiola did point to his record in semi-finals as a manager as a concern. At City, Bayern Munich and Barcelona he has lost seven of 21 semi-finals. He has managed in 17 finals (European Super Cups do not have semis) and won 16.

Fans allowed back into English sports events from next week

LONDON, JUL 18 (AP): Spectators will be allowed back into some sports events in England from next week as coronavirus prevention measures are tested ahead of a planned wider reopening of stadiums in October.

Domestic cricket on July 26-27 is set to be the first sport that fans are allowed to watch in person since March.

Some spectators will also be allowed into the world snooker championship in Sheffield from July 31, and the Glorious Goodwood horse racing festival on Aug. 1 is also part of a government scheme piloting the return of fans.

From October we intend to bring back audiences in stadia ... in a COVID-secure way subject to the successful outcome of pilots, British Prime Minister Boris Johnson said in Downing Street on Friday.

Prof. Susan Michie, who advises the government on the pandemic response, fears reopening sports to fans particularly indoor venues could lead to a rise in virus cases and another lockdown.

We've gone too far, too fast already, Michie said in an interview.

Mikel Arteta says Arsenal matching Manchester City impossible after break

NICK AMES LONDON, 18 JUL [THEGUARDIAN]: When Mikel Arteta looks over the Wemblev turf on Saturday night, what will he see? Part of the answer is simple: at certain points he will have to watch Manchester City whirring into gear and rendering his players virtual onlookers, regardless of the outcome. Arteta was asked whether Arsenal's transition to his preferred style had been slower than expected and the bristling in his reply was unmistakable.

"No," he said. "You are asking me if I wanted to play, after a two-month break, like City right now? Look back on the issues we had with a lot of players, with all the injuries, with suspensions, with players out. It is impossible. I need to adapt, I need to win games and I need to find ways to do that. My task, my longterm situation, in how we want to play is very



clear." EU tells US: Stop threatening our companies with sanctions

BRUSSELS, JUL 18 (AP): The European Union is warning the Trump administration to hold off threatening trade sanctions against EU companies involved in the completion of new German-Russian and Turkish-Russian natural gas pipelines and instead discuss differences as allies.

This week, the Trump administration warned companies involved in the projects they will be subject to US penalties unless they halt their work. The move has further increased tension in already fraught US-European ties.

I am deeply concerned at the growing use of sanctions, or the threat of sanctions, by the United States against European companies and interests," EU foreign policy chief Josep Borrell said in a statement, adding similar attempts had already been made in cases involving Iran, Cuba and the Interna-



Where policy differences exist, the European Union is always open to dialogue. But this cannot take place against the threat of sanctions," Borrell said. European policies should be determined here in Europe, not by third countries."

US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo announced this week the administration is ending grandfather clauses that had spared firms previously involved in the pipelines' construction from sanctions authorized by the Countering America's Adversaries Through

Sanctions Act, a 2017 law aimed at punishing Russia, in particular, for interference in U.S. elections and other matters.

The move opens the door for U.S. economic and financial penalties to be imposed on any European or other foreign company over

the Nord Stream 2 and TurkStream piplelines, including those that had been working on the projects before the passage of the act and had been previously exempted from the penalties.

Borrell said that as a matter of principle the European Union opposes the use of sanctions by third countries on European companies carrying out legitimate business."

The Trump administration has lobbied Europe, particularly Germany, to abandon the pipelines, which it believes put Europe under greater influence from Russia, which has used its energy exports as political leverage.

Pompeo called the pipeline projects the the Kremlin's key tools to exploit and expand European dependence on Russian energy supplies, which he said ultimately undermine trans-Atlantic security.

BEIJING, JUL 18 (AP): At least 14 people have died in the latest round of seasonal rains and flooding in southern China, as soldiers and workers built makeshift barriers with sandbags and rocks Saturday to keep the Yangtze River and its tributaries at bay.

Three floodgates of the Three Gorges Dam that spans the Yangtze were opened as the water level behind the massive dam rose more than 15 meters (50 feet) above flood level, the official Xinhua News Agency reported.

The dam was holding back about 45% of the water, Xinhua said, citing China Three Gorges Corp.

Upstream, 11 people had been killed in Chongqing as of Saturday morning, China National Emergency Broadcasting said in an online report, citing the municipal emergency agency. More than 20,000 people had been evacuated and 1,031 homes destroyed.

Three landslides in Dunhao town in a mountainous part of Chongqing left six dead, the city's **Emergency Management** Bureau said. The bodies had been found by Friday evening after more than 200 people were dispatched for a search and rescue operation. Rainfall in the town of Dunhao totaled 39 centimeters (15 inches), the bureau said.

Three more people died in neighbouring Hubei province, the emergency management department said in a social media post.

broadcaster State CCTV showed people cleaning up still wet, muddy streets and shops in the city of Enshi after severe flooding Friday.

Rescue workers used inflatable rafts to rescue more than 1,900 people trapped in their homes and other buildings.

Downriver, firefighters and others finished filling in a 188-meter (620-foot) break in a dike on Poyang Lake, China's largest freshwater lake, Xinhua said.

The dike gave way nine days ago, flooding 15 villages and agricultural fields in Jiangxi province, the news agency said. More than 14,000 people were evacuated.

The incoming waters were expected to peak Saturday behind the Three Gorges Dam, but more water is forecast to arrive around Tuesday, Xinhua said. The hydropower dam is used to mitigate catastrophic flooding. Seasonal flooding strikes large parts of China annually, especially in its central and southern regions, but the rainfall has been unusually high this year.

About 1.8 million people have been evacuated and direct losses attributed to flooding are estimated at more than 49 billion yuan (7 billion), according to the Ministry of Emergency Management.

Major cities have been spared so far, but concern has risen over Wuhan and other downstream metropolises that are home to tens of millions of people.

China's worst floods in recent years were in 1998, when more than 2,000 people died and almost 3 million homes were destroyed, mostly along the Yangtze.

Iran estimates it has 25 million coronavirus infections



TEHRAN, JUL 18 (AP): Iran's president on Saturday estimated as many as in recent weeks, closing 25 million Iranians could some public spaces like have been infected with coffee shops, zoos, and the coronavirus since the outbreak's beginning, as he urged the public to take the pandemic seriously, the state-run IRNA news agency reported Saturday.

Hassan Rouhani cited a new Iranian Health Ministry study in offering the unprecedentedly high numbers.

Rouhani also said about 30 to 35 million will be infected to the virus in the coming months.

We have to estimate that 30 to 35 million people will be exposed to the virus, which is very important, Rouhani added.

Iranians officials have not explained on what the report's estimates are based. The study has so far not been made publicly available.

Referring to the report, Rouhani said it also predicts that the number of hospitalisations will soon be "twice as many as we have seen in the last 150 days. Iran has seen the worst outbreak in the Middle East, with more than 270,000 confirmed cases and at least 13,979 deaths.

That includes 2,166 new cases and 188 deaths in the last 24 hours, according to the Health Ministry.

Authorities in the capital of Tehran are imposing new restrictions from Saturday, amid the severe increase in cases indoor swimming pools.

Rouhani's most recent remarks show that questions remain over the country's official figures from the outbreak, even after officials have publicly acknowledged its importance.

Before Iran reported its first cases of the virus in February, authorities denied it had reached the country for days, allowing the virus time to spread as the nation marked the 41st anniversary of the Islamic Revolution with mass demonstrations and then held a parliamentary election in which authorities desperately sought to boost turnout.

A parliamentary report in April said Iran's death toll is likely nearly double the officially reported figures. Given insufficient testing, the report said the number of people infected at the time was probably eight to 10 times higher than the reported figures.

Even today, Iranian death tolls remain based on those who died in coronavirus wards in hospitals. However, it's believed that many more died at home, and some families have reportedly asked doctors not to mention their loved ones died of the virus to avoid the stigma associated with COVID-19, the illness caused by the virus.

John Lewis, lion of civil rights and Congress, dies at 80

ATLANTA, JUL 18 (AP): John Lewis, a lion of the civil rights movement whose bloody beating by Alabama state troopers in 1965 helped galvanise opposition to racial segregation, and who went on to a long and celebrated career in Congress, died. He was 80.

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi confirmed Lewis' passing late Friday night, calling him one of the greatest heroes of American history. All of us were humbled to call Congressman Lewis a colleague, and are heartbroken by his passing, Pelosi said. May his memory be an inspiration that moves us all to, in the face of injustice, make 'good trouble, necessary trouble.

Lewis's announcement in late December 2019 that he had been diagnosed with advanced pancreatic cancer I have never faced a fight quite like the one I have now, he said inspired tributes from both sides of the aisle, and an unstated accord that the likely passing of this Atlanta Democrat would represent the end of an era.

Lewis was the youngest and last survivor of the Big Six civil rights activists, a group led by the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. that had the greatest impact on the movement. He was best known for leading some 600 protesters in the Bloody Sunday march across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma.

At age 25 walking at the head of the march with his hands tucked in the pockets of his tan overcoat Lewis was knocked to the ground and beaten by police. His skull was fractured, and nationally televised images of the brutality forced the country's attention on racial oppression in the South.

Within days, King led more marches in the state, and President Lyndon Johnson soon was pressing Congress to pass the Voting Rights Act. The bill became law later that year, removing barriers that had barred Blacks from voting.

John is an American hero who helped lead a movement and risked his life for our most fundamental rights; he bears scars that attest to his indefatigable spirit and persistence, House Majority Leader Steny Hoyer said after Lewis announced his cancer diagnosis.

Lewis joined King and four other civil rights leaders in organizing the 1963 March on Washington. He spoke to the vast crowd just before King delivered his epochal I Have a Dream speech.

A 23-year-old firebrand, Lewis toned down his intended remarks at the insistence of others, dropping a reference to a scorched earth march through the South and scaling back criticisms of President John Kennedy. It was a potent speech nonetheless, in which he vowed: By the forces of our demands, our determination and our numbers, we shall splinter the segregated South into a thousand pieces and put them together in an image of God and democracy.

It was almost immediately, and forever, overshadowed by the words of

segregated Troy State University.

Baptist Theological Seminary and Fisk University in Nashville, Tennessee. He began organizing sit-in demonstrations at whites-only lunch counters and volbeatings and arrests while traveling around the South to challenge segregation Lewis helped found the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee and was named its chairman in 1963, making him one of the Big Six at a tender age. The others, in addition to King, were Whitney Young of the National Urban League; A. Philip Randolph of the Negro American Labor Council; NAACP. All six met at the Roosevelt Hotel in New York to plan and announce the March on Washington.
